WHEREAS, litter mars the beauty and detracts from the esthetic value of our countryside;

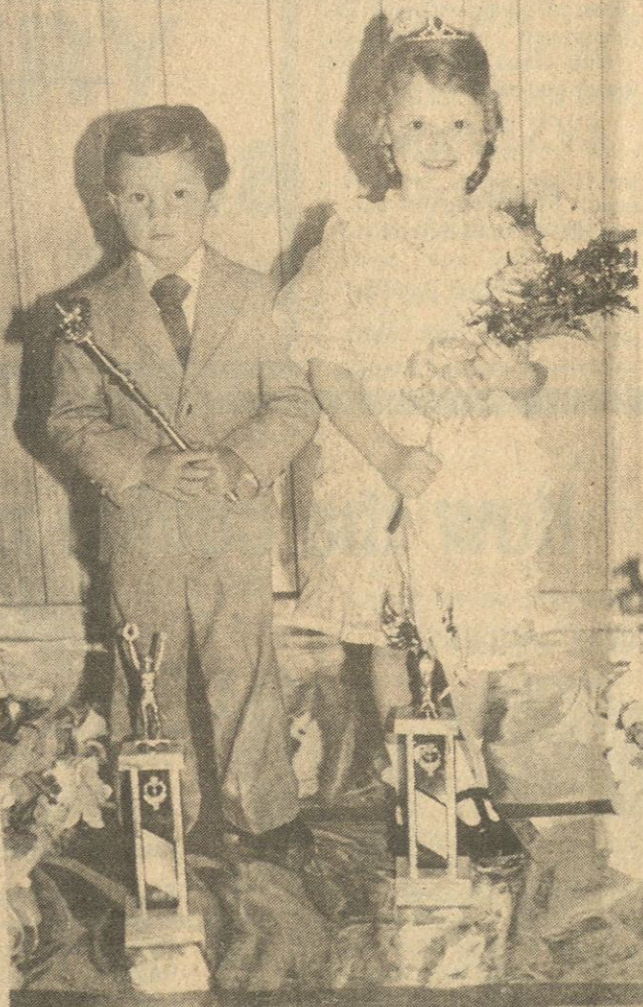
WHEREAS, litter is a sorry spectacle to the civic pride of our citizens, and creates an unfavorable image to our visitors and tourists; and

State Unemployment Drops To 10.2 %

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 10.2 percent in February, a decrease of one-half of one percentage point compared to January's revised jobless rate of 10.7 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's February unemployment rate was 8.7 percent.

The 10.2 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 9.6 percent national rate for

February. MESC figures showed 108,300 unemployed and 953,300 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,061,600. The initial Unemployment Insurance claims totaled 27,752 for February.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in February were Yalobusha, with an unemployment rate of 31.3 percent; Sharkey, with an unemployment rate of 22.6 percent; and Jefferson, with an unemployment rate of 20.9 percent.

Rankin, Oktibbeha, and

Issaquena counties had the lowest jobless rates in February. Rankin had a rate of 4.3 percent; Oktibbeha had a rate of 4.9 percent; and Issaquena had an unemployment rate of 5.3 percent.

Forty-two of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in February. Twenty-four counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates for January to February, while fifty-seven reported decreases. The unemployment rate in one county, Tishomingo, was unchanged.

Harmon W. McGill, Sr. died at the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee, Thursday, March 25. He was a retired grocery merchant.

He was born in Americus, Georgia on June 9, 1911. As a son of a Baptist minister he lived in Florida, Alabama, and South Mississippi before coming to Iuka in 1934, where his father, Wallace C. McGill, was pastor of the Iuka Baptist Church. Iuka became his home when he met and married his wife, Geraldine

In Service

Navy Aviation Fire Control Technician 2nd Class Todd D. Fowler, son of Ray and Delores Fowler, of Dennis, is serving aboard the Navy's newest nuclear-powered aircraft carrier.

He is a crewmember aboard the USS Carl Vinson, homeported in Norfolk, Va. Commissioned March 13, 1982 at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, it was finished one month ahead of schedule and cost \$20 million less than the estimated \$1.7 billion budgeted for the ship. Its keel was laid on October 11, 1975 and it was launched March 15, 1980.

The Vinson is the third of the Nimitz class aircraft carrier and is actually a floating city. In addition to a modern fully-equipped airport, the ship provides living quarters and dining facilities for nearly 6,000 men, plus most of the services available to a small city, including retail stores, a hospital, post office, and radio and television stations.

Unlimited endurance at high speed, provided by nuclear-propulsion, as well as extensive armor against bombs and guided missiles makes the Carl Vinson the least vulnerable carrier ever designed. Measuring 1,092 feet from bow to stern, it is almost as long as the Empire State Building is tall. It has a 4.5 acre flight deck and is 24-stories high from the keel to the top of the mast.

As a "plankowner" of the Vinson, he now faces

Services To Farm Producers

"The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), both agencies of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, are providing cooperative as well as individual services to farm producers," says Everett W. LeJeune, Field Operations Office Director for FCIC.

ASCS has announced an April 16 deadline for sign up in the 1982 acreage reduction program for Cotton, Rice, Feed Grains, and Wheat. Producers who have already reported planted acreage for All-Risk Crop Insurance can revise their acreage report by April 16, if they participate in the ASCS Acreage reduction program.

According to the provisions of the new Farm Bill, ASCS disaster payments will not be available on acreage eligible for All-Risk Crop Insurance (including All-Risk Insurance issued by a private insurance company and reinsured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation).

All Risk Crop Insurance may now be available through an individual agreement with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation on cropland that was previously considered uninsurable. The request for coverage should be made through the local agent or service office before the sales closing date for that crop. The sales closing date for Soybeans, Cotton, Rice, and Grain Sorghum is April 15.

In addition, FCIC has initiated an Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) program, which ultimately will permit policyholders to purchase insurance coverage based solely on their production records. An IYC participant must have verifiable acreage and yield records for at least the three most recent consecutive-planted crop years. Recorded yields may be used for up to 10 years, if available.

LeJeune further states, "Those producers who were insured on a spring-planted crop for the 1981 crop year, but canceled their insurance, may reinstate their All-Risk coverage and maintain any premium discount they may have earned for good experience if they do so before April 15, 1982."

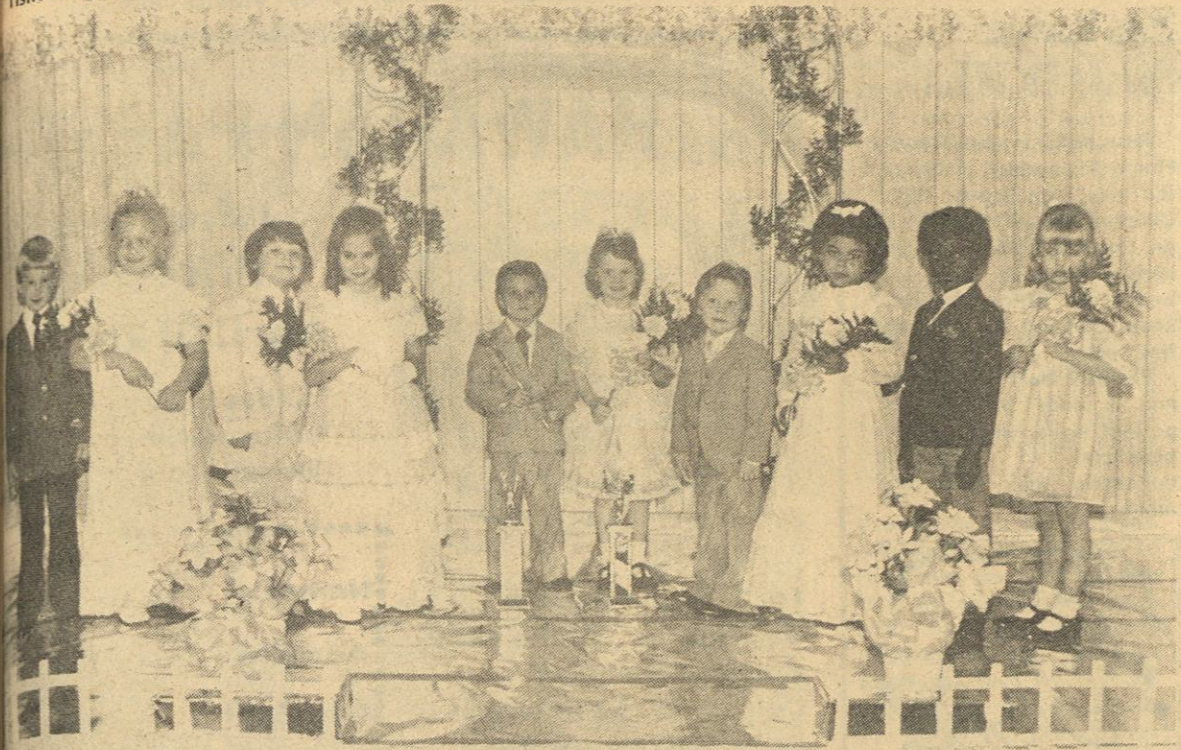

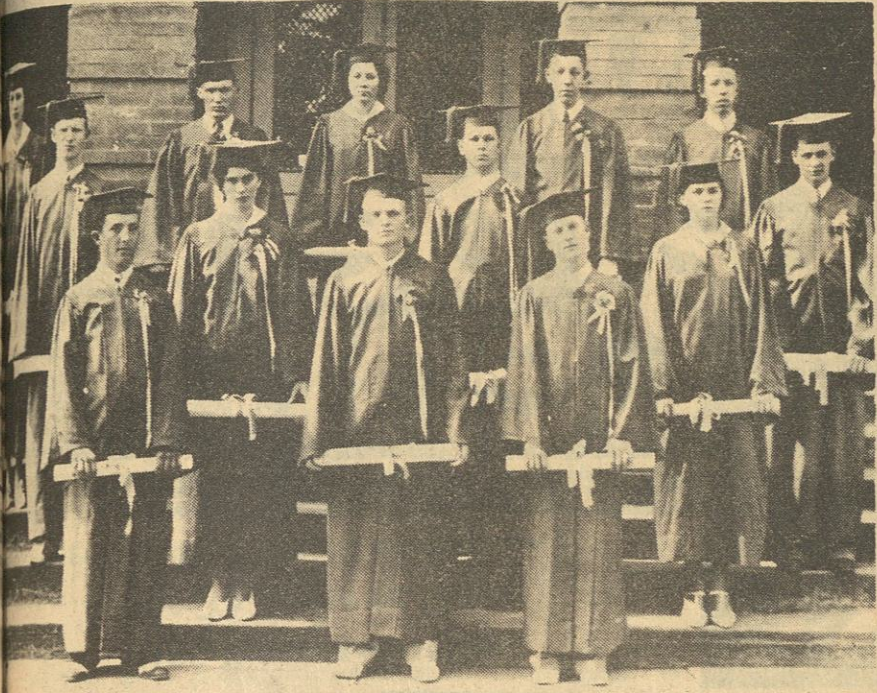

Action at Northeast Junior College's March board meeting included the official naming of two dormitories presently under construction and the new football stadium, which opened this past season, President Harold T. White announced.

The men and women's hotel type dormitories, which were funded by a \$2.4 million dollar FmHA loan were named for Bob Yarber, of Belmont, and Hoyt B. Wood, of New Albany, respectively, while the stadium, formerly known as Tiger Stadium was named for Thomas D. Keenum, of Booneville.

A former member of the board of trustees, Wood served as Superintendent of Education in Union County from 1964-1980. Prior to his election to county superintendent, he served as a coach and teacher in the county school system.

Mr. Yarber, a pharmacist and long-time supporter of Northeast, has served on the Northeast board since 1974, and presently holds the position of vice-chairman.

The dormitories are slated for completion this fall and will each accommodate some 118 students who wish to live on campus.

Carrying the name of Thomas D. Keenum, a Booneville attorney, the football stadium, with its aluminum seating can accommodate 5200 fans. A board member since 1974, Keenum served as chairman of the building and grounds committee prior to assuming the duties of chairman of the board in 1981.

President White said, "The thrill of adding to our physical facility is always heightened when we are able to honor men of such caliber who have a genuine concern for the support of quality education."

Energy
Answers

Q. I am considering buying a water-source heat pump to replace my present heating

and cooling system and I wonder if it will qualify me for the renewable energy source tax credits. I plan to run the heat pump on water from a well I will dig. Will this qualify as geothermal?

A. The IRS says drilling costs of geothermal wells and the costs of buying and installing equipment which will use geothermal waters to heat air or water for domestic use are covered under the 40 percent tax credits for renewable energy source tax credits. The catch for those of us in this area is that to qualify as geothermal, the water source must register 50 degrees Celsius (122 degrees Fahrenheit) at the wellhead. The engineers who advise us in such matters say that although Mississippi has some areas with geothermal waters, they know of no place in the state where the water temperature is high enough to meet the IRS requirements.

To complete this dismal answer we must note that heat pumps do not even qualify for the 15 percent conservation tax credits. Heat pumps are considerably more efficient than other kinds of electrical heat available to date, but Congress decided not to cover them as part of the energy-conserving equipment eligible for the credits.

Q. Is it okay to take my plastic storm windows down now? They really helped keep my house warmer this winter.

A. Oldtimers tell us that March 15 is a good cut-off date for winter around here, so it's probably pretty safe to take them down now. There are some circumstances under which you may not want to take them down at all, however. Our engineers say that people who use their air conditioners most or all of the time during spring and summer months would probably benefit by leaving the temporary window covers in place.

Although storm windows are most effective at keeping heat in and cold out in winter, they can serve the reverse purpose in the cooling season.

The major drawback to leaving the plastic storm windows up, of course, is that during spring and fall and on temperate summer days, the windows can't be opened for

ventilation. People who can get by on natural breezes and use cooling equipment sparingly need the ventilation more than the tightening up for air conditioning.

In other words, the people who use their air-conditioning most (rarely ever rely on outside air anyway) are the ones who would benefit most by leaving storm windows up.

Federal Crop
Insurance

All Risk Crop Insurance is introducing a new program called the Individual Yield Coverage Plan, stated Everett LeJeune, Field Operations Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. The purpose of the program is to provide individuals with their own guarantee for their farm as outlined in the Federal Crop Insurance Act of 1980.

Farmers may opt to substitute their yield records for the established FCIC yield for their area, continued LeJeune. Their certified records for a minimum of the last three consecutively plan-

ted crop years for the crop or crops involved will qualify them for IYC. Up to 10 years' certified production records may be utilized in the program. LeJeune elaborated further, interested farmers need to have their records checked for certification at least 15 days before April 15. This will allow for the necessary forms to be processed.

Farmers interested in IYC should check with a local All-Risk Crop Insurance agent to see if they qualify for the program. All-Risk Crop Insurance's IYC plan helps farmers take the risk out of taking risks.

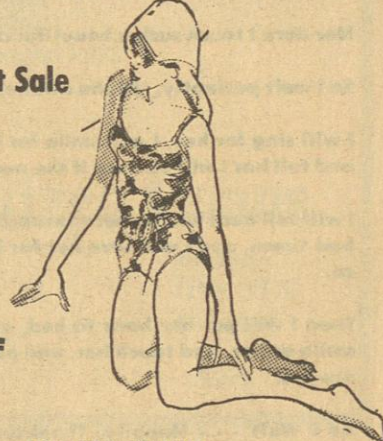

Carson Serving In Helicopter Squadron

A complicated and deadly game of hide and seek against hostile submarines is the ultimate game for some. It's the ultimate game for Dale Carson, a Navy (junior grade) from Iuka, knows all about the game. He's a Light Helicopter Squadron 33 based at the North Island Naval Air Station near San Diego, Calif. In this demanding job, the coordination of the tactical picture, he handles the communication and of submarines, the necessary information for the aircraft commander before taking action. The crew of three, consisting of a pilot, co-pilot and sensor operator, the helo can easily hover like a hummingbird over its target, dip its sonar and, in war, deliver weapons which can vary from gun fire and homing torpedos to air-to-surface missiles. Currently Carson has over 300 flight hours in the SH-2F Seasprite helicopter. He gets a lot of satisfaction out of the squadron's mission. "The LAMPS mission is exciting," said the 1975 graduate of Dougherty High School. "Trying to find a sub, locating it and dropping a successful hit is very satisfying." When Carson isn't flying, he's the squadron's public affairs officer. He's responsible for supplying the base newspaper with news about the men and the squadron. Carson, who graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1979, chose a Naval career because he grew up in the military family. "My dad is a retired Air Force technical sergeant, so joining the military was a natural choice," he said. "I chose the Navy over the other service academies because they offered the best educational opportunities."

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS

The so-called 'safe harbor leasing' provision of last year's tax bill which has allowed some large, very profitable corporations to greatly reduce their tax liability should be repealed immediately. It is not fair to those individuals and small businesses who are struggling to make ends meet to allow these corporations to raid the U.S. Treasury because of a provision in the tax law which never should have been approved. Supposedly, the intent of the provision was to aid financially ailing companies and new companies which are not yet profitable. However, in actual practice, they are being used to permit the sale of such credits to prosperous companies which do not by any stretch of the imagination need any tax relief. I was shocked to read recent newspaper reports that General Electric, with pre-tax earnings of \$2.66 billion in 1981, was able to file for a net tax refund of over \$90 million after taking advantage of this provision in the law. Amoco, with a pre-tax income of \$3.46 billion, was able to reduce its federal tax liability by \$159 million through the 'safe harbor leasing' provision. I do not believe this was intended by Congress when this provision was passed. In practice, this provision is allowing corporations to buy and sell federal tax credits as though they are stocks, bonds, bushels of wheat, or other commodities. The result is a clear and unjustified raid on the United States Treasury. It is poor policy to permit the selling and trading of federal tax credits when the possibility of a budget deficit in excess of \$100 billion is already staring us in the face this year. I believe we in the Congress should rectify this mistake as quickly as possible through an outright repeal of the leasing provision. The longer we delay, the more tax loss the Treasury suffers. My efforts will be directed toward prompt repeal of this provision.

Law Enforcement Program At NEMJC

The Law Enforcement Program at Northeast Mississippi Junior College was the first in the area when it was initiated in the 1960's. At present, it is the only transferable Law Enforcement Program at a junior college in North Mississippi.

Dr. Harmon Byrom, Law Enforcement Instructor, says that in the past three years there has been a steady enrollment increase due mainly to more awareness of the people in this field. In 1979, there were twenty-five law enforcement majors compared to the forty majors this semester.

One fourth of those law enforcement majors this semester are female. Dr. Byrom says that women

going into this field can do office work, along with probation and undercover work. The highway patrol is also open to women.

Northeast's program follows a curriculum to make all hours transferable to the University of Mississippi. Other schools in the Mississippi area that a student may transfer his law enforcement major to include Delta State University, University of Southern Mississippi, and University of North Alabama. Dr. Byrom says that with the academics required a student may easily change his major from that of Law Enforcement to what they desire.

Many students do go on to a University, but for those

that do not jobs are available in many areas. If twenty-one years of age, they can obtain a job with the police security any place they like, for instance, at Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant. Jobs with the Natchez Trace, for example, as highway patrolmen and the investigation area are branches of law enforcement also open.

Dr. Byrom says that he looks for honesty and integrity in students destined to be good officers. He explains that "they must really want to be of service to the public... willing to take a lesser pay and many personal risks." When seeing a former student doing well - successful and happy with what they are doing in the law enforcement field, Dr. Byrom said he knows that it (teaching) has all been worthwhile.

Federal Excise Tax Is Reduced On Area Telephone Service

South Central Bell District Manager announced recently that the Federal Excise Tax on telephone service dropped from a two percent rate to one percent on January 1, 1982.

Bailey said that this is a further step in the gradual phase-out of the tax - the tax will stay at one percent until its final expiration December 31, 1984.

The telephone tax was imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure. Although repealed briefly after the war, it was reinstated during the depression and at one time rates were as high as 25 percent on long distance calls and 15 percent on local service.

For nearly 20 years prior to 1972, the excise tax was 10 percent for most local and long distance telephone services. In 1973, and each year thereafter until 1981, the rate was reduced one percentage point as part of a plan to phase it out entirely.

Bell To Spend \$216.3 Million In Mississippi

South Central Bell has announced plans to spend a record \$216.3 million in 1982 to meet the anticipated telephone needs of its Mississippi customers.

According to J.N. McGowen, vice president for the Company's Mississippi operations, proposed telephone construction expenditures in 1982 represent a 10.2 percent increase over Bell's 1981 investment of \$196.3 million.

"Mississippi is experiencing the same growth trends as other areas of the Sunbelt," McGowen said. "New and expanded telecommunications services and facilities must be provided to maintain and improve our existing communications network. We currently serve over 84 percent of our Mississippi households and company construction expenditures must continue to grow at an accelerated pace if we are to provide these customers with the telephone facilities they need. Our forecast for the two-year period, 1982-83, indicates a need for approximately \$450 million in new telephone construction,

almost half of it for growth alone.

"During 1981, our service offices and installation forces were busy," McGowen said. "We installed 364,597 telephones which provided service to an additional 19,021 customers. Over 170,000 customers received reduced service connection charges as a result of visits to one of our 32 PhoneCenter Stores or by means of alternate forms of customer participation."

McGowen added that nearly 2.5 billion local calls were handled over the telephone network in Mississippi in 1981. Also, he said that the results of the first full year of the Directory Assistance Repricing Plan reflected that between 92 percent and 94 percent of telephone customers were not billed for Directory Assistance service on a month-to-month basis. All South Central Bell customers received a 50-cent reduction in their local monthly telephone bill.

"Serving as both a time and energy saver, the telephone has become a necessity for the average Mississippi family," McGowen continued. "Furthermore, we are aware of the critical nature of our operation in contributing to the business climate of this state. Most businesses simply could not survive without a reliable telephone system."

"We at South Central Bell remain committed to this state's economic development," McGowen said. "Our involvement is dramatically demonstrated through the 18 building construction projects either underway or planned for Mississippi communities in 1982."

"Mississippi is a good place to do business," McGowen said, "and we intend to do our part to make it an even better place to live and work."

McGowen pointed out that the Telephone Company plans to install Electronic and Digital Switching Systems in 9 additional locations during the next two years. Also, Automatic Number Identification (ANI) equipment for long distance calls continues to be installed at a pace which will provide all South Central Bell customers ANI access by the end of 1983.

McGowen issued the following progress report on the Company's 1981 Mississippi operations:

- Total telephones in service - 1,525,542.
- Total employees - 7,571.
- Total state and local taxes - \$53.8 million.
- Total expenditures for goods, services and contract work paid to Mississippi suppliers and businesses - \$80 million.
- Total gross construction - \$196.3 million.

Which provided: The installation of over 210,000 circuit miles of wire in cable; the construction of 11 major central office building additions, 3 new community dial offices, and 5 new service operations centers; a further reduction of rural eight-party service. During 1981, the number of subscribers with eight-party service was reduced by 62 percent, from 5,840 to 2,234; made Touchtone® service available to 687,130 customers, up 18.3 percent over the previous year.

"When a customer picks up his telephone receiver to make a call," McGowen said, "he wants the call to go through the first time with no trouble. This means instant dial tone, a clear line, no noise and good transmission. In Mississippi, he gets it 98.6 percent of the time. His phone will also go an average of 27 months without reported trouble. He will get it installed when scheduled 99 percent of the time. And operators will answer nine out of ten calls in
