U.S. Highway 72 West of luka was the scene of a tragic accident Sunday morning, November 21, which claimed the life of one of luka's leading young businessmen. Dexter Wayne Ham, 40, of 61-year-old luka, was killed in the early

morning mishap that occurred around 3:15 a.m. Ham was the owner of the Western Auto Store in luka. According to investigating Mississippi Highway Patrol

Officer, Jerry Boyd, the one car accident was 4 7/10 miles west of luka in the Bishop Bottom at the base of Barnes Hill. Boyd stated that Ham was traveling east on Hwy. 72 when he somehow lost control of the 1979 Chevrolet pick-up. The vehicle crossed the westbound lane, veered off the road, down an embankment where it struck a tree on the driver's side.

Mississippi Supreme Court Wednesday, November 17, reversing a \$400,000 jury award to Jack C. Murphy, a Tishomingo logger, who accused luka Doctor Bobby F. King of malpractice. The suit was brought up in the September, 1980 term of court in Tishomingo County. The later

ruling came on appeal by Dr.

King following the lower

court's ruling. The unanimous opinion, written by Justice Roy Noble Lee, said the trial judge erred by allowing an out-of-state physician to testify at the trial as an expert witness. Lee ordered the case sent back to Tishomingo County for a new

According to court records, Murphy and his employee were working near Cairo, MS., February 11, 1978, when his

bush and was thrown into his lower left leg, cutting a gash about 16 inches long and one and one-half inches deep.

Murphy was rushed to Tishomingo County Hospital where a nurse stopped the bleeding and cleaned the wound with an accudine solution. Dr. King was called to the emergency room at this treatment, time and procedures, and techniques used by King during the length of his care of Murphy were proper, according to testimony given by three or four other Tishomingo County doctors.

Following a detection of a rise in temperature and swelling of the patient, Murphy was transferred to Administration Veterans' Hospital in Memphis, TN., on February 13. King had called in Dr. Thomas E. Goyer, of

this decision was made.

Following examination of Murphy's wound by Dr. Freddie Barron at Veterans', surgery was prescribed where amputation above the knee was necessary. Approximately two weeks later, a second surgery was required for revision of the stump, and an additional four inches of the leg was removed, together with a portion of his buttock. When the case was

brought to court, Murphy was awarded the \$400,000 sum based on the testimony of Dr. Richard Gardner, of Ft. Myers, Florida. Dr. Gardner, orthopedic surgeon, testified in Murphy's behalf that King followed improper procedures in treating the injury before the leg was amputated. Gardner maintained during testimony practically every procedure used by King was improper and constituted negligence.

The trial judge allowed Gardner to testify although expressing some doubt as to whether or not he was qualified. The judge said Gardner "did not make out a real strong case of being familiar with similar localities."





The materials also should be Turkey parts; turkey "deli" stored behind locked doors to protect children, livestock availability of whole turkeys and pets from accidental misuse.

It's a good idea to post signs near the storage area to warn others that poisons are stored inside. Keeping the materials in their original containers is important in preventing possible misuse of the chemicals.

Protect the chemicals from excessive heat and freezing. Some pesticides lose their effectiveness after exposure to extreme conditions. Also check for leaks. If packages begin to leak, place them inside larger containers. Clean up any spills promptly and properly.

Don't store leftover pesticides with herbicides. That's inviting contamination.

Anyone handling should wear pesticides protective clothing and use the materials according to precautions and directions on the label. For more inforhandling pesticides, contact the county extension office.

Change the oil and clean the air filter. This helps assure that the inside of the mower is clean and ready to work next spring.

Empty the gas tank and carburetor of fuel. You can do this either by operating the engine until it runs out of fuel or by draining the fuel tank and carburetor.

Remove the spark plug. put one teaspoon of motor oil into the spark plug hole and replace the plug. Pull the starter cord a few times. The oil acts as a protective coating for the inside of the

Store the mower in a dry, well-vented and unheated location. Next spring, your mower should be ready for another year of hard work.

STRONG 1983 FEED GRAIN **PARTICIPATION VITAL** - The current situation of large supplies and weak prices for feed grains could be turned around next year if the 1983 feed grain program goal of a 9-million-acre reduction in corn acreage is reached. "This will only be achieved, however, through strong program participation," Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. "Farmers who want to help solve the

supply problem need to par-

ticipate in the acreage reduc-

tion and paid land diversion

this should act to bolster prices, South said. The 1983 program offers farmers a higher target price and loan rate for their corn than the 1982 program. It also provides land deversion payments and deficiency payments, payable in advance. The 1983 target price for corn is \$2.86 per bushel and the loan rate is \$2.65 a bushel. the land diversion payment rate is \$1.50 per bushel and the estimated defeciency payments. payment rate is 21 cents per bushel. Half of these payment rates will be used in computing advance payments, according to south. The program is voluntary. Acres eligible for diversion payments cannot exceed 6.67 percent of the 1983 cotton planted acreage, he said. Cotton diversion payments were authorized to reduce the level of cotton stocks in an effort ot improve prices. Even though 1982 production is currently estimated at only 11.3 million bales - 28 percent below 1981 - continuing weak demand will likely hold cotton use down this seasen, according to USDA officials. Consequently, stocks next August 1 may still total around 6-1/2 million bales, well above the 3.5 to 4 million bales carryover generally considered desirable. "This situation is keeping cotton prices depressed," the ASCS official said. Farmers participating in the 20 percent acreage reduction program can qualify for commodity loans and deficiency payments that give them price and income protection. They may also qualify for a 50-percent advance deficiency payment when they sign up. Farmrs

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





Timberline

By: Brendix Glasgow, **County Forester**

With several heavy frosts blanketing the area recently, the stage has been set for the wildfire season to begin again this year in Tishomingo County, and I want to urge all our woodland owners to protect their valuable timber with firelanes. Of course, we all need to be more careful with outdoor burning too. Prevention is always the best

wildfire Mississippi's season usually begins about mid-November each year when lesser vegetation has been killed by frosts. It normally continues until about mid-April when everything begins to green up.

Uncontrolled fire is the most destructive enemy of the forest, there's no question about that. Wildfires usually happen without warning, and in only minutes can destroy years of timber growth and untold profits for a forest owner. The saddest part is that most all of them can be prevented.

Protection against wildfire is essential for successful timber management, and it is simple and inexpensive to provide.

The best and cheapest insurance against wildfire losses is a fire lane. A lane six feet or wider around a timber stand usually is sufficient to secure the area from fire, and it can be constructed by simply plowing or discing.

Old existing fire lanes should be plowed or reworked each year to clean away debris and foliage that

collects in them during sum-

Firelane construction is a service the Mississippi Forestry Commission makes available to landowners for a minimal fee. Those wanting the service should contact my office or call the local dispatching tower. Those numbers are 423-9070 (office) and 423-5951 (tower).

Funding was made available for the project through gifts from the E.O. Roden family, of Booneville, business Roden associates and family and other friends of the College.

"The pool has been a part of the master plan of improvements to the Northeast campus for several years," White said. "But, because of the extreme generosity of Mr. Roden and his family, the dream has now become a reality.

"Mr. Roden has been a long-time friend of Northeast, giving faithfully to the scholarship program to ensure the education of those students who required financial assistance. He is recognized throughout the community for his generous contributions to all worthwhile causes," White added.

The pool will be named in honor of the Roden's daughter, the late Gaye

Roden Carr, of Booneville. Mrs. Carr attended Northeast in 1965-66.

Offering an added dimension for Northeast students, the pool will be located north of Wood Hall, the new women's dormitory, and south of the existing campus tennis courts.

Sun decks and high diving equipment are planned features of the facility.

The three major thrusts for the pool, according to White,

include recreational use by Northeast students, faculty and staff, educational emphasis through the department of physical education and the introduction of competitive swimming to the Northeast area.

Point of Law

Q: WHAT ARE THE MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS MARRIAGE MISSISSIPPI?

A: Before a marriage license can be issued the male must prove he is at least 17 years old, and the female must prove she is at least 15 vears old. But if a reason can be given to a judge of any Chancery, Circuit or County Court that a couple must be married, the age requirement may be waived. Also if the parents give their consent, an underaged couple may be married. Application for a marriage license must be in writing and be on file three days before the couple receives a license. Thirty days before applying for the license, the couple must receive a medical certificate showing them to be free of syphillis. Proof of age is required by showing a birth certificate, baptismal record, armed service discharge or other official document. If either person appears to be under the age of 21, and is without parental consent, the clerk will notify the mother, father, guardian or next of kin.

Q: IS THERE COMMON MARRIAGE LAW MISSISSIPPI?

A: No. Common law marriage in Mississippi was abolished in 1956. Mississippi common law marriage is valid if it was consummated before 1956. If a couple entered into a common law marriage in another state where it was valid, then it is considered to be valid in Mississippi. Children of a common law marriage after 1956 are illegitimate.

Q: IF MARRIED IN ANOTHER STATE, WOULD THE MARRIAGE BE VALID IN

A: A marriage legally entered into is equally valid in Mississippi. Marriage in another country, if abiding by all natural laws, if valid. But Mississippi will not recognize marriage between brother and sister or between father and daughter even if another state or country does. When Mississippians attempt to evade this statute by marrying elsewhere, marriage is considered to be void.

educationally disadvantaged Vietnam Veterans in obtaining training under Public Law 97-72.

Limitations of the program are as follows:

(a) The veteran must have had active duty service under conditions other than dishonorable, any part of which occurred during the Vietnam era (August 5, 1964, through May 7, 1975) provided he or she is otherwise eligible.

(b) To receive benefits for secondary training beyond his or her delimiting date, the veteran must not have a high diploma or equivalent.

(c) To receive benefits for vocational, apprenticeship, or other on-the-job training beyond his or her delimiting date, the veteran must be in need of training to achieve a suitable occupational or vocational objective because he or she is unskilled, or unemployed and unskilled.

(d) Training with a vocational objective must be residential training in NCD (non-college-degree) courses. Benefits for farm cooperative training may be allowed, but correspondence and flight training are not allowed under provisions of this the

(e) The length of the extension is governed by the following: (1) The extension vocational, apprenticeship, and on-the-job training may not exceed the applicant's unused entitlement, except extensions for vocational training under VAR 11041 (d) (1) and (2); and (2) The extension cannot begin before January 1, 1982, and cannot end after December 31, 1983.


