



James Cruse, 43, Belmont, was injured in the exchange of ammunition with **Tishomingo County Deputies.** Friday, September 10, around 5:00 p.m., on property belonging to the Tenneessee River Pulp and Paper Company, of Counce, Tenn., 4 miles west of Belmont.

According to Assistant District Attorney, Richard Bowen, the three law officers involved were in the area to search for contraband, which they had reason to believe was stored there. Implicated in the shoot-out are Phillip Harris, Bob Kemp, and Earl McIntosh, all deputies with the county police force. Mr. Bowen stated that the law officials reportedly returned fire after being fired upon by the victim.

Wounded three times during the exchange of fire, Cruse is currently hospitalized at the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, MS. Preliminary charges of aggravated assault on law officers have been filed against Cruse in the case.



Since meat takes the largest portion of your food dollar, careful shopping and innovative cooking is important. Meat is enjoyed for its good taste and excellent nutritional value. Here are some basic tips to help trim your meat bill:

- Plan ahead and cut frills, but not nutrition. Consider all your incredient costs and not just the meat price.

- Take advantage of advertised specials and compare prices

- Think cost-per-serving,

contract. Bids were opened August 5, for paving the incomplete 12-mile section in Alabama and a contract will soon be awarded to the lowest bidders, Thomas Associates for \$985,310, Bainbridge said.

Only the 39-miles connecting Tennessee 50 to Nashville and 32 miles in Mississippi will remain to be completed when the 308-mile section between Jackson and Tennessee 50 is opened next year.

Next summer the 42.8 miles between Tupelo (U.S. 45) and the MS/AL state line is supposed to receive its final surface, Bainbridge said. The estimated cost of the project is \$7 million, and has not yet been appropriated by Congress.

Conservation News By: Phil Purvis,

District Conservationist, SCS

Crop land treatment in Tishomingo County needs improving. This is an objective that the Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners and the Soil Conservation Service have been working on for a long time. Progress is being made in getting more acres of cropland treated to reduce soil tilth, reduce water contamination in lakes and streams, and improve the beauty of our countryside. All these things are accomplished when cropland fields are adequately treated with such practices as contour strips, grassed waterways, parallel terraces, and crop residue use. Almost all acres are sub-

ject to erosion to the extent of being hazardous to future production potential, maintenance of roads, channels, drainage ditches, of causing contamination of water in lakes and streams and the acceleration of the breakdown of soil structure. Soil erosion does create many problems in our total environment that are not readily recognized by landowners.

The extent of total soil loss from cropland in Tishomingo County is not known. For example, on a 4 percent slope the soil loss from continuous cotton planted up and down the slope was 89 tons per acre. Cotton on the contour alone lost 39 tons of soil per acre. The soil loss from cotton with alternating grass strips with the rows on contour was only 3.3 tons per acre. This is a good example of the effectiveness of grass strips when the system is properly laid out and needed

along with crop residue use. We know how to solve most of the problems mentioned if we can get landowners and operators to establish and follow good treatment measures land such as: (1) contouring, (2) waterways, (3) grassed modified stripcropping with parallel rows, (4) crop residue use, parallel terraces, (5) minimum tillage (no-till), (6) lime when needed, and (7) use of adequate fertillizer. There is also a need for plant management and treatment. However, we are concerned here with land treatment.



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



A Word From The Miss. Hwy. Patrol

Motorists who use Mississippi roads and highway rest areas as garbage dumps and restrooms will soon feel heat from the Highway Patrol, Chief Donald Butler has warned.

Butler has ordered a crackdown on littering and told state troopers to be on the lookout for anyone who throws trash out windows or abuses litter barrels in roadside rest areas.

"We are going to increase enforcement of antilittering laws," Butler said, "State troopers will stop and issue citations to people who throw junk on the highway."

Mississippi law says litterers can be fined up to \$500 for throwing paper, glass, tin cans or other litter on the highway. Anyone convicted of littering can be required to pick up litter on both sides of a highway for a distance of up to five miles. Policing roadside parks

and rest areas has also been made a top priority of the Highway Patrol, Butler said. "These rest areas have

been built for the convenience of the motoring public and serve a useful purpose," Butler said. "Our troopers will be visiting them more frequently to prevent abuses."

Butler said he was concerned about reports that residents were using litter barrels in the parks and rest areas as dumping grounds for household garbage.

He said the state has spent large sums of money to make these areas attractive for both Mississippians and

visitors to the state. The Highway Patrol will become more active in these areas as a result of the chief's orders.

Butler also warned that troopers will be looking for motorists who indiscriminately park along highways to relieve themselves.

"Special rest areas have been established with restroom facilities and the shoulders of highways are not acceptable sites for performing body functions," Butler said.

"Parking along a roadside is not the proper solution for someone who must relieve himself," Butler said. "The practice is dangerous and can cause accidents, and it is also offensive to other motorists."
