## Highway 25 Near Iuka Claims Another Young Life



A young Tishomingo County woman died early Friday morning as the result of a two-vehicle collision. Her young son, along with the

driver of the second vehicle, were taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital for treatment following the accident.

Rebecca Jean Patterson, 22, of Iuka, was dead at the scene of the accident, which occurred on Mississippi 25 about 4 miles north of Iuka. Kenley Ray Patterson, 6, passenger in the car driven by his mother, was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital for treatment and released.

Bobby Lee McClendon, 37, of Sulligent, Ala., driver of the second vehicle, was also transported to the local hospital where he was treated for cuts and bruises.

According to investigating

Mississippi State Trooper Jerry Boyd, Mrs. Patterson was traveling south on Hwy. 25 in a 1976 Chevrolet when her vehicle veered into the path of the northbound tractor-trailer rig, driven by McClendon. The 1974 Mack truck, owned by the Ed Northington Trucking Company, of Gattman, Miss., was loaded with rock enroute to Pickwick Lock and Dam.

Becky attended Iuka High School and was a member of Fifth Street Baptist Church. She was an employee of Wal-Mart in Iuka.

Services were conducted Sunday, December 19, at Cutshall Funeral Home

Chapel with Rev. Bill Hobson officiating. Burial was in Mt. Gilead Cemetery.

Survivors include a son, Kenley Ray Patterson, of Iuka; her mother, Mrs. Doris Jean Walker, of Iuka; her father, Jack Daniel, of Iuka; two brothers, Jackie Lynn Daniel, of Memphis, Tenn., and Larry Pike Daniel, of Iuka; and a half-brother, Billy Price Daniel, of Iuka.

Pallbearers were Sammy Parsons, Lyndon Parsons, Terry Rhodes, David Rhodes, Johnny Rhodes, Danny Patterson, Randy Lawrence, Ronnie Lawrence, Wayne McNally and Bobby Walker.

## Explosion Kills One, Injures Iuka Worker

An explosion ripped through the USS Agri-Chemical Plant in Cherokee, Ala., early Saturday morning, December 18, killing one worker and seriously injuring another. The chemical plant is located five miles north of Cherokee along the Tennessee River in Colbert County. The plant is a production facility for dry and solution based fertilizer.

Johnny Calvin Goodloe, 55, Cherokee, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Colbert County Coroner Jessie York. Goodloe was a compressor operator and a 20-year employee of the Agri-Chemical Plant, a division of U.S. Steel.

Paul Nunley, 42, of Iuka, was injured in the blast and taken to Helen Keller Memorial Hospital and later transferred to the Medical Center Hospital at the University of Alabama in Birmingham. He remains at the Medical Center where he is listed in satisfactory condition. Paulie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Nunley, of Iuka.

Nunley and Goodloe were working on a hydrogen line in the ammonia plant of the giant chemical complex at about 9:00 a.m. Saturday when escaping hydrogen sparked an explosion and then a fire, according to Alan Kindie, manager of the public affairs for USS Agri-Chemical. "They were working on a valve when it happened, it was a routine maintenance

procedure," he said. "The valve was leaking, which is a fairly routine maintenance procedure. That is why it is such a mystery. For some reason, the valve released hydrogen gas, which is part of the ammonia process. When the gas entered the atmosphere it exploded and caught fire," Kindie stated.

"The two operators were qualified experts and had been with the company for a number of years. It is a tragedy that has to be dealt with, those people were not amateurs," Kindie said.

Apparently there were no other injuries. Only four or five workers were in the highly automated ammonia plant at the time of the explosion. Kindie said the explosion blew siding off the outside of the building, but did not break much equipment. He said that the flash fire from the explosion caused minor damage inside the plant.

Cherokee Fire Department Lt. J.C. Blackburn arrived at the scene about 20 minutes after the blast. "It didn't take long to put out the fire," Blackburn said. "It had been one big flash fire."

The ammonia plant was shut down Saturday, but the rest of the 300-employee complex continued to operate normally. The force of the blast apparently caused little damage to the compressor or other machinery in the building. The plant runs 24 hours a day,

seven days a week.

Safety inspectors from the plant and from the chemical company's headquarters in Atlanta continue to check the rubble to determine what caused the blast. The ammonia plant will remain closed until the investigation is complete.

Kindie said there is no danger to the community or the plant.

"There was no danger to the rest of the complex and no danger to the community," said the company spokesman Kindie. "There was no pollution or environmental problems."

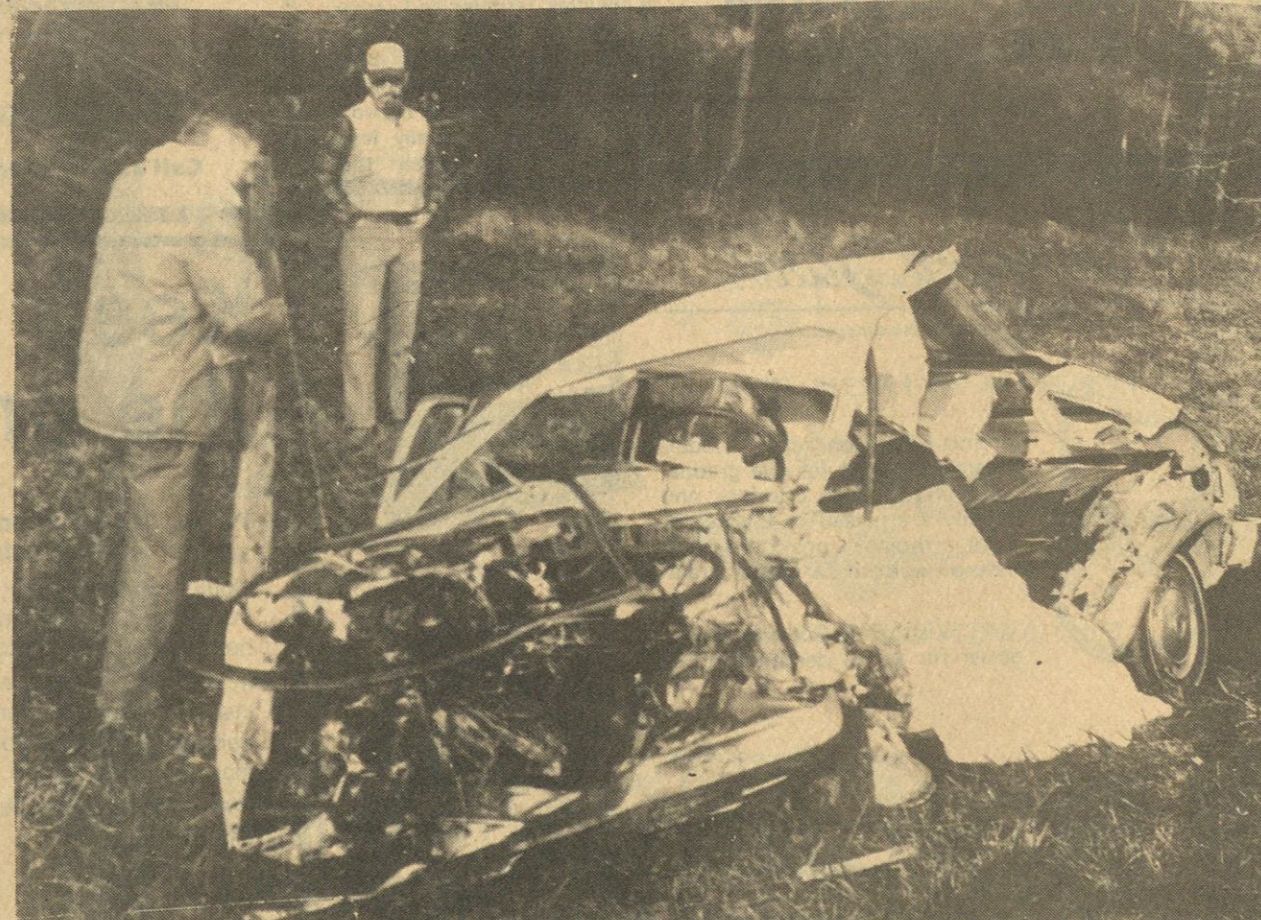

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

Season's Greetings  
Season's Greetings from your Tishomingo County Extension Home Economist's Office. I wish each of you a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! This week you will find recipes for Holiday Foods especially for you and your family.

### Turkey Curry

(293 calories/serving)  
2 cups cubed turkey meat,  
without skin  
1/2 lb. sliced mushrooms

1 tbsp. margarine  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
3 tbsp. enriched all purpose  
flour  
1 cup chicken broth  
1 cup finely chopped apples  
1 1/2 tsp. curry powder  
1 cup finely chopped parsley  
1/4 cup skim milk  
1 cup water  
1/2 cup raisins

In a large frying pan, saute the chunks of turkey, mushrooms and onions in margarine until the turkey is slightly browned. Stir in the flour, chicken broth, and curry powder. Add the apples, raisins and parsley. Then add the skim milk and the water. Simmer and stir constantly for 3 minutes or until the apples are tender. Serves 4.

### Broccoli With Cheese Sauce

(24 calories per serving plus 30  
calories per tbsp. of sauce)

2 lbs. fresh broccoli  
2 tbsp. margarine  
2 tbsp. all purpose flour  
1 cup skim milk  
2 slices low-fat process  
American cheese, torn into  
pieces  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. white pepper

Trim off outer leaves of broccoli and remove tough ends of lower stalks. Wash broccoli thoroughly, and separate into spears. Cook broccoli, cover, in a small amount of boiling salted water 10 minutes or until crisp-tender. Drain well, and keep warm.

Melt margarine in a heavy saucepan over low heat; add flour stirring until smooth. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Gradually add milk; cook over medium heat, stirring constantly with a wire whisk, until thickened and bubbly. Add cheese, salt, and pepper; stir until cheese melts. Serve sauce over broccoli. Makes 8 servings.

### Orange Sweet Potatoes

(135 calories/serving)

3 large sweet potatoes  
(1 1/2 lbs.)  
1 tbsp. margarine  
3 oranges, peeled and cut  
into small pieces  
1/4 cup orange juice  
1/8 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/4 tsp. ground ginger  
Toasted, slivered almonds  
(optional)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Bake potatoes about one hour or until tender. Halve the potatoes lengthwise; scoop out pulp and mash with 1/4 cup orange juice, margarine, salt, pepper, and ginger. Stir orange pieces into the potato mixture. Pile into shells. Top with almonds, if desired. Bake for 15 minutes or until heated through.

VARIATIONS: Add 1/2 cup raisins; use crushed pineapple (in unsweetened juice) and its juice in place of oranges and orange juice; mashed sweet potato can be put into casserole instead of stuffed back into skins. Casserole can be prepared in advance and refrigerated until ready to serve.

### Firewood & Insects

Anyone who supplements their home heating by burning firewood may be alarmed by the number of insects often seen on the firewood. Many of these insects are harmless.

The association of the insects and the firewood involves primarily food or shelter for the insects. Many of the insects are only looking for overwintering places under loose bark or in hollow wood.

Some insects, like roaches, are more troublesome than others. Roaches hide under loose bark and usually are more of a problem where wood has been stacked over a period of time.

Other insects such as beetles, termites and carpenter ants also may be found in firewood. Many of these aren't likely to be established in the home through firewood because they usually leave the firewood when their

colonies are disturbed. You can take steps to prevent insects from entering the home by firewood. Before carrying wood into the house, knock the sticks against something solid to jar the insects loose. Also, don't stack firewood in or against the house or other buildings.

Use up the wood you carry in the house in a day or two and keep it stacked in cold areas of the house, such as the garage or unheated porch. Before next spring, be sure to remove all firewood from inside the house.

It's not necessary to treat firewood with insecticides to kill the insects. It's dangerous, and it can be expensive.

All of us associated with agriculture have plenty to think about these days. Farmers, in particular, are faced with very low crop prices. The thing that's staying on their minds is how to survive another year of low prices.

The holiday season is a good time to push aside all these worries and look at the good side. If we look at things positively, we realize we all have much to be thankful for.

The Christmas season message is one of renewal and a spirit of optimism. The feeling is one that should have a lasting influence both in our lives and in the lives of those we influence.

This Christmas, take a pause from life's problems to count your blessings. Take a break from worrying about low crop prices, paying the bills and all of life's problems. The effect may surprise you.

### REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



Funding for production of the MX missile is essential if President Reagan is to have any chance of success in nuclear arms limitation negotiations with the Soviet Union. Failure to move ahead with production would significantly weaken any chances of an agreement to limit nuclear weapons in the future.

In negotiations with the Soviets in Geneva last June, the U. S. team made a proposal to make major reductions -- about one-third -- in the number of nuclear warheads on each side. At the center of this proposal was the MX missile. In fact, I understand the whole proposal depended on the MX which would insure that we could carry out our military missions at the reduced numbers that were proposed.

I have personally urged the President to negotiate seriously and hard with the Russians in an attempt to achieve an agreement on nuclear arms limitation which would be verifiable. Failure on the part of Congress to move ahead with funding for production of the MX at this time could erase any progress already achieved. It would prevent the President from negotiating from the same position of strength.

The MX missile provides the means for the U.S. to negotiate for future limitations on nuclear arms productions, while still providing an adequate deterrent against Soviet missiles. We simply should not set the President back in his arms control efforts.

For this reason, I am supporting the request for funding of MX production in the 1983 budget. We can hold off on a decision on the basing mode until there is an opportunity for further discussion and study, but we should not delay production of this missile which is an essential part of our nuclear defense system.

## Gas Prices Down For Holidays, Supplies Good

Christmas travelers in Louisiana and Mississippi should have little problem in finding fuel during the holiday season and will be paying slightly less than on Thanksgiving, reports the American Automobile Association.

According to AAA's Fuel Gauge Survey, prices in Louisiana dropped by 1.3 cents per gallon and in Mississippi by .4 cents since the Thanksgiving survey. The average price per gallon in

Louisiana is \$1.264 and \$1.359 in Mississippi.

Although motorists traveling throughout the state area should find ample fuel supplies during the Christmas holidays, approximately 45 percent of the stations surveyed said they would be closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. Stations will be closing earlier than usual on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. AAA suggests that travelers plan fuel stops wisely these days to prevent running out of fuel.

## Troopers Out In Full Force During Holidays

Col. Donald Butler has warned would-be drunk drivers that state troopers will be out in full force during the holiday season in an effort to reduce traffic fatalities.

"Our studies show that drinking drivers are involved in more than 60 percent of the traffic accident deaths in Mississippi," Butler said.

"Drunk drivers are not killing just drunk drivers, they are also killing drivers and passengers of other cars who do not drink."

Butler said shift schedules are being rearranged so that maximum number of troopers will be working during peak driving hours. He said highway patrol units will be operating 24 hours per day during both the Christmas and New Year's holiday weekends.

The contingent of state troopers will be augmented by 37 newly graduated and commissioned officers from the Highway Patrol Cadet School.

"It is not our purpose to desire to dampen holiday spirits, but our troopers will meet their obligation to make the highways as safe as possible for all motorists on the holidays," Butler said.

Butler, Chief of the Highway Patrol, said no trooper will be allowed time off during either the Christmas or New Year's holiday weekends. He said all leave and days off for troopers have been canceled during both periods.

The Christmas holiday season begins at 6 p.m. December 23, and runs through mid-night Sunday, December 26. The New Year's weekend begins at 6 p.m. December 30, and ends at midnight Sunday, January 2.

A total of 15 people were killed during the combined Christmas and New Year's weekends one year ago. A total of 18 died in traffic accidents during the 1980 combined holidays.

To reduce the death toll, state troopers have been ordered to be especially watchful for violators of drunk driving laws and for speeding motorists.

"Drinking drivers must learn that their chances of being involved in a fatal accident increase sharply after the first drink and skyrocket with each additional drink," Butler warned.

"The Highway Patrol will do its best to prevent drunk drivers from risking their lives and the lives of other people during the holiday season," he promised.

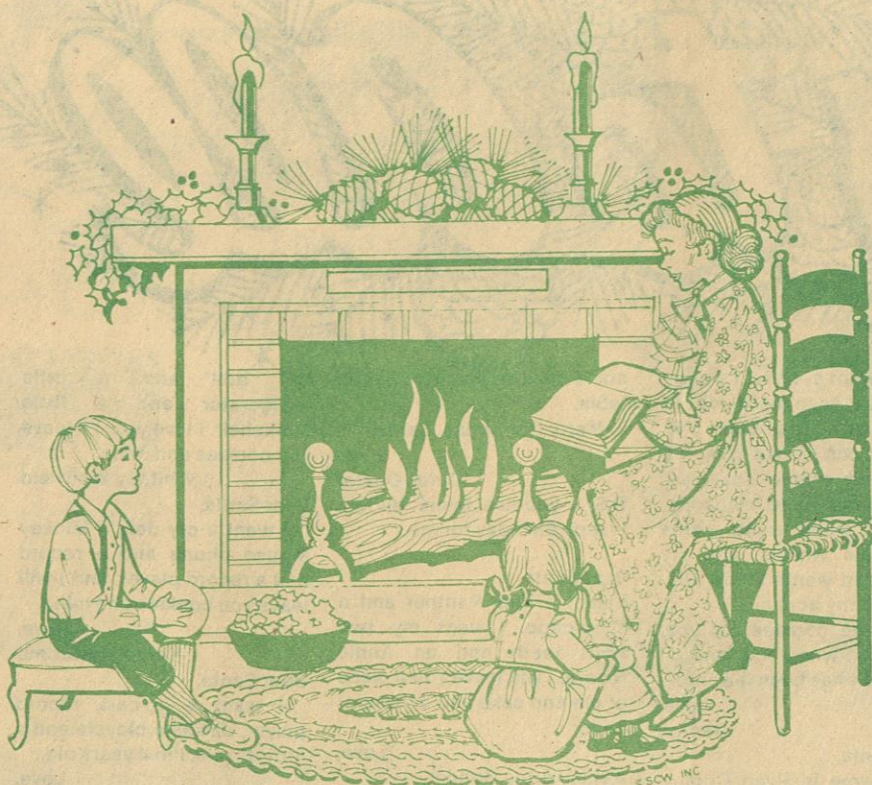
### CARAMEL CRUNCH

- 1/4 cup water
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 4 quarts plain popped corn
- 1 cup dry roasted peanuts

1. Combine butter, sugar, brown sugar, corn syrup, water and salt in 2 quart sauce pan. Heat over medium heat, stirring until sugars are dissolved.

2. Using a candy thermometer, cook syrup to hard ball stage (250°F).

3. Pour syrup over combined popcorn and peanuts in a large bowl or Dutch Oven. Stir to coat evenly using a long handled spoon as mixture is hot. Allow to cool and break into clusters. Makes 4 quarts.



## Literature of Christmas Enhances Enjoyment of the Holiday Season

Just as music and decorations add to the merriment of the holiday season, so the literature of Christmas enriches its meaning for all of us.

Fortunately for readers, Christmas has inspired many a wonderful poem or story.

Perhaps the most famous story of all is *A Christmas Carol* written by England's Charles Dickens in 1843. Is there anyone among us who has

not been fascinated by Old Scrooge and his miserly ways . . . or been touched by the pathetic figure of Tiny Tim? This beloved tale has inspired plays, musicals and motion pictures, not to mention generations of readers!

English poets, too, have been inspired by the nativity or its celebration. Tennyson, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, and John Milton are among those whose poetry sings of the season.

Here, in America, the

most famous Christmas poem of all was written for the entertainment of some youngsters, the children of Dr. Clement Clarke Moore, a professor of divinity.

In this poem, entitled the Visit of St. Nicholas, Dr. Moore described the activities of Santa Claus on Christmas Eve and old Santa himself. Today, our conception of Santa is derived to a great extent from his description: "His eyes, how they twinkled! his dimples, how merry! . . . He had a broad face and a little round belly, that shook when he laughed, like a bowl full of jelly." With such a delightful portrait, no wonder youngsters and adults alike took Dr. Moore's poem to heart.

### Marmee's Girls

In her popular novel, *Little Women*, Louisa May Alcott gave us a charming glimpse of Christmas among impoverished but genteel society. The March girls—Jo, Amy, Beth and Meg—have pitiful funds, yet they conspire to shower their beloved "Marmee" with thoughtful little gifts: slippers, a hankie, cologne and gloves. She in turn, is only able to give each of her girls a small book. Yet, the reader basks in the warmth that these beloved characters evoke.

Denmark's Hans Christian Andersen has written several tales with Christmas themes and they are justifiably cherished in world literature. Who can forget the story of *The Little Match Girl* . . . or *The Little Fir Tree*? Each story has that ability to touch our heartstrings, no matter how often read.

In more modern times, another American, William Sidney Porter, was to pen a classic story that has come to epitomize the spirit of Christmas itself: *The Gift of the Magi*. Writing under the name of O. Henry, Porter told the bitter-sweet tale of a young cou-

ple, Della and Jim. Although lacking in material goods, they have an abundance of that most precious gift of all, the gift of love.

### Famed Editorial

Not all the literature of Christmas is to be found in stories or poems. An editorial, written to a young inquirer is probably one of the best-known "works" that is quoted each holiday season. When an editor of the New York Sun published his answer to Virginia O'Hanlon on September 21, 1897, he laid to rest once and for all the question, "Is there a Santa Claus?" That editorial has been reprinted countless times since then, and it never fails to inspire.

St. Matthew wrote the first account of the Wise Men bringing their gifts to the Infant; St. Luke first described the astonished shepherds in the field near Bethlehem. Of all those who have written about Christmas, these two authors must surely be the most widely read of all!

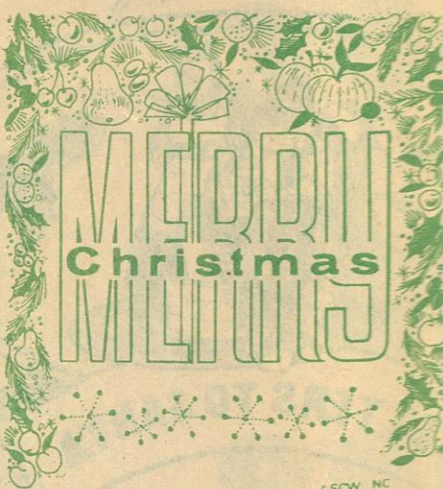

# Christmas \* Blessings

## Joyous History

The birth of Jesus: this momentous event in history is so important to us that we measure all other events in time in relation to that date.

God could have come to us in any way He chose. Why did He choose to be born to a humble Judean couple in a lowly stable?

The Gospel according to St. Matthew tells us, "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together she was found with child of the Holy Ghost.

"Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example, was minded

to put her away privily.

"But while he thought on these things, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost.

"And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins.

"Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying,

"Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us."

The prophet referred to by Matthew is Isaiah, who prophesied around 700 years before the birth of Christ, "Therefore the Lord himself



shall give you a sign: Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Emmanuel."

St. Luke tells us, "And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed...And all went to be taxed, every one into his own city.

"And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem: because he was of the house of lineage of David.

"To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child."

It was part of God's plan that His Son should be born to the wife of Joseph, a son of Abraham.

For the birth of Jesus fulfilled a promise by God to Abraham, who was called to be the father of many nations.

It was to Abraham that the One God first revealed himself. It was Abraham who was willing to leave his home and family to journey to a strange

land in obedience to the Lord.

Because of Abraham's great faith, God rewarded him with a promise: "...I will bless thee, and in multiplying I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore..."

God also included other nations in his promise to Abraham: "And in thy seed shall all the nations of the

earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice."

God kept his promise to Abraham; despite his old age, the patriarch begat a son, Isaac, who in turn begat Jacob. Jacob in turn begat twelve sons, the ancestors of the twelve tribes of Israel. One of these twelve, Judah, was destined to be the ancestor of David, the King. David in turn, became the ancestor of Joseph, the husband

of Mary, who was to be the mother of Jesus.

The prophet Isaiah foretold that the Messiah was to come from the line of David, the son of Jesse: "And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots:

"And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord..."

"And in that day there shall be a root of Jesse, which shall stand for an ensign of the people; to it shall the Gentiles seek; and his rest shall be glorious."

It was because he was of the house of David that Joseph had to journey to Bethlehem while Mary was with child. In journeying to Bethlehem, Mary and Joseph were fulfilling the prophecy of Micah: "But thou Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come

forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

Studying the history of salvation shows us

that the birth of Jesus to the young spouse of a descendant of Abraham recalls God's promise to one man who was faithful in answering God's call.

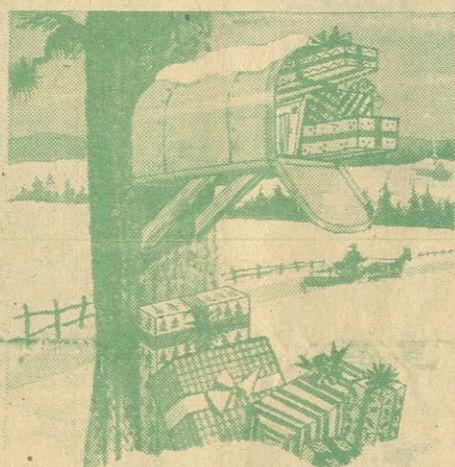

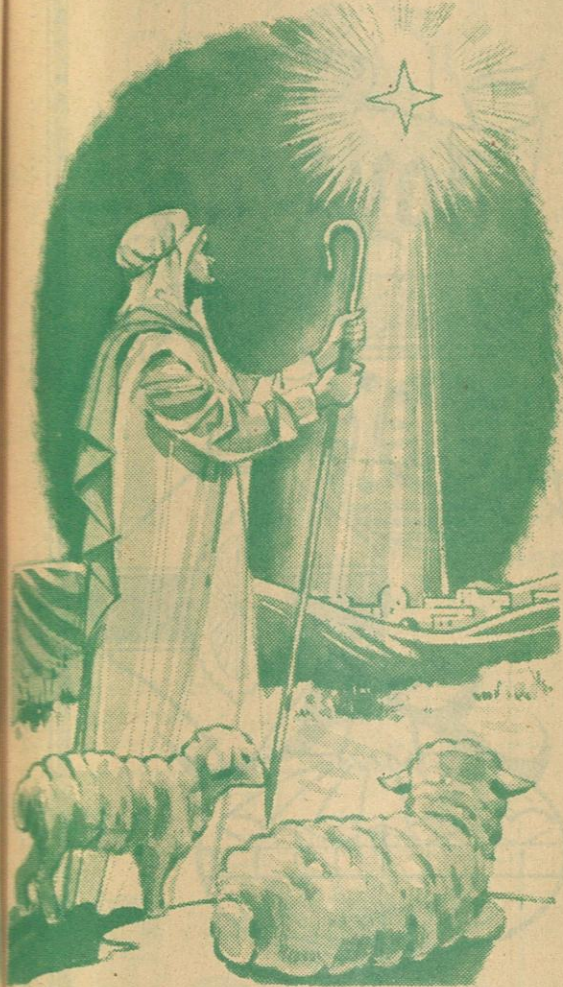

# Peace on Earth



## Star of Bethlehem Has Made Wise Men Wonder For All These Years

"Star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright..."

Ever since the first Christmas, the star that lead the Wise Men to where the Infant Jesus lay has been the object of con-

jecture and wonder.

Unfortunately, the only reference to the star in Matthew's Gospel offers no explanation for the phenomenon: "And behold, the star that they had seen in the East went

before them, until it came and stood over the place where the child was."

Thus it is that scientists and biblical scholars alike have been free to speculate about various theories, ranging from the supernatural to logical explanations.

One theory is that the star was actually a comet; yet another asserts that the star was probably a supernova, a star that suddenly takes on spectacular brilliance.

There is still another theory that the star was actually a conjunction of planets. According to astronomical studies, there were three conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn in the year 7 B.C. There were also major conjunctions of planets between 3 and 2 B.C., claim other studies. The 17th-century astronomer Kepler calculated that Mars, Saturn and Jupiter had been in conjunction around the time of Christ's birth.

One supernatural theory holds that the star was not physically manifested, but rather visible to only those who were privileged to the events of the Nativity. Others believe that God placed the star in the heavens expressly as a sign for a brief period of time. Interestingly enough, this ties in with one scientific possibility: a new star, or a temporary star. Such stars have been observed from time to time; in fact, Hipparchus is believed to have discovered a brilliant star where none had been seen before in the year 134 B.C. Could this have been the Star of Bethlehem?

Aside from being a beacon to the Magi, the star also fulfills an important prophecy regarding the Messiah. The Book of Numbers foretold "There shall come a Star out of Jacob."

Whatever explanation seems most plausible, Christians have always attached great significance to the star's appearance.

There have been many songs written about the

Star of Bethlehem and certainly no Christmas tree would be complete without its star shining atop.

The Star of Bethlehem is a wondrous part of the still more wondrous Nativity story; its brilliance has come to symbolize for us the miracle that is Christmas: the birth of Jesus, the Light of the World.

## Christmas Customs Of Other Countries

Most of our Christmas customs are a gift brought from other countries, so there is much to be learned about the Christmas spirit by visiting them.

### In North America

Our journey begins in Canada. In passing through this country's

contrasting regions, we find Christmas celebrations vary from the folkloric dances of the Inuit, to French and British carols, trees embellished with candles, gifts, and a wine-soaked yule log.

Southbound, in that "land of the posadas," Mexico, families gather for nine consecutive nights to re-enact the first Christmas. This ceremony of drama, song, and prayer is followed by blindfolded children breaking a pinata. What a scramble to pick up the fallen pieces of trinkets and sweets!

Continuing south, we discover many countries have adopted the posada custom. South American children also put notes beside the manger for the good angels to take up to Jesus.

Upon seeing festivities from sunrise to sunset, highlighted by horse racing and Indian dances, you'll know you're in Chile.

The season is ripe, and so, Bolivians celebrate their harvest festival along with Christmas.

### In Europe

It was in Germany that trees and toys first became a part of the holiday. All the family waits until six o'clock on Christmas Eve for Mother to unveil the hidden tree, decorated not only with lights and ornaments, but tasty treats.

On December 6th, Austria's opening of the season is greeted with a visit from "knecht Ruprecht," leaving small gifts and sweets for the

good or a switch for the others. Highlighting an Austrian Christmas is the procession to midnight mass, with lighted candles, singing Austria's own carol, "Silent Night."

### In Africa

Christmas has long been an important occasion in Ethiopia. Following the old calendar, it occurs January 6th. On Christmas Eve, people pray and chant outside the church until dawn. At 4 a.m., priests lead the people into church services. Christmas day is celebrated with gifts for children, dancing and feasting.

In Ghana, the advent season begins four Sundays before Christmas, and refers to Christ's coming. One can only admire the homes adorned with flowers and palm branches, and candle-filled palm trees!

### In Asia

Although in recent years it has gained significance, Christmas is not a grand scale holiday in Asia, except for Japan. Commercial stores have fostered many U.S. customs such as gift exchanging and turkey dinner. Similar to Santa is "Hoteiosho," believed to have eyes in the back of his head.

In Bethlehem where it all began, Christmas is purely a religious ceremony, not encompassing

the festive spirit found in other countries. Not much change can be seen in this Judean town, which helps our imagination to visualize life in Christ's time.

## Colonial Christmas

Although the earliest American Christmases were rather grim due to the fact that the Pilgrims disapproved of celebrating the holiday, Christmas in the colonies in time was generally pretty festive.

There were no Christmas trees, as the German custom was not introduced into this country until the 1880s, but in other ways, Americans made merry.

In Williamsburg, Virginia, for instance, the celebrating began a week before Christmas and lasted until Twelfth Night, or January 5. Festivities included caroling, dancing and much feasting.

The holiday season was ushered in with a huge bonfire and candles were lit in every window, while

fiddlers and singers filled the air with music.

Balls, fox-hunts, and visits between neighbors and family set the tone for the social season in colonial Virginia during the holidays.

The Dutch who settled on Manhattan Island brought over their Christmas customs from Holland, including the legend of Sante Klaas. So intent were the Dutch on celebrating Christmas that all Council meetings were called off from December 14 to three weeks after Christmas!

In Maryland, the many Catholic settlers brought holiday customs from their native England to keep a merry Christmas, too.

Food, of course, was an important element in all colonial celebrations, although it varied in ethnicity. The Dutch, for instance, favored dough-



nuts, sweet cakes, short cakes and ginger cakes, fruit pies, preserves, fried shad, roasted chicken and bowls of milk and cream.

Virginians feasted on roast turkey with grapes, kumquats, roast beef, cranberry mold, spiced crab apples and glazed sweet potato slices.

Christmas Day itself always centered around church services, ranging from morning worship to midnight mass, with churches festively decorated and voices

raised in praise of the season.

Because colonial settlers were often widely scattered, greetings at Christmas-time were likely to be sent by way of musket fire. This custom of firing muskets, as a matter of fact, has evolved into setting off firecrackers in some parts of the south today.

Although the colonial Christmas did not have Santa as we know him, or the tree, or gift-giving to the extent of modern times, it was a time of joy. A poem published in the *Virginia Almanack* during Colonial times expressed it best:

"Christmas is come, hang on the pot,

Let spits turn round, and ovens be hot; Beef, pork, and poultry, now provide To feast thy neighbors at this tide; Then wash all down with good wine and beer And so with mirth conclude the year."

## A Different Meaning for Many

What does the Christmas season signify to you? Ask the question of a hundred persons, and you would probably get as many different answers.

To some, Christmas is shopping for gifts, perhaps beginning as early as summer!

To others, Christmas is the sound of holiday music everywhere...on the radio, in the stores, in the office and in the churches.

To children, of course, Christmas is the time when Santa Claus comes to town, hopefully loaded down with lots and lots of presents!

Christmas means an eagerly anticipated annual visit from distant sons or daughters for many parents.

To others, it's the glow that comes from singing carols to those

spending the season in hospitals and convalescent homes.

Christmas is taking the youngsters to see Santa Claus for some; for others, it's ice skating down at the pond.



For many, the season means observing a family tradition, whether it's going together to choose the Christmas tree or attending special holiday services

together.

## Here Comes Santa Claus A Symbol of Good Cheer

Santa Claus is such an important element of Christmas today that we sometimes forget that he is fairly recently arrived on the holiday scene, as we know him today.

Santa's beginnings go back as far as ancient times, it is thought, when pagan gods such as Saturn presided over feasts such as the Saturnalia, a mid-winter festival celebrated by the Romans.

These pagan influences can be seen in the Father Christmas figure that was popular during the 1800s in England. He was a tall, bearded figure, pictured with

have miraculously restored three boys to life, thereby becoming associated with both children and gifts.

In Germany, the figure of St. Nicholas gave way during the reformation to the Christ Child, actually a messenger for the Infant Jesus and thought of as a girl.

In time the Christ Child, or *Christkindl*, became known as Kriss Kringle in the United States, taking on the old Father Christmas aspect that came to us from England.

The Dutch also had a great deal to do with our present concept of Santa Claus. Their version of the St. Nicholas figure was Sante Klaas, and it was this version that was brought by the Dutch settlers to the New World. Like St. Nicholas, Sante Klaas was both benevolent and saintly.

The realistic saint-figure became merged with elf figures from old European lore in the mind of a professor sometime during 1822 and the delightful concept of today's Santa Claus was born in a poem entitled *The Visit of St. Nicholas*.

Dr. Clement Clarke Moore's lively description of St. Nicholas as "a right jolly old elf" inspired the famed artist, Thomas Nast, to create a small, elfish character with

whiskers and beard, and name him Santa Claus.

Time has subtly changed the original Santa Claus from a gnome-like figure to the plump, jolly fellow more recognizable to modern children, but the sleigh and reindeer have remained intact, and we can directly trace our contemporary Santa to those first drawings by Nast.

Today, Santa is a symbol of Christmas to every youngster in this country, and he is rapidly becoming known around the rest of the world, thanks to communications.

## Tree of Life Tradition

Today's Christmas tree, all decorated and ablaze with lights, actually had a deeply religious significance at one time.

In medieval Europe, it was the practice of the local churches to present mystery or miracle plays, usually based on Biblical stories and intended to edify the people of the time.

One of the most popular of such plays was the Paradise play, based upon the story of Adam and Eve as related in Genesis. In this play, a fir tree hung with apples was used to represent the Garden of Eden.

As the mystery plays fell into disfavor, people began to place Paradise trees in their homes on the feast day of Adam and Eve, December 24th. At first, only apples, cookies and treats were used to trim the tree, symbolizing the sweet fruit of redemption. In time, candles were borrowed from the pyramid tree that was popular during the early 17th century in Germany. The latter was actually a structure of graduated wooden shelves, adorned with candles and glittering ornaments.

Gradually, the pyramid tree was forgotten as the Paradise tree took on its glitter and lights.



Today's typical Christmas tree, hung with many ornaments and twinkling lights, is a far cry from the simple, apple-strewn fir tree that was once associated with sin.

But, with the addition of candles, the Paradise tree became more symbolic of the light of Christ and so it is that the modern Christmas tree is a symbol of joy to Christians today.

## The Star of Bethlehem

In some countries, at one time, Christmas Eve celebrations did not begin until the first star had appeared in the heavens, in memory of the Star of

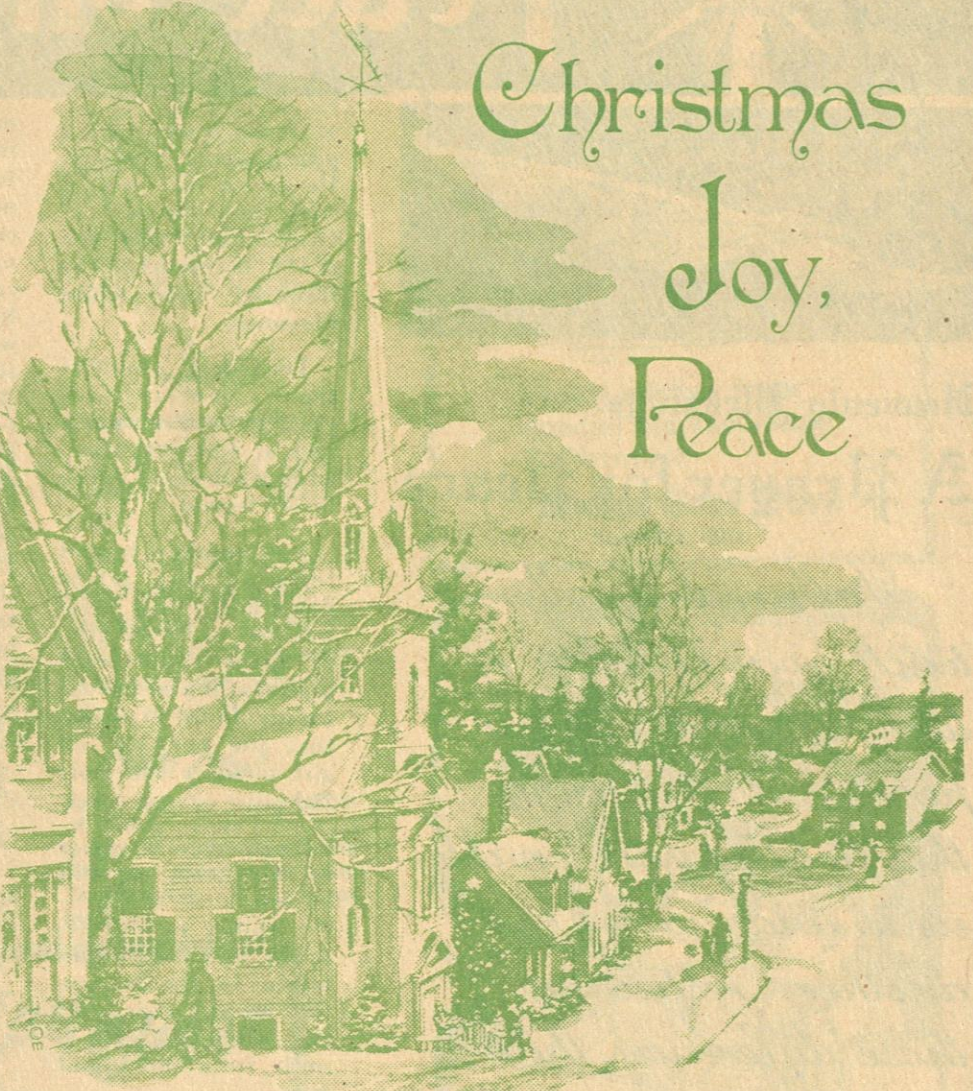
## Bethlehem.

### Legendary Inspirations

There is one such legend that was inspired by the small tree or shrub known as the Glastonbury thorn.

According to the legend, Joseph of Arimathea, the disciple

of Jesus, made a long pilgrimage to England. He drove his walking stick into the soil of Glastonbury, and the staff miraculously flowered into white blossoms.

The shrub produces these flowers twice yearly, in the spring and at Christmastime, adding substance to the lovely legend.

Yet another legend tells of the little drummer boy who watched sadly as gifts of great value were placed at the feet of the Infant Jesus. It seems that the boy had no gift to offer the Holy Babe.

Kneeling outside the window of the church, the boy began to pray. When he rose to his feet, he discovered a beautiful red flower growing where he had knelt, blooming in answer to his prayer. Joyfully, the boy took the flower, now known as the poinsettia, and placed it before the altar.

### Nutcracker Ballet Now A Tradition

**Sugar-Free Equals Low Calorie, Right? — Not Necessarily**

Most weight-conscious people tend to automatically go for sugar-free products over sugar-based sweets when choosing candy, soda or other popular packaged foods. Many of these products contain Sorbitol as a sugar substitute. Sorbitol, a carbohydrate artificial sweetener is not really low

in calories. According to experts at the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the principal difference between Sorbitol and sugar is that the first substance is absorbed slowly in the body. Sorbitol is used by the body as sugar. The averaged sized mint sweetened with Sorbitol has approximately nine to ten calories. A popular mini-mint sweetened with sugar contains only one-and-one-half calories.

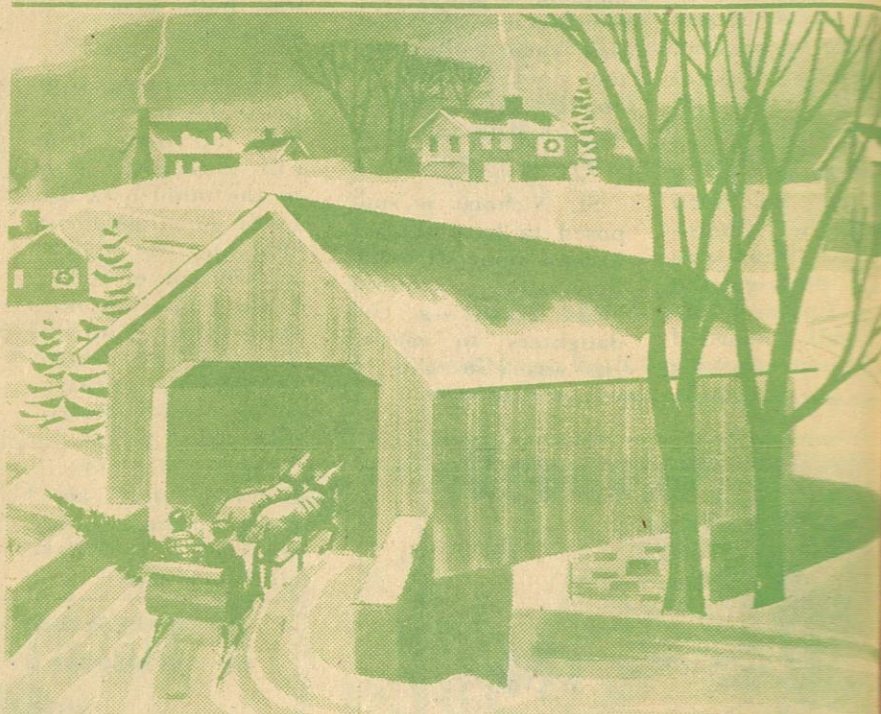

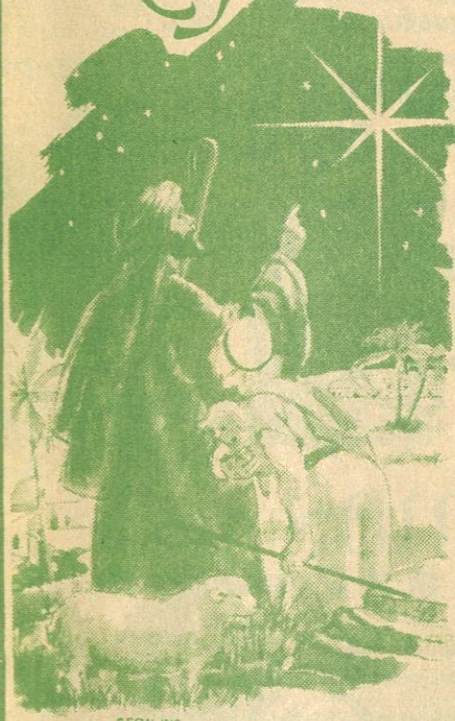

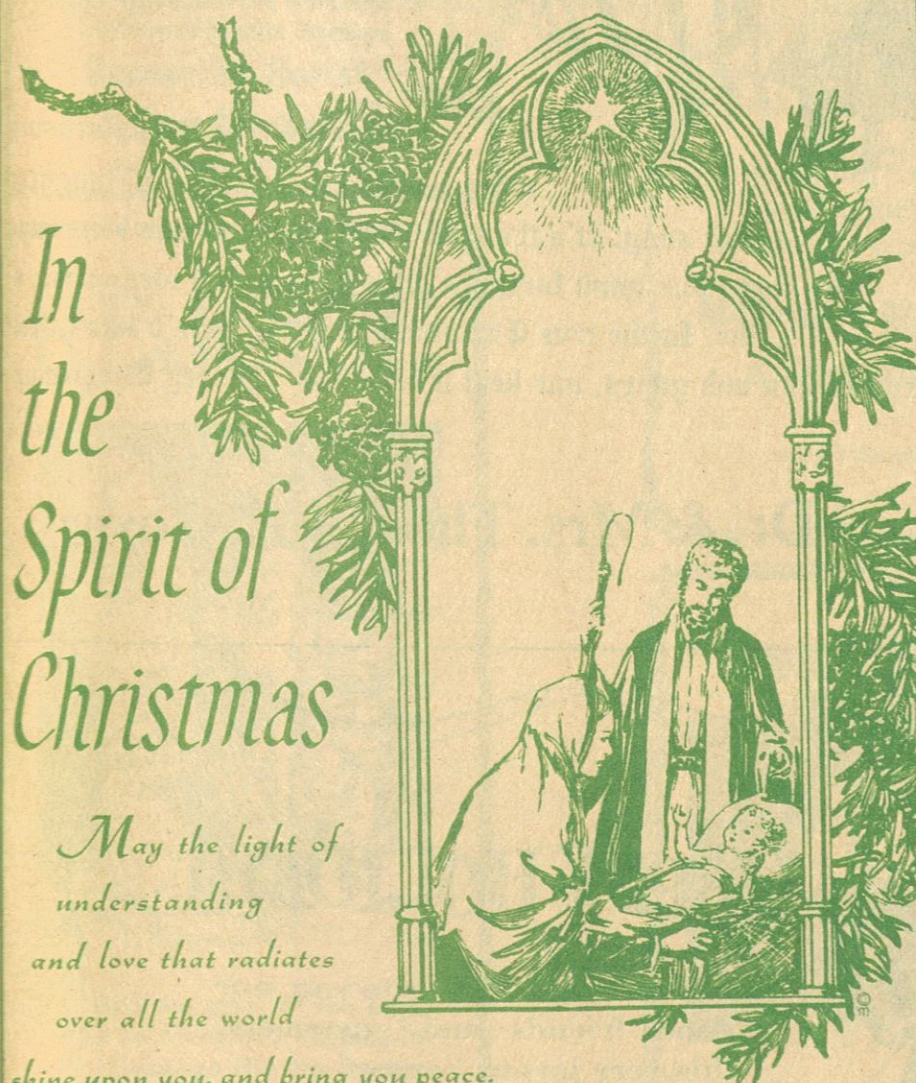

## Trimming The Tree's A Tradition

Of all the preparations for Christmas, probably one of the most delightful is the trimming of the tree.

How did this charming custom begin? Some suggest that the tradition dates back to pre-Christian beliefs in the magical powers of evergreens. The ancient Romans, for instance, decorated their homes with greenery for the festival of Saturn, or Saturnalia. This important feast was celebrated during December.

The association of trees with Christmas became defined during the Middle Ages, when miracle plays were performed, often in church, to teach stories from the Bible.

In the miracle plays, an

evergreen tree was used to depict the Garden of Eden, with apples hung from the boughs to symbolize the forbidden fruit eaten by Adam and Eve.

Although the miracle plays gradually fell into disuse, the evergreen tree remained as part of the holiday tradition in Europe. Cookies were added to the apples, and yet another form of decoration was borrowed from "pyramid trees" that were also popular during the sixteenth century: candles.

In the 18th century, sugartrees, trees trimmed with sweet meats, were popular. These gilded nuts and fruits gradually evolved into Victorian glass shapes, precursors of today's ornaments.

It was Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, who popularized the custom of the Christmas tree in England. However, America was introduced to the "Tannenbaum" by

Hessian soldiers during the Revolution and by German settlers in the mid-eighteenth century.

## Christmas Is The Time for Greetings!

It's Christmas! Time to shop for gifts, decorate the house... and send out greeting cards.

Christmas cards are so much a part of the holiday tradition that it's hard to imagine a time when they didn't exist. Yet, it wasn't until 1843 that the first Christmas greeting card was designed by John Calcott Horsley, the English artist.

Since then, cards of all kinds have found their way into the postman's sack. They reflect the sender's taste and interests in many ways, as well as current trends. Today's comical Santa, for instance, is more apt to be riding a moped instead of a sleigh.

There are always many religious themes to be found in yearly card selections: the madonna and child, the wise men, manger scenes and the star of Bethlehem, are among the more pious subjects.

Then, there are the "cute" cards: amusing Santas, kittens and puppies, reindeer, and youngsters hanging up their stockings by the chimney with care, for instance.

Victoriana seems to represent the spirit of Christmas to many. Hence, there will be the usual complement of Dickensian carolers, horsedrawn carriages and ice skaters adorning cards this season.

Christmas decorations are also favorite greeting card subjects: wreaths, Christmas trees, holly and poinsettias, among others.

Nature scenes of snow-covered meadows or a doe in contemplation... artists always find inspiration in such subjects for Christmas greetings.

Whether "store bought" or handmade, greeting cards are always welcome at Christmas time as a special reminder of what the holiday season is all about.

## The Legends Of Christmas

There are many beautiful legends associated with Christmas. Perhaps one of the loveliest is that of the Christmas rose, also known as the Helleborus.

According to tradition, the rose first bloomed on Christmas night. It seems that a little girl was outside the stable on that very first Christmas, weeping because she had no gift for the Holy Infant.

An angel noticed the child and took pity upon her. Brushing the earth with a wing, the angel called the little girl's attention to where her tears had fallen.

Much to the child's wonder, a plant at her feet began to bud and then unfold into lovely, white flowers. The little girl quickly plucked the flowers—here was a gift worthy of the Babe!

She placed them at the feet of Jesus. As His tiny feet touched the blossoms, suddenly the petals turned pink!

Thus was born the Christmas rose, so the legend says.



Yet another legend centers around plants: a delicate bedstraw plant, strewn with tiny white flowers, is said to have been mixed with the hay in the manger where the infant Jesus lay. The white flowers were miraculously turned to gold that night, and ever since then the plant has been known as Our Lady's Bedstraw.

Another legend explains how the lamb got its woolly coat. The story says that a little lamb was among the animals in the stable on Christmas Eve. Thinking that the Christ Child must be cold, wrapped only in

swaddling clothes and laying upon straw, the little lamb nestled by the infant, to shelter Him from the cold.

The infant touched the little lamb, and its coat was transformed into soft, curly wool. Since then, the legend says, all sheep proudly wear a warm and woolly coat.



## The Advent Wreath Is Harbinger of Christmas

In many churches and homes, during the four weeks before Christmas, wreaths with candles are displayed to remind the faithful of the approaching holiday.

These decorations are known as Advent wreaths, symbolizing the eager awaiting of mankind for its redeemer.

Originally, the Advent wreath may have been part of pagan observances. Tribes in northern Europe would display cartwheels decorated with greens and lights in their homes during the winter season.

The custom became Christianized in time, with the wreath's circular shape symbolizing God's unending nature, and the evergreens symbolizing His unchanging nature.

There are four candles on the wreath, one for each week of Advent. Three of the candles are violet in color, as a reminder of our repentance and our longing for the Savior. One candle is rose colored, symbolizing our joy and hope in the coming of the Messiah. All the candles are tied with purple ribbon, again as a symbol of longing and repentance.

In some homes, the family will gather around the wreath on the Saturday

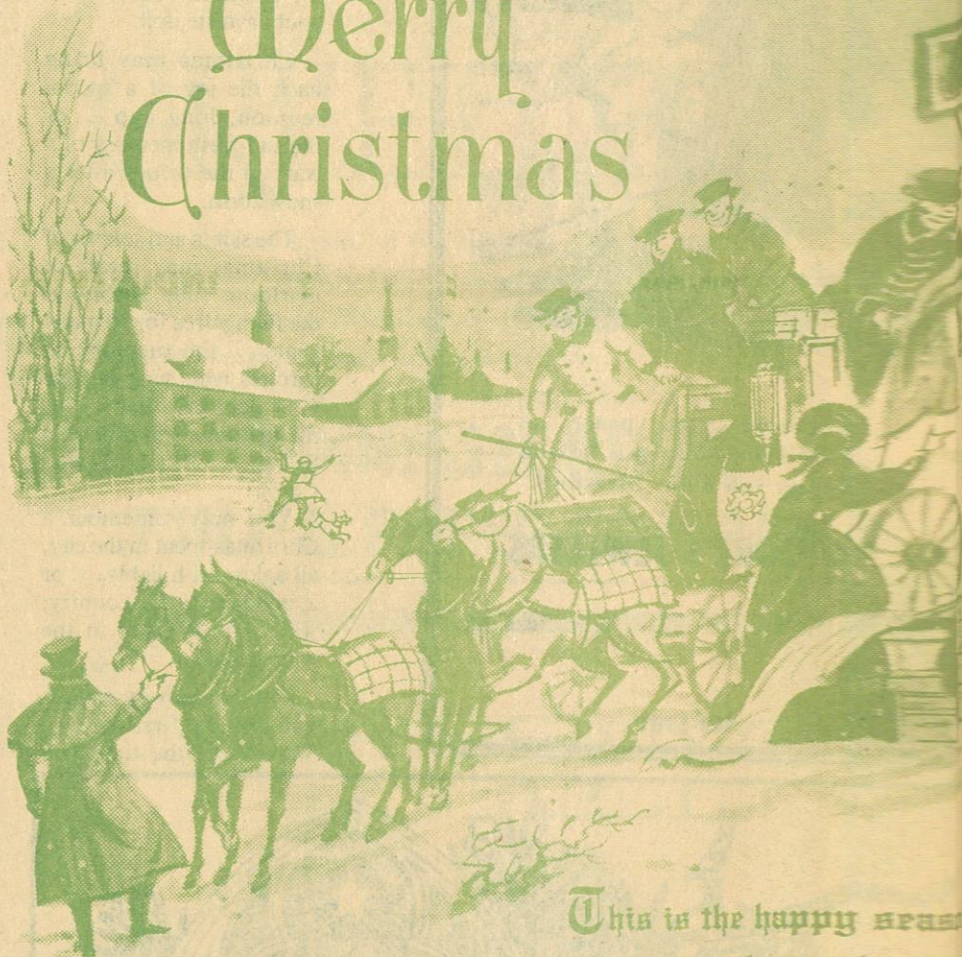

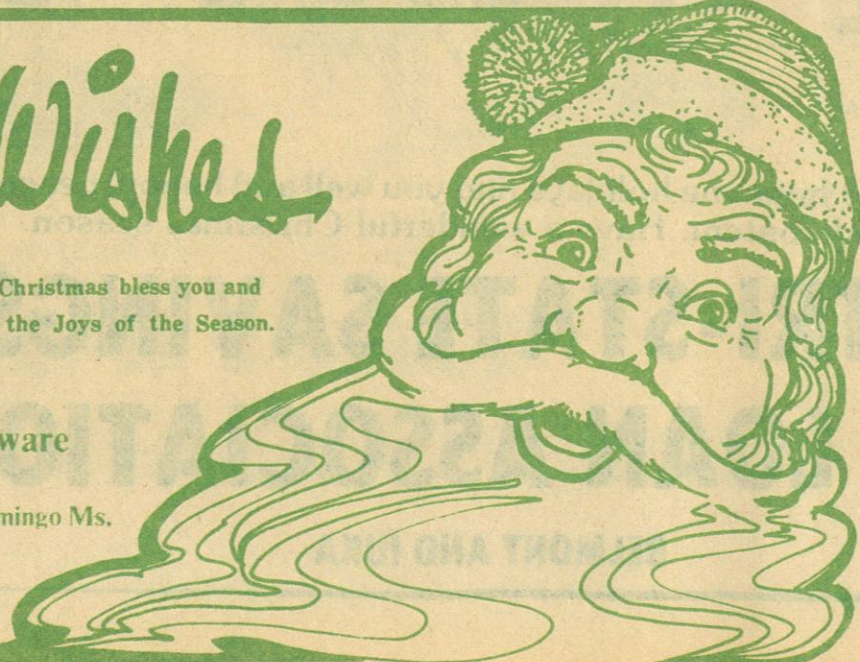

## One Solitary Life

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village, where He worked in a carpenter shop until He was thirty. Then for three years He was an itinerant preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never had a family or owned a home. He didn't go to college. He never visited a big city. He never traveled two hundred miles from the place

where He was born. He did none of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but Himself.

He was only thirty-three when the tide of public opinion turned against Him. His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. He was turned over to His enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves.

While He was dying. His executioners gambled for His garments, the only property He had on earth. When he was dead, He was laid in a borrowed grave

through the pity of a friend. Nineteen centuries have come and gone, and today He is the central figure of the human race.



All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man

on this earth as much as that one solitary life.

Amidst the general call of happiness, the bustle of spirits and stir of affections, which prevail at this period, what bosom can remain insensible? It is indeed the season of regenerate feeling — the season for kindling, not merely the fires of hospitality in the hall, but the genial flame of charity in the heart.

## Handel's "Messiah"

Each Christmas, music-lovers throughout the country are once again enraptured by the most popular choral work of all time, Handel's "Messiah."

Since its first performance in Dublin in 1742, this beloved oratorio has been performed countless times in concert halls as well as churches.

Although it was originally intended as an Easter work, "Messiah" has become synonymous with the Christmas season for English-speaking peoples. However, the entire oratorio

is not usually performed at Christmastime, but is limited to those sections relating to the Nativity.

The reason for the popularity of this magnificent work is not difficult to determine. Based on texts from the Scriptures, the music for "Messiah" is both melodic and moving. Tradition has it that when the oratorio was performed in London before King George, he was so inspired by the "Hallelujah" chorus that he spontaneously rose. Since subjects do not remain seated while the monarch stands, the rest of the audience promptly rose as well. Since then, audiences traditionally rise to the their feet at the beginning of this magnificent chorus.

Handel, it is said, claimed to have received divine inspiration in the writing of his greatest masterpiece. Certainly, he wrote "Messiah" in record time — he started the work on August 22, 1742 and completed it on September 14, approximately two weeks later. Scholars, in studying the original manuscript, note that Handel wrote so furiously, he sometimes neglected to put stems on the notes and scratched or blotted out changes instead of erasing. The manuscript reveals a composer working at a fever pitch and would seem to support Handel's claim.

Whether presented on a grandiose scale or

with smaller ensembles, all will agree that listening to Handel's "Messiah" is both a spiritual and a musical experience.

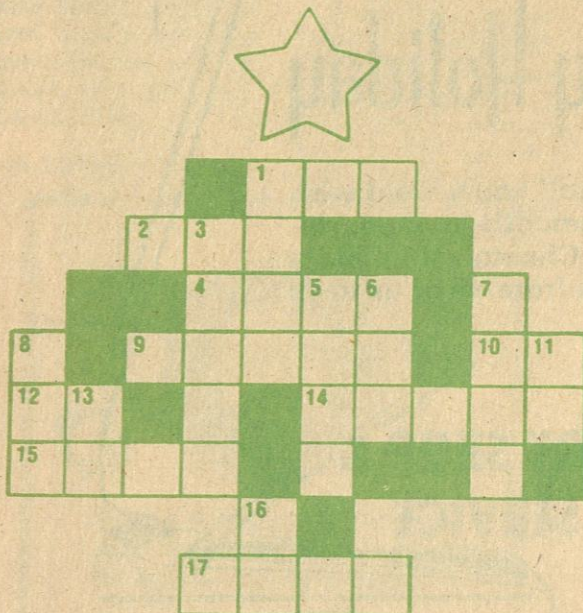

## Making A "Cookie House"

Christmas is the ideal time for family projects

like baking a cookie house but if you don't have either the time or inclination to bake, you can still make a charming cookie house by simply using graham crackers and cake decorations.

To make this cookie house, you'll need around 17 graham cracker units (each made up of 2 squares) a small tube of decorating gel, a small bottle of cinnamon hot, about 1/2 box of powdered sugar, a can of coconut flakes and a small box of caramel popcorn.

Have the youngsters decorate the crackers to be used for the sides and front and back of the house with doors and windows, using the gel and cinnamon hot. (You'll need two units for the front and back, three for the sides.)

Make a paste of the powdered sugar by adding water and then carefully join the squares together

to create a standing structure of front, back, and sides. Join three undecorated units together to form each side of what will eventually be the roof. Next, join the the two roofing sides together at right angles before setting them on top of the standing structure. Make sure "roofing" is secure before setting it in place.

To fill the space left between the roof and front of the house, cut a small rectangular piece of cracker and join it to the roof and front with your paste, fill in the rest of the space with caramel popcorn, again using the paste as a mortar. Repeat procedure for back of the house.

## Christmas Customs Around the World

Many beautiful legends and customs are associated with the Christmas season and they come from all parts of the world.

In Sweden, for instance, a popular custom centers around Saint Lucia, a maiden who lived during Roman times. According to legend, St. Lucia gave her dowry to some poor Christians on her wedding day and was condemned to be burned at the stake for doing so. But, the flames did not harm her, so her executioners had to use a sword to kill her.

Today, St. Lucia's Day begins the Christmas season in Sweden. Traditionally, the eldest daughter of the household, wearing a halo of lighted candles and a white robe, serves coffee and cakes to her family at dawn on this day. However, the ceremony is often observed publicly now, with Lucia and her court appearing in offices, schools and civic halls on December 13th.

A colorful legend originates in Greece about some mysterious beings called Karkantari. Half-human, half-creature, the Karkantari wander about on the twelve days following Christmas, making

mischief in general.

To make these mischievous beings go away, the tradition is for the local priest to dip a cross entwined with basil into a copper vessel of holy water, then sprinkling every room of the house. Old leather shoes that have been saved throughout the year are burned at this time to further ensure that the mischief-makers stay away.

In Italy, the legend of La Befana entralls youngsters still. It seems that this unfortunate witch was told by the shepherds of the birth of the Saviour, but she delayed so long that she missed the Star of Bethlehem and has wandered about in search of the Child ever since.

According to the legend, La Befana leaves gifts at each home she visits, in hopes that the Christ Child is there.

Italian children have to wait for the feast of the Epiphany, January 6, for their gifts from the legendary witch, however.

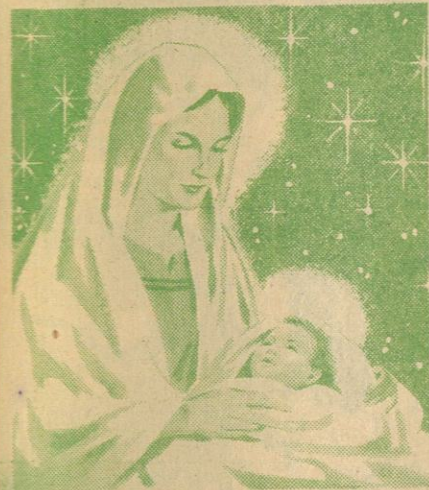

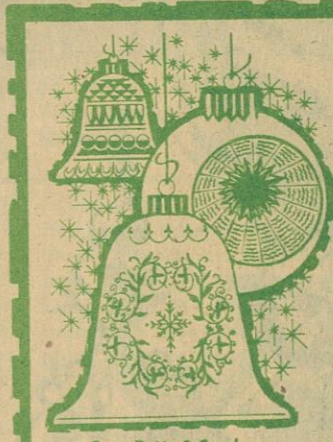

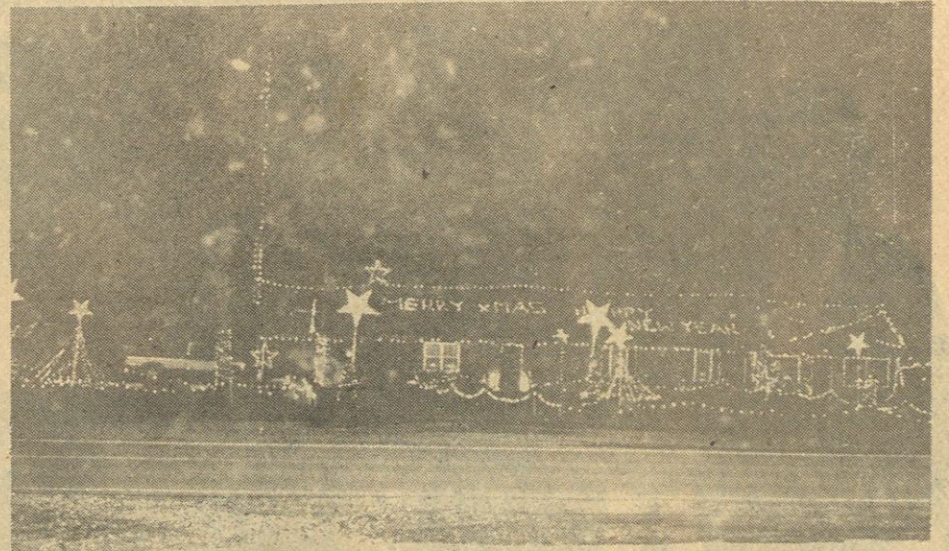

### Meals on Wheels

You've heard of "meals on wheels," and convenience foods." Now the Bureau of Recreation and Parks has "convenient food on wheels," as the state parks have put in to operation a portable bar-becue cooker with a capacity for cooking 200 chicken halves and 40 steaks. Multiple cooking can increase the number of servings.

"Several times every year we get requests to prepare food for large groups at our state parks," said Aubrey Rozzell, director Bureau of Recreation and Parks, "and sometimes we were not able to accommodate them. The parks with group camp kitchens can handle rather large groups, but many of our parks do not have any food preparation facilities at all, so this mobile cooker can do the job."

The unit uses propane gas as a source of heat, and there is a compartment for hickory logs that gives the meat a smoked flavor.

One person, Royal Lewis, is assigned as the main cook (along with other duties), and there is a person at each park trained to operate the cooker.

The unit has been used twice so far. A bar-becue chicken dinner was prepared at Roosevelt State Park for a Morton bank outing, and a steak dinner was served at Ducks Unlimited meeting at

Leroy Percy State Park. Reports from those who were invited to the dinners give the cooker and the cooks high marks.

The mobile cooker can be reserved for use by contacting any state park office.

Family food problems multiply during the holiday season. With more special-occasion food to prepare and more shopping, wrapping,

plation to choose combination dishes that cook quickly after several hours of chopping and assembling ingredients.

Skillet dinners that contain a whole meal, except possibly the salad, are time-savers that can be both nutritious and appetizing. Ground beef, eggs, sausage, and fried chicken are commonly used choices for this type of dish. Tuna and salmon, expensive in appearance, stretch a combination dishes to feed several people at reasonable cost. Chicken, beef, or pork liver are nutritious and delicious stretchers. Beef and pork brains are also super economy choices for those who like brains with eggs.

Beans are such obvious answers to economical dishes that it's easy to overlook them entirely. Beans cooked at home are three to five times as economical as canned beans. Save time by cooking at least a pound at a time, storing unneeded amounts in jars in the freezer compartment of your refrigerator.

Improve quality and avoid the overnight soak by using the one-hour hot-soak. To do this, wash beans and cover generously with water, boil for two minutes, and then heat off. Soak for about an hour and cook 45 minutes to one and one-half hours (depending on variety) until beans are tender.

To enhance the value of the vegetable protein in dry beans and peas, cook them with meat such as ham bone, chopped ham, fresh pork, salt meat, or the chunky pieces from a box of bacon ends and pieces.

To further enhance the protein value, serve beans with a glass of milk. Animal proteins found in milk contain all the amino acids needed by the body. Vegetable proteins contain some but not all of these building-blocks. When meat, milk, or eggs are served with vegetable proteins, the body combines vegetable and animal amino acids to its own best advantage.

You can also save money and preparation time by using roasts in family meals. A large pork or beef roast cooks with little attention from the cook and is usable as prepared for the first meal.

Additional meals from a roast can include sandwiches from the nicest slices and casseroles and stews from the scraps.

A neat plan-ahead-trick with beef roasts includes refrigerating the roast and gravy after the first meal. When the roast is chilled, make slices for sandwiches, wrap, and store them. Slice scrap pieces and store them in gravy to reheat later for serving over toasted muffins or mashed potatoes.

A second booklet, "A Lifetime of Freedom From Smoking," is to help maintain the new nonsmoking lifestyle. Tensions and events that cause backsliding are anticipated and this manual helps the new nonsmokers cope with and solve these problems while maintaining a "smoke-free" lifestyle.

"Freedom From Smoking" is a highly individualized and very workable way to quit smoking. It is available from the Mississippi Lung Association now and is ideally suited for the person making a New Year's resolution to "kick the cigarette habit."

### WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

## TCDF Activity Report

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation held its monthly Board of Directors meeting at noon, December 14, at J.P. Coleman Park. Director Rick Ward presented a brief activity report for the month of November and an update of the programs and projects now underway for the economic development of Tishomingo County.

The TCDF office reported 12 contacts with local and prospective firms or representatives from various manufacturing, distributing, and service-oriented businesses. One prospect visited the county during the month, and information was forwarded to two out-of-state industrial prospects, including one from the Mississippi Department of Economic Development.

One of the projects discussed during the meeting concerned the new SBA 503 financing program. The 503 has attracted considerable attention as an instrument for bringing together public and private sources of capital. The Foundation will be working to assure that the 503 program is available to area businesses that qualify.

The TCDF Board was brought up to date on the status of other projects in the works. Two loan packages were presented to TVA to follow up earlier proposals and the county's first industrial mitigation loan was finalized with Golden Sales, Incorporated, of Belmont. This was also the first loan of its kind to be made in the entire Tennessee Valley Region. Ward also reported that a

total of 10 Tishomingo County pre-applications were submitted in November by the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District to the Appalachian Regional Commission. Applications were made on behalf of 4 cities, 3 water associations in the county, and 3 rural projects. This total represented one-third of all of the PPD's pre-applications.

A full-scale update of the county's industrial data and promotional material was begun during the month. Community data summaries were revised and submitted to the state for printing, and two new county brochures were submitted to TVA printing. A new brochure on Yellow Creek Port and Industrial Property was completed December 15. An audio-visual presentation on Tishomingo County has also been planned and initiated in cooperation with TVA.

As the membership drive entered the sixth week, new members totaled 50 and collected dues amounted to \$7,000. Several membership committee meetings were held in Tishomingo and Iuka to update the progress of the drive.

Recruitment continued for Key Community volunteers in preparation for formal application. Industrial site ratings were finally received from the state with recommendations for compliance. An industrial site committee is now being formed for the purpose of up-grading all of the county's listed industrial sites. County-wide representation is needed on the development team as well as the site committee, community appearance committee, existing industry committee, and the community information committee. General members and interested citizens are being recruited for help in these

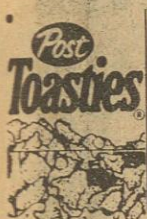
