Youth Dies Of Gunshot Wounds

A Tishomingo County youth died from a gunshot wound to the head late Monday evening, February 7, according to County Coroner Charles Lambert.

The body of 17 year old James A. "Jamie" Brackeen was discovered around 6:00 a.m. Tuesday in a bedroom of the Dennis home where he lived with his father, L.W. Brackeen, and his grandmother, Mrs. Elaine Brackeen.

The coroner stated that he had "reason to believe the shot from a .22 caliber rifle was self-inflicted," indicating no suspicion of foul play. He said that county authorities will further investigate the matter.

Young Brackeen was a member of the First Baptist Church of Dennis.

Survivors include his father, L.W. Brackeen, of Dennis; his mother, Mrs. Mae Watkins, of Iuka; grandmothers, Mrs. Elaine Brackeen, of Dennis, and Mrs. Orene Johnson, of Iuka; great-grandmother, Mrs. Mae Quillen, of Dennis.

Services were conducted Wednesday, February 9, at the Deaton Funeral Home Chapel in Belmont, with Bros. Thomas Ozbirn and John Stockton officiating. Burial was in the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church Cemetery.

RASH OF ROBBERIES HIT IUKA RESIDENTIAL AREA

The homes of four Iuka residents were broken into over the weekend while two of the owners were visiting out of town, and the other two had gone out just for a short time.

According to Iuka Chief of Police, Joel Holliman, his department received a call Saturday night at 8:05 p.m. reporting a break-in at the home of R.L. Brown, Jr. When the officers arrived at the scene of the burglary, they found that the front door of the Brown house had been kicked in, giving the thieves access to the dwelling.

Within minutes of the investigation, a second burglary was discovered at

the neighboring home of D.O. Jourdan, Jr. At the Jourdan house, glass in a back door was broken, allowing the entry there.

Around 8:00 a.m. Sunday, the Police Department was notified of a break-in at the Herman C. Gann residence, which was followed by a second report at the home of Deborah Ernsberger. Discovery of these violations were made by family members making a check of the homes since the owners were out of town at the time. Breakage of sliding glass doors provided the robbers admission at both of these locations.

Pilfering and plundering of

the premises in each theft was reported, with the crooks taking an undetermined amount of silver, gold, jewelry, and family valuables.

Local and state authorities continue examinations of facts pertaining to the cases, noting the similarities.

In a separate case reported by the law officials, at 1:00 p.m. Monday, February 8, the department was called to the residence of Mrs. Kate Horne on Ash Street, just outside the city limits of Iuka. According to information given of-

icers by Mrs. Horne, three men came to her home posing as carpet salesmen. Following admission into her home, the men wrapped the elderly lady in a roll of carpet and took an approximate \$400 in cash from the home before fleeing and leaving the victim bound. County authorities continue their search into this case and caution all elderly citizens to be extra cautious when unlocking doors to strangers.

STOLEN TELEVISIONS RECOVERED BY OFFICERS

The recovery of seven color televisions, valued at \$3,500, was made by the Iuka Police Department earlier this week, and an Iuka man is presently housed in the Tishomingo County Jail charged with grand theft.

Iuka Chief of Police, Joel Holliman, said city officers, assisted by county deputies, Don Reno and Bob Kemp, discovered the sets at various locations following a report to his department from a local t.v. repairman of a serial number match-up.

James Lambert, of Iuka, was arrested Monday, January 8, in connection with the case. Lambert was employed with a communications system and his duties included collection service and maintenance of the sets placed in the Tishomingo County Hospital. These sets, described as "19 inch color-trak RCA" were apparently taken from the medical facility during Lambert's employment with the business and sold by him to several local people, who according to Holliman "bought

them in good faith." Early Wednesday morning, authorities recovered a 25-inch color t.v. set and video recorder, along with a Royal Typewriter, which was identified by Iuka Elementary School officials as property of the institution.

Lambert has been charged with burglary of the school, pending a preliminary hearing.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Head Lice Are Cause For Care, Not Concern

Schooltime is sometimes accompanied by an outbreak of head lice among classmates.

Entomologist Doug Gaydon, with the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, said the lice are more a source of inconvenience or irritation than of disease or infection.

"They are rarely carriers of disease and there's little potential for infection from

them," he said. While head lice, *Pediculus humanus capitis*, flourish all year, winter seems to be the season during which they are most easily spread.

"During the winter hair is not cut as short as it might be in the summer, hats and scarves are being worn. When the hats are removed or when long hair comes in contact with a chair back, hairs containing head-lice or eggs may be pulled loose and provide an opportunity for the lice to be spread to another individual," Gaydon said.

"You'll find head lice in the best of families," Gaydon said. "They are not an indicator of social class or economic status. What they are is easily transmitted."

"Kids playing together, sitting on the same furniture, sharing a comb or brush; any

of these activities could allow the lice to spread from one person to another," Gaydon said.

Head lice are very picky about where they will live, and they are not the best of travelers.

"These lice live only on human heads," Gaydon said, "and they are not going to travel from the floor to the top of your head." Unless a louse is transferred from one head to another, by way of some direct or indirect contact, it is not likely to survive.

"A louse left on its own, on a chair or a comb, for more than a few hours, is probably going to die. And they don't jump from one person to another."

"The eggs, however, can last for a couple of days away from a human head," Gaydon said.

"The female louse lays between 50 and 150 eggs which are glued to the hair. If a hair containing eggs is transferred from head to head within a few days it is possible that the lice will also be transferred."

Gaydon said that when a family member notices the presence of head lice the entire family should consider themselves to have them.

The treatment for head lice is very simple. Most drug stores carry shampoos designed to kill head lice. Some of the products require a prescription, others do not.

"Get a shampoo designed to kill head lice and have everyone in the family wash their hair with it at least twice within five or six days and that should take care of it," Gaydon said.

Chicken Casserole

- 1 1/2 cups cooked chicken, diced
- 3/4 cup hard cheese, diced
- 1 small can mushroom pieces
- 1 can bean sprouts
- 2 tsp. onion flakes
- 1 tsp. diced pimiento
- 1 tsp. diced green pepper
- 1/2 cup condensed skim milk
- 1 cup chicken bouillon

Mix all together in casserole reserving 1/4 cup cheese to be grated on top. Bake 1 hour covered at 350 degrees. Note: May use turkey in place of chicken.

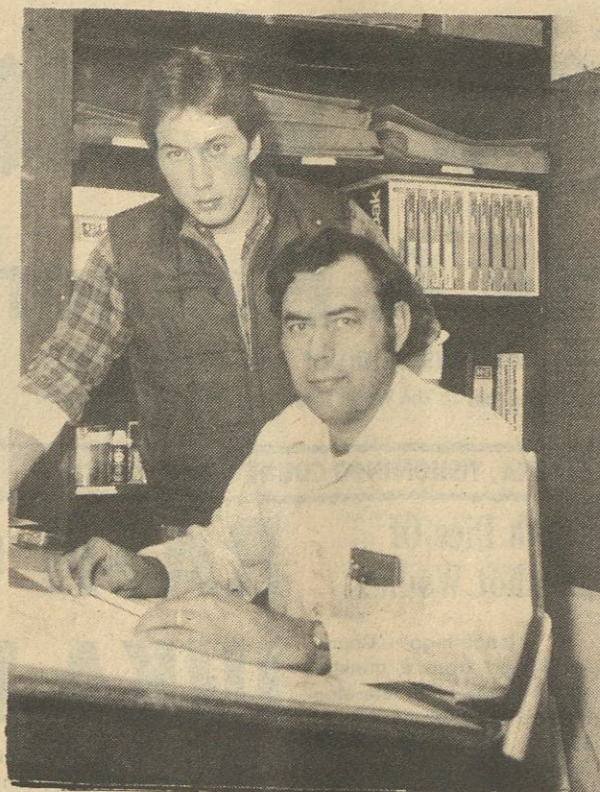

Pruning Peach Trees

Proper pruning is necessary with peaches from the time you plant the tree until you remove it from the orchard. Too often, however, trees are pruned without a clear understanding of what effect it will have on the tree. Proper pruning is good for the health and vigor of the tree, will promote maximum production and give quality to the crop. On the other hand, improper pruning will weaken the tree and reduce its potential crop.

You should begin shaping peach trees when they are planted. The reason for pruning young non-bearing peach trees is to develop a strong tree with maximum fruit-bearing area. The branches should have wide angles to the main trunk and be spaced up and down and around the trunk. Wide angled branches are stronger and less likely to split apart from the trunk when the tree bears a heavy load of fruit.

After trees are established, pruning should take place during dormant seasons -- February being a good month

At planting time a young tree from the nursery (1-year-old tree) should be headed back to about 30 inches from the ground. If the tree is less than 30 inches, wait until it grows to 30 inches and then pinch off the growing tip. The topping back or pinching out of the terminal bud will force development of lateral or side branches.

One-year-old trees and most 2-year-old trees may have developed natural lateral branches while growing in the nursery. Three or four well-developed and well-placed lateral branches may be selected and the main leader cut off above the highest of these.

During its first year in the orchard, a tree will have developed several side or lateral branches. Chose three or four wide-angled, well-placed lateral branches and remove the rest.

After the trees are mature, remember the peach tree

bears its fruit on 1-year-old wood. Pruning the mature tree, therefore, is primarily to provide for development of new fruiting wood and to control the height of the tree. The interior of the tree must be kept open enough to allow air circulation and some sunlight.

To keep the fruiting wood from developing only in the top or extreme sides of the tree, the mature tree should receive some heading or cutting back each year.

In order to produce adequate amounts of new fruiting wood, mature peach trees should have an annual terminal or twig growth of from 18 to 24 inches. If the growth is less than 18 inches, additional fertilizer is needed. If growth is more than 24 inches, fertilizer should be reduced.

Heavy fruit crops or high winds may cause some breaking of branches. Cut off all broken branches to a side

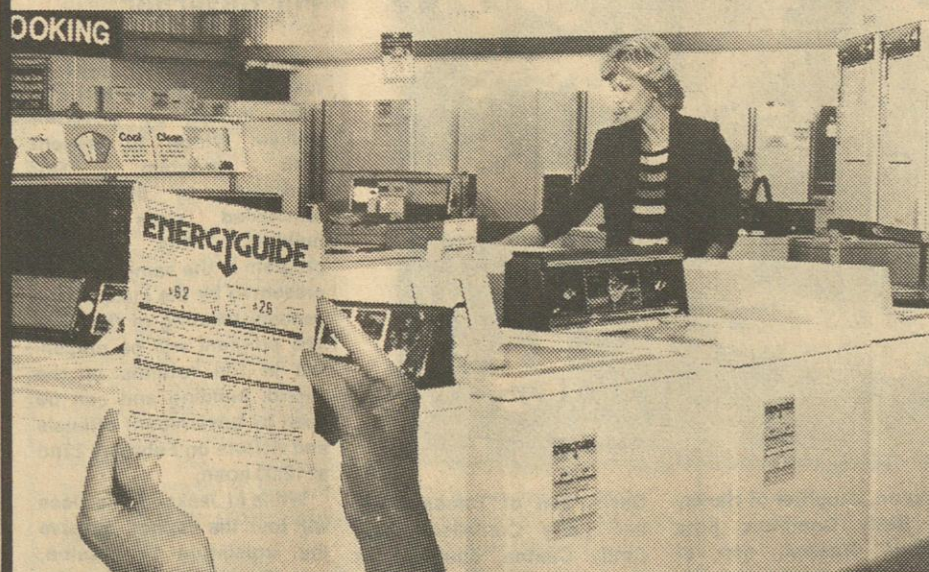

ASCS Farm News

1983 PROGRAM SIGNUP UNDERWAY AT ASCS OFFICE — Farmers in Tishomingo County are in the midst of a signup under the 1983 farm program. Signup under the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program and Acreage Reduction Program began on January 24, and will continue through March 11, 1983. Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Committee of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), said farmers are showing a great deal of interest in these programs. He said that every individual farmer is trying to get all available information in order to decide how these programs will fit the needs of his particular situation. The Acreage Reduction Program is in effect again for 1983. Generally a farmer must enroll in the Acreage Reduction Program in order to be eligible to participate in PIK. Participation in PIK can range from 10 to 30% of the base. There is also a provision for farmers to place bids for diverting an acreage equal to the entire farm base acreage. Bridges advised farmers to contact the County Office for program details. He also advised farmers to sign up early

to avoid the late rush. He emphasized that a farmer who signs up may cancel out any time during the signup period.

MARCH 16, 1983, FINAL DATE FOR ESTABLISHING INDIVIDUAL YIELD COVERAGE FOR CROP INSURANCE: Farmers who are considering crop insurance which is available through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), are encouraged to get their individual yields established based on actual production. The Individual Yield Coverage Plan (IYCP) was introduced in 1982, and provides individual farmers an opportunity to substitute their yield records for the established FCIC yield. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has been assigned responsibility for establishing yields under the Individual Yield Coverage Plan. Mr. Bridges said that farmers who are interested in proving their individual yields for 1983, must do so by March 16, 1983. He said that crop insurance is being offered in Tishomingo County for the following commodities: Cotton, Wheat, Soybeans, and Grain Sorghum. He said that individual yield coverage for any or all of the commodities. The chairman said that production records must be submitted for years prior to 1983, on which the crop was produced on a farm. He advised producers who are interested in establishing individual yield coverage contact local ASCS Office for detailed information as to the records which are needed as production evidence, crop year, which records are new, etc. Bridges stated that records will be turned over to authorized sales agents, emphasized that ASCS offices do not sell or service FCIC insurance. questions concerning sale or service of insurance must be directed to a person who is approved by the ASCS Office will be able to provide the names of agents who have been authorized by FCIC to sell crop insurance.

FIELD OF VISION

Normal vision is made up of two parts -- accurate, sharp sight when looking directly at an object, coupled with a general awareness of the scene around you. Both are necessary for proper vision. The loss of either the central vision or peripheral vision could be considered legal blindness.

There are many diseases which can rob us of either the central or peripheral vision. Glaucoma is an example of one that gradually shrinks the peripheral vision until, in the final stage, it is like looking through two narrow tubes.

It is also possible for a small portion or section of the overall field to be

lost in one eye. This is particularly hard for the individual to detect because the blank area is often filled in by the sight from the other eye. An optometrist, however, by testing with small lights or moving colored spots can detect such blind spots or field of vision losses. Advice -- if you are having problems with your central or peripheral vision, have an eye check-up at your earliest convenience!

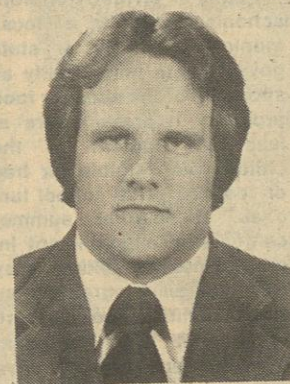

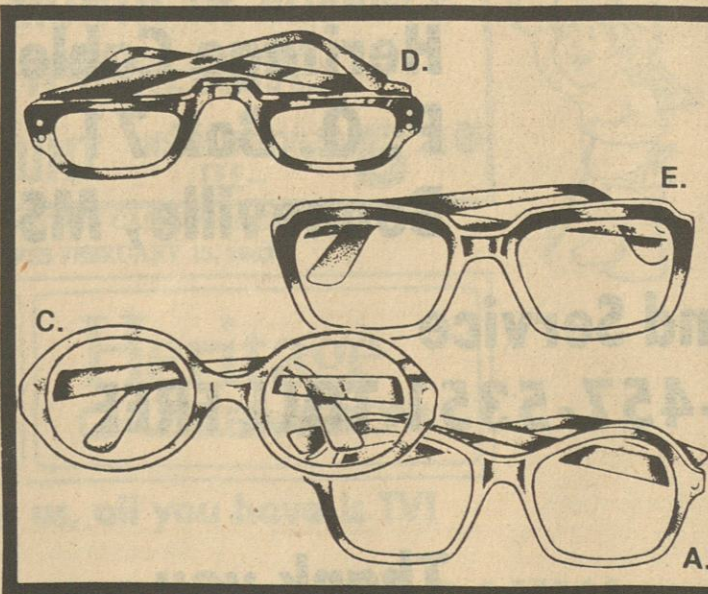

Summer Food Program

The Department of Education today announced the operation of the 1983 Summer Food Service Program for Children in Mississippi, to be administered through the Child Nutrition Program Office.

The summer food program

provides nutritious meals to children in needy areas during extended school vacation periods. In most areas, the program operates during June, July and August. Under the program, meals and snacks are served to children in such places as schools, playgrounds and parks.

Public or private, nonprofit schools and units of local, municipal, county or state governments may qualify as sponsors of the summer food program in areas where at least 50 percent of the children are eligible for free or reduced price school lunches. Residential summer camps whose enrollment includes needy children may also act as program sponsors. Qualified sponsors are reimbursed for program operating and administrative expenses up to the current rates of reimbursement.

Sponsors will earn reimbursement for program and administrative cost based on the number of meals served, times and reimbursement rates for each meal type or the actual cost of the meals whichever is less.

To qualify for the Summer Food Service Program, a sponsor must meet certain requirements. The principal

eligibility requirements include, but are not limited to the following.

1. Accept final financial and administrative responsibility for the total program operation.
2. Provide a regularly scheduled food service.
3. Serve meals that meet U.S.D.A. nutritional requirements.
4. Maintain adequate supervisory and operational personnel for overall monitoring and management.

Applicants for the Summer Program will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed or national origin.

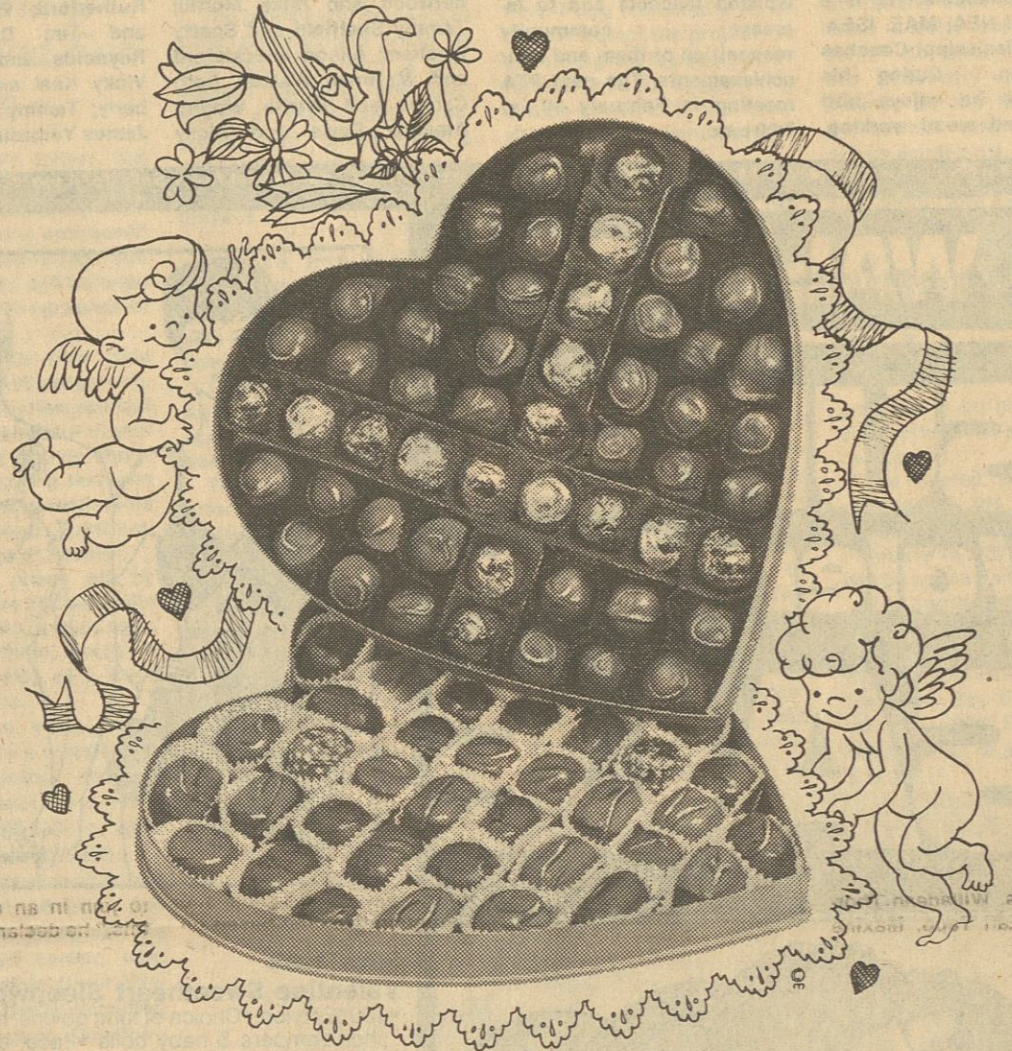
