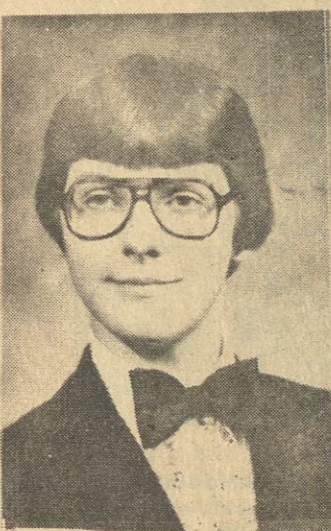

## Plane Crash Kills Iuka Pharmacist, Son and a Kentucky Man Tuesday

The crash of a six passenger, Piper Lance plane, minutes after takeoff from the Iuka Airport Tuesday evening, May 11, claimed the lives of an Iuka Pharmacist, his young son, and a Kentucky man, when the single engine plane in which they were riding crashed at the Iuka Airport, Tishomingo County Sheriff Amos Bates said. Mr. Buse was piloting the plane.

The dead were identified as Tommy Sims Buse, 43, Iuka Pharmacist; his young son, Anthony Buse, age 5; and John E. Howard, a machinist, of Martin, Ky.

Local authorities were reportedly notified of the crash shortly after 5:00 p.m.

According to reliable sources, Mr. Buse, the pilot of the small craft, had taken off from the north end of the runway. His brother, Joe Buse, of Corinth, was awaiting departure in a Piper Cherokee 140. When airborne, Buse attempted to circle the airport and observe his brother's take-off. Approaching from a southside easterly direction, he apparently went into a slide and the wing of the plane caught a bank at the north end of the runway, scattering debris for

approximately 100 yards. Bates said a clock that was thrown out of the plane stopped at 5:06.

Tishomingo County Coroner, Charles Lamberl, said the three died of multiple bodily injuries.

Mr. Buse came to Iuka nine years ago, and was owner and operator of Super B Drugs in Iuka. He was also owner of a pharmacy in Corinth. He was a member of Iuka Baptist Church.

Joint funeral services for Mr. Buse and his son will be held at 2:00 Thursday afternoon (today), May 13, at Cutshall Funeral Home. Burial will be in Memorial Gardens.

Survivors include his wife, Renate Elizabeth Buse, Iuka;

five sons, Raymond Kha Buse, Iuka, Joseph Thomas Buse, Memphis, Tenn., Michael Lloyd Buse, Iuka, Thomas Sims Buse, Jr., Iuka, and Bergie Allen Buse, Memphis, Tenn.; two daughters, Julia Marie Buse Parsons, Iuka, and Kimberly Dawn Buse, Memphis, Tenn.; two brothers, Joe Claude Buse, Corinth, and Dennis Ray Buse, Tupelo; two sisters, Mrs. Judy Collier, Tupelo, and Mrs. Linda Waldrup, Tupelo; and his mother, Mrs. Luna Sims Buse, Tupelo.

Funeral services for John E. Howard were incomplete at press-time. The body will be transferred to Martin, Ky. for burial. He is survived by his wife and two children.

### Two Injured In Car-Train Accident Tuesday

An early evening car-train accident at the Main Street Crossing in downtown Iuka occurred around 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, May 11. Mrs. Maxine Cutshall, an Iuka Businesswoman, driving a 1981 Cadillac, was apparently attempting to cross the tracks when she was struck in the left rear by a west-

bound Southern freight train. Mrs. Cutshall's grandson, Steven H. "Bo" Murphy, Jr., was also an occupant in the car. Engineer of the Southern freighter was P.M. Hinton, and M. Myhand was the driver. Both are employees of Southern Railway. Mrs. Cutshall was rushed to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to Colfee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala. She suffers

from multiple cuts and bruises and both lungs were punctured in the mishap, but no major complications are anticipated, according to a family spokesman. At press-time, Mrs. Cutshall was confined in the Intensive Care Unit at Colfee. Bo Murphy, age 11, was treated at Tishomingo County Hospital and released. He suffers from cuts and bruises and injuries to the mouth.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Poultry & Eggs

Poultry and eggs continue to be two of the most effective weapons against the high price of protein sources. In fact, you can use them in nutritious, yet cost-conscious meals.

You can take better advantage of these bargains when you know which quality factors to look for in these products. Just by checking label information, you can predict the tenderness, meatiness and appearance of poultry and the interior quality of eggs.

Lean poultry is an important part of a healthy diet. There are two U.S. Department of Agriculture insignias you may see on poultry. One is the inspection mark, which means that the bird is safe and wholesome to eat. The inspection mark does not tell you anything about the tenderness of meatiness of the bird. For information about these factors, look for the USDA grade and class of the bird.

All poultry sold in containers to look for in these products. Just by checking label information, you can predict the tenderness, meatiness and appearance of poultry and the interior quality of eggs.

summer markets has been inspected for wholesomeness, and the inspection mark is displayed on many consumer packages. But not all poultry is graded for quality. Look for the grade mark for information about the meatiness of the bird. U.S. Grade A chickens, turkeys, ducks and capons are the meatiest and have the fewest tares in their skin.

You can predict the tenderness of a bird by looking for the class or age. Young birds, usually labeled as broilers, fryers, and roasters, are the most tender. Older birds, which are good for stewing, baking, and soups, are often labeled as stewing hens.

Although chickens are referred to as broilers, you can broil, bake barbecue, roast, fry, oven-fry or saute them.

When you buy chickens for frying, figure about 3/4 or 1/2-pound per serving. You can buy them whole, halved, quartered or buy a package of your favorite cuts. One of the nicest ways to perk up summer is with a festive breakfast or brunch. The menu may vary according to where you live. Johnny-cakes, hotcakes, or grits, ham, bacon, pork chops or corned beef hash are just a few items to choose for a brunch. And, the national accompaniment for all these brunch favorites is eggs. Scramble them, fry them or

poach them. But, no matter how you prepare eggs, be sure you buy the right quality eggs for the intended use.

The USDA grade on the carton will tell you what you need to know about quality. Higher quality eggs (Grades AA and A) are ideal frying and poaching - where appearance is important. They are also the best choice for hard-cooked eggs.

When you buy eggs, you may note that prices vary by size for the same grade. To determine which size eggs will give you the most for your money, look at the price differential between medium

and large eggs, for example. If there is less than a seven cent price spread per dozen between one size and the next larger size - same grade, you will get more for your money when you buy the larger size.

## County Agent's Notes

### Fertilize On Time

The next two months - May and June - are when most farmers side dress (fertilize) crops like cotton, corn and sorghum with nitrogen. It's a good time to apply, because that's when the crops really need it.

Nitrogen losses, either through the soil or air, start as soon as it's applied. It makes sense, then, that you can cut losses by making application near to the time the crop will use it.

Most crops use 75 percent or more of their nitrogen from just before fruiting until the fruit is mature. For cotton, apply any fertilizer that's needed by early squaring. Fertilize corn by the time it is 12 inches tall and sorghum by the time it is eight inches tall. The amount to put on

Tishomingo County News - Vidette - Belmont depends on the crop production potential, the soil and the crop grown. Generally, you need enough nitrogen on corn to bring the total to 120 to 200 pounds per acre. Sorghum needs 80 to 120 pounds, cotton 60 to 120 pounds.

The nitrogen source itself, whether it's ammonium nitrate, anhydrous ammonia or urea, doesn't make a lot of difference. That's provided you apply it correctly and on time.

The way to tell if cotton, for instance, needs more nitrogen at fruiting is to take petiole samples. The County Extension Office has more details on taking the samples.

### Lime On Lawns & Gardens

Lime is important for crop and forage production, but it's also important for growing lawns and gardens. Extension Agronomy leader, Dr. Kelton Anderson, says lime is needed for lawns and gardens because most Mississippi soils are acid and need lime to make them more productive.

Anderson says a soil test will tell you if your lawn or garden needs lime. For details on taking soil samples and other lawn and garden practices, contact your County Extension Agent.

### Lawnmowing

Your lawnmower can be dangerous if you don't use precaution when operating it. Extension Farm Safety Specialist Dannie Reed says always clear your yard of rocks, sticks, and other debris before mowing. These objects could be picked up by the mower blade and thrown with great force through the discharge chute. Another precaution is to dress

properly for mowing lawn. Reed suggests sturdy shoes and slacks. Never mow while barefoot, wearing sandals or flip-flops.

## Answers From Veterans Administration

Q - Under the pension law, can a person who does not have a child nor reasonably expect a child support additional pension? A - No. The person must be paying child support to be entitled to a pension amount.

Q - My husband was service connected for a disability. Am I eligible for a pension? A - Yes. Payment of \$1,100 is allowed to a veteran's death benefit connected. This is in lieu of the \$300 allowance and the pension.

Q - The premium National Service Insurance are waived, am I totally disabled? I received my annual check. Should I be paid? A - No. You may check. Waiver of does not affect a dividend.

Q - How much assistance can I get under the noncombat Bill? A - Up to \$75 a month with an overall maximum of \$911.

Today's pet, living with

hundreds of other dogs or cats in their cities, encounters certain hazards that were unknown or were lesser problems to their ancestors. These include intensified concentration of parasites, dietary deficiencies, restricted exercise, and even artificial heating and cooling of homes and kennels. But with good care and judgement your pet can still have a healthy skin and haircoat.

**PERIODIC EXAMINATION:** Because of the number of complexity of conditions that affect the health of dogs and cats, regularly scheduled examinations are important to your pet. Professional examinations often reveal problems which could become serious if neglected. "Look alike" skin conditions, for example, may have completely different causes. Indiscriminate treatment wastes time and may even be harmful.

**THREE FREQUENT CAUSES OF HAIRCOAT PROBLEMS — PARASITES:** Both external and internal parasites are frequent causes of skin and haircoat conditions. Fleas, lice, ticks, and various kinds of mites live on or in the skin and cause severe itching, inflammation, poor health and even death. Internal parasites, such as roundworms, tapeworms, and hookworms, may also result in haircoat problems.

**DIETARY DEFICIENCIES:** Skin afflictions and rough, dull haircoats may result from conditions such as anemia, vitamin or fatty acid deficiencies, and overfeeding of protein or carbohydrates. A professional examination may reveal a need to change the diet, to supplement it with minerals or vitamins, or to increase the supply of absorp-

tion of fatty acids.

**HORMONAL IMBALANCES:** Dry, scaly, thickened skin and even loss of hair may result from an underactive thyroid. Tumors of the testicles in male dogs and malfunctioning pituitary and adrenal glands can cause skin and haircoat problems. Senility is only one of the possible causes of alopecia (loss of hair).

**OTHER PROBLEMS:** Miscellaneous causes of skin and haircoat problems include ringworms, insect bites, allergies, overexposure to sun's rays, drying of the skin and haircoat caused by artificial heat, diseases including distemper and diabetes, and insufficient or improper grooming. Because of individual differences in animals, a shampoo or chemical that causes no apparent reaction in one dog may cause a severe skin irritation in another.

**PROFESSIONAL HELP:** A pet's skin or haircoat problem may have a single cause. Or it may be due to a combination of factors. As a result of their often complex nature, many conditions require an extended period of treatment. This in turn calls for patience and understanding on the part of the pet owner. However, professional diagnosis and treatment, combined with your good care and nursing, will usually result in restored health and a happy, useful pet.

#### A Close Look At No-Till Farming

You read a lot these days about no-till farming. It seems that the craze is sweeping the country, and its gaining popularity here in Mississippi. Well, what's no-till farming all about?

To begin with, no-till farming is not so new. In many parts of the nation, farming without cultivation has been practiced for many years. In Mississippi, a few farmers have tried their hand at it as far back as 1960. But in the last few years, no-till has come under the spotlight. Why, you ask? Well, it could be that no-till farming saves a lot of high priced, hard-to-get fuel and many tons of soil that some plow-wary fields can't afford to lose. When you get down to it, no-till farming is saving valuable topsoil, yet

keeping yields up.

The land is not prepared for planting and is not cultivated when the crops are up and growing. Weed and grass control is the main reason we plow crops to begin with, and herbicides are applied to eliminate that problem.

When no-till farming is used, the land is never stirred. To a farmer, this means saving moisture that could be lost when the land is plowed. So if no-till farming is used, more moisture is available for the crops. During 1981 moisture was critical in many areas.

More moisture is available when crops like soybeans are planted no-till, because the beans are planted right behind the combine of the previous crop, say wheat. In many cases a farmer can get his beans up and growing weeks earlier if he no-till plants as compared to conventionally planted beans. This could mean the difference in success or failure, or at least the difference in a few bushels of beans.

In Mississippi, most no-till farming has been soybeans behind wheat. That will probably also be the case in 1982. So if you are interested in trying some no-till beans, you may want to think about this.

Some guidelines: Select fields free of johnson and other perennial grasses; locate a planter you can use to plant beans in residue; line up a good herbicide product

and apply it at planting or soon afterwards; plant beans right behind the combine; and don't burn the wheat residue, but put a shredder or spreader on the combine to scatter it.

If you need additional information, check with the Soil

Conservation Service Office in Iuka. No-till farming can save a lot of soil and a lot of fuel and save your land from erosion.

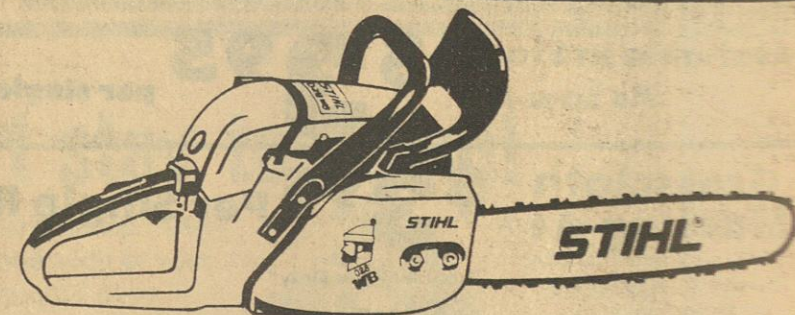

## Taxpayers Beware of False Tax Credit Advertising

While many taxpayers can claim a legitimate tax credit for insulation, storm windows, solar heating and other devices installed to reduce the energy used to heat and cool their homes, some taxpayers may be misled by false advertisements claiming that certain ineligible products qualify for the residential energy tax credit, the Internal Revenue Service said.

An item qualifies for the credit if it is specifically mentioned as eligible in the regulations determining product eligibility. Manufacturers are permitted to advertise that their product has been "certified" as eligible for the tax credit by the IRS. The IRS will, upon request by the manufacturer, review and certify a product as eligible, but it is not necessary that the product be "certified" in order for taxpayers to take the credit. Furthermore, taxpayers should be aware that some manufacturers have falsely advertised that an ineligible product is eligible for the credit or has been "certified."

The residential energy credit is made up of two credits: the energy conservation credit and the renewable energy source credit. Some of the most common conservation products include storm or thermal window and doors, roof, floor, and wall insulation, or an automatic set back thermostat to save energy when no one is home. For these types of conservation items, taxpayers can take an energy conservation credit of 15 percent of the first \$2,000 spent, with a maximum credit of \$300.

The credit is based on the cost of items installed after April 19, 1977 and before January 1, 1986. Also, the taxpayer's principal residence for which these items are purchased and installed must have been built or substantially completed before April 20, 1977.

Renewable energy source equipment, such as solar collectors, windmills, or geothermal devices, are eligible for the renewable energy source credit. The credit is 40 percent of the first \$10,000. Unlike the energy

conservation credit, this credit may be claimed for equipment installed in connection with a personal residence no matter when it was built. The cost of leasing renewable energy source property is not eligible for the energy credit.

Certain items are specifically excluded from the residential energy credit. For example, drapes, carpeting, wood paneling and exterior siding may have an insulating effect, but are primarily structural or decorative. Other items not eligible for the credit include wood, coal, or peat burning stoves, heat pumps, fans, fluorescent lights, and hydrogen-fueled equipment.

To compute the credit, taxpayers should use Form 5695, "Energy Credits," and enter the credit on line 45 of the Form 1040. Taxpayers should keep in mind that if a credit is claimed for an ineligible item, the tax which was due, as well as interest and penalties, will be assessed.

## USDA ISSUES COUNTY LOAN AND PURCHASE RATES FOR 1982—CORN, SORGHUM

County loan and purchase rates for 1982-crop corn and sorghum grading no. 2 or better have been announced. Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, said the county loan and purchase rates are based on the national average loan and purchase rates of \$2.55 per bushel for corn and \$4.32 per hundredweight for sorghum announced earlier. The 1982 national rate for corn is 15 cents per bushel above the 1981 level and this year's national sorghum rate is 25 cents per hundredweight higher than the previous year. For corn, the area-to-area relationships, prices received by farmers and trends in production required adjustments of some state and county rates. These changes resulted in 2 cents per bushel over the 15-cent rate for a net increase of 17 cents per bushel for farmers in Mississippi. No change was made in the schedule of premiums and discounts. Copies of the new rates are being prepared in Washington and are available from the cotton, grain, and rice price support division and will be available in the

county office in a few days.

CCC LOAN RATE INCREASED TO 14.125 PERCENT

Commodity and farm storage facility loans disbursed in May by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation will carry a 14.125 percent interest rate. This interest rate was announced this week by President Everett Rank, who is also administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The new rate, up from 13.875 percent, reflects the interest rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury in May.

## Food Stamp Recipients

Households receiving food stamps have the responsibility to report certain changes in their circumstances to the county welfare department. Food stamp recipients who fail to report changes can be penalized or even face prosecution by local authorities.

The changes must be reported within ten day of the date the change becomes known to the household. Changes may be reported by mail, telephone or personal contact.

Households must report (1) changes in the source of income or in the amount of gross monthly income that changes by more than \$25; (2) changes in monthly medical expenses of more than \$25; (3) the addition or loss of a household member; (4) change in residence and any resulting change in shelter costs; (5) acquisition of a licensed vehicle not previously reported; (6) when cash on hand, stocks, bonds and money in a bank account or savings institution totalling \$1,500 or over.

When a recipient fails to report a change, it could result in an overissuance of food stamps, in which case, the Department of Public Welfare files a claim. The recipient has the right to request a fair hearing and challenge the claim.

Suspected fraud claims are

referred to the agency's Legal Services Department for investigation. These cases may be referred for a fraud hearing or for court action. The penalty for welfare fraud ranges from misdemeanor to a felony conviction with

possible disqualification from program participation and a repayment requirement. According to James Welch, Director of the Fraud Investigation Unit, Division of Legal Services, "The Legal Services Division views

prosecution of criminal fraud cases as a major enforcement goal. Additionally this division has developed civil prosecution remedies for program abusers. This division will continue in its efforts to curb program abuse

through the prosecution, either criminally or civilly, of program abusers." The great majority of welfare fraud convictions are the result of the client's failure to report the correct income and/or employment.

"The Department of Public Welfare is a human services agency and, as such, is dedicated to providing services to those in need," said Max M. Cole, Deputy Commissioner-Programs, "the agency has an obligation to

the taxpayer to ensure that public funds are not misspent. This goal can be accomplished with the help of the recipient in accurately reporting household circumstances."

## Requesting Past Copies of Returns

Taxpayers who do not have copies of their previous years' tax returns and need to

request them from the Internal Revenue Service, can expect a six week wait to receive a copy of the forms, said. This wait is due principally to the large number (approximately 1.8 million) of

copy requests expected by the IRS this year. Some of the reasons why taxpayers may need to request copies of previous years' returns are for income averaging, student loans, and mortgage purposes. Tax-

payers needing previous years' tax returns should prepare a Form 4506, "Request for Copy of Tax Form" for each return requested. The forms should be sent to the service center

where the return was filed.

With the increasing demand for past tax records, the best way to avoid delays in the future, the IRS said, is keep previous years' tax returns as part of permanent tax records. Good records

will save time and make filing current returns easier. More information on record-keeping can be found in the free IRS Publication 552, "Recordkeeping Requirements and a List of Tax

Publications," available from local IRS offices.

## State Aid Road Projects

Construction is scheduled

to begin within the next few weeks on 29 State Aid road projects which were placed under contract during April, according to William P. Stevenson, State Aid Engineer of the Mississippi State Highway Department.

Mr. Stevenson said that these projects, which are located in 23 Counties, will provide for 38,961 miles of grading, drainage, base, bridge and approaches, double bituminous surface treatment, bituminous overlay, etc., as well as for 54,738 miles of patch and resal work. Estimated cost of these State Aid projects is \$7.2 million.

State Aid projects are awarded by County Boards of Supervisors, subject to the concurrence of the State Aid Engineer.

The following project was awarded during the month of April in Tishomingo County:

BR-0071 (10) B: 0.451 miles of grading, drainage, bridge, and gravel surface on the Dennis-Bloody Springs Road. Let to Wright Brothers Construction Company, Inc., of Charleston, Tennessee. Contract amount \$366,875.08.

## TVA Small Business Contracts Increase

The number of contracts awarded to small businesses by TVA increased 14 percent during the past fiscal year to a total of 41,000 contracts, according to James L. Williams, Jr., Director of Purchasing.

These contracts totaled more than \$710 million, an increase in dollar value of 97 percent over the previous fiscal year, Williams said.

The small business contracts represented more than 67 percent of the total number of contracts TVA awarded during fiscal 1981, and 53 percent of the total dollar value, he said.

In addition, 130 prime contractors reported more than \$62 million worth of small business subcontract and purchase commitments under TVA's Small Business Subcontracting Program.

Noting that May 9-15 is Small Business Week, Williams said that TVA recognizes the effective contribution that small business firms make to the economic well-being of the Tennessee Valley, and their important role in supplying materials and services needed by TVA in carrying out its regional development program.

Since the greater part of TVA's purchases are for the electric power program, a significant part of the power revenues of TVA and the region's local electric systems is used for purchases from small business firms, Williams said. These purchases are made not only in the Tennessee Valley states, but in practically every state of the Nation.

Mississippi Council on Aging (MCOA), an ideal time to initiate activities for the benefit of the state's senior citizens.

The 10 area agencies on aging across the state are planning a wide range of programs to observe this month dedicated to "one of Mississippi's most valuable resources," said Jay C. Moon, MCOA director.

Typical of these activities are luncheons, "old" fashioned fashion shows, senior citizen appreciation days, picnics and health fairs.

"This will be the 20th year that Older Americans Month is celebrated throughout the U.S.," Moon said. "It is traditionally a time to honor older Americans for their achievements, to promote better opportunities for all older Americans and to strengthen efforts to serve the frail and needy elderly."

Moon called upon all Mississippians to consider initiating activities for the state's senior citizens. "These activities could range from adopting a grandparent to visits and telephone calls to all older Mississippians in your area," he said.

The thrust of Mississippi's observance is volunteerism. "Funding cuts have imposed severe restrictions upon

governmental agencies. The need for volunteers has never been greater," Moon noted. "Few activities can be as rewarding as helping older Mississippians to enjoy their share of the good life our state has to offer."

The MCOA director also urged more involvement for older Mississippians. "The Mississippi Council on Aging believes that sufficient demands are not being made upon older people. In many cases, senior citizens don't want idleness and freedom. Instead, they want an opportunity to do something with their lives that will make them significant," Moon said. "Their many years of experience make them well qualified to advise us on a great variety of subjects, and older Mississippians can contribute their experience to most community activities. The influence they can have upon our youth alone is tremendous."

"Volunteer work is the most prevalent and perhaps most popular outside-the-home activity of Americans 65 and over," Moon said. "According to the Administration on Aging of the Department of Health and Human Services, about five million people aged 65 and over do volunteer work of one sort or another regularly, and

another three million are engaged in paid employment. Several millions more would like to have work and volunteer opportunities."

"The vast majority of older people are ready to serve, judging from the findings of various polls," he said. "For example, about 80 percent of all older people subscribed to the statement that 'voluntary service is essential to meet the communities' needs and that everyone should do his share.'"

Moon noted that "longer life has become a visible fact, dramatized daily in the homes and streets of America by 35 million persons aged 60 and over. Communities, in the past, tended to overlook older people while serving children and youth with overwhelming shares of community services, schooling and recreational opportunities. There used to be little left for other age groups."

"Now, there is a growing realization that older people, too, need educational opportunities to keep abreast in a rapidly evolving society. Older people need opportunities for every kind of involvement and participation in civic life."

"They need," he added, "opportunities to be productive in society instead of becoming liabilities."
