Firearms Educational Program For Women

Mayor Johnny Biggs announced today that there will be a Firearms Educational Program starting January 14, 1982, for the ladies of Iuka, Ms. This program will be under the direction of former highway patrolman, Curtis Butler, in cooperation with the T.V.A. Law Enforcement Department and the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant. Patrolman Butler will orient each person as to the proper use of her firearm. Firearms and ammunition must be furnished by each individual participant. The guns that are owned by each individual must be in good working order and unloaded upon entering the program.

Mr. Amos Bates, Tishomingo County Sheriff, states that he endorses this type of program to assist in the control of law and order. Mr. Butler urges those interested in this program to be present at the first meeting at the City Hall of Iuka January 14, 1982.

Agreement Reached In Tenn-Tom Negotiations

MOBILE, ALABAMA--Attorneys for the plaintiffs and the defense have signed a written consent agreement providing a temporary suspension of some activities on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway as a result of the on-going lawsuit against the project.

The agreement has been furnished to the U.S. District Court for Northern Mississippi for approval.

From the time of court approval the agreement will remain in effect until 60 days after the filing by the Corps of Engineers of a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (SEIS) with the Court. The Court has directed that the SEIS must be filed no later than June 1, 1982.

The 11-page agreement grew out of a ruling issued by the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals last July which upheld the plaintiffs on certain limited issues in the suit. The Appellate Court remanded the issues back to the District Court with orders to require the Corps of Engineers to file a SEIS on changes made to the waterway design since 1971.

Last September the District Court directed attorneys for both sides to attempt to reach agreement on any activities which might be suspended, delayed, or rescheduled while the SEIS was being prepared.

The agreement was negotiated between attorneys of the U.S. Justice Department and U.S. Army Engineers representing the defendants and attorneys for the L&N Railroad, the Environmental Defense Fund and others as plaintiffs. After approval by the Court, the agreement will have the force and effect of a court order.

Under the terms of the agreement, construction will continue on most elements of the waterway and only the following portions will be affected:

Tombigbee Electric Power facilities in the Lock C stretch of the waterway.

In addition, work would be rescheduled on portions of three dredging contracts in the Columbus pool and delayed for some embankment work on Locks D and E. Work will continue on the portions of these contracts not designated for rescheduling or delay.

On or before March 15, 1982, the Corp of Engineers will file with the plaintiffs a detailed report on the project land which was not reflected or identified in a 1971 EIS, and which has since been added to the requirements for the projects.

The Corps will also furnish the plaintiffs with information on contract schedules and monitoring of on-going construction in the affected areas.

A government spokesman said the agreement was submitted to the Court for approval and no action related to the agreement will be taken until it has been approved by the Court.

Tree Seedlings For Sale

There are still plenty of baby trees available to Mississippi landowners for purchase and planting this winter according to a recent Mississippi Forestry Commission seedling inventory.

Loblolly pine seedlings were in greatest supply (5,560,000). There were also 46000 Longleaf Pine seedlings. No species of hardwood seedlings and cutting was on hand at the time of the December 11 seedling count.

Tishomingo Countians interested in obtaining trees for delivery and planting beginning in December and continuing through the Winter months should contact County Forester Brendix Glasgow for a price list and application form. His office is located in the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

DOUBLE YOUR DOLLARS

In these days of shrinking dollars and the dollar squeeze, it's time to consider management. The secret of doubling your dollars is management. You start where you are with money and other resources that you have. Learn one step at a time how to use money as a tool. You learn how to manage your

money and develop management skills to be a financial success.

First decide what you want based on resources, values, and goals. To do this, consider the money you have available. Make a spending plan. Keep a simple record. Of course, you will have to make a list of fixed expenses and flexible expenses. For example, housing is a fixed expense and food is a flexible expense.

Establish your priorities based on your values and goals. Consider how much you spend for each item. Distinguish between needs and wants. Make adjustments. Evaluate and continue to

make adjustments until your plan fits your needs and wants. All of this magic of management means that you have to make decisions and perhaps sharpen your decision making skills.

Think in terms of percentages. Shave off the cost of living by reducing each item on your flexible list a certain percentage. Consider that when you make a spending plan you are able to stretch your dollars 15 percent just by deciding the amounts you will allocate for each item. If you become a well-informed shopper and do a good job of comparative shopping following buyman'ship guidelines, you can stretch your dollars another 30 percent. If you check your records, you can see where your leaks are. You can plug these leaks. It's up to you. Management is the magic key to double your dollars.

SPECIAL IRS HELPS FOR TAXPAYERS

The IRS may have the answer to what appears to be an unsolvable tax problem. A special office called Problem Resolution Office (PRO) has been established. Its purpose is to give personal attention to taxpayers after previous efforts to resolve the problem through normal channels have failed. PRO usually takes complaints only after there has been at least one unsuccessful attempt to deal with a problem during an IRS contact. Taxpayers can reach problem resolution by either writing to an IRS district office or calling the IRS tax information number listed in the telephone directory.

PRIZE WINNING MEAT LOAF

1½ lbs. ground beef
¾ c. quaker oats (quick or old fashioned)
¼ c. chopped onions
1½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper
1 c. tomato juice
1 egg, beaten
Combine all ingredients. Pack firmly into an ungreased (8½ x 4½ x 2½ inch) loaf pan. Bake in preheated moderate

REPORTS OF ACREAGE FOR OATS

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 has been enacted into law; as a result, we need acreage reports for oats so that producers will be eligible to participate in the 1982 programs. An acreage report is needed for oats for 1980 and 1981 crop years. If you have not previously reported this acreage to the county office, you must report by February 5, 1982. Base acreage will need to be established for farms that planted oats, therefore, it is important that your report to this office is accurate. If you have questions, please contact the county office for details.

1981 ACREAGE REPORTS FOR FARMS THAT HAVE NOT REPORTED PROGRAM CROPS

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 was signed into law by the President on December 22. It provides that farm bases for program crops (Wheat, Upland Cotton, Rice, Corn, Grain Sorghum, Oats and if designated by the Secretary, Barley) will be established beginning with the 1982 crop year. Top with sliced green onions. Serve over hot fluffy rice. Makes 2 servings.

Change In Policy On Burning

There has been an important change in the Mississippi Forestry Commission's procedure for issuance of outdoor burning permits, according to Tom Hardage, Chief of the Commission Forest Protection Division.

Under authority of a Cooperative Agreement between the Forestry Commission and the State Bureau of Pollution Control the forestry agency has been halting the issuance of burning permits on a statewide basis during periods of extreme fire hazard and occurrence. The Commission's new policy now authorizes that decision to halt or continue issuing such permits to be made at the district level.

District foresters may now either stop issuing permits on a district-wide basis, or allow them only in designated areas where the wildfire danger rating is low.

"We feel like this greater

local control of the permits will be better for all concerned since it will concentrate restrictions on burning in the most critical danger areas and allow essential debris burning and prescribed burning work to continue in areas where moisture, wind and other fire weather factors are at what are considered to be safe levels", declared Hardage.

Landowners wishing to do agricultural type outdoor burning still need only to call their local firetower to ver-

bally obtain a burning permit, or be denied (as the case may be) due to extreme fire weather conditions in their particular area.

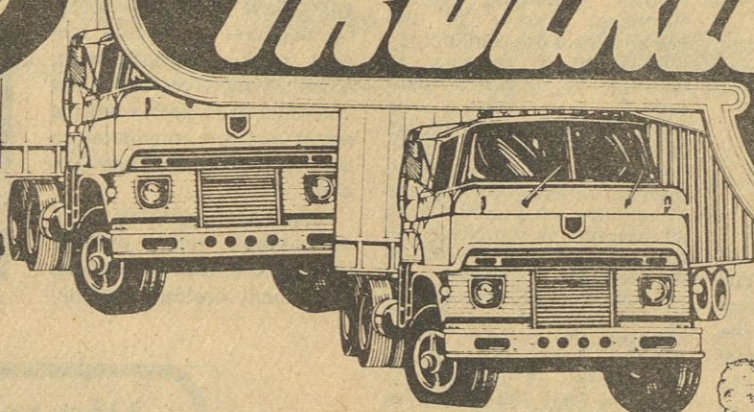

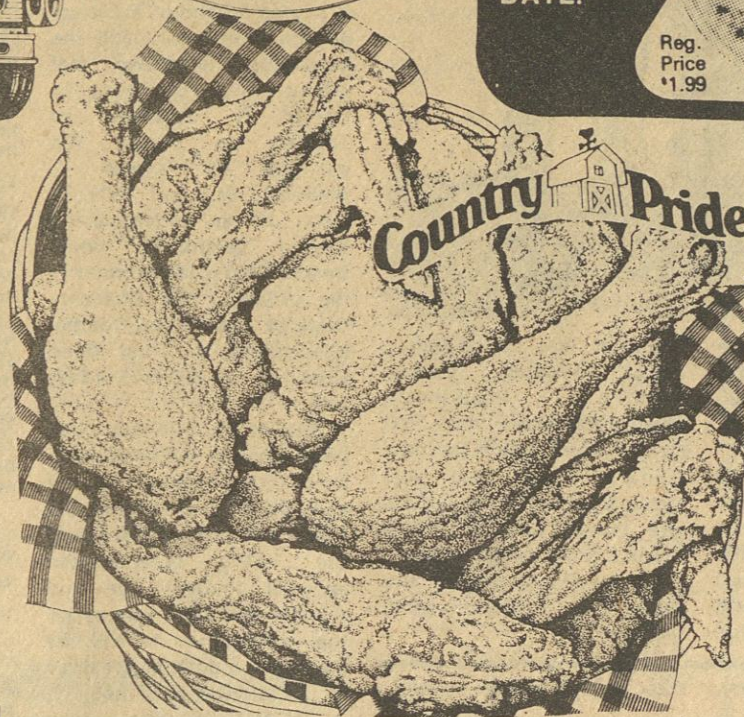

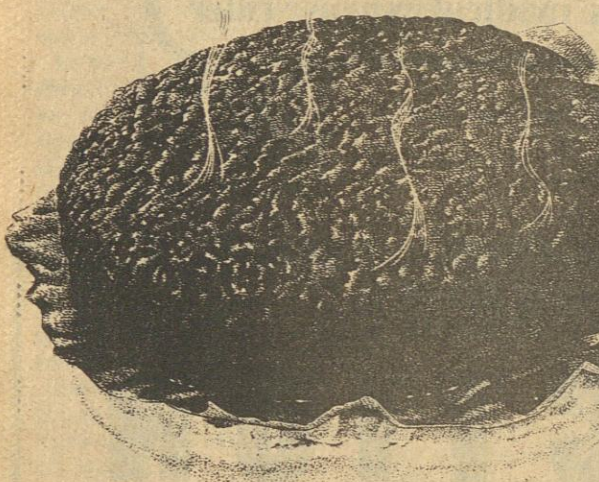

Carpenter Named New Extension Director

Dr. James R. Carpenter has been named director of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, effective January 1, 1982, according to an announcement by Dr. James D. McComas, president of Mississippi State University.

Dr. McComas approved the appointment of the new director on recommendation of Dr. Louis N. Wise, vice president for agriculture, forestry and veterinary medicine. The appointment was approved by the Board of Trustees of the State Institutions of Higher Learning Tuesday. The directorship also includes a federal appointment with the U.S.

Department of Agriculture.

Dr. Carpenter, who has served as associate director of the Extension Service since July of 1973, joined the organization in 1959 as assistant county agent in Leake County. He has also served as associate county agent in Amite County and as a specialist in resource development. In 1965 he was named assistant director of the Extension Service.

A Noxubee County native, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees at Mississippi State University and the doctorate in extension education at Louisiana State University. As associate director, he provided leadership for the \$1.5 by '75 and III by '83 agricultural development programs aimed at increasing the value of agricultural production in the state. He has also provided leadership for upgrading in-service training programs conducted by MCES.

Dr. Carpenter is a member of Alpha Kappa Delta, national honor society; Gamma Sigma Delta, honor society of agriculture; and Epsilon Sigma Phi, national Extension honorary. He is active in the Mississippi State University Alumni Association, the Mississippi Farm Bureau, the Mississippi County Agricultural Agents Association and the First Presbyterian Church of Starkville.

The 48-year-old educator succeeds Dr. W.M. Bost, who retired as director June 30. Dr. Wise has served as acting director of the Extension Service in the interim.

The Extension Service is a cooperative federal, state and county organization with responsibility for providing informal education across the state in the areas of agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H youth work. The organization provides the primary service function of Mississippi State University.

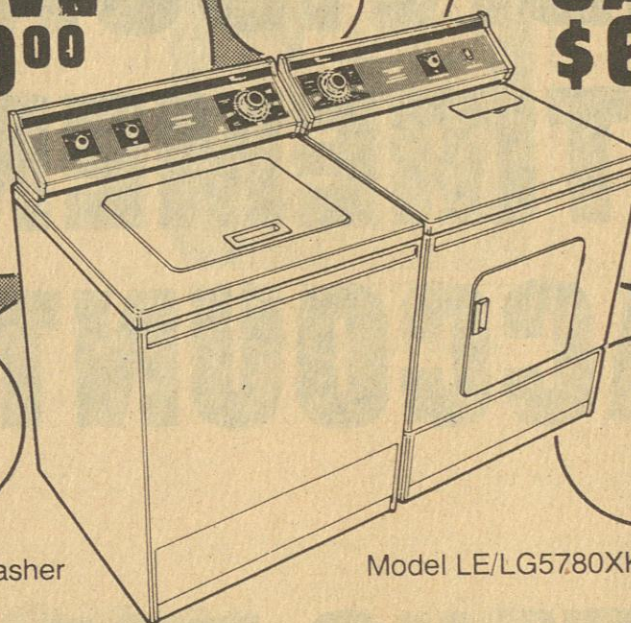

ce man's activities. Wise land use planning and resource development begins with a knowledge of the soil resources available. Soil surveys are based on careful field and laboratory studies of the physical, chemical, and biological properties of the soil. The information is interpreted for use by landowners, conservationists, urban developers, engineers, and others. From interpretations we learn about suitability of soils for farming, homesites, wildlife, woodland, recreation, and other uses.

In cooperation with the Mississippi State Experiment Station, the SCS has mapped more than twenty-seven million acres.

Twenty-seven counties have published reports, six are scheduled for publication and field work has been com-

Your Social Security

Back Payments Limited

It is important for people who plan to apply for Social Security benefits to do so 2 or 3 months before they want benefits to begin, or, at least as soon as possible after they become eligible.

This is because payments for months before the month of application is made are limited by law. The general rules are:

Workers 65 and over, widows, widowers, and parents 62 and over -- Back payments are limited to no more than 6 months, or 62 for widows, widowers, and parents.

Workers under 65 and widows and widowers under 62 -- in general, no payments can be made for months before the month of ap-

plication.

Disabled workers, widows, and widowers -- Back payments can be made for up to 12 months before the month of application, but not before the 6th full month of disability.

People applying for benefits, especially those applying for reduced benefits -- before 65 for workers or

before 62 for survivors -- should apply as soon as possible when they become eligible so they will not miss out on any possible benefit checks.

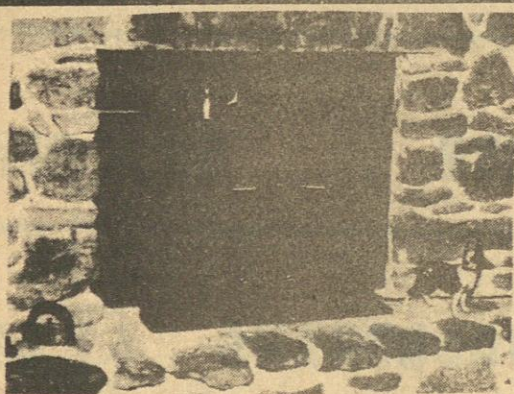
