

#### Chatting With Your Home **Economist**

What's New In **Household Equipment?** 

Several manufacturers are over-the-range microwave ovens with built-in exhaust and light. This configuration appears to be more popular than the three-in-one unit -- conventional oven cook top and microwave oven built

Over-the-range microwaves

are usually slightly smaller than other units. Otherwise most features are available.

Convertible cooktops, either built in or a part of the range, offer such flexibility as a grille, griddle, smooth cooktop, rotisserie,, and regular heating elements.

Some manufacturers now offer a built-in, convertible cooktop with six elements instead of the usual four.

Gas grilling indoors with down draft venting is also

Space-saving washers and dryers are being offered. These can be installed sideby-side or the dryer can be mounted over the washer. These now can be installed in

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homes where there was not room before.

You may not consider lighting fixtures as equipment, but they are a part of the house's equipment. Good news! Some attractive fluorescent ceiling fixtures are now available - fixtures that do not look like they belong in a lab or a workroom. Some are framed in wood. They are attractive and produce considerably more light per watt than incandescent bulbs.

#### **County Agent's** Notes

**Early Blight In Tomatoes** One of the more popular home garden crops in the state is tomatoes. Extension plant pathologist, Dr. Bobby Haygood, says if you have tomatoes in your garden, there is a good chance you have early blight, the most serious foliar disease to effect tomatoes in Mississippi.

Early blight will show up as a circular, dark brown to black spot on the lower, older leaves. As the disease progresses, leaves turn yellow, wither and drop off. Frequently, only the upper half of the plants will have green foliage, and in severe cases, the plant can become completely defoliated late in

Haygood says early blight can also occur as a collar rot, stem canker or fruit spot. Collar rot is characterized by large, brown, slightly sunken, irregular lesions on the stem of seedlings and transplants at or slightly above the

ground level. Haygood says there are several ways to control early blight including buying tolerant varieties, keeping the garden spot clear of dead or decaying plants, and not same spot every year. If you already have a problem with early blight, treat your plants recommended fungicide.

#### **Controlling Weeds** In Noncropland

Weeds can be a nuisance around buildings, especially those containing manure or other fertilizer materials. Extension weed scientist Dr. Wayne Houston says a little thought and some herbicide applications in the next couple of months could greatly reduce the problem.

Houston says you should be careful not to let the spray get into the buildings. To do this keep spray pressures low. Generally 20 pounds per square inch is all that is needed to provide adequate spray pressure.

There are many approaches to controlling weeds in noncropland areas. Houston says once you decide the level of

#### **Transplanting** Trees & Shrubs

When transplanting trees and shrubs, follow up care, in many instances, will determine the success or failure of to the first major branches.

the plant. Extension Horticulturist Jim Perry says the trunks of young trees are susceptible to sunscald, a winter injury caused by freezing sap. To prevent sun scald, wrap the tree with a protective wrap, available at local garden centers. Wrap the trunk from the bottom up

using soft cotton string. Don't use the strong cord or wire that may cut the trunk.

Stake and tie the trees to prevent the wind from whipping the young plant about and moving the roots. Trees less than six feet can be supported with one stake, larger trees will need two or more.

Perry says young trees and shrubs must be watered through the first summer if you expect them to survive. Water thoroughly every week it doesn't rain. Make a ring of soil around the plants to form a small well. Fill the well completely at each watering.

#### **April 16 Acreage Reduction Report Shows** 179.4 Million Acres Enrolled

Farmers nationwide have signed up in the 1982 acreage reduction programs 179.4 million acres of feed grain, rice, upland cotton, and wheat base acreage according to figures released April 20, by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The enrolled acreage represents 79.3 percent of the 226 million acres of total base acreage. USDA reported 130 million acres had been enrolled through the prior week. The signup ended on April 16, and farmers who enrolled are

eligible for program benefits such as Commodity Credit Corporation Loans, target price protection and - for wheat and feed grain participants - eligibility for the grain reserve. Base acreage enrolled includes 72.5 million under the feed grain program, 3.5 million under the rice

program, 13.9 million under the upland cotton program and 74.9 million under the wheat program. Farmers who signed up to participate in the acreage reduction programs for upland cotton, rice and wheat agreed to reduce their base acreage of these commodities by at least 15 percent while feed grain producers will reduce their base acreage by 10 percent. The acreage taken out of production must be devoted to a conservation use.

Enrollment figures show that 77.9% of Mississippi's cotton farmers, had enrolled. Nationwide 80% of the cotton farmers had enrolled. Enrollment figures for other commodities are: Wheat -Mississippi 18.9%, Nation-

evaporation and seepage. This supply usually is dependent upon the watershed but may also include such sources as natural springs and man-made wells.

Soil Conservation Service personnel will, wi hout charge, assist in selecting the pond site, determine the most water for your money and give advice on other pond needs such as clearing the trees and deepening the edges.

After the pond is constructed and the fish have been ordered from the fish hatchery, pond fertility should be dealt with. This factor recognized as necessary for optimum fish production. Nitrogen, potassium. phosphorus. and other elements are known to be necessary for plant growth of microscopic water plant life, an important link in the natural food chain which eliminates the need and cost of commercially feeding the

Some amounts of these elements are added naturally by rain or watershed runoff; however, these amounts are normally small and should be increased by the addition of commercial fertilizer.

fertilizer Commercial should be applied in the spring when the water temperature reaches 75 degrees. An application of 100 pounds of 8-8-8 or 50 pounds of 16-16-4 or 40 pounds of 20-20-5 per surface acre is recommended. Two weeks after first application the water should have a green or reddish brown color. If no color change is noted, repeat the application of fertilizer.

Continue fertilization as needed until fall, or until the temperature falls below 75 degrees.

A good test of water by visual means can be made by holding a white object approximately 12 inches in the water. This can be done by tacking the object on a stick, marking the stick at the right spot. If the white object goes out of sight at the 12 inch mark, the water is fertile enough. If the object can be seen at this depth, it is time to fertilize again.

Have the pH of the pond water checked. If it is as low as 5.5 apply two tons of agricultural lime per acre. Added fertilizer elements are not as available to plant growth in water which has a low pH value; therefore, the fertilizer would not be as ef-

Take a knife and split the sacks of fertilizer down one side, then submerg them in shallow water around the edges of the pod with slit side Wave action will distribute the fertilizer as it dissolves.

Another way is to apply it from a boat. It should be sprinkled in 4' of water or

Care should be taken when stocking the pond. Only fish obtained from a fish hatchery should be used. Obtaining fish from other sources could result in the introduction of undesirable



parasites or disease. Hatchery fish are available free of in recommended numbers and can be ordered from the Soil Conservation

More acres were reforested this year than ever before in the State's history, according to statistics released this week by the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

More than 191,000 acres were either planted to seedlings or direct seeded during the December-March tree planting season. That total surpasses the previous record high year of 1960 when 171,000 trees were planted. mostly under the old Federal

State Forester Dick Allen was understandably pleased with the new State tree planting record:

'I think it reflects the surging interest in tree growing and general support for forestry that is sweeping Mississippi these days. The message is finally getting through to landowners that there is an economic bonanza ahead for those who get their timberlands into full productivity now," said the State Forester.

Allen said despite the current flurry of reforestation activity there is an urgency to do even more of it each year if future demands on our forests are to be met:

"We are still playing catchup as far as regeneration of our cutover and underproductive timberland is concerned. There is a tremendous backlog - several million acres - of privately owned timberland that has been harvested in years past with no follow-up program to assure that it grows back in useful species of trees," he declared.

Allen praised the hard work of Forestry Commission employees and the outstanding support the Agency has been receiving for its program from other conservation agencies and organizations, the State Legislature, Governor William Winter and the general public.

"This new high reforestation activity is the result of a tremendous outpouring of support from all these areas," said Allen, "and Mississippians are going to really benefit in the years ahead as these trees grow and are finally harvested."

#### Law Day U.S.A. May 1

ORIGIN - Law Day was conceived in 1957 by Charles S. Rhyne, a Washington, D.C. lawyer, who was then president of the American Bar

Dwight D. Eisenhower established Law Presidential Day proclamation in 1958. In 1961, the first of May was set aside by joint Resolution of Congress as a "special day of celebration by the American people in appreciation of their liberties and the reaffirmation of their loyalty to the United States of America."

PURPOSE - The purpose of Law Day is to call the attention of every American citizen to both the principles and practice of American law and justice. It is a day to reflect on our legal heritage, the role of law in our society, and the rights we enjoy under our Constitution.

THEME - 1982 marks the 25th anniversary of Law Day. The theme chosen for this landmark year is "Law Day XXI: A Generation of This theme Progress." focuses on the contribution

democratic principles and institutions, even during a time of constitutional challenges and social unrest.

SPONSORSHIP American Bar Association, the national voluntary organization of the legal profession, is the sponsor of Law Day. Seven hundred and local associations. court administrators, staff judge advocates of the military services, businesses, media, schools and churches participate in Law Day programs.

SCOPE - An estimated 44,000 Law Day programs were held throughout the country in observance of Law Day, 1981. These programs took the form of free legal counseling, mock trials, courtroom tours, naturalization ceremonies, essay contests, television and radio shows. films, and exhibits. They reached an estimated 3,665,000 Americans.
