Resolution Passes House For Completion Of Plant

State Representative Mack
Wadkins, of Iuka, introduced
a resolution to the Mississip-
pi House of Representatives
on Monday, January 25,
asking the Board of Directors
of the Tennessee Valley
Authority to continue the
current Tennessee Valley
Authority Nuclear Plant Con-
struction Program, and in par-
ticular, the Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant in Tishomingo
County, Mississippi. The
concurrent resolution passed
by a vote of 113 to 0 in the
regular session of the 1982
congress. The resolution,
authored by Rep. Wadkins,
reads:

WHEREAS, the Tennessee
Valley Authority is in the
process of constructing a
nuclear energy plant in
Tishomingo County,
Mississippi, in conjunction
with that authority's nuclear
construction program; and
WHEREAS, in accordance
with the suggestion that the
completion of certain unit
reactor systems be deferred,
the Tennessee Valley
Authority has deferred the
completion of a nuclear plant
unit located at Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant to a later date;

and
WHEREAS, deferral of any
additional nuclear plant units
would not be in the public in-
terest since cost figures in-
dicate that it costs as much
to produce electricity with
coal as it does with nuclear
power; and

WHEREAS, at the present
time, the Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant project is ap-
proaching twenty percent
(20%) completion, including
the completion of most of the
construction plant facilities,
major portions of the grading
and excavation required on
the site, and foundation and
structural work on the per-
manent plant buildings; and

WHEREAS, all bridges
authorized to be constructed
across the Tennessee-Tom-
bigbee Waterway are either
completed or under contract
for construction and such
bridges are being financed
from the sale of bonds, pay-
ment thereon being se-
cured in part by certain
payments in lieu of ad
valorem taxes made to the
state and counties in the ser-
vice area by the Tennessee
Valley Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Yellow

Creek Nuclear Plant project is
currently employing ap-
proximately three thousand
(3,000) workers, thirty percent
(30%) of which are Mississip-
pi residents; and

WHEREAS, the monthly
payroll expended for the em-
ployees at the Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant project ap-
proaches Six Million Dollars
(\$6,000,000.00) each month,
upon which amount the State
of Mississippi collects in-
come taxes; and

WHEREAS, the total in-
vestment to date in the
Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant
construction is over One
Billion Dollars
(\$1,000,000,000.00); and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee
Valley Authority nuclear con-
struction program furthers
the economic growth and in-
dustrial development so
essential to Mississippi's
future progress; and

WHEREAS, the Governor
of Mississippi, the Honorable
William F. Winter, opposes
any attempts to decrease the
current level of construction
efforts at the Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi
Legislature has considered
the impact on the state's
economy of the further
deferral of any additional
nuclear plant units now under
construction by the Ten-
nessee Valley Authority, and
urges that the Board of Di-
rectors of the Tennessee Valley
Authority continue the
current Tennessee Valley
Authority nuclear plant con-
struction program and in par-
ticular, the construction un-
derway at the Yellow Creek
Nuclear Plant project in
Tishomingo County,
Mississippi;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT
RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE
OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI,
THE SENATE CONCURRING
THEREIN, that we do hereby
memorialize the Board of
Directors of the Tennessee
Valley Authority to support
the continued construction of
the Yellow Creek Nuclear
Plant project in Tishomingo
County, Mississippi.

BE IT FURTHER
RESOLVED, that a copy of
this resolution be forwarded
to the Board of Directors of
the Tennessee Valley
Authority, President Ronald
W. Reagan, Senator Howard
H. Baker, Jr., of the United
States Senate Committee on
Environment and Public
Works, each member of the
Mississippi Congressional
Delegation, and the Capitol
Press Corps.

Manhunt Finds Escapee And Hostage In Tenn.

A 17-year old juvenile
inmate at the Tishomingo
County Jail, escaped from the
local facility Tuesday after-
noon around 3:00, instigating
an all night manhunt. Accord-
ing to a Tishomingo County
Deputy, the juvenile was await-
ing sentencing on charges of
grand larceny to which he had
pleaded guilty. He had been
housed in the County Jail
since the September term of
Circuit Court.

Search dogs from Parch-

man Prison, along with other
police units from the area,
searched throughout the
night in the Iuka vicinity for
the escapee.

Around 1:00 a.m. Wed-
nesday morning, it was
discovered that a young Iuka
woman had been apparently
kidnapped from her home and
that her car was also missing.
Acting on this new finding,
the escapee, his hostage and
her car were found by the
Memphis Police Department

around 4:00 a.m. Wednesday.
At press-time Tishomingo
County Sheriff Amos Bates
was in Memphis and further
details of the crime were not
available.

County Murder Trial Reset For April Term

A murder trial scheduled
Tuesday in Tishomingo
County Circuit Court has
been continued until the April
term due to an injury to the
defendant, said County
Prosecutor Al Jernigan.

Larry Harris, 34, of
Tuscumbia, Ala., reportedly
fell down a flight of stairs at
the house of a relative Satur-
day. Harris was admitted to
Tishomingo County Hospital
where he has been placed in
traction, Jernigan said.

Harris was charged with
murder in connection with
the fatal shooting of his un-
cle, Robert C. Harris, in
February 1981. The uncle was
killed by shots fired from a
.25-caliber pistol.

Harris was not the only
person scheduled for trial

who will have to wait until the
next term. The county
prosecutor said James Ben-
nett, of Tishomingo, who is
charged with aggravated
assault and armed robbery,
was apparently injured in an
automobile accident in
Muscle Shoals, Ala.

Jernigan said Bennett is
supposed to be in Helen
Keller Memorial Hospital in
Sheffield, Ala. But he said his
injuries have not yet been
verified.

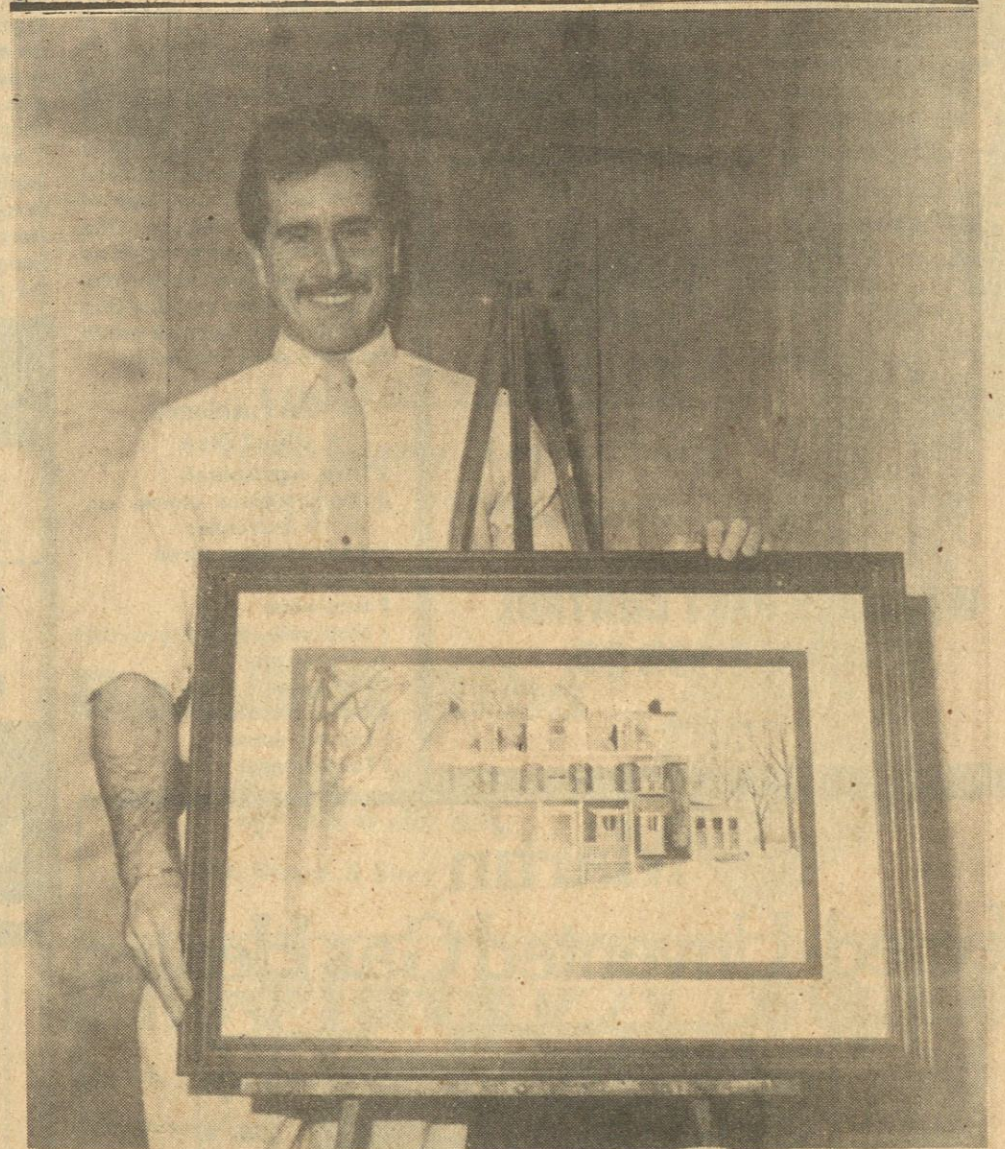
"Obviously the trial will be
continued. But his bond was
forfeited," the prosecutor
said.

However, the trial of Eddie
Wilburn Burns, of
Tishomingo, earlier identified
as Terrell Burns, was
scheduled to begin at 9 a.m.

Tuesday, Jernigan said.
Burns is charged with two
counts of aggravated assault
on a law enforcement officer
and one count of simple
assault on a law enforcement
officer.

Jernigan said the charges
stem from an incident in
which three Tishomingo
County deputies were
allegedly assaulted near
Dennis. One of the deputies
was disarmed in the scuffle
but no shots were fired
during the incident.

Jernigan said defense at-
torneys for Burns declared in
court his name is Eddie in-
stead of Terrell. The
prosecutor said the name will
have to be changed on the in-
dictment, but the trial will be
held as scheduled.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Soup and Stews

Homemade soup can be as versatile as the ingredients you use in it. An economical meal anytime, soup is probably appreciated more in cold weather and when budgets are tight. Leftover meats and vegetables make an entirely new appearance in a pot of hot steaming soup and you've saved on the food budget by using those left-

overs to advantage.

There are many possibilities for homemade soup, from the first cooking of that raw soup bone to the subtle blending of flavors, achieved by adding other foods like vegetables and herbs or even milk and cream. It's the individual use of herbs that makes the taste difference. That's why one soup will be great and other may be just so-so. Keep a container in the freezer to save those leftover vegetables, juices, broth, etc. Check your spice shelf for possible flavors to add to the soup pot.

Make a big batch at one time, then freeze in portion size servings and you'll have

several prepared meals ready for days when there's no time to cook.

You may also choose your soup meal from the grocery shelf, already to partially prepared. There are endless flavors of canned and dehydrated soups as well as frozen soups in the frozen food case. Canned, dehydrated or frozen soups save time in preparation and give variety in selection. Frozen soups have an excellent flavor and require storage at zero degrees until ready to use.

The use of commercially manufactured soups is one method of getting flavor variety with a minimum of time and raw materials. For example: cook a soup bone, celery tops, onion, salt and pepper together in a quart of water for hours. Strain, then add a can of condensed vegetable soup. This will give to the soup the subtle flavor of many herbs as well as a variety of vegetables, with a minimum of food preparation and time.

The variety of canned soups available is impressive. There is also a variation in the amount of built-in service. There's the heat or chill and serve soup, the condensed soup to which you add an equal amount of water or milk and then just heat and serve. New varieties are constantly appearing on the market. By the way, have you tried Cream of Cheddar Cheese Soup for quick, easy to make foolproof cheese sauce?

The dehydrated soups are those from which the water has been removed in a special drying process. They are then hermetically sealed in paper envelopes or in cans with easy open tops. These soups have some distinct advantages such as: long shelf life, can be stored in a small area, and the addition of liquid restores the original flavor -- which is really excellent. Dehydrated soups are the joy of campers and hunters, where weight and space are so important.

If cost is a factor you are considering, the commercially prepared soups will vary in cost per serving -- depending upon the type and whether water or milk is the liquid added. The higher priced ones are usually frozen and have more of the gourmet appeal -- such as Cream of Vichyssoise or Cream of Potato.

Cost of homemade soups? There can be no one answer since family tastes and preferences are so different. But there can be no argument that homemade soups can be very filling and satisfying -- both to the appetite and your pride in seeing your family enjoy something you have created.

A steaming hot bowl of soup served with a simple sandwich or a batch of your favorite crackers and fruit can really take the chill out of cold winter weather. The combinations are endless, so serve soup for lunch real soon or prepare and pour into a wide-mouth thermos bottle for lunch away from home.

Old-Fashioned Beef Stew

- 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 2 lbs. boneless chuck, cut in 1-1/2 inch cubes
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 Clove garlic
- 2 cups water
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 1/2 Tsp. pepper
- 1 Tsp. sugar
- 1 Tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 Tsp. soy sauce
- 1 Tbsp. vinegar

- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 Tsp. paprika
- 1 large bay leaf
- 1 Tsp. Italian seasoning
- Dash of allspice
- 6 carrots, peeled & sliced
- 1 pound small white onions, peeled
- 6 medium potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 1/4 cup cold-water
- 2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

Heat oil in a Dutch oven. Add beef and cook over medium heat about 20 minutes, turning often to brown evenly. Stir in the next 14 ingredients. Cover and simmer 1-1/2 hours, stirring occasionally. Remove bay leaf and garlic. Add carrots, whole onions, and potatoes; cover and simmer 30 minutes longer or until vegetables are done. Gradually add 1/4 cup cold water to flour in a small mixing bowl, mixing well; pour into stew, stirring constantly until gravy thickens. Simmer 5 minutes. Yield 6 to 8 servings.

Income Tax:
Organize & Save

Income taxes -- that's a subject that interests a lot of us in one way or another. And with all the tax changes made in the 1981 Economic Recovery Act, it's a topic that will be gaining in interest as tax filing time nears.

Folks who do a good job of keeping tax records will be in good shape for filing tax returns. If you didn't keep a good set of tax records last year, start now putting together all your receipts on tax deductible items. If you're in business for yourself, you also need to get a handle on your total income.

Several guides are available to keep your tax information together. For farmers, there's Schedule F of Form 1040. Once you have the information rounded up,

put it in some organized form on paper and attach the receipts to the document.

The typical wage earner is supposed to receive a W-2 Form from his employer no later than the last day of January. Other business people have Schedule C of Form 1040 to use as a guide in putting together their deductible expenses that will be used in determining income.

Don't overlook any deductible expense in figuring your income. If you overlook \$1,000 in deductible expenses, it costs you anywhere from \$140 to \$700 in additional taxes, depending on your income tax bracket.

While most taxpayers are required to file tax returns by April 15, it's a little different for farmers. Farmers who file an estimate of their taxes by January 18, using Form 1040-ES have until April 15, to file their final return and make any adjustments in the taxes. Farmers who did not meet the January 18 deadline for filing an estimate must file their final return and pay due taxes by March 1.

USDA Announces Plan For Cheese Distribution Program

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced plans to implement President Reagan's authorization of the release of 30 million pounds of cheese to states for distribution to non-profit organizations for households in need. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service regional offices will respond to states requests for commodities through state distribution agents who customarily handle commodities for schools and institutions. "The Food and Nutrition Service distribution network for commodity programs will be used to the maximum extent possible," Block said. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will ship the cheese in trucks or railroad car lots to central locations serving as delivery points. Charitable, non-profit organizations, including food banks, will make the cheese available at the local level. Churches and other non-profit groups customarily operate food banks. Agencies will be eligible to participate in the cheese distribution program, if they have adequate storage facilities and record-keeping ability as determined by the states. The Food and Nutrition Service has also implemented distribution of cheese and other bonus dairy commodities, non-fat dry milk and butter, to the Title 3 Elderly

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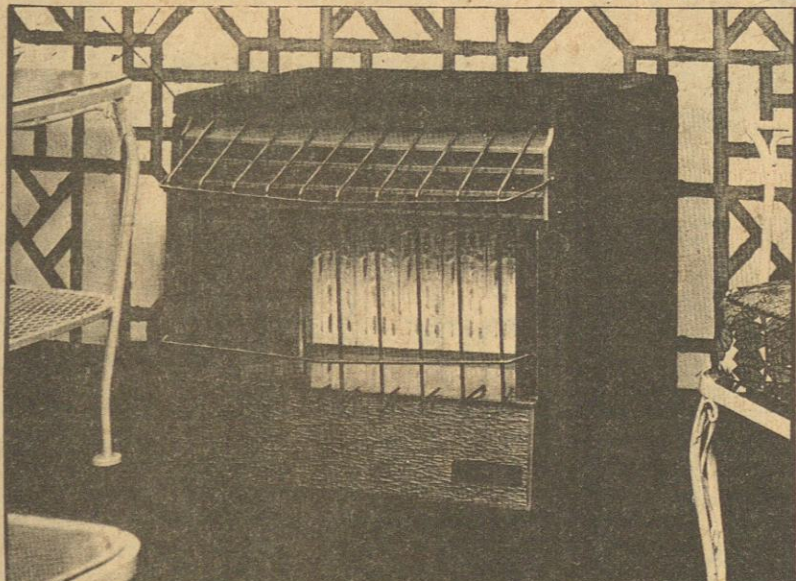

Teacher Workshop

The State Department of Education will, during the months of February through May, sponsor a series of workshops for special education resource teachers and regular classroom teachers. State Superintendent of Education Dr. Charles Holladay said two, three-day sessions will be held in Brookhaven, Clarksdale, Gulfport and Tupelo. Any special education or

Holladay said the workshops will be a continuation of the department's comprehensive system of development for school personnel working with handicapped children.

Museum Shares Secrets With Local Students

The Northeast Mississippi Museum Association (NEMMA) in Corinth is sharing display, research and exhibition techniques with several classes of local school children who are about to do their science fair projects.

b) That the said County, at this time, has outstanding bonded indebtedness in the amount of Five Hundred Forty-One Thousand Dollars (\$541,000);

c) That the amount of bonds now proposed to be issued, when added to the amount of indebtedness outstanding, will not exceed Ten Percent (10%) of the assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that it is necessary and in the public interest that bonds of said County be issued as hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

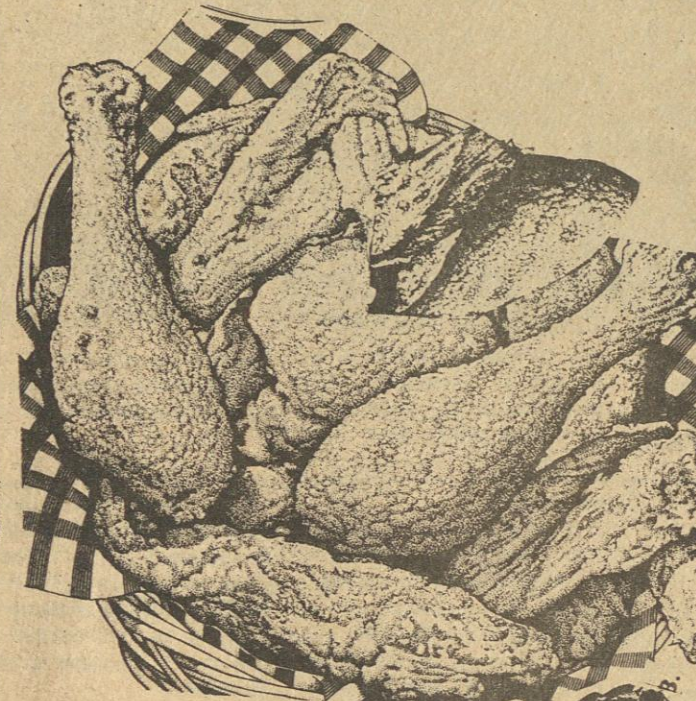

Medicare General Enrollment Period Now On

From January through the end of March is the general enrollment period for the medical insurance part of Medicare. During these three months people who passed up the chance for this protection, or who had it and dropped out, can again sign up. Protection for people who sign up during this period will start next July 1. Medical insurance is a bargain because the Federal Government pays

more than two-thirds of the premium cost from Federal general revenues.

Medical insurance complements the hospital insurance part of Medicare. Hospital insurance helps pay for medically necessary inpatient hospital care and certain followup care in a skilled nursing facility or at home.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services no matter where they are received in the U.S., including surgical services, diagnostic tests and X-rays that are part of the treatment, medical supplies furnished in the doctor's office, services of the office nurse, and drugs that are given as part of the treatment and which cannot be self-administered.

Medical insurance also covers outpatient hospital services received for

diagnosis and treatment of other services and not covered by hospital insurance. Medical insurance pays for 80 percent of proved costs or charges covered services and piles after the patient pays the \$75 annual deductible. More information Medicare medical insurance can be obtained at the Social Security Office.

Keeping your glasses clean and free from scratches will help keep your vision clear. This also pays dividends in making your glasses clearer and longer-lasting. Oil from your skin and dust in the air find your glasses an easy mark. You can clean them with a soft cloth or one of the special lens-cleaning papers. If your lenses are made of plastic, clean them when they're wet to lessen the chance of scratching. Water, with or without soap, can be used as well as lens-cleaning fluid. Whatever method you use, it's a good idea to clean your glasses at least once a day, whether you think they need cleaning or not. When you take your

glasses off, put them in the case or lay them down right side up. Never put them lens side down. When plastic lenses become scratched, they should be replaced. Scratches on plastic or glass lenses tend to weaken them and make them easier to break. Glasses are, in effect, an extension of your eyes. It makes sense to care for them so you can see clearly, sharply and safely as well as extending their length of usefulness.

Do A Visual Presentation

A 4-H visual presentation is a good way to teach someone something you have learned. It's "showing how" while

"telling how". You can actually make or do something step-by-step and have a finished product to show at the end, or you can just "tell how" by talking and showing visuals like charts, graphs, drawings, models, photographs or cut-outs.

By doing a demonstration, you'll learn to gather information about a subject, to organize ideas, to present information visually and verbally, to feel more at ease in front of a group, to help other people learn, to take part in group activities, and to have more confidence, because you'll have done something special.

Select a subject that interests you, one that is of practical value and challenges your ability. Start with something simple and something you can do regularly at home.

Narrow the subject to one main idea or theme. Get specific. Some subjects would take years to cover. You don't have that long.

Select a title that relates to the subject, is fun or catchy, is original, is short, and that suggests the subject without telling the whole story.

THE PLAN

An outline will help you organize your demonstration. List supplies you need (like an easel, charts, posters, equipment), then list what you will say and show, step by step.

Sometimes it helps to plan separately what you'll say and what you'll do. Divide a sheet of paper in half, lengthwise. Label one side "What I'll Say." Label the other side "What I'll Do." As you write what you'll say, you can remind yourself what you'll do.

The outline will have only three main parts: an introduction, the body, and a summary.

INTRODUCTION. Be original and be brief.

BODY OF THE VISUAL PRESENTATION. Show and tell how and why.

SUMMARY. Give the most important points you want your audience or listener to remember when they go home.

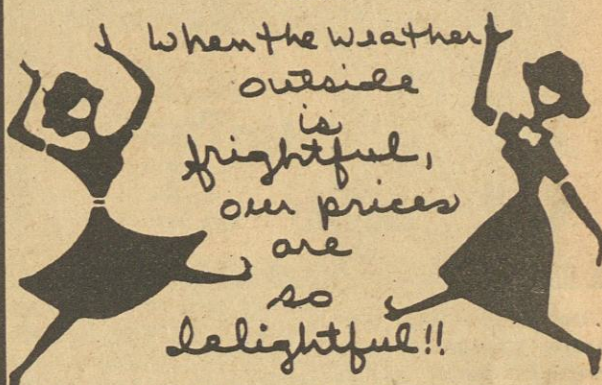

Ice Damaged Trees Need Special Care

Ice damage and freeze injuries to trees and shrubs may be a major concern for many homeowners across the State due to the extremely cold and icy weather we have experienced this winter, says Mississippi Forestry Commission Urban Forester Larry Frasier.

Freeze injuries are caused by a sudden decrease in temperature or late spring freezes. Dry conditions during periods of very low temperature may add to the problem. "Usually, the first sign of freeze injury is a scorched appearance of leaves," Frasier explains. "After a few weeks, branches that have been completely killed will be distinguishable."

Frasier recommends that the dead branches be pruned before early spring if possible. Broken or damaged limbs are tell-tale signs of damage resulting from ice or wind storms. These limbs should also be carefully pruned. "Always apply a wound dressing after pruning to prevent secondary organisms (fungi, insects) from entering the wound and causing more problems," the forester reminds.
