

New varieties cannot be blamed for any low acidity problems, according to the ARS scientists. There has been little or no change in the mean pH of tomato varieties introduced in the

last two decades. What does influence the acidity (or pH) of tomatoes is the degree of ripeness. Only firm, ripe tomatoes should be canned. Never can overripe tomatoes because they lose acidity as they ripen. Overripe tomatoes for canning may allow growth of the deadly toxin-producing bacteria botulinum. clostridium Tomatoes with soft spots or

Unit pricing is an effective tool used to compare costs between sizes of a particular product and between brands. The unit price usually is marked on the grocery shelf where the food is displayed. It lets shoppers compare the cost of a given unit of food, for instance 5 cents per ounce for the 32-ounce package. The same product may sell for 3.5 cents per ounce for the 64-ounce package.

and light-colored The unit price allows a lick comparison of cost on the basis of comparable unit size. If you use unit pricing regularly, you will notice that sometimes smaller packages are a better buy per unit. This service is time-consuming for the grocer to keep the prices current, but if he knows this is important to customers, he will maintain it effectively. It's another way for shoppers to maintain tight control on the food budget.

County **Agents Notes** By: Percie B. Stricklen, **County Agent Soybeans After Wheat** Looks like our early

maturing wheat crop gives us a chance to plant soybeans behind wheat earlier than usual this year. We've received plenty of moisture in the past few days, and that should help our doublecropping chances even more. These two factors -- late

planting and not enough soil moisture - are the main reasons soybeans following wheat doesn't yield as much as normal planted beans. Weeds and poor stands don't help either.

Planting beans behind wheat requires special considerations. One if managing the wheat straw. Burning the straw gives the big advantage of higher yields, but planting in the wheat stubble helps conserve moisture and slows weed germination.

If no-till options are not available, you may have to rely on conventional seedbed preparation by disking and harrowing. This tends to dry the soil and delay planting, but it gives you a chance to incorporate herbicides for weed control. In fact, where

proach to double-cropping. Your approach depends on particular situation. your Generally, it's suggested to plant in narrow rows and use mid to late maturing varieties if you plant after June 15. Earlier planting or irrigation reduces the importance of row spacing.

#### **Turf Weed Control**

Chemicals take a lot of the drudgery out of weed control in the home lawn. For most emerged weeds in bermudagrass and zoysiagrass lawns, the herbicide MSMA is a good choice.

Rates for using MSMA vary, but you'll know you have the mixture about right when the turf just starts to yellow or a slight tip burn occurs on the grass. For those tough problem weeds like dallisgrass, bahiagrass and goosegrass, you'll need to repeat the treatment every 10 to 20 days.

It's safe to apply MSMA on newly established bermudagrass lawns after two or three mowings or when the new root systems are active and extensive.

# 11.2 For 1981

The 1981 cost-of-living increase in Social Security and supplemental security income (SSI) payments has been set at 11.2 percent. The increase will be reflected in the July checks to about 36 million people receiving Social Security checks and 4.1 million people receiving supplemental security income ((SSI) payments.

The increase was triggered by an 11.2 percent rise in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Social Security and SSI increase payments automatically when the CPI goes up 3 percent or more in a year. The calculation is based on the change in the CPI from the first quarter of 1980 through the first guarter of 1981. Some people get both Social Security and SSI checks if their Social Security benefit is low and they have little or no resources or other income. In these cases, the SSI check may be reduced to reflect the additional income

Security cost-of-living in-

crease. The effect is to avoid

a double cost-of-living in-

crease for people receiving both SSI and Social Security.
