## Reduced Price Lunches To Increase

As a result of Congressional action, effective January 1, 1981, the price of reduced lunches will increase from 10¢ to 20¢ per day. The Iuka Public Schools will make this change effective January 12, 1981. Students will be charged 20¢ per day or \$1.00 per week for reduced lunches. This applies to school lunches only, the price of reduced breakfast will remain 5¢.

## Special Election Set To Fill Alderman Seat

The City of Iuka will hold a special election on Tuesday, February 10, to fill the unexpired Alderman seat, left empty following the death of Board Member Floyd Curtis, on December 6.

The date was set during the regular monthly board meeting held on Tuesday night, January 6. The special election is necessary, because there was more than six months remaining of his unexpired term. Iuka's regular city elections are scheduled for May, with new city officials taking office during

July, 1981.

Each candidate will be required to qualify at least 10 days before the date of the special election on February 10. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes, the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will have their names placed on the ballot for an election to be held one week later.

Polls at City Hall will be open from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m., and the candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast in the election will be elected.

## Draft Registration Underway In County

Twenty-five 18 year old Tishomingo County men registered Monday at the Iuka Post Office in the second round of registration for the Selective Service of the United States, a spokesman for the Post Office said.

The initial day of registration was July 21, 1979, when the draft was reinstated after several years of no registration for the draft.

Registration was Monday for men born in the first three months of 1962, continuing through Friday. Those with

birthdays in the second quarter of the year should have registered Tuesday; third quarter birthdays men on Wednesday; fourth quarter birthdays on Thursday, Friday and Saturday are make-up days for those who were unable to register on their day.

After Saturday, men are to register after reaching their 18th birthday.

Eligible males can register by asking postal clerks for registration cards, filling them out at the post office and returning them to the clerks.

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## ASCS Farm News

No Set-Aside  
For Cotton

Cotton farmers will not be required to set-aside or divert cropland for the 1981 cotton crop in order to be eligible for program benefits, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee for Tishomingo County.

The chairperson said that U.S. Department of Agriculture officials in Washington decided that there was no need for a set-aside program in 1981 because of extremely poor growing conditions which reduced 1980 production. The reduced crop, along with continued relatively strong demand for cotton, likely will result in a carryover next fall of about 2.6 million bales. Participating farmers will be eligible for price support loans on their 1981 crop. They will also be offered protection in the event (1) they are prevented from planting due to natural disaster, (2) suffer crop failure due to natural disaster, or (3) the market drops below a specified level. Originally, the U.S. Department of Agriculture had

proposed that cotton producers be required to plant within the normal crop acreage established for the farm. Bridges said. Subsequent action by Congress ruled out the proposal. The congressional action prohibits adding 1981 crop acreage increases to the normal crop acreage for subsequent years.

A preliminary 1981 crop upland cotton national program acreage of 14,021,538 acres was also announced. The program acreage is an estimate of the number of acres needed to meet domestic needs, export demand, and provide a desirable carryover. Bridges said that an allocation factor will be determined by dividing the final program acreage by the estimated national harvested acreage of the 1981 crop. The factor cannot exceed 100 percent. Bridges went on to explain that farmers who plant no more upland cotton in 1981 than was planted and considered planted in 1980 will not be subject to the allocation factor.

The target price for the 1981 upland cotton crop will be announced next spring when final yield and production cost estimates become available for the 1980 crop. Department officials estimate that the 1981 target price may be between 68.5 and 75.5 cents per pound. The 1980 target

## Conservation Notes

The two most common agencies causing soil erosion are water and wind. Water erodes soil mainly in two ways: (1) by the violent splash of the falling raindrops, and

(2) by the scouring action of soil-laden water. Falling raindrops splash soil in the same manner that a rock will splash a pool of water. Raindrops fall at a speed of about 20 miles per hour. A single raindrop may splash wet soil as much as two feet high and five feet from the spot where the raindrop hits. Continuous bom-

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bardment causes untold damage. A single, beating 1-inch rain may splash as much as 1 inch of soil depth by raindrop erosion. To get some idea of the force involved in this erosion, the weight of an acre of soil 1 inch deep is about 150 tons. Through raindrop erosion, 1 inch of rain may thus move 150 tons of soil on each acre.

Movement of soil by splash erosion is the primary cause of sheet erosion. By sheet erosion is meant the removal of soil in a more or less continuous thin sheet over the surface of the soil. This type of erosion is usually so slow that the farmer is seldom aware of its existence. Along sandy shores, sand dunes are evidence of geological wind erosion. Farther inland, wind erosion is evidence of poor land use. Sandy soils which have been overcut, overgrazed, or overplowed soon dry out and are subject to blowing by the wind.

As the wind increases in drying power and velocity, deeper layers of soil are sucked dry. Water which formerly helped to bind the soil particles together is lost rapidly by evaporation. The result is a sorting action of the wind which: (1) picks up the finer and more fertile fine sand and silt particles and moves them miles as clouds of dust; (2) rolls and hops coarser sand particles and certain clay granules along near the surface. These particles lodge against clumps of grass, crop residues, or fence rows, and momentarily come to rest. Most wind-erosion can be repaired by establishing adapted

vegetation. If you would like more information on how to control wind and water erosion, please come by or call the Soil Conservation Service office in Iuka.

SPECIAL REPORT:

### Religious Exemption



I am very pleased that Congress has enacted legislation I originally introduced to provide tax relief for missionaries and others who are engaged in religious or charitable work overseas.

This legislation, first introduced in June 1979 to correct the adverse impact of a 1978 tax law adjustment, allows an income tax exemption for a portion of the earnings of those persons involved in missionary or charitable work in foreign fields.

Without this change in the law, many religious and charitable groups were faced with reducing their activities overseas, and many of these missionaries and other workers would have been forced to give up their very worthwhile service.

The result of the 1978 Foreign Earned Income Act has required religious and charitable workers overseas to pay an additional \$1,000 to \$4,000 annually in federal income taxes.

Tax hikes of this magnitude would have a very adverse impact on our private missionary and charity activities. In recent years, many of these organizations have experienced great difficulty in adjusting pay scales to keep pace with inflation

and the declining value of the dollar.

Unlike their counterparts in private industry, they have no way to pass along cost increases and can adjust to such an added burden only by cutting the services they provide.

I pointed out in my testimony before the Senate Finance Committee on behalf of our bill that concern had first been expressed to me by religious leaders and missionary officials in Mississippi. I discovered that other organizations such as CARE, the Salvation Army, the YMCA and the YWCA, and agricultural officials from land grant colleges working in developing countries overseas were also adversely affected.

For example, the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board informed me that the 1978 act would impose nearly \$1 million in additional taxes. To a foreign mission board of any religious denomination, or any non-profit charitable organization, this jeopardizes very important services.

Other Senators and Congressmen subsequently joined me in seeking legislative relief for religious and charitable workers in foreign countries.

During the closing days of the 96th Congress, an amendment was successfully added to a House bill, H.R. 4968, to include language similar to my original bill, S. 1872. Passage of this bill was obtained in both the Senate and the House.

The bill containing this tax relief for missionaries and charitable workers overseas was dispatched to the President's desk as the recent lameduck session came to final adjournment.

Under the new act, American missionaries and charitable workers overseas could exempt the first \$20,000 of earned income from federal taxes. Without this legislation, many of our missionaries and other workers were faced with a hard decision as to whether or not they could remain in these foreign fields.

I do not believe the authors of the 1978 act realized the very serious impact that law would have on religious and charitable workers.

Our missionaries and charitable workers overseas should be encouraged to continue to carry out their service, not discouraged by punitive tax laws.

## Danger after an accident.



In an automobile accident, stay inside your car if you see that power lines have been knocked down. Wait for help. But if there is a fire or some other emergency that forces you out, then jump clear. Never touch the car and ground at the same time. Otherwise a serious electrical shock could result.

Downed power lines are dangerous. Stay away, and report them to us immediately.

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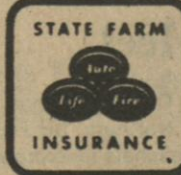


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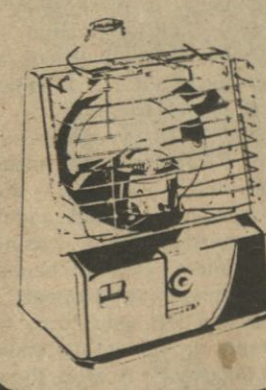
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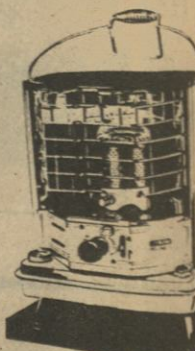

Bro. & Mrs. Charles Dampeer

Charles and Marion Dampeer moved to Iuka in September, 1973, bringing with them their three children and many goals and dreams for the future. They came to this area in response to a call from the Iuka Baptist Church. Over the years the Dampers have given of themselves as they served their church as well as the community.

Bro. Dampeer, a native of Newton, Miss., son of Mrs. Tina Dampeer and the late Charleston Dampeer, is one of three children. He was schooled at Newhebron where he played basketball, football and baseball, baseball being his favorite sport. During high school years, as he prepared for a career in coaching, he was an honor student, win-

ning the American Legion Award and was voted most likely to succeed. It was during these years that he felt God's call to enter the ministry (at the age of 16). "At the age of eighteen, I surrendered to this call and began to equip myself for the ministry," Bro. Dampeer said. At the same time he used his love for sports as a hobby, exercise and as a way of ministering and sharing with young people.

Bro. Dampeer's brother, Rev. Kelly Dampeer, resides in Meridian, Miss., where he is pastor of the 15th Avenue Baptist Church. He and his wife have three children. Mrs. Bobby Dampeer Cody, sister of Bro. Dampeer, lives with her husband and two children in the community where the

Dampeer family grew up.

Upon graduation from high school, Charles Dampeer entered Mississippi College, majoring in speech and minoring in Bible. It was during these years that the college student met the future Mrs. Dampeer.

Native Mississippian, Marion Sims was born in Bay Springs. Her mother passed away when Marion was nineteen months, her father later remarried and Marion lived with him and her step-mother, attending school grades one through eight in the Laurel City School. Marion then moved to the home of her grandmother to complete her high school education in Louin, Mississippi. It was the influence and the witness of her grandmother that led

Marion to accept Jesus as her Saviour and to surrender her young life to full-time Christian service. This decision resulted in the young lady's decision to enter the TN Nursing Program of the Mississippi Baptist Hospital in Jackson. During her days as a student nurse and while caring for one of her patients, Charleston Dampeer, Marion met the patient's son, Charles. During a conversation the two realized that their lives were parallel in the realm of Christian commitments. Soon future plans included a wedding. This choice of her prospective groom secured the decision Marion had made when she surrendered her life to full-time Christian service.

After the wedding, the young Mississippian State Ministerial student accepted his first pastorate at the Riverside Baptist Church in Monticello, Miss., and along with the duties of the pastorate the young couple received a salary of \$15.00 per week.

Bro. Dampeer later transferred to the Carey College near Hattiesburg where he pastored the Lakeview Baptist Church. Here he enjoyed a salary increase from \$15.00 per week to \$37.50 per week. During these days he not only pastored but attended college and found time to be active in sports, playing basketball for one year and baseball for three years.

The years of college, as well as later years spent at the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, were days of financial struggle for the family. To assist in their livelihood, Mrs. Dampeer decided to take State Board Examinations before completing the TN Program. Upon completion of the examinations she obtained her Licensed Practical Nursing degree and assisted in their support by nursing.

Later the family of the Rev. Charles Dampeer grew from two to five, as three children were born during the years.

Bro. Dampeer graduated from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary with a degree in Religious Education in 1962. The family then moved to South Georgia to assume a very rewarding pastorate. From this place of service the Dampers came back to their native Mississippi and to the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Leakesville, Miss. It was during this time that Mrs. Dampeer began to feel the strong urge to return to college. After considering her Christian commitment and her family, she decided to pursue a degree in Elementary Education. This she did and earned a B.S. degree. (She has taught elementary grades for eleven years, mostly third graders. "My first obligation," says Mrs. Dampeer, "is to my church, and I feel that teaching school has given me many, many opportunities to witness.")

The next home for the family was Brookhaven, Miss., where for five and one-half years they pastored the Easthaven Baptist Church with a membership of 837. In Brookhaven, Mrs. Dampeer taught school and the Dampeer children thrived as they watched their parents being true to their commitments. The early years of their schooling was in the Brookhaven area.

In September, 1973, Bro. Dampeer accepted a call to the pastorate of the Iuka Baptist Church. His pastorate followed that of Bro. Harris Counce. The Dampeer family had never been in the Iuka area, so in that autumn of 1973, they began the task of making their new surroundings home. Mrs. Dampeer found her place in her church as well as the Iuka Elementary School. The children enrolled in the Iuka School System from which they all three graduated, and Bro. Dampeer began his seven years of rewarding service to this area.

During the years at the Iuka Baptist Church, Bro. Dampeer has been a pastor to many and a friend to all. He's been a member of the Tishomingo Baptist Association where he has served on the Missions

Committee. His involvement with Mississippi Baptist has included being a member of the Mississippi Baptist State Convention Board, a board composed of one hundred Baptists from over the state. He served one year on the Executive Committee, which is made up of sixteen people selected from the one hundred. The Executive Board acts for the Convention when the Convention is not in session. In 1975, he served on the Time, Place and Preacher Committee for the Mississippi Baptist State Convention.

To add to his service to others, Bro. Dampeer served his state as a member of the Mississippi State Council on Aging under the Honorable Bill Waller Administration.

Under the leadership of Bro. Dampeer, the Iuka Baptist Church has been very progressive. The educational building has been renovated. The membership has been encouraged and inspired in giving and have responded by giving over one million dollars, doubling receipts. An indebtedness of over \$200,000 has been retired. The church has purchased additional properties, and they led the state in Study Course awards and placed third in the entire Southern Baptist Convention in 1980. Over the seven years, an average of 27 persons have been baptized each year and the church has had 484 additions, making a net increase of 25.6. The church began and now operates a successful kindergarten and day care program.

The Dampeer's children, all born in the month of September, are: Mrs. Marsha Dawn Cosby, of Memphis; Charlie, a senior at Mississippi State, majoring in Physical Education; and Cindy, a student at Ole Miss. Marsha is married to Walter Cosby, son of Dr. and Mrs. Harry Cosby, of Iuka. Walter is a

Medical Student in Memphis. The Dampers happily added that they expect their first grandchild in mid-June.

The couple have several hobbies. They enjoy traveling, just around the area or across the states. Over the years they have enjoyed touring about 43 states.

Along with teaching in the public schools, Mrs. Dampeer uses her skills to teach in Sunday School. She is also a member of the WMU and the Adult Choir, and uses her beautiful voice in special music. To add to the talents of this gracious lady and former high school beauty contestant, she is an expert seamstress, and reading for self improvement, knowledge and enjoyment occupies a part of her busy schedule.

Bro. Dampeer still participates in sports, enjoying tennis and swimming about 1 1/2 miles per week. He enjoys playing pick-up basketball with the high school and college boys of the community. He is also an avid newspaper reader, scanning a minimum of 2 to 4 daily newspapers plus several weekly editions.

The couple speak lovingly of their years here, of the people of the Iuka Baptist Church and of the community. They have found Tishomingo Countians, as well as Iuka Baptist Church members, a warm and gracious people and ones they could share their lives with. The church staff of the Iuka Baptist Church has been fantastic, Bro. Dampeer says.

They look forward to the coming events in their lives and to their new pastorate. But they also remain keenly interested in the development of Tishomingo County and the progress of the Iuka Baptist Church.

The Fairview Baptist Church in Illinois, where Bro. Dampeer will begin his pastorate during this month

of January, is one of the oldest Southern Baptist Churches in the State of Illinois. "This will give me another opportunity to broaden my ministry," Bro. Dampeer says. With 1,140 members, the Fairview Baptist Church is the largest of the 32 churches in its Association.

Bro. Dampeer will be able to pursue the joys of being a baseball fan, his new location being only 105 miles from St. Louis, Mo. and 60 miles north of Evansville, Ind., where he looks forward to attending minor league baseball games.

The Dampers are very satisfied with their lives. Bro. Dampeer stated the feelings of the couple very adequately when he said, "We find the ministry fascinating, fulfilling, exciting and reward-

ding. I still get a thrill each time I come to the pulpit. Any other life for us would be full."

## Overdose of Vitamins Can Be Dangerous

Many consumers have become obsessed with popping vitamin pills. More than a billion dollars is spent on megadose supplements annually. "Supernutrition" is the goal of some vitamin fans. Others are afraid their snack-food, fast-food diets lack essential nutrients. Clever advertising convinces the public that it needs to buy, at high prices, products that actually could be supplied from ordinary foodstuffs at little additional cost.

A visit to any health food store or reading the titles of books in the health or diet section of a bookstore could lead someone to believe that vitamins and other food supplements can prevent or cure just about any disease.

"Many consumers know enough to be concerned, but not enough to recognize claims based on misinformation or valid information mistakenly applied," says Eleanor Coats, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service food and nutrition specialist. "The same groups who seem to be most concerned about the potential harm of relatively small amounts of additives in foods are often willing to use potentially

toxic doses of nutrient supplements."

The promoters of large doses of nutrients make two general claims. Neither has facts to support it, but both seem valid to some consumers. First, they say large doses may promote optimal health and prevent specific diseases. The second claim is that individual variability in the need of nutrients means some people may need much greater quantities than the averages represented in the Recommended Dietary Allowances (RDA).

Ingestion of large amounts of any one nutrient, especially in concentrated form, is potentially harmful, not healthful, says Mrs. Coats. Massive doses of vitamin A can cause headache, blurred vision and flaky skin. Excess doses of vitamin D can cause vomiting, diarrhea and calcification of the kidneys.

Even excessive doses of water-soluble nutrients can be hazardous. Most of the excess is excreted in the urine, but injury can occur in the process. Massive doses of vitamin C can induce kidney problems and the development of kidney stones, and may reverse the effect of anticoagulants taken to prevent blood clots.

"Eating a balanced diet containing a variety of foods promotes optimal health," she stresses.

The second claim is based on a false allegation that the RDA do not take into account the wide variation in individual needs. All of the RDA, with the exception of calories, are deliberately set high enough to accommodate a wide range of variability. Individual variability in toxic reactions to nutrients can increase the hazard of taking large doses of a specific nutrient, she adds.

"Because vitamins work in partnership with each other and with other nutrients in performing their functions, the best way for us to get them in proper balance is to eat a wide variety of foods," Mrs. Coats says. "Money spent on high-nutrient-density foods in the basic food groups can provide us with better nutrition than money spent on expensive vitamin supplements."

Vitamin and mineral deficiencies do exist, and some diets may require supplementation. Clinical situations that may make vitamin supplements necessary include surgery and serious burns. Children and teenagers who have eaten poorly balanced diets for a long time may require supplements to restore reserves. Also, pregnant and lactating women may require nutrient supplementation.

"In these cases and similar cases where nutrient supplements are needed, the safest choice is supplying moderate amounts similar to the RDA," she says.

For more information on the proper balance of nutrients provided by a diet containing a variety of foods, contact your County Extension Home Economist.

## Employment Survey Here

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the work week of December 15 - 19, 1980, John Reeder, Acting Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas, announced.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 84,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the nation.

For example, in October the survey indicated that of the

105.2 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 97.2 million were employed. The nation's unemployment rate was 7.6 percent, about the same as in the prior 2 months.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and results are used only for the statistical totals.

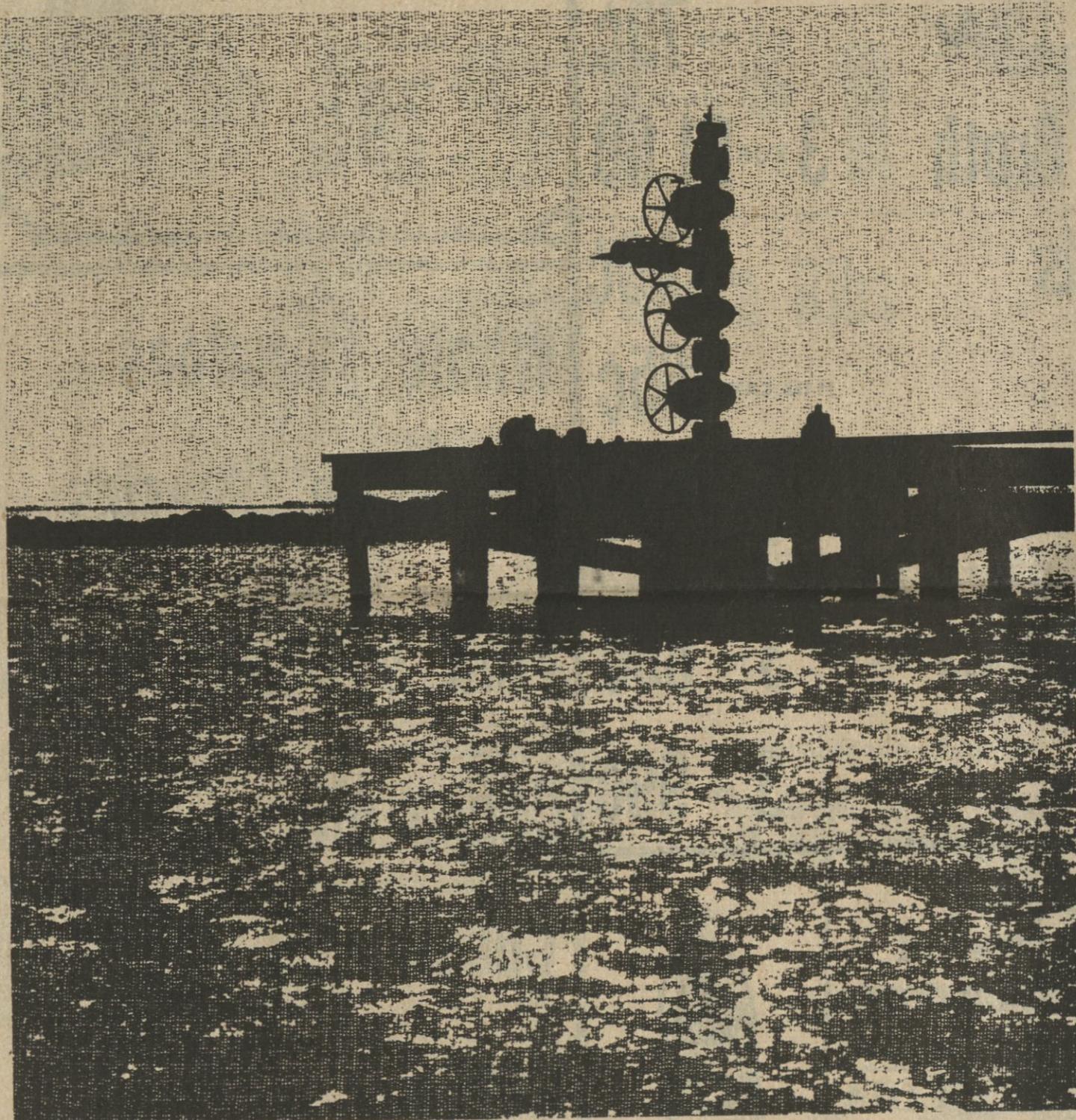

## County Agent's Notes

Farmers get only a small part of each consumer dollar spent on farm products. Extension Economist, Dr. Garey Perkins, says the farmer gets about 32 cents of every consumer dollar spent for an

agricultural product. The rest of the dollar - about 68 cents - goes to the marketing system. Mississippi farmers don't get quite as much of the consumer dollar as other farmers. They get only about 20 cents of every dollar spent on food and fiber products because commodities such as cotton and soybeans are shipped out of state for processing. To remedy this, Dr. Perkins suggests Mississippi build up its processing facilities, to keep more of the consumer dollar here in the state.

If you plan to graze your cattle on ryegrass, good management can give you more for your money. Extension Agronomy Leader, Dr. Kelton Anderson, says begin grazing ryegrass when it reaches a height of eight inches. Graze it down to about two inches, and then rotate your cattle to another pasture or feed lot. Ryegrass will grow faster if you don't graze it below two inches.

Start the new garden season off right this year by taking a soil test. Extension soil testing specialist, Freddie Rasberry, says you should test your garden soil to determine lime and fertilizer needs. This will give you better vegetable production in 1981. It doesn't take any longer to plant and cultivate a row of tomatoes that will produce 800 pounds than it does to work a row that will yield 400 pounds. Soil testing can provide the clue as to why your garden isn't producing maximum yields. Contact your County Extension Office for a free soil testing kit and instructions.

habits that get in the way.

Perhaps one of your New Year's Resolutions was to start budgeting your income. However, you may already have grown sick and tired of the word "budget" and your plans and good intentions may be about to fall by the wayside. If that is the case, something is wrong with your methods. Remember, you must be the master of your budget not its slave.

The first step in successful budgeting is to find out what you really need and want. Set your own goals. Once you decide just what you want, you can usually find a way of fitting these goals into your spending plan.

The secret of having something to show for your hard-earned dollars is planning to make those dollars buy exactly what you want and need before they disappear in those "unexpected ways" that we all know so well.

Much of the rest of budgeting is mechanical. The main factor to success in budgeting is making a complete listing of both, all your income and expenses. Then, and only then, will you be able to get a clear and adequate picture of your financial situation.

Do you remember how clumsy you were the first time you ever tried to drive a car? The same thing will happen in learning to handle money in a planned way. In your planning be sure to cut food price and not nutrition.

Since meat is the most expensive food item, it's usually a beginning point for curbing expenditures. But meat is the protein food. Buying economical meat cuts is one way to beat the high cost. Another is to use meat substitutes occasionally. Plan dishes with extenders to make a little meat go a long way.

Egg, cheese, milk - dishes from these foods count as a meat serving. Another sub-

stitute is the dried bean. Dry beans and peas are among least expensive sources of calories, protein, iron, thiamine and riboflavin. They're always in season and the price changes very little normally. This year prices will be up due to weather conditions and marketing processes. Even at higher prices they are a real food bargain, money-wise and nutrition-wise.

Although a big holiday season is over for another year, there are still times when friends drop in and it's time to eat. For a delightful change of pace, you can serve an elegant appetizing meal - if your emergency shelf is well-stocked with foods you have bought on special.

Fresh or canned mushrooms are easy to serve and they go with almost anything else you may have on your food shelf. They don't really require cooking - just thorough heating is enough, whether they are raw or canned.

Mushroom potato pancakes is one suggestion. Prepare potato pancake mix according to package directions, adding 1 tablespoon finely minced onion and 1 can (3 or 4 oz.) sliced mushrooms, drained. Bake as pancakes and serve with melted butter, cream cheese or sour cream.

Grilled mushroom sandwiches smell and taste most appetizing. For each sandwich, toast a slice of bread on one side. Cover the untoasted side with a slice of American cheese, paper-thin onion rings and thinly sliced fresh mushrooms. Dab generously with butter and sprinkle lightly with crumbled oregano. Broil 3 or 4 minutes, until mushrooms are hot and cheese begins to bubble.

Remember to add a special touch to ordinary meals by adding a small amount of the more expensive foods. It won't break your budget and your budget and your family will appreciate your

creativity.

Your Social Security

People getting social security checks will be able to earn more in 1981 than in 1980 before any of their social security benefits are withheld. Jerry Myatt social security manager in Corinth, said recently.

In 1981, a person under 65 for all of the year can earn \$4,080 before any checks are

held back. This annual exempt amount was \$3,720 for 1980. The annual exempt amount for people 65 or older in 1981 is \$5,500; up from \$5,000 for 1980.

If a person's earnings exceed the annual exempt amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. People should notify social security as soon as they think their annual earnings might exceed the exempt amount. This way they can avoid receiving any incorrect payments that might have to be repaid.

There is a special rule that applies to the year in which a person retires. In the year of retirement, people can receive checks for any month their earnings do not exceed the monthly limit even though total annual earnings are well above the annual exempt amount.

The 1981 monthly limit is \$458 for people 65 and over and \$340 for people under 65.

People who want more information about the annual earnings test can obtain a free copy of the leaflet, "How work affects your social security check," at the Corinth social security office. The phone number in Corinth is 287-5241. Most residents of Tippah and Tishomingo counties can call the office in Corinth at no charge by

dialing 837-3018 or 423-6042 respectively.

Energy Assistance Program

Governor William Winter has announced a Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) in the amount of \$12,917,719 to provide financial assistance to an estimated 130,000 low-income Mississippi households for the upcoming winter months.

The program, designed to help meet rising energy costs, will be administered by the Governor's Office of Federal-State Programs and the Department of Human Development. Division of Human Resources, through the state's 20 community action agencies and other community based organizations. These agen-

cies will begin taking applications on January 12 and all eligible recipients must be certified through an application process to obtain program benefits. When applying, applicants must bring proof of household income, such as check stubs, pay slips, or written statements from employers regarding wages.

Eligible group are low-income households who are affected by energy cost increases. Operators of public or subsidized housing may be eligible on behalf of their tenants. Benefits to recipients will vary from \$50 to \$200 depending on income, region of the state, type of heating used, and category of eligibility.

prayer meeting, in the market place as well as in the holy place.

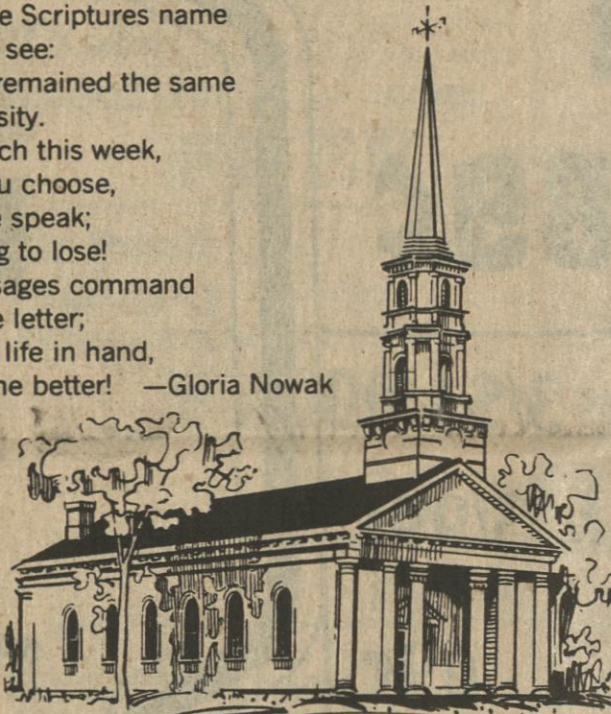
Some people want a religion that will make them feel respectable, but not require that they be respectable. But a religion that costs nothing changes no one is of any use.

## Dental Hygiene Program

The Dental Hygiene Program at Northeast Mississippi Junior College, one of three in the state, received notification that it's accreditation classification has been raised to approval.

The announcement, made by the American Dental Association's Commission on Dental Accreditation, was given following a site visit of the school's facilities in early October of this year.

Approval, the best of four classifications given by the Association, is granted to an educational program to indicate that it has achieved or exceeded the basic requirements for accreditation. It further specifies that the program has no serious deficiencies or weaknesses.

The two-year program, currently under the direction of Dr. Lee C. Eads, has just completed its third year. To date, the program has graduated eight students all of whom passed state boards on their first attempt. Presently, there are 21 students enrolled in the program.

## Tax Management Is Year Round Job

The April 15 deadline for filing income tax returns doesn't apply to farmers unless they file an estimate of their income taxes and pay the taxes due by January 16.

"If this estimate is filed by January 16, they have until April 15 to file the final return and pay any additional taxes," says Dr. Johnnie Sartor, leader, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service Agricultural Economics Department.

Farmers who fail to make the January 16 deadline on their 1980 estimated income taxes must file their final return and pay all taxes due by March 2, 1981. Normally, this date is March 1, but since March 1 is on Sunday, the following Monday, March 2, is

the deadline.

Individuals have a responsibility to pay any taxes they legally owe, but they have the responsibility to themselves and their families to do a good job in keeping records to minimize their taxes, says Dr. Sartor.

"Tax management is a year round job. You can't sit down at the end of the year or at tax reporting time and list all of your expenditures or personal deductions. Each \$50 deduction overlooked will cost a minimum of \$7 additional taxes. A single person with \$45,000 taxable income will pay \$24.50 additional taxes for each \$50 deductible expenditure overlooked, he adds.

A taxpayer is allowed an exemption for himself and each dependent. If the taxpayer or his spouse is 65 years of age or older, he is allowed an additional exemption. If either the taxpayer or the spouse is blind, an additional exemption is allowed. Therefore, if both are 65 and blind, they qualify for six exemptions. The additional exemption is not allowed for dependents other than a spouse, even though they may be 65 or more and also may be blind.

Taxpayers whose incomes were from wages, salaries, tips and other employee compensation and not more than \$400 in dividends or \$400 in interest income and with a total income of \$40,000 or less on a joint return (\$20,000 or less if single) may use Form 1040A, commonly referred to as the short tax reporting form.

A taxpayer should compare the two forms -- the short form and the long form, 1040A and 1040 -- to determine the amount of tax dollars he will pay using both forms, says Dr. Sartor. Then he can select the one that will be to his best advantage.

Use form 1040 if you meet the following tests: (1) you itemize deductions, (2) you claim more exemptions than are shown in the tax table for your filing status, (3) your spouse files a separate return and itemizes deductions (exception -- you can still use Form 1040A if you have a dependent child and meet the test under married persons who live apart), (4) your total income is \$20,000 or more for single persons or \$40,000 or more for married couples filing joint returns; (5) you can be claimed as a dependent on

your parent's return and had interest, dividends or other unearned income of \$1,000 or more, and had earned income of less than \$2,300 if single, (6) you are a qualified widow or widower with a dependent child.

In some cases, the Internal Revenue Service will calculate your taxes for you, he reminds taxpayers. If you have paid too much taxes, the Internal Revenue Service will send you a refund. If you did not pay enough taxes, it will bill you for the balance. You will not be charged interest or penalties if the bill for tax due is paid within 30 days of the notice date or by the due date for your return -- whichever is later.

The Internal Revenue Service will figure your tax, when using Form 1040, if all of your 1980 income was from salaries, wages, tips, interest, dividends, pensions or annuities; your income on line 31 is \$40,000 or less for a joint return (\$20,000 single); you do not itemize deductions; you

do not file Schedule G -- Income Averaging; you do not file Form 2555, deduction from or exclusion of income earned abroad; and you file your return by April 15, 1981.

## Winter Stresses Education

Winter noted that Mississippi recently lost a major industrial prospect because "there was a perception by the management of that industry that we provided inadequate training in Mississippi."

Stressing that economic development is largely dependent on the quality of education offered in the

state, Winter said, "From a practical economic standpoint it is vital that we gear up our system of education to reduce the too high percentage of undereducated people in our state. Too often our undereducated citizens find it difficult to obtain a job and many of these people swell our already overburdened penitentiary facilities or end up as welfare recipients. We need to provide them an opportunity -- an opportunity which they want -- to become productive jobholding citizens who can contribute to the economic prosperity of our state."

"We cannot be satisfied with simply getting along," Winter continued. "We must improve our educational and employment opportunities."

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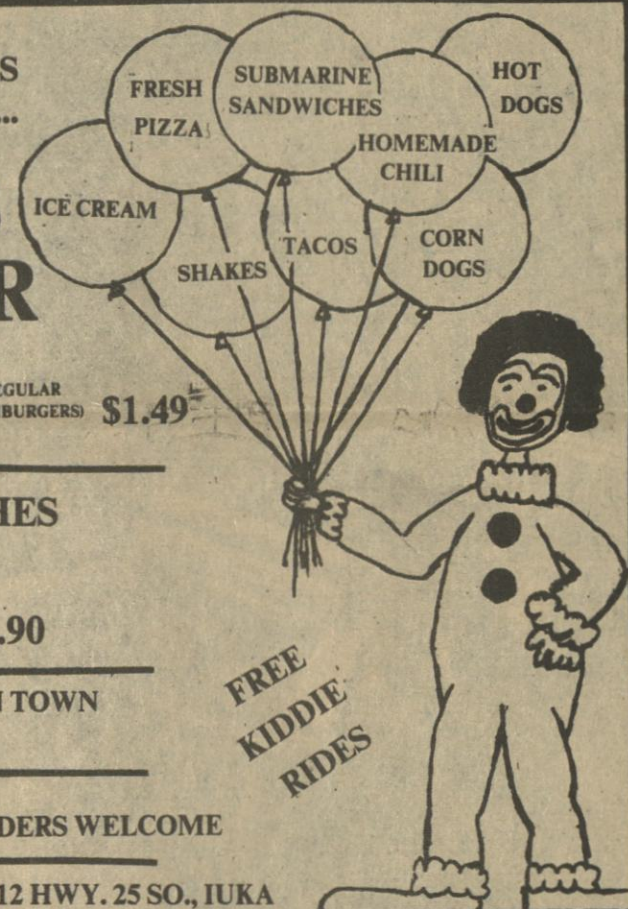
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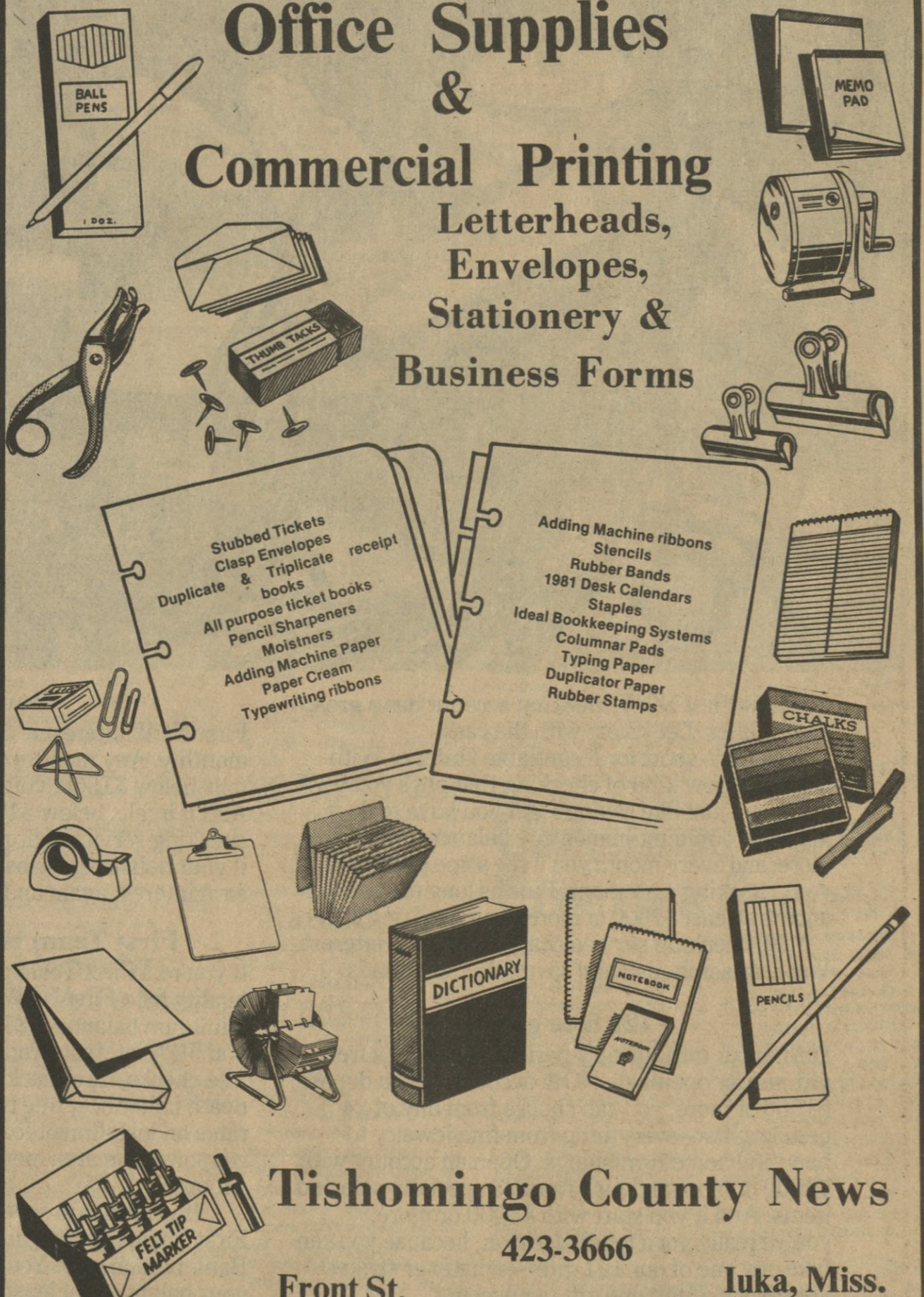
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
