Sale Of Nuclear Plant Tools And Equipment Scheduled

TVA will hold the third in a series of onsite sale on surplus construction equipment from the deferred and cancelled nuclear plants on Tuesday, December 14, at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant near Iuka.

This sale, part of TVA's Investment Recovery Program, will be followed on December 15, by an auction of over 50 surplus TVA vehicles.

Some 175 lots of equipment will be auctioned including small tools, portable

toilets, work tables, forklifts, welding machines, metal cabinets, portable generator sets, blasting mats, concrete wall ties, metal drums, ladders, tool boxes, pumps, chain saws, sledge-hammers, electric fans, fire extinguishers, hydraulic jacks,

shovels, posthole diggers, trash cans, used automobile tires, sheetrock, electrical cable, galvanized sheet metal, heavy equipment repair parts, welders, air conditioners, bandsaws, chain hoists, drill presses, oxygen-acetylene carts, and a wide variety of electric hand tools and other used and unused construction equipment.

The auction of tools and construction equipment will begin at 8:30 a.m. and will continue until all lots have been auctioned.

Auctioning of the surplus vehicles will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Wednesday, December 15, and will include sedans, sedan deliveries, vans, pickup truck, 4-wheel drive vehicles, a carry-all, and other items -- all in running condition.

Interested persons may inspect the equipment and vehicles and pre-register for the auction at the site on Friday, December 10, and Monday, December 13, from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Pre-registration and inspection will also be possible on days of the auction.

The two previous sales of surplus equipment at the Phipps Bend Nuclear Plant in Hawkins County, Tenn., and Hartsville Nuclear Plant in Trousdale County, Tenn., netted over \$430,000.

Decrease In County Sales Tax Collections

An overall decrease in collection of sales tax from Tishomingo County's six municipalities was realized for the month of October, 1982, over that of the previous month.

Figures published by Mississippi Municipalities, the official publication of the Mississippi Association during the month of October showed \$44,186.08 total tax reported as compared to a total of \$45,387.67 collected in September.

Merchants from each municipality are responsible for collecting the tax at the point of purchase, and reporting the amount collected to the state.

Following are listed the six

municipalities located in Tishomingo County indicating the amount of taxes collected in October, with the September collections shown in parenthesis. They are: Belmont \$10,107.30, (\$9,722.91); Burnsville \$4,485.73, (\$4,333.29); Golden \$602.17, (\$723.44); Iuka \$26,113.41, (\$27,813.43); Paden \$81.01, (\$56.80); and Tishomingo \$2,796.46, (\$2,737.80).

Ward Moser Presented U.S. Service Award

Ward C. Moser, of Iuka, was recently presented a Service Award in recognition of fifty years with the U.S. Postal Service. Post Master Ray Curtis of the Iuka P.O. is shown left making the presentation. Moser retired from the mail service July 23, 1982.

Beginning his career as a substitute rural carrier, he has also worked as mail clerk, serving under six postmasters, including J.C. Jordan, Miss Alabama Akers, W.L. Goodman, Isaac M. Jackson, Harold T. Lomenick and the present postmaster, Ray Curtis.

Although Moser retired as rural carrier on Route #5, he recalls, "I served on all routes anytime I was needed to fill in. I've never missed a day when they called on me to go." Reflecting back to the horseback and buggy days when he first started, he noted that "roads were the problem then... now, mail is the problem."

Commenting on his retirement, he said, "It's the first time in many years that I haven't had a job and I'm

afraid to ask... someone might give me one!"

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Christmas Baking

It's time to get out the recipe for Christmas fruit cakes, cookies and breads and decide whether to bake or buy. One big factor in making the decision will be the amount of time available to do home baking. Another big factor will be cost -- is it less expensive to make or buy. The cost will depend upon the amount of fruit and nuts used in either the homemade or the commercially prepared.

When examining the commercially prepared fruit cakes take time -- not only to compare the price per pound -- but READ THE LABEL. The label will list the ingredients in order of the largest quantity of the product. It will also state the kind of fruit included and nuts (if there are nuts). Price is not the only criteria. The lower priced fruit cakes usually have more cake and

much less fruit and nuts. The most expensive ones are fruitier and nuttier. The quality cake you want will also help determine which of the prepared fruit cakes you choose.

The cost of home baked Christmas foods will depend primarily upon the richness and amount of ingredients. You can control the cost of the ingredients to a considerable degree by smart shopping. Candied fruit is a big item. The least expensive form in which to purchase candied fruit is by the pound. Shopping around a bit to locate it by the pound will pay off. The most expensive way to buy it is in the small packages.

Dried fruits can be a shocker, too. With many of us being "once-a-year" bakers, we forget the prices attached to these fruits. However, when you stop to consider the amount of fresh fruit needed to produce one pound of the dried, the price doesn't seem so high. It takes 7 to 10 pounds of apples for 1 pound dried apples; 4 pounds of grapes for 1 pound raisins; 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of plums for 1 pound of prunes and 3 pounds of figs for 1 pound of dried

figs. The price also includes the cost of processing, packaging, transporting and storing the fruits.

Although much of the year, there is little choice in kinds of fruits and packages available, this season brings out a full array of choices. Many of the "colorful" dried fruits, such as peaches, apricots, and apples may be found packaged together or separately.

Prunes are available in various sizes. You can buy any one of several sizes from small to jumbo. The flavor of all is similar, but prices per pound usually "enlarge" along with the prune size.

When buying raisins, check the label. The Thompson seedless raisins come in white or golden and brown. The flavor of each is similar. The difference comes in that the white or golden ones have been bleached. These bleached raisins are usually higher in price than the dark ones. The very large raisins are the Muscat variety. These usually still have the seeds in them and usually appear around holiday time. Currants, good for pies, are much smaller than raisins and have an interesting tangy flavor. Raisin prices are still high so compare prices before you buy.

Dates come whole, pitted, and diced. Decide whether convenience (and no sticky fingers) or cost is the more important factor for you. The more "prepared" the dates, the higher the cost per pound.

Dried peaches, apricots and apples and scrumptious in baked goodies, but they also make great snacks. Keep some on hand for your family during the holidays.

If you plan to do much holiday baking, it may pay you to "shop around" for your dried fruits. The prices can vary from store to store. Be sure to check package sizes, too. The 10-ounce, 12-ounce, and 16-ounce sizes are the most common.

Decide what you want to prepare for the holidays, get your recipes, make your grocery list, compare prices of needed ingredients and start baking. You'll need to make fruit cakes first so they'll have time to age properly.

Fruit Delight Cookies

- 1 1/2 lbs. chopped dates
- 1/2 lb. candied cherries chopped
- 1/2 lb. candied pineapple, chopped
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 lb. nuts chopped
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs

Combine fruits and nuts... set aside... Combine dry

Ingredients... set aside.

Cream butter and sugar until smooth; add eggs and beat well. Mix part of dry ingredients with fruit; add rest to creamed mixture; stir in fruit mixture. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 10 to 15 minutes.

Store Grain Safely

Farmers across the state and in Tishomingo County are showing a great deal of interest in storing soybeans and other grains on the farm. New storage bins across the country are evidence of increasing interest.

Care is necessary in storing the grain safely until it is moved to market. Keeping the grain safely takes a certain amount of effort and know-how on the part of the operator.

Spoilage risks are too great to put grain in storage without applying some good storage management practices. Here are some that will help reduce risk of spoilage.

The moisture content for safe storage is 11 percent for a full season's storage. This means storage in the fall and winter and removal the next summer. Try to keep moisture content as near as possible to this level.

How long it will take to dry the grain depends on the

initial moisture content at harvest, the size of the fan used and whether heat is used. If no heat is used, weather conditions during the drying period are important.

Check the grain for moisture condensation across the top and along the bins walls. Use a moisture meter to check samples. Use a probe thermometer every week or two at various depths and locations to check for heating. If there is heating, aerate the entire bin.

Grain to be used for seed requires specialized drying. For more information on drying grain for commercial and seed uses, contact the County Extension Office.

Cottonseed For Cattle

Any cattleman is interested in ways to secure high quality feed at good prices. One alternative some cattlemen are considering is using cottonseed this winter as a feeding supplement.

Based on nutritional value, cottonseed are a good buy this year. Cottonseed contains about 22 percent crude protein and 90 percent total digestible nutrients on an air-dry basis.

Cottonseed can be used as a feeding supplement for wintering cows on hay or silage. Two pounds of cottonseed are roughly equivalent to one pound of cottonseed meal plus one pound of corn.

For supplementing hay or silage, there is no reason to add corn because cottonseed is an excellent source of energy. For best results, you

should have a sample of forage tested to determine supplement needs.

Several guidelines should be followed when feeding whole cottonseed to cattle. For more information on using cottonseed or on testing forage, call or visit the County Extension Office.

LIMITATION ON FARM PAYMENTS ANNOUNCED -- No "person" may earn more than \$50,000 under the Federal Farm Programs during any calendar year. Elmer A. South, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said this payment limitation

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is in effect for the 1982 calendar year and will also be applicable for the 1983 calendar year. The chairman advised that any person who has reason to believe that his/her 1982 or 1983 payments might approach the \$50,000 limit should contact their local ASCS Office. He emphasized that it is important for these persons to place a file with the county office a farm operating plan. At that time, county office personnel can provide information as to what constitutes a "person" for payment purposes. A full understanding at the beginning of the year, especially where partnerships, corporations, estates, trusts, etc., are involved, can eliminate problems which might otherwise arise from misunderstanding. He went on to explain that deficiency and disaster payments earned in connection with the various commodity

programs for cotton, rice, feed grain, and wheat are subject to payment limitations under the Agriculture Conservation Program (ACP) and Forestry Incentives Program (FIP) are under a different limitation. Price support loans and Farm Storage Facility Loans are not considered a payments for payment limitation purposes.

CCC LOAN INTEREST LOWERED TO 9 PERCENT -- Commodity Credit Corporation will carry 9-1/2 percent interest rate according to CCC Vice President Everett Rank. The new rate, down from 9-3/4 percent, reflects the interest rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury in December, Rank said.

mings, of Burnsville. Stanley is a 1975 graduate of Iuka High School.

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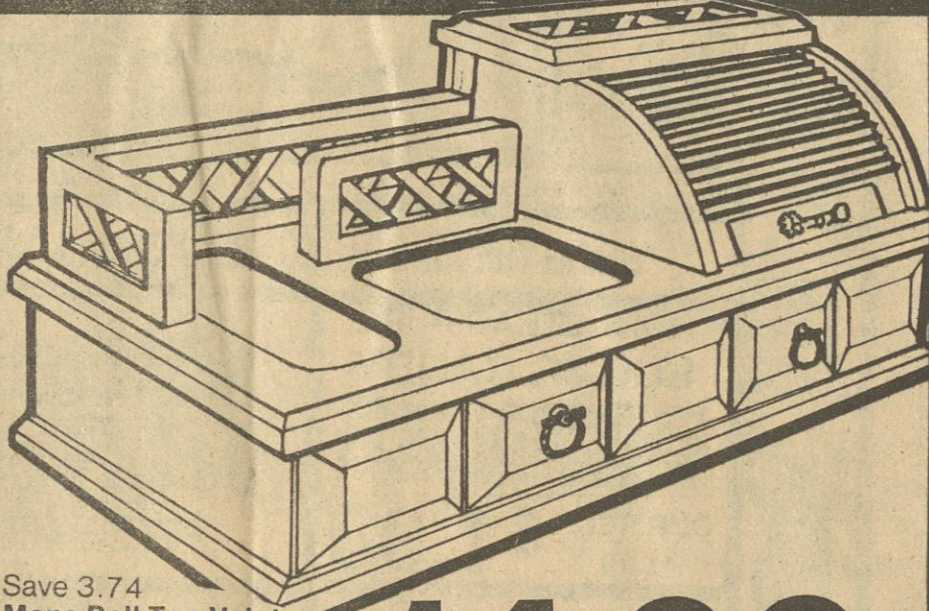
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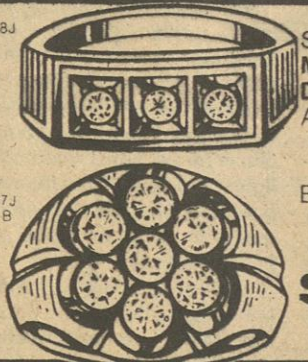
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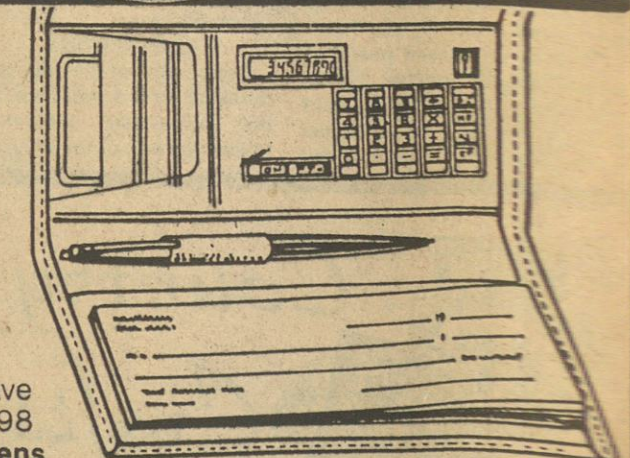

Baking Containers Hold The Key To Desired Results

It's not just what goes into the recipe that determines the success of your holiday cakes, cookies, or pies. What the recipe goes into also has an effect on the outcome.

Ann O. Rushing, marketin specialist with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said the type, size, shape and even the color of the utensil, as well as where in the oven you place them, can have a considerable effect on baking results.

Mrs. Rushing had these tips for holiday, and everyday, baking success:

"For best results, make sure you use a trusted, standard recipe. These recipes have been tested and the ingredient proportions have been well established.

"Sometimes the ingredients in a family recipe have been changed or forgotten as the recipe has been handed down from one generation to the next," Mrs. Rushing said.

"If your family recipes are not turning out as well as you would like, compare them to a similar standard recipe to see if the ingredient proportions

are the same."

The secret to golden brown cookies is a shiny aluminum cookie sheet without sides. The aluminum will spread the heat evenly, where as dark tin cookie sheets absorb the heat and make the browning uneven. Using a cookie sheet that is too large can also cause uneven browning because heat is trapped under the sheet which prevents air from circulating. For best results, allow two inches of free space on all sides of the cookie sheet and bake one sheet at a time.

Glass absorbs the heat and bakes faster. So, if you use glass baking dishes for cakes, bread, rolls or biscuits, reduce the oven temperature called for in the recipe by 25 degrees. It isn't necessary to lower the oven temperature for casseroles, meats or pies baked in glass dishes.

Baked frozen pies will look as tempting as homemade, if you follow the package directions. The shiny aluminum foil pans used for pies reflect the heat and prevent browning, sometimes resulting in a soggy, underdone bottom crust. That's why manufacturers recommend placing the pie on an aluminum cookie sheet. The cookie sheet helps to conduct heat to the bottom crust for browning.

To be sure that your homemade pies are golden brown, use a pie pan that absorbs heat - dark tin, anodized aluminum, or glass may be used. If the edges of your pie crust are too brown, form a collar of aluminum foil, 1 to 1-1/2 inches wide, to reflect heat and slow browning. Remove the collar during the last 10-15 minutes of baking.

If you have purchased a range recently, your new oven is probably quite different from your old one. Very often old ovens are out of temperature adjustment and you may have changed the time and temperature accordingly. With your new oven, this will not be necessary. Use the temperature and estimated baking time recommended in recipes without making any changes. And, follow the recommendations just mentioned for choosing the proper utensil.

FmHA '83 Farm Policies Explained

Basic farm lending policies for 1983 were announced today by James L. Perry, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration.

Perry stated that the adequate servicing of delinquent and other problem Farm Program loans to assist borrowers overcome financial and management difficulties and to protect the Government's interest continues as the prime concern. He emphasized that FmHA at all levels will make every effort feasible to assist financially pressed borrowers overcome their difficulties. "Borrowers will be assured that we understand their problems and that we will continue working with them on a fair but firm basis, using all our authorities to assist them to remain in farming when their farming operations are feasible," said Perry.

Assistance to borrowers will be continued to those who:

1. Have acted in good faith by demonstrating sincerity and honesty in meeting their agreements and promises made with FmHA.
2. Have been unable to pay their accounts as scheduled due primarily to circumstances beyond their control.
3. Apply production and financial management practices that are considered by FmHA as acceptable and suitable for their type of operation.
4. Have properly maintained chattel and real estate security and properly accounted for the sale of mortgaged property, including crops, livestock and livestock

production.

Subordinations will again, be used as a major method for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) borrowers to obtain financing for their 1983 farm operating expenses, according to Perry. FmHA loan funds are limited for 1983, so they will be used to the maximum extent only to supplement other credit sources.

"We will continue to meet with bankers, Production Credit Associations, Federal Land Bank representatives, Governor's staff, members of the State Legislature and Agri-Business leaders to explain FmHA policies for 1983. We intend to run the Farmers Home Administration in a businesslike manner in support of President Reagan's policies of using American's tax money on a sound basis and to the best interests of all concerned," said Perry.

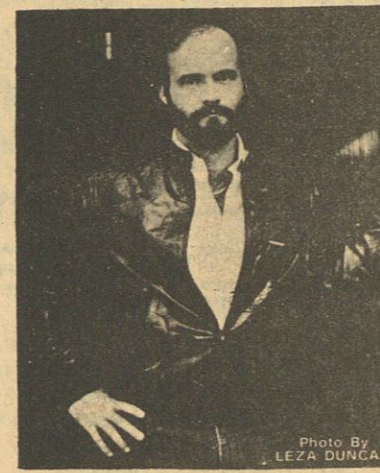

American Education: Here Today, Strong Tomorrow

As the 21st Century draws ever closer, American education draws even better. American education has always been "the education" to get, which can be proved by the overwhelming number of foreign students that have trained here and then returned to their own countries to put into use an education that stands second to none.

One reason that the American education is so good is because it is a balanced system of education. It contains four parts, each of which if left out, would not produce the same total education. The importance of the four part which are pre-school, elementary school, secondary schools and colleges, can be compared to a tug-of-war. If there were four people on one side of the rope and only three on the other side, chances are the side with four people is going to win. In the same instance a person with all four parts of an education is more likely to do better than someone who might not have completed the four steps.

Another important aspect of this country's education is its offered choice between public and private schools. A person that cannot afford a private school or simply doesn't care to enroll in one does not have to. He can go to a public school at which he can receive as good an education as he would in a private school. On the other hand, a child can go to a private school if he so chooses, which usually offers courses not always taught at public schools. This freedom of choice, which is unique in America for the most part, makes our system work, and produce the kind of students that our country needs to compete in a highly technology.

A third and final reason is the system's ability to adapt. Anything, person, company,

animal, etc., has to be able to adapt if it intends to succeed. Organizations, such as the PTA and many teacher's associations help to plan ahead and keep things running smoothly. Adaptability will play an important role as American schools approach new frontiers and encounter techniques of teaching. But the techniques are not that "futuristic", indeed they are soon to come.

I am ever thankful that I had the privilege to grow up in America and get educated in one of its schools. I feel certain, no matter what changes in practices or techniques take place, that the American system of education will continue to "lead the pack."

Duck Season Opens Dec. 11

Mississippi waterfowl hunters will be roaming the marshes and sloughs next Saturday when the first segment of Mississippi's duck season gets underway, according to the Department of Wildlife Conservation.

Open only for two days, December 11 and 12, the season will then close. It will reopen December 15 and end January 31.

Mississippi duck hunters will be harvesting ducks according to the "point system." Very simply this means that each shooter has a daily limit of 100 points. Various ducks are assigned a point value, largely depending upon the population

level of that species.

A hunter reaches his daily limit when the point value of the last bird taken is added to the sum of the point values of the other birds already taken during that day, and the total reaches or exceeds 100 points.

The possession limit is the maximum number of birds of species and sex which can be taken legally in two days. State enforcement officials say that hunters are not permitted a possession limit on opening day.

This year the point value of the various waterfowl include: canvasback, 100; female mallard, redhead, wood duck, black duck, hooded merganser, 70; male mallard, mottled duck, ring-necked duck, all ducks not specifically listed, 25; pintail, gadwall, teal, shoveler, scaup, mergansers (except hooded), widgeon, 10.

Wildlife officials say the legal shooting hours for waterfowl are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The shooting hours on some state-managed waterfowl areas and on some reservoirs will vary.

Duck shooters are also reminded that in Mississippi the use of steel shot is required only on national wildlife refuges for hunting migratory waterfowl. Shooters may not have lead shot in their possession while hunting in a steel shot area.

Hunters 16 years of age and older must have a federal duck stamp. Those over 16 and under 65 must also have a state stamp, in addition to valid Mississippi hunting

licenses. All shotguns must be plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells at one loading.

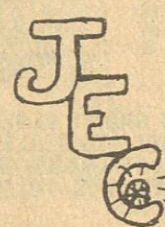

Talmadge L. Finch, District Director, Farmers Home Administration, today announced the 1982 Fiscal Year loan

and grant obligations for his district which is made up of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo Counties. The obligations are as follows:

Loans for Operating Purposes, \$3,303,120.00; Emergency Loans, \$9,591,020.00; Farm Ownership Loans, \$912,060.00; Individual Soil & Water Loans, \$47,590.00; Individual Housing Loans & Grants, \$5,614,010.00; Rural Rental Housing Loans, \$2,762,600.00; Water & Waste Loans & Grants, \$522,000.00.

The above figures represent a total of \$22,752,400.00 that was injected into the economy of the above mentioned Northeast Mississippi Counties during last fiscal year. Finch stated that although the Farmers Home Administration has grown and taken on several

new lending programs over the past few years, the Agency's primary concern is still to serve the people living in the rural areas of Mississippi. A local FmHA office is located in each of the six counties and the District Office is located in Booneville, Mississippi.

Farm Weather Watch

The National Weather Service is calling for average temperatures but more rain than usual in the northern part of the state in December.

Rainfall and temperatures in south Mississippi are expected to be normal for the period, according to the weather service outlook released by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

Average rainfall in December is five to six inches with moisture falling on about one day in three. Weather experts say damp weather may persist in north Mississippi, but conditions may be drier in south Mississippi later in the month.

Small amounts of snow or freezing rain also are possible during the period, according to the weather service.

Farmers in north Mississippi are advised to take advantage of breaks in the weather to complete harvest and other farm operations. Poultry and cattle producers should remain alert to sharp temperature changes, the weather experts say.

SAME TIME NEXT YEAR?

How frequently should one "change glasses"? There is no hard and fast rule in this regard. Certain people can keep the same prescription for two or three years, others require frequent changes. The latter is particularly true for near-sighted children and many adults between the ages of forty-five and sixty-five.

When growing children develop near-sightedness, it is common for that near-sightedness to increase a little with every inch of height. Until they stop growing, their glasses become inadequate about once a year, sometimes more often. After they have stopped growing, there is a

leveling off and glasses need changing less frequently. Many normal and most far-sighted people begin to need special glasses for reading around age forty-five. This development may proceed with sufficient rapidity to require a change in reading glasses about once a year until age sixty-five or so.

Clothing Christmas Gifts

If you are planning to purchase clothing as a Christmas gift this year, there is more to consider than the price.

While shopping, be sure to keep the person's figure in mind. Not all clothes flatter all people... and you certainly want your gift to look nice on the person you're giving it to.

If you're buying for the short and thin person, avoid sharp color contrasts between top and bottom pieces of clothing. An outfit all in one color gives an illusion of height. Vertical lines or lines that go up and down also tend to increase the wearer's apparent height, provided the lines are not too thick or too far apart. Shorter jackets make the lower part of the body look longer, giving an overall effect of tallness. A pin-stripe suit would be a good choice for someone who is short and thin.

The same rules apply to the person who is short and heavy, with one major addition. Darker colors help make the figure appear slimmer. Also, flat fabrics, that are not heavy and bulky, give a slenderizing effect.

Soft, less intense colors, the smaller prints (in scale with body) are best for the short person, regardless of weight.

Tall and thin people are lucky, because the majority of today's fashions are designed for this figure type. However, if a tall person wants to appear shorter, top and bottom colors should contrast. A contrasting belt can accomplish the same effect.

Horizontal lines, or lines that go across the body, can decrease height and add width to the figure. Pounds can also be added by wearing heavy, nubby, thick, crisp and stiff fabrics.

For example, a tall and thin man could wear camel slacks with a navy blazer and appear shorter than if he wore a navy blue suit. A red and blue plaid dress without a belt will make a tall and thin woman look
