## Deadline To Purchase Vehicle Tags Nears

All tags due in October, which includes truck tags, are due by November 15th, according to Tishomingo County Tax Assessor-Collector, James Bishop. After November 15th, a penalty will be assessed.

A road and bridge privilege tax of \$15.00 will be charged on all automobiles, increasing the cost by \$6 to \$9 from last year, Bishop said.

The new tax law became effective July 1, 1982, after the

State Tax Commission review legislation passed by the 1982 State Legislature.

The law also calls for a tax of \$8.00 on motorcycles and \$10.00 on all trailers.

Bishop said that the penalty for failure to purchase license tags on time is five percent for the first 15 days of delinquency and an additional five percent for each additional 30-day period of delinquency, up to 25 percent.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Preserve Paint Brushes & Rollers

Paint brushes and rollers represent an investment. The tools will survive a number of "overhauls" if cleaned and stored correctly after use.

Avoid letting paint harden and dry on the implements. Use a rounded stick to scrape excess paint off onto newspapers. For oil-based paint, clean in brush cleaner or mineral spirits. Then wash brushes or rollers in detergent or soap suds. Rinse

and press out excess moisture. If latex paint is used, simply wash tools in sudsy water. Work bristles between thumb and forefinger to remove paint from the heel of a brush. Suds the nap of a roller with both hands. Rinse. Comb brush bristles with a metal comb to prevent matting. Hang brushes by the handles; place rollers on pegs or upright to dry. When completely dry, wrap in foil to keep them dust-free.

### Creating A Spacious Feeling

Do you feel happier when you are surrounded by open space? Do you like rooms with an open feeling - chairs set far apart - plenty of space of each activity? The furnishings you select, and the

way you arrange them, can help you achieve an open, airy look, even in a small room. If the room is small, use furniture with simple lines. Contemporary styles are good choices. Some manufacturers make furniture in small scale to look right in small rooms and in rooms with low ceilings. Place furniture in against the walls to leave as much space as possible in the center of the room.

Don't overcrowd the room with furniture. If a piece has no special function, aesthetic appeal or sentimental value, dispose of it.

You can expand space visually with good use of mirrors. Hang one on the long wall of a narrow room to make it appear wider. If possible, hang a mirror to reflect the outdoors.

Put away some accessories and bric-a-brac to avoid a cluttered look, you can bring them out when you want to change the look for next season. Beautiful objects need space around them to be fully appreciated.

Create more floor space by using multipurpose furniture; a chest with storage drawers that doubles as an end table or modular units that fit around a sofa for surface use and storage. To make a bedroom more spacious,

frame the bed with modular grouping of chest, shelves and cabinets.

Meat Sauce & Spaghetti  
1 lb. ground beef  
1 tsp. salt  
1 cup chopped onion  
1 clove garlic  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper (optional)  
1 cup chopped celery  
1 No. 303 can tomatoes (2 cups)  
1 cup catsup or tomato sauce  
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1 tsp. chili powder  
1-1/2 tsp. lemon juice or vinegar  
1/2 tsp. black pepper

For thickening: 1/4 cup water, 1 tablespoons flour, and 2 teaspoons sugar

Heat heavy skillet and sprinkle salt over bottom, brown meat, stirring with pancake turner. Remove beef to large stewing pan. Cook onions, celery and peppers for about 5 minutes in skillet. Remove from fat and add to browned beef. Add minced garlic, tomatoes, catsup, Worcestershire sauce, chili powder, lemon juice or vinegar and pepper. Cover and simmer, over low heat for 1-1/2 to 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Mix water, flour, salt and sugar. Add to cooked meat mixture and cook 5 more minutes until liquid thickens. Makes about 5 cups sauce. Serve meat sauce and cooked spaghetti (or vermicelli) separately or spoon sauce over platter of spaghetti. Provide grated cheese in separate serving dish. Chopped ripe olives add to cost but also to flavor! For 5 cups spaghetti cook 1/2 pound (8 ounces) of spaghetti according to package directions though cooking time may need to be longer than directions indicate. Makes 10 (1 cup) servings.

## County Agent's Notes

### Fireplace Care

Most people whose homes feature a fireplace know that the fireplace is one of the least efficient ways to heat a house. But most people still like to use the fireplace because of its warm glow. There are several ways to add

to the enjoyment and efficiency of a fireplace.

Before cold weather sets in, check the chimney for obstructions and creosote build-up. Creosote, a highly flammable material, is found in all types of wood. It is a leading cause of chimney fires.

A cold chimney will not draw as well as a warm one. Before lighting the fire, hold a lighted rolled-up section of newspaper near the top and rear of the fireplace. This warms the chimney and keeps smoke from backing up into the room when the fire is started.

Allow ashes to accumulate to a depth of about one inch on the hearth. The layer of ashes acts as insulation and helps the fire burn more efficiently. Add new logs to the rear of the fire so they will reflect light and heat into the room.

If the house has central heating, turn it off while the fireplace is in use. Otherwise, the fireplace will draw the heated air up the chimney and hinder rather than help the heating system.

Sparks are always a source of danger. Use screens or glass doors in front of the fire to keep sparks from falling on the carpet or floor. Don't leave children unattended in a room with a fire.

### Don't Use This Year's Compost

If you are thinking about making compost from this year's garden residue, it's not a good idea.

Too much rain this summer kept many gardeners from spraying for diseases as often as they should have. As a result, there were more disease problems in home gardens than normal.

The diseases can overwinter on the decaying plant tissue and cause severe problems next spring. To avoid this, don't turn under the garden residue or use it as compost.

You also should have your garden soil tested, even if bumper crops were produced in the past without tests. You may be able to continue enjoying the good harvest without spending as much on fertilizer.

#### Farmers Reminded To Petition For ASC Committee Nominees

Farmers are reminded that the County ASCS Office is now receiving nominations for ASCS Community Committee Election candidates. Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, encouraged farmers to use this opportunity to nominate their farm neighbors as candidates in the ASC Committee Election. South said the ASC Committee provides the important service of administering government farm programs in the local community. The election will be conducted by mail from Nov. 26 to Dec. 6. Eligible farm voters will be provided with instructions for filling out the secret ballot and returning it to the county ASCS Office. Most resident farmers are eligible to hold office as ASC Committee Members. If a farmer would like detailed information concerning eligibility requirements, he or she should contact either a present committee member or the County ASCS Office. In filling out a petition, farmers should be careful to include the name of only one nominee, the signatures of at least three eligible ASC voters who support the nominee, and certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected. Petitions must contain this information to be accepted. The completed petition should be dated and mailed or hand-delivered to the County ASCS Office no later than Nov. 1. ASC Committee Elections are open to all eligible ASC voters without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. South explained that any concerned farmer with an interest in serving fellow producers would be an asset to the ASC Com-

mittee. For this reason, farmers are urged to petition for the farmers of their choice. The individual producer will benefit in the long run from a responsible, concerned team of ASC committee members in the local administration of U.S. Government farm programs, South said. Tishomingo County has 3 ASC Communities. The names of these communities are: Community "A" North Crossroads, North Burnsville, Doskie and Iuka; Community "B" Midway, South Burnsville, North Tishomingo; and Community "C" South Tishomingo, Dennis, Mingo, Belmont and Golden.

ASCS SAFEGUARDS TENANTS, SHARECROPPERS ELIGIBILITY FOR PROGRAM BENEFITS - To protect the interests of tenants and sharecroppers, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service recently issued guidelines for determining farm program benefits for producers when leases or rental arrangements are involved. Elmer A. South says the 1983 program benefits include price support loans and purchases, deficiency, diversion and disaster payments, if applicable, and the farmer-owned grain reserve on farms participating in the 1983

program. "For price eligibility, the person must be a producer of the crop, maintain a percentage interest in a specific acre of the crop," South said. A person who receives cash fixed or standing compensation for rent or is not a producer of the crop, said. Deficiency and diversion payments are generally divided among producers they share in the. Producers who are eligible price support benefits are generally be eligible deficiency payments proportion to their share of the crop, and may be for land diversion payment. However, a producer who not eligible for price support benefits could be eligible a share of the land diversion payment. "This is possible through the individual producer's contributions to the design and use of conservation acreage." The ASCS said producers who share the crop must agree payment proportions. If the payment will be by the County ASC Committee in a fair and equitable manner to protect the rights of tenants and sharecroppers. For further details explanations of program eligibility requirements, contact the local ASCS Office.

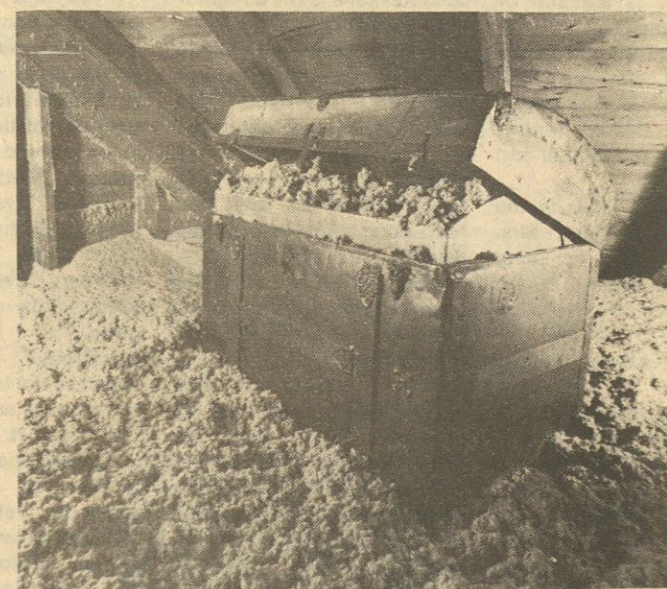

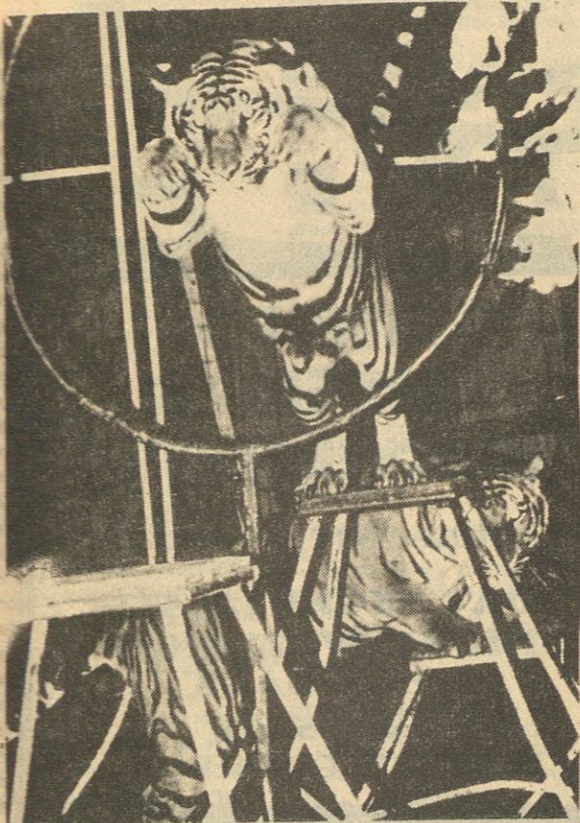

Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and to challenge its accuracy. Information which could identify an individual child will be

maintained by the school district and will be provided to other agencies in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act.

Parents of school age handicapped children who should be enrolled in the Iuka Public Schools but who are not presently enrolled may contact Dr. Jerry Stone, Superintendent, at 423-3206.

## Tree Seedlings Still Available

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is still taking orders for tree seedlings to be planted this coming winter. Seedlings went on sale in late June and by late September, about 45,000,000 seedlings, or 60 percent of this year's total stock, had already been sold.

The remaining seedlings are mostly pine, however, if Longleaf is what you need, you had better hurry -- only 127,000 remaining. Other species left for sale include Bald Cypress, Green Ash, Yellow Poplar and Cottonwood.

Selling price for the seedlings varies from \$17 per thousand for loblolly and Slash Pine to \$76 per thousand for Cottonwood cuttings.

Pine seedlings may be purchased in bundles of 1000 or more only, while hardwood and Bald Cypress seedlings can be bought in quantities of 100, 250, 500 or 1000.

Applications for the seedlings are available at any Mississippi Forestry Commission Office.

## How To Vote By Absentee Ballot

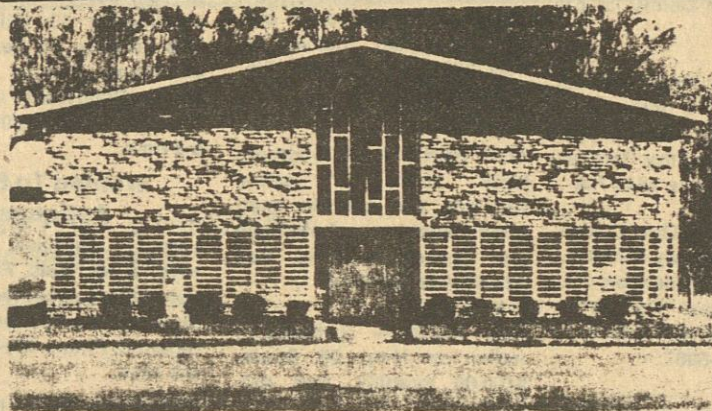
1. Write the Circuit Clerk in your county no more than 30 days prior to the election in which you wish to vote and ask for a ballot.

Desperate is the way we feel day in and day out as time slowly passes in Falkner, Mississippi.

As we reminisce over the past 528 days since Steve's disappearance, let us remind you that misfortune is no respecter of person.

This misfortune could have happened to our child or yours.

Steve was not an exceptional child or student, or maybe he was.

He was reared in a Christian home and a small town of 255 residents.

This is evidence that such things don't happen only in large cities where crime is high.

If one only mentions March 23, 1981, in this small town our emotions soar! No one asks, "What happened?"

It was that day that 15-year-old Steve Brown last arose and had breakfast with his family, the last day Steve attended Falkner High School, the last day he planned a hunting trip with his classmates, the last day he practiced his music to sing in the church choir the next Sunday.

Why? Why and how did he disappear so mysteriously?

All 255 of us are praying for the answer to this question, as well as numerous friends, relatives and associates.

The hours, money and prayers are innumerable that have been spent attempting to find him.

He mysteriously disappeared on this date after leaving on a hunting trip with classmates.

A classmate said, "Steve was not one we knew as a clown, but a quiet kind of fellow that wouldn't just leave as the wind would blow."

When we all put our thoughts and comments together, we came up with this description of Steve. The vote for its accuracy was unanimous.

He collected baseball caps, not enemies; and took music, not drugs.

Steve's world was defined by the red brick buildings of Falkner High School, and even the family home is on the campus. He spent weekdays in school and club meetings or on the practice field where he played football.

He spent Saturdays working in a nursery and Sundays in church. He might take in a movie in Ripley, but only after asking his parent's permission. He visited his grandparents and the orthodontist, not the poolroom.

See why we are praying and begging that everyone will do their little bit to help us find Steve.

A \$12,000 reward is still posted for information leading to his discovery. If

### POINT OF LAW

Q: What can landlords do

when their tenant doesn't live up to the lease?

A: It is common for leases to expressly contain a provision allowing the landlord to regain possession of the premises if the tenant fails to live up to the lease provisions, for example, failure to pay rent, damage to property, unauthorized subleasing or assigning, illegal use of the premises, or violation of other provisions. Another method of compensation for failure to pay rent is a rent acceleration clause, meaning that all future rent due under the lease becomes immediately payable.
