### TVA Plant Move Concerns Residents

Residents and officials of Tishomingo County are concerned about any moves by Tennessee Valley Authority to halt construction of the Yellow Creek Nuclear

same." TVA is expected to release a report on the residences of employees in January, he said.

Burnsville Mayor A.T. Marlar said he has also contacted TVA officials and Mississippi congressmen about the status of the plant. He added that he is convinced that the concern Tishomingo County residents are showing could have an effect on TVA's decision.

"Our congressmen are doing the best they can to help the people of Mississippi. But the area must have some kind of work," Marlar stressed.

"I'd say 50 percent of the working class people in Burnsville are out of work, and 30 percent of those are construction workers," he added. Marlar said sales for Burnsville merchants have fallen off considerably and a few businesses have closed.

"We've had several businesses interested in moving to Burnsville. But a lot of them are afraid to move with the economic situation. Right now they're riding the fence," he said.

But Marlar said, despite the hard economic times the concern of Tishomingo County residents may save the Nuclear Plant from halting construction.

"I've been told if there is enough interest we could possibly keep 2,500 workers at the plant," Marlar said.

Jack P. Wyman, Jr., Vice Mayor of Belmont, said, "Most of our people are still at work. But we could feel the effects if the plant closed."

Wyman said he too is confident the letter writing movement by Tishomingo county residents could have a bearing on TVA's decision regarding the Yellow Creek facility.

But, Wyman and other Tishomingo County officials will have to wait until TVA completes an "option paper" to determine the power needs of the area to see what will happen at the plant.

Gil Francis, a spokesman for TVA's public information office in Knoxville, said, no matter what the finding of the option paper, the TVA board will hear comments from citizens before a decision is made about closing nuclear plant sites.

Francis said the option paper should be completed in January.

### Stolen Goods Recovered In Prentiss County

Tishomingo County Sheriff Amos Bates reported to The News that he had received an anonymous phone call on Saturday, December 26, around 1:00 p.m. The caller informed Sheriff Bates that two stolen guns had been sold at The Trading Post in Corinth. The guns had reportedly been taken from the home of James Sullivan in Tishomingo. Management at

The Trading Post revealed the tag number and the color of the pick-up in which the suspects were traveling. Bates immediately notified Booneville Chief of Police Bobby Lambert, who traced the owner of the pick-up through the Prentiss County Tax Assessor's Office. Prentiss and Tishomingo County authorities met at The Trading Post on Monday

morning, December 28, and employees there gave a description of the man who had sold them the guns, and also revealed the name of a female who was a companion in the exchange. Authorities immediately traveled to Prentiss County, located the home and pick-up of the suspects, and obtained a search warrant. During the search, approximately 42

guns, T.V.'s, radios, jewelry, marijuana, tools, watches, clothing, and a wide assortment of other miscellaneous items was discovered. It is believed that all of the goods were stolen in Tishomingo, Prentiss, Lee, Union and Alcorn counties.

Five Booneville men are now being held in Prentiss County Jail for questioning in the robberies.

### Unemployment In County Rose To 10.6 Percent in November

Unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 10.6 percent in November. According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, this is the highest figure since March of this year when it was estimated to be 11.3 percent of the civilian labor force. The rate of unemployment for the county last month was 8.9 percent while one year ago it was estimated to be 6.2 percent. Mass layoffs and seasonal layoffs account primarily for this rise in unemployment.

The civilian labor force for

the county was estimated to be 11,450, 30 below the previous figure and 420 below the estimate for one year ago. The number of Tishomingo County residents employed, estimated to be 10,240 at mid-November, experienced a drop of 220 from October and 890 from November one year ago.

Manufacturing employment for the county was estimated to be 2,750, compared to 2,780 in October and 2,960 one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment at 6,320, experienced a drop of 120 over the month and 650

over the year.

Employment in the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo totaled 38,760 at mid-November. This represents a loss of 2,580 workers from October and 3,000 from November 1980. There were 6,940 unemployed in the area during November, up 2,610 from last month and 2,660 from one year ago. The estimated rate of unemployment for the area for November was 15.2 percent of the civilian labor force, compared to 9.5 percent last month and 9.3 percent one year ago. The civilian labor force, estimated to be 45,700, edged up slightly over the

month but experienced a loss of 340 over the year.

At mid-November, manufacturing industries in the four-county area reported 13,010 workers, compared to 15,030 in October and 14,650 in November one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment also experienced a decrease although not as large as in manufacturing. The November figure for nonmanufacturing was estimated to be 19,570 which is 130 below the previous estimate and 800 below that of one year ago. Although several groups contributed to the losses, Government experienced the largest decrease.

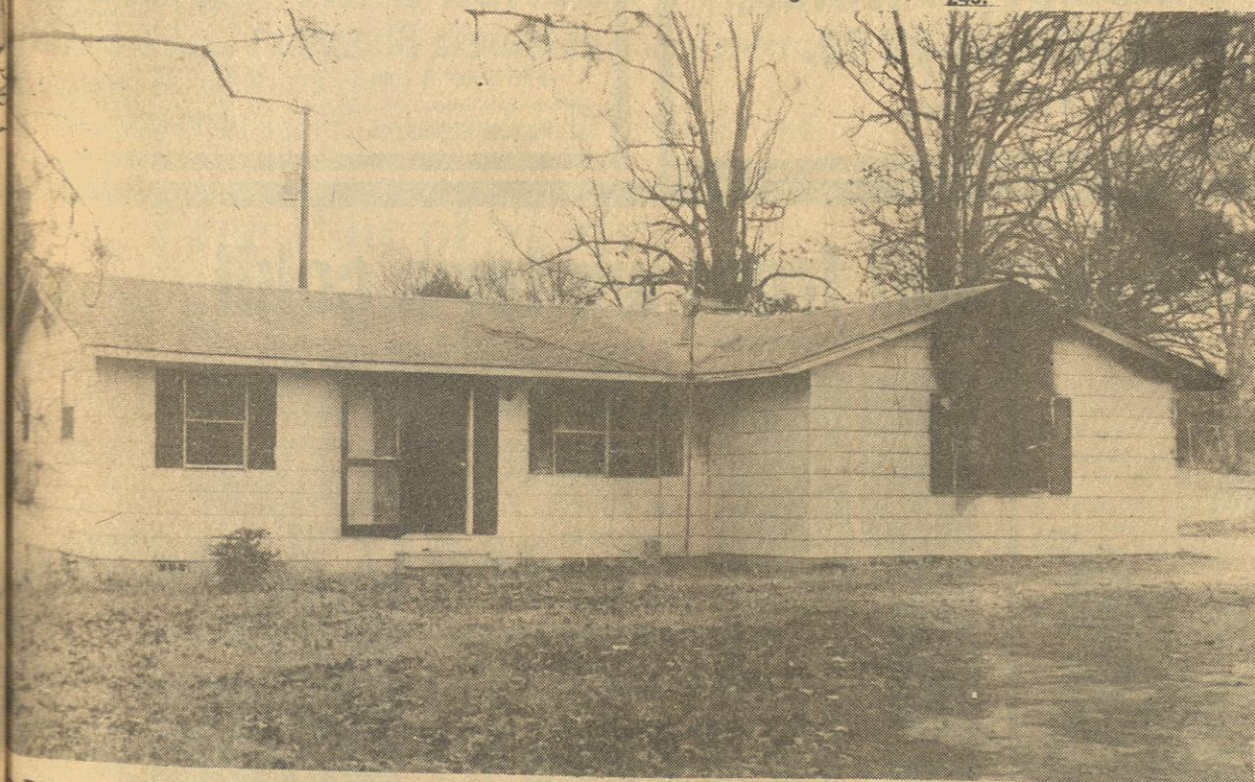

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Cleaning Walls and Woodwork

#### PAINTED SURFACES

For ordinary cleaning, use a mixture of soap jelly and warm water. Add enough

soap jelly to water to make light suds. Dust painted surfaces thoroughly before washing. Wash with a soft cloth dipped and wrung out in cleaning solution. Rinse well and dry with soft cloths. Wash only a small area at a time.

Whiting paste may be used for very soiled places. Make it with four parts of fine whiting to one part of soap jelly. Mix the two ingredients thoroughly and keep in a small jar. Apply with a soft

cloth and rub lightly. Rinse thoroughly to remove whiting.

For cleaning woodwork or light-colored, painted surfaces, use one part of kerosene oil to one part of vinegar. Rub over the soiled area and wipe with a dry cloth.

#### PAPER WALLS

Fresh grease spots may be removed partially by placing a clean blotter on the spot and pressing with a warm iron. Change the blotter often.

For further treatment and more stubborn spots, make a paste of water and magnesia powder of Fuller's Earth. (Use powdered magnesium oxide available at drug stores.) Apply the paste to the spot and let it dry thoroughly for two to three days. Brush off the dry powder. It may be necessary to repeat the treatment several times. CAUTION: Test first on an inconspicuous place.

#### WASHABLE PAPER SURFACES

For heavily soiled, washable paper, try this recipe:  
4 teaspoons baking soda  
2 cups flour  
2 1/2 tsp. household ammonia  
1 1/4 cups water  
Stir soda into the flour, add ammonia and water. Beat until smooth. Steam in a double boiler for 1 1/2 hours. Leave the dough covered and, when cool enough to handle, knead until smooth and soft.

To use the wall-dough cleaner, start at the top and rub gently downward. Knead the cleaner as you work. Overlap the strokes to prevent streaking. Dusting with a soft cloth will remove crumbs left from the dough.

This cleaning dough also can be used to clean window shades.

### Ground Beef Casserole

1 lb. ground beef  
1 onion, chopped  
1 can mushroom soup (undiluted)  
Salt to taste  
1 - 16 oz. can mixed vegetables (undrained)  
3 potatoes sliced thin  
Brown beef and onions. Layer beef and onions, soup, vegetables and potatoes in a casserole dish. Have soup for top layer and top with cheese if desired. Bake at 350° F. for 1 hour.

## County Agent's Notes

Cattle

During cold weather cattle need more feed to maintain body temperature and growth. Extension Agronomist Dr. Lamar Kimbrough says because of this, they may need a little extra hay on cold mornings.

Kimbrough says where winter annual pastures are heavily frosted on cold mornings, delay grazing until later in the day. Grazing frosted grass with frozen ground will injure the grass.

If there are questions about the quality of hay, cattlemen should have their hay chemically analyzed to determine how much to feed and what supplements, if any, need to be fed with it. For more information, contact your county agent.

these days because of the high cost of energy. Extension Farm Safety Specialist Dannie Reed says although it's important to save energy by burning wood, it's also important to do it safely. Reed recommends the following safety tips: Keep the area around the wood-burning unit free of clutter. Don't use petroleum products to start a fire in a wood-burning stove or fireplace. Remove ashes into a closed metal container and take them outside immediately.

### Grazing Cattle On Ryegrass

If you plan to graze your cattle on ryegrass, good management can give you more for your money. Extension Agronomy Leader Dr. Kelton Anderson says begin grazing ryegrass when it reaches a height of eight inches. Graze it down to about two inches, and then rotate your cattle to another pasture or feedlot. Ryegrass will grow faster if you don't graze it below two inches.

## USDA Announces Change In CCC Interest Rate Policy

Beginning January 1, 1982, the interest rate on Commodity Credit Corporation loans will be set at the rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury during the month that the loan is issued, according to a recent announcement by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

Loans disbursed since April 1, 1981, and which have interest rates subject to change, will have their interest rates adjusted January 1. These loans, which currently have a 14.5 percent interest rate, will be adjusted to the interest rate charged CCC by the Treasury in January. Previously, CCC interest rates were set semi-annually - on April 1 and October 1.

The interest rate paid by CCC has declined from a peak of 16.75 percent in October to 13.625 percent this month. Farmers should benefit from this downward trend in interest rates, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Committee of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which administers the CCC loans locally. Bridges said farmers and others who have questions concerning the interest rates and other loan provisions should contact the local ASCS Office.

## Conservation Notes

Terracing is a method of erosion control accomplished by constructing a channel and levee across the slope on cropland. Terraces decrease the length of the slope, thereby reducing sheet and rill erosion and preventing the formation of gullies. The standard terrace is called the broad base terrace where the entire terrace is farmed. Some of the wide farming equipment that is now being used may not fit the broad base terrace. Therefore, some farmers are constructing a narrow base terrace where the entire terrace is vegetated and cultivation is performed on the contour between the terraces only.

Terraces must have an outlet or a method of draining the runoff water to a safe disposal area. This outlet can be a vegetated area or a grassed waterway which spreads the water over a wide area at shallow depths slowing the runoff to prevent erosion.

Sometimes a waterway across a field may be difficult to establish and maintain. As an alternate to establishing a waterway, the terrace may be built across the depression in the field to temporarily store the runoff water. The terraces are emptied by an underground pipe system. These pipe outlets eliminate the need for a vegetated

outlet and facilitate a parallel alignment of the terraces. For technical assistance on design and layout of terrace systems and for more information on pipe outlets for terraces, contact your local Soil Conservation Service.

## Stretch Food Budget With Delicious Wild Game

Venison meat loaf, barbecued venison, squirrel fricassee and venison sauerbraten are only a few of the mouth-watering dishes that creative cooks have invented when faced with a freezer filled with wild game.

"Wild game is low in fat and high in protein and nutrients," says Eleanor Coats, food and nutrition specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. "It's an ideal budget-stretcher, too."

Proper care in the field and in the kitchen can assure even a beginning cook of a gourmet meal. Ideally, wild game should be bled and eviscerated at once. Skin and chill wild game as soon as possible, she adds. Warm, freshly killed game is ideal for salmonella food poisoning, and prompt chilling stops the growth of bacteria.

She advises hunters to small game like birds and squirrels to take a portable ice chest along so they can chill game as soon as they return to the car.

"Flavor and tenderness are

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influenced by the way an animal is cut up," she adds. "Remove all traces of fat from game. The fat gives the meat that gamey taste that many people dislike. If necessary, baste meat with beef fat or cooking oil."

She describes rabbit and squirrel as tender and mild-flavored. Cook these as you'd prepare chicken, she suggests. "Quail and dove are considered delicacies. Proper handling of birds in the field and kitchen can mean a feast fit for a king," she says.

Mrs. Coats says duck and wild turkey are improved in flavor and tenderness by aging. Age them for two to four days in the refrigerator before cooking or freezing, she adds. Freeze in moisture-vapor-proof materials such as heavy-duty freezer foil or plastic freezer bags. Don't use regular waxed paper or aluminum foil for this purpose, she cautions.

"Spices and herbs can be used to great advantage in cooking game," she says. "Garlic, mint and bay leaf are especially good."

Marinades can tenderize and enhance flavor, too. Cover meat with one of the following marinades and allow it to stand in the refrigerator at least 24 hours: vinegar, French dressing, tomato sauce, undiluted tomato soup or tomato juice. For variety, experiment with combinations of fruit juice, seasonings and vegetable oil.

"Expect a failure every now and then," she cautions cooks. "But you'll be pleased with most of your experiments."

Mrs. Coats lists these tips for cooking venison:

Cook venison as you would cook lean beef. Tender cuts can be pan-fried, broiled or roasted. Round steaks, meat from the leg, and less tender cuts are cooked best by moist heat - braising, stewing or pot roasting.

Don't overcook venison, and don't cook it at a temperature which is too high. A low to medium temperature setting is best. Cook to

medium or well done, rare or overdone.

Venison is sweeter than other meats, so reduce salt in sauce recipes by one-fourth. Tenderize by using one of the methods described above.

Because venison is moist it during cooking with chunks of beef cover surface with strips anchored with picks.

Included was John A. Hart III, Iuka, master of science in civil engineering.

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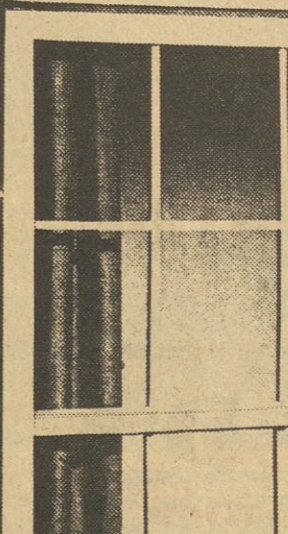
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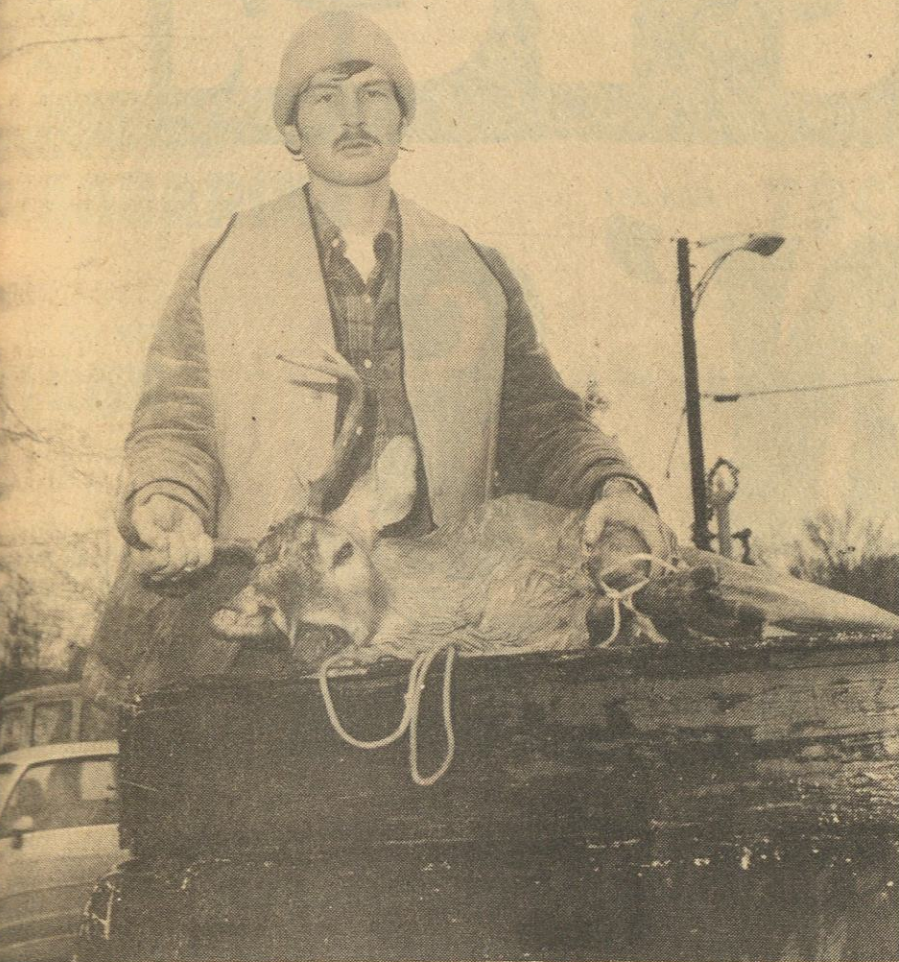

Makes 2 loaves

3-3/4 cups unsifted flour  
1-1/4 cups yellow cornmeal  
2 packages Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
2 cups milk  
1/2 cup water

In a large bowl combine 1-3/4 cups flour, cornmeal, undissolved Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast, sugar, salt and baking soda. Combine milk and water in a saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are very warm (120°F. to 130°F.). Gradually add to dry ingredients and beat well. Stir in remaining flour to make a stiff



batter. Spoon into two 8-1/2 x 4-1/2 x 2-1/2-inch loaf dishes which have been greased and coated with cornmeal. Sprinkle tops of loaves with additional cornmeal. Cover; let rise in a warm place, free from draft, for 45 minutes. Microwave each loaf on high power for 6 minutes, 30 seconds. Surface of loaf will be flat and pale in color. Allow to rest 5 minutes before removing from dishes. To serve, slice and toast. Spread with Fleischmann's Margarine is desired.

### TO BAKE IN CONVENTIONAL OVEN

Stir 1 cup additional unsifted white flour into batter to make a very soft dough. Spoon into two 8-1/2 x 4-1/2 x 2-1/2-inch loaf pans that have been greased and sprinkled with cornmeal. Sprinkle tops with cornmeal. Allow dough

to rise as directed. Bake at 400°F. for 25 minutes. Remove from pans immediately and cool.

### Nutrition

#### THE BALANCING ACT

Telecommunications  
Technology  
Dramatic Innovation

Telephone service is a convenience so basic it's easy to take for granted.

But consider what happens to a cross-country call. The number dialed sends impulses traveling at speeds measured in milliseconds. It started with a telephone that by comparison with today's electronic instruments was only slightly more

sophisticated than the soup can and thread children experiment with. A series of innovations over the past century has had a dramatic impact both inside and outside the communications industry.

Invention of the high-vacuum electronic amplifying tube by a Western Electric research scientist in 1913 first paved the way for the reliable transmission of long distance calls, then provided a building block for the development of radio, broadcasting, sound movies and eventually television.

The transistor, invented at Bell Labs in 1947 and first manufactured by Western Electric, was the key to modern electronics. It revolutionized communications, television and the computer industry, and led to the creation of products ranging from pocket calculators to space exploration equipment.

Western Electric and Bell

Labs worked together to develop the first industrial uses of the laser. Western uses lasers extensively for precision drilling and cutting. In other applications, doctors use lasers for delicate eye and ear surgery, and supermarket checkout clerks use them to read product codes on packages.

Communications service has benefited from these and many other developments. Today Western Electric builds lightwave communications systems that beam signals by laser light over hair-thin glass fibers carrying vast amounts of information. Microelectronic chips -- smaller than a thumbnail and able to do the work that once required a room-sized computer -- are at the

heart of "smart" communications equipment. Western Electric's tradition for innovation -- now 100 years old -- will continue into the second century of partnership with the Bell System.

INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS

IRA's should certainly be considered in planning your financial future, and listed below are some of the most frequently asked questions with appropriate answers about IRA's.

1. What is an IRA?  
An Individual Retirement Account (IRA) at Iuka Guaranty Bank is just what the name implies: a savings account designed for retirement income - along with tax deductions that every individual wage-earner can use today.

2. Who is eligible for an IRA?

## Local Residents To Receive Federal Income Tax Packages

Approximately 880,000 Mississippi taxpayers will receive their Federal Income Tax Packages within the next two weeks, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Forty-nine percent, about 431,000 of these will be 1040A packages, featuring the less complicated "short form." The remaining 449,000 tax packages consist of four different 1040 "long form" packages with various supporting schedules, depending on which forms the taxpayer filed last year.

Altogether, the IRS expects

from taxpayers in Mississippi during the 1982 filing season.

The most significant change in this year's tax package is that it now features only one tax table to be used by all taxpayers, regardless of filing status. Previously, there were four separate tables. Because of this change, an extra step, in which the taxpayer subtracts \$1,000 from gross income for each exemption, has been added to the computations.

The tax tables have been expanded, and now cover taxable incomes up to \$50,000. Previously, the tax tables only went up to \$20,000 for individual taxpayers, and \$40,000 for married filing jointly.

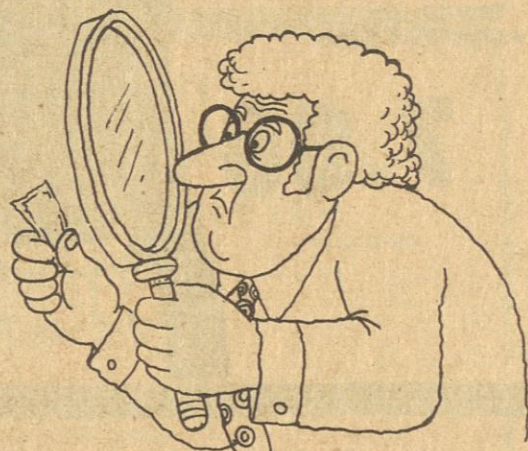

## Energy Answers

Q. Is it okay to use my gas oven to heat my kitchen?

A. Your gas oven is not designed for extra heating. Do not use it that way! If the flame goes out and the oven does not have a safety valve, the gas that escapes may cause an explosion or asphyxiate you.

Q. I'm cooking some big meals this holiday season. What's the most energy-efficient way of handling leftovers?

Everyone conscious of saving energy is aware that refrigeration of food is costly, but the safety of the food should be kept in mind also.

Often, you hear recommendations to let hot dishes

cool before placing them in the refrigerator or freezer. From a safety and energy standpoint, cooling hot items in a sink of cold water before refrigeration is fine, but cooling your leftover roast turkey on the countertop for a few hours (even though it may be energy-saving) definitely is not safe.

There is a reasonable possibility that food poisoning bacteria is on the turkey, and the chances of bacterial growth in two hours is excellent. Alone, this may not cause food poisoning, but the risk of it is high.

When you remove the turkey from the refrigerator for the next meal, the bacteria growth starts again. If it takes another two hours from the time you remove it from the refrigerator, slice it and serve it, until you put it back, food

poisoning will probably result.

The one-day flu, as it is called, is actually food poisoning caused by improper handling of food in the home and not by a virus, says the Health Department. Cooling hot food quickly is important, especially for high protein foods. It is safe and energy-saving as well to place the turkey in a pan and set it in a sink of cold water to cool it quickly.

Q. What can I do to make household hot water use more energy-efficient?

A. Install an insulation refit kit on your water heater to cut heat loss, and lower the temperature setting on your heater to the lowest degree acceptable to your needs. Never leave hot water running unnecessarily. Fix leaky hot water faucets. Limit dish-

washer runs to full loads.

Consider installing a flow restrictor in the showerhead pipe to reduce water flow. Flow restrictors are available at most stores that handle plumbing supplies. Consider using faucet aerators. They mix air with water and reduce the amount of water used, yet provide a water flow turbulent enough for washing.

## Your Social Security

Increase In Earnings Limits,  
Quarters of Coverage

Social Security benefits can have without affecting his or her benefit - and the amount of earnings constituting a quarter of coverage were announced recently. These figures are recomputed each year to reflect increases in general wage levels. They are effective as of January 1.

The earnings limit for people under age 65 increased from \$4,808 to \$4,440. For people 65 and over, the limit increased by law from \$5,500 to \$6,000. Earnings over the limit reduce a Social Security benefit \$1 for each \$2 in excess earnings. The earnings limit does not apply to people 72 and over. The amount of earnings needed for a quarter of coverage increased from \$310 to \$340. Work under Social Security is measured in quarters of coverage, with up to a

maximum of 4 quarters of coverage allotted for during the year. For \$1,360 during the result in 4 quarters of coverage.
