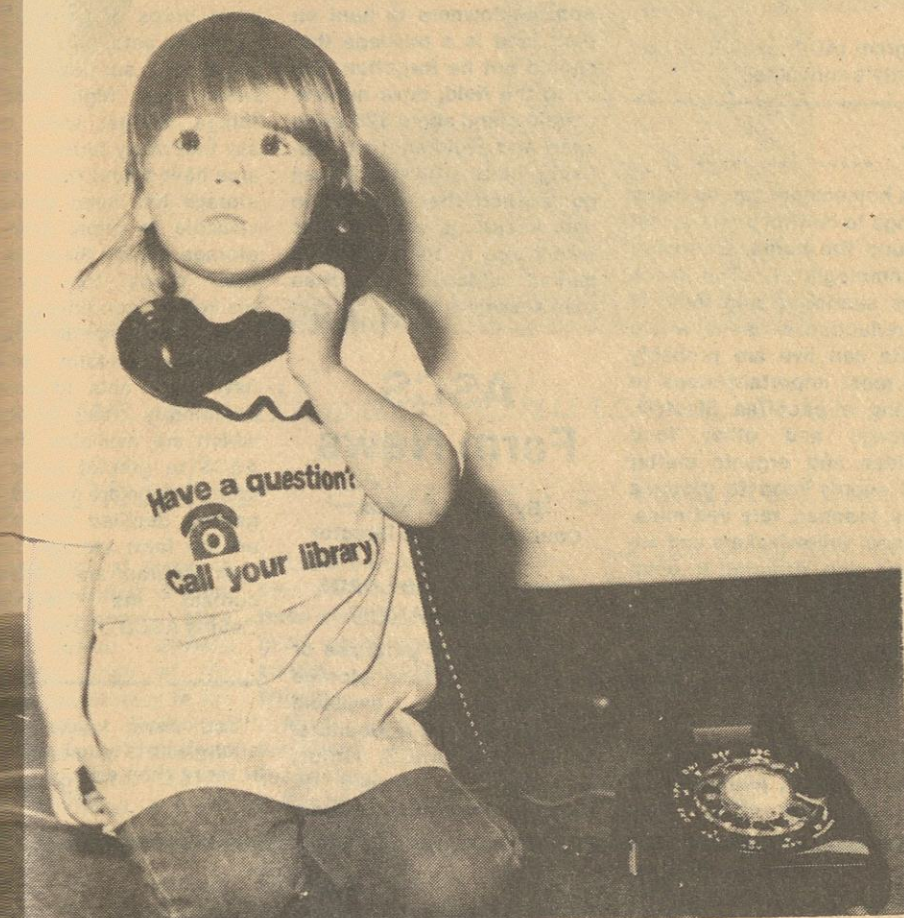

### Corps Makes Firewood Available

The Corps of Engineers is making timber, surplus to the clearing of Bay Springs Lake, available, free to the public for firewood. In a designated area, clearing contractors have removed all merchantable timber and have cut the remaining trees, leaving them on the ground for anyone who wishes to harvest their winter fuel.

The area is located approximately 3 miles south of Jackson's Camp Church and is identified by "Firewood Area" signs. It should be kept in mind that this is the only area where firewood may be cut at this time, to avoid creating safety hazards for the clearing contractors. The only conditions placed on this firewood is that all wood may be removed in firewood lengths only, and all must be harvested from trees felled by the clearing contractor in this area. The harvest of standing timber is prohibited.

## Iuka Doctor Apparent Low Bidder On Postal Facilities

Dr. Ben E. Kitchens, of Iuka, was the apparent low bidder for the proposed construction of a new and larger post office facility for the City of Iuka.

According to Charles E. Smith, Manager of the Real Estate Branch of the Postal Service's Regional Field Office in Memphis, Tenn., bids were opened at 2:30 p.m. August 31, 1981, with Dr. Kitchens submitting the lowest bid of \$37,950.

Iuka Postmaster Ray Curtis told The News that the \$37,950 will be a yearly rent paid by the Postal Service for the land and postal facilities,

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Types Of Wallcoverings

Time was, you papered the walls or glued on fabric if you dared.

Fabric, used on walls for centuries to give warmth, texture and richness, is no longer a stretch and strain problem in hanging. It is

laminated to paper backing, sold in rolls, and hung much like wallpaper. There is burlap in whites, off-whites and colors; linen in solid colors, and handprinted wall and coordinated drapery fabrics.

Vinyl-coated fabric and vinyl-coated paper give moisture resistance and are scrubbable as well as handsome. They come in traditional and contemporary patterns, and textural effects. Hanging instructions accompany the rolls. Follow instructions, particularly as to kind of paste or adhesive to use. The very latest is vinyl on a

nylon-dacron cloth that is pre-pasted. With it you receive a special water box to use in wetting the wallcloth to hang. A feature of the fabric-backed vinyl is ease of removal.

Grasscloth, a luxury covering, has been available for years. Now it can be sprayed with vinyl and made scrubbable.

Specialty coverings include screen-printed foil that is laminated to paper. It gives effects such as ancient tapestries and 18th century scenes. Although it looks fragile, it is waterproof and washable, because the foil is vinyl-coated.

There is a woven wallcovering that is actual fiber woven into cloth, laminated to ordinary wallpaper and coated with clear vinyl to make it cleanable. Its texture is extremely pleasant and it can hide minor cracks and defects of old walls.

There are many types of wallpaper, including washable, scrubbable, pre-pasted and even a release paper. This is a kind that when used with a special adhesive can be wet, removed, rolled up when dry and saved!

Paper hangers are familiar with lining paper. It is white, porous stock and is hung just as ordinary paper. It is pounded on the wall with a stiff nylon brush and left to dry overnight. Many professionals use it under any good wallcovering.

### Fig Preserves

7 cups sugar  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1-1/2 quarts hot water  
2 quarts peeled, firm-ripe figs (about 4-1/2 pounds)  
2 lemons, thinly sliced

Add sugar and lemon juice to hot water. Cook until sugar dissolves. Add figs and cook rapidly 10 minutes. Stir occasionally to prevent sticking. Add sliced lemon and continue cooking rapidly until figs are clear, about 10 to 15 minutes. (If syrup becomes too thick before figs become clear, add boiling water, 1/4 cup at a time.) Cover and let stand 12 to 24 hours in a cool place.

Pack into hot jars, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Adjust caps. Process half-pints and pints 30 minutes in hot-water bath. Yield: 10 half-pints.

NOTE: Although the product will not be as high in quality figs may be preserved without peeling. If unpeeled, figs should be covered with water and boiled 15 to 20

minutes and drained before adding to syrup.

## ACP Helps Everyone

One of our most vital resources is agricultural land. Our Nation is blessed with an abundant supply of food and fiber because it has a temperate climate, a vast acreage of rich soil, and the management capability on its farms to make the most of this combination. Abundant farm production stimulates other sectors of the economy—trade, transportation, and industry. It means jobs on farms and ranches, and cities. This is why we have a stake in conserving the productivity of the land.

Properly cared for and conserved, our agricultural resources can supply food, clothing, housing, and recreation over and over again. Without conservation, lakes and streams will fill up with sediment, chemicals and waste.

The Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee will assist farmers in solving some of these critical problems on the farm, such as soil loss and streams filled with sediment and chemicals. Some of the practices offered in the county are: SL-1 Permanent Vegetative Cover Establishment; SL-2 Permanent Vegetative Cover Improvement; SL-4 Terrace Systems; WC-1 Water Impoundment Reservoirs (Pon-

ds); WP-3 Sod Waterways; and WP-4 Animal Waste Control Facilities (Lagoons). Tulon B. McKee, of the Midway Community, stated, "with the cost-share assistance to construct terrace systems, we have just about eliminated the topsoil problem in one field on our farm." Remember, cost-sharing assistance varies from 60 percent to 75 percent of the cost. ## County Agent's Notes

If you're planning to soil test your fields this fall, decide now where to take the samples. Dr. Freddie Rasberry, leader of the Extension Soil Testing Department, says it is easy to see the different appearances of the crop in the field this time of year. Divide your field into sampling areas, taking a sample from an area where the crop looks good, and another sample from an area where the crop looks bad. Usually differences in the crop in various areas of the field are caused by a lack of some nutrient in the soil. Rasberry says by looking over your fields now, you can see where the crop looks poor and can mark it so you will be sure to sample that area after the crop is out of the field this

problems in corn and sorghum fields. Extension Agronomist, Dr. Charles Baskin, says late summer and early fall applications of herbicides can help control these grasses in fields where the crop is harvested for silage or where corn is harvested in July or August for grain.

Baskin says some disking may be necessary to stimulate growth before applying herbicides. In most cases, spot sprays can be relatively inexpensive.

The 1981 Mississippi dove hunting season is just around the corner, with opening day Saturday, September 5th, starting at daylight. Extension Wildlife Specialist, Dr. Skip Shelton, reminds dove hunters that common courtesy often prevents accidents in the field. First, permission from landowners to hunt on their land is a privilege that should not be forgotten. Once in the field, dove hunters should stand about 125 yards apart and avoid shots at low-flying birds. Always unload guns when they are not in use. Accidents with firearms take place in the vicinity of parked vehicles more often than anywhere else.

### Farm Storage Loans Through ASCS

Loans for the purchase or erection of on-farm storage facilities are available through the local Agricultural Stabilization (ASCS) Office, according to Howard R. Bridges, Tishomingo County

ASC Committee. He said the farm facility loan authorizes a maximum of 75 percent of the equipment and structure to exceed \$50,000. The loan must be repaid over a 5-year period. ### Farmers Advised To Report Crop Disasters Promptly

Farmers who suffer crop losses or reduced yields due to drought or other natural disasters should file a report with the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. Total or partial losses of cotton, rice or feed grain crops may result in the producer's eligibility for low yield payments under the current farm program. Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said producers should notify their ASCS Office as soon as the disaster condition

becomes apparent. Chairman Bridges went on to say that prompt reporting to the County ASCS Office by the producer provides opportunity for adequate appraisal of the crop loss. This is particularly important in cases where drought strikes corn or sorghum which planted for grain is to be salvaged as silage, grazing, hay or green chop. Appraisal of losses after harvest may be impossible and could result in loss of payment. Bridges said that producers of cotton and feed grains who harvest these crops and find that yields are below normal for the farm (due to natural disaster) should notify their ASCS Office not later than 15 days after harvest. The crop residue should be left until necessary appraisal has been made. The chairman emphasized that it is wise for the producer to notify the county office prior to harvest in cases where a low yield is anticipated. Producers who have

## Man Asks And God Answers Questions

### What Proves Its Inspiration?

2 Tim. 3:16 - All Scripture is given by inspiration of God.

(1) Its miracles: John 20:30, 31 - And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ. Heb. 2:4 - God also bearing them witness, both with signs and wonders, and with divers miracles, and gifts of the Holy Spirit.

(2) Its fulfilled prophecies: Is. 41:21, 23 - Produce your cause, saith the Lord; bring forth your strong reasons, saith the King of Jacob. Shew the things that are to come hereafter, that we may know that ye are gods. Is. 45:11, 21 - Thus saith the Lord... Ask Me of things to come... Who hath declared this from ancient time? Who hath told it from that time? Have not I the Lord? Is. 46:9, 10 - I am God, and there is none like Me, declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times the things that are not yet done, saying, My counsel shall stand, and I will do all My pleasure. Acts 28:23 - And when they had appointed him a day, there came many to him into his lodging, to whom he expounded and testified the Kingdom of God, persuading them concerning Jesus, both out of the Law of Moses and out of the Prophets, from morning till evening. 2 Pet. 1:19 - We have also a more sure word of prophecy, whereunto ye do well that ye take heed, as unto a light that shineth in a dark place, until the day dawn, and the day star arise in your hearts.

(4) Its reasonableness: Is. 1:18 - Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord. Acts 17:2 - And Paul, as his manner was, went in unto them, and three sabbath days reasoned with them out of the Scriptures. 1 Pet. 3:15 - Be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you.

(5) Lacks and characters of its writers: Acts 4:13 - When they... perceived that they were unlearned and ignorant men, they marvelled; and they took knowledge of them, that they had been with Jesus. 2 Pet. 1:21 - Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Spirit.

(6) Its superhuman knowledge: 1 Cor. 2:7, 8, 10 - We speak the wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom... which none of the princes of this world knew: but God hath revealed them unto us by His Spirit: for the Spirit searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God. Ps. 119:98-100 - Thou through Thy commandments hast made me wiser than mine enemies: I have more understanding than all my teachers: for Thy testimonies are my meditation. I understand more than the ancients, because I keep Thy precepts. Mark 12:24 - And Jesus answering said unto them, Do ye not therefore err, because ye know not the Scriptures, neither the power of God?

(7) Its indestructibility: Is. 40:8 - The grass withereth, the flower fadeth: but the Word of our God shall stand forever. Matt. 24:35 - Heaven and earth shall pass away, but My words shall not pass away. 1 Pet. 1:25 - The Word of the Lord endureth forever. LHM Chester Springs, Pa. 19425

## Who Do You Worship?

"He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth: he is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so he openeth not his mouth," (Isaiah 53:7).

One could read the accounts of Jesus' life in the Gospels and see how mean, vile, and cold the people were who killed him. One could easily become emotional as he reads of how Jesus was scourged, beaten, and mocked; how that Jesus was made to carry his own cross yet was so weak that he fell beneath the load. Tears flow freely when you read of how he was nailed, without

making a sound, with nails, equivalent to railroad spikes, through his hands and feet, then to see him being lifted up and dropped into the hole where the cross was to stand. Flesh tearing, muscle fiber ripping, nerves being severed, yet not a sound did he utter. Imagine if you can the pain, the agony, and the humility Jesus must have gone through. In order to breathe, Jesus had to push up on the nails in his feet, tearing the flesh, and at the same time pulling with his hands, thus tearing even more flesh. What kind of picture does this leave in your mind? Now picture this same bloody, gross, sickening scene and listen closely as Jesus says, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do," (Luke 23:34).

This same Jesus was buried in a borrowed tomb, then arose three days later. Now He lives with God, and is preparing a home for all those who love him and are keeping his commandments. Who do you want to worship, things of this world, or this man who SUFFERED AND DIED FOR YOU.
