Food Management In The Home

In providing food for the family, consider the following goals: (1) balanced meals; (2) economy - staying within a budget; (3) efficient use of time; (4) appetite appeal foods that look good, taste good, and suit the family members' preferences; (5)

Having a plan is the key to reaching these goals. Planning involves deciding ahead of time: a menu plan - what foods to serve during a day, week or month; a shopping list - what foods to buy; when foods are prepared; and who will prepare them.

With planning a person can include all the foods needed for good health each day and have meals with more variety. Use the Daily Food Guide as an easy guide for planning. You can take advantage of advertised specials if the plan is built around these foods. To save food dollars, you can get all the foods needed for a week or other time period in

one trip to the store. Frequent trips not only waste time but also cost money. Each trip exposes a person to the impulse-buying traps.

Following a shopping list to the letter can provide protection against impulse buying. Avoid the eye-level, high-profit items in the supermarket. Stoop to find the lower-priced and more nutritious items on bottom shelves. Be careful of traps, such as out-of-place items · sweet rolls nestled among the instant coffee - that give false "buy me" signals.

If possible, leave children at home. They distract shoppers from their serious decision-making task as well as nag parents into buying the foods they see advertised on TV. To quard against impulse buying, eat before you Hungry shoppers spend more and are likely to overbuy and succumb to impulse buying.

much you are spending for food and how you are dividing your food dollar. To get the best diets for your food dollar, your spending should be about: 35 percent for meat, poultry, eggs, fish, dried beans and peas, peanut butter and nuts; 20 percent for vegetables and processed and fresh; 13 percent for milk, cheese, vogurt and ice cream: 12 percent for bread, cereal, pasta, rice. crackers and bakery goods; and 20 percent for other foods such as fats. seasonings, sugar, dressings and beverages. If you are overspending in the "other foods" category, you may be buying too many soft drinks, snack foods and high-calorie extras and getting too few other nutritious foods. In addition to evaluating

the cost of food and how food dollars are divided, check the meals served: Did you include proper amounts of foods in the Daily Food Guide? Are the appetite-appealing? How much preparation and clean-up time did the meal require?

Planning takes time and effort. With practice, it can be done quite speedily and make your meals more nutritious and enjoyable.

Boiled Navy Beans

Soak 1 lb. navy beans overnight in 3 to 4 times as much water as beans. Remove any beans that float, Drain, Place beans in a heavy 3 qt. sauce pan. Cover with water.

1 medium onion, chopped 3 whole cloves

1 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. black pepper 1/4 tsp. dried thyme

Simmer beans, covered, 2 hours. Stir occasionally. Add 1 can beef consomme and cook 30 minutes longer or until tender. Serve hot, garnish with chopped parsley. Makes 5 servings

Served with whole wheat bread, fresh fruit salad and a glass of milk, this is a nutritionally complete meal.

A good farmer usually can find a way to overcome problems like unexpected production costs or low yields. But there are losses his business may not survive. These are the accidental deaths or disabling accidents that happen on hundreds of Mississippi farms every year.

Permanent injury of a farm owner or manager can ruin a business financially. Farm family members are usually the victims of farm mishaps. Understandably, these losses can hardly be overcome.

The consequences of such accidents are replacing personnel, reorganizing the farm and facing liability suits which can bankrupt a farm business. Liability settlements in the million dollar range are occurring now.

Management is the only protection against accidents. Insurance provides only limited financial protection against damages from accidents.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

BY: REP. MACK L. WADKINS Senate Bill 2330 passed chambers of Legislature to raise the ceiling on medicaid from 58 million to 64 million. The bill. along with the annual deficit appropriation will help to insure medicaid recipients of services for another year. There are 1,256 medicaid County, A total of \$679,468,52 was paid for medicaid services in Tishomingo County. These payments went to Tishomingo County Hospital. local doctors and drug stores. In addition to these payments, payments by medicaid were made out of state to places such as Red Bay Hospital, Methodist and Baptist Hospital, etc. for Tishomingo County recipien-

Someone has said othe Medicaid Program is like having 356,000 Mississippians walking around with a credit card and you don't know how many times they are going to use it. The program which started about ten years ago with a 2 million appropriation is expected to rise to approximately 75 million by next year. There were 70,206 new applicants for medicaid assistance filed last year. Of these, 36,101 were approved. It appears that due to the

rapid growth of the program and increased cost for the operation that some benefits will have to be altered to prevent the program from colapsing. I have always supported the program to help



SPECIAL REPORT:

A New Beginning

With President Reagan's inauguration and the return of our American hostages safely to their homes, Congress and the new administration can now focus on the issues facing our nation as a whole.

I am pleased that President Reagan declared this past Thursday a day of national thanksgiving for the hostages, and especially that he reminded all of us of the bravery shown by the eight Americans who died in the heroic rescue attempt last spring in the Iranian desert.

Even more important, most of us support the President's clearly stated warning that other nations think twice before they contemplate action similar to the international crimes perpetrated by the Iranian regime.

New respect for the United States must be instilled around the world. I believe the President and Secretary of State Alexander Haig are making a forceful effort to accomplish this.

Congress and the administration have begun moving to implement the mandate for firm leadership voiced at the polls by the American people last November.

In the U.S. Senate, we have been holding confirmation hearings and voting on the Senate floor to confirm those nominated to Cabinet positions by the President. This has all been completed with the exception of the nominee for Secretary of Labor.

The new administration has some excellent people in positions of leadership, in the Cabinet, and in Cabinet-level positions such as the special trade representative, former Senator Bill Brock of Ten-

For my own part, we have organized the Appropriations and Agriculture Committees on which I serve. The Agriculture Committee, of course, held confirmation hearings on Agriculture Secretary John Block and I have personally made know to him my concern that he be fully aware of the problems and goals of Southern agriculture.

The Appropriations Committee is now receiving budgetary and fiscal policy briefings in preparation for our work on the Fiscal Year 1982 budget. In the Agriculture Committee we are planning field hearings in the near future on the 1981 farm

As some of you may have heard, recommendations have been made to the White House and appropriate Cabinet officers for key appointments to federal positions in the state of Mississippi in the fields of agri culture and justice.

I am convinced the appointments which have been recommended are excellent choices, and that the individuals named will do an outstanding job in their various capacities.

It is my hope that all other federal positions within our state will also be filled by the most qualified individuals available. There is no substitute for competence and ability, and our citizens deserve a government that is run by the best and most qualified individuals.

You can be assured that my recommendations to the President will be based first on that important considera-

The 97th Congress and the Reagan administration should work together in a partnership to reach solutions to the problems and questions confronting our

Whether in legislation, appointments, foreign policy, or the tough economic decisions which must be made, a spirt of cooperation and the willingness to provide responsible leadership are what our country needs.

By working together, I believe this challenge is going to be met.



PRESENTED NESHOBA COU Here is the first and only book ever published about Ross Barnett, Mississippi's colorful and sometimes controversial governor in 1960-64. It takes the reader behind the scenes, with previously untold stories, about his campaigns of 1951, and 1955, and 1959, when he finally achieved his ambition. He became a champion of states' rights, vigorously defending racial segregation. Part of the book is devoted to his long but futile efforts to keep James Meredith from enrolling as the first black student at the University of Mississippi. Governor Barnett was the only governor to persuade Mississippi voters to approve of "unpledged electors" to furnish a trading opportunity

with the Democratic or Republican presidential nominee. But during what has been described as "the turbulent sixties," he managed to get legislative approval of a far-reaching "Bill of Rights" for industry, an achievement that brought about many new industries for the state. The governor himself solicited prospects by telephone, by trips to the north and east, and by entertaining corporate executives at the Governor's Mansion with a typical southern breakfast of country ham, red eye gravy, hot biscuits, and


Leake county molasses. His philosophies, gradually eroded away by federal court orders and Congressional enactments, still remain part of an era in Mississippi where change was fought stubbornly, although the national government eventually

was the victor, and Mississippians were forced to make adjustments. The author, Erle Johnston, was publicity director in Barnett's campaigns of 1955 and 1959. He served as public relations director and then director for the old Miss. State Sovereignty Commission, which also has a place in the book. Johnston also was a campaign publicist for Governor Fielding Wright, Senator

Johnston, retired editor of the Scott County Times at Forest, Mississippi, is a native of Grenada where he graduated from high school in the Class of 1935. He worked on the Grenada Daily Star, then in 1937 joined the staff of the Jackson, Miss., Clarion-Ledger, where he became political reporter and oil and gas editor. In November, 1941, he purchased the fledgeling Scott County Times and

turned it into one of Mississippi's most prominent and respected weeklies, winning top prizes in Mississippi Press Association contests for general excellence, best editorial page, and best advertising ideas. He was succeeded by his son, Bubby Johnston, as editor in May, 1979. Since then he has contributed to the newspaper but also devotes part of his time to free lance



Area Students To Participate In Tourney

Mississipi College will host seventh annual Mississippi Science and Mathematics Tournament February 5 and 6 and high school students from the luka area are expected to participate.

The tournament, sponsored by the Mississippi College Division of Science and Mathematics, recognized students and their high schools for outstanding academic achievement in science and math. Some 1,300 students representing 165 different high schools will participate in the two-day Featuring both team and

individual competition, the tournament offers over \$35,000 in academic scholarships to Mississippi College. Individual competition includes one-hour written exams in math, biology, chemistry and physics with each student allowed to compete in two of the four areas. First place winners receive \$1,200 scholarships. while second place winners receive a \$600 scholarship. Recognition certificates and \$100 scholarships are given to top ten percent in each

Team competition is divided into two divisions depending on the science and math curriculum offered by the individual schools. The four-member teams compete in a quiz type format where questions are flashed on the screen and quick calculations and responses are required. All calculations are done with pencil and paper
