

Dear Mr. Biggs:

Ever since we filed an ap-I've also been reading the letters we've been receiving from customers. Either per-

sonally or by letter, we have tried to respond to most of them. While the language and

thrust of these comments have varied, some points have been raised more than others. These deal with the size of our request, its timing and our reasons for advertising.

Perhaps I can offer some thoughts which will clarify these points. First, nobody denies that

\$98 million is a lot of money. And nobody denies that local rates increased substantially - especially when compared to the size of past increases.

But those increases are required to meet the increased costs of doing business since our last increase over two years ago. For example, inflation has increased 25 percent since then, yet the additional revenues we are asking for represent an increase of only

A substantial portion of our \$400 million-pllus construction program must come from investors, either from the sale of stock or by porrowing through the sale of bonds. Is this return out of line? Well, if you analyze the rate requests of 200 gas, electric and telephone companies now pending around the country, you will find that well over half are requesting returns on equity as high or higher than our requested return.

One final point concerns the membership of a few company executives in private clubs. Those are personal memberships paid for by the individual. Meat and poultry products should be thawed, still wrapped, in the refrigerator. For quicker thawing, place food in watertight wrapping under cold water and cook the product soon after thawing.

Shrubs Need Attention Don't neglect the new shrubs you transplanted this spring. They will need special attention to stand up to the summer

Shrubs need plenty of water on hot summer days. Water them at least twice a week during dry spells. Young shrubs need four to five gallons of water each

A good layer of mulch around shrubs will conserve moisture. Use a three to six inch layer of pine straw, pine needles, leaves or compost.

Under this method the slide is projected from underneath a table onto a glass screen and the acreage is calculated corn or rice acreage is being directly from the slide by electronic computer.

Henry L. Knox, Director of County School Bus the Tishomingo ASCS Office, said the new method of determining crop acreages has resulted in substantial savings in the cost of determining crop acreages. However, he was quick to emhasize that some farm visits are still made on a spot check basis for quality control purposes. Also, ground measurement is still done in isolated cases where unusual conditions make it necessary. The beginning of farm

programs in the 1930's made it necessary to measure cotton and other crops on participating farms. This immediately proved to be a tremendous task. In those early days, County ASCS offices, (which were known at first as AAA offices and later as PMA offices), employed a great many field reporters. Ground measurements were made with "dog" chains. Later on steep tapes came into use. It didn't take long to realize that it was impossible to ground measure the vast number of fields. As a result, various types of maps were used.

Soon the use of aerial photographs was developed and they came into general use in the mid thirties. With this system a reporter could go to the farm and plot the planted acreages on to the photograph. This eliminated necessity for most the around measurements. Acreages were then determined for individual fields by the use of planimeters. Using these instruments to trace the field boundaries as outlined on the photographs, acreages were computed. In the thirties many county ofemployed 15-20 fices planimeter operators. I am told that here in Tishomingo County 20 field reporters and 3 planimeter operators were used during those early years. The




