## Highway 72 Accident Fatal To Corinth Man

An accident at 11:30 p.m. Thursday, July 8, one-half mile west of Burnsville on Highway 72, claimed the life of a Corinth man.

Jerry Wayne Plaxico, 22, of Corinth, was killed instantly following the head-on collision with a Bowman 18 wheeler. According to

Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Ralph Montgomery, Plaxico was headed east on 72 and the 18 wheeler, driven by John Sharit, of

Walls, Miss., was traveling west, with the point of impact in the westbound lane. Mr. Sharit was taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital and treated for a fractured hand, cuts and bruises.

A second transfer truck, traveling behind the Bowman truck, lost control when the driver attempted to avoid hitting the wrecked vehicles, causing it to leave the highway and wreck also. The driver suffered cuts to the head and several fractured bones.

Rescuers worked some 45 minutes freeing the victim from his mangled car. Other officials worked throughout the night clearing the highway of diesel fuel and other debris. Patrolman Montgomery praised the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Deputies, the Burnsville Police Department, the Burnsville Fire Department and the Mississippi Highway Maintenance crew for their assistance.

Funeral services for Jerry Plaxico were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at McPeters Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Donald Kennedy and Rev. Jerry Whitman officiating. Burial was in Holly Cemetery.

He was a member of the Corinth Baptist Temple Church.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Virginia Watkins, of Corinth; his father, Bobby Plaxico, of Corinth; a sister, Mrs. Elaine Moore, of Corinth; and his grandmother, Mrs. Annie Hutcheson, of Corinth.

## Golden Lady Dies In One Vehicle Crash

Mrs. Patricia Fay Pardue, age 33, of Route 1, Golden, was killed in an automobile accident, Sunday morning, July 11, when she apparently lost control of her car on Highway 25 North of Dennis.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Ralph Montgomery, Mrs. Pardue's wrecked vehicle was discovered around 8:30 Sunday morning where it had skidded off the left side of the highway just south of the Dennis Railroad Overpass Bridge. The young woman, who had last been seen around 4:30 Sunday morning, was apparently traveling south and alone at the time of the crash.

Mrs. Pardue was a machine

operator employed with Blue Bell in Belmont.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, July 13, at 3:00 p.m. at the Old Union Baptist Church in Belmont. Rev. Rex Edwards and Rev. Woodrow Horn officiated. Burial was in the adjoining cemetery with Deaton Funeral Home of Red Bay in charge of arrangements.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Planning Meals To Save Money

Plan before you shop. If possible, plan menus and shop for at least a week at a time. Include as many recommended servings of the four food groups as you can in each day's meals. By planning ahead, you can save money by using left-overs in another day's meals. (Then

you can call them planned-overs, not left-overs!)

If your family enjoys snacks, try to include them in your menu plans. Homemade snacks usually are less expensive. When food dollars are limited, it's important for snacks to be nutritious. Homemade oatmeal cookies or peanut butter cookies with raisins and milk-based drinks, fruit juices and fruit drinks with vitamins added are good examples of wholesome snacks.

As you plan menus, check newspaper ads for weekly specials and sales, and for menu ideas. You can save money at sales if the store is nearby, if the food is of a

good quality for your needs, if you have enough good places to keep it, and if you can use all the food. Remember, you waste -- not save -- money when you buy a sale item your family won't eat! Check local newspapers to find out which day grocery ads appear. Handbills and circulars handed out at the store also list sale items.

Make a shopping list. Write down items as you think of them through the week. Group the items by the order you find them in your store to save time and steps in the store. Take a pencil along and check off items as selected. Stick to your list, but if you find a better buy at the store, substitute. Write down prices and add them up as you go through the store, so you don't spend more money than you planned. Always check what's on hand before shopping.

Remember, non-food items are not part of your food bill. You might buy laundry supplies, cosmetics, hose or magazines in the supermarket, but you should keep these things separate from your food budget. Also remember that food stamps cannot be used to purchase non-food items.

Buy staples such as flour, sugar and corn meal only once or twice a month if possible. Most grocery products cost less per serving when you buy larger packages.

Become familiar with brand names so you can recognize price changes. A price increase in one brand might tell you to compare brands and perhaps switch to a lower-priced brand. (On the other hand, a price increase may indicate an increase in quality.) If the price goes down, you might consider buying more if you have enough places to keep the food and if you can use all of it.

Shop for foods that are good sources of the impor-

tant nutrients. Buy as many of these as your budget allows, in the greatest variety possible. Variety in foods and meals is the best way to make sure your diet is well balanced.

If possible, eat before shopping. If you go to the store hungry, you may buy things you don't need and spend more money than you planned.

### Pickled Okra

1 tsp. dry mustard (per pint)  
½ tsp. celery seed (per pint)  
Salt & pepper to taste (per pint)  
Bud of garlic (per pint)  
Small hot pepper (per pint)

Use only small, tender pods of okra. Pack in hot jars and add above ingredients. Heat vinegar to boiling and pour over okra. Adjust lids and process in boiling water bath 5 minutes.

## County Agent's Notes

### Soybeans

The soybean crop is planted and so far insect infestations have been very light. Extension Pest Specialist Dr. Jim Hamer says cutworms have been active in some areas and thrips have been evident, though in most cases, below economic levels.

Hamer says we are approaching the time when the three cornered alfalfa hopper will be a problem. These insects present most problems during their nymph stage and can be recognized by their tan color and the fact that during this stage they cannot fly.

The three cornered alfalfa hopper makes pin like punctures near the base of the plant on the stem and later in the season the plant will break off thereby reducing yield. The soybean plant is most susceptible during the

period from emergence to 12 inches. During this time Hamer says it's very important to scout the field. If there is evidence of the three cornered alfalfa hopper, there are several materials available to control it.

For more information about soybean insect control, contact your local county agent and ask for the 1982 SOYBEAN INSECT CONTROL GUIDE.

### Weeds

Although there are countless varieties of weeds, there are methods to control most of them. Extension Weed Scientist Dr. Wayne Houston says man has the material and the methods to control weeds in most situations, but you must be careful.

With the popularity of clover growing, many farmers are seeding it in their pastures. Houston says although many of the weed control measures now available will kill clover, these materials can be used if you have the right equipment. For example, 2,4-D applied through a rope wick or carpet applicator is an effective method if you make sure the rope only touches the weed.

### Tomatoes

Gardeners can harvest tomatoes until frost if they take care of their plants. Extension Horticulturist Dr.

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Milo Burnham says spring-set tomato plants can produce until fall if plants are kept free of disease and insect pests.

Burnham says some hints for successful gardening include spraying for leaf disease and insects, watering plants when rain is scarce, fertilizing plants every four to six weeks, breaking off suckers on plants as needed and keeping the plants tied up. When suckers are allowed to develop, fruit becomes smaller. When the vines touch the soil, the fruit will rot. For more information contact your local Extension office.

### July 15, Last Day To Certify Crops

Whether they participate in the acreage reduction program or not, farmers have until Thursday, July 15, 1982 to report their 1982 planted acres to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office. Program participants are required to report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops, and cropland acres to be devoted to conservation uses. "Non-

You can do several things to save on long distance calls made to points outside Mississippi:

- Take advantage of the one-minute minimum on all interstate long distance calls. There's no longer a three-minute minimum operator-assisted calls. So now, whether you dial the call yourself or use an operator, if you talk for only one minute, you pay for only one minute. Plan your conversations; you can say a lot in one minute.
- Dial long distance calls nights and weekends when rates are lower. Rates are lowest every night from 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. day Saturday, and Sunday until 5 p.m.
- Use "800" numbers when possible. There is no charge to you for calls to "800" numbers and a lot of companies make their special numbers available. Many show "800" numbers in their advertising or list them in the local directory. If you can't find listing, call toll-free 1/800/555-1212.
- Dial your own station-to-station interstate "Calling Card" and pay less than you would pay for other operator-assisted calls. You can get a Calling Card by phoning your service representative.

### Fear of Rabies Outbreak In Fla.

Five baby raccoons taken in as pets by different families three months ago are thought to be rabid, and at least 16 residents will undergo painful and expensive rabies shots, officials say.

Health officials do not know how many people have been exposed or infected, said John McGarry, director of the Orange County Health Department. But health officials are guarding against a possible outbreak of the disease.

Nearly 40 Sunday School students were exposed to one of the animals.

One of the raccoons was found to have rabies last week. Two others were put to sleep so they could be tested, and the results are due this week.

Health officials were trying to contact an Orlando family Saturday to get the fourth raccoon, and the fifth was thought to have been taken to New York.

All five raccoons were about three months old.

Fifteen-year-old Tommy Webster found the raccoons on a fishing trip near Clear Lake in southwest Orlando, officials said. He took the raccoons home, kept one for himself and gave away the others.

One of the recipients, thinking the animal was sick, took it to a veterinarian last week. The veterinarian killed the raccoon and determined that it was rabid. He contacted health department of-

## Tenn-Tom's Vanpool Program

An experimental vanpool commuting program along the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway has been expanded to include rides for women construction workers.

The original plan started last August and was to serve as a six-month demonstration program to promote cost-efficient energy-conserving transportation while also attempting to reduce worker absenteeism and tardiness. Two vans carried 30 workers from their temporary living quarters in Fulton, Miss., approximately 50 miles to their jobsite at the Bay Springs Lock and Dam for a nominal fee. The vanpool worker so well that it has continued for nearly a year and now will expand to give a "Lift" to the ladies.

The project is jointly sponsored by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Project Area Council (PAC), and the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). The Corps and TVA provide financial and technical assistance and the

Tenn-Tom PAC, headquartered in Columbus, Miss., is coordinating the service. Management is being provided by the Employment Committee, a sub-committee of the Affirmative Action Committee of PAC.

PAC and TVA have established the vanpool routes and arrange fuel purchases, maintenance procedures and general upkeep of the vans. Each driver is responsible for collecting funds, obtaining fuel and arranging pick-up points. For their extra duty, they ride free of charge.

Commenting on the additional service for the female workers, Wilma Falls, PAC's Manager of Women's Placement Opportunities and Programs said, "Because of the savings involved, this demonstration project should attract the support of female workers travelling long distances to and from work." "The project's effects on absenteeism, tardiness, and the increased employment opportunities for women will be

collected for the Office of the Women's Bureau of the U. D. Department of Labor. The workers riding together will demonstrate a 'big sister' relationship and we feel it will help workers cope with work-related problems," added the PAC spokeswoman.

"The PAC Employment Committee feels that this program is a complete success," says Tom Epps, PAC's Manager of Human Resources. "We have seen the program in operation for nearly a year now and note the positive impact on the problems of the disadvantaged. Housing and other complications have helped by this innovative approach to solving the transportation problems of our rural employees," Epps added.

The vans are specially equipped with first aid kits, fire extinguishers, and front and rear heating/cooling systems. They are obtained new and are on lease from Van Pool Services, Inc., of Atlanta, GA. The demonstration project is a partnership arrangement, involving Teamsters Local No. 402, Tenn-Tom Constructors (a contractor on the Divide Cut Section of the Waterway) and the Al Johnson Construction Company (prime contractor for Bay Springs.).

## New China For State Parks

Though not as elegant as the china service recently bought for the White House,

the new china and flatware purchased for the 178 vacation cabins in the Mississippi State Park system will be used much more and appreciated no less. While a service for 220 was bought for the White House, the parks' china order was for a service for 1,140 and at a cost considerably less than the reported \$209,000 paid for the White House set.

Over the years each park cabin has acquired a hodgepodge of plates, cups, glasses, and utensils. This is the first time that cabins throughout the system will have uniform place settings.

Fred Robinson, chief of planning for the Bureau of Recreation and Parks, and Chris Wiley, housekeeping consultant, have coordinated the purchase and placement of the new equipment. The service is the Omni pattern, manufactured in Mississippi by Prolon Products in Port Gibson.

Included in the order was 1,140 plates, bowls, water glasses, and coffee mugs and 384 platters and vegetable bowls. New flatware has also been purchased and placed in each cabin.

The addition of new service dishes is just another in the continuing program to modernize and upgrade the cabin facilities in the state park system. During the past winter cabins have been renovated at Roosevelt, Paul B. Johnson, and Leroy Percy. New rental units are nearing completion at Clarkco, Lake Lowndes, Leroy Percy, Tombigbee, and Holmes County State Parks.

## CETA On-The-Job Training Successful In NE Mississippi

The CETA On-the-Job Training (OJT) Program has proven to be more successful in northeast Mississippi than any other area of the State, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. "During this fiscal year starting in October and running to date, northeast Mississippi

has accounted for 38 percent of the statewide OJT expenditures," said Smith. Area employers have been very receptive of the program because it costs money to train new workers, and the OJT Program helps hold down costs by paying up to

50 percent of the initial expenses in training inexperienced people.

"We have a big stake in the OJT Program because it is one of the last of the regular CETA funded programs to be continued," said Smith, "and the big advantage for the worker is that when training is completed they remain on, in what is planned to be regular permanent employment." If employers continue to accept the training program and the State Employment Service Offices can continue to locate and certify qualified workers, we should reach a record this year in placing unskilled people on OJT jobs, said Smith.

Nearly all employers can benefit from OJT if they have to train new workers. Low income, unemployed persons qualify for on-the-job training and must be certified as being eligible before employers hire them. These same workers may also qualify as a tax credit for employers under the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit (TJTC) Program, thereby giving an employer a double benefit. Any State Employment Office can provide information on these programs, said Smith.

## Job Service

The U.S. Department of Labor has started a project to link veterans in business with veterans seeking employment. "Just as we helped

each other on the battlefield," said William Plowden, assistant secretary of labor for veterans employment, "so can we assist our fellow veterans who are fighting to become gainfully employed."

According to Paul Smith, Director of the Mississippi office of the Labor Department's Veterans Employment Service (VES), a computer printout of veteran-owned businesses in Mississippi which have Small Business Administration loans will assist VES staff members who are contacting the veterans who own businesses seeking to place veteran applicants in jobs with the firms. Smith hopes the contacts will lead to other veteran-owned businesses willing to hire fellow veterans.

In addition to direct placement of unemployed veterans, Smith said, the VES is working through Mississippi State Employment Service (Job Service) offices to inform veteran-employers about such opportunities as the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit (TJTC) program and the Veterans Administration's On-the-Job Training Program.

TJTC offers employers a tax credit for hiring members of certain "target" groups, including economically disadvantaged Vietnam-era veterans. On-the-Job training is designed to provide qualified, trained applicants for jobs.

Veterans seeking jobs with veteran-employers willing to

hire them can obtain information by contacting Veterans Employment Representatives (VERs) at local Job Service offices or by contacting the Veterans Employment Service at Jackson.

## Excessive Tanning Poses Risk Of Skin Cancer

The evidence is clear: repeated and persistent exposure to sunlight can cause cancer of the skin. The Mississippi Medical Association points out that skin cancer has been an occupational hazard to the farmer, sailor, and logger. Ardent outdoor sportsmen and sun worshippers share the same risk.

Cancer of the skin is more often in the South, Southwest, areas with sunny climates. Skin cancer occurs most frequently on the face, ears, hands, and feet. Skin cancer occurs ten times more often in light-skinned people than in dark-skinned people.

Excessive sunbathing, the skin. Years of exposure to the sun, in leathery texture, skin folds and sagging. Blotchy pigmentation replace desired tan. Dermatologists (medical specialists) recommend regular use of sunscreens by outdoor workers and others who are exposed to themselves.

Commonly used such as antibacterial in medicated soaps, control high blood pressure, tranquilizers and antibiotics can cause the skin to become photo-sensitive. The skin may become even slightly red. These individuals must avoid direct sunlight as much as possible, and wear protective garments and brimmed hats when outdoors.

### REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



High interest rates are continuing to plague the entire American economy, and we cannot expect real recovery until something is done to bring rates down. Realizing the seriousness of this problem, I am weighing the effect of every vote I cast in the Senate against the probable effect on interest rates.

Almost every segment of our economy is adversely affected by the current high interest rates. In the housing, automobile industries and in farming, many good managers are finding that there is simply no way to make it under these high rates. Unless something is done soon to bring interest rates down, we are going to see even more personal and small business bankruptcies and unemployment.

The problem is a difficult one, and it is hard to determine what should be done. Naturally, reducing the size of the federal deficit would help, and I am working too in support of budget reductions in every possible area. However, large reductions cannot be made abruptly without throwing the economy into deeper trouble, so we cannot expect any quick results from that effort.

It is clear now that interest rates are not responding to reduced inflation and other factors which some experts believe should have led to their decline. Therefore, I believe we should look at the problem anew with the idea of doing anything possible to reduce interest rates. Even steps which might be considered extreme should be thoroughly studied because our economic system cannot withstand these interest rates much longer.

I am thoroughly convinced that the interest rate problem is the most severe cause of economic problems Mississippians throughout the state are experiencing. As I have traveled from one end of Mississippi to the other in recent months, I have talked with many men and women who are out of work because of the decline in the housing and automobile industries. I have also visited with farmers who are at the end of their financial rope because of the high rates of interest they are paying on loans, coupled with other problems. I have also talked with sorely disappointed families who are delaying building new homes or buying needed new cars because they cannot afford the current high interest rates.

I do not believe that these problems are insurmountable. It would be wrong to take the attitude that high interest rates are a burden which must simply be endured. Rather, we must tackle the problem with renewed vigor and determination.

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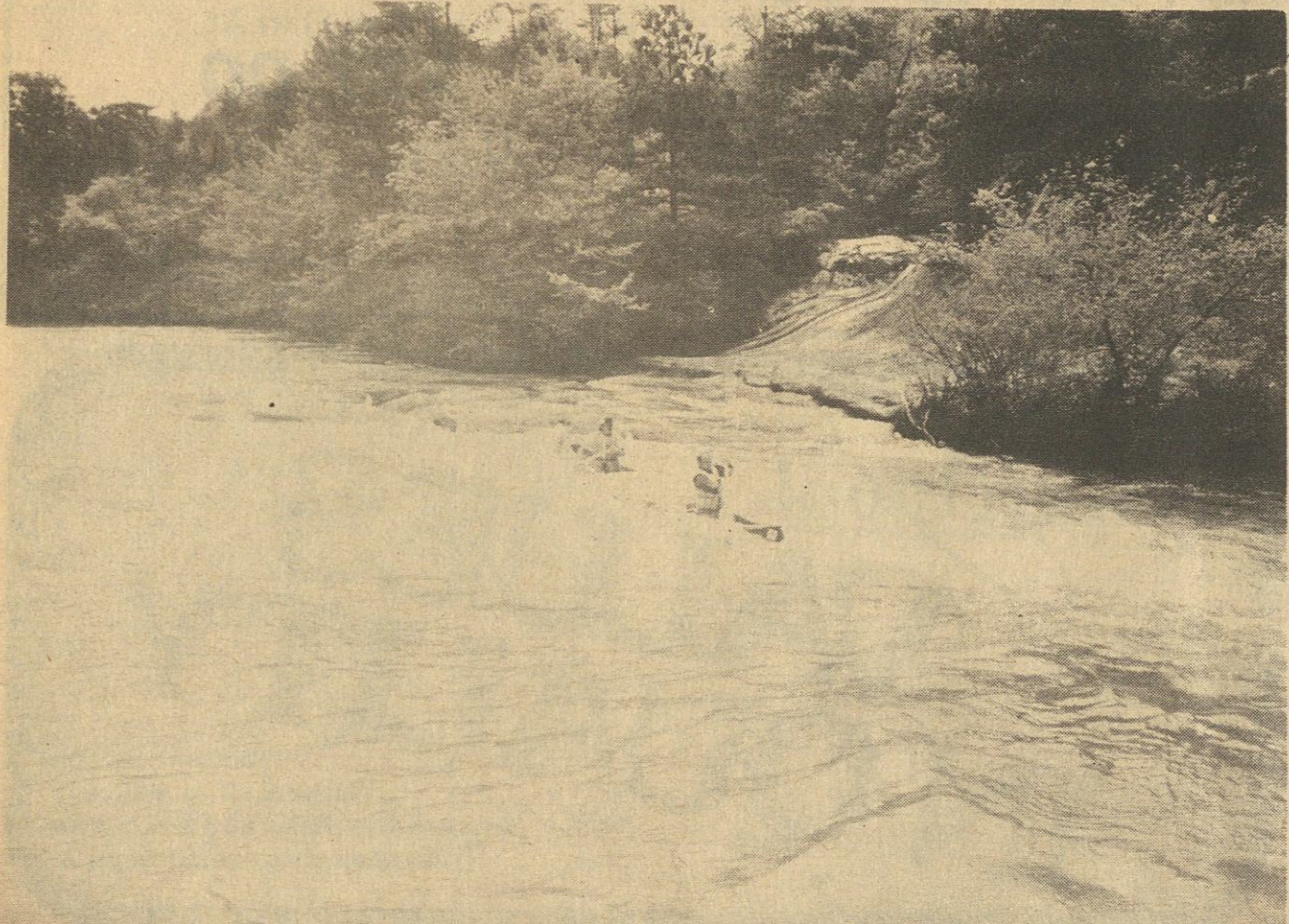

## Scenic Bear Creek Riverway Opens For Use

The scenic Bear Creek Riverway in northwest Alabama is officially open to the public although development of access sites will continue through the summer, TVA said today.

TVA has purchased rights for the public to float the 24-mile segment between Upper Bear Creek and Bear Creek Reservoirs, to portage dangerous stretches, and to picnic, swim, or sunbathe in other areas along the streambanks.

Project manager Dick Austin said the purchases were necessary because under Alabama law the streambed as well as all surrounding property is privately owned. The purchases were financed with Federal funds.

Along a three-mile stretch the Bear Creek from Upper Bear Creek Dam to Highway 241, the public is now entitled to float, fish, and swim, but cannot land on the banks except in an emergency or to portage Upper Factory Falls, Austin said.

From Highway 241 downstream, the public is allowed to temporarily land on the banks for recreational activities such as picnicking within a 50-foot wide strip of the bank on either side of the creek, said Austin. (TVA has purchased a wider easement but only for scenic protection and not for public access.)

No camping is allowed at present anywhere on the streambank.

The following access points have been established for the scenic riverway.

- On the left bank downstream of the Highway 5 bridge just south of the town of Bear Creek.

- On the right bank downstream of the Highway 241 bridge at Mill Creek.

- On the right bank downstream of the Old Jackson Highway Bridge at Rock Quarry Branch.

- On the left bank upstream

of Military Bridge.

- On the right bank downstream of Scott Bridge on Highway 187 northeast of Hodges.

Despite a previous lack of legal access, Bear Creek has long been a magnet pulling many canoeists and john-boaters from as far away as Nashville and Birmingham. Although no estimates of these visits are available, the formal development of the floatway is expected to attract up to 30,000 visits a year, Austin said.

Bear Creek's primary attraction is its scenic beauty. It flows through a gorge with 50- to 100-foot bluffs where mountain laurel, azaleas, hemlock, and wildflowers grow in profusion. Because the gorge apparently restricted easy access to the timber, much of the forest along the banks appears never to have been cut.

Quiet, observant floaters may see great horned owls, green herons, muskrats, and wood ducks among the wildlife species that commonly make their home along the creek. A black bear was recently sighted by TVA personnel.

A number of waterfalls that empty into Bear Creek are visible from the creek, and others, blocked from view by huge hemlocks and poplars, can be heard echoing against the walls of the bluffs.

The entire stream is easily navigable except for Upper and Lower Factory Falls -- locations where factories once produced cotton yarn. Upper Factory Falls, located between mile 112 and 113, in Class IV whitewater, Austin said.

"Class IV means very difficult going and whitewater experience is absolutely necessary," Austin said. "For this reason, we purchased the necessary rights on the left bank for floaters to portage the falls."

Lower Factory Falls, near mile 109, is rated at Class VI, which means it cannot be attempted without risk of life, Austin said. "Portage rights have been purchased on the right bank."

Just above the lower falls are Class II rapids of medium difficulty which should be scouted and even portaged depending on waterflow and experience of the floaters involved.

"It's not at all unusual for those who run this Class II stretch to be forced to pull to the right bank below the rapids to empty the water taken on," Austin said.

Because camping is prohibited along the banks, TVA plans to develop a primitive camping area at the Rock Quarry Branch Access Area. In addition, there are numerous developed campgrounds around the Bear Creek reservoirs and motels are located in nearby towns.

## "Chotankers" Explores History

"If I were superstitious, I would believe I had some guidance in finding these things," said the author of a book on family genealogy in the southern United States.

"I'd pick up a book, thumb through it and there would be something I needed," said Dr. A. Edward Foote, a professor in the Department of Speech Communications and Theater at the University of Northern Alabama.

Foote has written and published "Chotankers: A Family History," (Thornwood Book Publishers, Florence) a novel about his ancestors who originally resided in Virginia before moving to the Shoals area.

After he began researching

A Bear Creek Water Use Permit issued by the Bear Creek Development Authority is required to float the stream. The permits are available at local hardware and sporting goods stores and at bait and tackle shops throughout the area, and cost \$1 for daily permits and \$7.50 for annual permits.

Prime times to float the stream are weekends and holidays when the local authority guarantees minimum flows as long as there is no conflict with maintenance of reservoir levels for water supplies and flood control. Floaters must bring their own boats because rentals are not yet available.

his family roots in 1971, "it was impossible to stop," he said. "There are interesting stories that have never been told" about the Foote family.

He said his family has ancestors who were active in the political arena during the early 19th century, established a religious haven in Virginia, and "are distant kin" to past-president Jimmy Carter.

Foote became interested in researching the family after his father received a query into the Foote family from a man in Texas who was researching his own family. Foote said his father did not reply to the man. After he received a copy of the book

which told very little about the Foote family, Foote decided to investigate his own family.

"It's an unreal story," Foote said. His research uncovered things that are "partly supposition, but too much to be coincidental" about the family.

Documented facts tie the family to Brent Town, Virginia, where a religious haven was established for French Protestants and which eventually became an American outpost for English Catholics.

The Foote family moved south when Henry S. Foote settled in Tuscumbia in the late 1820s. He was one of the founding trustees for La Grange College, "the forerunner of UNA."

Henry S. Foote also was active in establishing legislation for the Tuscumbia / Courtland / Decatur railroad.

But Henry S. had one downfall, the author said. "He had a very short temper." This temper, which later caused Henry S. to be barred from Tuscumbia, eventually caught up with the man during a Senate gathering in the late 1840s, Foote said.

During one legislative session, Henry S. pulled a gun on another member of the Senate on the Senate floor. Henry S. is "so colorful and so interesting" to Foote that he said Henry S. is one of the reasons he decided to write the book.

Another relative who prompted Foote to detail the family history was Gilson Foote, who was tried and convicted of horse stealing in 1824 and executed in Edgefield County, South Carolina.

"Chotankers: A Family History" is the first book Foote has authored. He said he does not plan on writing another book about his family history. "It's done, and now I have to go on to something else," he said.

Foote was born in Burnsville, Miss. in 1937. He received his bachelor's degree at UNA, his master's degree at Southern Mississippi, and his doctorate at Ohio State University.

He has been the editor for the "Educational Broadcasting Review," a periodical published by the National Association of Educational Broadcasting, as well as an advertising writer and coordinator, a part-time faculty member at Southern Mississippi, and a full-time faculty member at the University of Georgia.

Foote, who married Dorothy Gargis, from Sheffield, has been teaching radio, television and film courses at UNA for two years. He said his return to Florence was because of the family ties, and teaching at a small university.

The teacher-to-student relationship is closer at a smaller university, he said.

Two of Foote's children, Anthony and Michele, attend UNA. His other son, Kevin, attends the University of Georgia.

Foote is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Avon R. Foote, of luka.

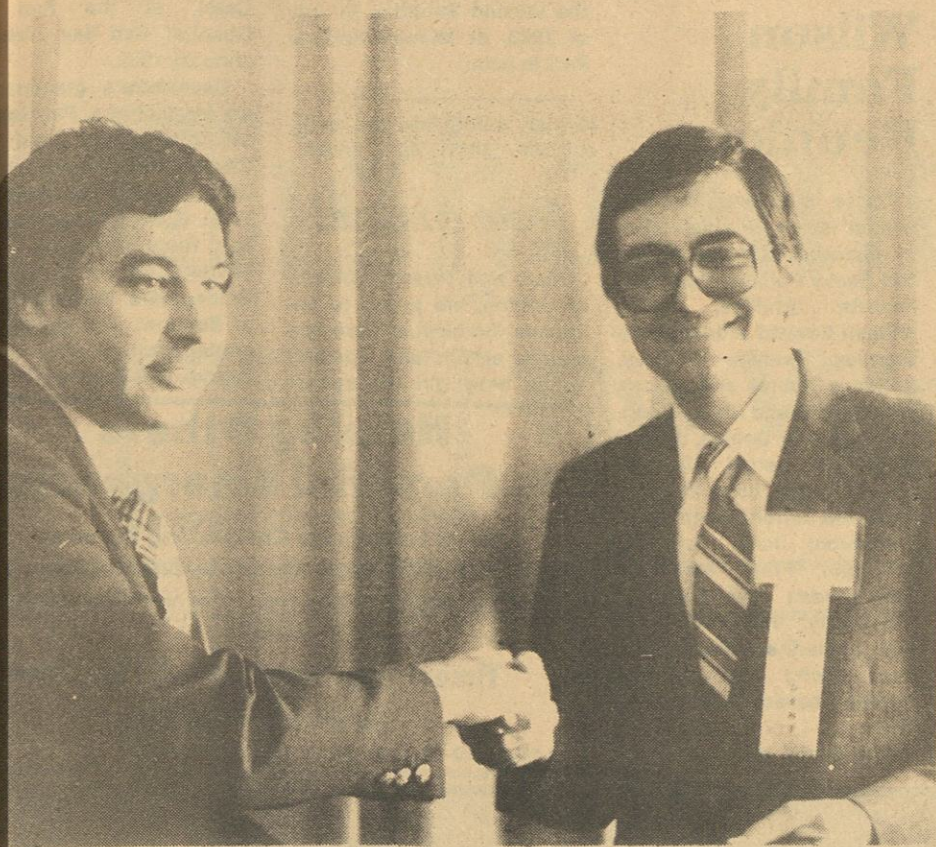

### Mississippi Forestry Commission

Orders for tree seedlings to be delivered and planted this coming winter are now being accepted by the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

According to Nursery Director W.D. McNeel the following species are available: Loblolly, Slash and Longleaf Pine, Baldcypress, Green Ash, Yellow Poplar and

a limited number of Cottonwood cuttings.

Prices for seedlings (delivered to the County) will remain the same as last year, namely: Loblolly and Slash Pine - \$17 per thousand; Longleaf Pine - \$19 per thousand; Hardwoods and Baldcypress - \$66 per thousand; and Cottonwood cuttings - \$76 per thousand.

Pine seedlings may be purchased in orders of no less than one thousand. Hardwoods and Baldcypress may be bought in quantities of 100, 250, 500 and 1000 seedlings (or cuttings, in the case of Cottonwood).

No pine seed will be available from Commission nurseries this year, but a list of private seed dealers will be supplied on request.

The Forestry Commission expects to have a total of 75 million trees for sale and distribution this year. Landowners who order earliest usually stand the best chance to obtain their needed

species and quantity. Official seedling order forms are available through any Commission office or employee.

## Shooks Visit With Family In Germany

Dr. and Mrs. Raymond Shook returned home Thursday after a two weeks visit with their daughter, Donna Cooper, and family in Kaiserlautern, Germany.

They departed Atlanta June

24th, at 6:30 p.m. arriving in Germany Friday, June 25th, at 9:05 a.m.

Saturday, June 26th, they all enjoyed a Rhine River cruise with picnic lunch. Traveling by motor coach via weisbaden to Rudesheim, the historic wine town, where they boarded the triple deck 600 passenger river boat Germania which took them up the Rhine River passing many castles (some over 1000 years old) to St. Goar then back to Bacharach. After shopping they boarded the bus for Bingen to visit Kloop Castle then back to the boat to finish the cruise, arriving home at 8:30 p.m.

June 29th, they took a two day visit to Switzerland. Leaving by motor coach at 11:30 p.m., they arrived in Switzerland for a typical Swiss breakfast then on to Berne the capitol city for a sight-seeing tour and a first glimpse at the Swiss Alps. After shopping in the 500 year old city market, strolling along the banks of the mighty Aare River where Einstein walked, they visited the Parliament Building, medieval churches, world famous Bear Pits and indulged in those sinfully rich Swiss chocolates and pastries, they then departed for Lucerne on the back roads, which take you through the heart of the cheese-making region, following a sight seeing tour by bus they had time to shop for Swiss watches and see the town all afternoon. They finished the day with an evening at the Casino Club featuring genuine Swiss folklore entertainment with yodeling, flag throwing, Alpine horn blowing and a hearty full meal of Swiss fondue, accompanied by local entree and dessert. Working their way south into the heart of the Alps, they wound through the rugged landscapes on roads clinging to the mountain sides past areas where "The Eiger Sanction" and "James Bond" movies were filmed. Grindelwald (meaning glacial village) is frequently host to international skiing competitions and sports broadcast on ABC TV. They returned home at 9:30 p.m.

July 2nd at 11:30 p.m. found Dr. and Mrs. Shook, Donna and Edwin Cooper and their two children, Kherl and Kevin, headed for another side trip, this time to Paris, France. 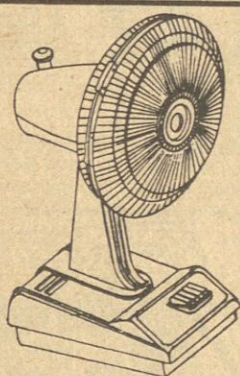
