State Unemployment **Drops To 10.2 %**

unemployment rate dropped to 10.2 percent in February, a decrease of one-half of one percentage point compared to January's revised jobless rate of 10.7 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's February unemployment rate was 8.7 percent.

The 10.2 percent unemployment rate for the state national rate for

February. MESC figures showed 108,300 unemployed and 953,300 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,061,600. The initial Unemployment Insurance claims totaled 27,752 for February. The counties having the

highest unemployment rates in February were Yalobusha, with an unemployment rate of 31.3 percent; Sharkey, with an unemployment rate of 22.6 percent; and Jefferson, with an unemployment rate of 20.9

Rankin, Oktibbeha, and

Mosquito Problems Prevent problems around your home this year. Extension En-

tomologist, Dr. Doug Gaydon says most people who have heavy mosquito populations actually maintain breeding places for mosquitoes near their homes. The mosquito must have a water source in which to lay eggs. If you have old tires, cans, flower pots with water in them, bird baths, or wading pools near your home, be sure these don't become mosquito breeding grounds. Change the water in bird baths and wading pools. Inspect flower pots and plant containers weekly for mosquito larvae. If you find larvae, change the water. Reduce your mosquito population this year by

Tax Provisions -**Benefit Timber Owners**

eliminating breeding places.

Timber owners may pay too much income tax. Extension Forester, Dr. Tom Monaghan says many people aren't aware of tax provisions that can benefit timber owners. For federal tax purposes, timber is a capital asset and is subject to capital gains requirements are met. Capital gains treatment allows you to sell timber, deduct 60 percent of the net income you receive from the sale, and be taxed on just 40 percent at the ordinary tax rate. This can save a timber owner quite a bit of money. Several other tax provisions apply to timber owners, so check these out before you pay more tax than necessary.

Small Grains

Ryegrass and small grains grow well in April. Extension Agronomist Dr. Lamar Kimbrough says these forages need fertilizer, especially nitrogen. If excess growth is produced, set aside a certain amount for hay. Ryegrass and mixtures of ryegrass and small grain make good hay when cut young and leafy. Dr. Kimbrough says ryegrass quality drops rapidly as seed heads mature and dry.

prices caused many farmers to place sizable amounts of grain under loan. As of March 26, Tishomingo County farmers had obtained federal price support loans on more than 10, 706 bushels of their 1981 grain crops. County loan rates per bushel are: Wheat, \$3.15; Oats, \$1.37; Corn, \$2.57; Sorghum, \$5.08; and Soybeans, \$5.08. South said wheat under loan is eligible for immediate entry into the farmer owned grain reserve. "This program offers farmers three year loans and storage payments in advance for isolating grain from the market until prices rise." The ASCS official said many farmers use the commodity loan program to obtain interim operating capital or hold their grain for future delivery. "Although the program does not guarantee participating farmers a profit, it does guarantee a minimum price." The agency has provided commodity loans to farmers since 1933. In most cases, farmers satisfy their loan obligations by repaying the money before the loan matures or by forfeiting the crop to the Commodity Credit Corporation if prices at loan maturity are below the loan rate. Farmers interested in obtaining a loan on their 1981 small grain crops should contact the County ASCS Office before the March 31 deadline.

Federal Crop Insurance

All Risk Crop Insurance is introducing a new program called the Individual Yield Coverage Plan, stated Everett LeJeune, Field Operations Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. The purpose of the program is to provide individuals with their own guarantee for their farm as outlined in the Federal Crop Insurance Act of 1980.

Farmers may opt to substitute their yield records for the established FCIC yield for continued area. LeJeune. Their certified records for a minimum of the last three consecutively plan-

ted crop years for the crop cr crops involved will qualify them for IYC. Up to 10 years' certified production records may be utilized in the program. LeJeune elaborated further, interested farmers need to have their records checked for certification at least 15 days before April 15. This will allow for the necessary forms to be processed.

Farmers interested in IYC should check with a local All-Risk Crop Insurance agent to see if they qualify for the program. All-Risk Crop Insurance's IYC plan helps farmers take the risk out of taking risks.





REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The so-called 'safe harbor leasing' provision of last year's tax bill which has allowed some large, very profitable corporations to greatly reduce their tax liability should be repealed immediately. It is not fair to those individuals and small businesses who are struggling to make ends meet to allow these corporations to raid the U.S. Treasury because of a provision in the tax law which never should have been

Supposedly, the intent of the provision was to aid financially ailing companies and new companies which are not yet profitable. However, in actual practice, they are being used to permit the sale of such credits to prosperous companies which do not by any stretch of the imagination need any tax relief.

I was shocked to read recent newspaper reports that General Electric, with pre-tax earnings of \$2.66 billion in 1981, was able to file for a net tax refund of over \$90 million after taking advantage of this provision in the law. Amoco, with a pre-tax income of \$3.46 billion, was able to reduce its federal tax liability by \$159 million through the 'safe harbor leasing' provision. I do not believe this was intended by Congress when this provision was passed.

In practice, this provision is allowing corporations to buy and sell federal tax credits as though they are stocks, bonds, bushels of wheat, or other commodities. The result is a clear and unjustified raid on the United States Treasury.

It is poor policy to permit the selling and trading of federal tax credits when the possibility of a budget deficit in excess of \$100 billion is already staring us in the face this year. I believe we in the Congress should rectify this mistake as quickly as possible through an outright repeal of the leasing provision. The longer we delay, the more tax loss the Treasury suffers. My efforts will be directed toward prompt repeal of this provision.


