MARIJUANA EXCHANGE FAILS

An approximate 2 1/2 pounds of marijuana, an undetermined amount of seeds (believed to be marijuana seeds), several pills, and a .32 pistol were confiscated as the local officers foiled the plans of the apparent drug peddlers. Three men were apprehended and arrested during the swap: Bobby Lucas, Alcorn County; Jimmy Kelly and Henry Williams, both listed as residents of Haleyville, Ala. Lucas was charged with possession of controlled substances; Kelly with possession of controlled substances and intent to sell a controlled substance; and Williams received charges of possession of controlled substances. The three have been freed following posting bond and are currently bound

over to the Grand Jury. The scheme was revealed to Deputy Payne early Sunday morning by receipt of a couple of anonymous telephone tips giving the proposed plans and descriptions of the vehicles intended in the use of the crime. Acting quickly, Deputy Payne accompanied by Deputies Kemp and Grimes proceeded to the designated point, discussed the set-up with store employees and were assured of full cooperation. The law officials then arranged surveillance from a side road, which provided a complete view of the super-market's parking lot. The deputies had only to wait a short time before the earlier described blue Datsun, driven by Lucas, pulled in, to be followed shortly by the late model GMC pick-up, occupied by Kelly and Williams. According to Payne, Lucas was traveling with a .32 pistol positioned in the seat beside

him. The marijuana was contained in a handbag, as were the seeds and pills.

South Central Bell Gives Option To Purchase Phones

South Central Bell's Mississippi customers now have the option of purchasing the telephones and certain other equipment they now rent.

"From mid-March through

mid-April, the company will be sending every customer detailed information and an order blank in the envelope with their telephone bill," Tom Bailey, District Manager, said. "Customers who want to buy the phones they're

now renting are simply asked to complete the order form and return it to us, and we'll take it from there."

In addition, customers who made one-time payments for Trimline R and Princess R telephones and who lease

other types of equipment will receive separate letters with information on the purchase prices for this equipment.

Bailey emphasized that the decision to buy the phones is up to the customer. Customers who do not wish to buy their phones need take no action, and their service will continue as it now is.

South Central Bell has set up two special toll-free numbers for customers who would like information on buying their telephone equipment. These numbers are: residential customers, 1-800-626-1700; business customers, 1-800-282-8883.

Here is a list of the equipment being offered for sale and the price. The figure in parenthesis is the monthly rate now charged for the same item. These are prices for the equipment customers now have in use in their homes or businesses and will be in effect until June 14, 1983. After June 14, prices will be \$15 to \$20 higher.

Equipment now sold at the Service Center is also priced \$15 to \$20 higher. Standard rotary desk set, (\$1.50) \$19.95; standard Touch-Tone desk set (\$2.50) \$41.95; standard rotary wall phone, (\$1.50) \$19.95; standard Touch-Tone wall set, (\$2.50) \$41.95; Trimline rotary desk set, (\$3) \$44.95; Trimline Touch-Tone desk set, (\$4) \$54.95; Trimline rotary wall set, (\$3) \$44.95; Trimline Touch-Tone wall set, (\$4) \$54.95; Princess rotary set, (\$2.75) \$39.95; Princess Touch-Tone set, (\$3.50) \$49.95.

The company is also starting a new plan to help prevent set losses when customers disconnect service. With the new plan, customers will have the option of taking their sets with them if they are moving to another location served by South Central Bell, or returning their sets either by mail with company-provided mailing materials or in person to an authorized drop-off point, or if keeping the sets and paying for them on their final bill. When the final bill is paid, ownership of individual line sets is transferred to the customer. Ownership of party line sets cannot be transferred because they are specially modified and cannot be sold to customers. If customers return the sets to a drop-off point, they will receive a credit of \$6.00 for the first set returned and \$2.50 for each additional set returned.

The set charges for customers who choose to keep sets will be the same as the purchase prices of in-place equipment under the new set sale plan.

State Unemployment Rate Increases To 12.4 Percent

Mississippi's unemployment rate rose to 12.4 percent in February, an increase of two-tenths of a percentage point compared to January's 12.2 percent jobless rate, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's February unemployment rate was 10.9 percent.

The 12.4 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 11.3 percent national rate for February. MESCC figures showed 129,800 unemployed and 912,800 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,042,600. The initial unemployment insurance claims totaled 21,162 in February.

Seventy-four of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in February. Of that number, five counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in February were Sharkey, with an unemployment rate of 26.2 percent; Tunica, with 24.0 percent; Winston, with 22.0 percent; George, with 20.8 percent; and Attala, with an unemployment rate of 20.5 percent.

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Issaquena, Rankin, and

Oktoberfest counties had the lowest jobless rates in February. Issaquena had a rate of 5.8 percent, Rankin had a rate of 6.8 percent, and Oktibbeha had an unemployment rate of 8.0 percent.

Forty-five counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates from January to February, while thirty reported decreases. The unemployment rate in seven counties remained the same.

NEMJC To Offer Repeat Of Computer Literacy Class

Participants will learn basic terminology and simple programming so they can communicate effectively with computer and systems personnel to obtain the types of

information they need. They will also gain insights into the total requirements for automating or computerizing operations.

Consultants with expertise in computer basics, programming, business and industrial applications of computers will conduct the sessions. During the final class meeting, participants will complete hands-on exercises using the computers.

Because the class is limited to only 30, interested persons must pre-register by March 25. The registration fee is \$40.00 per person. Continuing Education Units (CEU's) for 15 contact hours will be awarded successful participants.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

CABBAGE

Cabbage is the least sophisticated member of a rather large vegetable family, but it enjoys day-to-day popularity surpassed by only four other fresh vegetables: Potatoes, lettuce, onions, and tomatoes. In its simple way, cabbage also competes as an economical source of vitamin C with more elegant fresh fruits. Practically no one thinks of cabbage as a snack food which contributes to the popularity of fruits. Yet, only four fresh fruits

(oranges, bananas, apples, and grapefruits) are consumed in larger amounts than cabbage.

Year-round availability of cabbage -- at a relatively economical price -- has contributed to its popularity. Versatility and ease of preparation are other points in favor of cabbage.

In fresh form, cabbage is most always lower priced and higher yielding than other members of its vegetable family -- which includes more elegant broccoli, brussels sprouts, and cauliflower. Average yield of a pound of cabbage is eight half-cup servings of shredded fresh cabbage or four to five equal-size servings of cooked cabbage.

Cabbage is not only economical, it's calorie-poor and vitamin-rich. A half-cup serving of finely shredded,

raw cabbage supplies about half the vitamin C needed by well adults or children, plus modest amounts of other vitamins and minerals. For all this, a half cup of shredded, fresh cabbage adds only 12 calories to the day's total; but generous use of salad dressing can quickly offset the calorie advantage. For a similar amount of vitamin C but more calories, we might choose a baked sweet potato, one-fourth medium grapefruit, one-third medium orange, or two-thirds of a tangerine, tangelo, or baked or boiled Irish potato.

To keep the crisp texture and vitamin C content of fresh cabbage, protect it at three points: in storage, during preparation, and at serving time. Even in the fresh vegetable compartment of frost-free refrigerators, cabbage needs the added protection of a plastic bag. Wrapping cabbage heads in a moist towel also helps to prevent changes in texture and food value during refrigeration.

Some loss of vitamin C in both shredding and cooking of cabbage is unavoidable -- but shredding loss is increased by bruising the cabbage with a dull knife or shredder. Allowing shredded or cooked cabbage to stand in a moist towel also helps to prevent changes in texture and food value during refrigeration.

To protect the delicate flavor and food value of cabbage, cook it only until crisp-tender in a small amount of water. Cabbage wedges need 10 to 15 minutes cooking time in about an inch of water. Shredded cabbage needs only enough water added to prevent sticking and cooks to a crisp-tender texture in 5 to 8 minutes. Though it was once thought that cabbage should be cooked uncovered to allow its strong odors to escape, it's now considered best to cook cabbage in a heavy covered pan because this method reduces cooking time and the amount of water that needs to be added before cooking. Adding soda to cooking water is another preparation practice that is no longer recommended. While soda preserves the color of green vegetables, it also destroys much of their vitamin C content. Shredded hard head cabbage may be pan-fried (cooked quickly in a small amount of fat) though these cookery methods are more often used for loose-leaved Chinese types -- Nappa and Bok Choy.

Corned Beef & Cabbage
4 to 5 lbs. corned beef brisket
1 medium clove garlic

1 medium yellow onion, halved
2 whole cloves
10 whole black peppers
2 bay leaves
¼ tsp. mustard seed
1 medium head cabbage, cut into wedges

Wipe corned beef with damp paper towels. Place in large kettle; cover with cold water. Add remaining ingredients, except cabbage. Bring to boil. Reduce heat; simmer 5 minutes, skim. Cover; continue to simmer 3 to 4 hours, or until fork-tender. Add cabbage last 15 minutes of simmering time. To serve: Remove corned beef and cabbage from liquid. Slice corned beef; arrange on platter with cabbage wedges.

Establish & Manage Your Home Lawn

One of the strongest elements of any landscape design is the lawn. A well-managed lawn ties together the overall landscape design. But a sparse, poorly kept lawn is ugly and hard to keep. The lawn serves as a carpet which enhances the outdoor living area. Turf-grasses reduce erosion and help reduce tracking mud indoors. Turfgrass also reduces heat absorption and heat gain near the home during the hot summer months. This reduces the need for cooling and lowers your air conditioning bill.

Many gardeners enjoy maintaining a quality turf. Others despise lawn work and demand a low maintenance turfgrass. Still others are confused about how to keep a lawn. You don't have to be an expert to have a quality lawn. Neither do you have to spend all your leisure

time working on it. By learning a few basic facts about turfgrass, you can have the best lawn on the block. Also, you can choose a turfgrass to suit the time and money you have for maintenance.

The question is, "What is the best lawn grass for you?" You must make a few decisions to answer that. Choosing the best grass for you involves personal judgment based on your needs and the conditions of your property. Each variety of grass has its advantages and disadvantages. Some grow in the shade; others need full sun. Some grow in all parts of the state; some grow only in certain areas. Some require lots of time and patience; others are less troublesome. Some are fast growers, while some are slow growers.

Sound confusing? It really isn't. Simply be aware of the great versatility of lawn grasses and the wide choice of grasses you have. Remember that a quality lawn can make or break your landscape design. Learning the basics of turfgrass establishment and care, followed by a little hard work, will just about assure success.

To help you select the right grass for your lawn, a Turfgrass Selection Guide has been included in the Extension Publication 1322 "Establish and Manage Your Home Lawn". This publication is available to you free upon request by contacting the local County Extension Service at 423-3616.

Enclosed in this publication is a lot of useful information relative to such things as ground covers and lawn substitutes, tips on renovation, fertilization, weed control, insect and disease control, and many other management ideas.

I strongly recommend that you secure a free copy and file it as a ready reference on the home lawn.

water to soak into the soil, thus preventing erosion, conserving moisture for plant growth, and restoring underground water supplies. The higher and denser the grass, the better it shades the soil and keeps it cool. This reduces loss of water by evaporation and enables grass to grow better in hot weather.

Decaying grass roots, leaves, and stems and the manure produced by grazing

animals supply organic matter to the soil. This maintains its tilth and fertility, makes it more absorptive, and reduces erosion.

For more information on pasture and lawn grass come by the Soil Conservation Service located at Front Street in Iuka.

BEST TIME TO SPAY KITTEN

Female kittens mature a good deal faster than males. They are capable of becoming pregnant during the first heat period -- as early as five months -- but you should not mate your kitten until she is at least one year old.

When your kitten is in heat, she becomes restless, nervous and tense. She may roll around on the floor quite a bit. And her voice can also change, becoming more piercing and demanding. But these behavioral changes are quite normal.

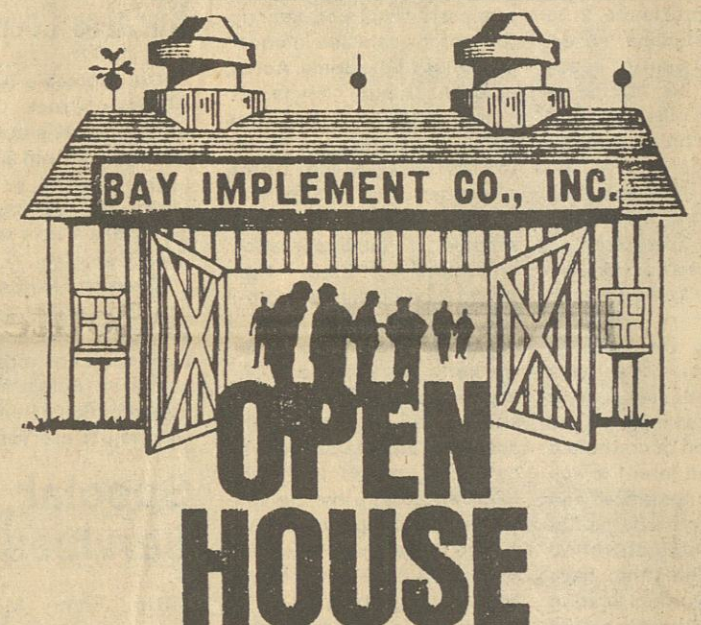
There is no reason to postpone having your kitten spayed unless you do plan to mate her. Many veterinarians feel that the best time to spay a kitten is at four to

five months, before she has her heat period. The younger the kitten, the faster the healing process.

Once your kitten has been spayed, her disposition will not change except for the better. She may become less nervous, less noisy, more relaxed, playful and affectionate.

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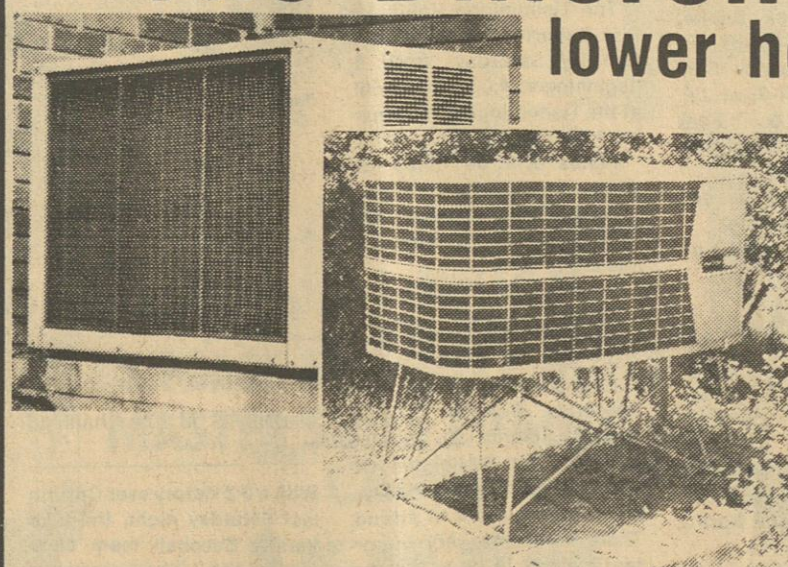
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Luttrell - Derrington Nuptials Exchanged

A rescue tool nicknamed the "Jaws of Life" may have snatched a 30-year old Philadelphia man from the "jaws of death" in Trenton, N.J. The man's station wagon had overturned and pinned the drivers head and shoulders in the accident. The rescue squad recounted the dramatic rescue.

The man was conscious but with his head and left shoulder jammed under the roof and door. The emergency medical technicians quickly decided that it was a job for the "Jaws". They went about their task to delicately rip and pry open a hole in the car so they could pull the man free.

Wayne Pietzsch, the man trapped in the car, told the rescuers that his head and chest were injured and bleeding could be spotted from several nasty cuts. Slipping the tool into place, and as soon as the hydraulic pump was started metal begins to give way. In a few minutes a hole is made large enough to slip a backboard under him and then pull him free. "Time really matters," one of the EMT's reported, "for when a person is lying there thinking about their jail of twisted metal, or car, or them, it is enough to put them into shock or kill them."

We do not now have this kind of rescue equipment in Tishomingo County. There are many who intend to see that lives are saved, some of whom you may know. It is too late for those who have already been in auto accidents, but it is never too late for those who may need your help tomorrow. 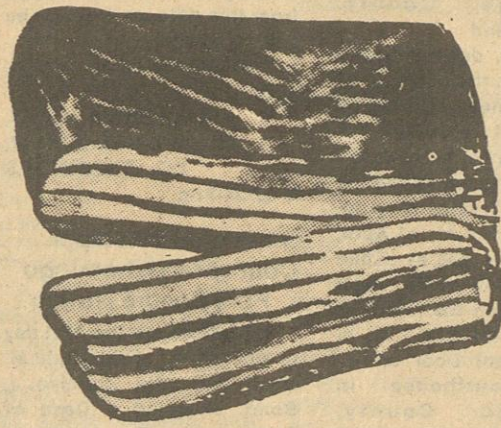

DESIGNATED CONSERVING USE ACREAGE REQUIREMENTS IN SKIP ROW PATTERN — A number of farmers have indicated that they are giving consideration to planting all or a part of their 1983 row crops in a skip row pattern. Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, cautioned that idle strips must meet certain width requirements in order to be counted as conserving use acreage. Bridges went on to say that idle strips, in order to qualify as conserving use, must be not less than the greater of 160 inches from plant to plant or the width of 4 normal rows in the field. another phase of work this week with the passing of the deadline for floor action on General Bills originating in the other House. This brings the Legislature into what might be called the final phase of work where only those bills which have survived all of the votes in committees and on the floor of both House and Senate will be going either to the Governor or to conference committees to work out the differences between the House and Senate.

Some of the House bills passed by the Senate this week are as follows: **LAW ENFORCEMENT** — Three House bills passed the Senate this week which provide for what is called alternative methods of sentencing persons accused or convicted of committing non-violent type crimes.

Two of these bills allow local district attorneys the opportunity of placing persons charged of non-violent crimes in a community work program as a condition to not being actually prosecuted. One of these bills allows persons actually convicted of non-violent crimes to avoid actually serving time in prison by making restitution to the victim and/or community service work.

DRIVING UNDER INFLUENCE — This is considered a very tough law. Once a person is arrested and

charged with DUI, about the only way he or she could save their drivers' license for 90 days is to voluntarily take the breath test and the test shows they had less than .10 percent blood alcohol content.

Persons actually convicted would lose their drivers' license for at least 90 days or until they complete a safety school and also be subject to not less than a \$200 fine on the first offense.

This bill was amended in the Senate to prohibit a reduction in the charge by the Judge. Some believe that this bill is a little too tough, and it may be modified in a conference committee where it will no doubt go.

OBSCENITY LAW — This law provides local prosecutors with the means of prosecuting and when convicted having persons both fined and/or imprisoned who have sold, distributed or otherwise dealt in the showing or performing of what is known as hard-core pornography.

APPROPRIATIONS — Most all of the appropriation bills will probably be going to conference committees where some effort will be made to cut these appropriations about \$15 million without a severe reduction in services and provide for a balanced budget.

All of these bills will have

to be put in final form by final adjournment on 3rd.

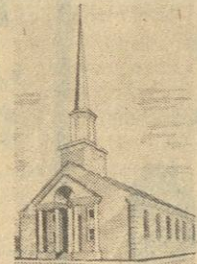

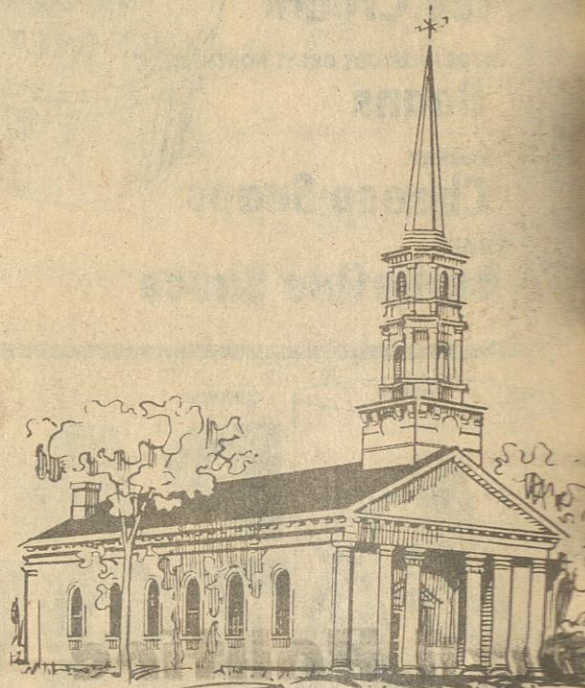

Today Southern politics are changing in both ideology and election techniques. Yet, Tishomingo County is not so fickle to modern trends. One of the last bastions of the handmarked ballot, she has a style of politics unlike that of anywhere else.

A Glance At Local Politics

This being an election year, the fever of politics will soon sweep over Tishomingo County. Several symptoms will give evidence to this quadrennial ailment.

Candidates will tramp paths to the doors of potential voters. Political cards will be passed from hand to hand like hot potatoes then thrown to the ground, as if they really did burn the hands that held them. Banners and bumper stickers will sprout forth on almost anything. Finally, promises and guarantees will flow from the mouths of politicians when they make their sincere speeches.

Yet, beneath all the hoopla and rignarole, something far more important will be taking place. The democratic system will be in action. Since America's birth as a nation, citizens have practiced the rite of democracy by casting their ballots.

Here in Tishomingo County, residents have journeyed to the polls for many

generations. However, the voting process did not only involve marking the ballot. Before going to the polls, residents spent many hours deliberating over whom to vote for. They knew the type of men (or women) the candidates were. They knew who had made what promise. They knew what was wrong with local government and had opinions on how the problems should be remedied. Often those opinions concerned law and order.

Not surprisingly the public office which generated the most interest and partisan emotions among voters was that of sheriff. In his book, DOWN MEMORY LANE, local historian A.W. Mangum states that the position of sheriff was the most highly prized county office in the early 1900's. Eighty-something years later this statement still holds true. In recent years past, the office of sheriff has drawn more

Charles C. Cresap graduated from Iuka High School in 1938 and from Mississippi State University in 1942. Following his enlistment in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1942, he was commissioned Second

Lieutenant in 1943, participated in the Battle of Iwo Jima in early 1945, and awarded the Silver Star Medal while leading a Composite Infantry Company. Cresap served 24 years in the Marine Corps in the Engineering Field and retired in Albany, Ga. in 1966.

In the fall of '66, he accepted the position of Director of Public Works and Warden of the Local Dougherty County Prison Work Camp. Cresap was married to Marie Tomlinson, of Starkville, Miss., in 1946. The couple have three children and reside on a small farm near Albany, Ga. They hope to see more of family and friends in the Iuka area now that he has retired for the second time.

TOBACCO BLINDNESS

If you or some member of your family uses tobacco to excess, this can sometimes have an adverse effect on vision because of circulation problems. Cutting down on the use of tobacco, the number of cigarettes smoked and how much of the cigarette is smoked, often has a very beneficial effect on circulation problems. It is also considered important in reducing the likelihood of heart disease and lung cancer as well as vision problems caused by poor circulation.

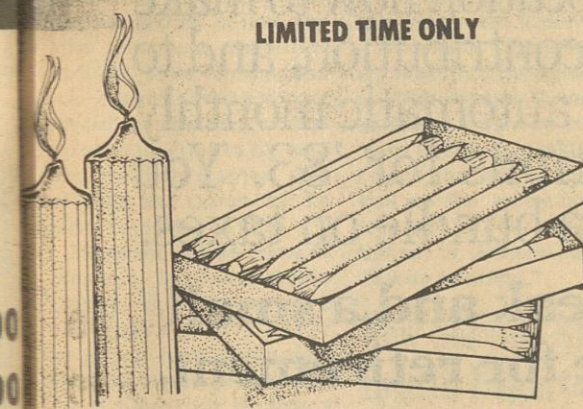
