### Wet Weather **Hurts Cattlemen**

Wet weather over the holidays left cattlemen with more boggy grazing conditions. With wet and cold conditions, cattle feeding and winter pastures need special attention.

The wet, cold weather presents cattlemen with a special problem. While cattle need more feed during this period, grazing soggy care to bring neglected trees pastures heavily may injure the grass. Also consider the age of

If fields are wet enough to bog, cattlemen may need to move cattle around or limit graze. Overgrazing pastures that will not hold up cattle during wet weather will reduce future grazing.

The best thing needed is a few days of mild, sunny weather to help firm up and dry fields.

over till systems. In a similar study conducted by Michigan State University and published in the July 1980 edition of NO-TILL FARMER, fuel savings were equated to money savel. That study showed a savings of 4.21 gallons of diesel fuel per acre with no-till farming over conventional. With a 40 acre operation, that means an annual savings of 1,684 allons of fuel, and at a 'conservative" \$1 plus per galon, it's

a big savings. Farmers in Tishmingo County that are hinking about conservation tillage, should be considering fuel savings, erosion contol, and labor and time savings in

# **Skeletal Remains** Identified As Missing Falkner Youth

Skeletal remains found in Benton County December 27, have been positively identified as Falkner youth, Steven Brown. The identification came following examination of dental records by forensic dentist Dr. Michael West, of Hattiesburg. pathologist Jackson

Rodrigo M. Galvez, determined Monday, January 3, that Brown, who has been missing for almost two years, died from a single .22 caliber bullet that entered the skull at the rear and exited through the forehead.

Brown, who was 15 at the time of his disappearance, was reportedly last seen on March 23, 1981, when a school friend, Mike Miskelly, dropped him off at the Bank of Falkner, about 17 miles east of where the skeletal remains were found.

Danny Ross, 15, of Corinth, discovered the remains, a gun and a piece of denim while deer hunting in a

wooded area in Benton County about 1 1/2 miles past the Tippah-Benton County line off Mississippi 370.

Highway Patrol Chief Investigator Walter Tucker confirmed that the case is "definitely a homicide."

Tucker said all evidence collected by patrol investigators and Tippah County officers had been turned over to District Attorney Kenneth Coleman.

Authorities plan to present the case at a regular session of a Benton County grand jury scheduled to convene today, January 13, Coleman said.
