Teachers Plan Rally In Support Of Education

Teachers from Tishomingo County are expected to take part in a "Rally for Education" Saturday, February 27, at the Tishomingo County Courthouse. The Tishomingo County rally is part of a statewide activity planned by the Mississippi Association of Educators, the largest teachers organization in the state. Rallies are planned in every county of the state on February 27th.

"We want everyone who is

interested in the future of education in Mississippi to be with us on Saturday. We have kept silent too long about the legislature's failure to provide adequate education for the children of Mississippi," said Steve Cain, President, Tishomingo County Educational Association. Teachers throughout the state have expressed anger and dismay over the legislature's failure to take positive actions on salary increases, kindergarten, and

compulsory attendance. "We won't just complain among ourselves about the problems. We will begin at this rally to take steps to correct the dismal state of public education in Mississippi," commented Mr. Cain.

The Mississippi Legislature recently defeated plans to establish state-funded kindergartens and to strengthen the school attendance law. Many think that there is little hope of passage

of even a 3% salary increase for teachers.

"The Mississippi Legislature has insulted all teachers by proposing a 3% increase and then even threatening to take that away to create a cash reserve," said Mr. Cain.

The Mississippi Legislature is scheduled to be in session until April 4th. Salary increases and other education legislation must be passed prior to that date.

TVA Board To Make Decision On Continuing Nuclear Plant Work

TVA board members will decide for themselves whether to halt construction on three nuclear reactors instead of leaving the responsibility up to General Manager Bill Willis, agency officials said Monday.

Until Monday TVA officials said Willis would decide whether work would continue or be stopped on two reactors at the Hartsville Nuclear Plant in middle Tennessee and the lone reactor at Yellow Creek facility in Northeast Mississippi.

If board members disagreed with Willis'

decision, they could veto it and make their own recommendation.

But TVA Information Director Craven Crowell said board members have now agreed to make the decision by themselves.

Crowell said it was not certain when the board will decide whether to stop work on the reactors for savings of \$8.2 billion or continue construction for the sake of 4,000 jobs. Some \$2.1 billion has already been invested at the plants.

Crowell said the decision could come at the agency's

next scheduled board meeting March 4, in Knoxville, or the board could call a special meeting.

The spokesman said TVA Chairman Charles Dean and Directors David Freeman and Richard Freeman would decide the fate of the nation's largest nuclear construction

program instead of Willis because "this way you would have to have it at a board meeting instead of at a press conference."

"I think people expect the board to make the decision," said Crowell. "It will now be a staff recommendation to the board."

Local Head Start Pre-Registration

Mississippi Action For Progress, Inc. will pre-register children at your local Head Start Center: March 1 - April 7, 1982, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.; April 7-8, 1982, from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Children registered at this time will be screened by your local County Council for recommendation of enrollment when centers re-open in August, 1982.

The eligibility criteria for enrollment are children ages 3, 4, and 5 years with family income below poverty and/or on welfare. Parents of children in this age group with handicapping conditions are encouraged to register their handicapped children. Handicapped children are defined as those who are mentally retarded, hard of

hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, crippled, or other health impaired children who by reason thereof require special education and related services.

Parents desiring to pre-register their children are asked to go to the closest center within their community for registration. Parents are asked to carry a certified copy of their child's birth certificate, Medicaid card (if on welfare), immunization card and proof of income, such as W-2 Form, or Income Tax Return.

TVA To Modify Loans For Weatherization

TVA and participating power distributors, in an effort to control costs, will reduce the amount of money consumers may borrow for home weatherization and heat pumps beginning April 1, 1982.

The total maximum loan amount for a combined home weatherization and heat pump loan will be \$5,000 per residence. The interest-free weatherization loan will be limited to \$1,200 per residence. A maximum of \$3,800 will be available for heat pump loans; however, this amount will be less if the consumer has a previous weatherization loan that exceeds \$1,200.

"We're making these

changes with some reluctance," said TVA Manager of Power Hugh Parris. "These programs have been very successful and offer significant savings for participating consumers. But the reductions are necessary to help control program costs which ultimately affect all TVA ratepayers."

"Even with these reduced loan amounts, the majority of participating consumers will still be able to use the programs to finance all of their weatherization and heat pump expenses," Parris added.

The new limitations will not apply in those cases where the work to be financed has

been completed before April 1. Consumers who have received a survey, but for reasons beyond their control are unable to complete the work before April 1, should notify their local power distributor in writing if they wish to obtain an extension of this time limit.

Before receiving a loan, consumers must first get a free home energy survey to identify the areas where weatherization is needed. The survey and the loan are part of TVA's Home Insulation Program, which was initiated in 1977.

The Home Insulation Program is jointly conducted by TVA and the 160

distributors of TVA power. Nearly 500,000 homes have received free home energy surveys through this program, and over 250,000 consumers have received loans.

The heat pump loans are part of TVA's Heat Pump Financing Plan which began in 1978. Offered by 127 local distributors, this program has provided low-interest loans for more than 15,000 heat pumps. Consumers are required to have adequate weatherization, or be in the process of weatherizing, to qualify for a heat pump loan.

By 1990, the two programs are expected to save about 2.8 billion kilowatt-hours annually. By that time, the programs will also save consumers an estimated \$115 million a year at today's electric rates and will defer the need for approximately 1,170 megawatts of new capacity.

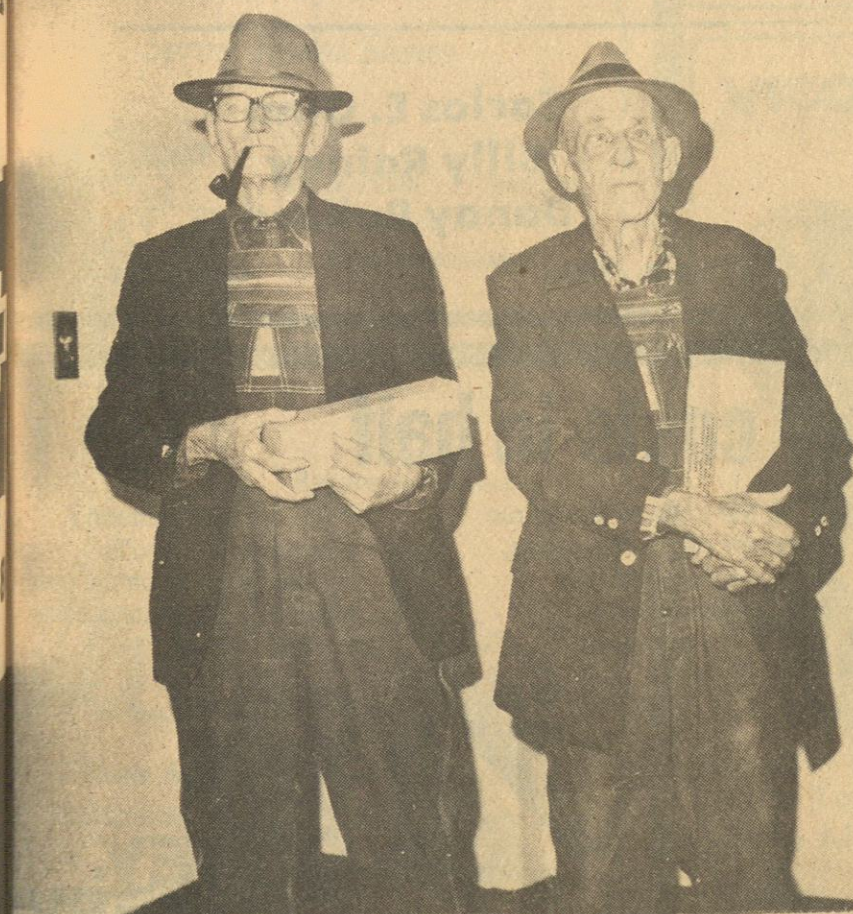
120 Year Old Home Destroyed By Fire

They received the call at 10:00 p.m. Friday night, and both fire trucks responded to the call. Chief Whitaker said when they arrived the back bedroom of the house was on fire. They fought the fire for

several hours until it was completely out, but around 3:00 a.m. Saturday morning the department received another call that the house was burning again. Chief Whitaker said when they arrived the flames were completely out of control. The main telephone cable for the north part of Iuka ran through

the Thomason's yard and it also burned, which was the cause for loss of phone service for almost a day and a half. This 120 year old structure was built and lived in by Mrs. Ida Hamilton, and was later the home of Mrs. Hamilton's daughter and her family, Mr. and Mrs. Bunyon Skinner.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Don't Waste Dollars - Grow A Home Garden

Try something new in '82. If you've been planting the same old vegetable varieties year after year, you are no doubt missing the advantages of earliness, high yields, and disease resistance that characterize many of the newer vegetable varieties. Check the mail order seed

catalogs, many of which are available just for the asking. You'll find many of the newer varieties singled out to catch your attention.

All-America Selections for 1982 are Peter Pan hybrid bush scallop squash and Jersey Golden bush acorn squash.

As you start the new year, remember:

- * Gardening costs, but it pays big dividends.
- * Fresh is best, especially when home grown.
- * Don't overplant.
- * Put your garden where you can water it.

Gardening activity is at its lowest during January and

February. Use this time to.

- * Plan your garden for spring, summer, and fall.
- * Obtain your seed for spring and fall.
- * Soil test for lime and fertilizer needs.
- * Start broccoli in the cold frame.

The first vegetables to plant are Irish potatoes, English peas, onion plants, lettuce, leafy greens, and spinach. Next come beets, carrots, and cabbage. Be sure to have the seeds on hand when you need them.

Purchase 10 pounds of seed Irish potatoes for every 100 feet of row. Cut seed pieces to weigh 1 1/2 to 2 ounces several days before planting, and hold at 50 to 70 degrees to promote sprouting and healing. Fresh-cut seed planted in cold soil may rot with fusarium seed piece decay. There are red-skinned and brown-skinned varieties; all have white flesh. Red varieties, good for boiling, are Red Pontiac, Red LaSoda, and Norland. Brown varieties, good for chipping, frying, and baking, are La Chipper and Norchip.

One of the best new, sweet corns that appeared last year was Funk's Sweet G-90. It is bicolor corn with mid-season maturity and is excellent for boiling. Seed should be widely available locally.

Fertilize your asparagus bed with 2 pounds of 6-8-8 fertilizer per 100 square feet. If you haven't cut back the dead fern, do so before applying fertilizer.

English and Sugar Snap peas need early planting to be productive. The soil temperature need be only 45 degrees for germination. Plant seed 1 inch deep and 1 inch apart. Varieties are Thomas Laxton, Green Arrow, and Sugar Snap.

Set onion transplants at least 2 to 3 inches apart for bulb onions. Beware of plants with dry roots and yellow, wilted leaves.

When purchasing cabbage and broccoli plants avoid plants that are wilted and have yellow leaves and woody stems. Broccoli that shows a small bud or head at purchase won't produce.

You and your family members each eat over 300 pounds of vegetables every year. You can grow most of these if you'll make plans now to do it.

Salisbury Steak Deluxe
1 (10 3/4 oz.) can of mushroom soup, undiluted
1 tsp. prepared mustard
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. prepared horseradish
1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 tsp. salt
Dash of pepper
1/2 cup water
2 tbsp. chopped parsley

Combine soup, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, and horseradish; blend well and set aside. Combine beef, egg, bread crumbs, onion, salt, pepper, and 1/4 cup soup mixture. Shape into 6 patties; brown in skillet. Drain drippings from pan. Combine remaining soup mixture, 1/2 cup water, and parsley; pour over patties. Cook over low heat 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Yield: 6 servings.

County Agent's Notes

Transplant Now, Enjoy Later

Remember those luscious plums and peaches your neighbor enjoyed last summer while you watched and wished? You, too, can have these delicacies, and other, by transplanting young fruit trees now.

You may have to wait two to three years to enjoy the first fruits, but it's well worth the wait. You should transplant as soon as possible so the young trees can establish a root system before hot, dry weather.

First, select healthy trees from a reputable nursery. Dig a hole large enough and deep enough to set the tree in without bending or crowding the roots. Prune roots of the plants only if it is needed to remove damaged, dead or extra long roots.

Place some loose topsoil in the bottom of the hole. Set the tree upright in the hole at the depth it was growing in the nursery. Then fill the hole about two-thirds full with good topsoil. Finish filling the hole with water to pack the soil, then finish with more soil after the water soaks in. Don't apply fertilizer at planting, but you will need to fertilize later.

After transplanting, stake and tie the tree, wrap the trunk and mulch under the

tree with two to three inches of organic mulch to ensure a better chance of survival.

Young trees need plenty of care to reach fruit-bearing age. Be sure to provide plenty of water in the summer. For a list of recommended practices for young trees, including fertilizing, watering, pruning and pest control schedules, contact the County Extension Office.

Prepare Garden Space

The first hint of warm weather brings out the gardening urge for those with the green thumb inclination. How well you prepare before planting time may have a lot to do with success at harvesting.

A good gardener starts early by selecting the garden location. Pick an area that will receive full sunlight and one that is near a water source. Cut back bushes, etc., that will interfere with the garden's ability to receive sunlight.

When considering what to plant, look at available garden space, family likes and dislikes, freezing and canning needs, and your gardening ability. Don't waste time and money by planting more than you can use or maintain.

1981 Crop Upland Cotton Producers To Receive Deficiency Payments

Eligible upland cotton farmers soon will receive an estimated \$530 million in deficiency payments on their 1981 crop, according to Everett Rank, Administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Deficiency payments are required under the 1981 upland cotton program because the average market price received by farmers during the 1981 calendar year was below the established target price of 70.87 cents per pound. The 1981 national weighted average market price for upland cotton was 63.2 cents per pound; therefore, eligible producers will be paid 7.67 cents per pound for their 1981 crop. Deficiency payments will be based on 1981 cotton planted acreage times the payment yield for each farm as determined by ASCS. The 1981 upland cotton crop totaled about 15.6 million bales or 7,509 million pounds. Deficiency payment will be made to upland cotton farmers who reported their 1981 crop acreage and filed an ap-

plication for payment with their local ASCS Office. Rank said the payment checks will be issued through local ASCS Offices as soon as possible. The final 1981 upland cotton national program acreage is 12.8 million acres and represents the number of acres of a crop needed to meet estimated demand and assure desirable levels, Rank said. The allocation factor for upland cotton is 93 percent and is computed by dividing the national program acreage for a crop by the estimated harvested acreage. Payments to producers who increased their 1981 planted acreage from the previous year will be reduced to reflect the allocation factor, Rank said.

professional help for your new pet is an excellent first step toward good health. Here's why: Puppies come in to the hands of new owners from many different environments. Some are received in a fat and healthy condition. Others are sick and undernourished from the start. Most puppies, however, come to new owners in a physical condition somewhere between these two extremes. For this reason an initial health examination is suggested just as soon as the puppy is acquired. Professional recommendations can then be made based on the particular background and problems of your puppy.

INITIAL VACCINATION AND EXAMINATION: Dogs may now be vaccinated against five deadly diseases—parvo, distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis and rabies. When you receive or buy a dog, arrangements should be made for an initial examination to get your pet off to a good start. At that time the first inoculation may also be given or scheduled.

VACCINATION "BOOSTERS": It is important to remember that one cannot be sure that a vaccine (whether for animal or human use) will be 100% effective, however, vaccines are effective in most cases. Likewise, a vaccine will seldom confer lifelong immunity. Therefore, "booster shots" are recommended at prescribed intervals.

PERIODIC EXAMINATIONS: At the time of the initial visit, arrangements should also be made for regular scheduled examinations. These often nip disease and health problems in the bud. They are the most economical way to assure the health of your growing pup. Booster inoculations can also be given at the time these periodic examinations are conducted.

PARASITES: During the many years of their domestication, dogs have encountered more than 500 different kinds of internal and external parasites. To make matters worse, external parasites such as fleas, lice and mosquitoes sometimes help infect pets with internal parasites. The complex parasite problem, however, can be controlled through microscopic inspection of a fecal specimen, and use of the correct medication for the problem will help assure a happy, useful life for your pet.

HEALTH RECORDS AND CERTIFICATES: Keeping an accurate, up-to-date health record is an excellent idea. Should you move or travel out of state with your pet, be sure to take the records along. At home, keep all certificates and other documents in a safe place. Bring this packet along any time you visit a veterinarian.

DIET: There are many different and acceptable methods of feeding puppies,

Teachers' March Vowed For Wages

Some public schools in Mississippi will close their doors March 2, while teachers march on the Capitol to

demand higher pay, the Mississippi Association of Educators reported Monday.

Dr. Janice McAllister, president of the association, told a news conference teachers will "fight to the bitter end" in their struggle to lobby the Legislature for a 10 percent cost-of-living pay raise.

"It's time that something was said and done about the Legislature's deplorable lack of attention to the needs of education and teachers," she said. The organization represents more than 13,000 teachers statewide.

The House and Senate have gone on record against pay raises for state employees, teachers and junior college and university personnel because of a lack of money.

Dr. McAllister, along with Frank Yates, associate executive secretary of MAE, said local affiliates of the organization are planning rallies throughout the state on Saturday to obtain funds for the campaign to win public support for pay raises. The following fact sheet gives statistics concerning teaching as a profession in Mississippi:

* The average teacher salary in Mississippi is the lowest in the country, almost \$4,000 below the national average.

* Less than 22% of Mississippi public school teachers are men. (ranking 45th in the country)

* Mississippi teacher

salaries are the lowest in the Southeastern Region, and will fall further behind if the Legislature has its way in granting no salary increases.

* Other Southeastern states are planning for salary increases this year - Alabama, Governor supports 14% increase; Florida, \$1,758 per teacher; South Carolina, 7.3%; Tennessee, 7%; Georgia, 6%.

* Teacher shortages in math, science and industrial arts already exist. Other areas surely will follow if salaries are continually eroded. The cost of living has increased 53.6% over past 5 years. Personal income in Mississippi has increased 52.8% over same period.

* Mississippi average teachers' salaries have increased only 38.3% in the same time.

* The total budget for an intermediate standard of living for a family of four (4) is over \$23,000 while the average teachers' salary in Mississippi is less than \$14,000.

* Average beginning salary for teachers is lower than for other professions which require a college degree.

* Estimated expenditures for public elementary and secondary schools in Mississippi per pupil in 1980-81 is \$1,771, which is almost \$700 below the national average.

* The Legislature is considering passing a cigarette tax increase and an off-shore drilling tax to fund other programs, but is doing

nothing to increase salaries.

* The Legislature's kindergarten and early education legislation currently plans no adjustments for the teachers, amounting to ABANDONMENT of institutional responsibility to provide education for Mississippi citizens.

2. SITTING-UP and studying your Bible daily - 2 Timothy 2:15.
3. PULLING-UP to a prayerful heart - I Thess. 5:17, Rom. 12:12.
4. SET HIGH GOALS of giving Jesus the pre-

eminence - Mt. 6:33, Col. 1:18. 5. KEEP AWAY FROM sweets or fattening influences - I Cor. 15:33, I Thess. 5:21-22.

A Close Look At No Till Farming

You read a lot these days about no-till farming. It seems the craze is sweeping the country, and its gaining popularity here in Tishomingo County. Well, let's no-till farming all out.

To begin with, no-till farming is not so new. In many parts of the nation, farming without cultivation has been practiced for many years. In Mississippi, a few farmers have tried their hand at it as far back as 1960. But in the last few years, no-till has come under the spotlight. Why, you ask? Well, it could be that no-till farming saves a lot of high priced, hard-to-get fuel and many tons of soil that some plow-weary fields can't afford to lose. When you get right down to it, no-till farming saves valuable topsoil, yet keeps yields up.

The land is not prepared for planting and is not cultivated when the crops are up and growing. Weeds and grasses are the main reason we plow crops to begin with, and herbicides are applied to eliminate that problem.

When no-till farming is used, the land is never tilled. To a farmer, this means saving moisture that could be lost when the land is tilled. So if no-till farming is used, more moisture is available for the crops. During 1981 moisture was

critical in our county.

More moisture is available when crops like soybeans are planted no-till, because the beans are planted right behind the combine of the previous crop, say wheat. In many cases a farmer can get his beans up and growing weeks earlier if he no-till plants as compared to conventionally planted beans. This could mean the difference in success or failure, or at least the difference in a few bushels of beans.

In Tishomingo County, most no-till farming has been soybeans behind wheat. That will probably be the case in 1982. So if you are interested in trying some no-till beans, you may want to think about this.

Some guidelines: Remember that no-till farming has to have good management; select fields free of johnson grass and other perennial grasses; locate a planter you can use to plant beans in residue; line up a good herbicide product and apply it at planting or soon afterwards; plant beans right behind the combine; and don't burn the wheat residue, but put a shredder or spreader on the combine to scatter it.

You might also keep in mind that corn is an excellent crop to plant no-till. So keep this in mind this spring when you start to plant corn.
