## Dingler To Run For Mayor In Burnsville

Tuesday, June 2

I cannot tell you we can put in housing projects and parks, but I will apply for every grant available to our town. It's just a matter of what things the town needs first. The problems mentioned are things you, the citizens, want done. These WILL BE DONE on a regular basis.

People tell me that they have seen more done in the last two months than in the whole four year term. If I am elected as your Mayor, I will see that these problems are taken care of regularly.

A Mayor is elected to preside over the board meetings and see that whatever the board votes for is carried out.

I am not running for any financial gain from being Mayor. I am concerned with filling up holes in the streets instead of my pockets. People tell me they want a change. On Tuesday, June 2, is the time to make that change. I have talked to many people personally. If I didn't catch you at home, do not think I have left you out. 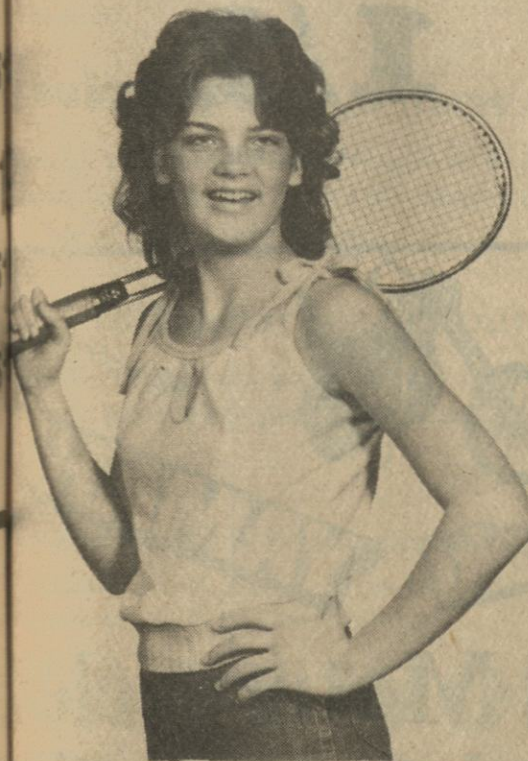

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Freezing Prepared Foods At Home

Food science and technology have brought big changes in daily meal preparation. With a food freezer, you can prepare anything from meat balls to

cream puffs, store them in the freezer, and have them ready for busy-day meals and parties.

You can save time, energy and freezing costs by using your food freezer wisely. Keep the freezer, that full-time servant, full the year 'round. Use space not filled with meats, fruits, and vegetables for prepared foods. Let cooking for the freezer come with regular meal preparation. One meal will be prepared and the others will be ready as "free meals" when you plan for

them. Usually, it is best to package individual dishes -- rather than a complete meal. Plan ahead and organize for the job. Today's freezing techniques make it possible for you to: prepare foods at a convenient time, increase recipes to use now and freeze for later, prepare party refreshments ahead of time, prepare meals for busy days or unexpected guests, prepare foods for packed lunches, special diets, and snacks, and reduce shopping trips and take advantage of "specials".

### Important Considerations

It will be to your advantage to freeze those prepared foods which: are seasonal and/or plentiful, require a little more time to prepare in quantity than in small amounts, require a long time to prepare or to cook, use a variety of ingredients, demand certain skills and care in preparation, demand little time and attention from freezer to table, and maintain their quality for a reasonable storage period.

Most frozen prepared foods have a relatively short storage period because: color may fade, textures may become soggy, flavors may be weakened or changed, combined foods may not freeze in the same way as their individual ingredients do.

No special recipes are necessary, use your favorite or a standard one. If you increase a family-size recipe two or four times, the proportions may differ slightly.

Do NOT cook the food COMPLETELY DONE if it must be reheated when served.

Quick cooling is a must because it stops the cooking process, helps retain the natural flavor, color, and texture of the product, and retards the growth of bacteria.

Package in family-size, airtight, moisture-vapor-resistant containers. Label each package. Quick freeze to prevent loss of flavor, texture and food value. Keep all frozen foods stored at 0 degrees F. or lower temperature. Keep an accurate inventory. Use the food within the recommended storage period. Freezing does not improve quality. Use only quality products in their prime of goodness.

Keep bacterial contamination to a minimum by using clean equipment and speed in preparation, cooling, freezing, and reheating. Special caution must be observed with any cooked protein food.

**Dieter's Tomato Dressing**  
1 clove garlic  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 can condensed tomato soup  
2 tbsp. wine vinegar  
1/2 cup skim milk cottage cheese

Mash garlic in salt until finely ground. Add remaining ingredients; mix well and chill. Makes about one and two-thirds cups dressing (approximately 12 calories per tablespoon).

recreational activities. Boating, camping, hiking, cycling, sports and other outdoor activities and just plain driving for enjoyment bring families into the recreation mainstream.

But with the fun comes added danger of accidents and increased need for safety precautions.

Participating in the 4-H safety program, sponsored nationally by General Motors, these young people are learning and practicing safety habits wherever they are. They also are taking what they've learned and are sharing it with families and other youth and adults in their communities.

Working individually and through their clubs, 4-H'ers use all kinds of activities and methods to spread their safety messages. And they enlist the help of community leaders, businessmen, law enforcement personnel and others to make their communities a safer place to enjoy.

Some 4-H groups have emphasized safety in water sports. Others have stressed bicycle and motorcycle safety, proper use of chemicals at home and on the farm, and proper use of equipment such as power lawn mowers.

## County Agents Notes

### Extension Director To Retire

Dr. William M. Bost, director of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service for the past 19 years, will retire on June 30.

During Dr. Bost's 30 years of service to the people of the state, his innovative leadership and programming have not only captured the imagination of Mississippians, but they have propelled him into the national spotlight as one of the outstanding leaders in the fields of agriculture and Extension education.

To recognize Dr. Bost's service to the people of Mississippi, the new Extension Center on the Mississippi State University campus will be dedicated in his honor on June 25. The dedication ceremony, open to the public, is scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

### Grain Sorghum

You still have time to plant sorghum for grain and reduce chances of production problems associated with a late crop.

Sorghum planted in May not only out-yields that planted in June or later, but it has fewer insect problems than late planted crops. By planting in May, you can harvest

in September before soybean harvest begins.

Sorghum is sensitive to low pH, so be sure to fertilize and lime according to soil tests. If the soil pH is below 5.5, lime even if you have to apply it just before planting.

Phosphate and potash needs for grain sorghum are but about the same as for corn. If these nutrients are low, apply 50 to 60 pounds of each per acre. About 120 pounds per acre is a good general recommendation for nitrogen.

Thousands of dollars are lost each year due to herbicides moving from treated areas to nearby sensitive crops. Extension Weed Scientist, Dr. Wayne Houston, says some herbicides require extremely careful application to prevent drift because very small quantities of certain herbicides can cause damage. Herbicides such as 4-4-D, 2-4-D-B, 2-4-5-T and Dicamba will injure plants such as cotton, grapes, field peas, okra and tomatoes when only one one-thousandth of a pound per acre drifts to these plants. Although most herbicides don't injure plants at these low levels, precautions should be taken to prevent drift to avoid crop injury.

which 460 are owned and the balance rented. He produces soybeans, corn, beef cattle and hay. He has been a director of the Benton County Farm Bureau, an officer in the Benton County Pork Producers, and a member and director of the Benton County Beef Cattlemen. He served as an ASC Community Committeeman for 3 years, and as Commissioner of the Chilli Creek Drainage District. Mr. Tilley, 59, has been farming all his life and now owns 66 acres of land of which 53 are in grain sorghum. He also has 83 head of Charbray/Brangus cattle, and his partnership with his two sons has a 430-acre row crop operation in soybeans. He has belonged to the Mississippi Farm Bureau for 10 years and served four years as a director. He has belonged to the Jackson County Farm Bureau

for ten years and served five years as president. He has been active in County ASC Committee work, and has served as chairman, vice-chairman, regular member and alternate member to the County ASC Committee.

## 1980 Farm Exports Valued at \$41.3 Billion

Farm exports totaled a record of \$41.3 billion during a calendar year 1980, according to a recent report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The total compares with \$40.5 billion reported for fiscal 1980 and \$34.7 billion reported a year earlier. Feed grains, wheat, soybeans and cotton accounted for 60 percent of the value and nearly 80 percent of the 163-million-metric tons of commodities. This record trend is expected to remain unbroken in 1981, as fiscal year exports

are now projected at \$47 billion. The favorable balance in U.S. Agricultural trade also continues to widen, as exports consistently outpace imports. Agricultural imports in calendar 1980 rose only 4 percent above the previous year to \$17.4 billion. Agricultural officials say the increased farm export activity is good for the economy and for farm income. Farm exports generated about \$83 billion worth of business in 1980. About \$34 billion of this economic activity took place in the farming community; the remaining \$49 billion was in nonagricultural industries. Approximately \$1 in every \$3.50 of total farm income came from farm exports, according to the USDA report. In short, farm exports put well over \$40 billion into the agricultural economy in calendar 1980, much more



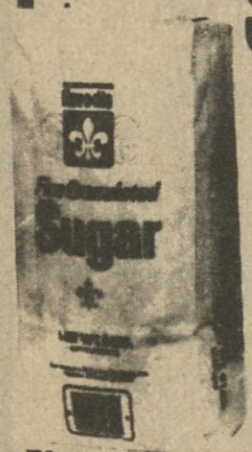

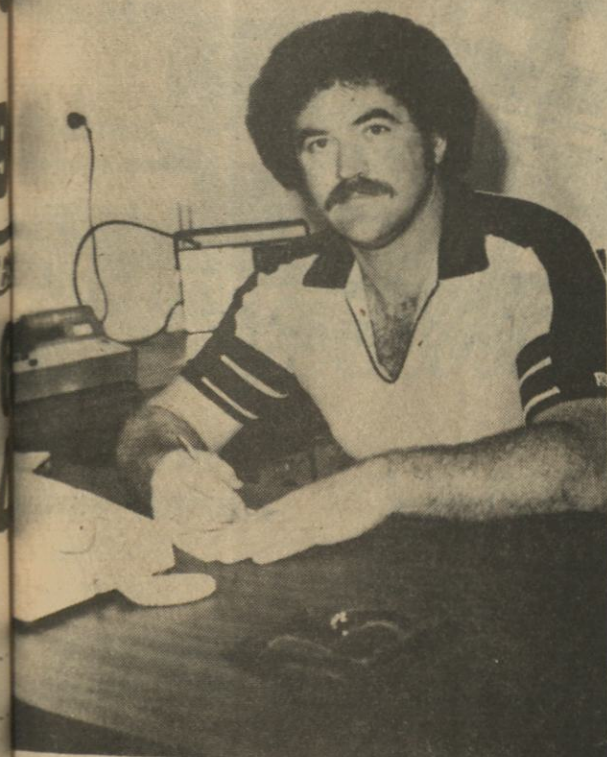

### What Can Be Done To Prevent Rabies?

Every individual pet owner  
may help to prevent rabies in  
his community by doing the  
following:

First of all, have your pet  
vaccinated if you haven't  
already done so. Veterinary  
medical scientists have  
developed safe and effective  
vaccines which give your pet  
maximum protection against  
rabies. To insure continued  
maximum protection, follow  
your veterinarian's advice and  
observe your local rabies  
control regulations.

Second, if bitten by an  
animal, thoroughly cleanse  
the wound with soap and  
irrigate with profuse quan-  
tities of running warm water.  
Contact your physician,  
board of health, or police  
department immediately.  
Confinement, do not kill the  
animal.

Third, obey leash and  
licensing laws in your com-  
munity.

Fourth, make sure your pet  
is identified by a license tag  
and a rabies inoculation tag.

Fifth, report stray dogs to  
the police or local pound  
department.

Finally, teach children not  
to play with strange pets and  
to avoid handling any wild  
animal, particularly when it  
appears to be tame. This is  
especially important when  
you are camping.

## Ron Wanner: Battling For Independence

Ron Wanner from  
Tishomingo, Mississippi, was  
full of smiles as he prepared  
to leave the Mississippi  
Methodist Rehabilitation  
Center on May 13. By the  
standards he has set over the  
past seven years, his month  
long stay was a rather short  
one. Having been in the cen-  
ter twice before, Ron expects  
to return to MMRC several  
times for additional correc-  
tive hip surgery.

With his wife, Anita, and  
sister-in-law, Carole, at either  
side of him, Ron says  
rehabilitation is not a new  
process for him.

"Since my motorcycle ac-  
cident in 1974, I've had eleven  
skin grafts, kidney and hip  
operations performed on me.  
I've been in a total of nine dif-  
ferent hospitals but MMRC is  
by far the best of them all."

"I've been in some  
hospitals where you had to  
wait half an hour before your  
nursing call was answered.  
That's no exaggeration. It's  
different at MMRC. When you  
ring a bell here, someone an-  
swers it immediately."

Ron believes that the key to  
dealing with disability is the  
rehabilitation process.

"Rehabilitation is the hope  
you have for a new and in-  
dependent life. It's a goal to  
shoot for and a reward to be  
gained."

"I think able people should  
work. That's the point of all  
this, isn't it? If you can't do  
that - why bother? For me, its

a matter of economics. In the  
future I want to make more  
than Uncle Sam can give me.  
That's one of the strong in-  
centives about rehabilitation.  
If you can do better, you'll do  
it, but first you have to have a  
chance. That's what I'm  
looking for, and that's what  
MMRC is giving me."

With his hopeful and ef-

fusive nature, Ron is ob-  
viously not someone who will  
be defeated by a disability --  
however severe.

Looking up, he said, "I have  
a T shirt that reads: I don't  
take defeat lightly. That's  
really the way I am. I'll just  
keep trying as long as I'm  
alive. In fact, when my last  
breath comes, you can bet I'll  
have been fighting for  
another one."

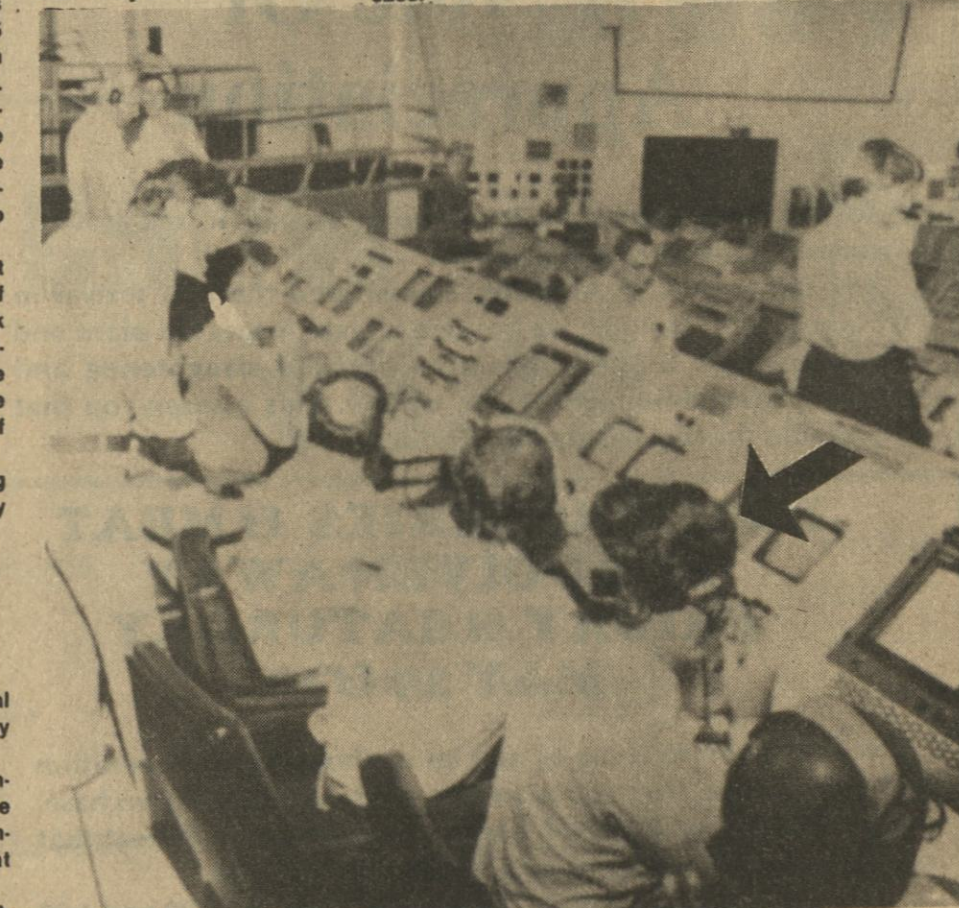

## Sen. Bill May Reports To The People

S.B. No. 2576: (conference report adopted). This bill contains comprehensive amendments to the state's new personnel law, which became effective February 1, of this year. The version of this bill adopted by both houses contained provisions giving pay raises to the state's elected and appointed top officials and the judiciary. The disagreement between the two chambers stemmed from differing philosophies: the prevailing feeling in the House was that the State Personnel Board should set salaries of the top appointed officials, while the Senate desired to retain the statutory salaries in the "omnibus pay" statute. The conference committee failed to reach an agreement on this issue, so the salary provisions in the

bill were deleted.

The substantive provisions left in the conference report provide that state employees shall receive a compensatory leave for work after normal working hours and administrative leave for specified extraordinary circumstances, such as jury duty, military duty or a death in the family. The bill provides that part-time state employees shall accrue sick leave and annual leave on a pro rata basis. The bill authorizes the State Personnel Board to develop organization and staffing plans at state agencies, and provides for compliance with said plans. The bill authorizes the State Personnel Board to set those salaries of appointed state officials whose salaries are not otherwise set by statute. Finally, the bill authorizes the State Personnel Board to exempt certain state employee positions from the provision that no employee may be compensated in excess of the salary

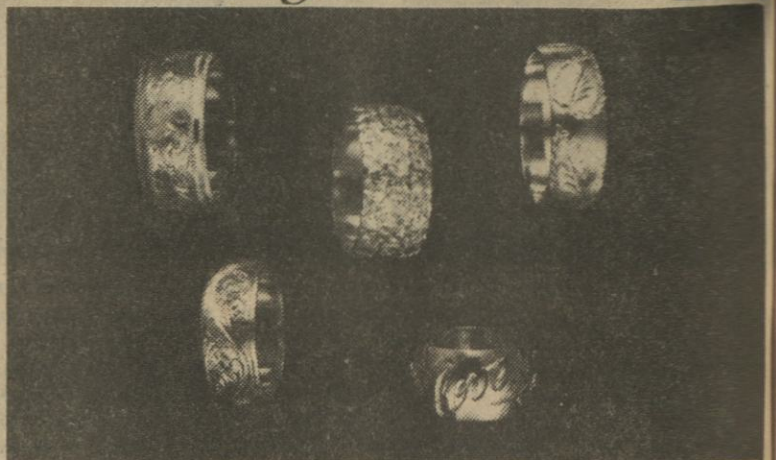

## Standing Conservation

Tishomingo County Water Conservation  
plan a program this year to recognize outstanding conservation work in the Tishomingo District. The District Commissioners presented two

awards this year, Outstanding District Cooperator and Cropland Conservationist.

The awards were given out at the May 14, SWCD Commissioner's meeting. Receiving the award of Outstanding District Cooperator for 1980 was Mr. Taron McKee, of Tishomingo.

Among Mr. McKee's many conservation accomplishments

ments were installing 4900' of terraces with 330 feet of these being parallel pipe outlet terraces on his cropland, properly managing approximately 60 acres of mixed bermuda, bahia, and kobe lespedeza pastures and approximately 15 acres of fescue and white clover pastures, and practicing wildlife conservation by management of his stock pond for game fish production and erecting Wood duck nesting boxes to increase waterfowl production on his farm.

The Cropland Conservationist of the Year Award went to Mr. Joe Bostick, of Golden. Mr. Bostick did an outstanding job of cropland conservation over the past year. He double crops a large part of his land with wheat followed by soybeans. Although this system is similar to what a lot of our county farmers practice, Mr. Bostick's operation is somewhat different. He planted approximately 150 acres of soybeans directly into the wheat stubble using a no-till planter. Even though last year was an extremely dry year, he feels his yields on some fields were comparable or better than conventionally planted soybeans with similar soil types.

Mr. Bostick not only applies the no-tillage conservation practice but he also applies other practices such as contour farming, chiseling or subsoiling, terraces, crop residue management, and grassed waterways to cropland that he owns and rents. Therefore, the award of Cropland Conservationist for 1980 was presented to Mr. Bostick for his outstanding job and example he has set in cropland conservation.
