Energy Assistance Program Available

Financial assistance to help residents in Tishomingo County meet their rising energy costs is still available through the Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP).

LIEAP, which is being administered through the Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency, provides eligible persons

with one-time payments, ranging from \$20 to \$200.

Priority is being given to elderly and handicapped applicants. Tenants of subsidized housing may also be eligible for assistance.

Persons desiring financial assistance through LIEAP should apply at the Tishomingo County Courthouse at the Tishomingo County Community Action Center in the basement in Iuka.

When applying, applicants should bring proof of household income (check stubs, pay slips, or written statements from employers regarding wages) for at least

the last month and their energy bill or a statement from their landlord indicating that they are paying their energy bill through their rent payment. All applicants must be the head of the household or the spouse.

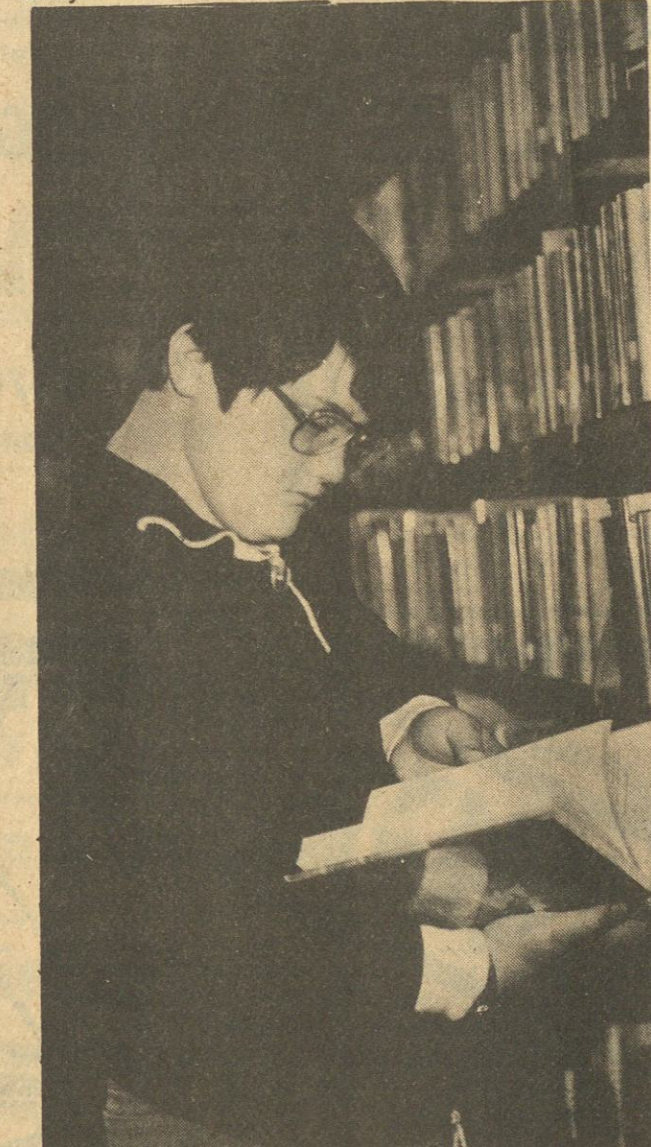
Iuka Drive-In Re-Opens

South Central Bell Seeks Rate Increases

South Central Bell today asked the state Public Service Commission to approve additional revenues to cover the steadily increasing costs of providing telephone service in Mississippi.

The company also requested approval to change its method of billing for some of its services to allow South Central Bell to more equitably provide service in an increasingly competitive telecommunications marketplace. J.N. McGowen, South Central Bell vice president for Mississippi, said that the major factors promoting the request for repricing services were the combined effects of inflation and the significant changes taking place in the telecommunications industry.

McGowen stressed that today's request has nothing to do with plans of the company's parent, American Telephone and Telegraph Company, to spin off its local operating companies as called for in the antitrust case agreement between the Department of Justice and the Bell System.

"The earliest date at which the spin off could be accomplished is late 1983," McGowen said, "with the most likely dates being late 1983 and early 1984."

"Our responsibility is to continue providing the best possible service at a price as low as possible, consistent with keeping the company financially sound and with meeting the future telecommunications needs of Mississippi customers," he stated.

The proposed increases would apply to various elements of local exchange service for residence and business customers. In addition, intrastate Wide Area Telecommunications Service (WATS) would be restructured and repriced to allow a more cost-based rate struc-

ture. There is no revenue increase being requested for intrastate long distance calls even though some rates will change slightly, some up and some down, as a result of a restructuring of the rates.

Approval of the request would mean the the charge for residence one-party telephone service with one regular set would increase about \$7.20 per month. A one-party business telephone customer with one regular set would pay an additional \$15.55 per month. McGowen said that the effect of these increases on a specific residence or business customer would vary, however, according to the type and the amount of service used. "The revenues generated by this request will continue to ensure high-quality, dependable telephone service for Mississippians," McGowen said.

"It has been over two years since we last proposed an increase in telephone rates," McGowen continued. "For the vast majority of our customers, rates have not been adjusted during this time; however, our costs have risen sharply. Productivity improvements, cost control efforts and the use of expense-reducing technology, wherever possible, have all helped to delay this rate request. Unfortunately, the costs of doing business continue to rise faster than our revenues, and we must request a rate adjustment at this time."

McGowen cited several examples illustrating the impact of inflation on the company's operating costs. "Since telephone rates were last increased, the cost of new debt has risen by over 30 percent, postage expense has jumped over 30 percent and the cost of a telephone installation/repair vehicle has gone up 21 percent," he said.

McGowen stated that the

company's earnings are currently below the minimum level authorized by the Commission in 1980, when it granted South Central Bell \$20 million less than the company requested and needed at that time.

In the meantime, McGowen said, South Central Bell has continued to build new facilities and improve existing facilities to keep up with the demand for service. "In our business we must anticipate customer demand and provide for it through long range construction plans. Even a slowdown in the business cycle should not deter us from continuing the construction of new facilities. If we don't do this job well, our customers will be the ones to suffer in terms of quality and availability of service."

McGowen said the company will need to spend in excess of \$400 million on new and improved telephone facilities during the next two years. With this added expenditure, South Central Bell's investment in its Mississippi operation would be approximately \$2 billion.

"The level of earnings authorized by the Public Service Commission two years ago does not adequately cover the costs of doing business in today's economy," McGowen said. "The proposed new rates would have the effect of producing \$98.2 million in additional annual revenues, or \$50.6 million after taxes, to cover the company's increasing costs of providing service."

The South Central Bell vice president emphasized that inflation, both past and present, has resulted in a sharp increase in telephone construction costs. "The cost today to place a new telephone in service is greater than any previous time in our history of

operations in Mississippi," he said.

McGowen added that extensive changes in the regulatory environment are resulting in deregulation and increased competition in the telecommunications industry. "Technology, spurred by competition, is rapidly advancing," he stated. "Effective service lives of communications equipment are being shortened. In recognition of this, recently authorized changes in depreciation rates and methods have also increased our needs for new revenues."

"Competition is causing another change," he continued. "In a competitive environment rates move more closely toward the actual costs of providing service. With competition being established in the more profitable areas of our business, such as long distance, the subsidy from those services is being reduced, thereby forcing local service rates up nearer to costs of providing the service," McGowen said.

Effective with this filing is a request that local service rates be separated into charges for sets and for exchange access lines. Previously, the rate for local service included both access to the telephone network and a telephone set.

The company is also proposing to restructure and reprice its intrastate Wide Area Telecommunications Service (WATS), as well as proposing an increase from 10 to 25 cents in the charge for local calls from coin telephones. The 10-cent rate has not been changed in 30 years. Higher charges for service connections are included, as well as increased rates for miscellaneous equipment provided primarily for business customers.

If approved, the new rates would be effective May 7, 1982.

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Stretch Your
Transportation Dollars

Are you aware that you can save up to 12 percent on your gasoline bill just by keeping your car tuned? Or that you can save 5 percent just by keeping your tires inflated to the tire manufacturer's recommended levels? Or did you know you can save up to 10 percent by switching to

radial tires? Are you aware that you can save 20 percent on gasoline when you drive on the highway by not exceeding the 55 mph speed limit?

Just by driving more efficiently, you can cut your gasoline consumption from 40 to 80 gallons. By eliminating unnecessary travel, you can save \$60 or more a year. Drive at a moderate speed. Drive at a smooth and steady pace. Drive defensively. Anticipate traffic flow 10 to 12 seconds ahead. Don't idle the motor for more than 30 seconds. Idling gets 0 miles to the gallon.

few minutes is a much more efficient way to warm the motor than excessive idling. Turn off the ignition any time you expect to wait more than 30 seconds; restarting takes less gasoline than idling. Remember this when waiting in line, for instance, at a drive-in bank. Keep windows closed when driving at highway speeds. Open windows increase wind resistance by creating drag.

Plan your trips and share your rides. Combine trips; plan your trips to market, to the library, to school or to visit friends. Gasoline costs about 5 cents a mile in small efficient cars, and much more for short trips. Make your shopping or optional trips when traffic is lightest, and return home before the rush hour. Eliminate unnecessary trips. Use public transportation if possible.

Take good care of your car. Check tire pressures regularly. To replace all four tires with radials will generally give 3 to 5 percent improvement in gasoline mileage in the city, and up to 10 percent on the highway. Have your wheels aligned properly. Be sure your brakes are adjusted properly. Use gasoline of the proper octane rating. Check and change oil and oil filter at recommended intervals. Use a good quality SE multi-grade (multiviscosity) oil.

Do the little things prudence requires. Don't overfill the gas tank; eliminate any chance of spillage. Don't carry unnecessary weight. For every additional 100 pounds, mileage goes down as much as .4 of a mile per gallon.

Upside-Down Cake

1 package (3 oz.) lemon, raspberry, strawberry or berry, strawberry, or orange-pineapple gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 can (1 lb. 1 oz.) sliced peaches or fruit cocktail
1 baked 8-inch white cake layer
Sweetened whipped cream or prepared dessert topping

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Drain peaches, measuring syrup. Add water to make 1 cup. Add to gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. Place peaches in an 8-inch layer pan; cover with about 1 1/4 cups gelatin. Place cake

Mulch Helps Gardens

Using a mulch can work wonders in the garden. Mulching produces a better environment in which plants grow, and that translates into higher vegetable yields at harvest.

Mulch is any material used to cover garden soil to protect plant roots from heat, cold or drought, or to keep fruit clean. Mulches may be natural, such as straw, hay, sawdust, compost of pine needles, or synthetic, such as plastic and paper.

Not only does mulch protect plant roots, but most natural mulches also make good fertilizer and soil conditioners when worked into the soil. Natural mulches improve both the physical and chemical properties of the soil, including water-holding capacity and soil aeration.

A natural mulch protects soil from compacting rain, drying wind and controls weeds by keeping sunlight from germinating seeds and

seedlings. Fewer weeds means less competition for plant nutrients, and fewer cultivations for less damaging root pruning.

It's best to spread the mulch evenly over the entire growing area in a layer two to five inches deep. Light mulches like pine needles, hay and straw need a four-to-five-inch layer to do their job. Other mulches like compost and sawdust require two to three inches.

You can also use bark, wood shavings, leaves, grass clippings, rice hulls, ground corn cobs and animal manure as mulch. It's important that mulches be free of seeds to prevent introducing a weed problem. That's frequently the trouble with hay, straw and manure.

Trees, Shrubs Need Food

Whether your lawn plants are mature, established plantings or young transplants, they all need proper fertilization to bring out the beauty we all appreciate in our landscapes.

But just as youngsters and grown-ups differ in food energy needs, so do plants. Because young plants are young and actively growing, they need more fertilizer than mature trees and shrubs.

Generally speaking, well-established plants and trees approaching maturity need one annual application of fertilizer in early spring -- from March 15-May 30. Young plants less than three years old

require fertilizing in the spring and a second application in mid-August to mid-September.

Don't fertilize new transplants and shrubs until at least four weeks after planting. It takes this amount of time for the root system to regenerate and be able to absorb nutrients to stimulate new, rapid plant growth.

A complete fertilizer that has nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium is best. Don't use fertilizer stronger than a 10-10-10 mixture. For the most popular fertilizers, 6-8-8 and 8-8-8, apply at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per 100 square feet of soil area.

Also, be sure not to over-fertilize shrubs damaged by cold or drought. Mulch the plants to protect the roots, and water after applying the fertilizer to dissolve the material.

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Make Measles A Memory

The Tishomingo County Health Department is taking part in the statewide campaign "Make Measles a Memory in Mississippi", by urging all parents to have

their children immunized by October of 1982. Mrs. Edna Tapp, County Health Nurse, launches the drive in Tishomingo County by vaccinating young John Mark Stephens, son of Rev. and Mrs. Kenny Stephens, of Iuka,

with a measles-mump-rubella shot. He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Middleton and Mr. and Mrs. H.C. Stephens.

Help Stamp Out Measles In Area

In the final phase of a four-year campaign, the Mississippi State Board of Health is calling on everybody to help "Make Measles a Memory in Mississippi."

The state public health agency encourages every Mississippian from 15 months to 21 years of age to become immunized against measles if he has not already had the disease or the vaccination. Individuals and physicians are encouraged to report every case of suspected measles to the county health department.

Measles - sometimes called red, seven-day, or hard measles - is one of the most dangerous childhood diseases. Although children may suffer fever, rash, persistent hacking cough, and red puffy eyes for only five to seven days, measles can result in pneumonia, hearing disorders, and brain damage.

Everyone can be protected from measles with immunization. All babies at 15 months of age and healthy individuals under 21 years who have never had measles or the vaccine should be vaccinated.

Former DHEW Secretary Joseph Califano, Jr., launched a nationwide measles eradication campaign in October 1978; his aim was to eliminate indigenous or native measles from the nation by October 1982.

The Mississippi School

Immunization Law of 1978 provided the main vehicle that will help Mississippi meet the nationwide eradication goal. Since the passage of that law, the state has attained a 98.1 percent immunization compliance rate for children in kindergarten through grade 12.

Private physicians, licensed day care center operators, and school superintendents have joined the effort to locate and report all suspected cases.

In the final campaign phase, the Board of Health seeks to create statewide public awareness of the campaign, of the disease, and that measles can be eliminated. Through news reports and public service announcements, printed materials for distribution through health departments, public libraries, and other outlets, and through ongoing immunization programs, the public health agency is calling on everyone to "Make Measles a Memory in Mississippi."

Reported measles in the United States reached a record low in 1981, with a total provisional 3,032 cases. This is a 99.4 percent reduction from the 1950 to 1963 prevaccine era when an annual average of 525,730 cases were reported.

Mississippi has not had a case of measles reported since November 1980, proof that the campaign has been successful.

cessful.

In 1964, the first year the measles vaccine was in full use, some 458,000 cases of measles and 421 measles-associated deaths were reported in the U.S. By 1966, the numbers had dropped dramatically to 205,000 cases and 261 deaths.

The American Public Health Association at its 1966 meeting saw epidemiologic-based evidence that measles could be eradicated. Four basic components would be necessary: routine immunization of infants, immunization of children entering school who had not been immunized or had the disease, surveillance, and epidemic control.

Mississippi has employed those components and has a much better-than-average chance of meeting the October 1, 1982, deadline.

Disease control staff with the State Board of Health emphasize that parents and their children who are 21 and under should check their immunization records for a specific date and reference for having gotten a measles immunization. Those who have no record or who have doubt about their immunization status should check with their physician or county health department.

Gary Ramsay, park manager, said the exhibit-talk will be an excellent special event for club, boy and girl scout troops, 4-H Clubs, science club, and other organizations. "We invite everyone to come early, bring a picnic supper to enjoy before the program starts at 6:30," Ramsay said.

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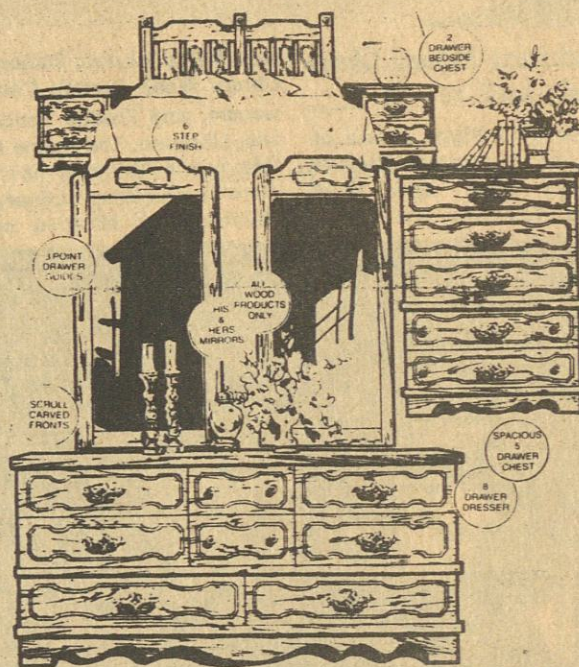

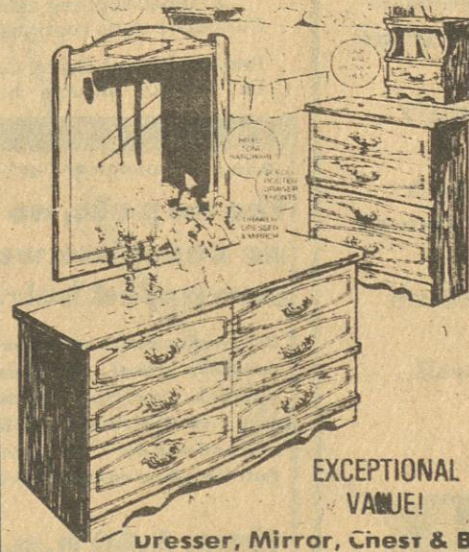

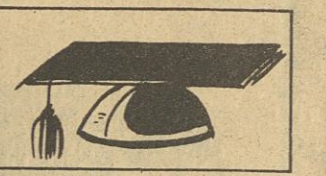

Tips From EMT's

Tornadoes are short lived local storms containing high speed winds, usually rotating in a counter-clockwise direction. Tornadoes begin within

an intense thunderstorm cloud and develop downward toward the earth's surface. Tornado damage can occur on the ground even though the visible funnel may not seem to reach the ground. The funnel is initially composed of condensed water vapor and is actually a cloud. When the circulation of the funnel reaches the ground, it usually picks up dust and debris, which eventually darkens the entire funnel. It has been estimated that wind speeds vary from less than 100 mph in weaker tornadoes to possibly over 300 mph in the strongest.

Only a few thunderstorms, usually the most severe ones, will spawn a tornado. Severe thunderstorms and tornadoes are more likely to occur when the proper weather conditions are present: warm, humid and unstable air at the earth's surface; cold air at middle atmospheric levels; and strong upper level "jet stream" winds.

On the average, tornado paths are less than 2 quarters of a mile wide and seldom more than 15 miles long. However, there have been spectacular instances in which tornadoes have had paths of more than a mile wide and 200 miles long. Most tornadoes travel from the southwest to the nor-

theast with an average speed of 30 mph, but some have been observed to travel at a forward speed of 70 mph.

Most tornadoes occur in the deep south and in the broad, relatively flat basin between the Rockies and the Appalachians... but no state is immune.

Peak months of tornado activity for Mississippi are February, March, April and May. However, tornadoes have occurred in every month and at all times of the day or night. A typical time of occurrence is on an unseasonably warm sultry spring afternoon between 3 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Because most tornadoes are so abrupt in onset, short-lived, and often obscured by rain or darkness, the best way to deal with them is through preparedness. Individuals should have tornado preparedness plans for their homes. They should also familiarize themselves with the proper safety rules so that they will know how to protect themselves in a car, in open country, or in whatever situation that may arise. Businesses should also have emergency plans and pre-designated shelter areas.

We can do little to prevent a tornado from occurring, but by knowing the safety rules, we can keep the number of

deaths and injuries to a minimum.

A tornado watch means that tornado development is possible. Keep an eye on the sky for threatening weather and stay tuned to radio and TV and listen for weather bulletins.

A tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. Persons in the path of the storm should seek shelter immediately, preferably in a storm cellar, underground excavation, or steel framed or concrete reinforced building.

In homes... the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Stay away from windows.

In schools, hospital, and shopping centers, move to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on lowest floors are best. If the building is not of reinforced construction, if there is time, go to a nearby one that is, or take cover outside on low protected ground. Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other structures with wide-span roofs. In open country move away from the

tornadoes path at right angles. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds of tornadoes are forecast. Damage can be minimized by securing trailers with cables anchored in concrete footing. Trailer parks should have a community storm shelter, and a person to monitor broadcasts throughout the severe storm emergency. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer park and take cover on low protected ground. Learn these warnings and

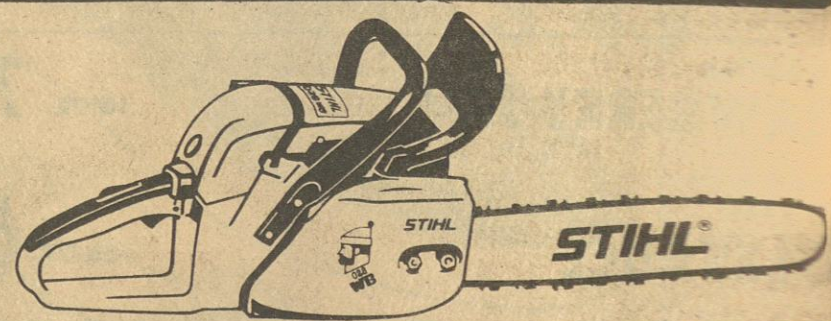

Even a relatively complete diet can fail to provide adequate vitamins and minerals for animals under stress, and stress is a common factor in the lives of all pets. Consider situations like these:

GROWTH PERIOD: For a puppy or kitten, achieving proper growth requires tremendous amounts of energy. The growth rate is especially rapid among large and giant breed puppies.

PREGNANCY AND NURSING: Both cats and dogs experience an increased need for calcium and vitamins A and D during this period - more than double their usual requirements.

SURGERY AND HEALING: Ample supplies of iron, and the copper and cobalt needed to use iron, help animals form new blood components.

ILLNESS: Disease can result in added nutritional demands, especially since a sick animal may not eat properly. Studies have also shown that a lack of vitamins severely impairs production of disease-fighting antibodies. This not only lessens the chance of recovery once an illness strikes; it also means that vaccines administered to a vitamin-deficient animal may not produce maximum protection against future disease.

OLD AGE, DISABILITY: Old or disabled pets present special nutritional problems. Hearty appetites often fade with age, making it more difficult to meet vitamin and mineral needs. In addition, absorption of nutrients may be less efficient than when the animal was younger and more vigorous.

HELMINTH (WORM) INFECTIONS: Pets infected

with worms have increased needs for vitamins and nutrients. This is particularly true of hookworm infections, which cause the loss of whole blood.

1982. If the producer reports to the office by July 15 that he has zero cotton acreage, the cotton base on the farm for 1983 would be 100 acres.

Contracts Needed For Crushing, Exporting Additional Peanuts

Additional peanuts produced for crushing or exporting must be contracted by April 14, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said. Additional peanuts are those marketed from a farm for which a poundage quota has been established and which are in excess of the poundage quota, and also those marketed from a farm for which no farm poundage quota has been established. "This production must be either placed under an approved contract with a handler or be placed under price support loan, at the \$200.00 per ton loan rate. If the additional peanuts are marketed, or considered marketed, in any other way except as green peanuts, they will be designated as quota marketing and subject to a 38.5 cent per pound penalty," the ASCS official said. The peanut price support program no longer limits the number of acres of peanuts that can be planted. This means that any person can grow peanuts anywhere in the country and market the peanuts for other than domestic edible use. Under previous programs,

production was limited to farms with an allotment. According to South, a handler may contract with a farmer to buy additional peanuts for crushing or export, or both. However, all contract forms (CCC-1005) must be submitted to the county ASCS office for approval by April 14. All peanut growers are required to certify their planted acres to the county ASCS office and have peanut marketing cards issued before they can sell peanuts. The cards reflect the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed for domestic edible uses or marketed as contract additional peanuts for export or crush. Peanuts marketed in excess of the contracted quantity are considered marketings of quota peanuts.

Conservation Notes

A wet soil is a cold soil. This is because it takes much more heat to warm a soil that is saturated with water than one that is not. A drained soil becomes warm earlier in the season; therefore, planting can be completed earlier with better germination to be expected.

Crops that are planted on a soil that stays saturated through spring and early summer do not develop a deep root system because of the high water table. The roots tend to spread out along the surface of the soil. During summer droughts, the water table drops and these

shallow rooted plants starve for moisture. On a properly drained soil the plants begin developing a deeper root system early in the season and are better prepared to withstand periods of dry weather.

Drainage of a field to eliminate wet spots can be accomplished by drainage field ditches or by land leveling to smooth the surface irregularities. The elimination of these wet spots can save time and money by allowing the entire field to be planted at the

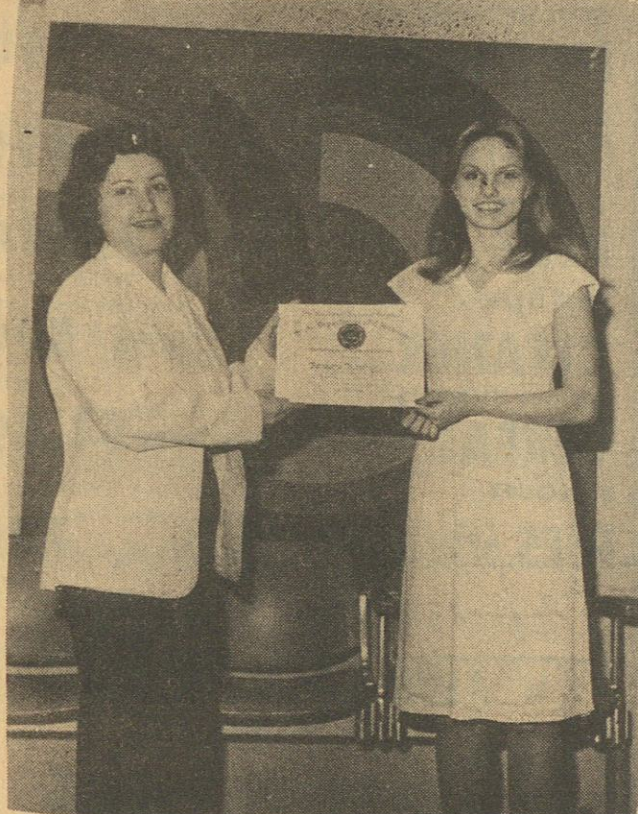

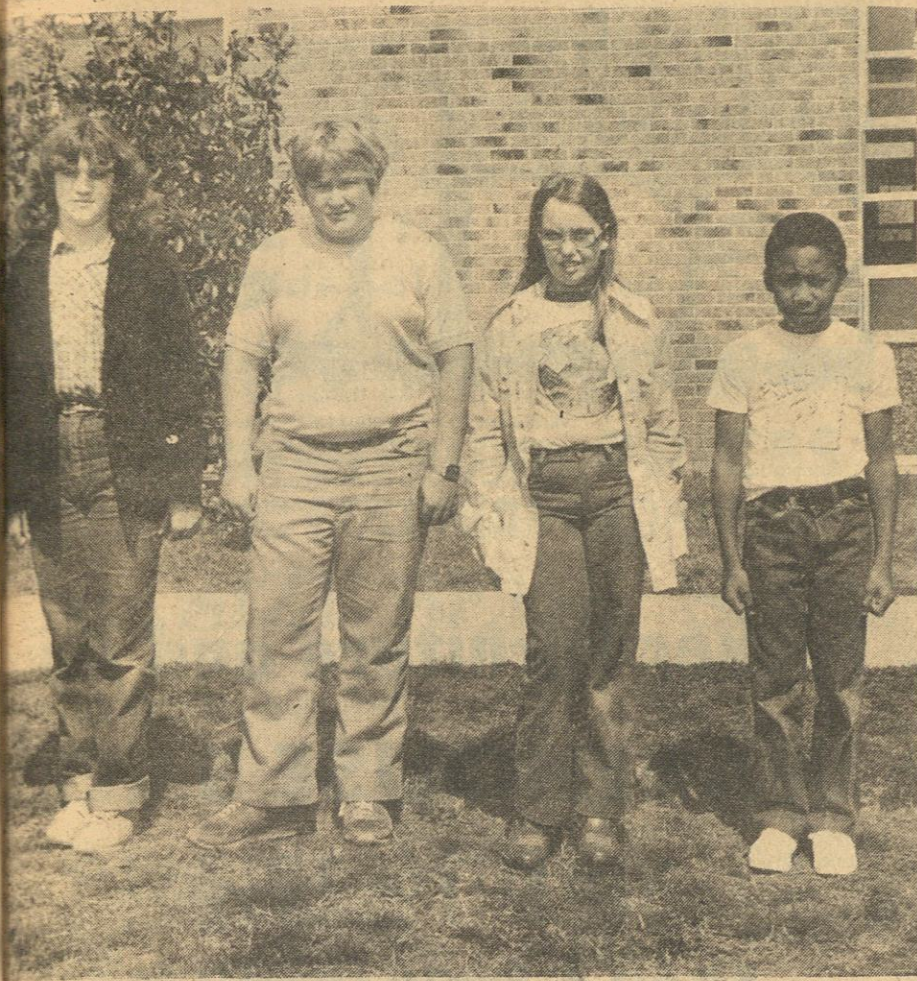

Alcohol Related Accidents

As a Mississippi police officer races to the scene of a fatal traffic accident, chances are better than 50 percent that the accident was related to excessive alcoholic consumption, or driving under the influence (DUI).

Merely determining who's at fault after bodies are pulled from the wreckage is far from adequate. Because of this, the Governor's Highway Safety Program (GHSP), a division of the Governor's Office of Federal-State Programs, currently is training police officers to become more effective in getting DUI drivers off the highways before they cause accidents.

Twenty-three Mississippi police officers recently completed a 44-hour DUI Law Enforcement Training Program at the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers' Training Academy. They are now working with their departments to upgrade DUI law enforcement.

The training program, developed by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, is designed to

improve an officer's ability to detect, apprehend and investigate DUI violators and improve understanding of the drinking-driving relationship to accidents, alcohol's effects on driving behavior and drinking-driving laws. It's also aimed at increasing the officer's efficiency in processing DUI arrests and improving skills in presenting courtroom testimony.

"Sharply reducing alcohol-related accidents is one of the Governor's Highway Safety Program's top priorities," said Ernie Albritton, acting GHSP director. "Beyond contributing to more than half of Mississippi's fatal highway accidents, alcohol also is related to hundreds of injury accidents. Yet, enforcing DUI laws requires considerable expertise."

Effective DUI enforcement requires that a law enforcement officer be able to quickly recognize driving characteristics of an individual who's intoxicated. The officer must know who to properly approach the suspect. "The officer's actions at this point could, if the proper steps are taken, endanger his life or adversely affect his case against the suspect," Albritton said.

The officer also must thoroughly understand

psychological and physical testing techniques. How the driver answers a question often is as important as the answer given. Breath and blood tests can indicate other problems as well as that the driver probably is intoxicated.

"Sometimes, a driver's behavior is related to medicine he or she has been taking or another factor not related to alcohol," Albritton said. "The officer must be able to recognize this and see that the driver receives immediate medical attention. Taking such an individual to jail could endanger the person's life."

Albritton also stressed the importance of effective courtroom testimony. "If this link in the DUI enforcement chain is weak, the officer's prior efforts could be in vain," he said.

With more and more Mississippi police officers trained for effective DUI law enforcement, the chances are better that intoxicated drivers will be taken off the highways before they can cause accidents. Yet, Albritton knows that the DUI problem cannot be solved by police officers alone.

"All Mississippi drivers who consume alcoholic beverages should make prior arrangements for somebody else to drive when transpor-

tation is planned after drinking," Albritton said. "Any Mississippian who spots a vehicle apparently being operated by a DUI driver should immediately notify law enforcement officials. If all of us work together to address this serious problem, the results could be astounding."

Sen. Says Tenn-Tom Completion Means More Jobs

Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) said Monday the Tenn-Tom Waterway will not only improve the "overall efficiency of the nation's transportation system, but that 45,000 jobs will result from the construction and completion of the project."

He commented that savings in transportation costs will mean savings to consumers, farmers, and coal shippers, and will help make U.S. products more competitive in world markets. His remarks came as he

chaired a Senate Appropriations subcommittee hearing on 1983 budget requests for public works projects such as the Tenn-Tom. The Reagan administration has recommended \$186 million for construction work on the waterway during FY 1983.

"If we are to see an improvement in our economy in the years ahead, such improvements will depend to a great deal on our investment in energy efficient transportation."

Senator Cochran said further, "Tenn-Tom is an excellent example of what can be done in the public works area to improve the overall efficiency of our transportation system."

"Inland navigation provided by the completed Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway will not only provide significant benefits to the region where it is located, but the project will contribute in rates and the efficient movement of bulk commodities between competing modes of transportation."

He charged that "outspoken opponents of further development of our inland navigation system have attempted to use the Tenn-Tom project as the focal point of their arguments against water development projects."

"In my view, the Tenn-Tom project has been maligned and misrepresented to the Congress and the public as part of this effort."

Senator Cochran pointed out that by the end of FY 1982, nearly 80 percent of the Tenn-Tom navigational facilities will be completed. "It would be absurd to even consider termination of the project or delaying its completion at this stage of its development."

Drug & Alcohol Awareness Week In Mississippi

By gubernatorial proclamation, the week of April 12-18 is Drug and Alcohol Awareness Week in Mississippi.

A state-wide campaign is underway to make people aware of an important health and safety issue, teenage drinking and driving.

Traffic accidents are the number one cause of death among teenagers. And most of those accidents involve a drinking driver. Fifty percent of high school students report that they drink in cars and about one in four reports driving after having had "a good bit" to drink.

Although drinking alcohol is against the law for most young people, most of them do drink. Surveys show that teens are drinking more and they're starting younger.

Teens are inexperienced at both drinking and driving. When they combine the two, they become auto accidents waiting to happen. Young drinking drivers endanger themselves and everyone else on the road.

Television and radio spots are planned over the next few weeks to publicize the dangers of teenage drinking and driving.

Parents are being urged to talk to their teenagers about drinking and driving. Parents are also being asked to examine their own drinking practices and beliefs to see whether they are setting safe examples for their children.

The lives and health of many of our young people could be affected by this campaign. It deserves your attention and your support.

Know Times To Contact Social Security

It is important that everyone in this area know the proper times to contact social security. Jerry Myatt social security district manager in Corinth said recently.

Knowing the five times action is needed is too important to take for granted. It can mean greater security for local residents and members of their families. A person should contact social security.

* Before he or she gets a first job, because he or she

needs a social security number to get proper credit for earnings.

* After a death in the family, to learn if survivor benefits or a lump-sum death payment are payable.

* When somebody is disabled, to find out if disability benefits are payable.

* At retirement age; 65 for full cash benefits or as early as 62 for reduced payments. Sign up for Medicare 2 or 3 months before 65, even if the person has no plans to stop working.

* Whenever a person has a question about social security or needs to report a change that will affect monthly benefits.

The people at the social security office can tell a person how much work he or she needs to be insured, who can qualify for benefits, how to replace a lost social security or Medicare card, how to get a free statement of his or her earnings record, or what documents are needed when a person applies for benefits. Further information about benefits available through Social Security or SSI may be obtained by contacting any Social Security Office. The phone number in Corinth is 287-5241. 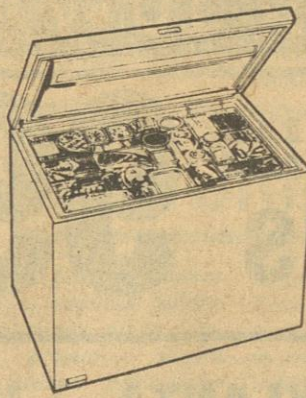

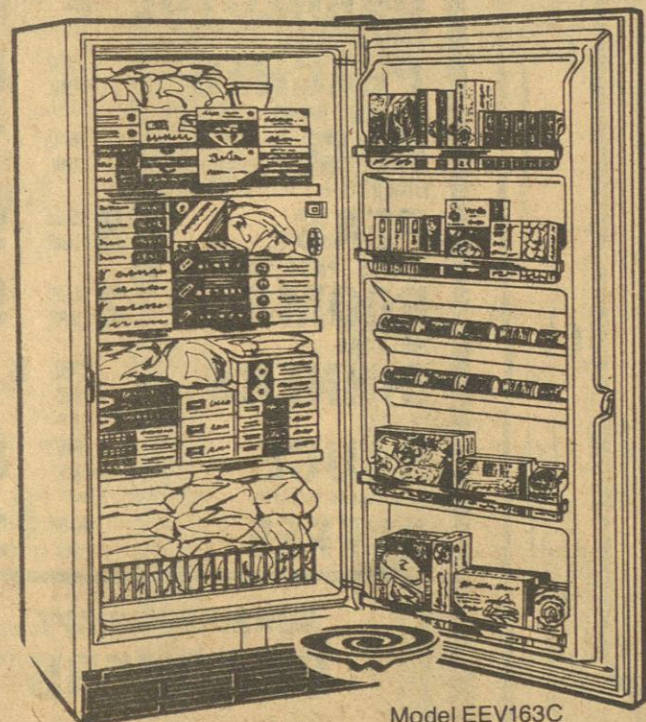

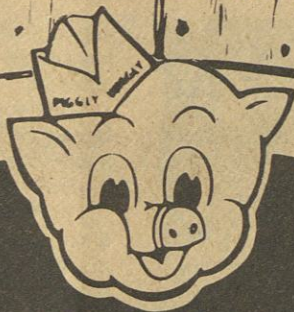
