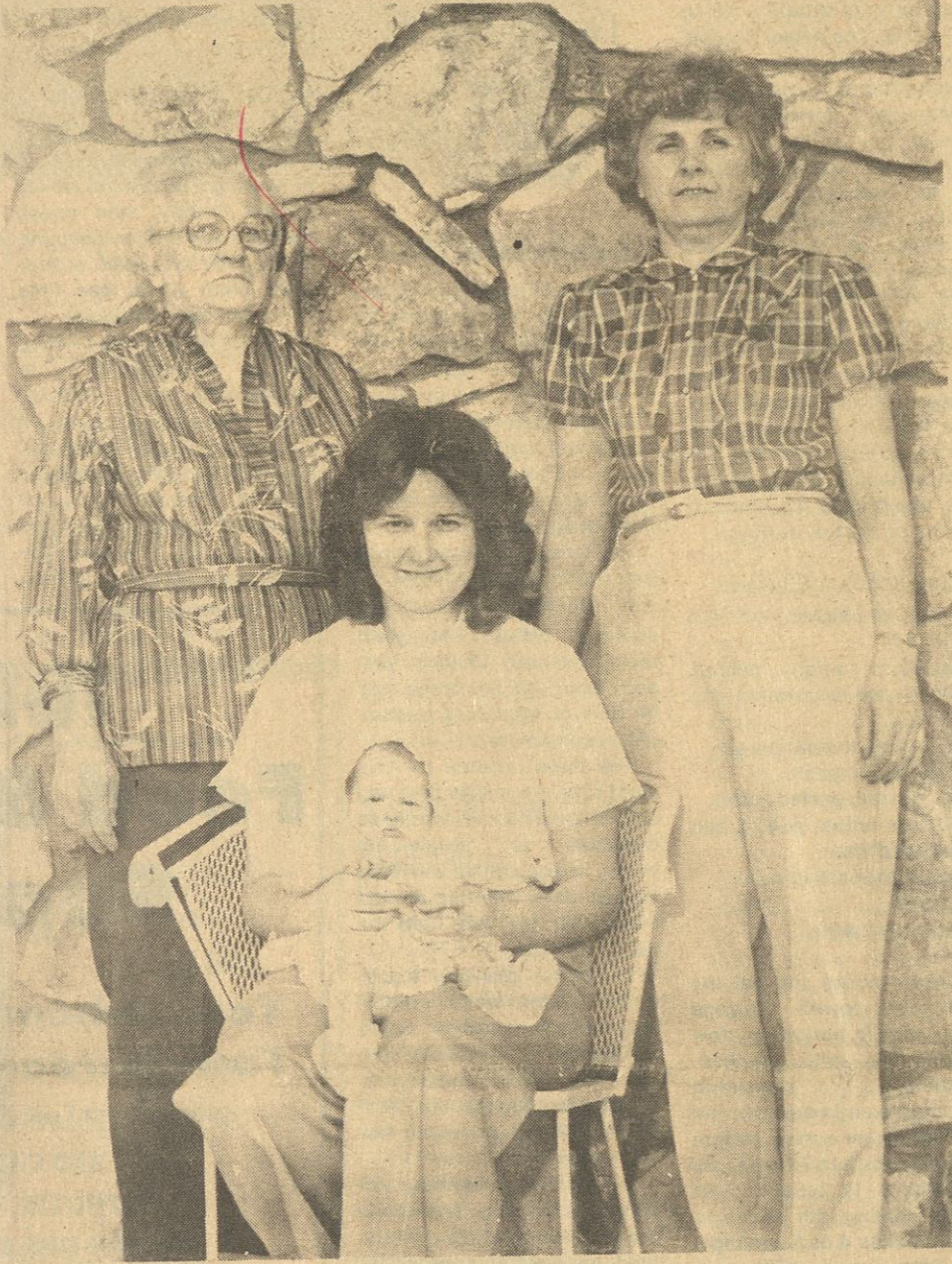

CETA Summer Youth Program Available

Mississippi State Job Service officials have announced that the CETA Summer Youth Employment Program has been funded again this year. Corinth Center Manager Charles Smith stated that Tishomingo County has a tentative allotment of 51 slots and that economically disadvantaged youth ages fourteen through twenty-one will be able to work at various city, county, and school worksites throughout the area again this summer.

"The CETA Summer Youth Program will be similar to last year's program," said Smith. "The Program will begin June 14, 1982, and end on August 6, 1982. Participants will be allowed to work a maximum of 32 hours per week and will be paid minimum wage. Recruitment and selection will be from all segments of the economically disadvantaged youth population and priority will be given to those youths who have not previously been in the Summer Youth Employment Program, with all other factors being considered."

"Application forms for the program have been distributed to local schools and are also available at all Job Service offices. Youth

will be selected for the program by a special committee of at least six county residents. Those most in need will be selected and all will be expected to work and earn their wages," said Smith. "Work and job safety will be stressed and those youth not willing to work will be dismissed. We have more applicants than we do job slots," Smith said, "and those not willing to work will be replaced by someone who is. In addition, there will be intensive labor market orientation to acquaint the summer workers with the area job market and skills in demand, along with other information

Officials Discuss Bell Proposed Rate Hike

Elected officials and representatives from a 13 county area of Northeast Mississippi met with District III Public Service Commissioner D.W. Snyder Thursday, April 22, at the Ramada Inn in Tupelo to discuss a proposed rate increase from the South Central Bell Telephone Company.

Sponsored by N.E.D.A., a local lobbying group, the meeting was an opportunity for officials of the 13-county area served by N.E.D.A. to express their feelings about the proposed increase.

"I can't tell you how I'm going to vote on the case until it's heard," Snyder told the group.

Members of the group - which includes supervisors, mayors and elected state representatives - told Snyder that a large number of the residents of Northeast Mississippi will have their phones disconnected if South Central Bell follows through with the rate increase.

South Central Bell has asked the Public Service Commission of Mississippi to approve a rate hike which would increase the charge for

residential one-party telephone service with one regular set approximately \$7.20 per month. A one-party, one-regular-set business telephone customer would pay an additional \$15.55 per month.

According to Snyder, the Public Service Commission, which has regulatory authority over a number of services in the state, first sets a docket of all cases filed with the agency. The docket is called on the first Tuesday of each month, at which time all non-protested cases are usually heard. Protested cases, such as the South Central Bell case, are set to be heard at a later date.

But Snyder indicated that would not happen in this case. "We're going to have an in-depth hearing," he said. "We've hired a law firm which is very knowledgeable of the utility laws of the state. We've hired Maurice Dantin's firm." (In addition to being a respected attorney, Dantin has been an active political figure in the state within the past few years.)

Snyder said the Public Service Commission is also going to "hire the very best consultants that we think we

can hire."

"They've got the best attorneys that money can buy," he said of the phone company. "They've got the best engineers that money can buy; they've got the best economists that money can buy... the best consultants as a whole. And they are pros. They have teams that go from Atlanta to Montgomery, from Atlanta to Tennessee, from Atlanta to Jackson, MS, to testify in these rate cases and they know so much about what they're doing."

"And that's the reason I say that we've got to hire the very best that money can buy or we're going to be out there in left field not knowing what we're doing," the Commissioner said.

Regardless of the outcome of the hearing, Snyder indicated the rate increase would probably go into effect. If the Commissioners vote to deny the phone company's request, South Central Bell can appeal the decision to the Chancery Court of Hinds County. If they are not satisfied with the outcome of that appeal, they can then take the case to the state Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, the phone company can go ahead and implement the rate increase as scheduled on May 7, with the understanding that if they lose the appeals, they will have to refund the extra money collected from their customers.

"Just yesterday," Snyder said Thursday, "South Central Bell came to our office and they filed a bond of \$50 million. And that bond is to assure the people that if they collect this money while this case is being heard, that they'll have enough money to refund the money if it is finally adjudicated that it should be issued back to the people."

Until July 1, the phone company will be required to pay 8 percent interest on any money it has to refund to customers. However, on July 1 a new law, passed during

the 1982 session of the state legislature, will go into effect, requiring the payment of interest on such money at 2 percent above the discount rate. With the discount rate at its current 12 percent level the phone company would have to pay 14 percent interest on any overcharges after July 1.

Snyder said last week that a proposed increase from 10 cents to 25 cents for calls from pay phones will not go into effect until after the Supreme Court ruling - if the case goes that far - "because if someone made a call from them they wouldn't know who to refund that money to if it was finally turned down by the Supreme Court."

In feedback to the Commissioner, many of those at the meeting indicated the phone company would lose customers if it implements the rate increase.

"What's going to happen on this deal, the way I see it, they're going to lose half of their customers in my county," one official said. "I've heard people talking."

"And they're going to lose three phones at my house," he continued. "I've just got three and they're fixing to lose them. If it goes up, they can have them all. I'm a county supervisor, but I don't need one."

Snyder also confirmed Thursday that people living in rural areas are eventually going to have to pay more for telephone service than those who live in more populous areas.

The Commissioner said that the people living in the cities have been subsidizing local telephone rates for those who live 15-30 miles out in rural areas.

"Now the federal government says you can't do that; you're going to have to go back there and charge for the cost of running that telephone line out into the rural area," he said. "And it's going to be prohibitive for those people to have phones out there. It is not right."

Burnsville Man Dies From Gunshot Wound

Kenneth Larry Glover, 21, of Burnsville, died Wednesday, April 28, at the Baptist Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., as a result of a gunshot wound inflicted by a .25 caliber pistol on April 20, said Sammie Davidson, an investigator with the Savannah Police Department.

Glover, who worked as a carpenter, was wounded once in the neck in the shooting incident in Savannah, Tenn. Davidson said Glover and another man were searching an abandoned house in a mixed residential and business area on the south side of town about 6:45 p.m. on the 20th, when the shooting occurred.

No charges have yet been filed, said Davidson. The shooting is still under investigation. Services were Saturday, May 1, at Coleman Funeral Home East Chapel Burial was in the Carpenter's Cemetery.

Survivors include his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Glover, of Burnsville; his mother, Mrs. Maudie Wilson Glover; two sisters, Mrs. Bonnie Weathers, of Iuka, and Mrs. Wanda Light, of Burnsville; two step-sisters, Miss Lee Ann Glover and Miss Christy Glover, both of Burnsville; a brother, Thurman Glover, of Corinth; four step-brothers, Jackie Waldrop, Tony Waldrop, Lonnie Waldrop, and Shawn Waldrop, all of Burnsville; his grandmother, Mrs. Ivy Glover, of Iuka.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Slow Cookers

Our new eating style revolves around certain trends that will influence our food habits and nutrition in the years to come. Following are some of the forces that are affecting the purchasing and preparation of food:

Many former housewives and now employed outside the home, so the woman of

the family is no longer doing all the food shopping and cooking. Husband and children are helping out in the kitchen and supermarket. And everyone's work is being made simpler with convenient new food products and appliances.

Consumers are looking for quality and value in food. Inflation and high prices, combined with the consumer education movement, have made us all more aware of what we're getting for our money in the supermarket.

Meat consumption is decreasing. This trend reflects the rise in food prices. Main dishes still revolve around a source of protein,

but the tendency is to stretch expensive meats with the less expensive protein sources of eggs, cheese, dried peas and beans, pasta, and rice.

Calories and cholesterol are being watched carefully. Along with consumer education has come nutrition education. We're beginning to realize that diet is closely linked with health, and many meals are being prepared with an eye to attaining trim, fit bodies.

These trends are spurring the development of new cooking methods and food choices. One example is the one-pot meal. This is a thrifty, simple, nutritious way to serve dinner when time is at a premium. One-pot meals are logical fare for the family that sits down together only at dinnertime, and only on certain nights. Everything is ready at once - a speedy salad, beverage, a simple dessert, and perhaps a loaf of bread rounds out the meal.

And if one family member is delayed at the office or an after-school activity, reheating is easy and does not detract from taste appeal.

The typical one-pot meal includes a protein, such as meat, chicken, or fish; a carbohydrate, such as rice or pasta; and vegetables, all cooked together in one vessel to meld flavors and preserve nutrients. Smaller amounts of expensive protein can be combined with beans, cheese, eggs, etc., to stretch the protein value. And less expensive cuts of meat can be tenderized by the longer, slower cooking process.

One-pot meals are experiencing a renewed popularity, and so is the equipment for making them. Freezer-to-oven casseroles and Chinese woks are best sellers.

The electric slow-cookers have gained favor with busy homemakers. Although the

package is quite different, the principle behind the slow-cookers is the same as that of the large black kettles fancied by our colonial ancestors. Both are designed to cook an entire meal in a covered pot at an even, low temperature over a long period of time. The result of the all-day simmering is a variety of savory, hearty, and money-saving dishes.

The modern slow-cookers are equipped to do their work all day without further attention from the chef - thus freeing the working mother or father from the kitchen for his or her full-time job. The ingredients simply have to be put in the pot in the morning and, by dinnertime, a tasty meal is ready for the table.

Slow-cooking appliances go by many names - the crockpot, pot-o-plenty, and crock-watcher are among them. The originals have a lining of thick stoneware that evenly conducts heat through low-wattage heating elements around the sides and bottom of the pot. The energy consumed by the slow-cookers is about equal to that

used by a light bulb - 75 to 150 watts. The newer models have browning trays, metal constructions, removable stoneware servers, and timers.

All slow-cookers operate on the principle of maintaining the cooking temperature at around 200 degrees F. so that cooking is slow and steady. Some have high and low settings, so that food can be cooked faster in the beginning and then slowed down towards the end. Basically, cooking time can be adjusted to suit the daily schedule. Most dishes take about 8 to 10 hours if cooked on the low setting.

Slow Cooker Chicken
1 (3 pound) chicken, cut into 8 pieces
1 medium onion, peeled, sliced and separated into rings
1 (16 oz.) can tomato puree
1 tsp. tomato paste
1 tsp. minced, peeled garlic
1 medium onion, peeled and chopped fine
1 tsp. dried basil leaves
2 tsp. salt
2 small bay leaves

Rinse chicken and pat dry with paper towels. Arrange onion rings in bottom of slow cooker. Top with chicken. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over the chicken. Cover cooker, set on low and cook 5 to 7 hours, until chicken is tender. Just before serving, stir sauce to blend. Makes 4 or 5 servings. It's also good with hot, cooked spaghetti.

Protecting Your Puppy Against Canine Distemper

Canine distemper (CD) is a viral infection and the most serious disease of dogs. CD may cause either death or permanent disability in infected dogs. For this reason, it is vital to protect your puppy by vaccinating it against distemper as early as possible.

A puppy's mother passes antibodies to her litter through her milk. These antibodies protect each pup against such diseases as distemper - but only temporarily. As the puppy grows older, the maternal antibodies begin to disappear and the pup becomes increasingly susceptible to CD. At 6 weeks of age (about the age of weaning), 50% of all

puppies have lost their maternal antibody protection and are susceptible to distemper. Virtually all maternal antibody protection is lost by 12 weeks of age. Therefore, your veterinarian may recommend distemper vaccination at, or shortly after, 6 weeks of age.

Facts About Canine Distemper

Canine distemper is a worldwide viral disease of

dogs.

With today's large pet population, nearly every dog will be exposed to CD at some time during its life.

Once symptoms appear, there is no treatment for the viral infection.

Canine distemper causes death in many dogs. Dogs that live through the disease often never fully recover.

Symptoms of distemper include: rising temperature, discharge from eyes and nose, behavioral changes (often depression), and apparent nervous disorders such as seizures, "gum-chomping", and jerking movements.

CONVENTIONAL CANINE DISTEMPER VACCINATION

A pup's maternal antibodies protect it from CD virus for a brief time, but during that same period of time the antibodies also neutralize CD vaccine. Only when the pup's maternal antibodies subside, and the puppy is susceptible to the disease, can conventional vaccination be effective.

Because loss of maternal antibodies varies from puppy to puppy (even within the same litter), and because there is no convenient way to

tell when a particular pup is susceptible to CD, a series of shots is usually given to provide protection at the earliest possible date.

A NEW APPROACH: DISTEMPER-MEASLES VACCINATION

In recent years, scientists have discovered an interesting phenomenon: a dog's system cannot completely distinguish between the canine distemper virus and the human measles virus. This means that vaccinating the puppy against one viral disease (measles) can stimulate immunity against another viral disease (CD).

Puppies older than 12 weeks of age should respond to standard, distemper vaccinations, and this is the immunization recommended for these older animals. But for maximum protection of the young puppy, a program consisting of a combination distemper-measles vaccination between 6 and 12 weeks of age, followed by standard distemper vaccination at 12 to 16 weeks, is often recommended.

Mrs. Lela Clark, President of luka Auxiliary Post 15, and Mrs. Irene Barnes, vice-president, attended the conference.

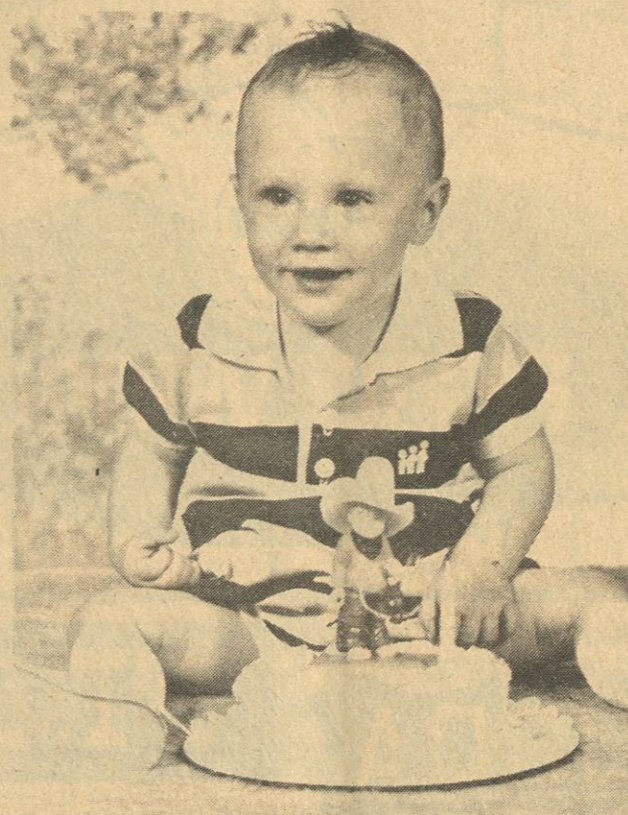
St. Mary's Church Bingo Huge Success

TIMBERLINE

Timberland is a valuable possession. It's worth a lot of money. And that's about as good a reason as any for an owner to plan its management with the same businesslike forethought that he would any other valuable asset.

The sad fact is, however, according to the State Forestry Commission, most Mississippi forest owners give little, if any, serious thought at all to planning the management of their timber.

And it's costing them big money. Every forest, no matter how large or small, should be managed according to a plan if the owner is to realize maximum benefits from it, say forest management specialists with the Forestry Commission.

The plan may be as simple as a few paragraphs in a notebook or as complex as a journal on forest technology and economics. It's the point that counts: planned management.

As one forester put it, "a forest management plan simply sets down in an orderly way the steps to take to improve the volume and the quality of a timber stand."

The content of any management plan, no matter how large or small the timber acreage, should be based on three things: 1) The owner's objectives and his financial limitations; 2) The size, condition and capabilities of the woodland; and 3) Expected markets.

For small forests, especially those under 30 acres, and for woodlands composed entirely of young timber, a simple plan may be all that's needed. This plan would list the action to be taken for a period of time, say about five years.

For example, if reforestation is needed, the plan would indicate the area needing planting, number of trees required, species to plant, spacing and approximate date to plant. Planting planned for a specific year or different years is also indicated.

The plan might also outline the location of proposed ac-

cess roads, fire breaks, or other improvements needed. A cutting may be planned for a certain area, a thinning for another area.

For a larger forest, where some of the timber is mature or approaching maturity and the landowner wants repeated, frequent income the plan should include a schedule for harvesting on a sustained yield basis.

This would require a timber inventory and growth study so that a program of annual or periodic harvest cutting could be prescribed to ensure a continual operation without depleting the resource.

This more complex plan would also include a "cutting budget" showing areas to be cut, approximate volume to be cut, various harvesting practices, the data on present volume by species and products, annual or periodic growth and other helpful information.

Other essentials provided for in a forest management plan include: a timber type map; marketing recommendations; allowances to natural seeding; timber stand improvement measures protection from wildfire grazing, insects and diseases; and wildlife habitat.

Timber owners desiring forest management plans are urged to contact the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

Last year, Commission foresters developed management plans for over 1,500 Mississippi landowners that involved 112,813 acres.

4-H Volunteers Honored

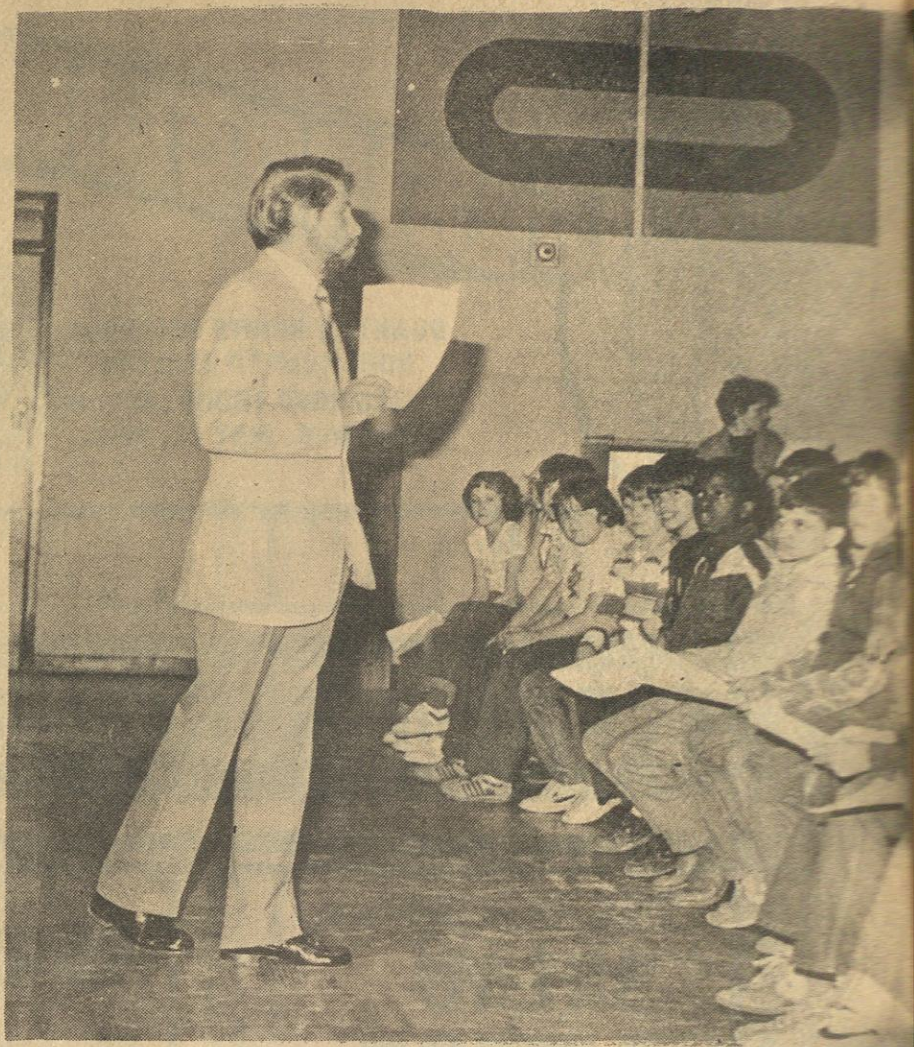

Some farmers have a poor stand and/or mildew damage. Federal Crop Insurance adjusters MUST inspect the crop before it is destroyed if a claim is to be made.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE — Pre-Measurement of acreage to be planted or acreage to be set-aside in 1982 is available at a reasonable cost through the ASCS Office. After crops are

planted, measurement services are also available to anyone needing to know the acreage planted or set-aside in order to file accurate certification. Contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office for further details.
