Unemployment Rate Increases In County

Unemployment continues to climb in Tishomingo County at mid-May. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the number of unemployed people in Tishomingo County is estimated to be 1,600, or 11.7 percent of the civilian labor force. This compares to 11.3 percent in April and 6.4 percent in May, 1981. The number of residents employed is estimated to be 12,040, 180 below the previous estimate and 1,050 below that of one year ago. The civilian labor force, a combination of those employed and unemployed, dropped to 13,640, as compared to 13,750 in April and 13,980 in May, 1981.

Manufacturing employment in Tishomingo County edged up slightly at mid-month to reach 2,890, 40 above one month ago but 100 below one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment, at 5,690, experienced large

decreases from other comparison periods. These large decreases being found primarily in Construction and Government.

In the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo, the civilian labor force totaled 48,870. This is a decline of 10 from the April estimate and 990 below the estimate for one year ago. An estimated 42,930 workers were employed at mid-May, compared to 43,240 in April, 1982, and 45,150 in May, 1981. There were 5,940 persons unemployed in May, an increase of 300 from April and an even larger increase of 1,230 from the May, 1981 estimate. The rate of unemployment during May was 12.2 percent of the civilian labor force, as compared to 11.5 percent last month and 9.4 percent one year ago.

Overall establishment based employment in the four-county area experienced a considerable decline over the

month and year. A total of 14,460 workers were employed in Manufacturing employment at mid-May, a drop of 150 below the April estimate and 1,110 below that of May, one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment was registered at 18,370, as compared to 18,730 one month ago and 21,380 one year ago. Monthly comparisons reveal Government experiencing the major loss, while yearly comparisons indicate major losses in Construction, Transportation and Public Utilities, and Government.

Congressional Elections To Be Held As Ordered

In regards to the 1982 Congressional Elections, Attorney General Bill Allain has stated that a Three-Judge Federal Court issued an order in June 8, 1982 for the initial purpose of conducting the 1982 Congressional Elections.

The Plaintiffs who filed the suit were dissatisfied with the Three-Judge Order. They applied to the United States Supreme Court for a stay of the order.

The United States Supreme Court denied the stay, so the Congressional Elections this year will be held as ordered by the Federal Court.

The Court requires temporary congressional districts and a special time schedule, which is as follows:

July 13, 1982 at 6:00 p.m. will be the deadline for candidate qualification for primaries; August 17, 1982 will be the first primary; August 31, 1982 will be the second primary; September 14, 1982, at 6:00 p.m., the deadline for independent candidate qualification; and November 2, 1982 the General Election will be held.

All persons who have previously announced, paid qualifying fees and otherwise qualified as 1982 candidates for any Congressional District may reannounce their

candidacy in the court-ordered district and requalify with state and party officials without paying any additional qualifying fee. Party candidates qualify with the State Party Executive Committee. Independent candidates qualify with the State Election Commission.

The order is for the initial purpose of conducting the 1982 Congressional Elections; otherwise, provisions of state law, not in conflict with the order, remain unaffected.

All candidates must qualify for a district described in the Court Order.

After the deadline date has

passed for qualifying as a candidate in the primary, the State Executive Committee of each political party will prepare and furnish a sample ballot to the respective county executive committee of each political party where there is more than one candidate who has qualified in each congressional district. If only one candidate is qualified, that candidate will be certified by the State Executive Committee to the State Board of Election Commissioners as the nominee of the party without the necessity of conducting that particular primary election.

After the deadline date has passed for qualifying as an independent candidate, the Secretary of State, with the approval of the Governor, will furnish a sample ballot to the County Election Commissioners containing the names of the independent candidates who have qualified by petition and the names of the nominees of the political parties in each respective congressional district.

The 1982 Congressional Election District No. 1 shall consist of the following counties and parts thereof: DeSoto, Tate, Panola, Tallahatchie (all except the precincts of Phillip, Leverette and Cascilla), Marshall, Lafayette, Yalobusha, Grenada, Calhoun, Benton, Tippah, Union, Pontotoc, Chickasaw, Alcorn, Tishomingo, Prentiss, Lee, Itawamba and Monroe.

New Tag Laws Effective July 1

Commissioner A. C. Lambert of the State Tax Commission has reviewed changes in the law relating to automobile tags enacted by the 1982 Legislature effective July 1.

TWELVE-MONTH TAG
Vehicles acquired from dealers, either new or used, must be registered within seven working days following the date of purchase. The tag will expire in month of purchase. Purchased June will expire June following year. Thus, under provision of the new law, owners will be assured of at least twelve months operation on the first tag purchased. Renewals will be issued for twelve months.

VEHICLES PURCHASED FROM INDIVIDUALS REQUIRE REGISTRATION
Persons purchasing automobiles and other

vehicles of 10,000 lbs. GVW and less from individual owners (non-dealers) are required to register them within five working days after the date of purchase with the local County Tax Collector. By presenting the current tax receipt and license tag, credit for the unused portion of taxes paid will be allowed, and the new tag will be issued for twelve months. This is a change from the procedure now being used whereby the purchaser continues to use the seller's tag until its expiration.

PRIVILEGE TAX STANDARDIZED

In an effort to simplify calculations, the road and bridge privilege tax is set at \$15.00 annually for all automobiles regardless of size or age, and the annual tax for motorcycles is set at

\$8.00. All trailers will be \$10.00. Truck tags are unchanged, but special tags, such as amateur radio operator's tags and antique car tags are increased.

SUBSTITUTE TAGS LOSS MUST BE REPORTED
Applications for substitute tags must be accompanied by a copy of a report of loss or theft made to the appropriate law enforcement official.

PENALTIES REDUCED
The mandatory penalty of 25 percent for failure to purchase license tags on time will be reduced to 5 percent for the first 15 days of delinquency and 5 percent for each additional 30 day period of delinquency or part thereof up to a maximum of 25 percent. This new penalty will apply to privilege and ad valorem tax.

BE SUCCESSFUL WITH
MONEY MANAGEMENT

Gather the family together. Decide on your goals. Jot down all monies available each month. Get an idea of how your family uses money by listing fixed expenses and payments due.

Put money aside monthly for irregular but fixed payments that come due in the year. Put this money in an accessible savings account

or passbook drawing daily compounded interest. Pay yourself first. Save something from every paycheck.

Set aside monthly for emergency funds. Save regularly for specific goals. Be sure one person keeps the books and pays bills on time. Know where your money goes. Make your money but what you want. Check carefully your goals and consider all available resources to achieve your goals.

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SWISS STEAK
Slow Cooked

2 pounds round or Swiss steak cut 3/4 inch thick
Salt and pepper to taste
1 large onion, thinly sliced
1 can tomatoes (1 pound)

Cut round steak into serving pieces; season with salt and pepper and place in casserole with sliced onion. Pour tomatoes over all. Cover and cook on Low 8 to 10 hours.

Creamy Swiss Steak: Follow recipe for Swiss Steak substituting 1 can mushroom soup (10 ounces) and 1/2 can water for tomatoes. Spread soup evenly over top.

Conservation Notes

How well do you know the soils in your county? Many people spend an entire lifetime within a few miles of where they were born. Yet they know very little about the soil upon which they depend for a livelihood. The knowledge that a farmer has of the soils on his farm often makes the difference in success or failure of his farming operations.

Soils are as variable as people. They have different characteristics and different capabilities. Soils may be described as shallow, medium or heavy textured. The drainage might be classed as poor, fair, well drained or excessively drained. There are clay, sandy, silty, loamy or a combination of these types. Slope and degree of erosion and all of the above factors help to determine the capability of any given soil.

You would not expect a boy to do a man's work. Neither can you expect a shallow, poorly drained soil to grow a deep-rooted plant. Crops must be adapted to the soil to grow a deep-rooted plant. Crops must be adapted to the

practices. These production practices were already being used by many farmers in Tishomingo County.

Reduced tillage or no-till farming saves equipment, time, labor fuel and money as well as soils. But these benefits don't come without some demands and risks on the part of farmers.

The big problem farmers have with conservation tillage is fitting the best program to the land, the crop and to the weed situation without cutting yields. Even so, conservation tillage is on the increase because it gives farmers an opportunity to cut costs at the same time they control erosion.

The Tishomingo County Extension office is always ready to help farmers choose conservation practices and develop crop production programs that will reduce soil erosion and keep crop yields up.

FARM NUMBERS UP AGAIN

The number of farms in the United States had dropped for the last 45 years until 1981 brought a change in the trend. The current trend of higher farm numbers is expected to continue this year.

The increase in farms seems to be in two categories: small farms with less than \$10,000 in annual sales and large farms with more than \$100,000 in sales.

One reason for the increase in the number of farms may be the definition of a farm. To qualify as a farm, a farm business has to

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generate \$1,000 worth of agricultural sales annually.

This probably includes many persons who are not traditionally considered farmers. And inflation could push some individuals into the \$1,000 category.

A movement of the population back to rural areas may be another reason behind the rise in the number of farms.

COTTON, FEED GRAIN, RICE
PRODUCERS ADVISED TO
REPORT PLANTED ACRES

Cotton, corn and grain sorghum farmers are advised that July 15 is the final date for reporting planted acreages. Elmer A. South, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee urges farmers to report their acreages as soon as planting is complete and not wait until the July 15 deadline.

South stated that it is highly important for farmers to report their planted acreages. Failure to report will cause loss of program benefits such as deficiency payments in event of market failure. Failure to report will affect acreage bases and eligibility to participate in future years. In the case of cotton and rice, the yield and acreage planted will be set at zero for the year if planted acreage is not reported.

The Chairman also stated that requests for measurement service are still being accepted at the County ASCS Office. Measurement service is available for the measurement of crop acreages and conservation use acreages. This year the tolerance factor in reported acreage and actual measured acreage is the larger of one acre or 5 percent of the reported acreage. Accordingly, in order to be sure of compliance, farmers are encouraged to get measurement service on fields where acreages are not known.

South said that producers of cotton, corn, or grain sorghum should contact the county ASCS Office for detailed information concerning the reporting of planted acreages, measurement services, or other program matters.

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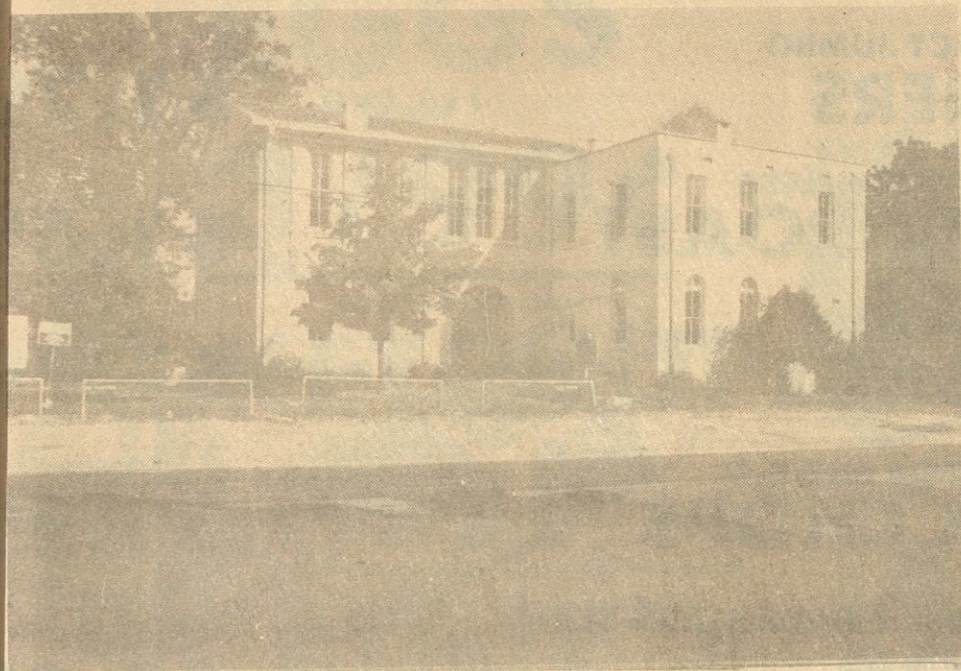

CATARACTS AND HOPE

For the great majority of people, having a cataract does not mean they will become blind. The record for cataract surgery is one of the best in medicine. Vision is restored in 95 percent of all cases. This is true for elderly patients, too, if their general health is good.

People who have a cataract in one or both eyes find their vision blurred. This is caused by a cloudiness or opacity of the lens of the eye. There is not enough light for a clear image.

When the cataract is removed, so is the lens. This means a substitute lens must be used to see again. Sometimes the

eye surgeon will implant a substitute lens in the eye itself. But most people compensate for the loss of the eye's lens by wearing glasses or contact lenses.

Some people prefer contact lenses because they fit directly over the eye. They feel more comfortable wearing contacts rather than thick-lenses glasses. Other people prefer wearing glasses. Both do the job that's needed: they allow you to see clearly again.
