Blue Bell is making some noticeable changes to the plant. A new "break room - lunch area" is to be constructed, which will provide the employees a more attractive, more relaxing location for the enjoyment of their free time

The offices at the front of the building will be going through some changes as well. Rooms in this area will be modified and rearranged to provide the most attractive

area possible for visitors to the facility.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Food-Drug Interactions

Combinations of certain foods and drugs can interact and produce harmful effects in the body. Drugs and medicines are chemical agents which affect body processes just as foods affect the body. When several drugs are taken simultaneously, they act upon each other and can be harmful. Since foods can act upon our bodies as drugs do, combinations of certain foods and drugs can produce harmful effects, also.

If you take any kind of drug regularly, including alcohol and over-the-counter preparations, you should be

aware of what you eat and when you eat. Certain foods can hinder the absorption of drugs into the bloodstream or interact with drugs to produce unexpected effects. Drugs also can interfere with the absorption of some nutrients in food.

Excessive use of certain drugs causes a decreased absorption of certain nutrients. This leads to low levels of essential nutrients in the body. Some drugs can cause a great loss of nutrients through urine.

Growing children, the elderly and pregnant women are most vulnerable to drug-caused nutritional problems. Other people at risk include those who have poor diets or chronic health problems or those who take drugs for a long time.

It's hard to know which foods and drugs act upon each other. No easy-to-read chart can tell you which foods to eat when taking prescribed or over-the-

counter drugs. Ask your doctor or pharmacist about prescriptions and other medicine. Tell them if you're on a special diet or any other drugs.

Aspirin should not be taken with acidic foods or beverages such as citrus fruits, colas, tomatoes, pickles and vinegar. The combined acidity of the aspirin and these foods can corrode the stomach lining and possibly lead to ulcers. Since aspirin may cause an upset stomach, take aspirin with food, milk or a full glass of water. Daily, excessive use of aspirin can lead to decreased blood levels of vitamin C.

Those on a low salt diet should be cautious of over-the-counter antacids. Many common antacids are high in sodium. One dose of any of the popular brands provides more sodium than the daily allowance for low salt diets.

To reduce the risk of any problems with drug and food interaction, eat foods that provide necessary nutrients. Get detailed instructions from your doctor and pharmacist about when and how to take drugs. Also, ask for advice on adjusting your eating habits while taking medicine.

Hot Chicken Salad

2 cups cut, cooked chicken*
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 cup sliced water chestnuts
1 cup cut pimiento
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup crumbled French fried onions
3/4 cup grated, processed American cheese
Mix chicken, pecans, chestnuts, pimiento, seasonings, lemon juice, and mayonnaise; pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Mix remaining ingredients and sprinkle over top. Bake, uncovered, in a preheated 350° F. oven about 1/2 hour. Yield: 6 servings. *Good for leftover turkey and ham also.

Stop Soybean Weeds

Your key to controlling soybean weeds is timeliness and follow-up. The most critical period of the season is four to six weeks after emergence, when weeds are easier to control and haven't

started to reduce yields.

Remove the first flush of weeds in this period and follow with additional treatments for weeds that escape or emerge later. Pick herbicides that fit your method of application, kind and size of weed, and size of soybean plants.

You don't want to overlook cultivation as an effective, economical way to remove weeds outside the drill area. Use herbicides to get weeds the cultivator can't reach. Many times, combining flat cultivation with directed sprays on a band is the least expensive and most effective way to stop weeds.

Cheese consumption has increased greatly in the past 10 years. Extension Food Technologist, Dr. Charles Shannon says Americans eat an average of more than 18 pounds of cheese per person every year. The most popular cheese is cheddar. Many people wonder why cheese is expensive, even though its cost has not increased as much as other consumer items. Dr. Shannon says the cost can be blamed on the fact that it takes 10 pounds of milk to make one pound of cheese.

Don't let your garden droop this summer. Extension Horticulturist, Dr. Milo Burnham says water is necessary to keep your garden healthy and

productive. Otherwise, plants may wilt and die. A growing garden needs an inch of water every week. Gardens in sandy soils may need as much as two inches of water every week in mid-summer. Each watering should wet the top three to five inches of soil. Frequent, light waterings cause shallow rooting, make plants more susceptible to drought and make them more easily damaged by wind.

Report Crop Acres By July 15

Farmers who are producing a program or marketing quota crop (cotton, corn, grain sorghum or peanuts) are urged to come by the county office and report the planted acres now. A timely and ac-

The term 20/20 refers to the size letters which the average eye can read twenty feet away. In most standard vision testing, you read the familiar Snellen eye chart at a distance of 20 feet. The upper number of the fraction expresses the size letters you were able to read at this distance. Thus 20/70 vision means that you are able to read at 20 feet the line which a normal eye can read at 70 feet.

Often, this test is given by having you look into a machine which creates the same conditions optically. The results are roughly similar to those of the Snellen chart.

However, parents should not be lulled into the impression that their child has perfect vision because he scores a 20/20 on this vision test. All it measures is how well or poorly the child sees at THAT distance. And that's all. Problems with near vision, eye coordination and focusing ability are among the many problems not discovered in this test. Only a professional eye examination will protect the priceless miracle of sight.

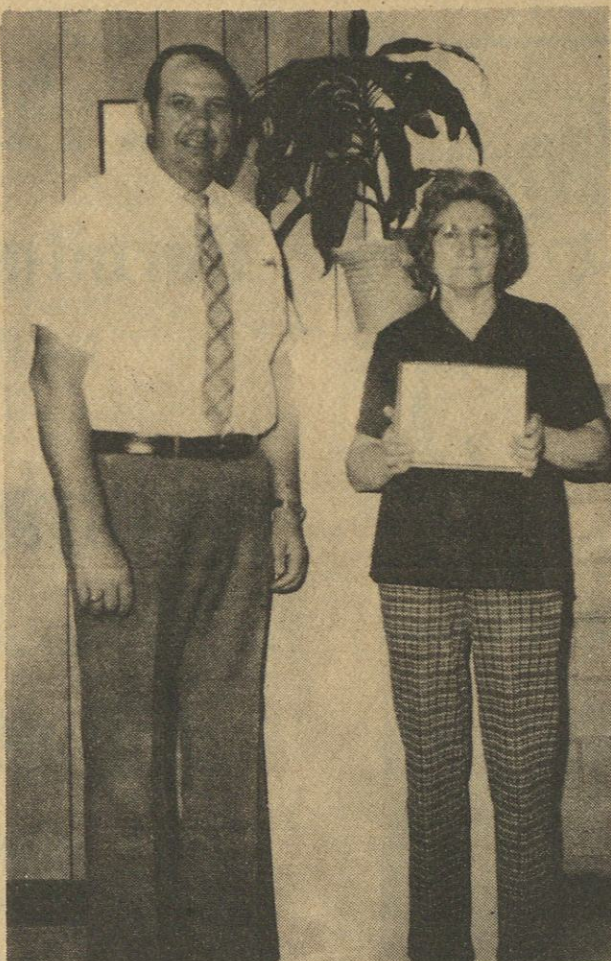
Film To Be Shown At Iuka Library

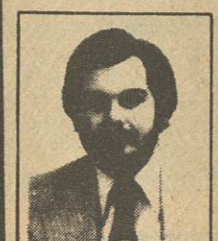

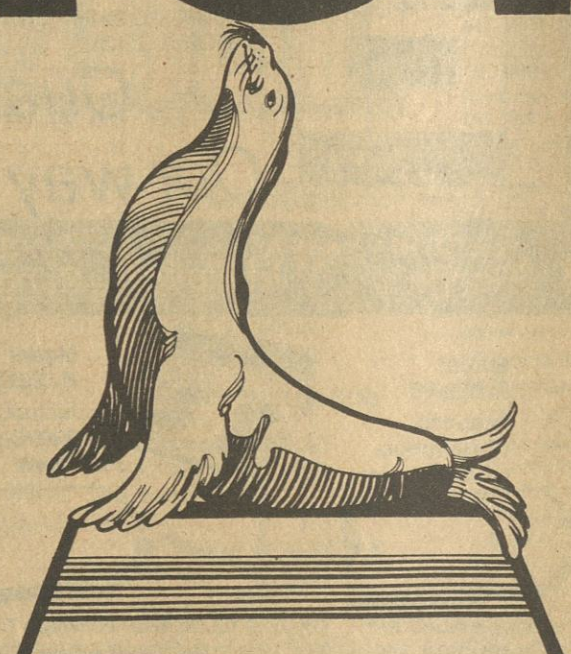
