County Mourns Death Of Outstanding Citizen

Services Held For Robert E. Lambert, County Hospital Administrator



Robert E. Lambert, 52, well known and highly respected businessman, died Sunday, May 14, at Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., following a brief illness.

Mr. Lambert had served as Administrator of Tishomingo County Hospital since May 15, 1960. He was a graduate of Belmont High School and The University of Mississippi, where he completed his requirements for a B.S. in Biology on August 12. He was accepted as a student at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville to study for a degree in Dentistry, but was unable to accept his appointment due to the Korean Conflict, during which he served in the Air Force Medical Department at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas.

Mr. Lambert was an active member of the Mississippi Hospital Association, serving on its Finance and Shared Services Committees. He was a Board member and past president of the Northeast Mississippi Hospital Council. He was a member of the American College of Hospital Administrators and National Board of Nursing Home Directors. He served as Colonel on the staff of three Mississippi governors and was appointed by Governor William Winter to the Mississippi Health Care Committee State-Wide Coordinating Council.

Funeral services were held Saturday, May 16, at 10 a.m. at the Iuka Church of Christ with Rex Buford, Jerry Westmoreland and Rev. Doc Jeter officiating. Burial was in Belmont Cemetery.

School Bonds Sold Tuesday

Ten year general obligation bonds, for renovations to Iuka High School and Iuka Elementary School, were sold on Tuesday, May 19, to First Tennessee Bank, of Memphis, Tenn., at 9.311%.

Voters in the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District passed the bond issue in a special election held on October 9, 1979.

The money generated for the school bonds will be utilized on a priority basis as follows: (1) Commons Building; (2) Gymnasium Renovation; (3) Howard Auditorium Renovation; (4) Sidewalks and Covered Walkways; (5) Combination Pressbox-Concession Restrooms; and (6) Architect-Engineer Services.

After advertisement for bids and letting of contracts, it is hoped that work can begin on these projects by early fall.

Don Cowell Asks For Iuka Alderman Post

To the Citizens of Iuka: Thanks for the support many of you gave me in the February 10th special election. As a citizen of Iuka for over nine years, I am vitally concerned with the planned, orderly growth of this community and its potential to provide maximum educational, cultural and employment opportunities for its citizens, both young and old.

It has always been my FIRM belief that a person who earns their livelihood in a community ought to put some of their time, talent and substance back into that community, if their health and circumstances permit. I have tried to practice this belief by being active in the affairs of the church we attend, taking an active part in Lions Club activities and serving on the Advisory Committee to the Vocational/Technical Division at N.E.M.J.C. I also serve as a Tishomingo County delegate on the board of the Community Action Agency. As evidence of this belief, I offer to serve at no salary, if elected as one of your aldermen.

My current employment with Consolidated Aluminum, a privately held company, gives me ample opportunity to work with budgets, forecasts and cash flows. It also provides me with a working knowledge of what makes an area attractive to new industry and business.

This experience would, I believe, be helpful in attracting new industry to Iuka. Our city will need additional money to keep its services competitive in the next four years. There are only two ways to go. One is to raise everyone's taxes to a higher level. This works an undue hardship on too many of our elder citizens and marginally employed residents. The other alternative is to attract new, well-paying industries and jobs to Iuka. This would increase tax collections without increasing the load on those already paying their share. I believe this is the direction we should take.

The current Mayor and Board have made some very constructive moves during their tenure to upgrade our city, and I feel I would be able to add some positive input to the Board. Since I work for a private industry, which makes a product sold wholesale only, I have no special interests or pressure groups to which I must answer. I would answer only to the people of Iuka.

County Supervisors Act On Reappraisal Issue

Tishomingo County supervisors may take a big step toward completion of the court-ordered reappraisal of county property in the next few weeks with the advertising of bids on the mapping and revaluation of property.

Leon Cook, president of the supervisors, said the board informally agreed Tuesday that bids should be sought on the mapping of the 14,000 to 15,000 pieces of property in the county.

However, actual advertising for mapping bids will be delayed while supervisors

decide whether to award the re-evaluation of property value and mapping - the two major phases of reappraisal - as a single contract, Cook said.

He said a decision probably will be reached during the June 1 meeting of the supervisors, who will be looking for the cheapest alternative.

Without predicting the board's decision, Cook said a single contract could benefit the county by making one firm responsible for complete reappraisal. For instance, this removes the temptation of

the mapping firm to criticize the performance of a company hired to re-evaluate property, he said.

Property reappraisal - the updating of property values that appear on the county's tax rolls - is being undertaken in most counties as a result of a Hinds County Chancery Court order requiring property tax equalization by 1983.

Tishomingo County is starting reappraisal early enough to meet the court-ordered deadline, Cook predicted. Aerial photography of the county, one of the initial

steps in reappraisal, was done in January or February.

Reappraisal, which has never been done in Tishomingo County, should make property taxes more equitable by updating the evaluation of old homes that don't reflect today's inflated real estate values, Cook said.

Supervisors have levied a special 2-mill property tax to help pay for reappraisal, expected to cost an estimated \$400,000 to \$500,000, he said. The 2-mill tax, which generates \$45,000 annually, probably will be supplemented by the sale of bonds, Cook said.

p.m. a big talent show is scheduled. Judge James Kirk will be the master of ceremonies. All types of talent are welcome to participate in the show. Trophies will be awarded to the acts placing in the top three.

Sunday afternoon a big gospel sing is on the schedule, with several outstanding gospel groups from the area performing.

J.P. Coleman State Park is located on the Tennessee River 13 miles north of Iuka off Mississippi Highway 25.

Freight Liner Hits Utility Pole

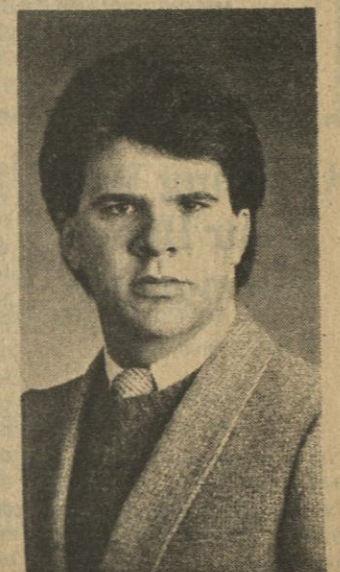
During a heavy rain on Sunday morning, May 17, at 9:08, a 1973 Freight Liner 18 wheeler, driven by James H. Whitt, of Okolona, Miss., was involved in an accident on Highway 72 East in Iuka, in which a utility pole was knocked down and extensive damage done to a resident's lawn.

According to Chief of Police, Jack Rye, the driver of the truck, owned by Wallace Hollis, of Okolona, Miss., was driving east on Highway 72. As he approached the traffic light in front of the Old Courthouse, he applied his brakes, lost control of the vehicle, causing it to jack-knife into the yard of W.S. Brown, stopping at the concrete, which retains the lawn. A utility pole was struck, causing the electrical lines to fall across the cab, trapping the driver until power employees arrived.

Also, certain areas in Iuka were without electricity for several hours. The diesel tanks burst, causing the fuel to spill out.

Mr. Whitt was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital by ambulance, checked and released.

Mr. Rye, Chief of Police, would like to thank Mr. Ben McRae and the employees of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association for their fast and efficient action and any other problems in the past, which were taken care of in the same dependable manner. Your Credit History
Is Crucial

One of the many problems that confront women upon the death of a husband or divorce may be the loss of their credit accounts. Many women find that credit ac-

counts they have shared for years with their husbands are terminated upon death or divorce, and they are unable to qualify for an account in their own names because they have no independent credit history. This sudden loss of credit, at a time when credit may be needed to handle large expenses and delays in benefit payments, can create tremendous, additional emotional strain and may precipitate a financial crisis.

Credit Union Magazine reports that a recent public opinion survey indicated that more than 50 percent of the American public now believes the disadvantage of credit cards outweigh the advantages. Among the disadvantages of credit cards cited by the public were delinquencies or over-extensions resulting from the too easy availability of credit.

Corn-Crisped Chicken
1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in serving pieces
1 cup corn flake crumbs
1 teaspoon flavor enhancer
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup evaporated milk

Mix corn flake crumbs with flavor enhancer, salt and pepper. Line shallow baking pan with aluminum foil. Dip chicken pieces in evaporated milk, then roll immediately in seasoned corn flake crumbs. Place chicken pieces, skin side up, in foil-lined pan; do not crowd. Bake in 350 degree F. oven about 1 hour, or until tender. No need to cover or turn chicken while cooking. Makes 4 servings.

County Agents Notes

Gardening

May and June are among the best gardening months. This is when the garden really starts to pay off as spring-planted vegetables are ready to harvest.

Cabbage, turnips, mustard, English peas, beets, broccoli and Irish potatoes are ready to harvest. You will be picking your first tomatoes, sweet corn and snap beans, too.

Here are some suggestions you may want to consider for top quality at harvest.

Dig Irish potatoes when the vines have died. If the skin easily rubs off the potatoes, give them several days to mature before digging. Keep newly harvested potatoes out of the sun. Store them in a cool, dark place.

Don't try to hasten maturity of bulb onions by breaking over the tops. As the tops begin to yellow and fall over, hasten maturity by gently lifting the bulbs with a fork to

break some of the roots.

Sweet corn takes about 21 days from first silking to maturity. The ears should feel full when mature. When silks first appear, start checking regularly for earworm eggs on the silks so you can spray if needed.

Harvest tomatoes before they are fully red-ripe to avoid bird damage and water bursting.

After you have harvested early vegetables, prepare the garden site for sweet potatoes, peas and beans, pumpkins, squash or fall tomatoes.

Fruit & Nut Care

Spray peaches, plums, bunch grapes, pears and apples according to recommended schedule to insure quality fruits. We have spray schedules at the County Extension Office.

Thin peaches, plums, apples and pears if trees are overloaded. Thin when fruits are three-fourths to an inch in size and before seeds begin to harden. Thin peaches four to six inches apart, apples and pears six to eight inches apart.

Prune and train young trees by removing suckers on the trunk and by thinning branches during the growing season.

Be sure to water recently transplanted trees frequently in dry weather.

CCC Offers Corn For Sale

Farmers and other interested persons will be eligible to purchase corn from the Commodity Credit Corporation starting May 21.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-

vation Committee, said the CCC will offer corn for unrestricted use sale at market prices, but not less than the formula price which is 145 percent of the county loan rate for corn where stored times 105 percent.

"The minimum quantity that will be considered for acceptance is 1,000 bushels," Bridges said.

Here in Mississippi, the corn is stored at the Bunge Corporation located in Greenville. According to Bridges, offers will be received and sales will be made on a first come, first served basis.

The CCC will offer for sale a total of 4.5 million bushels of corn stored in Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Report ACP Practices

Do you have an Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practice that you have not reported? If so, report it today. Payment cannot be made to you until the completed practice is reported to the county ASCS office. Also, if you have a practice that you will not complete, then you need to cancel so that other farmers can use the funds. USDA Reports On Farmland Owned By Foreigners

Foreign investors reported owning about 7.8 million acres or 0.6 percent of U.S. agricultural land at the end of 1980. Secretary of Agriculture John Block said the 2.2 million acre increase includes about 1.8 million acres reported after last year's cutoff date.

"The total acreage of foreign-owned U.S. agricultural land is too small to measure the impact on agriculture at the national level," Secretary Block said. The actual increase during 1980 was about 414,000 acres out of a total U.S. agricultural area of about 1.25 billion acres.

Crop, pasture and other agriculture accounted for 57 percent of all holdings and acquisitions, forest and 37 percent and nonagricultural and unreported use for 6 percent.

Here in Mississippi, land holdings by foreign investors totaled 89,566, land acquisitions 47,818 acres, and land dispositions 5,322

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acres.

Among the states, Maine reported the largest number of acres - 11 percent - owned by foreign persons. Foreign holdings and acquisitions were concentrated in the South and West except for Maine. Of the total holdings and acquisitions reported, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Texas reported 32 percent, and Arizona, California, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, and Utah reported 29 percent. Rhode Island is the only state with no reported foreign-owned agricultural land.

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act of 1978 requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases (over 10 years) and land-use changes to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Foreign owners who fail to report or who are late in reporting face possible fines. USDA has assessed 1,950

penalties for late reporting amounting to about \$2
