Shutdown Of Plant Not Projected By TVA

Tennessee Valley Authority officials, moving to dispel rumors of a construction shutdown at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant near Iuka, said Thursday no decision is pending to stop work on the facility, which has become vital to the economy of Northeast Mississippi.

However, the layoff of workers continues at the Yellow Creek project as does a scaling down of the construction in line with TVA's earlier ordered work slowdown.

The work force at the Yellow Creek Plant has dropped to 2,799 as of September

17. Charles Howell, district administrator for the TVA in Mississippi, said the layoff of workers would continue until the numbers reach 2,100 in January.

Union leaders claim the layoffs have been speeded up and could eventually lead to a shutdown of the \$2.9 billion construction project located about 10 miles north of here.

George Kimmons, manager of the TVA's Office of Engineering and Design in Knoxville, Tenn., said no decision has been made to defer construction at Yellow Creek.

"The rumors are flying down there, but I can assure you we have not made a

decision. The layoffs are simply stretching out our schedule," Kimmons said.

The TVA announced this week they were working on an agreement with a Houston, Texas, utility to buy excess power produced by Yellow Creek. Sources have indicated the agreement with Houston Light and Power would be crucial to the continuation of Yellow Creek.

The TVA announced in August a slowdown in construction of Unit One at the Tishomingo County project, setting into motion a six-step layoff of workers - primarily those in hourly wage jobs - that would reduce the number of employees from 3,539

to 2,100 by January 1, 1982.

The slowdown also meant a two-and-a-half year delay in bringing the Unit One nuclear reactor on line. It originally would have started up in April 1988, but the delay pushed that back to October 1990. The Yellow Creek's second unit nuclear reactor was delayed indefinitely in 1979 after the TVA found a smaller demand for electricity in the Mississippi region than anticipated.

The delay boosted the cost of the project from \$2.3 billion to \$2.9 billion.

The TVA has spent or obligated more than \$1.3 billion to Yellow Creek. The layoff of the anticipated 1,400 workers would reduce the economic impact of the plant construction by \$57.1 million a year.

In addition, John Hendrix, Yellow Creek project coordinator, confirmed the TVA has re-negotiated several contracts for some work on the cooling tower, containment room, and turbines.

"These were to stretch out the construction to meet the two-and-a-half year slowdown and to defer some expenditures that were not necessary at this time - those things that are not critical to the project right now," he said.

Hendrix said the action on the contractors were simply made to reduce costs that would have been incurred unnecessarily. "This does not indicate that any new decisions are being made about Yellow Creek," he said.

The layoffs have been a stunning blow to one of the highest unemployment areas of Mississippi and Tennessee. The jobless rates in the counties around the Yellow Creek project - Alcorn, Tishomingo and Prentiss in Mississippi and Hardin in Tennessee - have averaged between 10 percent and 14 percent over the past two years.

Grand Jury Report Given

Came now the Grand Jury of Tishomingo County for the September, 1981, Term and submits this its Final Report.

The Grand Jury has been in active session for two days, has heard testimony from 16 witnesses, and is returning herewith into Open Court 11 True Bills.

We have also examined the public offices and buildings of the County, and submit herewith our findings and recommendations:

TISH. CO. COURTHOUSE

We found the Courthouse and its offices neat and clean and generally in very good condition. We suggest however, that the fire extinguishers in the building be

regularly inspected and placed on wall brackets so that they might be accessible when needed. We noted also that the carpet in the Courtroom at the threshold of the doorway nearest to the Circuit Clerk's Office needs replacing.

TISH. CO. JAIL

We found the Jail also to be generally clean, neat and in good repair, although adequate office and storage space is lacking. We recommend that the fire extinguishers in this building also be made more accessible and be regularly inspected. We suggest that the mattress pads in the cell area be cleaned or replaced as needed and that an exposed electrical wire in this area be repaired.

TISH. CO. HOME

We found the Tishomingo County Home to be generally

in a bad state of repair. The main building needs painting both inside and out. The windows are broken and screens need replacing. Plumbing repairs are badly needed especially in the bathrooms. The water fountains need cleaning and one is totally inoperable. The bathrooms are dirty and the lights in the showers are not working. We recommend that the Board of Supervisors undertake whatever steps are necessary to restore the County Home to a condition suitable for its patients.

Now having submitted this our Final Report we hereby asked to be adjourned subject to recall before the next regular term of this Court.

Construction To Begin On New Iuka Post Office

Iuka Post Office tentatively set construction date to begin building the new post office in October.

The postmaster noted the new facility will provide 4,440 square feet of working area for the office's 12 workers. The post office used now has only 2,802 square feet available for work area.

Curtis indicated work should conclude around March or May of 1982. The project has been designated about 240 work days.

The 32,978-square-foot,

brick structure will be located on the southwest corner of Eastport and Wilmoth Street. The existing post office is 20 years old.

Guidelines for the new post office called for financing by private funds. In addition bidders were required to furnish leased space and a basic lease term of 15 years, with separate and consecutive renewal options for five years.

Iuka Postmaster Ray Curtis said the Postal Service's regional field office in Memphis, Tenn., recently confirmed that Dr. Ben E. Kitchens was low bidder for the project, bidding \$37,950 for the facility, lease per year.

Tips On Appliances

The cost of household appliances totals several thousand dollars when you include the range, refrigerator, washer, toaster, vacuum, electric skillet, blender, mixer, dishwasher, dryer, food processor and iron. These appliances may be the

next largest investment a family makes after a house and car.

The total cost of these appliances is increasing with the purchase price rising and cost of energy, too. The family concerned with stretching the paycheck will want to look carefully at any new purchases.

Before deciding to buy a new appliance that is not essential, ask if this money would be spent better for something more critical such as: to pay bills, a visit to the dentist, repairs on the house or new tires.

with the Joneses! Buy because it really is necessary or important to your family.

The microwave oven is an example of a good appliance that is not used fully in many homes. It is used only to thaw and reheat a few items. It's an expensive appliance and takes up a lot of counter space to be put to such limited use. Only you and your family know if its cost can be justified for infrequent use.

Consider your own needs, wants and resources before deciding to buy a new appliance. Collect information on any appliance you are considering. Ask questions of friends and sales people. Call your Extension home economist for information.

Guides on the appliances can help you make a wise decision. Learn to interpret appliance labels and other point-of-purchase information. The nameplate attached to the appliance also gives information about its operation.

Energy guide labels in yellow and black provide shoppers with energy information.

Be a careful shopper! Don't buy the first thing you see; shop the field. Get some ideas of models and features available.

Features do increase the purchase price. Some features are valuable; others are largely for show. You may find certain features (like certain appliances) worth the price; your neighbor may not.

As appliances become more automatic, service is more important. Check on the availability of service and the reputation of the service department. Read the warranty carefully before you buy. Understand the terms. It's your protection against poor workmanship and materials.

Any appliance can be a valuable servant and worth the cost if it meets your needs and wants.

Chicken-Asparagus Casserole

5 tbsp. all purpose flour
1 tsp. salt, divided
¼ tsp. onion salt
¼ cup melted butter or margarine
2-½ cups milk
1
1-½ cups uncooked instant rice
1-½ cups chicken or turkey broth
1 (14-½ oz.) can cut asparagus spears, drained
2 cups cubed chicken or turkey
½ cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Stir flour, ½ teaspoon salt, and onion salt into butter in a heavy saucepan; cook over low heat until bubbly, stirring constantly. Gradually add milk; cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Set aside.

Place rice in bottom of a 2-quart casserole. Pour broth over rice and sprinkle with ½ teaspoon salt. Layer asparagus and chicken over rice; pour sauce over chicken. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 375° for 20 minutes or until bubbly. Yield: 8 to 10 servings.

County Agent's Notes

Start Wheat Right

Interest in planting wheat is high again this fall. No doubt the record crop last year still lingers in the minds of a lot of farmers, but we can't expect those kinds of yields every year. But we can make good yields regularly if we use good management.

Start by selecting the right varieties. Variety trial results

are available at the County Extension Office. We have some good varieties available, but we need to consider several factors in making a choice, including disease resistance.

Diseases weren't a major problem in our wheat last year, but we certainly don't want to ignore disease resistance. In a year when rust problems are severe, some varieties have better resistance. Septoria also can be a serious disease problem.

All varieties may need a fungicide to produce highest yields. Fungicides to control seed rots and seedling diseases increase seedling emergence and survival rates by 10 to 15 percent. Instead of treating the seed, some farmers simply increase the planting rate. This may or may not make up for seedling disease losses. The best way to solve this problem is to treat the seed.

Arrange for your seed beforehand so you'll be sure to get the variety you want. But don't plant too early. Wait until October, preferably after October 15 in most of the state, to plant to reduce fall insect problems.

MANAGE FORAGES

Producing good forage crops is expensive, and it takes good management to produce a profit. That's why you need to consider soil testing, lime and fertilizer, legumes and proper grazing in your forage program.

Without a soil test, you have no way to know the lime and fertilizer needs of your soil. And with the high cost of both, this free service can save you money. Our office has the materials you need.

Most forages grow best at a soil pH of about 6.5. You may need to add lime to reach this pH level. Some forages will grow at a lower pH, but legumes like a higher pH.

Using 300 pounds of 13-13-

13 is not a sure-all in producing forages. In fact, the newer 0-17-34 and 5-15-30 ratios often fit soil test needs better. And, you can plant legumes to furnish additional nitrogen. Some legumes produce 100 to 200 pounds of nitrogen per acre annually, which is used by the legumes and grasses growing with the legumes.

Poor grazing techniques can offset previous management practices. Overgrazing often injures forage, but too little grazing wastes forage and reduces the quality of grazing. Good grazing practices help provide young, tender, regrowing plants, improve forage quality and help animal performances.

Tentative Wheat Program Provisions For 1982

The Secretary has outlined details of the 1982 wheat reduced acreage program, pending enactment of the new farm legislation. Participation will be voluntary. However, program benefits will be tied to participation. Listed below are a few of the proposed details: (A) To be eligible for wheat program benefits, such as target price protection, price support loans, and the farmer-owned reserve program, producers must meet the requirements for participation in the 1982 wheat program; (B) Individual farm wheat acreage bases will be established using the 1981 wheat acreage planted for harvest; (C) To participate,

producers shall reduce the farm's 1982 wheat acreage planted for harvest by at least 15 percent from the farm's established wheat acreage base; (D) An acreage of eligible cropland equal to 17.65 percent of the 1982 wheat acreage planted for harvest must be devoted to a conservation use sufficient to protect the acreage from wind and water erosion; (E) The acreage devoted to a conservation use may not be mechanically harvested; (F) Offsetting compliance will apply; (G) Cross compliance will not apply; and (H) No payment will be made to you for the acreage devoted to a conservation use. We will inform you of the wheat program details as they are received by our office. If you have any questions, please contact the county office at 423-5036.

Farmers Urged To Check Grain For Insects

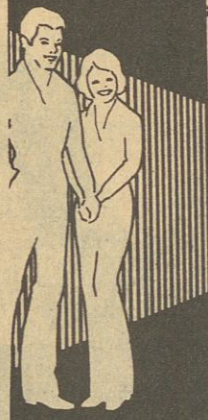

between 9 and 19, both rural and urban," said Dr. Charles Sappington, state leader, 4-H youth development, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. "The real mission of 4-H is to help young people develop into responsible, productive citizens. This year's theme is pathways to the future."

4-H is a partnership involving youth, volunteer leaders, state landgrant universities, federal-state-local governments and the private sector, he added.

More than 6,640 volunteers helped with the Mississippi 4-H program last year. Nationwide, for every hour spent by a professional Extension worker on 4-H, volunteers spent 12 hours. This amounts to 25 eight-hour days a year for each volunteer. The national estimate of total volunteer time devoted to 4-H last year was more than \$600 million.

More than 500 projects are available to Mississippi 4-H'ers. Many choose more than one project, Dr. Sappington said. Project areas include animals, conservation, engineering, home economics, personal development, plants and others. Some of the most popular projects are beef, horse, garden, forestry, wildlife conservation, citizenship, leadership, health, safety, clothing, foods and nutrition and photography. All are designed for a learning-by-doing approach.

Awards and incentives encourage 4-H participation and recognize outstanding achievement. Local, state and national businesses, associations, and individuals provide the funds for these incentives. Most awards are given through various competitive events designed to help 4-H'ers exhibit skills learned in project work. 4-H'ers are encouraged to maintain a record of their learning and achievement.

"These records give the young people a feeling of self worth and provide a method for recognizing accomplishments in 4-H," he adds.

4-H began in Mississippi in 1907, but the program has adapted over the years to meet the needs and interests of young Mississippians.

U.S. Postal Service Marks 85 Years Of Rural Free Delivery

On October 1, Rural Free Delivery will celebrate 85 years of service to Rural America. The first rural route was established on this date in 1896 in Charles Town, West Virginia.

Rural Free Delivery is unique because the rural carrier operates a "Post Office on Wheels" - rendering all those services provided at the local post office.

Specifically, rural carriers sell money orders and stamps. They register and insure certified mail. Also, they pick up and deliver letters and parcels.

In addition to providing a variety of postal services, many rural carriers make the effort and take the responsibility to help out their patrons in a personal way.

A genuine love for people and a desire to meet their needs has endeavored the spirit of Rural Free Delivery.

Rural Free Delivery con-

tinues to save time for rural residents, as they do not have to make the trip to town to pick up their mail. The elderly, particularly those who are handicapped, rely on the timely delivery of their Social Security checks and other business mail. Patrons of all walks of life enjoy the home delivery of the weekly and daily newspaper.

The U.S. Postal Service has five rural routes operating out of the Iuka Post Office. The local rural carriers travel a total of 381 miles daily and serve 2342 boxes, 2500 families and approximately 8000 individuals. These rural carriers are: Route 1, Nick Starkey; Route 2, Gene Wadley; Route 3, Gene Haines; Route 4, L.T. Butler; Route 5, Ward Moser. The substitute carriers are Mac Milligan, Carolyn Brown and Austin Curtis.

They made three first downs as the first quarter ended, tied 6-6.

The Bulldogs gained for two more first downs as the fourth quarter opened, and with 10:37 left in the second quarter, Bulldog Frazier ran from the 10 yard line for the touchdown. The Bulldogs ran a fake kick and holder Lewis Cass handed to Gary "Hooky" Allen who pitched to the goal line where both Frazier and Powell caught the ball to make the two point conversion good, and the score Bulldogs 14-6.

The Eagles again threatened with three first downs but on a pass completion, the Eagles fumbled, the Bulldogs got a hand on the ball before it went out of bounds, and Tishomingo was again in possession on their own 20 yard line.

The Bulldogs made good yardage on the combined efforts of running backs Frazier, Marty Thomas, Jeff Cox, and Eric Powell, and quarterback Allen but as they got within striking distance again, a fourth down pass was incomplete and the Eagles took over again on their 30.

The teams traded penalties before the Eagles got into gear. However, this series continued to be plagued by penalties and down near their goal on fourth and 13, the Eagles were once again tagged with an intercepted pass as Powell gathered in the aerial on the 5 yard line and ran back 95 yards for another Bulldog touchdown with just 0:20 left in the first half. Time ran out on the Eagles as the half time horn sounded and Tishomingo went to the dressing rooms ahead 20-6.

The second half opened with a determined Eagle team in possession. They took six first downs to claim 68 yards, and almost 6 minutes, but the goal was finally theirs on a fourth and 2nd outside dash. Their luck didn't hold for the two point conversion pass attempt and with 6:04 left, the Bulldog margin was reduced to 20-12.

The Bulldogs continued to fight for goal with four first downs, and the Eagles, resisted, to regain possession. Formal dedication ceremonies for the Northeast Junior College Tiger Stadium will be conducted Saturday, at 7 p.m., prior to the Northeast-Hinds kick off at 7:30 p.m., President Harold T. White announced today.

Replacing a wooden structure, the new facility, made of rust-free aluminum with galvanized steel understructure, features a closed deck

grandstand. Seating capacity for the maintenance-free facility is 5200, an increase of 2200 over the former stadium.

In addition to the increased seating, the new stadium stretches 26 rows high as opposed to the old stadium's nine rows, giving a much better viewing position for Tiger fans. Atop the home side is a 72 foot long press box. The stadium is designed to load from the rear.

Another plus noted by President White is that "the stands may be added to in the future with no trouble as far as design and looks."

"This is something we have needed to do for some time," he said. "Our facilities were not at all satisfactory."

Cost of the completed renovation is near one-half million dollars.

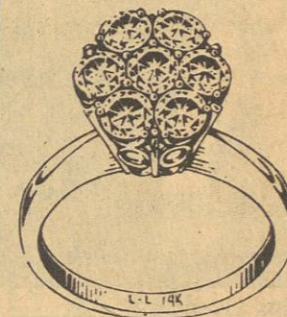

Tishomingo County Hospital Expands Coronary Care Unit

In the spring of 1978, the hospital realized the need to expand and improve the services of the Coronary Care Unit. The present unit was opened for patients on May 3, 1978. The old unit provided a bed patient monitoring system with the monitor located at the nurses desk. In renovation, the unit was expanded to a four bed CCU and two bed ICU. All patients would be monitored to a central location with a special nursing staff on duty 24 hours a day.

The monitoring equipment is upgraded with the latest equipment on the market. Four Care 4000 telemetry monitoring units are purchased from CMP Corp. in Huntsville, Ala. This equipment was developed through the astronaut program to monitor the men in space.

Additional emergency equipment was placed in this area to facilitate the delivery of bedside patient care to the CCU-ICU. The CCU-ICU is staffed with a 24 hour nursing staff. These nurses have been specially trained to work with CCU patients with classes on reading EKG strips, management of cardiac rhythms, interpreting blood gases, listening and interpreting heart and lung sounds and delivery of critical nursing care.

The staff keeps abreast of new nursing management in this area through continuing education classes periodically during the year, outside seminars, subscribing in critical care magazine, and other nursing journals and books published during the year.

Members of the hospital medical staff have been teaching the nurses day to day new techniques and

helping them to expand and advance their skills in caring for these patients. The E.R. physicians have been excellent in teaching the nursing staff as the occasions arise.

Dr. Kelly Segars, Medical Director of the CCU, worked hard for the expansion of the CCU facility. He has taken special courses in advanced coronary care and is always quick to share his knowledge with the staff. He has recently done a study on the coronary care units success in the first two years it was opened. His study revealed a decrease in the death rate from 35% to 6% after the new unit was opened. This was attributed partly to the constant monitoring and quick response of the nurses to patients developing life threatening heart arrhythmias. Research has proven that a patient can die within minutes from undetected and untreated cardiac arrhythmias.

This fall, the Tishomingo County Hospital Board of Trustees agreed to purchase equipment and expanded CCU monitoring equipment from a six bed unit to 12 monitored beds. This is possible with the purchase of six telemetry and/or hardwire units and two telemetry "only" units. The telemetry unit enables a patient's heart to be monitored and constantly observed at the CCU nurses station while he remains in his room on the nursing unit.

This is one of the ways your hospital is growing to deliver better patient care for your community. On September 23rd, Harold T. Lomenick was our 1000th CCU patient. So, you can see, we have been busy.

producing trees and water. While the Delta fox squirrel is found mainly in that section of the state, the hill fox squirrel can be found over the remainder of Mississippi. Largest of the tree squirrels, hill fox squirrels favor upland hardwoods and mixed pine areas.

Gray squirrels, the state's most numerous variety, can be found usually in abundance in moist bottom lands and along sloughs supporting large stands of mast producing trees. They can also be found in hill areas near pines.

Rabbit hunters across the state will take to the woods on October 3. The season will extend through February 28. Easily one of Mississippi's most plentiful game animals, cottontails and swamp rabbits are favorites with many state shooters. The daily bag limit is eight, and the possession limit is 16.

The DWC suggests that hunters can usually find rabbits in good cover close to thick areas where the animal can elude its natural predators. Waist-high weed patches, briar thickets and heavy undergrowth are ideal spots.

Authorities at the DWC say that the life expectancy of rabbits is such that only about 25 percent of a population at any one time survives more than 12 months. The annual mortality is about 75 percent.

Hunters should know that the shooting hours for deer, squirrels, and rabbits is one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset. Hunters should have a valid state hunting license on their person before going to the woods.

FmHA Added \$44 Million To Miss. Rural Resources

District 6 received 44 million during the first 10 months of Fiscal Year 1981 in loans and grants by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) supporting farms, home improvement and community development in rural areas, FmHA District Director reports.

"The Agency's farm loan services, which supplement private credit available in rural areas, added \$29.5 million to District 6 resources for operation of farms during a year of emergency and commercial credit shortage for many farmers.

FmHA home loan programs accounted for \$9 million to build or improve 296 homes in

town and countryside areas. This total includes \$1.8 million for two RRH projects to serve family and elderly renters.

Loans and supplementary grants to improve rural community water, sewer, health, fire protections and other public facilities totaled \$5.5 million for 22 projects in District 6.

Talmadge L. Finch, District Director, said FmHA's improvement as a multi-purpose rural financial agency, servicing rural localities through county and district offices, has resulted in \$711 million more farm credit and community development in rural Mississippi during this 10 month period.

Energy Answers

Q. How many gallons of water does my washing machine use? How much does it cost to operate?

A. The number of gallons your machine uses may or may not be listed on your washer or in your owner's manual. If you can't find the information in either place, use these representative figures supplied by Frances Fortenberry, assistant to the state leader of the Home Economics Department, Cooperative Extension Service: extra-large load, 40 gallons; large load, 34 gallons; medium load, 27 gallons; small load, 20 gallons.

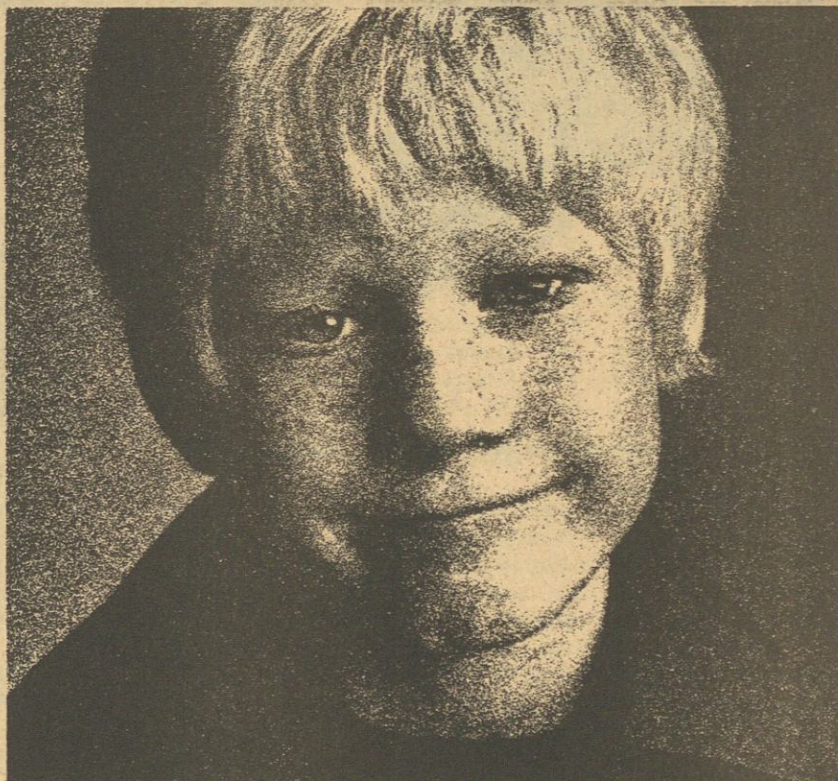
As to how much your machine costs to operate, that depends on many variables. The amount of water it uses is one. Others are the cost of electricity in your area, the water temperature you choose, the length of the washing cycle and what kind of water heater you have. (Heating water for wash cycles can account for as much as 85 percent of the energy needed.) The "average" kilowatt hour usage for a washer is 108. You can multiply 108 by the cost per kilowatt hour for electricity in your area to come up with an approximate cost.

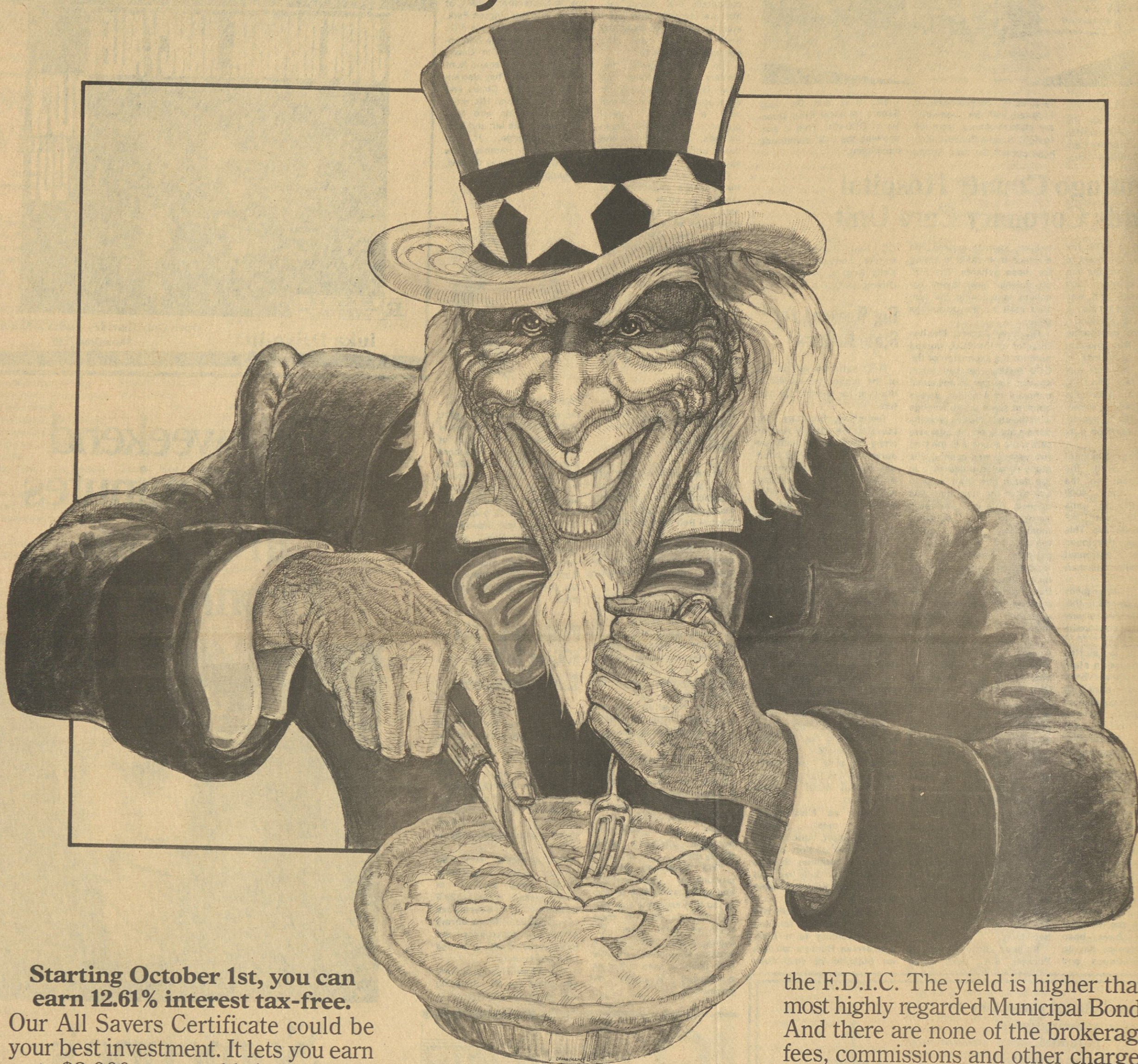
