Mississippi's Unemployment Rate Rises To 11.6% In June

Mississippi's unemployment rate rose to 11.6 percent in June, an increase of 1.6 percent compared to May's jobless rate of 10.0 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's June unemployment rate was 9.1 percent.

The 11.6 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 9.8 percent national rate for June. MESC figures showed 123,100 unemployed and 36,100 employed out of a civilian labor force of

1,059,200. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 25,394 in June.

Sixty-three of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in June. Of that number, six counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in June were Jefferson, with an unemployment rate of 23.4 percent; Walthall, with an unemployment rate of 21.7 percent; and Greene, with an unemployment rate of 21.3 percent.

Issaquena, Rankin, and

Yalobusha counties had the lowest jobless rates in June. Issaquena had a rate of 5.2 percent, Rankin had a rate of 5.5 percent, and Yalobusha had an unemployment rate of 6.9 percent.

Seventy-eight counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates from May to June, while three reported decreases. The unemployment rate in one county remained the same.

South Central Bell Answers Questions On Rate Increase

Dear Mr. Biggs:

Ever since we filed an application for increased rates, I have been following very closely the editorials, articles and letters-to-the-editor that have been appearing in newspapers around the state. I've also been reading the letters we've been receiving from customers. Either personally or by letter, we have tried to respond to most of them.

While the language and thrust of these comments have varied, some points have been raised more than others. These deal with the size of our request, its timing and our reasons for advertising.

Perhaps I can offer some thoughts which will clarify these points.

First, nobody denies that \$98 million is a lot of money. And nobody denies that local rates increased substantially -- especially when compared to the size of past increases.

But those increases are required to meet the increased costs of doing business since our last increase over two years ago. For example, inflation has increased 25 percent since then, yet the additional revenues we are asking for represent an increase of only 16 percent in our total

revenues in Mississippi.

To put the size of our request into further perspective, we need to also consider that investors have been willing to make a \$1.5 billion investment in the state to provide telephone service. Our plans call for an additional investment of over \$400 million in the next two years. That also is a lot of money -- being spent now and to be spent next year to maintain good service for existing customers and provide for future customer needs. Our investors expect a competitive return on this investment.

Many comments have been made by people who understandably question why local rates are being raised by substantial percentages while long distance rates were not increased. In past years, we have raised long distance more than necessary to cover the costs of providing it to help keep basic rates low. But the federal regulators have ordered long distance competition -- as well as competition for telephone sets, PBX's, and other products and services. Now that these services and equipment are competitive, they must be priced nearer the costs of providing them, which in turn forces us to price basic service up nearer its costs. If long distance rates continue to carry an increasing subsidy for basic service, competitors will undersell, and that business as well as the subsidy will be lost.

We are acutely aware of the state of the economy and would much prefer to ask for

an increase in better times. However, ours is not a stop-and-go business. We must provide service 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We cannot shut down our central offices or refuse to install telephones and still fulfill our obligation to serve.

The question of rate increase size and timing has generated many comments that our prices are beyond people's ability to pay. We can't argue that even the smallest increase would severely impact some people.

And we know that this current increase will require some to weigh their priorities very carefully. No one can decide for another person what is important or valuable -- that's something each person must decide. However, we think that telephone service is a very good bargain and that most of our customers will agree. For those who need or wish to lessen the impact of the increased rates, we do offer options -- shared (party-line) service and in many locations, Measured Service. Our business offices will be glad to review with customers their individual services and offer suggestions for controlling the amount of their bills.

And then there is the issue of advertising.

There are a number of good reasons why we advertise, but let me just summarize them by saying that advertising helps sustain and increase revenues without a corresponding increase in expenses. The additional revenues brought in by advertising help keep rates lower than they would be otherwise. Advertising doesn't cost the telephone subscriber, it benefits. If it didn't, we wouldn't. It's that simple.

The media have also commented widely about our requested rate of return.

We are requesting an overall return on our investment in Mississippi in the

lower end of a 12.99 to 14.27 percent range.

A substantial portion of our \$400 million-plus construction program must come from investors, either from the sale of stock or by borrowing through the sale of bonds. As a part of our requested overall return on investment, we have requested a return on our stockholders' investment in the 16 to 18 percent range so that we can be competitive with other investment opportunities which involve risk.

Is this return out of line? Well, if you analyze the requests of 200 gas, electric and telephone companies now pending around the country, you will find that well over half are requesting returns on equity as high or higher than our requested return.

If our earnings are not improved to a competitive level, we will be unable to raise the money we need to fund new construction.

One final point concerns the membership of a few company executives in private clubs. Those are personal memberships paid for by the individual. If there are expenses incurred that are business related, they are reimbursed by the company, but only if they are properly documented and if they meet the rules and regulations of the company and the Internal Revenue Service that govern such expenses.

Overall, the quality of telephone service in this state is as good as that found anywhere else in the country. It is important to Mississippi and its people that this high quality service be continued so that the state's economy can develop, and its citizens can receive reliable communications service when and where they need it.

Governor Supports Waterway Completion

Governor William Winter made a four hour tour of the Divide Cut section of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway last week and reaffirmed his full support and efforts to complete the 232 mile waterway at the earliest possible date.

Winter called it "out of the question" to stop construction of the waterway and said he will continue to work with Senator John Stennis, Representative Jamie Whitten and other congressional leaders in an effort to insure continued funding for the project. "It is time for the federal government to say with a tone of finality that we are going to finish the waterway," Winter said. "Once the government does this investors will not hesitate to come into the area and we will see significant economic development."

The governor noted that it would be "ludicrous" to halt the project now because it would cost much more to

reclaim the land than to finish the waterway.

Winter was accompanied on his tour of the Divide Cut by engineers with the Corps of Engineers. He also inspected work on the Bay Springs Lock and Dam.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Summertime Food Safety

It's important to take proper care of foods when picnicking, especially meat and poultry products, from the time you buy them, until you eat your fill and pack the leftovers for home.

When readying for a picnic, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Keeping food hot

means thorough cooking, holding it at a hot temperature during serving and fully reheating stored foods. Keeping food cold means refrigerating perishables or leftovers promptly.

When shopping, pick meat and poultry products last. Have them bagged with other cold foods and get them home and into the refrigerator or freezer promptly.

If you are going to use the meat and poultry products within a few days, they may be stored in the refrigerator in the plastic wrap as purchased. If you remove the store packaging, loosely rewrap the product in wax

paper, plastic film or aluminum foil.

For longer storage, freeze the food. Wrap it tightly in moisture-resistant material, such as aluminum foil, plastic film or freezer wrap. Keep refrigerator temperature at 35 to 40 degrees F. and the freezer at 0 degrees F. or below.

Meat and poultry products should be thawed, still wrapped, in the refrigerator. For quicker thawing, place food in watertight wrapping under cold water and cook the product soon after thawing.

When preparing food for outdoor cooking, but just as careful as for indoor cooking. Wash all kitchen work surfaces and utensils with soap and hot water before and after using them for raw meat or poultry. This includes countertops, wood cutting boards and knives.

Never place cooked, ready-to-serve meat or poultry on a surface or in a container which was used for the raw product without thoroughly washing the surface. If possible, use separate cutting boards for raw and cooked products.

When preparing meat and poultry salads, chill all the ingredients thoroughly. After mixing the salad, put in shallow containers to remove the heat produced in preparation and to allow for more rapid chilling, then refrigerate.

For picnics, pack perishable foods, including lunch meats and hot dogs, in a well-insulated cooler with plenty of ice. Don't open the cooler unnecessarily. Leave it in a shady spot to help keep the ice from melting too fast.

Canned products should be eaten immediately after opening. If food looks or smells bad or if liquid spurts when the container is opened, don't use or taste the food. Don't use foods from cans that are leaking, bulging or severely dented. Jars that are cracked or have loose or bulging lids should also be avoided.

When finished eating, put leftovers into the cooler immediately. Be sure there's enough ice to keep leftovers cold and safe until you get home.

Fruit Cobbler

- 1 stick margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups cut up apples, cherries or peaches
- 1 cup sugar
- ¾ cup flour
- ¾ cup milk
- 2 tsp. baking powder

Melt margarine in two quart casserole. Sprinkle one cup sugar over fruit, set aside. Mix sugar, flour, milk and baking powder. Add to margarine, add fruit last. Bake for one hour in 300 degree oven.

Tomatoes Until Frost

You gardeners can have fresh tomatoes until frost if you take care of your plants. That means keeping out diseases and insect pests.

One key to successful gardening is spraying for leaf diseases and insects. You also need to water when rain is scarce and fertilize plants every four to six weeks.

Break off suckers on plants as needed. When suckers are

allowed to develop, the fruit is smaller. Keep the plants tied up so the vines won't touch the soil and rot the fruit.

Stop Fire Ants

If fire ants are a problem around your home, the best way to get rid of them is by treating the mound. Mound treatment takes less chemical to kill the ants, so it's better for the environment and more economical.

Amdro fire ant bait is available from the County Extension Office. Use five tablespoons of the material for each mound, scattered three to four feet around the mound. This is for non-crop land or turf areas.

You can also use other chemicals for treating fire ant mounds. Keep children and pets away from treated areas until the chemicals are dry.

Turf Weed Control

Chemicals can take a lot of the work out of weed control in the home lawn. For most weeds in bermudagrass and zoysiagrass lawns, the herbicide MSMA is a good choice.

Rates for using MSMA vary, but the mixture is about right when the turf just starts to yellow or a slight tip burn occurs on the grass. For tough weed problems like dallisgrass, bahiagrass and goosegrass, you need to repeat the treatment every 10 to 20 days.

You can safely apply MSMA on newly established bermudagrass lawns after two or three mowings or when the root systems are

active and extensive.

Shrubs Need Attention

Don't neglect the new shrubs you transplanted this spring. They will need special attention to stand up to the summer.

Shrubs need plenty of water on hot summer days. Water them at least twice a week during dry spells. Young shrubs need four to five gallons of water each week that it doesn't rain.

A good layer of mulch around shrubs will conserve moisture. Use a three to six inch layer of pine straw, pine needles, leaves or compost.

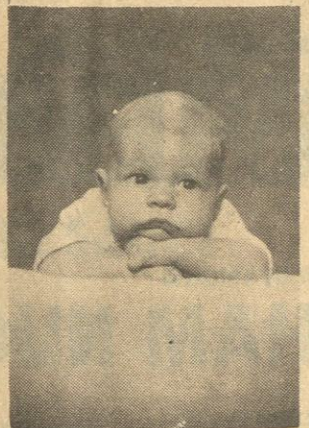
The groom's cake was chocolate, decorated with lattice work and basket weave

Re-Enactment of the Battle of Iuka

One hundred and twenty years ago, the bloodiest battle of the Civil War was fought at Iuka, Mississippi. On August 21-22, 1982, two hundred Civil War re-enactors will re-enact the battle at Mill Creek. The re-enactment is sponsored by the Iuka Jaycees and Maury Schuh of the 38th Mississippi Infantry Regiment. The event will consist of three battle re-enactments and two living

history demonstrations. During the living history demonstrations, the public is urged to tour the Confederate and Federal camps and to ask questions of the re-enactors who will be in "19th century character." Re-enactors will travel from as far away as Texas to attend the battle. Each re-enactor will purchase his own authentic uniform and weapon. The most spectacular sight at the re-enactment will be the artillery fieldpieces, complete with horses. This will be the

largest concentration of artillery in battle in north Mississippi since the Civil War. The 38th Mississippi Infantry Regiment, the Pettus Flying Artillery, and the 11th Mississippi Heavy Artillery are recruiting men between the ages of 16 and 60 to participate in the Battle of Iuka. A limited number of uniforms and weapons is available. Anyone interested in participating should contact Herbert Thomas, P.O. Box 117, Iuka, Ms. 38852.

presence of hepatitis and syphilis agents, group and Rh factor typing. When blood is transfused to a patient, a processing fee is reflected on the hospital bill. In nearly all cases, health insurance covers these expenses. Blood donated may be transfused to one patient as whole blood, or it may be divided into components -- red cells, platelets, plasma, and other derivatives -- to help many patients with special needs. Anyone who is between the ages of 18 and 65 may donate. Seventeen-year-olds may donate with written parental permission. A donor must weigh at least 110 pounds. The donation process takes approximately 30-45

minutes, including registration and a mini-physical. During the screening, a Red Cross nurse checks a donor's blood pressure, temperature, pulse, rate and hemoglobin. The actual donation lasts only eight minutes or less. The average adult has 10-12 pints of blood, and is eligible to donate every 56 days. The donation which is a little less than a pint, is replaced quickly. The donor is encouraged to eat well and drink plenty of fluids both before and after a donation. During the fiscal year July 1, 1981 through June 30, 1982, Tishomingo County Hospital required 668 units of blood and blood components to balance their inventory. Only 274 units were actually

collected. "Since the closing of the Yellow Creek facility, blood collections in Tishomingo County have fallen drastically," says Ms. Casey. "We've got to get more people involved in the blood program. This county has to pull its own weight." The Red Cross and the Iuka EMT's are co-sponsoring a community drive on Friday, August 6, from 12 noon until 5 p.m. at the Iuka Baptist Church. "We encourage the residents of Iuka and the outlying areas to come in and donate. After all, just picture yourself on the receiving end." For more information, contact the church office at 423-5246.

Blood Is Like A Parachute

... if it's not there when you need it, chances are you'll never need it again. And this Region of the American Red Cross needs an average of 750 units of blood per day. "These needs do not decrease in the summer and holiday periods; unfortunately, our collections do," says Leigh Casey, Red Cross Blood Services Representative.

"We must ask people to remember that it is their community's responsibility to supply their blood needs." The blood that is collected in a community is processed in the regional laboratory in Huntsville or Birmingham. The county hospital then places a weekly order with the Red Cross, and that supply is distributed. Emergency needs are provided at all times via the state troopers or common carriers. Processing laboratory tests for the
