### Screening Unit To Visit County Soon

Elderly persons living in isolated portions of Northeast Mississippi who find it difficult to reach health screening facilities soon will have a solution to their problem.

A mobile unit, equipped to provide basic health screening activities such as blood pressure, eye and diabetes tests, will travel from community to community in Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo counties beginning February 11, in Booneville.

"Approximately 20,300 age 65 and older Mississippians live in these six counties, and 186 of these individuals have incomes below the federal poverty level," said Keyes, project coordinator with the Mississippi Council on Aging.

"This new project is another example of the state, community and private sector working together to meet a pressing need."

The project will be conducted by the Mississippi Council on Aging, a division of the Governor's Office of Federal-State Programs, in cooperation with the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA), the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District (NM-PDD) and the State Board of Health.

TVA has granted \$50,000 for purchasing the unit and some of its equipment. NM-PDD has allocated \$39,760 to cover operating expenses and additional equipment as needed, and the Board of Health has provided \$14,000 for medical personnel salary and travel expenses. Council on Aging funds have been provided by the Title 3-B Older Americans Act.

In addition to providing basic health screening activities, the mobile unit will offer educational services on health, nutrition and consumer subjects, particularly those related to energy conservation.

Consisting of a 15-passenger van with a

wheelchair lift and a 25-foot mobile trailer, the unit will be manned by a registered nurse and a licensed practical nurse.

Local health departments, cooperative extension offices, area agencies on aging and other local agencies will assist in coordinating the project. As the mobile unit is relocated from community to community, local civic clubs, churches and other organizations will be called upon to provide volunteer assistance.

Following an individual's visit to the mobile unit, referrals will be made to local service providers to ensure that participants obtain necessary social and follow-up medical services. Individuals also will be referred to their family physicians for treatment indicated by the screening.

"Elderly residents in the counties will be notified when the mobile unit will be in their areas," said Keyes.

### South Central Bell Pays County Taxes

T.H. Bailey, District Manager for South Central Bell, presented a check for \$131,494 to Tishomingo County for payment of 1981 ad valorem taxes. This was an increase of about \$15,100 over last year's payment. "The tax payment helps support schools, police and fire protection and other services that Tishomingo County provides," Bailey said.

It's expected South Central Bell will pay approximately \$24 million to Mississippi municipalities and counties for 1981 ad valorem taxes. These payments are part of an estimated \$53.8 million tax bill that will be paid by the telephone company to Mississippi and its counties and municipalities for 1981 and do not include income, social security and excise taxes paid to the Federal government.

## Northeast To Offer Engineering Course

Northeast Junior College will offer an eight-week course in the fundamentals of engineering, beginning Monday, February 15, at 6:00 p.m. in Room 5 of Wright Hall on the Northeast campus. The fee for this course is \$50.

Designed as a review for the first part (EIT) of the Professional Engineers' Examination, the class will meet one night per week for three hours each night. Because the class is structured as a review for degreed or equivalently experienced engineers, all participants should have an adequate engineering background.

Each class session will consist of two 30-minute videotaped presentations, made by a licensed engineering professional in his area of specialty. Additional time will be given to discussion of concepts covered in readings and video programs for expansion and clarification of ideas and problem-solving techniques.

Course topics include mathematics, nucleonics and wave phenomena, chemistry, statics, dynamics, mechanics of materials, fluid mechanics, thermodynamics and heat transfer, electrical theory, materials, science and engineering economics, all of which are covered in the Professional Engineers' Examination.

Upon completion of the course, participants will be awarded Continuing Education Units (CEU's) and a certificate for 30 contact hours from Northeast Mississippi Junior College.

### Three Arrested In Robbery

Three men have been arrested in connection with a robbery, which took place at the Cook Piano Company, located on Hwy. 25 South of Belmont, on Sunday morning, January 24th.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Amos Bates, two Belmont men and one Itawamba County man were charged with breaking and entering the establishment and taking some \$1,400 worth of shop equipment.

Acting on a tip, the Sheriff's Office recovered all of the stolen merchandise on February 2, and placed the three under arrest. They were placed on \$8,000 bond each. Two of the men are being held in the Tishomingo County Jail, and one man is out on bond, awaiting action of the Grand Jury.

## Free Cheese To Be Distributed In County

Several needy families throughout Tishomingo County will be recipients of processed cheese when the county receives its share of the surplus cheese that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is giving to needy families across the country.

Since the supply is limited, only those households receiving food stamps will be eligible to participate in the program.

Mississippi's allotment of the cheese provided will be 334,000 pounds, while Tishomingo County's share will be 60 cases, or 1800

pounds. According to Mrs. Margaret June Riley, Director of the Tishomingo County Welfare Department, each case contains six five-pound blocks of cheese. This, in turn, means that only 360 blocks will be available in Tishomingo, with a limit of one block per household. She added that a five pound block cannot be broken.

Unfortunately, however, the number of households in the county which receive food stamps exceeds the amount of cheese that will be available. Approximately 926

households in the county were recipients of food stamps during the month of January. This means that some 566 families receiving food stamps will not receive any cheese.

As a result, it will be available on a "first come, first serve" basis, she added.

The North Mississippi Planning and Development Committee will pick up the cheese at Camp Shelby between February 15 and March 1 for distribution to the six-county area. Upon arrival in Booneville, the County Board of Supervisors will pick up Tishomingo's portion and bring it to Iuka.

According to Mrs. Riley, it now appears that the cheese will be distributed at the Tishomingo County Courthouse on Wednesday, February 17th.

## Tree Planting Week Underway In County

Tishomingo County will be among counties across the state focusing attention on the importance of trees February 8-12, when Tree Planting Week in Mississippi is celebrated.

Celebrated in conjunction with Arbor Day on Friday, February 12, Tree Planting Week is sponsored statewide by the Mississippi Association of Conservation Districts in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service, Mississippi Forestry Commission, and other conservation-minded groups.

According to Tishomingo County Forester, Brendix Glasgow, the primary purpose of the annual celebration is to develop a keener awareness among both children and adults of the economic and environmental importance of trees in the state.

Glasgow said several tree planting ceremonies will be held in the county but the main thrust of the week's celebration will be in connection with school activities.

He noted that any school, group or individual desiring information or assistance in conducting tree planting ceremonies may contact the local Mississippi Forestry Commission or Soil Conservation Service Office.

Last year during Tree Planting Week more than half a million trees were distributed for planting on homesites, school grounds, parks, roadsides, cemeteries and other such places. Some 66,000 students at 436 schools participated in tree planting ceremonies.

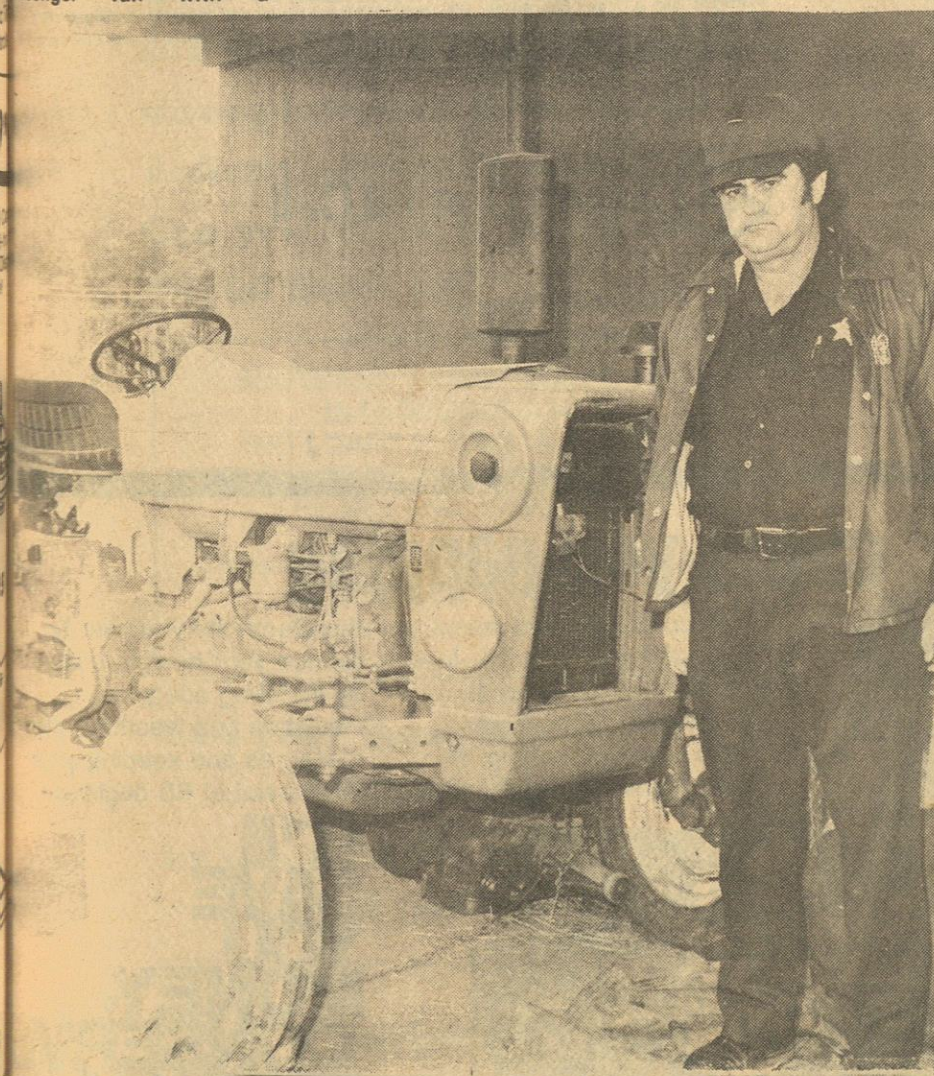

### Broken Glass

Armstrong Chrysler Dodge, Inc., located on Hwy. 25 South, Iuka, was bombarded with gunshot early Thursday morning, February 4, around 1:15 a.m. All the front glass was shot out and three vehicles were damaged, by a

12 gauge shotgun, said Sheriff Amos Bates. Bates told The News that six 3" magnum buckshot hulls were found on the premises, and it appeared that the shots were fired from across the road near the garbage dumpsters. According to a nearby neighbor,

who heard the firing, he estimated that around 8 to 10 shots were fired rapidly indicating more than one shotgun. One man has been questioned in connection with the shooting, but it is still under investigation by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Using Dry Beans

Dry beans cannot be placed in the classification of "fast foods" unless the canned form is used. For dry beans to keep so well, the beans are dried to a moisture content of about 10 percent. This moisture must be replaced when the beans are used. This is why it takes so long to soak and cook dry

beans. The microwave oven can be used to speed the process of soaking and cooking dry beans and to reduce the time involved from overnight or five hours to less than two hours.

The general instructions for soaking and cooking dry beans by microwave are: Wash and sort a pound of dry beans. Place in a five-quart casserole along with any seasonings called for in the recipe. Soak by microwaving at full power for 8-10 minutes or until boiling. Cover with plastic wrap and casserole lid.

Let stand one hour, still covered. Stir several times

and add hot water as needed to keep beans covered. Cook at full power once again for 8-10 minutes or until boiling. Then reduce power level to 50 percent and cook 15-20 minutes or until beans are tender.

Dry beans may be soaked overnight, then cooked at 50 percent power for 15-20 minutes. Cooking time will depend on the wattage rating of your microwave oven, the amount of electricity coming into your kitchen, and the age of the dry beans. Older beans tend to take more time to cook.

Now you are ready to use the beans in the way you normally would.

Dry beans need to be soaked, or rehydrated, in water to replace the moisture lost in drying. A good rule is to use two to three cups of water for each cup of dry beans.

After soaking, dry beans must be cooked. Plan on at least two hours of simmering for each pound of soaked beans.

A pound of dry beans measures about two cups. Beans triple in volume when soaked and cooked. So a cup of dry beans yields three cups, and a pound of dry beans yields six cups.

Dry beans will keep almost indefinitely when stored in their commercial package or in a tightly-covered container. Do not keep dry beans in the refrigerator. Cooked beans can be covered and kept in the refrigerator for four to five days. Cooked beans can be frozen in covered containers and stored at zero degrees F for up to six months.

If beans foam when you cook them, add a tablespoon of butter, margarine or oil. Foaming will stop and the flavor will not be altered.

Sometimes the skins of beans will burst when they are being cooked. This doesn't matter if you are making bean soup, but beans for salad should be nice and whole. Try simmering the beans more gently. Stir them carefully now and then to prevent sticking.

Do you live in a hard water area? Do you live in a high altitude area? Increase both the soaking and cooking times to get tender beans.

Beans are cooked easily in a crockery cooker simply by following the manufacturer's suggestions. Or, bring the beans to a boil, simmer for 10 minutes, then place in the cooker. Add water, cover and cook on low for 12 hours. After this, drain the beans, add any seasonings for baked beans, cover and cook on low again for another six hours. A time management tip: Do the first cooking overnight. Then the baked beans will be ready for supper the next day.

### Blueberry Hot Bread

2 eggs  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 cup milk  
1/4 cup melted butter  
3 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
2 cups blueberries (fresh or frozen without syrup)

Beat together eggs and sugar, until mixture loses its granular consistency. Add milk and melted butter. Sift together flour, salt, and baking powder; add to the liquid ingredients. Mix until just combined. Do not try to get it smooth. Toss blueberries in a little flour to keep them from sinking to the bottom of the bread. Pour into 2 small, very well greased

### Success Includes Marketing

Most of us in farming take a lot of pride in the production end of our business. But often it's a different story when it comes to selling. We're too busy worrying about big yields and efficiency to spend much time on the marketing end.

If you do want to change your luck on the pricing end, chances are you probably can. But it takes as much effort on your part as it does in getting those high crop yields and superior feed efficiencies. There's no time like the present to start.

We all have some kind of goal in farming. Why not set another goal this winter? Learn something about marketing which you can apply in a practical way that you didn't know before. Attend a seminar, or read a book or pamphlet you've never seen before.

Learn how the futures market works, even if you never plan to use it. It's too important a part of the price discovery process to overlook. Look closely at forward pricing as a way to eliminate some of the price risk of farming.

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service is holding several marketing seminars in February and March dealing with the futures market, forward pricing and price outlook. If you're interested in attending one in our area, contact the County Extension Office.

### It Pays To Fertilize

You have to look hard to find something that doesn't go up in price from year to year. Fertilizer, unfortunately, is one thing that usually does. But even though prices are up, I would advise against cutting back on the nutrients

you need for top yields.

Fertilizer prices are up 5 to 10 percent from last spring. But that's no reason to skimp. For every \$1 you put in fertilizer, you get \$3 to \$6 in return, when it's used according to soil test recommendations. Not too many investments give you this kind of return.

Arrange now for your fertilizer needs so you can get the analysis recommended by soil test. You may be able to cut total nitrogen needs by using split applications instead of applying it all before planting. If animal waste is available and priced right, don't hesitate to use it for some of your needs.

## ASCS Farm News

### ASCS Official Cites Farm Program Details

Major provisions of the 1982 farm program were announced recently by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block at an Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Conference in Kansas City, MO. Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, stated that an acreage reduction will be in effect for wheat, corn, oats, barley, grain sorghum, upland cotton and rice.

"Acreage reductions of these crops, with the higher loan rates also announced by Secretary Block, will help strengthen farm prices and reduce supplies," he said.

Program regulations call for a 15 percent reduction of wheat, cotton, and rice acres, and a 10 percent reduction of feed grain acres. "To be eligible for loans and target price protection, farmers must sign up and comply with program requirements," South said.

The target price for 1982 wheat will be \$4.05 per bushel. Loan rates will be \$3.55 per bushel for grain placed under loan.

Feed grain program participants will receive per-bushel target prices of \$2.70 for corn, \$2.60 for sorghum and barley, and \$1.50 for oats. The loan rates per bushel are: corn, \$2.55; sorghum, \$2.42; barley, \$2.08; and oats, \$1.31. According to South, the

constructing, reconstructing, and repairing roads, highways, and bridges in said County.

SECTION 2. If Twenty Per Centum (20%), or fifteen Hundred (1,500), whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall file a written protest against the issuance of said bonds, on or before the date aforesaid, then an election on the question of the issuance of said bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then said bonds shall be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof.

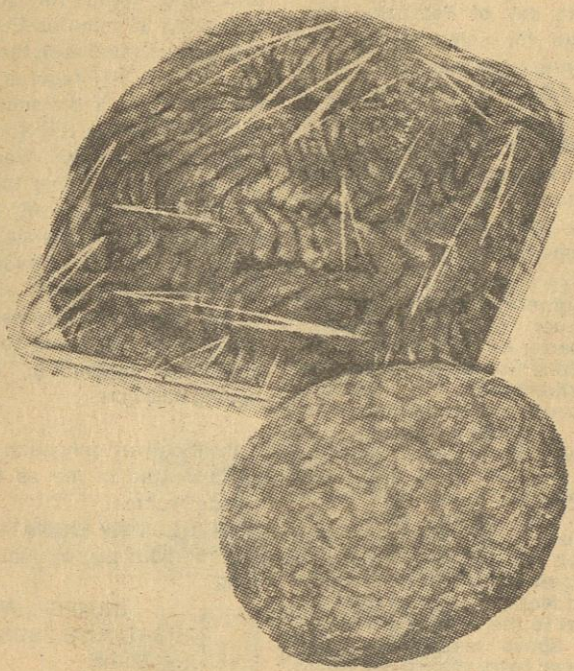

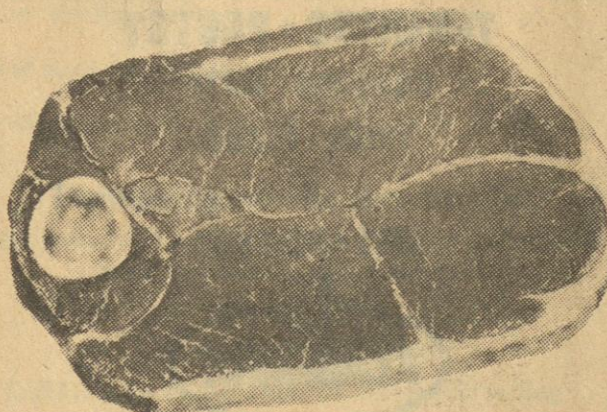

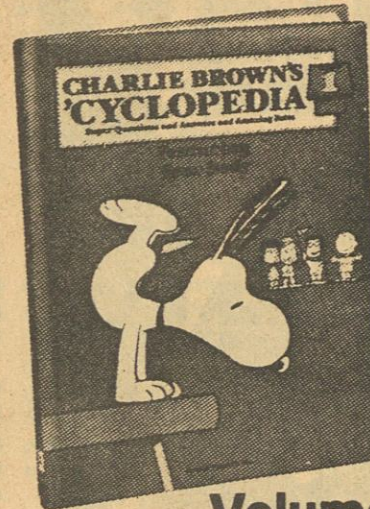

### The Job Is There

In a recent survey by the English IV class of Tishomingo High School, the employers in Tishomingo County had little information on their policy for hiring a handicapped person. They answered all questions with "We're an Equal Opportunity Employer." They often stated that handicapped persons were not currently working. From this, I was lead to believe that their "Equal Opportunity Employment" was in name only.

Finding the right job for the handicapped person can sometimes be difficult. Although there are several types of jobs in most factories that a handicapped person might do, the employer does not take the time to place him.

Is placement worth the effort? The answer is yes. If a handicapped person is employed his production statistics are as high and sometimes higher than that of a non-handicapped person. The job gives the handicapped person a feeling of usefulness and a place in society which is very important to him. In addition, the job is also his means of providing for himself and his family without being dependent on other family members or the government.

Some companies have special jobs and special training programs open for the handicapped. They train the worker and place him in a

job which best suits him. Although, there are several companies that do this, there are not enough. If every employer in the community would give the handicapped person an equal chance at an already existing job there would be little need for these special programs.

For five minutes put yourself in a handicaps position. Stop up your ears, watch the television, and tell me what is happening. You can not because you are shut off from an important part of your understanding ability. This is only a game to you, yet for millions of handicapped persons it is a tragic problem they face daily and they must find ways of overcoming their handicap.

A disabled Veteran served actively for 17 years as an United States Postmaster with phlebitis legs and feet. The disease is an inflammation of the veins and is often very painful. He kept this from interfering with his job and provided for his family. He was given the chance to prove himself and he did.

Handicaps are often more of the mind than of the body. If one believes he can accomplish something, and he applies himself, he will usually succeed. But the street is two way, while the handicapped person tries to succeed, the employer must also give him an equal opportunity to obtain a job.

United's share of the new Canadian gas - and Alaskan gas when it becomes available - will be exchanged in the Mid-West for gas closer to the Gulf South.

It seems strange to be bringing Canadian and Alaskan gas to Louisiana. But this costly and complex project is one of the many things United is doing to keep the gas flowing to its customers.

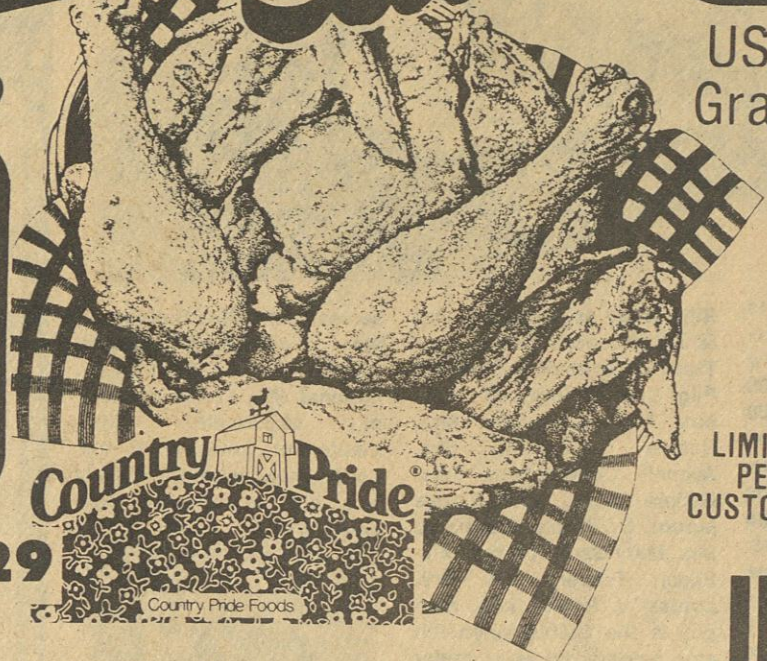

# INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS

IRA's should certainly be considered in planning your financial future, and listed below are some of the most frequently asked questions with appropriate answers about IRA's.

### 1. What is an IRA?

An Individual Retirement Account (IRA) at Iuka Guaranty Bank is just what the name implies: a savings account designed for retirement income - along with tax deductions that every individual wage-earner can use today.

Valentine's Day is  
celebrated on February 14th.  
It is not a business or bank  
holiday. Schools and  
businesses remain open as  
usual. But during the weeks  
before the festival merchants  
sell Valentines, and  
decorations for parties.  
School children like to give  
Valentines to their friends  
and loved ones. There's one  
special for teacher. In early  
school days we would make a  
big box and decorate it pretty  
and all children put their  
names on the Valentines and  
dropped them in the box. It  
would almost take the 1/2 day  
to read the names on the cards.  
At first the cards were  
made from any kind of fancy  
paper. The most were made  
from sample wall paper  
books.

Historians disagree about  
the identity of St. Valentine.  
our St. Valentine was a priest  
who lived in Rome during the  
200's under Emperor  
Claudius II. The Romans  
killed him for aiding per-  
secuted Christians. About  
270, the Romans beheaded  
him on Palentine Hill. Many  
years later the Christians  
named a gate in Rome St.  
Valentine. St. Valentine's  
remains are buried in the  
church of St. Proxodes in  
Rome.

In the United States, Valen-  
tine's Day became popular in  
the 1800's. At the time of the  
Civil War, a writer in a  
magazine of 1863 wrote, "In-  
deed with the exception of  
Christmas there is no festival  
throughout the world which is  
invested with half the interest  
belonging to this cherished  
anniversary." Many Valen-  
tines of that period were hand  
painted and many cost  
\$10.00. These Valentines are  
valued for their decorative  
qualities and are now collec-  
tor's items.

There are Valentines of all  
shapes, and funny as well as  
sentimental verses - even  
candy hearts with love written  
on them. In the early and  
middle period of the 1900's  
many sentimental songs were  
learned in schools -

Valentine! Valentine!  
Red and blue -  
Valentine! Valentine!  
I love you!

One red Valentine, two red  
Valentines, three red Valen-  
tines four - We'll cut and cut  
and paste and paste and then  
make 20 more.

### MACULAR DEGENERATION

The macula is a small area at the back of the eye that's responsible for fine or distinct vision. When the macula degenerates, there's a loss of central vision. You can't see things directly as well as you used to. All you get is a blur.

Your side vision or ability to see clearly around an object may still be good. But the object itself is out of focus.

Macular degeneration is one of the major causes of visual disability among older people. It's the result of damage to the blood vessels that nourish the retina, the nerve network at the back of the eye that sends images to the

brain. But, help may be available. If the condition is treated early enough, you may benefit from photocoagulation. This procedure, an intense beam of light from a laser is used to seal off or "coagulate" the affected blood vessels.
