Services Held For Mrs. Gladys Jourdan



Mrs. Gladys Virginia Carmichael Jourdan, 86, died Wednesday evening, August 25, at Tishomingo County Hospital. She was the widow of J.C. Jourdan, Jr., attorney, merchant and lumberman, who also served as Tishomingo County Chancery Clerk for 16 years. Mr. Jourdan died June 5, 1961.

Mrs. Jourdan, the daughter of the late Laura Harris and George T. Carmichael, was born at Allsboro, Colbert County, Alabama, January 27, 1896. She moved with her family to Iuka at an early preschool age and made her home here the remainder of her life. Her father owned and operated a general mercantile business in Iuka for a number of years.

Mrs. Jourdan was educated in the Iuka Public Schools and at Martin College, Pulaski, Tennessee. She and Mr. Jourdan were married October 25, 1922, in the Iuka Methodist Church, where she was an active member. She

taught a children's Sunday School class for a number of years and was Superintendent of the Children's Division for several years. She sang in the Church choir and was a member of the Women's Society of Christian Service. She was also a charter member of the Thursday Study Club.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m., Friday, August 27, at Iuka Methodist Church with Rev. Dudley Brown, of Lexington, Mississippi and Rev. Jerry Horton officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge. Her nephews served as pallbearers: John H. Allen, Jr., Jackson, Mississippi; George C. Allen, Memphis, Tennessee; Robert H. Allen, Louisville, Kentucky; C.R. McCulley, Jr., Owensboro, Kentucky; and D.O. Jourdan, Jr. and D.O. Jourdan, III, both of Iuka.

In addition to her husband and parents, she was preceded in death by three brothers, Will, Harris and Lucian Carmichael; two sisters, Mattie Faye (Mrs. John H. Allen), and Reba (Mrs. Lawrence Goyer); and one granddaughter, Bettye Jourdan "Beth" Brown.

Mrs. Jourdan is survived by one daughter, Mrs. R.L. Brown, Jr.; two sisters, Mrs. C.R. McCulley and Mrs. Robert L. McKnight; one grandson, Robert L. Brown, III; one granddaughter, Barbara James Brown; and one great-grandson, Robert L. Brown, IV, all of Iuka.

Funeral Services For Mrs. Pansy Reid

Citizens of Iuka are saddened following the death of one of their senior citizens, Mrs. Pansy Tibbets Reid. Mrs. Reid, 80, died Thursday, August 26, at the Tishomingo County Hospital. She was a member of the Iuka Baptist Church.

Mrs. Reid was born June 1, 1902, in Reuben, Kansas, and was reared in Athens, Alabama, later moving to Iuka, where she remained a citizen for 60 years. She was very well known among Iuka merchants because of the role she took in the operation of her husband's men's retail clothing store, Reid Brothers.

Taking an active part in local civic clubs, Mrs. Reid was a member of the Thursday Study Club and a mem-

ber of the Chief Tishomingo Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. A very talented artist, she will be remembered by her many friends whom she often entertained with her very special home cooking.

Graveside services were held at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, August 28, at the Oak Grove Cemetery in Iuka, with Jerry Swimmer and J.B. Burns officiating. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the funeral arrangements.

Survivors include her husband, Clifton B. Reid, of Iuka; two daughters, Mrs. Sam Daniel, of Iuka, and Mrs. Thomas R. Joseph, Jr., of Hamilton, Texas; six grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Governor's Educational Planning Committee

Beth Davis, of Iuka, has been selected to serve as coordinator of the Governor's Educational Forum Planning Committee for Tishomingo County.

An area forum addressing education and economic development in Mississippi will be held in Oxford at Oxford High School, September 7, at 7 p.m.

Shoplifters Sentenced

Tishomingo County's First District Justice Court Judge, James J. Kirk, passed sentence Tuesday, August 31, on the second young male offender from Alcorn County involved in shoplifting at the Wal-Mart Store on Highway 25 South in Iuka, during the month. The subject's abetter was seized earlier, and as a result both have received fines from Judge Kirk totaling \$250, along with 20 days in the county jail for each violator.

According to reliable sources, Wal-Mart store manager, James Frasher, reportedly gave chase on foot upon being informed that the two suspects were observed leaving the store with concealed merchandise belonging to the store, approximately valued at \$130.00. The pair fled the scene by car evoking a high speed chase on Hwy. 72 West through Burnsville, ignoring law official's warnings, with the chase ending in the Strickland Community in the eastern part of Alcorn County where the driver lost control of the vehicle.

One of the offenders was apprehended immediately, while the second evaded officers, escaping to a nearby wooded area, to be arrested later in Corinth. One of the subjects had been involved with shoplifting in the Alcorn County area previously.

At the time of sentencing only one pleaded guilty, while the other violator was represented by legal counsel.

COUNTY SCHOOLS LOCATING HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

The Tishomingo County School District is participating in a statewide effort to locate children through the age of 20 who are physically, mentally, communicatively or emotionally handicapped. The information will be used to determine special education program needs as progress is made toward providing a free and appropriate public education to all handicapped children in compliance with Public Law 94-142.

Under this law, no school

age child, including the severely and profoundly retarded can be denied admission.

Information will be gathered on all handicapped children through census activities, telephone or written responses to media campaigns, and through referrals derived from other data.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by the school district and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family

Rights and Privacy Act.

Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without parents' consent.

Those who have a child or know of a child between the ages of 6 and 20 who is physically and/or mentally handicapped that is not enrolled in a public school program are asked to help school officials locate and plan for such children.

The State Department of Education has required that each school district provide teachers for the following categories of exceptional children - trainable mentally retarded, educable mentally retarded, specific learning disabilities, speech/language handicapped, hearing impaired/deaf, severely/profoundly retarded, deaf/blind, emotionally handicapped, visually impaired, physically handicapped, D.D. and

multiple handicapped.

The law states that school districts shall seek exceptional children who are not enrolled in school.

Parents of school age handicapped children who should be in the Tishomingo County School but not presently enrolled may contact Mr. Alvia J. Blakney, Superintendent of Education, located in the Tishomingo County Courthouse, Iuka, MS. 38852 or phone 423-6061.

In addition to school age children, the Tishomingo County Schools operate a Pre-School Day Care Center for handicapped children between the ages of 2 years 9 months and 6 days old. This center is located one mile north of Tishomingo adjacent to the Vocational-Technical Center. Parents of pre-school age handicapped children may contact the above named office of the County Superintendent or call Mrs. Linda Southward, Acting Director of the Day Care Center, Phone 438-7471.

Family Planning Clinics Held At Health Department

Family planning clinics are held weekly at the Tishomingo County Health Department, according to Coordinating Nurse, Edna Earl Tapp.

"The Health Department offers family planning services to anyone, regardless of age, marital status or financial situation," Tapp said. "These services are provided on a strictly confidential basis."

The services of the family planning program include medical examinations, education and counseling regarding reproduction, contraceptive, follow-up, treatment of contraceptive-related emergencies, infertility services and referrals for other

health problems. "The Board of Health established this program to provide services of high quality within an atmosphere which respects the privacy and dignity of the individual," Tapp said. "Presently, we have over 656 persons taking part in the program."

"The greatest advantage of our family planning service is preventing undesired pregnancies when a family cannot support or handle another child," she said. "Infant mortality is also reduced. Also, we have found several cases of cervical cancer."

Superintendent Dr. Jerry Stone states that this should be a fun-filled afternoon for the whole family, as parents participate in the run with their children and then attend the ribbon cutting and open house for the Commons Building.

Casseroles

To cut your food bill serve casseroles more often. Casseroles provide convenience and economy for busy, budget conscious cooks. Many foods, from main dish to dessert, can be cooked in a casserole. They are time-savers, in that they may be made up several hours ahead, placed in the

refrigerator then put in the oven to bake when needed for a meal. Many casseroles lend themselves well to freezing. Make up several, cook and serve one and store the others in the freezer for later use.

To conserve fuel energy, bake several casseroles at one time -- one of meat, a vegetable, and a dessert.

There are many occasions when a casserole is the best choice for a meal. The convenience of the casserole, its popularity as a way to use leftovers are all familiar advantages. Sometimes in our zeal for the practical we may overlook the possibilities for making a casserole real

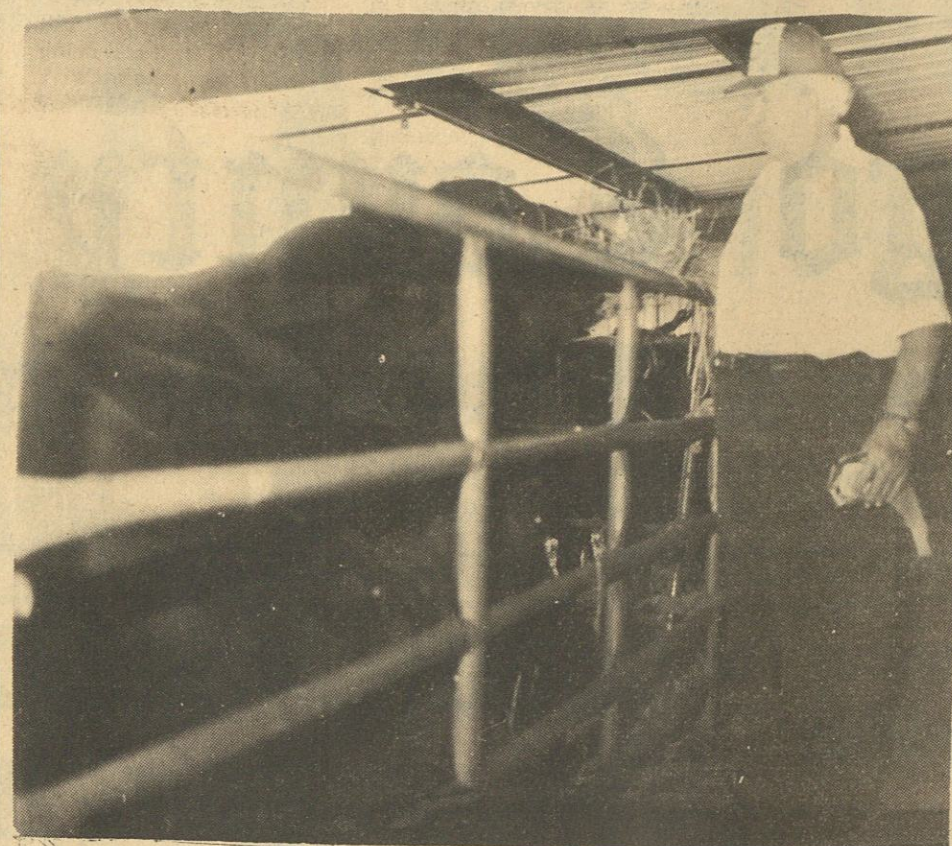

gourmet fare.

There are recipes planned for elegant party-type casseroles suitable for buffet entertaining. Subtly seasoned, interestingly flavored, a really good casserole can be a culinary achievement suitable for any occasion where you want to serve good food.

Casseroles are the perfect answer for busy homemakers and time-saving for hostesses. Another advantage is if part of the family happens to be late for a meal the casserole remains in good condition with the heat suitably reduced.

Many foods can be used in casserole dishes. Choose those that look and taste well together and that your family likes. Use leftovers or planned-over (when you've cooked extra foods to have some to use in later meals for casserole dishes.)

Casseroles consist basically of a protein food (meat, fish, poultry, cheese, eggs, dried beans) combined with a sauce, canned soup or other liquid. Frequently a starchy food such as noodles, rice, or potatoes is added making a little meat or other principal ingredient go a long way.

Good ingredients make a good casserole, but you can save pennies by selecting food appropriate for your use. Canned tomatoes to go into casseroles need not be fancy, or the most expensive. Shape isn't important in most casserole recipes, so there's no need to pay extra for it. Grated tuna usually costs less than chunk style, but the flavor is the same.

Here are a few points for successful casseroles: Use foods that "go together" from the standpoint of flavor, texture, and color; keep pieces of food in identifiable sizes and shapes; remember that the casserole will absorb some of the liquid during baking, so don't make the sauce too thick; try layers of food rather than stirring the ingredients as one mixture; use your imagination in seasoning -- try various herbs and spices; vary toppings -- fluffy mashed potatoes, cooked rice, cornbread batter, ready-to-bake biscuits or rolls, roasted almonds; investigate the wide variety of canned soups for added flavor and ease of

preparation.

You don't need fancy recipes and menus for easy casseroles or oven meals. Just check up on foods in good supply selling at the most attractive prices at your market. Decide which ones you want -- then it's merely a matter of combining.

Casserole recipes are not precise. It's up to the cook to add or subtract seasonings and other ingredients according to what the family prefers and what's on hand. Convenient packaged casserole mixes from market shelves offer a short cut and permit you to create your own special dish with the addition of ground beef, cooked cube meat, or hard cooked eggs.

During the days ahead and year round -- enjoy lots of good eating from casserole dishes.

One-Dish Supper

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 4 Tbsp. oil
- 2 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1 small eggplant, cut in small cubes
- 3 onions, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, chopped
- 2 cups cooked macaroni or rice
- 3 large ripe tomatoes (2 cups canned)
- 1 tsp. salt
- Pepper
- Thyme
- Oregano to taste

In large skillet, cook ground meat, stirring, until browned. Drain fat, set meat aside. Heat oil and butter in same skillet; add cubed eggplant, onions, and garlic. Stir to brown. Return meat to pan; add remaining ingredients. Cook, stirring, about 10 minutes. Garnish with greens. Makes 4 servings.

Low Prices Hurting Farmers

Farmers are in financial trouble. They're victims of their own production miracle. They produce more than a sluggish economy can buy, a situation that depresses prices to the point where farmers often get less for their commodities than it costs to produce them.

Net farm income this year may be the lowest in real dollars since the Depression. The latest U.S. Department of Agriculture estimate is \$19 to \$21 billion. That's a little more than half of what it was in 1973.

The farmer's dilemma comes in spite of astounding productivity. In the last 15 years, U.S. farm output has tripled while the farm population declined by half. The American farmer is by far the most productive in the world. He produces enough food for himself and 77 other people.

It's ironic that being very good at his job is a major source of the farmer's problem. The squeeze brought on by low crop prices, along with high interest rates, has put literally thousands of farmers in a severe financial crunch. And when farmers are in financial trouble, they aren't the only ones who hurt. Not only does the farmer produce

Six ways to save on summer cooling costs

You can stay comfortably cool all summer long while lowering your cooling costs. Just follow these tips:

- Set your thermostat at 78 degrees or higher. For every degree below 78, you increase your cooling costs by 7 percent.
- Make sure you have a clean filter in your air-conditioner. Your central or window air-conditioner should have an annual maintenance check.
- Keep furniture, draperies and other objects away from air vents so cool air may flow freely.
- Close draperies on the sunny side of your home during the day.
- Turn off unnecessary lights since they produce heat.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing.

our food and fiber, he's a major customer for what we produce in our factories. Farmers spend more than \$13

billion a year on equipment and another \$16.4 billion for fuel and maintenance. They keep 150,000 workers busy on assembly lines. When the farmer hurts, we all feel it.

Marketing is only one of the myriad of problems the farmer faces. Until we learn how to control the weather and develop better ways to protect soil and water, he will continue to face perplexing problems.

Farming is a way of life that has appeal. That's probably why, in spite of all his problems, the farmer wouldn't want to change places with his city cousins and a steady paycheck as long as he and economic realities can prevent it.

Soil Test & Be Sure

We've said so many times in this column, but the only way you can be sure to apply the right amounts of crop nutrients is by soil testing. That goes for crops, pastures, vegetables, lawns, flowers, shrubs and horticultural crops.

If you grow summer crops, probably the best time to take a soil sample is right after harvest. Then, you have the best opportunity to look over crop conditions for specific production problems.

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service Soil Testing Department will analyze your soil sample

free or charge. Samples are usually returned in five to six days. By soil testing this fall, you can avoid the spring rush.

To take advantage of this free service this fall, contact the County Extension Office. We have all the material you need.

WHEN SIDE VISION IS BLURRED

If you've noticed a blurred or shadowy area in your side vision, you should have your eyes checked to see if you have a detachment of the retina or if some other problem is causing it.

When there is a detachment of the retina, this means the retina has separated from its normal position at the back of the eye. The retina is the innermost lining of the eye and is a very delicate membrane. Because it receives the focused image entering the pupil, it is sometimes compared to the film in a camera. Except at two points, most of the retina is held in position by pressure of the eye fluids. When it moves out of position this may

cause blurring as well as other symptoms. Spots and flashes, for example, are sometimes an early sign of impending detachment.

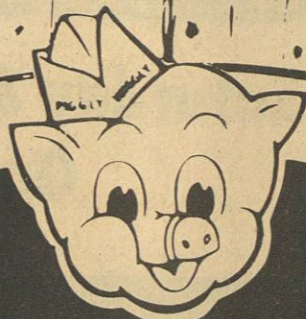
Even a minor detachment of the retina should be treated as soon as possible because it will tend to increase and cause more serious vision problems. The best way to protect yourself from detachment of the retina and any other eye disease is to have your eye examined regularly by your eye doctor.

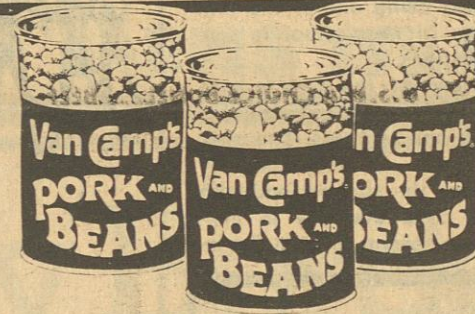

One two three four five six seven eight . . . "There's no business like show business. There's no business I know . . ." The rhythm of the tune and the high-kicking girls in the glitter suits linger in your memory after the music has faded and the lights blackened.

The unforgettable song is a home-crowd favorite, the stage is a football field and the young ladies are the Tiger Dancers of Northeast Mississippi Junior College, a dance line reminiscent of the Rockettes and other such famous show girl entertainers. They dazzle audiences with their sparkling costumes and Hollywood routines.

Recognized as one of the most beautiful and talented lines in the South, the Dancers were the first to introduce the precision kick line to the state of Mississippi. They perform to the music of the 190-member Tiger

Band from early fall until the school year ends at every home football game, many away games and many basketball games.

They have also appeared on national television, in two New Orleans Mardi Gras parades, in many marching festivals throughout the South and once gave a special performance for former Mississippi governor Bill Waller.

In addition, the group is also known for its innovative approach in the use of props. Dancing to well-loved tunes like "String of Pearls" or "In the Mood," they often incorporate either hats, canes, chairs, boxes or flash flags into their act. As well, they boast being one of the first lines in Mississippi to use pom-poms.

However, the work is hard and the road to precision is a long one at times. The girls practice spasmodically during the summer and with the band everyday in marching season to keep the in-

novative kick line sharp.

As with any group that works closely together, friendships grow among the squads that come and go down through the years. Many of them still keep in touch even though some have gone on to be reputable dance instructors, some models appearing in magazines and some performers with dance companies.

The squad of 34 was in-

creased this spring to include 42 young ladies from Northeast Mississippi and the surrounding area. Over 100 hopefuls, the largest number of girls to try out since the Dancers began in 1974, showed off their talents to judges vying for a spot on the line, Rickey Bishop, Tiger Band Director, said.

But, he added, because of the quality, dance ability and performance personalities of the girls trying out, the performance standard will remain high. In fact, this year's line promises to be one of the best yet.

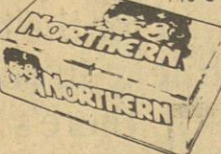

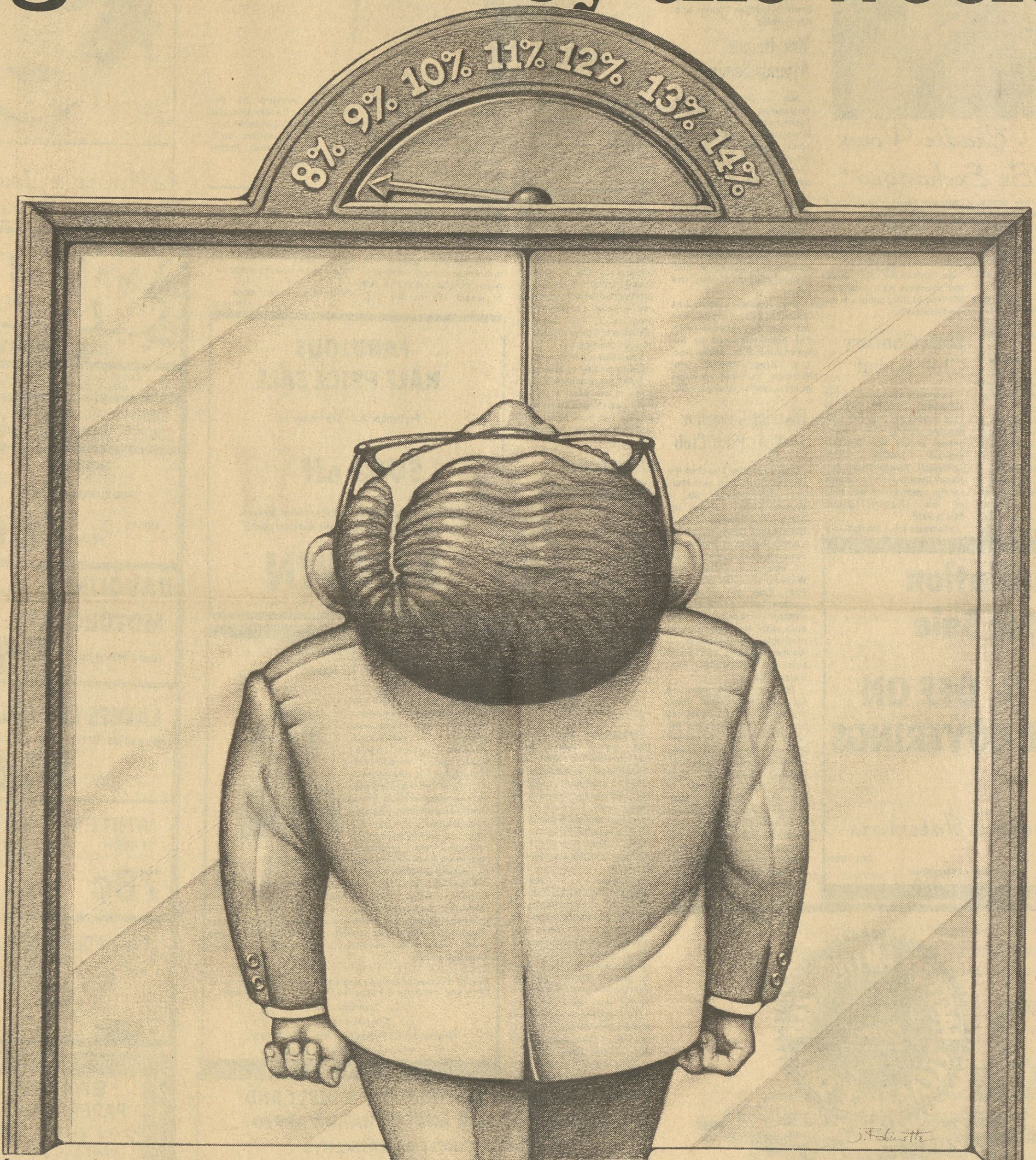
