Quail Hunting Begins Thanksgiving Day

While most persons will have turkey on their mind Thanksgiving Day, many Mississippi bobwhite quail hunters will be thinking of a different bird.

Hunters will take to the fields Thursday, November 25, as the quail season begins in Mississippi.

Extending through February 28, the quail season is one of Mississippi's most popular bird hunting sports.

The Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson estimates that some 65,000 hunters enjoy quail hunting each year here in the state. Annually hunters bag some 1.5 million birds in Mississippi.

The daily bag limit on quail is 12 and the possession limit is 24. Hunters need not have their guns plugged to hunt quail. All hunters, of course, must have a valid Mississippi hunting license on their person before going afield.

Supreme Court Overturns Local \$400,000 Law Suit

A ruling was made by the Mississippi Supreme Court Wednesday, November 17, reversing a \$400,000 jury award to Jack C. Murphy, a 61-year-old Tishomingo logger, who accused Iuka Doctor Bobby F. King of malpractice. The suit was brought up in the September, 1980 term of court in Tishomingo County. The later ruling came on appeal by Dr. King following the lower court's ruling.

The unanimous opinion, written by Justice Roy Noble Lee, said the trial judge erred by allowing an out-of-state physician to testify at the trial as an expert witness. Lee ordered the case sent back to Tishomingo County for a new trial.

According to court records, Murphy and his employee were working near Cairo, MS., February 11, 1978, when his

chainsaw blade caught in a bush and was thrown into his lower left leg, cutting a gash about 16 inches long and one and one-half inches deep.

Murphy was rushed to Tishomingo County Hospital where a nurse stopped the bleeding and cleaned the wound with an acudine solution. Dr. King was called to the emergency room at this time and treatment, procedures, and techniques used by King during the length of his care of Murphy were proper, according to testimony given by three or four other Tishomingo County doctors.

Following a detection of a rise in temperature and swelling of the patient, Murphy was transferred to Veterans' Administration Hospital in Memphis, TN., on February 13. King had called in Dr. Thomas E. Goyer, of

Iuka, for consultation when this decision was made.

Following examination of Murphy's wound by Dr. Freddie Barron at Veterans', surgery was prescribed where amputation above the knee was necessary. Approximately two weeks later, a second surgery was required for revision of the stump, and an additional four inches of the leg was removed, together with a portion of his buttock.

When the case was brought to court, Murphy was awarded the \$400,000 sum based on the testimony of Dr. Richard Gardner, of Ft. Myers, Florida. Dr. Gardner, an orthopedic surgeon, testified in Murphy's behalf that King followed improper procedures in treating the injury before the leg was amputated. Gardner maintained during testimony practically every procedure used by King was improper and constituted negligence.

The trial judge allowed Gardner to testify although expressing some doubt as to whether or not he was qualified. The judge said Gardner "did not make out a real strong case of being familiar with similar localities."

For years Mississippi has followed the "locality or neighborhood" rule. Under it, physicians in malpractice suits are to be judged according to the standards of care, skill, and diligence shown by other doctors in the same area in Mississippi.

A 1971 decision by the Supreme Court indicated "considerable force" to the argument that geographical conditions or circumstances are no longer valid in considering standards of a specialists' care or competence.

The Supreme Court concluded that Gardner, who has not practiced in Mississippi, did not qualify as a witness under the locality rule and the lower court should not have permitted his testimony.

The justices ordered a new trial of the suit against Dr. Bobby F. King, of Iuka.

County Jobless Rate Drops To 11.1%

After a rise last month in unemployment, Tishomingo County's jobless rate dropped slightly at mid-month. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the rate of unemployment for the county was estimated to be 11.1 percent of the civilian labor force, or 1,450 individuals, compared to 12.0 percent last month and 7.5 percent one year ago. At mid-

October, there were 13,010 individuals in the labor force, compared to 13,220 in September and 13,530 one year ago. Of this number, 11,560 were employed at mid-month, reflecting a decline of 80 from the September figure and 960 below that of October, 1981.

Overall establishment based employment experienced a decline over the month and year. Manufacturing em-

ployment was estimated to be 2,970, 60 above the September figure and 140 over the estimate for one year ago with Apparel contributing most to these increases.

Nonmanufacturing employment at 5,093 experienced a decline of 190 from last month and 2,410 below one year ago. Both these declines were attributed primarily to Construction and Government.

Smith continued that the civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo decreased in October to reach 47,420, 330 below the September figure but 940 below the estimate for October, one year ago. October's unemployed reflected a monthly decrease of 80 and a yearly increase of 1,850. The number of people em-

ployed in the area decreased by 250 from the previous month, with a yearly decrease of 2,790. The current rate of unemployment for the four-county area was 12.7 percent, a drop of 0.1 of a percentage point, compared to September, 1982. However, a rise of 4.0 percent was noted from one year ago.

A total of 14,440 workers were employed in manufacturing industries at mid-October, down 40 from September and 770 below that of October, 1981. Non-manufacturing industries reported employment at 17,840. This figure showed a decline of 190 compared to last month and a substantial 2,380 below the figure for October, 1981. The large yearly decline was found in several categories but the largest decrease being in Government.

NUTRITION IN TURKEY

Turkey is a high-protein food that is considered part of the meat group (two or more servings daily recommended by the USDA). An average serving of turkey (3½ ounces or 100 grams) provides 176 calories (light

meat, no skin), and 32 grams of protein -- more protein than almost any other popular cooked meat. That's more protein per 100 grams than tuna, chicken, steak or lamb -- and it's low in calories and low in fat, too.

Turkey franks, turkey ham, turkey salami, and turkey pastrami are similarly lean and high in protein, lower in fat than the traditional products.

Turkey also provides 26 milligrams of calcium per hundred grams of edible meat (a cup of whole milk provides 288 milligrams), 1.1 to 2.30 milligrams of iron (dark meat

provides more), .14 milligrams of riboflavin, and 11 milligrams of niacin. So it's an excellent source of high quality protein, iron and B vitamins.

Nutritionally, turkey is a winner -- good eating that is good for you, too.

Turkey parts; turkey "deli" roducts and the ready availability of whole turkeys mean more turkey across the nation all year round. No wonder turkey consumption has gone up 400 percent per capita since 1945 -- and there's no end in sight! Any way you slice it, turkey is an excellent meat buy.

APPLE CIDER/APPLE JUICE, WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Apple juice is natural apple juice that has been pasteurized. It is available in the natural state, unsweetened with no water added, filtered and unfiltered. "Cloudy" apple juice contains more pectin and apple solids. Packaging is in glass containers or vacuum packed cans.

Sweet apple cider is natural unfermented apple juice with less filtering (more apple solids left in) and no pasteurization. It may or may not have a preservative added -- usually not. Under refrigeration it will stay sweet and unfermented for two to three weeks.

Hard apple cider is well fermented apple juice.

Apple wine is juice or cider turned into wine by fermentation with yeast cells feeding on sugar.

Sweetpotato Bake

2 large sweetpotatoes
1 cup sweet milk
1 cup sugar
1 no. 2 can crushed pineapple
1 cup raisins
¾ cup butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped nuts

Grate sweetpotatoes into milk. Add remaining ingredients. Pour into buttered casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes to one hour.

County Agents Notes

STORE PESTICIDES SAFETY
The close of the insect control season in crops should be a signal for farmers to store leftover chemicals safely to avoid safety hazards with people and livestock.

Many farmers in Tishomingo County have leftover pesticides which were not used during the insect

season. Storing the unused pesticides properly is important in saving the chemicals for later use as well as for safety reasons.

Leftover pesticides should be kept over the winter in well-ventilated, dry areas away from food or feed. The materials also should be stored behind locked doors to protect children, livestock and pets from accidental misuse.

It's a good idea to post signs near the storage area to warn others that poisons are stored inside. Keeping the materials in their original containers is important in preventing possible misuse of the chemicals.

Protect the chemicals from excessive heat and freezing. Some pesticides lose their effectiveness after exposure to extreme conditions. Also check for leaks. If packages begin to leak, place them inside larger containers. Clean up any spills promptly and properly.

Don't store leftover pesticides with herbicides. That's inviting contamination.

Anyone handling pesticides should wear protective clothing and use the materials according to precautions and directions on the label. For more information on handling pesticides, contact the county extension office.

LAWNMOWER STORAGE

Cold weather is a sign for you to give your hard-working lawnmower a well-deserved rest. We have these storage tips to make sure your lawnmower will be ready to go again next spring.

Wipe the lawnmower clean with a dry or slightly damp

cloth. Be sure to clean both the top and underneath the machine.

Change the oil and clean the air filter. This helps assure that the inside of the mower is clean and ready to work next spring.

Empty the gas tank and carburetor of fuel. You can do this either by operating the engine until it runs out of fuel or by draining the fuel tank and carburetor.

Remove the spark plug, put one teaspoon of motor oil into the spark plug hole and replace the plug. Pull the starter cord a few times. The oil acts as a protective coating for the inside of the engine.

Store the mower in a dry, well-ventilated and unheated location. Next spring, your mower should be ready for another year of hard work.

ASCS Farm news

STRONG 1983 FEED GRAIN PARTICIPATION VITAL. The current situation of large supplies and weak prices for feed grains could be turned around next year if the 1983 feed grain program goal of a 9-million-acre reduction in corn acreage is reached. "This will only be achieved, however, through strong program participation," Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. "Farmers who want to help solve the supply problem need to participate in the acreage reduction and paid land diversion program." With full par-



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payment will be 25 cents per pound times the farm payment yield times the acres diverted." South said. Producers may receive one-half the payment at signup. The number of acres eligible for payment will depend on the level of diversion selected by the producer up to the maximum of 5 percent of the base.

Acres eligible for diversion payments cannot exceed 6.67 percent of the 1983 cotton planted acreage, he said. Cotton diversion payments were authorized to reduce the level of cotton stocks in an effort to improve prices. Even though 1982 production is currently estimated at only 11.3 million bales - 28 percent below 1981 - continuing weak demand will likely hold cotton use down this season, according to USDA officials. Consequently, stocks next August 1 may still total around 6½ million bales, well above the 3.5 to 4 million bales carryover generally considered desirable. "This situation is keeping cotton prices depressed," the ASCS official said. Farmers participating in the 20 percent acreage reduction program can qualify for commodity loans and deficiency payments that give them price and income protection. They may also qualify for a 50-percent advance deficiency payment when they sign up. Farms

may apply for the upland cotton program and the feed grain program at the ASCS office between 8:30 A. M. and 4:30 P. M., weekdays. The signup period ends March 31.

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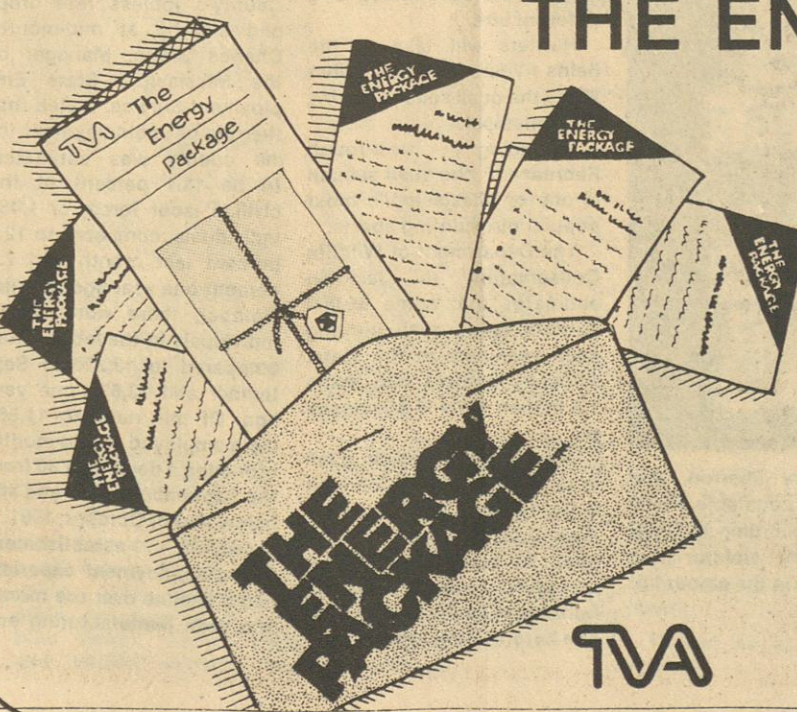
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World War I Veterans

Timberline

With several heavy frosts blanketing the area recently, the stage has been set for the wildfire season to begin again this year in Tishomingo County, and I want to urge all our woodland owners to protect their valuable timber with firelanes. Of course, we all need to be more careful with outdoor burning too. Prevention is always the best step.

Mississippi's wildfire season usually begins about mid-November each year when lesser vegetation has been killed by frosts. It normally continues until about mid-April when everything begins to green up.

Uncontrolled fire is the most destructive enemy of the forest, there's no question about that. Wildfires usually happen without warning, and in only minutes can destroy years of timber growth and untold profits for a forest owner. The saddest part is that most of them can be prevented.

Protection against wildfire is essential for successful timber management, and it is simple and inexpensive to provide.

The best and cheapest insurance against wildfire losses is a fire lane. A lane six feet or wider around a timber stand usually is sufficient to secure the area from fire, and it can be constructed by simply plowing or discing.

Old existing fire lanes should be plowed or reworked each year to clean away debris and foliage that

collects in them during summer.

Firelane construction is a service the Mississippi Forestry Commission makes available to landowners for a minimal fee. Those wanting the service should contact my office or call the local dispatching tower. Those numbers are 423-9070 (office) and 423-5951 (tower).

NE Board Accepts Construction Bids

The Board of Trustees at Northeast Junior College met in special session October 20, to reconsider bids for construction of the Gaye Roden Carr Memorial Aquatic Center.

Successful bidder was Commercial Pool Specialists of Jackson, MS who submitted the low bid of \$127,000, President Harold T. White announced.

Bids received at the regular board meeting in September had been placed under advisement at that time.

Construction for the eight-lane pool, which will be 75 feet in length to meet requirements for competitive swimming, is set to begin within the next two weeks, White added. The projected construction period is 120 days.

Funding was made available for the project through gifts from the E.O. Roden family, of Booneville, the Roden business associates and family and other friends of the College.

"The pool has been a part of the master plan of improvements to the Northeast campus for several years," White said. "But, because of the extreme generosity of Mr. Roden and his family, the dream has now become a reality."

"Mr. Roden has been a long-time friend of Northeast, giving faithfully to the scholarship program to ensure the education of those students who required financial assistance. He is recognized throughout the community for his generous contributions to all worthwhile causes," White added.

The pool will be named in honor of the Roden's daughter, the late Gaye

Roden Carr, of Booneville. Mrs. Carr attended Northeast in 1965-66.

Offering an added dimension for Northeast students, the pool will be located north of Wood Hall, the new women's dormitory, and south of the existing campus tennis courts.

Sun decks and high diving equipment are planned features of the facility.

The three major thrusts for the pool, according to White,

include recreational use by Northeast students, faculty and staff, educational emphasis through the department of physical education and the introduction of competitive swimming to the Northeast area.

"We hope that organized swim clubs will take advantage of our facilities when determining the location of future swim meets," White said.

Think On These Things

In Paul's concluding chapter of the Philippians letter he begins to close by saying, "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, . . . just, . . . pure, . . . lovely, . . . of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." (Phil 4:8). What great and practical advice the

Apostle Paul left for the early church, and for us as well. We need to concentrate on the good rather than the bad. A recognition of the bad is necessary, but should not be allowed to cloud our positive attitudes. The world is filled with problems - economical, political, psychological, emotional, physical, and spiritual problems. Point of Law

Q: WHAT ARE THE MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR MARRIAGE IN MISSISSIPPI?

A: Before a marriage license can be issued the male must prove he is at least 17 years old, and the female must prove she is at least 15 years old. But if a reason can be given to a judge of any Chancery, Circuit or County Court that a couple must be married, the age requirement may be waived. Also if the parents give their consent, an underaged couple may be married. Application for a marriage license must be in writing and be on file three days before the couple receives a license. Thirty days before applying for the licen-

se, the couple must receive a medical certificate showing them to be free of syphilis. Proof of age is required by showing a birth certificate, baptismal record, armed service discharge or other official document. If either person appears to be under the age of 21, and is without parental consent, the clerk will notify the mother, father, guardian or next of kin.

Q: IS THERE COMMON LAW MARRIAGE IN MISSISSIPPI?

A: No. Common law marriage in Mississippi was abolished in 1956. A Mississippi common law marriage is valid if it was consummated before 1956. If a couple entered into a common law marriage in another state where it was valid, then it is considered to be valid in Mississippi. Children of a common law marriage after 1956 are illegitimate.

Q: IF MARRIED IN ANOTHER STATE, WOULD THE MARRIAGE BE VALID IN MISSISSIPPI?

A: A marriage legally entered into is equally valid in Mississippi. Marriage in another country, if abiding by all natural laws, is valid. But Mississippi will not recognize marriage between brother and sister or between father and daughter even if another state or country does. When Mississippians attempt to evade this statute by marrying elsewhere, the marriage is considered to be void.

Mississippi Employment Service

The Mississippi State Employment Service has made available information to aid

educationally disadvantaged Vietnam Veterans in obtaining training under Public Law 97-72.

Limitations of the program are as follows:

(a) The veteran must have had active duty service under conditions other than dishonorable, any part of which occurred during the Vietnam era (August 5, 1964, through May 7, 1975) provided he or she is otherwise eligible.

(b) To receive benefits for secondary training beyond his or her delimiting date, the veteran must not have a high school diploma or its equivalent.

(c) To receive benefits for vocational, apprenticeship, or other on-the-job training beyond his or her delimiting date, the veteran must be in need of training to achieve a suitable occupational or vocational objective because he or she is unskilled, or unemployed and unskilled.

(d) Training with a vocational objective must be residential training in NCD (non-college-degree) courses. Benefits for farm cooperative training may be allowed, but correspondence and flight training are not allowed under the provisions of this program.

(e) The length of the extension is governed by the following: (1) The extension for vocational, apprenticeship, and on-the-job training may not exceed the applicant's unused entitlement, except extensions for vocational training under VAR 11041 (d) (1) and (2); and (2) The extension cannot begin before January 1, 1982, and cannot end after December 31, 1983.
