Jack Rye Announces For Re-Election As Iuka Chief of Police

Jack Rye, a long-time, 28 year resident of Iuka, today announces his candidacy for re-election to the office of Chief of Police.

Mr. Rye was first elected to the office of Chief of Police in 1973 and served the 16 months term. Mr. Rye was re-elected to the office of Chief of Police in 1977 for another four year term.

Mr. Rye is making his announcement for a third full term, and he has this to say:

"First, I would like to thank the fine people of Iuka for the splendid vote they gave me in electing me to this high and noble office. I know that, without the support of everyone of you I could not have been so successful in my races for this office. So, it is with a deep gratitude and humble thanks that I now come to you again, asking that you support me in this upcoming election. I promise you that if you will re-elect me as your Chief of Police, I will continue to give you the same 24-hour efficient service that I have given in the past.

"While serving as your Chief of Police I have always worked closely with our school officials and teachers and have always maintained a good relationship with them. I have always done my best to keep the unfortunate youngsters from public places in unpleasant situations. We have the finest group of teenagers in the county, and we should be proud of them. I shall continue to work closely with our teenagers.

"And I would further like to state that my relationship with the Black people in our community has always been good. They are good citizens and are deserving of police protection and security, and I have done my best to see that they have always been cooperative and I have had no problems on their part.

"One thing that is coming more apparent every day is the increase of other minority group of people in our community. Mr. Rye continued. I have reference to our Senior citizens. Iuka is fast becoming a retirement center for many of our older people, and due to this, they are also dependent upon the Police Department for protection and security. I have worked closely with our Senior citizens and shall continue to maintain a constant vigil for their safety.

"Also, Mr. Rye continued, Iuka is growing every week in construction activity. Several construction companies now have contracts in Iuka vicinity and with these contracts has come the construction people. I have been working closely with the owners of these construction companies in an effort to be service to them and assist in every way that I can. The last four years in Iuka will be different with so many new people coming in, therefore, it is necessary that we have good relationships with all newcomers.

"I would like to emphasize that I know how to deal with the public and have had a minimum of trouble in enforcing the laws. I have always treated the prisoners fairly, and I won't ask any of our officers to do anything I wouldn't do myself.

"The Iuka Police Department is in need of expansion. We need more men, and we need two police cars right most of the time. It is essential that we keep up with progress, therefore, I will do my best to expand

and improve your Police Department so as to give you more and better service than ever, and with the help of the good people of Iuka, I know that these improvements can be made.

"We have had some problems within the Police Department, but they have been ironed out. A Police Department is like any other department - things will come up that are not right, but with some good common sense and a little hard work they can be worked out.

"In other words - there are always improvements to be made in the Police Department, and I promise to make these improvements.

"I have always worked hard to get all the Federal Grants that I could for the Police Department. I will continue to work for all grants that will help your Police Department. So many agencies are being phased out that grants are hard to come by. I have the knowledge and the know-how to get these grants if they are available, and I promise you that I will continue to keep abreast with all Federal Grants.

"In regard to my service to you in the past, we have made more arrests than any time before in the history of Iuka. Crime has increased about 20% in all categories, in spite of our vigilance and efforts. However, with our limited personnel and equipment, I believe most of our good citizens will agree that we have done a pretty good job.

"In all instances, where necessary, I have gone before the Grand Jury and Circuit Courts every term to prosecute my cases, and also, when necessary, I go to Chancery Court with juvenile cases. I have always maintained a good relationship with my fellow officers, with the County Attorney, the District Attorney, and the Judges. This is very important in that our prosecuting attorneys must have faith and confidence in the arresting officers, so that better justice may be given.

"In conclusion, let me emphasize this— Re-elect a man that will continue to help you! There are some of the finest people in the world right here in Iuka and Tishomingo County. My interest in Iuka and Tishomingo County and my only desire is to see that we continue to keep a safe and secure place for all of us to live in peace with a minimum of violence and crime. I shall forever be grateful to you for your continued support and vote. So, let me urge you, when election day comes around, go to the polls and vote for me and I will assure you that you will never regret it."

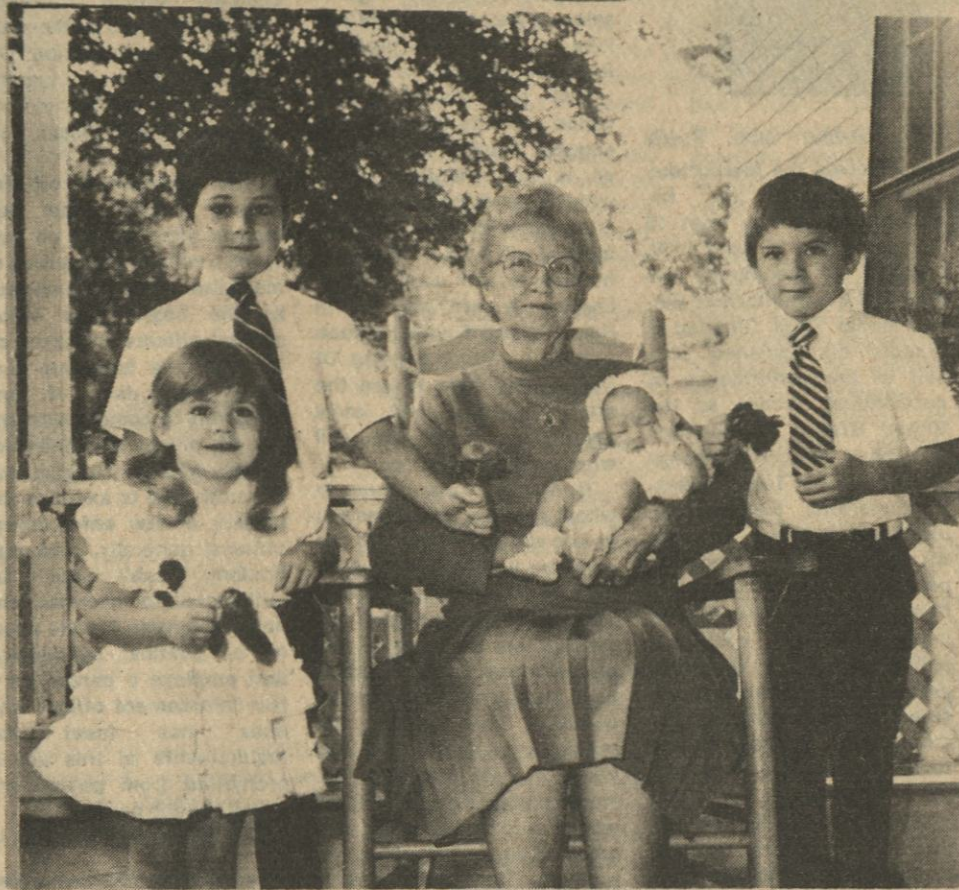

A Farmers Home Administration Loan of \$646,000 has been approved for improvements in the Midway-Pleasant Hill Association, according to Congressman Jamie Whitten.

The FmHA funds will be used to construct a new 300 gallon per minute well, a 300 gallon per minute water treatment plant, a 50,000 gallon elevated storage tank, a 75,000 gallon standpipe and extensions to serve 121 additional users, bringing the total number of Tishomingo County residents served to 574.

Good Start For Cotton

Our cotton crop this year was planted at a near-record pace. Because of a dry winter and spring and above-average temperatures, many of our growers planted almost all of their crops in April.

The early crop establishment gives us better yield

potential at this point than in the last several years. While some stands did not emerge immediately after planting, most should be up to a workable stand by the middle of May.

The early start should allow most of our cotton to mature on time and be harvested in good weather. Yield and quality have the potential to be good.

Once a workable stand is established, control of weeds and insects becomes a top priority. The first five to six

weeks after cotton emerges are critical in controlling weeds.

Insects probably are our worst problem in producing cotton. Unless controlled, insects will attack crops throughout the growing season and reduce yield potential severely.

With a little luck, the good start we have this year could mean above average yields this fall if we use our best management.

Plant On Time

Soybean growers should try to plant most of their crops at the most favorable time.

This means planting from May 1-30 in the area north of U.S. Highway 84.

Planting in these periods gives beans the best chance to reach maximum plant size before they begin to bloom. This means better chances of highest yields.

Planting earlier than these dates may reduce yields, but probably not as much as planting later than the best periods.

Double Cropping Following Wheat

Looks like wheat might mature early this year. If so this should help our chances with soybeans. There are approximately 450,000 acres of wheat and if every acre were to be followed with soybeans this would account for about 11 percent of the total soybeans.

Soybean yields are usually reduced following wheat. The major reason is probably late planting dates. Other factors in yield reductions include dry soils, weeds, and poor stands. Several things can be done to partially offset these problems.

Strawmanagement is one of the main problem considerations - either you keep it or get rid of it. Research at the Brown Loam Station and the Black Belt station show 5 to 6 bushel yield advantage to burning the straw when compared to stubble planting. Burning does not exclude no-tillage planting shortly following the burn before the soil becomes dry and hard. Otherwise, some shallow tillage will be needed.

Grain Loan
Rates Announced

The price support loan rate in 1981 for soybeans is \$5.02 per bushel. This is the same as last year, Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reported. The county rate is based on the national average loan rate for soybeans, which is \$5.02 per bushel.

Other loan rates are: wheat, \$3.20 per bushel, up 20 cents from 1980; oats, \$1.24 per bushel, up 8 cents; sorghum, \$2.28 per hundredweight, up 14 cents; and corn, \$2.40 per bushel, up 15 cents from 1980. "Special loan rates are in effect for this year's grain reserve crops," Bridges said. These rates are \$3.50 per bushel for reserve wheat, \$2.55 for corn, \$1.31 for oats and \$2.42 per hundredweight for sorghum placed in the grain reserve.

The reserve program offers farmers three-year loans and storage payments up to hold their grain off the market in

reserve until the contract matures or until the farm price reaches the specified release price. "When these prices reach the call level, farmers agree to repay the loan plus accrued interest and unearned storage payments or forfeit the grain to the Commodity Credit Corporation," the ASCS official said.

Conservation Notes

Those who know say that 1981 is going to be a big year for wheat in Mississippi - into the hundreds of thousands of

acres, they say. Well, after wheat, what?

Many wheat farmers are thinking about planting soybeans the no-till way. Dozens of farmers did just that last year. The big questions, though, is what to do with that wheat residue. Some say burn it, others say disc it under, but still others say leave it right there and plant beans the no-till way. The no-till way - let's talk about that.

If you farm a wheat crop, chances are you will have about 2 tons of residue per acre on the land after harvest. That residue contains things worth money to you. For instance, each ton of wheat residue has 13 pounds of nitrogen, 23 pounds of potash, and 3 pounds of phosphate. The easiest thing to do is burn it - but wait, is that best? If the residue is burned, most of the nitrogen is gone, so is the organic value of the residue, and you lose the cover that protects the soil from erosion.

Soil and water conservation districts and the SCS suggest leaving the residue as is and planting beans without land preparation or cultivation. It's a fact that this method will work if the proper herbicides are used and if beans are not planted in fields infested with johnson or other perennial grasses. Of course, you have to use the proper planters and know something about the soil where you are planting.

If you plan to plant beans in wheat residue, a suggestion or two will be helpful. Set the combine to leave about 6 inches of wheat stalk standing. This will eliminate a lot of top residue that might get in the planter's way. Put a shredder or at least a spreader on the combine. This spreads the residue on a larger area and keeps it from bunching up. Another good tip is to look for weeds and grass after the wheat is harvested. When the sunlight hits the ground, these plants will begin to grow faster. This means you need to apply herbicides at planting or soon after. It's a good idea to plant beans soon after the wheat harvest, the same day if possible. This allows you to take advantage of good moisture.

Well, if you are growing wheat and plan to follow with beans, making full use of that wheat residue can protect your soil and save soil and fuel. And chances are good that your profits will be better when you farm the no-till way.

Sen. Bill May Reports To The People

S.B. No. 2191
(Signed by Governor)
This bill creates the Board on Law Enforcement Officer

Standards and Training. This board will have the authority to set minimum standards of education and training for law enforcement officers.

The board will consist of nine members. The Governor will appoint a member from each of the following categories: a chief of police of a municipality, a sheriff, a district attorney, and a representative of higher education. The remaining members will be the Attorney General, the Commissioner of Public Safety, the Chief of the Mississippi Highway Patrol, the President of the Mississippi Municipal Association, and the President of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors.

The board will certify officers as being qualified under the provisions of this act and the board's rules and regulations. In addition, the board will approve law enforcement officer training schools operated by the state or a political subdivision. The Criminal Justice Planning Commission will provide administrative and fiscal support for the board.

Law enforcement officers already serving under permanent appointment on July 1, 1981, will not be required to meet the standards imposed by the board. Law enforcement officers employed after that date have one year from their date of employment to comply with the act. An officer who does not comply with the act shall not be authorized to exercise the powers of law enforcement officers generally, and particularly shall not be authorized to exercise the power of arrest. A state agency or political subdivision that employs a person as a law enforcement officer who does not meet the requirements of this act is prohibited from paying the salary of such person.

The board will reimburse

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each political subdivision and state agency at least 50% of the salary and allowable tuition, living and travel expenses incurred by an officer's attendance at an approved training program.

The bill sets forth a schedule of assessments which will be imposed whenever a court imposes a fine or orders a bail forfeiture as a penalty for a violation of a criminal law of this state or a criminal ordinance of a municipality or a county, except an ordinance relating to vehicles unlawfully left or parked. The assessment ranges from \$4.00, when the fine or forfeiture is \$20.00 to \$49.99, to 5% of the fine or forfeiture, when the fine or forfeiture is in excess of \$5,000.00. These assessments will provide revenues to fund the operation of the board. The assessments will take effect on July 1, 1981.

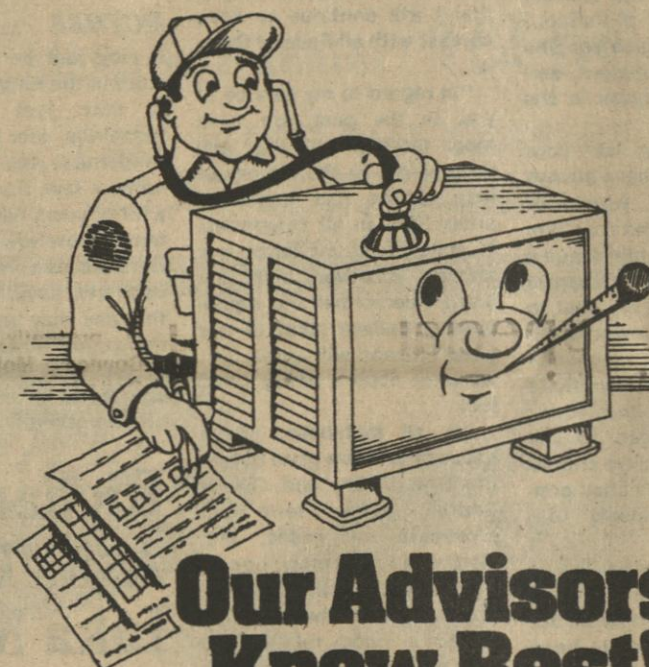

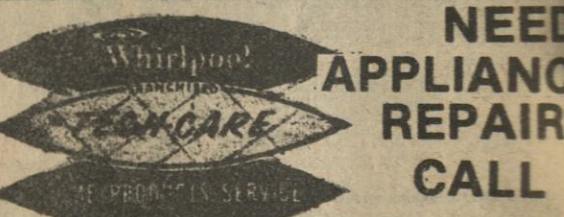

Amend Tax Return

Many taxpayers discover that after they have filed their federal tax returns, some items were left out, such as a deduction or an income figure. These taxpayers can change their original tax returns by filing corrected returns on Form 1040X, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The original return can be amended any time during the three years following the due date (including extensions) of the original, or two years from the time the tax was paid, whichever is later, according to IRS.

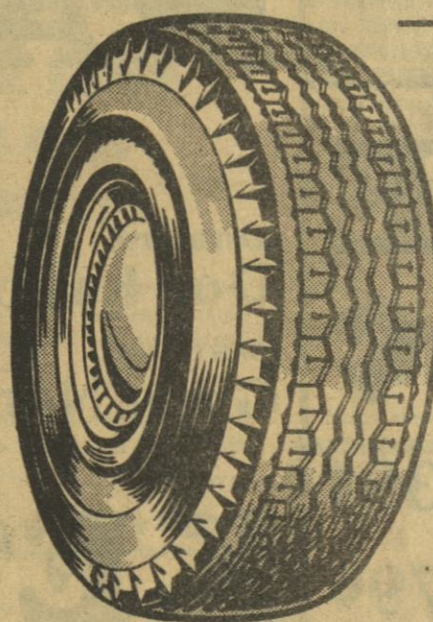

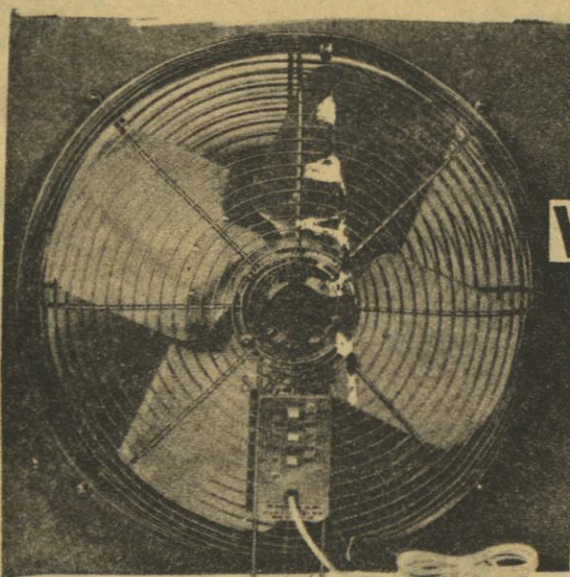

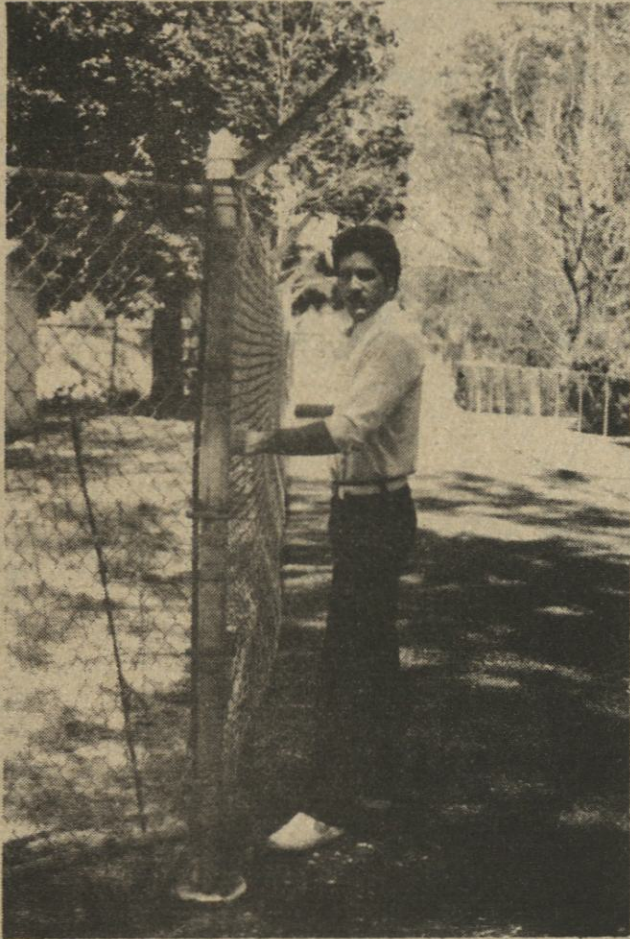

Larry Fiske Accepts Position At Kamper Zoological Garden

Larry Fiske, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Fiske, of Iuka, has recently accepted the position of Curator of animals and birds at the Kamper Park Zoological Garden in Hattiesburg, Miss.

Larry, a student who will be studying at the University of Southern, has been collecting and breeding rare species for about six years. He has raised many animals and birds from all over the world, right here in Tishomingo County. For example, Larry has raised several species of migratory waterfowl from the United States, Blackbuck antelope and India blue peafowl from Asia, African Gray parrots and Egyptian geese from Africa, Muffon sheep from Europe, Rheas and White-Eared marmosets from South America, Black swans and Emu from Australia, and Sika deer from Japan. These experiences have been very helpful to Larry, and now his expertise can be used in starting a good dietary and breeding program for the Hattiesburg Zoo.

Last summer Larry spent two weeks at the Bronx Zoo in New York under the tutelage of Ms. Helena Zangara. His work there was an extensive study in the breeding of rare birds. His next trip to the Bronx Zoo, in the fall, will be for a primate breeding workshop.

We feel the animal enthusiasts in the area will miss Larry's "odd pet" collection, but that his studies will be very beneficial to the Hattiesburg Zoo.

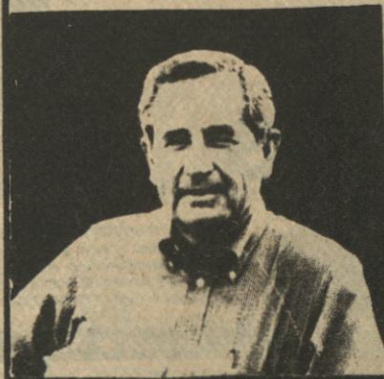

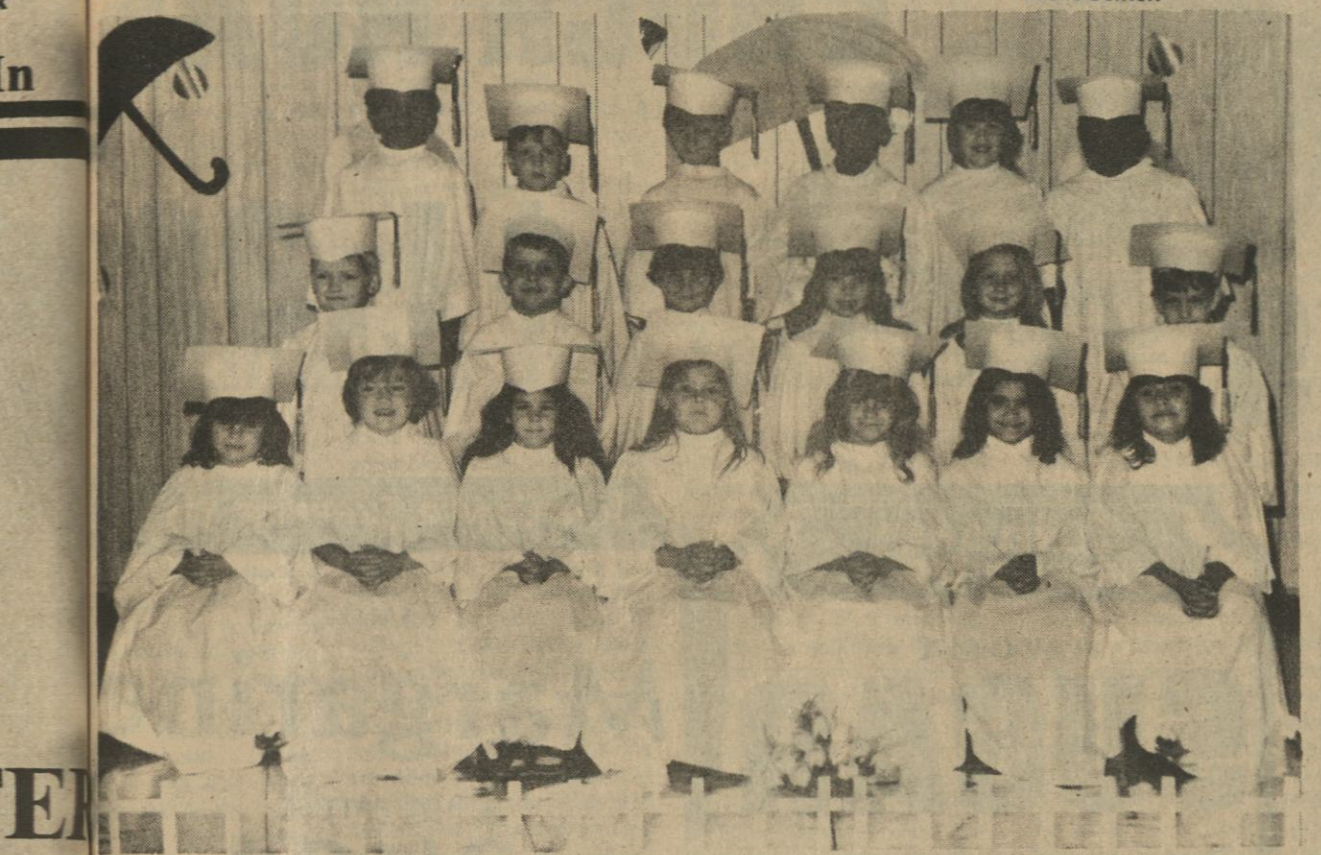

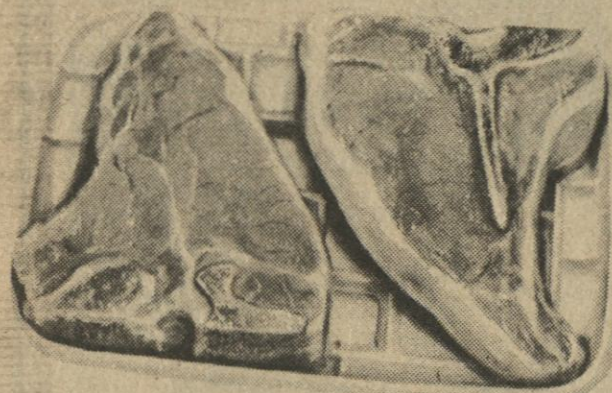

Merchant's Appreciation Day In Iuka Saturday

Train Ride For All And Special Exhibits

Visitors to the Merchants' Appreciation Day in Iuka will have an opportunity to learn about the history and many sides of railroading this weekend. Both the "Best of Charleston" and the Southern Railway's colorful locomotive on display Saturday, near the Southern Depot in Iuka.

The Exhibit Car, with many displays, including a model train actually powered by solar energy, will open to visitors from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. In the car, slide

shows, dioramas, scale and working models depict Southern's computerized operations, detection of overheated wheel bearings and many other facets of modern railroading. A display on solar energy shows how Southern harnesses the sun's rays to meet varied energy needs.

The "Best Friend" consists of steam engine, tender and two open coaches, and was built in 1928 from the plans of the original "Best Friend," which inaugurated regular steam railroad passenger service on December 25, 1830. It will give brief rides

from 12 noon to 4 p.m.

Between 1970 and 1980, the "Best Friend" was viewed by an estimated 4.4 million people, while over 300,000 rode the famous replica.

Its appearances have included a number of functions connected with the 1970 South Carolina Bicentennial and the 1976 United States Bicentennial celebrations, and such events as the Presidential Inaugural parade in 1977.

Since 1971, the Exhibit Car has visited 175 cities and been viewed by over a quarter-million people.

Center Postmaster J.W. of Tupelo, today announced the appointment of Curtis, as the new Postmaster at Iuka, effective May 2, 1981.

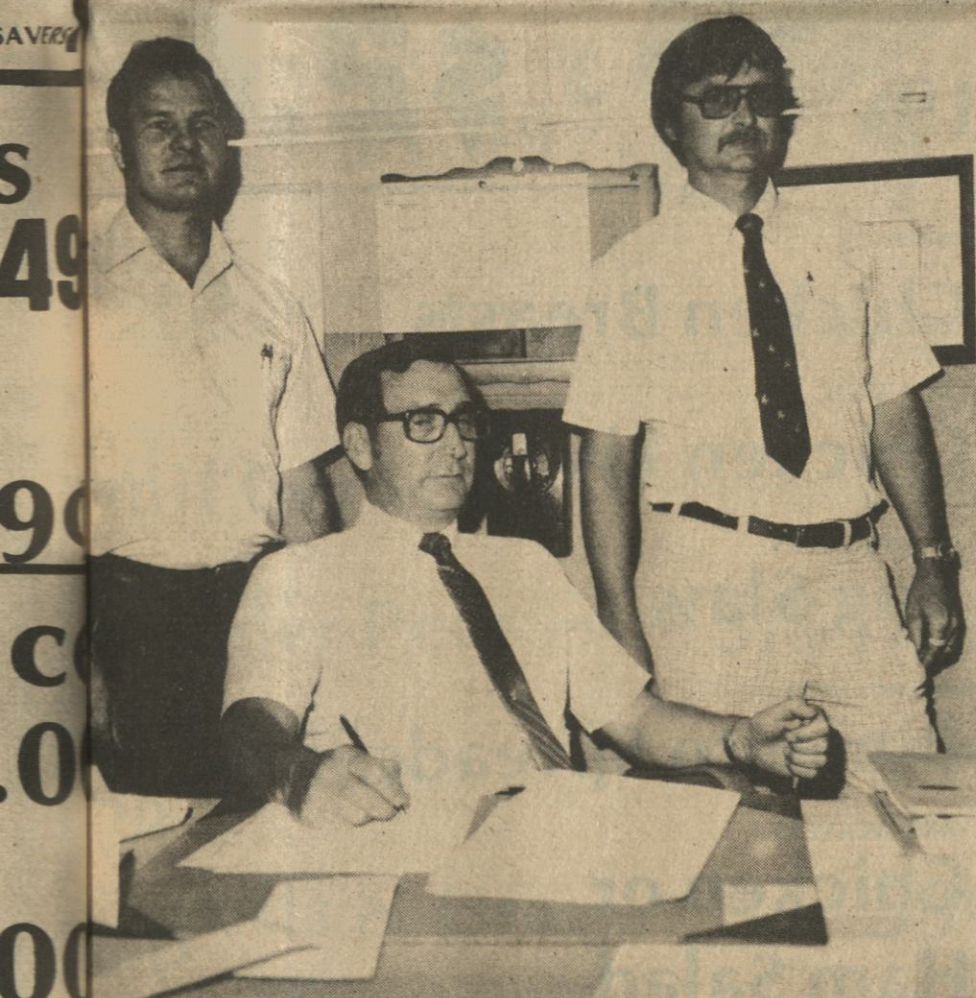

Elect Luther Rice, Jr. Chief of Police, June 2

I would like to remind the citizens of Iuka that I am still in the race for Chief of Police of Iuka despite the fact that a few people tried to get the Election Committee to rule that I was not qualified. The Election Committee ruled that I am qualified to run in the June 2nd election.

I wrote before that when I moved back here several years ago, I found Iuka had not changed during all the years I was away. Since this zoning deal came up a few months ago, I believe all the people of Iuka can see for themselves that Iuka is still being run like a dictatorship. There are just a few people who run this city and they run it to suit themselves. The citizens are the voters who put them in office does not have one thing to say once these people are elected. These elected officials tell us, the voters, that we don't have sense enough to know what we want. Doesn't that make you want to make a clean sweep of this city government. There are only two people in city government, and that includes the Mayor's office and the head of the Police Department, that will listen to the average citizen and try to carry out their wishes. They are James Rice and Corkey Smith.

As most of you know, I moved a mobile home into the city a few days after the trailer and zoning ordinance was voted out by the Board of Aldermen. A few days later our Mayor George Cutshall sent word by our Police Chief Jack Rye that if I didn't move the trailer by 5 o'clock the next day he would have me arrested. I didn't move the trailer. I did not arrest me. About one month later our Police Chief issued me a ticket for violating the trailer ordinance that had been voted out and was still out when I moved the trailer inside the city limits.

This past Saturday, May 2, Mayor Cutshall held what he called my trial. I had several witnesses to testify they heard the City Attorney say that as of that night (March 3rd) there was no longer a trailer or zoning ordinance in the City of Iuka. Mayor Cutshall said because of the City Attorney, Steve Jackson's, ignorance of the law he would find me guilty. He fined me \$500.00. I appealed the case to the September term of Circuit Court where I feel I will get a fair hearing and will be found not guilty.

This sort of thing is only one reason we need a new city government. I want the citizens of Iuka to remember I will be, if I'm elected the Police Chief, for ALL the people of Iuka.

There have been quite a few people during the past week ask me if they could leave the Chief of Police candidates blank and just vote for the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. I talked to the Election Committee and they said you can leave the Chief of Police candidate blank. You DO NOT have to vote for the Chief of Police in the first two elections. You CAN leave it blank. But you do have to vote for five candidates for the Board of Aldermen. If you vote for any number less than five your ballot could be thrown out.

The only rights the citizens of Iuka have, as things stand now, is the right to vote. They can't take that away from us. So, let's be sure and get out and vote so we can change the city government before it's too late.

I will be running in the June 2nd election against the winner of the May 12th and May 19th elections. Be sure and vote in all three elections. Let's get James Rice and Corkey Smith some help. The people I believe will help besides James and Corkey are J.C. James, Zeb Gregson and T.E. Stanford for Alderman; Richard Woodruff for Mayor; and Luther Rice, Jr., for Chief of Police. Please consider these names when you vote.

Low Lake Levels

Despite April showers over most of the Tennessee Valley, the recreation outlook on tributary streams and lakes in the Tennessee Valley is still not good, TVA said.

White water enthusiasts who normally start flocking to the Ocoee River and other fast-flowing streams in the

eastern part of the Valley in May will be particularly affected.

Barring a major -- and unlikely -- change in ordinary weather patterns for this time of year, TVA will be able to release only about half the water it did last year on some of its white water streams.

The reason basically is that the TVA reservoirs have not recovered from an all-time record 10 months of drought that occurred between May of last year and April of this year. With the "wet" season for the Valley now ending, the reservoirs are expected to remain well below normal summer levels.

Even with April's rainfall, which measured 3.6 inches, the Tennessee Valley has received 15 inches less rainfall than normal for the past 11 months.

The effect of the drought is especially significant in the eastern part of the Valley where most of the tributary reservoirs are located. This also is the area where most white water streams are located.

With forests and other plant life now reaching their peak growing season, benefits to streams and reservoirs from rainfall will decrease as plants take up much more of the available moisture.

Although the drought included the summer months of last year, TVA officials pointed out, conditions on the reservoirs were better in 1980 because of adequate winter and spring rains. "This year," said Bob Shelton, Chief of TVA's Reservoir Operations Branch, "we are starting out the recreation season with our reservoirs far below normal levels."

As a result, TVA tributary lakes will not be as aesthetically pleasing to visitors because low water levels will leave banks exposed. In some cases, boat ramps may be inaccessible.

Also, water releases from reservoirs for the purpose of power generation will not occur during as many hours per day as in previous years, and this will mean fewer hours of "fast" water for downstream recreation -- rafting and kayaking.

TVA projects where substantial recreational use of this sort occurs include the Hiwassee River below Ap-

palachia powerhouse, the Natchala River below Nantahala powerhouse, and the Ocoee River below Ocoee No. 2 Dam.

Water releases for recreation in these areas will provide, TVA said, when they are consistent with power generating requirements.

Because of commercial navigation requirements on the Tennessee River proper, it is not as affected by drought as are the tributaries and will be maintained at near normal elevations.

Gov. Winter Visits TVA Office Head

Mississippi Governor William Winter visited TVA offices in Knoxville on Tuesday, April 14, to discuss progress on Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant under construction in Northeast Mississippi.

Gov. Winter met with George H. Kimmons, a native of Oxford, Miss., who heads TVA's Office of Engineering Design and Construction. That office is responsible for the design and construction

of the plant near luka.

"Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant will help ensure a prosperous future for our region," said the Governor. "Right now, an enormous amount of work is going into that project in Mississippi and in Knoxville. I was delighted to get a chance to tell George Kimmons and others that we in Mississippi are proud of the work TVA and its employees are doing."

The nuclear project employs about 3,000 persons. The first of the plant's two units is expected to be producing electricity in the late 1980's.

It Can Be Done By Telephone

Some people apparently find it hard to believe that almost all social security business can be handled by telephone, from changing an address to applying for retirement, disability, or survivor benefits.

This may explain why many people stop at the social security office to get answers to their questions, pick up a leaflet, or apply for benefits. They may end up waiting in line or wasting gas (and

energy.)

For several years, social security has been geared up to handle most of its business by telephone a direct result of the steady increase in the volume of business from new programs, new legislation, and new clients. Social Security Offices around the country are staffed to provide service by telephone. The offices have personnel trained to handle almost all social security business by phone so a special trip to the office is not necessary.

Social Security officials believe that telephone service can be a convenience to many people. The best times to call the office generally are the last two weeks of the month, the latter half of most weeks, and in the afternoon. More information about Social Security or SSI can be obtained by contacting any Social Security Office. The phone number in Corinth is 287-5241.
