## Iuka Special Election Set For Tuesday, Feb. 6

Qualified voters in the City of Iuka will go to the polls on Tuesday, February 10, to fill the unexpired term of Alderman Floyd Curtis, who passed away December 6. Curtis' successor will hold office until July.

Three candidates have qualified for the position. The candidate who receives a majority of the votes will win, however, if none of the hopefuls receive a majority of the ballots, the top two will be in a run-off election on

February 17.

Polling time will be from 7 a.m. till 6 p.m. at the Iuka City Hall.

Qualified as candidates for the election are former Iuka Alderman Rex L. Tuckier, retired painter, James A. Rice; and Iuka businessman, Donald Cowell.

Tuckier, who served as alderman from 1973 to 1977, said in an earlier announcement of candidacy, "If I can help you, I will - and if I can't help you, I'll tell you so, and

why." "I will keep my word, so far as it is in my power, to do my best, for the people of the City - for the people are due, to have their wishes get fair and above-board recognition."

James Rice, in his announcement, said, "I will represent 'all the people of Iuka,' not just a select few as has been done in the past year." He spoke out against the Zoning Ordinance, the Planning Commission, and favors having members of the

School Board elected by the people.

Donald Cowell said in his announcement, "I am vitally concerned with the planned, orderly growth of this community and its potential to provide maximum educational, cultural and employment opportunities for its citizens, both young and old. He states, "the current Mayor and Board have made some very constructive moves during their tenure to up-grade our city, and I feel I would be able to add some positive input to the board."

## Census Report Shows County Population Up

A preliminary report released by the U.S. Census Bureau to the Tishomingo County Chancery Clerk's Office shows a moderate increase in population for the county as compared to the 1970 figures. The latest data made available shows Tishomingo County with 18,425 for 1980. This is some 4000 people above the 1970 figure of 14,940.

A break-down of the districts in Tishomingo County, showing that part which falls in a city or town is as follows: 1st district - 3,989, Iuka's part - 1619; 2nd district - 3,842, Burnsville's part - 856, Iuka's part - 179; 3rd district - 3,420, Iuka's part - 687; 4th district - 3,622, Belmont's part - 610, Paden - 115, Tishomingo - 374; and 5th district - 3,118, Belmont's part - 761, and Golden - 282. The district totals add up to 17,991, which was the first preliminary total released by the Bureau. It was later revised to 18,425. The unrevised figures gave the following totals for the towns and cities in Tishomingo County: Iuka - 2485; Burnsville - 856; Belmont - 1371; Paden - 115; Tishomingo - 374; Golden - 282.

Iuka reports that their figure has been raised to 2847, but is still extremely low. Burnsville reports that their figure has been revised to 889, which is only 105 above a count, which was taken in 1975.

The Census Bureau's final statewide total sets Mississippi's 1980 population at 2,520,638, or 13.7 percent higher than the 1970 census. However, 16 counties lost population, all predominately black.

An official breakdown of Mississippi's population, including racial data, won't be available until April 1, when the Census Bureau is scheduled to send Gov. William Winter a more detailed report. That report will be used by the state Legislature in reapportioning U.S. congressional districts and state legislative districts.

And there should be sweeping changes in the makeup of both the congressional and legislative districts.

The Delta, where 12 counties lost population, will lose representation. The big gainers will be in northeast Mississippi and the areas surrounding Jackson, Biloxi-Gulfport, Pascagoula-Moss Point and Hattiesburg.

Overall, Mississippi's population increased 303,726 during the decade. During the same period, Mississippi's birthrate also has been dropping.

The birthrate has steadily decreased since 1960, when there were 27.2 births per 1,000 people. From 1970-75, the birthrate declined from 21.7 to 18.5.

Also during the '70s the

death rate has stayed relatively steady, between 9.5 and 10.8 per thousand.

So judging from the birth and death statistics, it's estimated that at least 10-15 percent of the state's population gain has been accounted for by out-of-staters moving into Mississippi.

The large number of people immigrating to Mississippi surprised those who watch population figures.

"We expected a net increase in population of about 9-10 percent," said Jim Williamson, a demographics analyst with the Mississippi Research and Development Center. But the growth is a "regional phenomenon," he added. "All of the Sunbelt has grown. In fact, Alabama was the only state in the Southeast that grew at a slower rate than Mississippi."

Williamson also pointed out that Mississippi's 13.7 percent population increase marked the first time since 1940 that Mississippi has grown faster than the nation as a whole. The U.S. population increased 11.4 percent in the '70s.

Between 1960 and 1970, Mississippi grew only 1.8

percent, while the national growth rate was 13.3 percent. During the 1960s, Mississippi's birthrate was higher than current levels, indicating that even though the state grew, more people were moving out of the state than were moving in.

The larger population will help certain Mississippi communities share a heavier share of some federal funds, such as revenue-sharing money. But on the other hand, the statistics also mean that Mississippi's per capita income - already the lowest in the nation - is lower than initial predictions indicated.

Because of the population gain, more people share in the state's total personal income. So the Research and Development Center is revising its per capita income forecast from \$6,643 (in current dollars) to \$6,517.

**Church Destroyed**  
Golden Central Baptist Church was completely destroyed Saturday evening, January 31. The church, which was

built in 1970, was engulfed in flames when the fire was discovered around 8:00, making it impossible for some eight fire departments working approximately six hours to extinguish the blazes.

## Golden Baptist Church Destroyed By Fire

Golden Central Baptist Church, one of Tishomingo County's most beautiful and modern houses of worship, was completely destroyed by a Saturday evening, January 31. The church, with membership of 300, opened in April of 1970. The structure housed a sanctuary, an educational building, a recreation area, and a complete church library and office, all of which was destroyed in a matter of minutes.

According to the church pastor, W.L. Oaks, the fire was discovered around 8:00 Saturday evening by a passing motorist. He came to the parsonage, located next to the church, and reported that flames were coming from the roof of the building. The fire was already completely out of control at that

time. Bro. Oaks said that he and his son, who had attended to the church since they came to Golden 7 1/2 years ago, were in the church around 6:00 Saturday evening making preparations for the First Sunday Deacons Breakfast the following day. They saw nothing that indicated a fire was present. Although the cause is not known, some believe that the rapid spread of the flames could have been caused by faulty or overheated gas lines leading to the furnace.

Volunteers fought some six hours, in gusty winds, trying to contain the flames to the church, preventing them from spreading to the parsonage only 20 feet away. According to Greg Pharr, with the Belmont Fire Department, fire trucks from Itawamba County, Belmont,

Tishomingo, Red Bay, Vina, Golden, and Banner all responded to the scene.

Harold Ginn, of the Golden Water System, reported that some 150,000 to 200,000 gallons of water were pumped from the city wells on the fire. He estimated that the four hydrants used at the fire some seven hours, pumped 300 gallons a minute, which emptied the city tank to one-half its 75,000 gallon capacity.

Two volunteers stayed throughout the night, sitting on top of the parsonage with water hose in hand, saving the home and its furnishings from destruction.

A faithful congregation assembled Sunday morning at the Golden Town Hall, responding with enthusiasm to plan for the future.

According to Bro. Oaks, a trailer has been set up on the church property and office

operations will be underway on Thursday. A schedule of services will be mailed out in the near future to the members. He added that at present time, the Methodist Church of Golden has offered their facilities to be used by the congregation of Central Baptist. Sunday morning worship service will be held at 8:00 a.m. Sunday at the Methodist Church. Sunday School will be held from 5 until 6 in the evening, followed by evening worship at 6:00 until 7:00. Church training will be discontinued until further notice.

Rev. Oaks would like to personally express his deepest gratitude to everyone who helped in any way. He reports that clearing started on Tuesday for the construction of a new church. He estimates that the cost will be approximately \$200,000 to replace the building and its contents.

## Former County Man Dies In Jan. 29, Shooting

J.C. Fields, Jr., 52, a native of the Doskie Community, north of Iuka, was found dead Thursday morning, January 29, in his place of business near the Mississippi-Tennessee State Line.

According to Jim Winborn with the Hardin County Sheriff's Department, Mr. Field's body was found around 9:00 Thursday morning by an employee opening the State Line Inn, owned by Fields. He had been shot once - the exact time unknown.

At 11:00 a.m. Tuesday, February 3, Hardin County

Sheriff, David Seaton, and Investigator, Richard Hammett, arrested Katherine Elizabeth Qualls, 25, of Savannah, charging her with the first degree murder of Fields. She is being held in the Hardin County Jail on \$50,000 bond.

Funeral services for Mr. Fields, a Navy veteran of World War II, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Minister Jerry Westmoreland officiating. Burial was in Pleasant Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Sherry Wilburn, of Collierville, Tenn.; a son, Dwight C. Fields, of Tampa, Fla.; his mother, Mrs. Leona Fields, of Cicero, Ill.; three sisters, Mrs. Mamie Deachi, of Stone Park, Ill., Mrs. Grace Hopper, of Cicero, Ill., and Mrs. Estene Comer, of Corinth; and six grandchildren.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Food Management In The Home

In providing food for the family, consider the following goals: (1) balanced meals; (2) economy - staying within a budget; (3) efficient use of time; (4) appetite appeal - foods that look good, taste good, and suit the family members' preferences; (5) variety.

Having a plan is the key to reaching these goals. Planning involves deciding ahead of time: a menu plan - what foods to serve during a day, week or month; a shopping list - what foods to buy; when foods are prepared; and who will prepare them.

With planning a person can include all the foods needed for good health each day and have meals with more variety. Use the Daily Food Guide as an easy guide for planning. You can take advantage of advertised specials if the plan is built around these foods. To save food dollars, you can get all the foods needed for a week or other time period in

one trip to the store. Frequent trips not only waste time but also cost money. Each trip exposes a person to the impulse-buying traps.

Following a shopping list to the letter can provide protection against impulse buying. Avoid the eye-level, high-profit items in the supermarket. Stoop to find the lower-priced and more nutritious items on bottom shelves. Be careful of traps, such as out-of-place items - sweet rolls nestled among the instant coffee - that give false "buy me" signals.

If possible, leave children at home. They distract shoppers from their serious decision-making task as well as nag parents into buying the foods they see advertised on TV. To guard against impulse buying, eat before you shop. Hungry shoppers spend more and are likely to overbuy and succumb to impulse buying.

In evaluating your progress, keep track of your spending on the different food categories to see how

much you are spending for food and how you are dividing your food dollar. To get the best diets for your food dollar, your spending should be about: 35 percent for meat, poultry, eggs, fish, dried beans and peas, peanut butter and nuts; 20 percent for vegetables and fruits, processed and fresh; 13 percent for milk, cheese, yogurt and ice cream; 12 percent for bread, cereal, pasta, rice, crackers and bakery goods; and 20 percent for other foods such as fats, seasonings, sugar, dressings and beverages. If you are overspending in the "other foods" category, you may be buying too many soft drinks, snack foods and high-calorie extras and getting too few other nutritious foods.

In addition to evaluating the cost of food and how food dollars are divided, check the meals served: Did you include proper amounts of foods in the Daily Food Guide? Are the meals appetite-appealing? How much preparation and clean-up time did the meal require?

Planning takes time and effort. With practice, it can be done quite speedily and make your meals more nutritious and enjoyable.

### Boiled Navy Beans

Soak 1 lb. navy beans overnight in 3 to 4 times as much water as beans. Remove any beans that float. Drain. Place beans in a heavy 3 qt. sauce pan. Cover with water.

Add:  
1 medium onion, chopped  
3 whole cloves  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. black pepper  
1/4 tsp. dried thyme

Simmer beans, covered, 2 hours. Stir occasionally. Add 1 can beef consomme and cook 30 minutes longer or until tender. Serve hot, garnish with chopped parsley. Makes 5 servings.

Served with whole wheat bread, fresh fruit salad and a glass of milk, this is a nutritionally complete meal.

Accidents Cost

A good farmer usually can find a way to overcome problems like unexpected production costs or low yields. But there are losses his business may not survive. These are the accidental deaths or disabling accidents that happen on hundreds of Mississippi farms every year.

An estimated 6,000 disabling accidents will occur on state farms this year; 500 will be permanent. About 50 will result in death on the state's 50,000 to 60,000 farms.

Permanent injury of a farm owner or manager can ruin a business financially. Farm family members are usually the victims of farm mishaps. Understandably, these losses can hardly be overcome.

Tractor overturns, entanglement in equipment and falls are the most common

fatal farm accidents. Suffocation, electrocution, poisoning, fires and traffic accidents are common, too.

The consequences of such accidents are replacing personnel, reorganizing the farm and facing liability suits which can bankrupt a farm business. Liability settlements in the million dollar range are occurring now.

Management is the only protection against accidents. Insurance provides only limited financial protection against damages from accidents.

Information to help farmers reduce accidental losses is available at the county Extension office.

### Be Ready At Planting

The top priority for cotton producers in February is to book cottonseed. Locate and book the seed now to assure an adequate supply at planting time. I would ask for a vigor test, too.

You need to book pesticide and fertilizer supplies, if you know these needs. By booking early, you will be sure to get the materials recommended. Prices will be a little higher, but there should be enough to go around.

### ACP Sign-Up

The Sign-Up for practices under the AC Program will begin February 9, and continue through February 20. If you have not already done so you should check the conservation needs for your farm and make application for assistance under this program at an early date. We recommend that you follow any conservation that has been developed for your farm in making your selection of practices. Cost-Share rates vary according to the practices being established from 60 to 75 percent. Low-income

farmers largely depending on farming for a livelihood will receive a cost-share rate of 110 percent of the rate normally paid on each practice not to exceed 80 percent of the cost. This sign-up will be for the annual program and Long-Term Agreements. Below are listed a few of the practices that are being offered:

SL-1, Permanent Vegetative Cover Establishment; SL-2, Permanent Vegetative Cover Improvement; SL-4, Terrace Systems; SL-5, Diversions; SL-11, Permanent Vegetative Cover on Critical Arrears; WC-1, Water Impoundment Reservoirs (Ponds); WP-3, Sod Waterways; WP-4, Animal Waste Control Facilities (Lagoons); FR-1, Establishment of Forest Trees; and FR-2, Improvement of a Stand of Forest Trees.

### Comments Sought On 1980-81 Milk Support Price

The public is invited to comment on the terms and conditions of a mandatory midyear adjustment of the support price for manufacturing milk. The most likely increase in the support price is about \$.88 from the current support price of \$12.80 to \$13.68 per hundredweight (CWT) on April 1, 1981. The price adjustment will have a direct impact on market prices of butter, cheese, and nonfat dry milk (NDM) and on indirect influence on fluid milk prices. The week of February 9 - 13 has been named Tree Planting Week in Mississippi for

1981. Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout the state and the Mississippi Forestry Association will sponsor this event.

Trees are essential to life on our planet. They moderate temperature, reduce pollution, noise levels, and wind and water erosion. It takes ten trees one day to produce oxygen required to burn just one gallon of gasoline. Fuel used in the home can be reduced 20 to 30 percent by properly locating win breaks on the side of the home facing the prevailing winter wind.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District is happy to join with others in sponsoring Tree Planting Week in Mississippi. In recognition of this and Arbor Day on February 13, we will be providing trees to landowners and school groups throughout the county.

Trees will also be available for groups such as Scouts, 4-H, and others for planting on public grounds. Anyone in Tishomingo County desiring trees should call the District Office at 423-6272 or get in contact with the Soil Conservation District Commissioner in your area. We hope to have an adequate supply of trees, but call us early to be sure you get seedlings for your group, special project or club.

## LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Senate Bill 2330 passed both chambers of the Legislature to raise the ceiling on medicaid from 58 million to 64 million. The bill, along with the annual deficit appropriation will help to insure medicaid recipients of services for another year. There are 1,256 medicaid eligibles in Tishomingo County. A total of \$679,468.52 was paid for medicaid services in Tishomingo County. These payments went to Tishomingo County Hospital, local doctors and drug stores. In addition to these payments, payments by medicaid were made out of state to places such as Red Bay Hospital, Methodist and Baptist Hospital, etc. for Tishomingo County recipients.

Someone has said "the Medicaid Program is like having 356,000 Mississippians walking around with a credit card and you don't know how many times they are going to use it. The program which started about ten years ago with a 2 million appropriation is expected to rise to approximately 75 million by next year. There were 70,206 new applicants for medicaid assistance filed last year. Of these, 36,101 were approved.

It appears that due to the rapid growth of the program and increased cost for the operation that some benefits will have to be altered to prevent the program from collapsing. I have always supported the program to help

our sick and elderly and will continue to do so, however, some cuts in the program appear to be unavoidable.

## The Ross Barnett Story



Here is the first and only book ever published about Ross Barnett, Mississippi's colorful and sometimes controversial governor in 1960-64. It takes the reader behind the scenes, with previously untold stories, about his campaigns of 1951, and 1955, and 1959, when he finally achieved his ambition. He became a champion of states' rights, vigorously defending racial segregation. Part of the book is devoted to his long but futile efforts to keep James Meredith from enrolling as the first black student at the University of Mississippi. Governor Barnett was the only governor to persuade Mississippi voters to approve of "unpledged electors" to furnish a trading opportunity with the Democratic or Republican presidential nominee.

But during what has been described as "the turbulent sixties," he managed to get legislative approval of a far-reaching "Bill of Rights" for industry, an achievement that brought about many new industries for the state. The governor himself solicited prospects by telephone, by trips to the north and east, and by entertaining corporate executives at the Governor's Mansion with a typical southern breakfast of country ham, red eye gravy, hot biscuits, and Leake county molasses.

His philosophies, gradually eroded away by federal court orders and Congressional enactments, still remain part of an era in Mississippi where change was fought stubbornly, although the national government eventually was the victor, and Mississippians were forced to make adjustments.

The author, Erle Johnston, was publicity director in Barnett's campaigns of 1955 and 1959. He served as public relations director and then director for the old Miss. State Sovereignty Commission, which also has a place in the book. Johnston also was a campaign publicist for Governor Fielding Wright, Senator Jim Eastland, Senator John Stennis, and others.

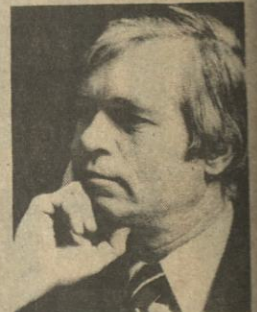
Johnston, retired editor of the Scott County Times at Forest, Mississippi, is a native of Grenada where he graduated from high school in the Class of 1935. He worked on the Grenada Daily Star, then in 1937 joined the staff of the Jackson, Miss., Clarion-Ledger, where he became political reporter and oil and gas editor. In November, 1941, he purchased the fledgeling Scott County Times and turned it into one of Mississippi's most prominent and respected weeklies, winning top prizes in Mississippi Press Association contests for general excellence, best editorial page, and best advertising ideas. He was succeeded by his son, Bubby Johnston, as editor in May, 1979. Since then he has contributed to the newspaper but also devotes part of his time to free lance writing.

### A New Beginning



With President Reagan's inauguration and the return of our American hostages safely to their homes, Congress and the new administration can now focus on the issues facing our nation as a whole.

I am pleased that President Reagan declared this past Thursday a day of national thanksgiving for the hostages, and especially that he reminded all of us of the bravery shown by the eight Americans who died in the heroic rescue attempt last spring in the Iranian desert.

Even more important, most of us support the President's clearly stated warning that other nations think twice before they contemplate action similar to the international crimes perpetrated by the Iranian regime.

New respect for the United States must be instilled around the world. I believe the President and Secretary of State Alexander Haig are making a forceful effort to accomplish this.

Congress and the administration have begun moving to implement the mandate for firm leadership voiced at the polls by the American people last November.

In the U.S. Senate, we have been holding confirmation hearings and voting on the Senate floor to confirm

those nominated to Cabinet positions by the President. This has all been completed with the exception of the nominee for Secretary of Labor.

The new administration has some excellent people in positions of leadership, in the Cabinet, and in Cabinet-level positions such as the special trade representative, former Senator Bill Brock of Tennessee.

For my own part, we have organized the Appropriations and Agriculture Committees on which I serve. The Agriculture Committee, of course, held confirmation hearings on Agriculture Secretary John Block and I have personally made know to him my concern that he be fully aware of the problems and goals of Southern agriculture.

The Appropriations Committee is now receiving budgetary and fiscal policy briefings in preparation for our work on the Fiscal Year 1982 budget. In the Agriculture Committee we are planning field hearings in the near future on the 1981 farm bill.

As some of you may have heard, recommendations have been made to the White House and appropriate Cabinet officers for key appointments to federal positions in the state of Missis-

siippi in the fields of agriculture and justice.

I am convinced the appointments which have been recommended are excellent choices, and that the individuals named will do an outstanding job in their various capacities.

It is my hope that all other federal positions within our state will also be filled by the most qualified individuals available. There is no substitute for competence and ability, and our citizens deserve a government that is run by the best and most qualified individuals.

You can be assured that my recommendations to the President will be based first on that important consideration.

The 97th Congress and the Reagan administration should work together in a partnership to reach solutions to the problems and questions confronting our nation.

Whether in legislation, appointments, foreign policy, or the tough economic decisions which must be made, a spirit of cooperation and the willingness to provide responsible leadership are what our country needs.

By working together, I believe this challenge is going to be met.

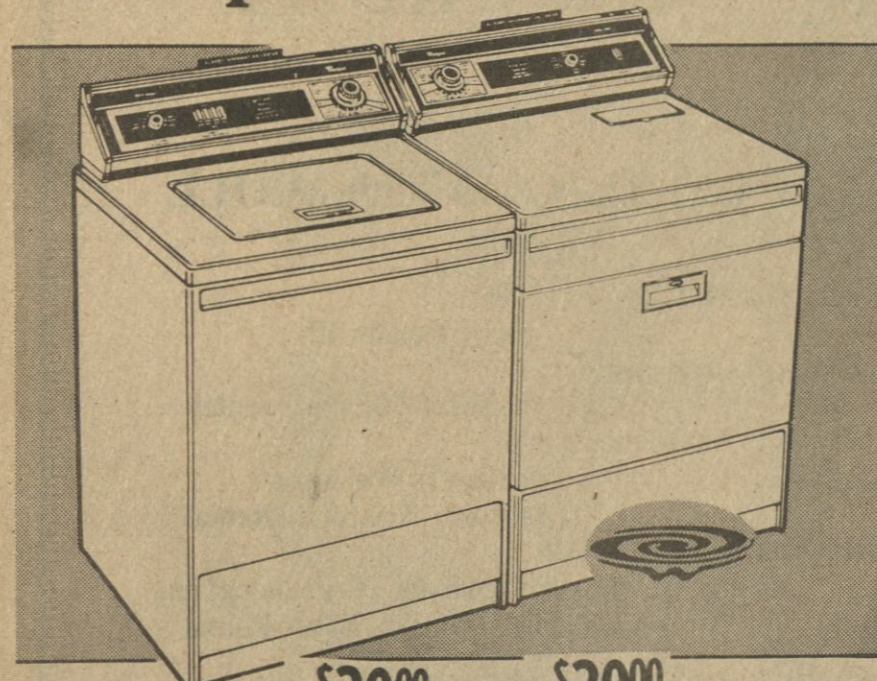

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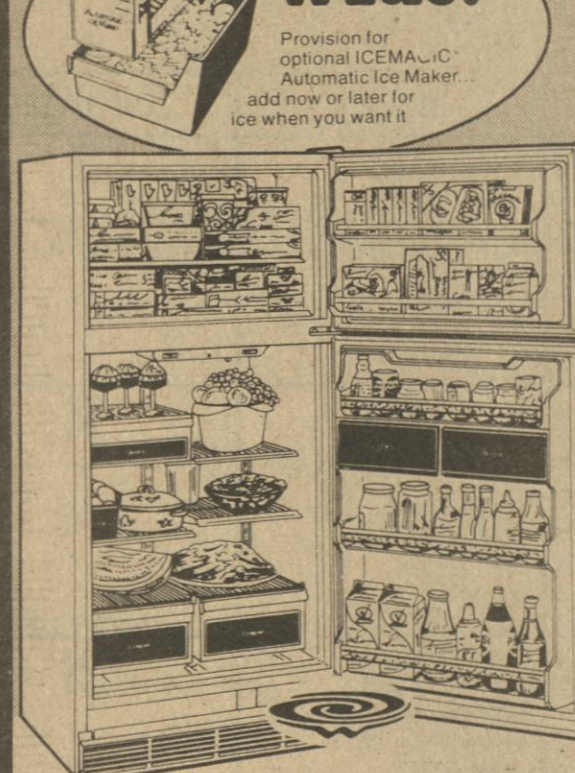

Designed to provide child care facilities in an atmosphere conducive to family living, the Homebound Day Care Center Project has a two-fold purpose: it aims to supplement the fixed incomes of senior citizens who serve as operators of the centers and to provide additional day care services around the

two-county pilot project area.

Persons 50 years of age or older who express an interest in housing one of the centers are eligible for participation. Once the minimum guidelines have been met, technical assistance is provided to the home owner so that proper licensing standards can be met. After the license to operate a family day care center is obtained, the owner is able to operate the home as his or her own business.

Further assistance to the day care center operator is provided through N.E.M.J.C.'s three-day training program which emphasizes child development, nutrition and small business management.

Following the licensing of the center, periodic checks are made by the health department to insure that the centers are meeting good health standards. Checkpoints include cleanliness, up-to-date health records on all children,

recorded meal plans, and proper temperature reading.

To be considered as a day care provider one must: be living on a fixed income and be a homeowner; demonstrate interest in children and their development; have had experience working with children; be physically active and able to manage a small group of children; actively seek and obtain a license for operating the centers.

"Phone For Help"

Half this nation's children under the age of seven cannot use the telephone in an emergency. No one has ever taken the time to ensure that these children know exactly what needs to be done when a crisis occurs.

Furthermore, half the mothers of school-age children are working outside the home. The result is a population of young children who let themselves into an empty house after school, and are alone until one of the parents gets home from work. What if something happens in those hours? Approximately 3 1/2 million disabling accidents happen in American homes every year. Will these children be able to cope in an emergency?

An emergency need not become a tragedy, if there is someone to report it quickly and call for help. South Central Bell is launching a program to try to give parents and educators the knowledge that, in an emergency, the telephone is a life line to help. The company has prepared a training program designed to show parents and other

adults the importance of instructing children in the emergency use of the telephone. This program, called "Phone for Help", is being made available for use in clubs and PTA groups. The program includes instruction on how to train small children to use the telephone.

Area Students To Participate In Tourney

Mississippi College will host the seventh annual Mississippi Science and Mathematics Tournament February 5 and 6 and high school students from the Iuka area are expected to participate.

The tournament, sponsored by the Mississippi College Division of Science and Mathematics, recognized students and their high schools for outstanding academic achievement in science and math. Some 1,300 students representing 165 different high schools will participate in the two-day event.

Featuring both team and individual competition, the tournament offers over \$35,000 in academic scholarships to Mississippi College. Individual competition includes one-hour written exams in math, biology, chemistry and physics with each student allowed to compete in two of the four areas. First place winners receive \$1,200 scholarships, while second place winners receive a \$600 scholarship. Recognition certificates and \$100 scholarships are given to top ten percent in each division.

Team competition is divided into two divisions depending on the science and math curriculum offered by the individual schools. The four-member teams compete in a quiz type format where questions are flashed on the screen and quick calculations and responses are required. All calculations are done with pencil and paper.

Dr. Craig Whitlock, head of the department of physics at Mississippi College, is the tournament coordinator.

NMCAA Serving Northeast Mississippi

Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency,

Inc. (NMCAA) is a private non-profit corporation established in accordance with the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Created in 1979, NMCAA is a "medium size" community action agency covering the three counties of Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo. The population with NMCAA's geographic boundaries is 63,000.

NMCAA has been serving Northeast Mississippi for two years. Working with state and local agencies it has administered programs designed to help low-income families, disadvantaged youths, senior citizens and handicapped persons overcome problems. Through these programs, NMCAA serves a population of 3,868 people in Tishomingo County.

The small tax base and limited fiscal resources create severe drawbacks and problems to the War on Poverty in Mississippi. These drawbacks and problems are addressed by some of the programs we have worked with over the past two years; Community Outreach Centers, The Energy Crisis Intervention Program, Comprehensive Employment Training Act, Summer Recreation Program, Meals-on-Wheels Program, Cannery and Greenhouse, Home Weatherization, Solar Greenhouse and Low-Income Energy Assistance Program.

NMCAA receives \$150,000 in funds from the Community Services Administration (CSA). Other CSA assistance comes for Community Food and Nutrition and Crisis Intervention Program.

NMCAA's total operating budget for 1980 was \$1,236,964. Major Non-CSA funding sources include the Department of Labor, Department of Energy and U. S. Department of Health and

Human Services.

NMCAA's organizational structure features a Central Office located in Corinth. This office provides administrative support to the Community Outreach Centers. NMCAA operates three Community Outreach Centers. The Centers are located in the County seats of Alcorn, Prentiss and in Tishomingo.

NMCAA is governed by a 21 member Board of Directors. Policy decisions are made by the Governing Board. The Tishomingo County Community Action Agency Board members are Gerald Parsons, Lionel Wade, Elizabeth Mitchell, Ed Hunley, Don Cowell and Yvonne Starkey.

The Agency is headed by Nolen U. Embry, Executive Director. NMCAA has 21 staff

personnel.

The Community Outreach Center for Tishomingo County is located in the basement of the Courthouse in Iuka. Mrs. Tina Holt directs the services administered by the Tishomingo County Center and Mrs. Linda Bolton serves as Outreach Worker in the local center.

Rev. Embry states that 1980 has indeed been a year of changes. Inflation is still a threat to the entire nation as well as the low-income people of Tishomingo County. NMCAA will continue to help bring social and economic aid to the needy. He further stated that during the brief history of the Agency, it has grown and looked forward to further growth and the development of in-

novative approaches and solutions to the pressing problems of our community

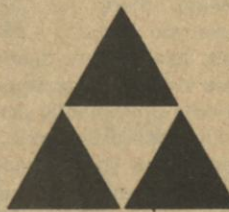

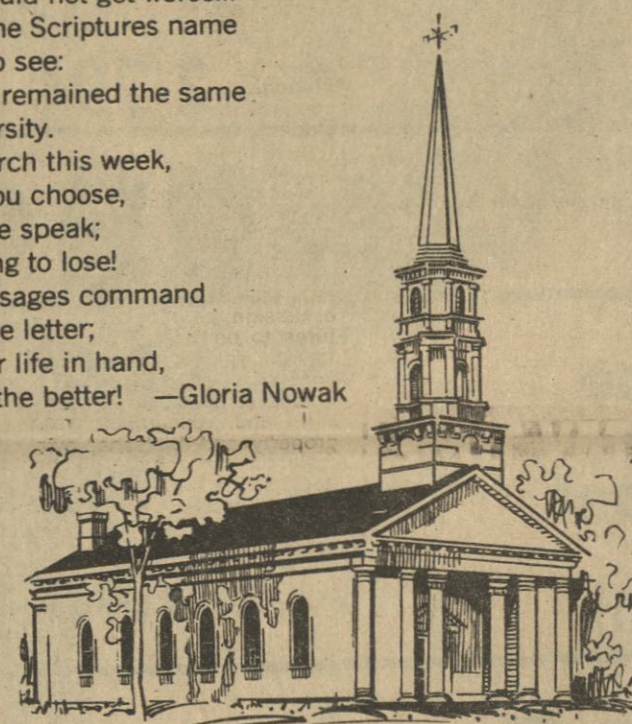
