'Dick' Merrill, Pioneer Flier Of Iuka, Dead At 88



Henry Tindall 'Dick' Merrill, formerly of Iuka, native and pioneer flier who piloted the first commercial flight across the Atlantic in the 1930's, died Sunday, October 31, in Miami Beach, Fla. He was 88 years old. Merrill was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Merrill, who lived in Iuka, where his father served as depot agent from 1869-1897. Merrill became Eastern Airlines' leading pilot and logged 8 million air miles in 44,111 flying hours, more than any pilot before him or since.

"He represented the passing of an era that we will never see again in the airline industry," said Eastern spokesman Jim Ashlock. "His accomplishments in his

day were more dramatic than those of the astronauts."

"What people remember him for is that he didn't smoke, he didn't drink and he didn't cuss. The simple fact is that he was just an awfully nice guy."

Merrill collected numerous honors, including the Harmon Trophy, bestowed for flying the first commercial trans-Atlantic flight in 1937. The flight carried no passengers; instead, Merrill carried across the Atlantic the first photographs of the coronation of King George VI.

In 1966, Merrill helped pilot a corporate jet around the world with entertainer Arthur Godfrey, setting 21 world speed records. He was also awarded the International Federation of Aeronautics School Gold Medal for having more flying time than any other pilot.

Born in 1894, Merrill took Navy flight training during World War I, and then began flying mail in 1928 for Pitcairn Air Lines, the predecessor of Eastern.

Merrill and his wife, former actress Toby Wing, maintained their Miami Beach home until recently, as well as a home in Lake Elsinore, Calif., where he died.

In addition to his wife, survivors include two granddaughters, Anna Wing Merrill and Simone Wing Merrill, of Lake Elsinore. Merrill was buried in Matthews, Va., following a private ceremony.

Services Held For Lowell E. Grisham

Lowell Edward Grisham, 57, died Saturday, October 30, at his residence in Oxford, Miss.

A native of Iuka, Grisham graduated from Iuka High School in 1943, attended the University of Ole Miss in Oxford, served as a member of the Ms House of Representatives, 1948-1951, served with the F.B.I., personnel employee with Reynolds Aluminum Corp. in Alabama, and was Assistant U.S. District Attorney. At the time of his death, he was the senior partner of Ethridge and Grisham Law Firm in Oxford.

Grisham was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence

Grisham, of Iuka. His paternal grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. T.H. Grisham, also of Iuka, and maternal grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Long, Sr., of Counce, Tenn.

Services were conducted Monday, November 1, at the St. Peter's Episcopal Church with the Rev. Doug Sterling officiating. Burial was in the Oxford Memorial Cemetery. Elliott Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Jo Ann Grisham, of Oxford; a son, the Rev. Lowell Grisham, of Jackson; a daughter, Mrs. Celia Grisham Barnett, of Oxford; and three grandchildren.

Sales Tax Collections Decrease In County

A report of sales tax collections, issued by the State Tax Commission, showed an overall decrease in collections of sales tax from Tishomingo County's six municipalities for the month of September 1982, over that of the previous month.

Figures released indicate that the sales tax collected from Tishomingo County during the month of September showed \$45,387.67 total tax reported as compared to a total of \$48,498.12 collected in August.

Merchants from each municipality responsible for

collecting the tax at the point of purchase, and reporting the amount collected to the state.

Following are listed the six municipalities located in Tishomingo County indicating the amount of taxes collected in September, with the August collections shown in parentheses. They are: Belmont - \$9,722.91, (\$9,884.64); Burnsville - \$4,333.29, (\$4,240.94); Golden - \$273.44, (\$401.29); Iuka - \$72,813.43, (\$6,422.79); Paden - \$56.80, (\$15.56); and Tishomingo - \$2,737.80, (\$3,532.90).

County Schools Ranked In State

Iuka Separate School District ranked 138th in the state in average current expenditures per pupil, based on average daily attendance during the last complete school year for which figures are available. The average expenditure per pupil was \$1,286.29.

Tishomingo County Schools ranked 107th in the state in average current expenditures per pupil, \$1,404.59.

With an average per pupil expenditure of \$2,295.03,

Yazoo County School District was first in the state. At the bottom of the ladder was Pearl Separate School District, \$1,090.57.

The figures, which are for 1980-81, are included in the 1982 report of C.E. Holladay, State Superintendent of Education.

According to Dr. Holladay's report, Iuka ranked 144th in teachers salaries, \$12,163, and 151st in instructional personnel salaries, \$12,418.

Tishomingo County ranked 71st in teachers salaries, \$12,779, and 88th in instructional personnel salaries, \$13,083.

First in Mississippi teachers salaries was Jackson Separate School District, \$15,111 per year, and first also for instructional personnel salaries, \$15,683 per year.

Itawamba County ranked last of the state's school districts in teachers salaries, \$11,927, and instructional personnel salaries, \$12,333.

Tax Assessor Issues Reminder

James Bishop, Tishomingo County Tax Assessor-Collector, reminds local residents that all tags that were due in October, which includes truck tags, are due by November 15th. After this date a penalty will be assessed.

Bishop said that the penalty for failure to purchase license tags on time is five percent for the first 15 days of delinquency and an additional five percent for each additional 30-day period of delinquency, up to 25 percent.

STENNIS, WHITTEN RESEATED IN ELECTION

Whitlock, Moss Elected To School Board

Northeast Mississippi voters joined forces in Tuesday's Senator and House of Representative's race in a resounding endorsement for the two veteran Democratic politicians, Senator John C. Stennis and Representative

Jamie Whitten. Voters in Tishomingo County went to the polls Tuesday to select a senator, a representative, chancery and circuit court judges, and county school board members.

Senator John C. Stennis, 81 year old Democratic choice, was endorsed for a seventh term by Tishomingo County voters with a total of 3867 over Republican nominee Haley Barbour's total of 693. Stennis received 85% of the

votes cast in Tishomingo County. On the state level Stennis received 401,065 to Barbour's 226,704.

Democratic Representative Jamie Whitten will now head back to Washington to begin his 19th full term in the House. With the backing of Northeast Mississippi voters in Tishomingo County, Whitten's county tally was 3866, over his challenger Republican nominee, Fran Fawcett's total of 646. Whitten tallied 86% of the Tishomingo votes in the race for Representative. On the state level, Whitten's overall total was 80,001 to Fawcett's 32,495.

The three incumbent chancery judges and the three incumbent circuit judges, all of whom were unopposed in the re-election bids were endorsed to new terms of office by Tishomingo voters also.

Chancery Judges 1st District, Place I Fred P. Wright, 2944; Place II James E. Bost, 2404; and Place III George F. Adams, 2445.

Circuit Judges 1st District, Place I Fred Wicker, 2702; Place II Thomas Gardner, 2381; and Place III Neal Biggers, Jr., 2173.

In the third district, voters elected unopposed candidate, Jerry Moss to the County Board of Education post with a total of 204 ballots cast.

Voters in the fourth district elected Paul Whitlock to serve the Tishomingo County Board of Education post for the next 6-year term. Totals showed Whitlock with 407; Floyd L. Ware, 277; Archie Berryman, 123; and Jimmy Dale Phifer, 94.

The four amendments listed on the November 2 ballots were approved. Final totaled figures on these resolutions were unavailable at press-time.

All totals given in this article were unofficial at press-time and state totals were incomplete. Totals given are those released from the Tishomingo County Circuit's Office on county totals. On the state level, totals were reported from Jackson, Mississippi from a spokesman in the House of Representatives.

Attorney General Rules On Local Municipal Question

A city employee may reside in a municipal building under certain circumstances, according to a recent opinion of the office of the Mississippi Attorney General.

The opinion was written in response to a query by Michael D. Cooke, attorney for the Town of Tishomingo.

In his letter to the attorney general's office, Cooke stated the Tishomingo Board of Aldermen recently agreed to let a local policeman live in a municipally owned building "for a nominal fee to help defray the expenses of the monthly note and as a matter of protection to the building itself." Cooke noted the building, which was unoccupied for several months, had previously been used as a doctor's clinic and had living quarters in it.

The Tishomingo town attorney stated after reviewing the law, he could find no statute prohibiting the arrangement, but several citizens of the town had objected.

In an opinion written by Ass't. Atty. General S.E. Birdsong, Jr., the attorney general's office held that a municipal employee may live in a municipal building if the arrangement is part of the employee's contract or employment of if the employee's residing in the building is found to be necessary for performance of the employee's duties.

Birdsong stated further that under Section 21-17-1 of the Code, "the premises may be leased at a proper rental by a person who is not a municipal officer or employee."

In a subsequent letter to the attorney general's office, Cooke stated he had learned the original municipal building was built with a \$23,000 bond issue and was begun on March 24, 1969. The bond issue was authorized under Sections 21-33-301 to Sections 21-33-315, Cooke continued. He stated this appears to be the general bond statute as opposed to the other statutes relating to health clinics.

Cooke wrote he had discovered that after the original building was built, there was a \$42,000 addition to the building. After the building was built and all the space not utilized, a doctor and his family lived in that building for some period of time. Cooke questioned whether this was legal under the code sections cited.

Birdsong responded that since the inquiry concerns an action already taken by Tishomingo's governing body, the attorney general's office could not give an official opinion.

"Any such opinion could neither validate or invalidate the government authorities' action and the ultimate resolution of the matter is for a court of competent jurisdiction," Birdsong wrote in the September 16 opinion.

Unemployment Rate Climbs In County

The number of jobless people in Tishomingo County climbed slightly from the August figure, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. Smith stated that 1,590 Tishomingo County residents were unemployed at mid-September, compared to 1,520 in August and 890 in September, 1981. This represents a current unemployment rate of 12.0 percent.

The civilian labor force dropped slightly at mid-month to reach 13,230, 50 below the August estimate and 300 below that of one year ago. The number of employed residents also dropped from the previous figure to total 11,640, compared to 11,760 in August and 12,640 in September, one year ago.

Manufacturing jobs in the county totalled 2,910, 40 above the August figure and 140 over one year ago. Non-manufacturing jobs, estimated to be 5,280, experienced a minimal decline of 30 from the August estimate but a more substantial drop of 2,500 from the September, 1981, figure.

In the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo the civilian labor force was 47,840 for September, as compared to 47,700 for August, 1982, and 48,600 for September, 1981. There were 6,140 individuals unemployed in the four-county area in September for a 12.8 percent unemployment rate. This was a decrease of 0.2 of a percentage point below August, 1982, and 4.4 percent above the estimate for one year ago. The employed segment of the labor force rose during September to 41,700. This was 200 more

than in August and 2,800 less than in September, 1981. Monthly comparisons reveal that Agricultural employment experienced the largest increase while over the year all categories experienced losses.

Smith noted that Nonagricultural Wage and Salaried employment increased 400 persons over the August figure but was still 3,150 below the figure reported in September, 1981. Both Manufacturing and Non-manufacturing employment rose from the previous month. Several areas were responsible for the increase in manufacturing while the increase in nonmanufacturing was due to the rise in Government employment. This was due to the opening of schools. The yearly decline was experienced in primarily all categories.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

More About Fat

Would you believe the average American's diet contains more fat today than it did in 1900. Back then when we used lots of lard and butter, poured cream on cereal, and never threw away the bacon or roast drippings, fats and oils provided only 30 percent of the day's calories. Today fats provide 42% of our calories, and their contribution is climbing. We have the highest fat intake of any civilized people in history. A recent report from a

panel of the National Academy of Sciences urges Americans to reduce the amount of fat, especially saturated animal fat in their diets; to minimize the salt-cured, pickled and smoked foods, and to eat more vegetables, fruits, and whole grains. It is suggested this will result in less cancer. Scientific opinion has been tending toward a general agreement that the worst thing about the American diet is its high fat content, which generally goes along with a low fiber intake.

To be effective in preventing cancer, a dietary change should occur early in life and continue permanently. This is a strong argument against faddish changes with which it will be hard to stick. Youngsters and young adults will benefit from a moderate,

not a radical, shift to the recommended diet. Older adults are unlikely to get much benefit from such a diet. Infants and young children should not be put on extreme diets of any kind. They need fat in their diet, and should not be limited to skim milk.

Miracle Cures

Almost every month a new and different "cure" comes out for almost every ailment or disease. Individuals spend money (which many can ill afford to throw away) on empty promises. It is easy to believe in medical fakes, especially if you are sick or worried.

Quackery may vary in degree, from relatively innocuous half-truths to advice so flagrantly wrong that it would endanger the life of a person following it.

Quacks may be unscrupulous health swindlers, or ignorant, uneducated, misguided persons. They even may be highly trained persons with advanced degrees, but generally they lack scientific knowledge of the diseases they claim to treat.

If a medicine is developed and proven scientifically beneficial, it will be made available through reputable sources.

You wouldn't trust your ailing cat to an untrained mechanic, so be even more

discriminating with your health. It may sound wonderful - they usually do, but any drug or remedy which will cure a variety of complaints should be looked upon with suspicion. Be safe, ask your doctor.

Honey Bread Pudding

1-1/2 cups bread cubes
1/4 cup liquid honey
2 tbsp. butter or margarine
1/8 tsp. salt
2 eggs, beaten
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1-1/2 cups hot milk

Place the bread cubes in a small baking dish. Combine the honey, butter or margarine, salt, eggs and vanilla. Slowly stir in the milk. Pour the mixture over the bread. Set the baking dish in a pan of hot water and bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 to 40 minutes or until pudding is set.

Cost Cutting Essentials

Good farmers are always looking for ways to cut costs and become more efficient. That's even more evident this year as farmers search for ways to make up for low crop prices.

Farmers who have both row crops and cattle can save by letting cattle eat crop residues left in the field after harvest. This is a good arrangement for some cattlemen because cattle can consume a lot of roughage. Even where cattle have plenty of lush winter grazing, they seem to crave some rough fiber material.

Most crop residues available for cattle are usually high in fiber, but low in protein and energy. That means the cattle may need supplement with minerals and other higher quality feed. The quality of the residue as feed drops fairly rapidly as it stays in the field.

Many pastures also contain some "frosted" grass which the cattle can use as feed. Cattle always eat a lot of frosted grass if it is available in late fall or early winter.

Farmers should use special caution with feeding certain types of frosted materials such as sorghum. Frost ruptures the plant cells which releases an acid that may

cause cyanide poisoning in cattle. The poisoning potential varies among forages. Grain sorghum has the most potential followed by johnsongrass, sorghum-sudan and sudangrass.

The affected plants can be fed safely if fermented as silage or cured as hay. They also are safe for cattle to graze after the plants are dry.

For more information on managing crops to reduce costs and increase efficiency, call or drop by the County Extension Office.

On Stopping Insects

The peak insect season is history for many of our farmers, but steps should be taken now to get a head start on insect problems that may be even bigger headaches in 1983 crops.

A good way farmers can get the jump on insects is by attending the Mississippi Insect Control Conference. The conference is scheduled for November 9-11 at the W.M. Post Cooperative Extension Center on the Mississippi State University campus. Last year about 400 farmers and officials attended the meeting.

The conference will give the latest information on a wide range of insect control topics that are important to Tishomingo County farmers. Topics will range from insect control in cotton, soybeans, and wheat to how integrated pest management works to control a variety of pest related problems in crops.

The meeting is sponsored by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Mississippi Entomological Association. I encourage anyone who has an interest in insect control to attend this meeting.

Safe Gun Handling

As a safe hunter you will have many responsibilities. You should already realize your responsibilities toward conservation, ethics, the landowner, trip planning, and personal safety to mention just a few. In addition, you must now think of your responsibilities concerning the rules of safe gun handling.

One basic rule in firearms safety is: Always point the muzzle in a safe direction. This is a very simple rule, and actually pretty easy to follow,

"if you think". However, most firearm accidents are caused by a person not obeying this rule.

Safety rules are only good if they are remembered and applied to different situations. For example, what does the phrase, "Always Point the Muzzle in a Safe Direction", mean? It means that you keep the muzzle pointed away from people at all times. It means that a firearm should be placed so it cannot be accidentally knocked over and pointed at someone. The rule means to lay the firearm down so people cannot walk in front of the muzzle. It means the firearm should not be used as a cane or crutch. The rule means that the firearm should be rested in a secure position, not on a tree trunk, fence, side of a car, or bush. These are common situations. If the firearm is mishandled, then someone can be put in danger. This is only one rule of many. As a safe hunter, it will be your responsibility to not only know the rules, but to use them in many different situations. The following are some of the rules that you will need to know and use.

SAFE FIREARMS HANDLING
Many safety rules you will have to apply no matter where you are. You may be at home, in the field, or somewhere in between. You should know and use each of the following rules:

1. Always keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction. Think ahead, never point it at someone, or allow people to accidentally walk in front of the muzzle.

2. Keep the action open when not in use. If you are not ready to hunt, the action should be open. There is an action release mechanism which will allow you to open the firearm without firing it.

3. Treat every gun as if it were loaded. Have good control of the firearm, keep it pointed in a safe direction, with the action open. "Your finger should be off the trigger" until ready to shoot. Use the mechanical safety located on the gun.

4. Know your gun and ammunition. Use the proper ammunition for your firearm. Carry only one type of ammunition, so that you will not

mix different types together.

5. Be sure of your target... and beyond. Identify the target, then look on past it to be sure you have a safe background. If in doubt, DO NOT SHOOT!

6. Know where your companions are. If you are handling a firearm, do not point it in their direction.

7. Alcohol and shooting do not mix. Alcohol affects your judgment. You need good judgment to apply these safety rules.

8. Never shoot where you will have a ricochet. Bullets will ricochet off of many different surfaces including rocks, trees, metal, and water.

These have been just basic rules. For more information concerning the 4-H Safety Program, complete with certificate and patch, contact Tommy Purvis at the Extension Office or call 423-3616.

Tishomingo County Soil Conservation Annual Report

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners would like to present their Annual Report to the people of Tishomingo County for the 1982 fiscal year.

The commissioners of your district are responsible for planning and implementing conservation programs, practices, and activities in Tishomingo County. One commissioner from each voting district serves on the board. Because of the importance that each man on the board places in the conservation of natural resources, these men are elected to a three year term and serve without pay.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners sponsored and conducted several activities during the 1982 fiscal year. Some of these accomplishments are listed below:

1. Developed and carried out a Plan of Work for 1982.
2. Worked in cooperation with the SCS to provide technical assistance to 318 cooperators, assisted 198 of these individuals to carry out one or more conservation practices, and prepared conservation plans for 3764 acres.
3. Worked with the SCS and ASCS County Committee to submit an application for special project assistance for conservation work. This project was approved and approximately \$34,000.00 was obligated for conservation practice installation.
4. Sponsored a Wildlife and Beaver Control Seminar with approximately 60 people in attendance.

attendance.

5. Participated in Tree Planting Week February 9-12 with school children in grades 1-4 receiving pine seedlings. Approximately 6,000 seedlings were given away. Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company furnished the seedlings for this event.

6. Conducted annual membership drive.

7. Co-sponsored with Mississippi Forestry Commission and the Extension Service a Forestry Seminar with approximately 50 people attending.

8. The district was represented at the Area Four SWCD Meeting.

9. Worked with Chevron Chemical Company to set up a demonstration plot to test effectiveness of no-till soybeans in wheat stubble.

10. The district also sponsored an Environmental Education Mini Workshop August 12, with approximately 20 teachers in attendance.

11. A booth at the County Fair was erected displaying conservation materials and literature.

12. The Tishomingo County SWCD co-sponsored with the Extension Service an Agriculture Tour and evening program September 23. For the tour and evening program, we had 32 people in attendance.

13. The district commissioners met six times during the fiscal year for business meetings.

14. Sponsored a 4-H Soil Judging Contest for junior and senior divisions.

Determining A Fair Price For Your Timber

Deciding whether now is the time to sell your timber is a tough decision. Chances are if the sale is postponed, the value of your timber will increase. A pulpwood size timber stand might increase in value as much as five or six times if left to grow to sawtimber. And timber, like other real property, increases in value at a rate greater than inflation.

The question of whether a fair price has been offered can be answered by finding out what the timber is actually worth on the open market. This can be achieved through the competitive bidding process. With this process, market price is determined by what buyers are willing to pay. You can assume the person who needs it most and can make the highest value-use from

your timber will pay the highest price. The competitive bidding process involves preparing and distributing a bid notice, conducting the bid opening, finalizing a sales contract, and then, administering the sale during the harvest to see that all contract conditions are met.

The bid notice should include sale conditions, maps, timber inventory, bid reply form, and a copy of the sale agreement. Anything you do to reduce the prospective buyers expense or which gives a positive impression to your sale will be to your advantage. For example, a timber inventory helps you to accept or reject bids. By including your inventory in the bid notice, you substantially reduce the buyer's expense and hopefully attract more buyers. Other things which might make your sale more attractive include: written easement for right-of-way access to public roads, sale volume equal to or greater than 3 cords or 1,000 board feet per acre; logging restrictions kept to a minimum, and allowance of at least 12 months for removing the timber.

A request for sealed bids to be opened at a specific time, date, and place is another important aspect of the competitive bidding process. With this method, competitive bidding works to your

advantage. The actual bids determine the value of your timber and no one will know exactly what that price is until the day you open the bids.

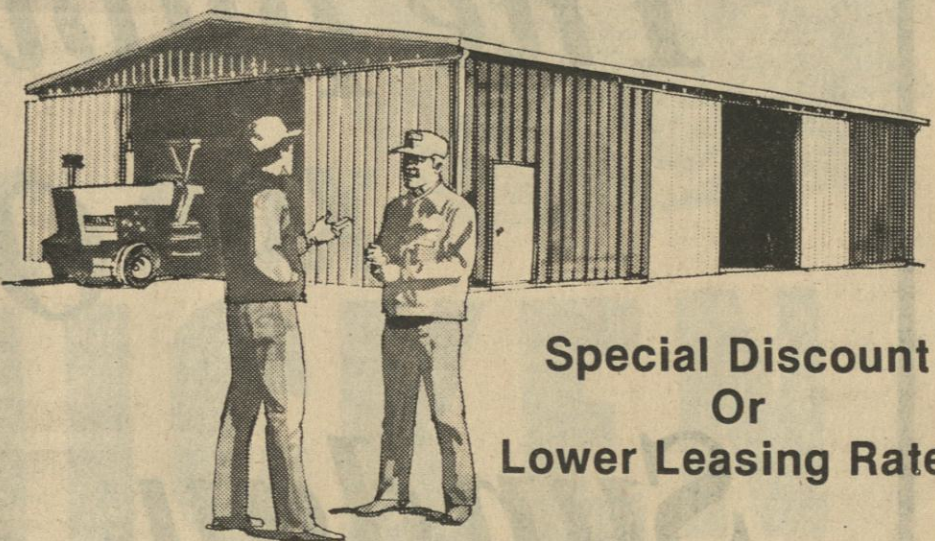

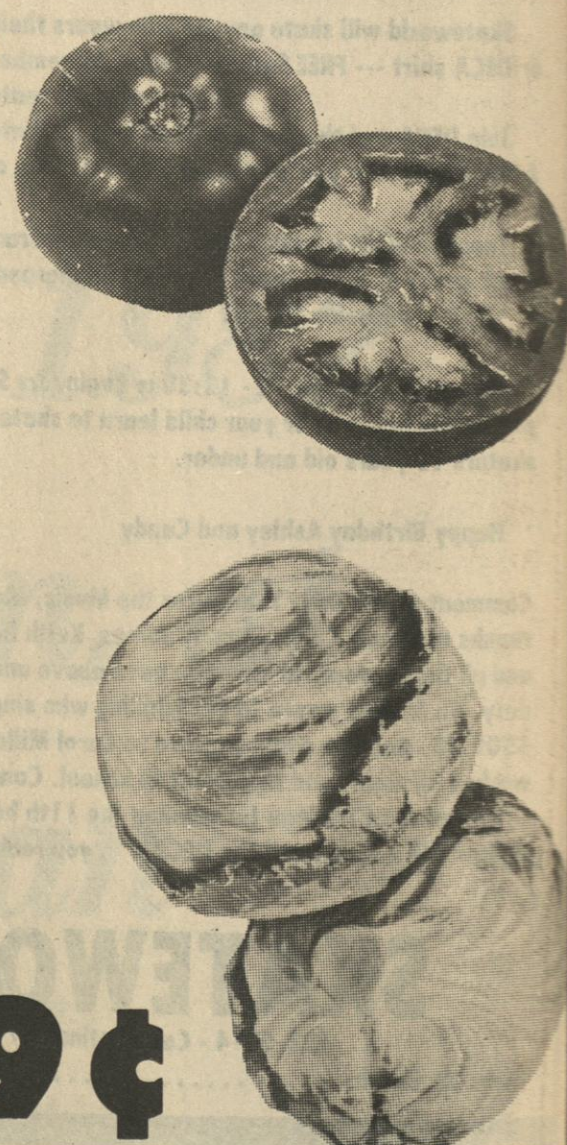

acreage reduction and land diversion requirements. "To reduce carry-over supplies and increase commodity prices, farmers need to sign up for the new program in large numbers, the ASCS official said.

PRICE SUPPORT LOAN ACTIVITY INCREASES — Farmers are making greater use of the price support loan program for 1981 and 1982 grain than they have in prior years, according to Clarence Tardy, an official of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Increased loan levels and low market prices have had some impact on the amount of participation in the program, he said. Comparing 1982's loan activity with the previous year, Tardy said: "We have approximately 942.8 million bushels of wheat under loan compared to 622.7 million bushels for this same period in 1981. Corn loans have been even more dramatic, increasing from 385 million bushels to 1.7 billion bushels over 4 times the amount under loan in 1981. In the case of soybeans, we've also had substantial loan activity." He said that farmers need to participate in the acreage reduction program to be eligible for price support loans. "The importance of the acreage reduction program and its benefits cannot be overemphasized. Strong participation is necessary to help increase grain prices and also to balance supply with demand. In addition to loans, participating farmers are eligible for target price payments, land diversion payments, deficiency payments and the price enhancement of reduced production." The ASCS official said that the primary function of the price support loan program is to offer farmers a tool for marketing their grain. "Historically, during harvest time our market prices are generally less than what they are during other times of the year, and the loan program does provide farmers with an opportunity to take advantage of any possible increase in market prices at a later time." To qualify for price support loans, farmers need only to comply with acreage reduction program provisions.

ASCS Farm News

FARMERS RECEIVE PAYMENTS TO DIVERT FEED GRAIN, WHEAT ACRES — Tishomingo County farmers who participate in the 1983 acreage reduction program will receive payments for diverting 10 percent of their

feed grain acres and 5 percent of their wheat acres, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the ASC County Committee, reported. When added to the 10 percent acreage reduction requirement for feed grains and the 15 percent requirement for wheat, the paid land diversion will result in a total reduction of 20 percent in these acres for 1983. "With such large feed grain supplies, the paid diversion will help bring supply in line with demand," South said. The diversion payments will be \$1.50 per bushel for corn and sorghum, \$1.00 for barley, 75 cents for oats, and \$2.70 per bushel for wheat. "Farmers who request advance diversion payments at the time they sign up for the 1983 program will receive a payment equal to half the established payment rates," South said. Advance deficiency payments will also be available to farmers upon request at signup. Farmers who accept the payments and do not comply with program provisions must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest. The signup period began October 1. To be eligible for these benefits as well as for deficiency payments and price support loans, a farmer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats, barley and wheat acreage planted for harvest to no more than 80 percent of the farm's feed grain and wheat base. Farmers are also required to devote to conservation uses and acreage equal to both the

Mississippi's Unemployment Rate Drops

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 12.2 percent in September, a decrease of four-tenths of one percentage point compared to August's 12.6 percent jobless rate, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's September unemployment rate was 7.8 percent.

The 12.2 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 9.7 percent national rate for September. MESC figures showed 130,000 unemployed and 934,700 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,064,700. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 25,795 in September.

Seventy-four of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in September. Five of those 74 counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.
