Fire Damages County Jail

Amos Bates inspects damage left after an early morning fire at the Tishomingo County Jail over the weekend. The fire, which started between midnight and 2:00 early Sunday morning, caused considerable damage to the jail. According to Bates, the fire was started intentionally by one of the four prisoners housed in the jail. He said the inmates used matches, which were used to start the fire in the Day Room, adjacent to the cells. Iuka Fire Chief Floyd Whitaker said

that when he arrived on the scene, smoke had engulfed the building. He said one of the prisoners had apparently set fire to a blanket and stuffed it threw a hole, which leads from the Day Room to a storage room. Some fires in the storage area caught fire causing the intense smoke. The other three prisoners, who were asleep at the time, awoke and alerted the jailkeeper of the fire. Mr. Whitaker said the storage room door was so hot when he arrived that he had to enter the area from a vent on the roof to oust the fire. Repair work is underway this week to restore the damaged area.

YCC Offers Summer Jobs

YCC will employ a number of youth and more than 100 youngsters from 15 to 18 years of age at 11 Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) camps throughout the Tennessee Valley this summer.

The YCC program, funded by the U.S. Department of the Interior, is an 8-week, 5-day-a-week residential program in which the campers do useful conservation work on public lands while gaining an understanding and appreciation of the natural environment.

The young people who will be employed by TVA for the program will be selected from all racial, economic, and ethnic groups. The camps will open from June 15 through August 7 and participants will be paid \$3.35 an hour, the federal minimum wage, for 40 hours of conservation work each week. Ten hours of environmental awareness activities will also be a required part of each workweek.

Environmental conservation work projects include hiking and primitive trail construction, timber stand improvement, erosion control projects, and wildlife habitat improvements.

Positions open to participants include camp counselors, work supervisors, environmental awareness educators, group living assistants, group leaders, cooks. All adult employees, except cooks, will live at the camps two days per week.

Residential camps will be located in Estill Springs, Georgia; Decatur, Georgia; Beersheba Springs, Georgia; Tennessee; and Between The Lakes in Kentucky and Tennessee (two camps); Iuka, Mississippi; and Guntersville, Alabama.

5-day, nonresidential camps will be located at Ijams Park at Knoxville,

Tennessee. Enrollees and staff will provide their own sack lunches and transportation to the site each day.

Young people who would like to enroll may request job applications from high school counselors and State employment offices or by calling TVA's toll-free Citizen Action Line. Community Wide Meeting To Discuss Emergency Response For North Crossroads

The Yellow Creek Watershed Authority and the Tishomingo County Extension Service are sponsoring a meeting at the North Crossroads Community Church, 7:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 3, 1981. The purpose of this meeting is to consider formation of a Volunteer Fire/Emergency Response group to serve the North Crossroads Community and surrounding area.

Once formed, such an organization would be eligible for funding from a TVA grant, fire insurance rebate funds and other sources, and would benefit from the proposed Tishomingo County Fire District and Emergency Response upgrading coordinated by the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority. There are already funds available for equipment, facilities, training, communications and administration.

According to Louis Bohorloush, Emergency Response Planner for the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, the object of the program is to set up coordinated, comprehensive Emergency Response systems in Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. In process are: "911 type" county-wide phone system, VHS two-way radio and pager

systems, an emergency response training center, road and highway numbering, and improved weather radar coverage.

Bohorloush says that each county has been subdivided into "emergency response zones" representing a five minute response time from the center of the section. If the existing agencies will commit to providing reliable coverage in their zones, and if North Crossroads and Midway will organize themselves and cover their five minute zone, then 95% of the county will be within five minutes of a response vehicle. At present, the District One Volunteer Fire Department must cover all of the county North of Highway 72, except for the areas within Iuka or Burnsville City Limits. It could take twenty minutes or more to get to some of these areas, and a house can burn down in five minutes.

Rushing Drugs Victimized

Rushing Rexall Drugs, Front Street in Iuka, was victimized last week when culprits entered the establishment and seized an undetermined amount of strong drugs. According to Mr. Frank Burns, Owner and Manager, the thief (or thieves) gained entrance by first cutting a hole in the roof of the building. After entering the attic space, a portion of the ceiling in the rear of the store was then torn out and the intruders helped themselves to a variety of drugs.

Mr. Burns told The News that the robbery was discovered when employees arrived for work at 7:30 on Thursday morning, February 19th.

City and County Officials and the State Bureau of Narcotics are investigating.

Solar Water Heater Workshop At Vo-Tech

The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association and the Tishomingo County Area Vocational Technical Center will co-sponsor a workshop February 28, to teach participants how to build their own solar water heaters. The event is set for 1:30 p.m. at the Vo-Tech Center.

Herbert Stonebrook, TVA District Solar Communication Coordinator, will instruct the group in the techniques necessary to build the TVA SUNBOX, a simple solar water heater developed by the Agency for do-it-yourselfers.

The SUNBOX is a specially-designed wooden box which

holds a metal tank filled with water. The box is placed on the south side of the house, and water inside the tank is heated as the sun shines through a glass cover. This home-made water heater is connected to the conventional water heater inside the house by pipes. Pumps and separate controls are not

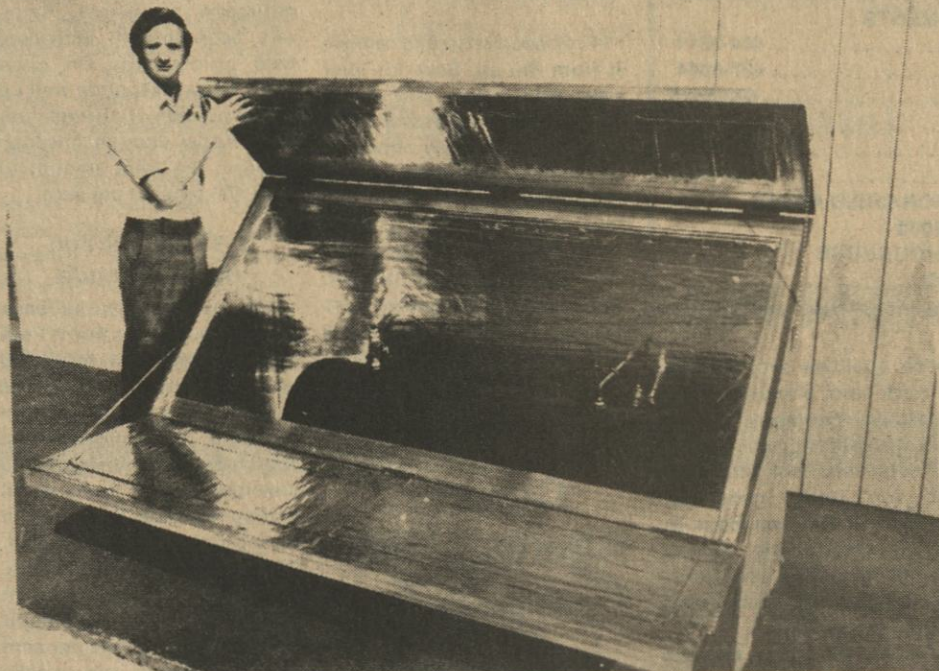
needed.

TVA is seeking 70 residential sites to demonstrate the effectiveness of the SUNBOX. During the workshop, do-it-yourselfers will have a chance to help build a unit and to apply as a demonstrator for the units they build. The 70 that are selected will receive \$50 each for providing TVA with monitoring information.

A booklet showing how the SUNBOX may be built will be used during the workshop and a free copy provided to each participant.

The SUNBOX can be built with new materials for about \$450 and for considerably less if secondhand materials are used, according to Stonebrook. "A Federal income tax credit for home energy conservation is available for solar water heater installations," he said.

No advance registration is necessary, but persons wishing more information on the workshop may telephone Charles Rushing, Vo-Tech Center, 438-6689. The Center is located on Highway 25, one mile north of Tishomingo. There will be no charge for participating in this workshop or in others now being planned for various locations throughout the Tennessee Valley.



SOLAR WATER HEATER DISPLAYED

Nuclear Equipment Arrives At Yellow Creek Construction Site

More than 1,600 tons of nuclear equipment arrived recently by barge at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant unloading dock. Included in the shipment were two steam generators and two reactor cooling pump motors.

The generators, manufactured by Combustion Engineering (C-E) of Chattanooga, Tennessee, are identical to those received by Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant in June 1980. The reactor cooling pump motors were built by a subcontractor of C-E in West Germany.

The procedure for unloading the components will be the same as that used previously, with the first step being to ground the barge enough so that it is level with the unloading dock.

According to Boyd Ruppelt, Mechanical Engineer, a Lamson 1,200-ton jacking tower was used to lift the steam generators, and the Lamson crawler transporter was used to move the equipment from the barge to a storage area.

However, before the generators and cooling pump motors could be removed

from the barge, they had to be inspected. Jeanie Polehn, Engineering Aide, conducted the first phase of the inspection, which was called "receiving inspection."

Jeanie stated that her job was to check the nuclear components for the site name and address, catalog numbers, and shipping damage.

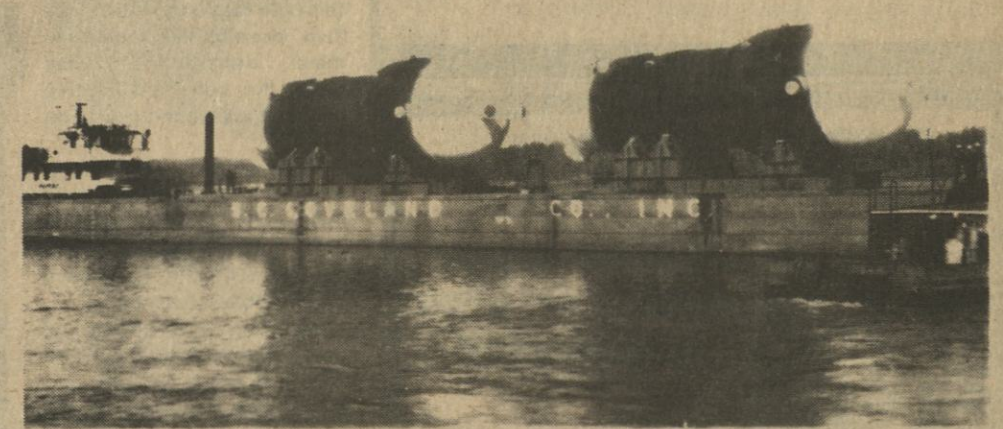
"I have to make sure that the components contain the correct pressure, and also

ensure that warning signs are on the equipment," he said, "but most important is to confirm that a stamp is present saying that the components are safety-related items."

After the inspection, the nuclear equipment was moved to the Nuclear Steam Supply System storage yard where Jack Johnson and Frank Carroll, Engineering Aides, headed the second phase of the inspection

called "handling and preventive maintenance."

Jack, Frank, and other members of the Materials Services Unit carry the responsibility of maintaining surveillance of the components while in storage and construction. This service unit is also responsible for daily checking the purge pressure inside the generators, assuring that it does not fall below minimum requirements.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Grow Your Own
Vegetables

Success in gardening has little or nothing to do with luck, a magic touch, or a "green thumb".

Good gardeners have important human qualities that they use to succeed. Among

these qualities are: wanting to work hard, planning ahead carefully, keeping records and observing accurately.

People who look but fail to see don't make good gardeners, but they can learn. By seeing clearly the signals your garden gives, you can do the things to increase yields of quality vegetables.

Among the many reasons for growing a vegetable garden is that it puts you one step closer to "self-sufficiency". Gardens are often a more secure and

reliable source of food than large commercial farms in times of climatic extremes or labor and transportation problems. There is something to enjoy in the right-out-of-the-garden freshness and flavor.

Gardening sustains the human spirit and teaches vital lessons about living in peace with the earth. This year enjoy all of these reasons for gardening as well as having a rewarding family experience.

America is a nation of gardeners with more than 40 percent of her households involved in gardening. In 1979 these Americans grew gardens averaging 595 square feet in size and produced vegetables valued at \$386 for a cost of \$19.00. This amounted to producing vegetables worth more than 65 cents per square foot of garden space.

The economics of gardening stands out in a time when increasing food costs at the market contribute heavily to shrinking the American dollar.

Turnip Greens With A Flair

1 lb. fresh turnip greens
2 strips bacon
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup minced green pepper
1 hard cooked egg
1 tsp. salt to taste
1/4 tsp. black pepper
2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
1/2 tsp. sugar

Fry bacon crisp and remove it from the fat. Save for later use. Add onion and green pepper to bacon fat and saute until limp. Coarsely chop turnip greens and add to onion and green pepper. Stir to mix well. Cover tightly and cook 10 to 15 minutes or until tender. Add salt, black pepper, sugar and lemon juice. Toss lightly. Turn into a serving dish. Garnish with crumbled bacon and slices of hard-cooked eggs. Yield: 4 servings.

County Agents News

Production Costs: Higher Than Expected

Farm production expenses may rise 13 to 15 percent in 1981, exceeding the 12 percent gain in 1980. But unlike 1980, farm origin inputs, especially feed and feeder cattle, will climb from depressed 1980 levels and be put up more than other expenses.

Price hikes for manufactured in puts will increase again this year, but probably not quite as much as in 1980. While machinery prices will climb as much or more than in 1980, fuel, fertilizer and chemical prices will rise sharply, but not as much as last year. For example, costs for all fuels and energy may go up to 25 to 30 percent. In 1980 they rose 39 percent. Decontrol could tack on an additional 15 to 20 cents a gallon of gasoline.

Energy prices will influence how much more fertilizer and chemicals will cost. Still, it looks like the gain will be smaller than in the year just ended.

Cut Feed Costs

Because most of the cost of producing hogs is in feed, we ought to look closely at this area for possible savings. Two possibilities come to mind: substituting small grains for corn and feeding recycled waste and gestating sows.

Another area we need to look at is improving herd health. For example, mange cuts feed efficiency by 15 percent as well as causes other problems in the herd.

We can save energy by using high-moisture corn to reduce drying costs and also by heating only part of the farrowing house to warm baby pigs.

Wheat Needs Nitrogen

From now until early March is the best time to apply nitrogen on wheat. Rates vary according to individual field

productivity. On good soils, wheat responds well up to 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Apply enough nitrogen to bring the total amount to 80 to 100 percent per year.

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Fish Production In Farm Ponds

Landowners can increase fish production in Farm Ponds by liming and fertilizing ponds. Extension Wildlife and Fisheries Leader Dr. Tom Wellborn says Fertilization increases fish weight and provides fish for recreational fishing in ponds. Dr. Wellborn says ponds should be limed, if required, before fertilizing. He recommends using eight pounds of nitrogen and eight pounds of phosphate per acre every three to six weeks during the summer. For more specific information on how to lime and fertilize farm ponds, contact your County Extension Agent.

4-H Beef Cattle Project

Beef cattle production is one of the most important parts of Mississippi's agricultural industry. Less labor is needed to raise beef cattle than most other kinds of livestock. Grass and roughage are the most important feeds for cattle on Mississippi farms. Because they live largely on roughage rations, beef cattle can produce an income from land that might otherwise be worthless.

You will probably sell your steer when he is about eighteen months old, although cattle are sold at many different ages. Men who represent a meat packing company usually buy slaughter cattle at a stockyard or auction market.

Beef cattle are slaughtered by people who work in the packing plant. The meat after the animal is slaughtered is

called beef. Beef is sold to the grocer as fresh meat or processed and packaged for sale as canned or frozen beef. Fresh beef is sold mainly as steaks, roasts and ground hamburger.

Beef is the favorite meat of Americans. An average person eats about 116 pounds of beef each year. Beef makes up almost half of the meat eaten in this country.

The most desirable steaks and roasts are cut from the rib, loin, rump and the round. The lower priced cuts are less tasty and contain more bone and fat.

ASCS Advises Farmers To Report Changes, Prove Yields

"Tishomingo County farmers were urged to report changes in their farm operations for the 1981 program year," Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

readily than others under the same conditions of rainfall, cover, and slope. Capacity for water absorption and permeability of the soil to a great extent determine the amount of runoff. Certain other physical characteristics of the soil, such as texture, also affect the amount of erosion.

The amount of water absorbed is influenced by the texture and structure of the soil. In sands and other coarse-textured soils, high permeability results in rapid water absorption and in little erosion. However, a sandy soil may be highly erodible when it is saturated with water, especially where the amount of organic matter is low. In fine-textured soils, structure is an important factor in determining erodibility. A soil with a granular structure, in which the fine particles are arranged in clusters, absorbs water fairly readily and is fairly resistant to erosion if the clusters are not easily broken down by beating raindrops.

The organic matter in the soil is important because of its high waterholding capacity and its tendency to improve granulation. As a result of growing cultivated crops, the erodibility of the soil increases.

The amount of erosion which has taken place must be considered. Loss of surface soil exposes subsoils which are almost lacking in organic matter. They have less capacity for water absorption than the natural topsoil and so may erode more rapidly than the original surface soil.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. However, the four special hardship conditions (unusually high medical expenses, shelter cost in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses) have been eliminated. A standard deduction for each household has been incorporated into the income scale instead.

The applications which are currently on file are being reevaluated to determine whether children are eligible for free benefits, for reduced price meals, or for paid meals under the new criteria. Families of children whose benefits are reduced or terminated will receive written notice of the change at least 10 days before the effective date of the change.

Families who wish to submit a new application may obtain an application form from each school's office. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by an adult household member that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

THE FOOD SERVICE SUPERVISOR will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the decision of the determining official, he or she may wish to discuss it with the official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to DR. JERRY CLAY STONE, SUPERINTENDENT, 507 WEST QUITMAN STREET PHONE 423-3206 for a hearing to appeal the decision.

Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District's free and reduced price meal policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or its family size or income changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children or the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or national origin. F-26-c.

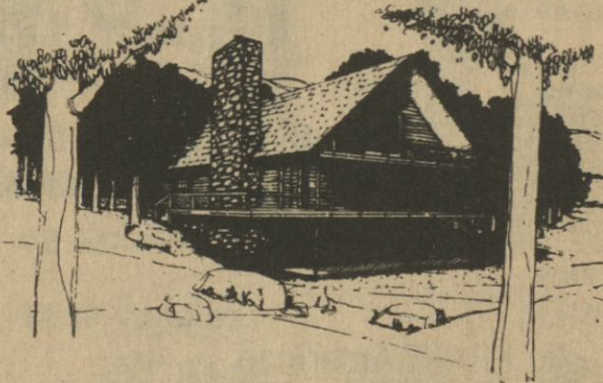

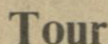

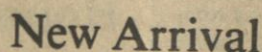

Legislative Report

After convening at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, February 2, the first order of business for the House of Representatives was the swearing in of Mrs. Mary Stevens of West, Mississippi, to take the seat of the retired Clarence Pierce, of Vaiden. Mrs. Stevens and Representative Betty Jane Long, of Meridian, are the only two female members of the Legislature.

The House considered and passed five bills on Monday. These included House Bill 7, which revised and made comprehensive amendments to the state textbook purchasing law; House Bill 70, which changed the name of the Southern Interstate Nuclear Compact to the Southern States Energy Compact; House Bill 733, which provided that an insurance company may not raise its rates for certain speeding convictions; House Bill 853, which set up the Uniform Securities Act for Mississippi; and House Bill 1050, which excluded the use of the bodies of mentally ill and retarded persons from use in medical colleges.

On Tuesday, the House passed Senate Bill 2912, which was the first of many appropriations bills yet to come implementing the state employee pay raise. Also, a bill to increase the amount paid to local registrars for birth and death certificates was passed. Several bills concerning municipalities were passed, including a bill to change the date after which municipalities may not expend money without an approved budget and a bill to authorize municipalities to create zoning or adjustment boards.

Two bills concerning the practice of dentistry passed on Wednesday — House Bill 462, providing for certain penalties for the illegal practice of dentistry and House Bill 464, which revised the qualifications for taking the examination to practice dentistry.

A bill to authorize counties and municipalities to make appropriations to planning and development districts passed the House on Wednesday, as did a bill to allow National Guard commissioned warrant officers to administer the enlistment oath to recruits.

Thursday, February 5th, was the deadline day for House Committees to report bills to the House. All general

bills not favorably reported died in Committee.

Several game and fish bills were passed on this day, including a bill to reclassify nutria and bobcat as fur-bearing animals and to provide for their hunting and trapping, and a bill to classify pheasants as game birds and to authorize a hunting season for them.

House Bill 205, increasing the amount of wages a debtor may pay to the heirs of a deceased creditor was passed.

House Concurrent Resolution 23 passed the House on Thursday. This bill would provide for a Constitutional Amendment to require the State Supreme Court to redistrict circuit and chancery court districts five years after each U.S. Census if the Legislature has not done so during such five-year period.

Also passing the House on Thursday was another resolution for a Constitutional Amendment to exclude Legislators from certain conflict of interest provisions of the State Ethics Laws.

On Friday, the House approved a conference report on Senate Bill 2241, which is to clarify public contracts and purchases by state agencies and local governing

authorities. A bill was also passed to revise the salaries of county voter registrars. House Bill 511 passed the House on Friday. This bill requires those who are Social Security disabled to renew their exemption from hunting and fishing licenses each year and to require the clerk to retain copies of proof of such disability.

House Bill 845, defining legislative conflicts of in-

terest was set specifically to be taken up by the House 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday, February 10th. The House then adjourned until Monday, February 9th, 2:00 p.m.

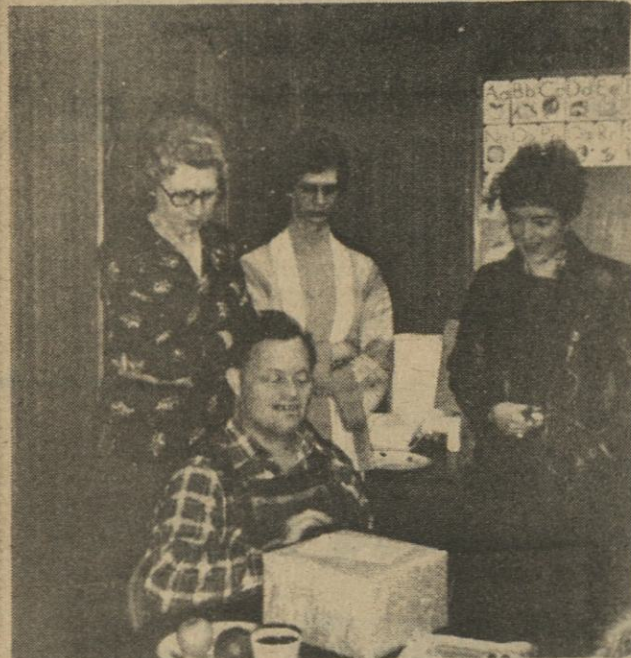

From Sen. Bill May

February 20, 1981

There has been much written and many conversations concerning a couple of bills presently under consideration in the Legislature concerning the Tennessee Valley Authority in lieu tax payments. The Senate bill which is presently under consideration by the Senate Finance Committee is S.B. No. 2820. This bill calls for the transfer of the TVA in lieu payment to a North Mississippi Highway Improvement Fund. The House bill, H.B. No. 292, has passed the House and is also in the Senate Finance Committee. House Bill No. 292 seeks to revise the method of apportioning payments of in lieu taxes based on three criteria. Under the proposed House bill, this payment would go to the general fund of the respective counties to be used for any lawful purpose. If either of these particular pieces of legislation were to pass the Legislature this year, neither would take effect nor be implemented until 1987.

Senate Bill 2820 would enable a cash buildup in a ten year period of \$260 million to be utilized in the construction of six specific highways (Miss. 6, Miss. 25, U.S. 45, U.S. 78, U.S. 72, U.S. 82). According to communication received from the Director of the Mississippi State Highway Department, there are approximately 892 miles of highway contained in this particular bill. The primary author of this particular bill prepared a synopsis of the bill calculating that the designated highway construction contained within the bill would be approximately \$460,000,000. The Mississippi State Highway Department, however, has calculated a figure of \$2,456,130,000. As you may note, there is approximately a 2 billion dollar discrepancy. The roads contained in this particular bill would be constructed in a priority status contained in other Code sections.

The roads most likely to receive the highest priority under the present law would be U.S. 45, U.S. 78 and U.S. 82. The Highway Department estimates that it would cost approximately \$795,678,000 to 4-lane U.S. 45 under the present bill. The Highway Department also predicts a cost of \$348,498,000 to 4-lane U.S. 78 under this bill. The Highway Department also calculates that it would cost approximately \$349,635,000 to 4-lane U.S. 82 under this particular bill. This bill would also enable additional funds which might become available by other state and federal programs to be used for construction within this program. However, one can obviously see that there are insufficient funds to 4-lane any one of the top three major top priority roads, much less U.S. 72, Miss. 25 and Miss. 6. I may point out at this point that these priorities are set by state law based on certain criteria.

It is my feeling that the TVA in lieu payment as established by an act of Congress was to assist local governments, since they have an inability to tax this federal entity. This type program would be in effect taking monies from local county and city governments to be utilized to build state and federal highways. This may be advantageous to the areas which would receive this

money due to their highway priority status, but it is my feeling that it would be extremely unfair to my particular district. I therefore have taken opposition to this particular bill.

House Bill No. 292 is a method to redistrict TVA in lieu payments to the counties. If H.B. No. 292 were to pass, based on the formula contained therein, starting in the year 1990 Itawamba County would receive approximately \$431,000; Prentiss County approximately \$696,000; Tishomingo County approximately \$13,016,000. All of these above figures are strictly estimates because there is no real basis that can be established at the present time for these future tax payments. The House bill seems much more equitable and will receive my total support.

After presenting the factual information obtained from the State Highway Department, the Senate Finance Committee overwhelmingly agreed with my position and defeated Senate Bill No. 2820.
