Businessman Found Shot

A 54-year-old Iuka
businessman died Thursday,
October 8, at his business
from a gunshot wound. Ac-
cording to Iuka Chief of
Police, Jack Rye, Billy Gar-
dner, owner of the Parade
Service Station, on Highway
25 South, next to Iuka Rubber
and Gasket, was found dead
in a side room of the building
around 8:54 Thursday morn-
ing by customers of the
establishment.

Rye said Mr. Gardner died
from a 12 gauge shotgun
blast to the head. He further
stated that an investigation
into the incident is being
conducted by the Iuka Police
Department, the Tishomingo
County Sheriff's Department,
and a State Investigator.

At press-time the exact
cause of death had not been
determined, but indications
are that it will be ruled ac-
cidental.

Mr. Gardner, was a Veteran
of World War II, an employee
of Tennessee Valley
Authority for many years, and
was a member of the
Whitehaven Church of Christ.

Funeral services for
William Henry "Billy" Gar-
dner were held at 11 a.m.
Saturday at Cutshall Funeral
Home Chapel with the Rev.
Jerry Horton and Dr. Kenneth
Murphy officiating. Burial
was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include a
daughter, Margaret Gaye
Gardner, of the home; and a
sister, Ruby Gaye Gist, also
of Iuka; and a host of friends
and relatives.

Iuka Mourns Death Of Chief Of Police Jack Rye

The citizens of Iuka are
shocked and saddened today
following the sudden death of
Iuka Chief of Police, Jack
Rye, on Tuesday evening, Oc-
tober 13. Mr. Rye, 52, suffered

an apparent heart attack at
his home on Main Street
around 9:00 p.m. He was
rushed to Tishomingo County
Hospital by ambulance where
hospital personnel worked

with him for approximately 45
minutes before pronouncing
him dead.

A 28 year resident of Iuka
Chief Rye will long be
remembered by the people of
Iuka for his keen sense of
humor, for his ability to work
closely with all school of-
ficials and teachers, and for
his love of Iuka's young
people and skill and
willingness to help and guide
them in any way possible.

Mr. Rye was first elected to
fill the unexpired term of
Travis McGaughey as Chief of
Police, and at the general city
election in 1973 was re-
elected, and was then re-
elected in 1977 and 1981, ser-
ving the people of Iuka for
nine years in this capacity.

Chief Rye was a member of
Iuka Baptist Church, the Iuka
Lion's Club, and the
Mississippi Peace Officers
Association.

Funeral services will be
held today (Thursday, Oc-
tober 15) at Cutshall Funeral
Home Chapel at 3:00 p.m.
Rev. Harris Counce will of-
ficiate with burial in Oak
Grove Cemetery, Iuka. Mem-
bers of the Iuka Police De-
partment will serve as
pallbearers.

Survivors include his wife,

Mrs. Barbara Rye, of Iuka; one
son, Steve Rye, of Florence,
Ala.; four daughters, Mrs. An-
na Parker, of Iuka, Mrs. Bren-
da Dawson, Iuka, Becky Rye,
Iuka and Benji Rye, Iuka; and
one step-daughter, Debra
Barrett, Iuka; his mother, Mrs.
Lillie Rye, of Nettleton, Miss.;
two brothers, Henry Rye, of
Hamilton, Ala., and Jim Rye,
of Nettleton; four sisters,
Mrs. Connie Grubbs,
Jackson, Miss., Mrs. Zelma
Lee Whitehead, Mrs. Gladys
Hester and Mrs. Faye Mc-
Murry, all of Nettleton; and
four granddaughters.

Increase Noted In Tax Collections For County

Four municipalities in
Tishomingo County showed
an increase in sales tax
collections during the month
of August as compared to
those figures of August,
recently released in the mon-
thly issue of "Mississippi
Municipalities". Those not-
ing increases in tax collections
were: Belmont, Golden, Iuka,
and Paden.

Burnsville and Tishomingo
were the only towns in the
county showing a decrease in
the amount of taxes. Bur-
nsville collected \$3,882.29 in
July and \$2,779.33 in August.

Tishomingo collected
\$3,105.78 in July and
\$2,669.78 in August.

Belmont tallied a figure of
\$11,576.64 in August,
showing an increase over
July figures of \$11,071.63.

In Golden collections
totaled \$509.02 in August, as
compared to \$493.24 in July.
Iuka's tally for August was
\$42,240.39, showing a sub-
stantial increase over July
figures of \$31,714.00. Paden
also showed a slight increase
in August with \$69.36 col-
lected, compared to the \$29.72
figure for July.

Iuka Landmark To Be Restored

The Mississippi District
Assemblies of God has pur-
chased the old Presbyterian
Church on Eastport Street in
Iuka for the location of their
Iuka church. Remodeling and
restoration is now in progress
with work to be completed in
November.

The Assemblies of God are

known world-wide with 162
churches located in
Mississippi. This will be the
first and only Assembly of
God in Tishomingo County.
The headquarters are located
in Springfield, Missouri.

Pastor Allen Hapner and
his family moved to Iuka in
May, 1980, to establish the

new Assembly of God Church.
Services, at the present
time, are being held in the old
V.F.W. building on Highway
72.

Everyone is invited to wor-
ship at the Assembly of God,
and look forward to the
opening of the new church in
November.



An Iuka Landmark

A one-hundred and ten year
old Iuka Landmark is now
being restored for worship.
The structure is the former
First Presbyterian Church on
Eastport Street, now the
future home of the First
Assembly of God Church.
Services are to begin in
November, a newcomer to the
Iuka area. The First
Presbyterian Church, erected

in Iuka, was completed in
1872. This church was built
through the efforts of Mrs.
Mary Lecky, who moved to
Iuka from Courtland, Ala. in
1865. The frame building was
constructed on the south
side of town. This was an un-
fortunate location, because
the creek which flowed near-
by, when swollen with heavy
rains, would overflow its
natural boundaries and

destroy or damage the foun-
dation of the little church.
Consequently, in 1908, Mr.
J.C. Grocey, an Elder,
donated land for a new
location. The old church was
put on rollers and moved to
this new location on Eastport
Street. The building was
damaged in the move, so it
was decided to build a new
one, which was completed in
1924. The church was com-
pletely renovated in 1954.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Marinating Meats

Use a marinade to add flavor and make less expensive cuts of meat more tender. Cuts of meat such as a blade roast or steak, an arm roast or steak, a round steak, a flank steak and fresh brisket come from more heavily exercised parts of the beef animal. They contain more connective tissue and are less tender. Soaking these cuts in a marinade that contain an acid such as vinegar, fruit juice or wine breaks down the connective tissue. Then you can grill or broil just as you do tender

steaks.

Meat marinades usually contain seasonings and oil in addition to the acid. Popular seasonings include onion, garlic, thyme and basil. The choice depends on the specific flavor desired. Oil is used to help hold natural juices in the meat so it does not lose its own flavor.

Prepare enough marinade to cover the meat. Allow about ½ cup marinade per pound of meat. Cubed meat is soaked two to three hours; a larger cut is soaked 12 hours or overnight. Marinating too long may mask the flavor of the meat. The marinade container should be glazed ceramic, glass or stainless steel. It should be just large enough to hold the meat. Foods marinated an hour or longer must be kept in the

refrigerator.

Safety Tip For Hot Water Systems

Returning from vacation or moving into a new home? If your hot water system includes a gas water heater, allow hot water to run from all of the faucets for two minutes before using a dishwasher or clothes washer. The chemical reaction of water with the corrosive protective device inside the water heater produces small amounts of hydrogen gas in the system. An extensive lapse in use (two weeks or longer) permits potentially flammable hydrogen gas buildup in water heaters. In normal use, the gas escapes continually and harmlessly as home water faucets are used.

Applesauce Cake

1 cup fat
2 cups sugar
2 beaten eggs
1-½ cups thick applesauce
2-½ tsp. baking powder
½ ts.p. nutmeg
¾ tsp. soda
1 cup soy flour
2-½ cups sifted enriched flour
1 tsp. salt

Cream fat with sugar, add beaten eggs and applesauce. Sift all other ingredients together and stir into the first mixture. Pour into a well-greased 9 x 13 inch pan and bake in a low oven (325°) for 1 hour. This cake can be made several days ahead, as the flavor improves with age.

Protect Yourself

Adding grain handling equipment to your operation also adds new safety hazards. Training your workers and using proper maintenance can help prevent many grain handling accidents.

The grain auger is one of the most dangerous pieces of farm equipment because of the high number of accidents in relation to the number of hours it is used. The leading danger is getting caught in the auger intake, belts or chains.

Encourage your workers to wear tight-fitting clothes that aren't easily caught in machinery. Keep protective guards and covers over moving parts, especially the auger intake.

Disconnect the power and lock it off when the auger



Extra Large Sweet Potato

Isn't being used or when maintenance is being done. This will prevent someone's being entangled in the auger in case of accidental start-up by others.

Stay clear of power lines when moving a portable auger or elevator. A person can be electrocuted if contact is made. And, be alert for elevator collapse or winch failure when moving the auger into position.

Moving any kind of grain can cause a grain "bridge" to form in the storage bin. Be extra careful when breaking this bridge. Don't enter the grain bin while unloading. Shut off the unloader and use a pipe or another long object to break a surface bridge. The bridge may look safe, but you can fall through and be submerged instantly. It takes only a few inches of grain covering a person to cause suffocation.

If you must enter the bin to break up a bridge, first shut off the unloader. Tie a rope around yourself and the other end to the outside of the bin. Have someone standing by to pull you out in case of emergency. For further protection, wear a filter respirator when you must work in grain dust or around spoiled grain. You especially need a respirator if you have allergies.

The average American ate 1,402 pounds of food last year, but according to a Department of Agriculture study, paid proportionately less for it than in 1960.

Consumer expenditures climbed 319 percent from 1960 to 1980 but, proportionately, food gained less than other items in the consumer's budget. In 1960, about twenty cents of every dollar of disposable income went for food. Last year food took about sixteen cents of the disposable dollar. The study also showed some changes in what we eat. For example, beef consumption has increased 21 percent, chicken consumption increased 84 percent, and cheese consumption is up 116 percent.

Conservation Notes

Lespedeza bicolor, the soil building plant which offers marvelous opportunities to the farmer for bringing the number of quail on his place to a high peak, must be planted properly, cultivated regularly and managed wisely if it is to give maximum results.

The bicolor field border should be from 12-20 feet wide immediately next to the woods, or brush covert adjoining the field. The border should contain 4 to 5 rows of plants spaced three feet apart with plants set two feet apart in the row, using a minimum of 1,000 plants to the border. Between the bicolor and the cropland plant a 12-15 foot sericea border if you wish. The sericea border will serve as a turn-row, emergency hay crop, and also as preferred roosting cover for quail.

You can also plant bicolor strips in wooded areas. Strips

The teaching of economic education at all grade levels is essential for an understanding and appreciation of our

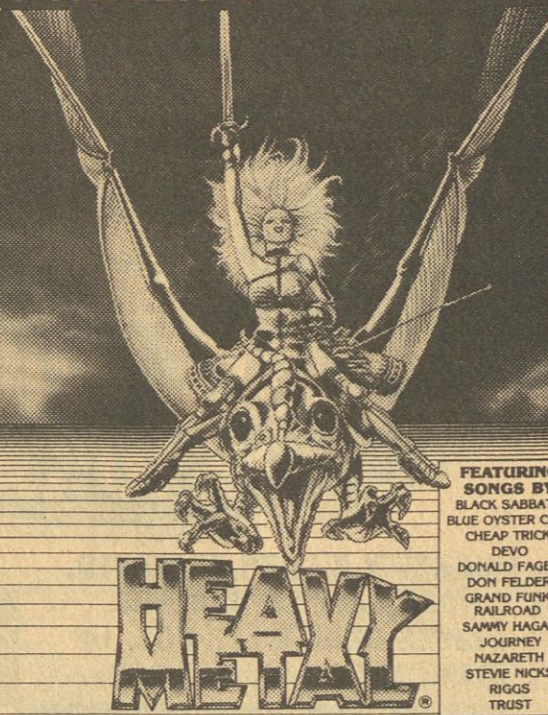
free enterprise system, according to Mississippi Economic Council Chairman W.W. Gresham, Jr., an Indianola businessman.

Iuka Defeats Alcorn Cent.

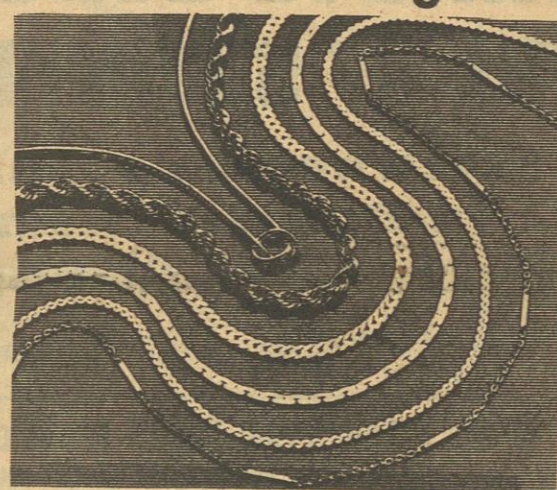
Iuka defeated Alcorn Central Friday night for their first

Undaunted by the drizzling rain, Tishomingo's Bulldogs topped the Mooreville Troopers 18-0 on a first quarter 7 yard run by junior, Rodney Frazier, a second quarter, 60 yard punt return and a 3rd quarter 64 yard score by freshman, Eric Powell.

Mooreville won the toss and elected to receive to start the contest, but could make no gain in four downs. Frazier and sophomore, Marty Thomas, were right on top of the action, with a near interception by Frazier, to send the Troopers into the punt situation.

The Bulldogs and Troopers traded another punt each before the Bulldogs finally got into action for their first score. The fine mist took its toll as Frazier got loose once but slipped in first down territory and the hike from center became a delicate procedure. The Bulldogs had possession over four minutes and marched 61 yards for the first score with 3:41 left in the quarter.

Freshman Mark Green got a sack for a loss of five yards

and sophomore, Lewis Cass, tripped the trooper at the line to get the Bulldogs another chance. On a third and 12, Senior Allen Kay got a final block as Frazier ran for a score from the 43 yard line, but a holding penalty denied the Bulldogs the points.

On the Troopers first down, a fumble was recovered by the Bulldogs on the 18 yard line, and the Bulldogs were in possession again as the quarter ended. The second quarter opened and the Bulldogs were quickly in a fourth down situation, giving possession back to the Troopers as a pass fell incomplete.

Lineman Kay pushed the Trooper for a loss of four yards. The second down was a completed pass over middle of the line and only a last chance tackle by Frazier protected the Bulldog lead. A Mooreville fumble, which they recovered, and a third down incomplete pass set the Troopers up to punt. A fake punt, converted to a pass for a first down 22 yard gain put another score into the watching Bulldog fans, but Powell tripped the Trooper to prevent the score.

A combination of a sack for Kay, a holding penalty and an

incomplete pass, which Powell almost intercepted, set up another fake Trooper punt-pass, which fell incomplete and the Bulldogs took possession for four downs, with no gain.

Powell got another near interception and tackle, and received the Trooper punt return for a 60 yard run and touchdown as Kay got the last block to give him a clear field. With 3:32 left in the first half, the Bulldogs led 12-0.

Mooreville held possession for the remaining three and a half minutes as they marched from the 43 yard line. Tackles by senior Tim Cox, Kay, seniors Gary Allen and Richard Berryman slowed down, but did not stop the Troopers, as the half drew down to seconds remaining and third and goal on the nine yard line, but an incomplete pass as the half time horn sounded preserved the Bulldog shut-out, 12-0.

After a halftime show, which included both the visiting pride-of-Tishomingo Marching Band and the colorful host Mooreville Trooper Band, the teams again took the field in the continuing mist and drizzle.

Mooreville kicked deep to Bulldog Powell, who carried back to the 25 yard line. Frazier carried for 9 yards, and with 10:54 left in the third period, Powell got good offensive blocking to break clear for a long run and another score, Bulldogs 18-0.

Second half action continued to be exciting as Mooreville returned the kickoff 45 yards before junior

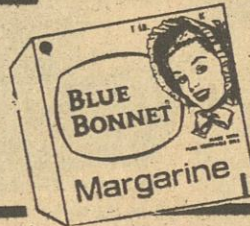

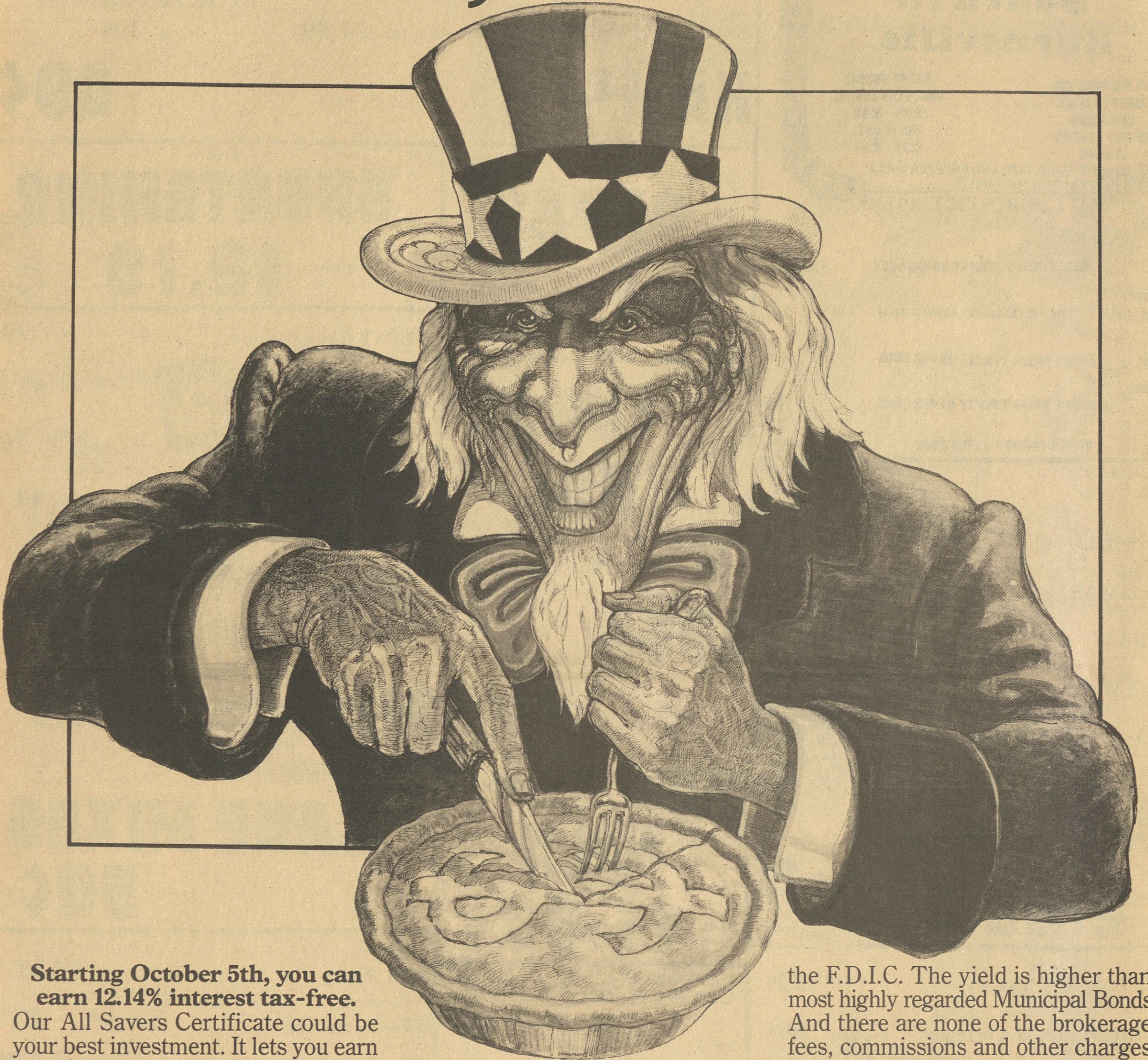
