Rescuers worked approximately 30 minutes freeing the bodies of Mrs. Virginia Cosby, Mrs. Lula

Maye, Homer Gene Morris, Ray Vaughn, and Michael Paul Farris, from the tangled wreckage.

Five Family Members Killed In Auto Crash

A late afternoon crash, which involved two vehicles, claimed the lives of two luka women and three children.

Tuesday, January 11. These are the first traffic related fatalities reported within Tishomingo County in 1983.

The collision occurred about one mile south of luka on Mississippi Highway 25.

Killed in one vehicle was the driver, Mrs. Virginia Cosby, 33; along with four

passengers, her grandmother, Mrs. Lula Maye, 83; her nephews, Homer Gene Morris, 13; Ray Vaughn, 9; and Michael Paul Farris, 6, all of luka.

The driver of the second vehicle, an employee of Sunshine Mills, Delton L. Kelton, of Red Bay, Alabama, was taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital and later released.

Vocational Evening Classes At NEMJC

Registration and first class meeting for evening college classes offered by Northeast Junior College will be 6 to 8 p.m., January 17, in Dean Hall, Jimmy Crane, assistant director of vocational education announced today.

The classes are offered in cooperation with the State Department of Education for adults who need vocational education to help them improve their earning capacities in their present employment or in new employment, he explained.

Course offerings for the spring semester include automatic transmission, combination welding, electronics, machine shop,

microprocessors, air conditioning, forest inventory, urban forestry and respiratory therapy (clinical upgrading).

Fees for the on-campus classes are determined according to the number of contact hours the classes meet. For those classes which meet 50 or more contact hours, the fee is \$40.00, while the fee for those classes which meet less than 50 contact hours is \$8.00 per hour.

In addition, students who register for classes which grant Continuing Education Units will be charged a \$10.00 registration fee.

State Trooper Jesse Coke, the two involved in the impact were a 1969 Ford car, driven by Mrs. Cosby, and a 1978 Mack truck, driven by Kelton. Coke stated that the accident occurred around 3:45 p.m. when the car was entering the highway from the driveway of the McManus Trailer Court. Apparently the car pulled out in front of the southbound 18-wheeler.

The car was struck on the driver's side and knocked down an embankment off the northbound lane of traffic.

Following the collision, the truck left the highway, crossing the northbound lane, plowing into the yard of

Merle Helton, cutting an oak tree down in its path before jack-knifing to a halt approximately 15 feet from the resident's home, pulling down the TV antenna as guide wires were torn loose. Helton stated that his wife, young daughter, and a friend were in the home at the time of the crash.

Trooper Coke stated that the accident is still under investigation by authorities.

The children are survived by their mother, Mrs. Betty Ann McAnally, of luka.

Funeral services for the victims were incomplete at press-time.

13 Qualify For County Offices

With the arrival of the new year well underway . . . the opening date for candidates to qualify for public office has been anxiously anticipated for many who have been making plans to enter the upcoming political campaigns. It is also the time that many of the present elected officials have dreaded because of opponents they will face in their bid for re-election.

1983 is the year many will refer to as the "Political Year" . . . the year that many will sit back, discuss and enjoy politics.

Public officials - from the next Governor of the State of Mississippi down to the County-District officials - will be elected this year.

For those interested in politics, the year 1983 should be interesting and exciting.

Four years ago, in 1979, Tishomingo County had about 75 local candidates seeking various offices in county-wide and district races. The 75 did not include candidates running for Representative, Senator, Highway Commissioner and other higher offices. In most races, Tishomingo Countians had a good slate of candidates from which to choose their present elected officials.

This year, even more candidates are predicted to seek the various offices. Only time will tell.

According to Circuit Clerk Lamar Rutherford, some county candidates were out for the first day filing proper papers required, making their candidacy known to the

public. "Lyonel 'Cotton' Wade is seeking re-election as Supervisor in the First District."

"Gerald Parsons will be seeking re-election to the post of Supervisor of the Second District. Ricky A. Cummings has also qualified for this office."

"The third district supervisor office has drawn three candidates thus far, including Charles D. Lambert (present County Coroner), Donald Cain, and Wheeler Harris Rutherford."

"M.R. Whitehead is seeking re-election as Fourth District Supervisor."

"Present 5th District Supervisor, Leon Cook, has qualified for re-election."

"Qualifying for Justice Court Judges are: James J. Kirk, Cynthia E. Crane, Willie Joe Sparks, and Cecil Phifer."

"Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk, Lamar Rutherford, will be seeking re-election to his office."

The preceding candidates will publish their formal statements to the voters at a later date.

Several others have indicated that they will become candidates, but have not filed the proper papers as of press-time. The Tishomingo County News will continue to inform area voters of any changes or additions to the list of candidates as they qualify.

County Agent's Notes

Why Pecans Don't Produce

It seems like every year some homeowners in Tishomingo County ask the same question: Why didn't my pecan trees produce last year?

There may be several reasons why pecans don't produce. One is fertilization. Pecan trees are like any other crop - they need fertilizing. If you've neglected to fertilize your trees for a long period, that could be the answer.

If your trees haven't been

fertilized for several years, don't expect them to start producing immediately even if you fertilize them this year. It usually takes three to five years of fertilizing and other care to bring neglected trees back into production.

Also consider the age of your trees. Many varieties don't start producing nuts until they are 12 to 15 years old. Your tree may not be old enough to bear. Generally speaking, pecan trees don't get too old to produce nuts if they are cared for properly.

Old-timers have a saying that "if it rains during the first week of May the pecan crop will be short." That saying has some merit, because the rain may wash away pollen which is needed to produce the crop.

Sometimes the pecans themselves aren't completely

filled. The reason may be that aphids have sucked the leaves and caused them to fall. If you've ever parked your car under a pecan tree and later noticed a sticky substance on the windshield, the problem is aphids.

Several fungus diseases also may prematurely defoliate pecan trees which keeps them from producing. For more information on why your pecan trees didn't produce, call or drop by the County Extension Office.

Wet Weather Hurts Cattlemen

Wet weather over the holidays left cattlemen with more boggy grazing conditions. With wet and cold conditions, cattle feeding and winter pastures need special attention.

The wet, cold weather presents cattlemen with a special problem. While cattle need more feed during this period, grazing soggy pastures heavily may injure the grass.

If fields are wet enough to bog, cattlemen may need to move cattle around or limit grazing. Overgrazing pastures that will not hold up cattle during wet weather will reduce future grazing.

The best thing needed is a few days of mild, sunny weather to help firm up and dry fields.

Pork Producers Meet

Interested pork producers should make plans for the annual Mississippi Pork Producers Conference January 20-21 in Jackson. The conference will be held at the Metro Ramada Inn with registration to begin at 12 noon on January 20th.

The conference will emphasize ways to improve efficiency in swine herds, the marketing outlook for Mississippi producers in 1983, and the swine production outlook in the 1980s.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Plastic Dishes & Utensils

Many plastic dishes and utensils on the market today can be washed in the dishwasher. If you are uncertain whether a plastic item can be safely washed in the dishwasher - but wish to take a chance - be sure to load the item near the top and away from the heating element.

Stains can usually be removed from plastic items by rubbing with baking soda. To avoid scratching plastic surfaces, do not scour with

harsh abrasives or steel wool. Commercial cleaners made from plastic dishes and utensils are available.

A homemade cleaning solution for removing heavy stains on plastic dishes and utensils can be made by mixing 3/4 cup bleach, 3/4 cup baking soda and 1 cup vinegar. Let this stand in the stained utensil for 5 minutes. This mixture will bubble over if you are not careful, so protect surrounding surfaces. After soaking, wash and rinse items thoroughly.

A solution to deodorize plastic containers can be made by simply adding a teaspoon of dishwasher detergent to a quart of hot water. Soak the container in the solution for several hours and it should smell fresh and clean again.

Microwaves Micro-Savings

Research at several universities has shown that microwave ovens do save time and energy.

A microwave oven usually uses less energy and is faster than top-of-the-range cooking when small amounts (2 cups or less) of food are cooked. The microwave oven also uses less energy and is faster than the conventional oven. The largest energy savings occur when the microwave oven is used rather than the conventional oven.

The combination microwave-conventional oven, whether using microwaves alone or microwaves with bake or broil, is about twice as fast as the conventional oven.

When the microwave oven is used in conjunction with the conventional oven in meal preparation there is an energy savings of 42 percent and cooking time is reduced by 53 percent. When used in conjunction with the surface units, the microwave oven will provide energy savings of

only about 5 percent, but preparation time may be reduced by as much as 21 percent.

Both energy and time savings are impressive even if not as much as some ads promise.

Oven-Style Swiss Steak

- 1 2-lb. beef round steak, 1 in. thick
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 4-oz. can sliced mushrooms drained
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce

Trim fat from beef; pound with meat mallet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place in 11 x 7 x 7 x 1 3/4-inch baking dish. Top with onion and mushrooms; pour sauce over top. Cover. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 30 minutes. Uncover. Bake for 15 minutes longer, basting occasionally. Spoon sauce over beef to serve. Yield: 8 servings/about 171 calories per serving.

Conservation Notes

How much fuel can be saved on your farm by making the switch to conservation tillage from conventional tillage methods? A considerable amount according to some recent studies.

According to the University of Nebraska figures, the conventional moldboard plow tillage system has the highest fuel and labor requirements. By substituting a chisel plow, there is nearly a 23 percent reduction of fuel consumption. By using a disk for seedbed preparation, over 42 percent fuel savings has been found. The study went on to show that a 70 percent fuel savings can be realized by using no-till over conventional systems.

In a similar study conducted by Michigan State University and published in the July 1980 edition of NO-TILL FARMER, fuel savings were equated to money saved. That study showed a savings of 4.21 gallons of diesel fuel per acre with no-till farming over conventional. With a 40 acre operation, that means an annual savings of 1,684 gallons of fuel, and at a "conservative" \$1 plus per gallon, it's a big savings.

Farmers in Tishomingo County that are thinking about conservation tillage, should be considering fuel savings, erosion control, and labor and time savings in making plans for wheat crops this fall and other crops for 1983.

Contact the Soil Conservation Service about savings from using conservation tillage on your farm.

Taxpayers who invest in tax shelters may be in for an unpleasant surprise if they feel they can avoid federal income taxes using this device, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The IRS has consistently challenged the legitimacy of many abusive type tax shelters and has been repeatedly upheld by the courts.

There are two types of shelters - abusive and non-abusive. The primary purpose of a non-abusive shelter is to shelter income against tax. Generally, this is a deferral type investment such as IRA plans or other legitimate investment. An abusive tax shelter, has as its primary motive tax avoidance. There is no profit motive and generally the promotion would indicate that a large deduction or credit is allowed for tax purposes in the year of the investment.

Taxpayers should be very wary of the promotions that are offered. The IRS will be taking a close look at these and those that are determined to be abusive tax shelters will be disallowed.

Overvaluation of the product being sold is a primary concern of the IRS. These products are, upon identification, submitted to professional appraisers for an appraisal of the Fair Market Value. Once this value has been determined all affected returns are adjusted to

reflect the proper valuation. Even though the taxpayer may have already received money back in the way of a refund, the return is subject to examination and the tax may be reassessed along with the interest charge.

Local Business Activity

Edwin Lloyd Pittman, Secretary of State, has released to The Tishomingo County News the following information about business activity from this locality with the Secretary of State's Office for this month.

Secretary Pittman reported that there were 12 documents filed from the County giving notice that a creditor has a

security interest in property of the debtor. During this same period, no new business corporations located in the county were chartered.

In addition, the Secretary of State reports that no out of state defendants were served through the Secretary of State's Office with court process for law suits which originated in this County. Skeletal Remains Identified As Missing Falkner Youth

Skeletal remains found in Benton County December 27, have been positively identified as Falkner youth, Steven Brown. The identification came following examination of dental records by forensic dentist Dr. Michael West, of Hattiesburg, Jackson.

Rodrigo M. Galvez, determined Monday, January 3, that Brown, who has been missing for almost two years, died from a single .22 caliber bullet that entered the skull at the rear and exited through the forehead.

Brown, who was 15 at the time of his disappearance, was reportedly last seen on March 23, 1981, when a school friend, Mike Miskelly, dropped him off at the Bank of Falkner, about 17 miles east of where the skeletal remains were found.

Danny Ross, 15, of Corinth, discovered the remains, a gun and a piece of denim while deer hunting in a wooded area in Benton County about 1 1/2 miles past the Tippah-Benton County line off Mississippi 370.

Highway Patrol Chief Investigator Walter Tucker confirmed that the case is "definitely a homicide."

Tucker said all evidence collected by patrol investigators and Tippah County officers had been turned over to District Attorney Kenneth Coleman.

Authorities plan to present the case at a regular session of a Benton County grand jury scheduled to convene today, January 13, Coleman said.

Deer Seasons Changed By Legislature

The Mississippi Legislature passed a bill Friday morning, January 7, which has been signed into law, changing a portion of the state's remaining deer hunting with guns.

Effective Saturday, January 8, it will be permissible for Mississippi deer hunters to take deer with the use of dogs through January 15.

In addition the new law now allows the second regular gun season for deer to continue from January 16 through January 23 without dogs.

Wildlife officials in Jackson said that the action by the Legislature in no way interferes with or changes the already established primitive weapons or archery seasons which will be underway during the Jan. 16-31 hunting period.

Officials also stressed that the changes in the deer hunting period will not apply to deer hunting on any of the state wildlife management areas. Hunting on these areas are governed by statutes which allow the Commission on Wildlife Conservation to establish regulations for state wildlife management areas.

She said although some consider Christmas Holidays to be the happiest of the year, holidays can also be the loneliest time of the year for some people. "I just want to make sure there is some cheer at the homes where the

aged are staying," she said.

Mrs. Hampton's own mother, 85, is hep to spreading the good feelings. Mrs. Hampton said while she was out delivering cakes, she missed a call from her daughter in Germany. "I called mother to tell her about it and she was busy baking tea cakes for all of the grandchildren. Now, you think of that!"

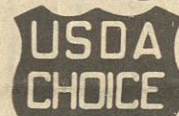
