

Chatting With Your Home Economist

CABBAGE

Cabbage is the least sophisticated member of a rather large vegetable family, but it enjoys day-to-day popularity surpassed by only four other fresh vegetables: Potatoes, lettuce, onions, and tomatoes. In its simple way, cabbage also competes as an economical source of vitamin C with more elegant fresh fruits. Practically no one thinks of cabbage as a snack food which contributes to the popularity of fruits. Yet, only four fresh fruits



(oranges, bananas, apples, and grapefruits) are consumed in larger amounts than cabbage

Year-round availability of cabbage -- at a relatively economical price -- has contributed to its popularity. Versatility and ease of preparation are other points

in favor of cabbage. In fresh form, cabbage is most always lower priced and higher yielding than other members of its vegetable family -- which includes more elegant broccoli, brussels sprouts, and cauliflower. Average yield of a pound of cabbage is eight half-cup servings of shredded fresh cabbage or four to five equal-size servings of cooked cabbage.

raw cabbage supplies about half the vitamin C needed by well adults or children, plus modest amounts of other vitamins and minerals. For all this, a half cup of shredded, fresh cabbage adds only 12 calories to the day's total; but

generous use of salad dressing can quickly offset the calorie advantage. For a similar amount of vitamin C but more calories, we might choose a baked sweet potato, one-fourth medium grapefruit, one-third medium orange, or two-thirds of a tangerine, tangelo, or baked or boiled Irish potato. To keep the crisp texture

and vitamin C content of fresh cabbage, protect it at three points: in storage, during preparation, and at serving time. Even in the fresh vegetable compartment

of frost-free refrigerators, cabbage needs the added protection of a plastic bag. Wrapping cabbage heads in a moist towel also helps to prevent changes in texture and food value during

refrigeration. Some loss of vitamin C in both shredding and cooking of cabbage is unavoidable but shredding loss is increased by bruising the cabbage with a dull knife or shredder. Allowing shredded or cooked cabbage to stand a or cooked cabbage to stand room temperature, especially after seasonings are added, also reduces vitamin C content.

To protect the delicate flavor and food value of cabbage, cook it only until crisptender in a small amount of water. Cabbage wedges need 10 to 15 minutes cooking time summer months. This in about an inch of water.

Conservation Notes

USDA, Soil Conservation Service Grasses, like all green plants, live and grow on food manufactured primarily in their own green leaves. Ranges, pastures, lawns, or other grass crops can flourish and conserve soil only as the individual plants have an opportunity to make food for their own growth.

A grass cover that is weak does not make efficient use of soil moisture and nutrients. As a result it does not provide the maximum amount of livestock feed. And it is not able to protect the soil from erosion by wind or water.

A dense cover of grass protects the soil from the battering, splashing action of rain. The leaves break up the raindrops and allow more

water to soak into the soil, thus preventing erosion, conserving moisture for plant growth, and restoring underground water supplies. The higher and denser the grass, the better it shades the soil and keeps it cool. This reduces loss of water by evaporation and enables grass to grow better in hot weather.




BEST TIME TO SPAY KITTEN

Female kittens mature a good deal faster than males. They are capable of becoming pregnant during the first heat period - as early as five months -- but you should not mate your kitten until she is at least one year old.


When your kitten is in heat, she becomes restless, nervous and tense. She may roll around on the floor quite a bit. And her voice can also change, becoming more piercing and demanding. But these behavioral changes are quite normal.

There is no reason to postpone having your kitten spayed unless you do plan to mate her. Many veterinarians feel that the best time to spay a kitten is at four to

covered pan because this method reduces cooking time and the amount of water that needs to be added before cooking. Adding soda to cooking water is another preparation practice that is no longer recommended. While soda preserves the color of green vegetables, it also destroys much of their vitamin C content. Shredded hard head cabbage may be panned or stir-fried (cooked

quickly in a small amount of fat) though these cookery methods are more often used for loose-leaved Chinese types -- Nappa and Bok Choy.



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



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A Gift Of Life To Tishomingo County Residents

A rescue tool nicknamed the "Jaws of Life" may have snatched a 30-year old Philadelphia man from the jaws of death" in Trenton, N.J. The man's station wagon had overturned and pinned the drivers head and shoulders in the accident. The rescue squad recounted the dramatic rescue.

The man was conscious but with his head and left shoulder jammed under the roof and door. The emergency medical technicians quickly decided that it was a job for the "Jaws". They went about their task to delicately rip and pry open a hole in the car so they could pull the man free. Wayne Pietzsch, the man trapped in the car, told the rescuers that his head and chest were injured and bleeding could be spotted from several nasty cuts. 



Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the **Tishomingo County ASC** Committee, cautioned that idle strips must meet certain width requirements in order to be counted as conserving use acreage. Bridges went on to say that idle strips, in order to qualify as conserving use, must be not less than the greater of 160 inches from plant to plant or the width of 4 normal rows in the field. 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





Mac McAnally To Appear At Walmart, April 2 nd. coming to terms with com-

Twenty-five year old Mac McAnally comes to Geffen Records at a pivotal point in his ten years of songwriting. His first Geffen album, NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH, has been two intense years in the making. During those two years, while still adjusting to a young marriage, he became a father to a daughter and saw his own much beloved father die of a tragic illness.

"I always thought of life as being kind of like a river," Mac says. "You could either stand on the side and watch how everybody was spinning every which way, or you could jump in and spin."

For 19 years Mac stood on the banks and watched life in the narrow rivulet of Belmont, Mississippi (pop. 1,300). Belmont, in turn, watched him. When, as the school superintendent's son, Mac dropped out of Belmont High authority over kids" to help

In 1976, when he was 19, Mac rode over to Muscle Shoals, Alabama to the Wishbone Recording Studio. There he was persuaded to play some of his songs for Wishbone owner Terry Woodford and his production partner, Clayton Ivey. Astonished, they stayed up all night, coaxing out more songs and listening. The resulting first album, MAC MCANALLY, both critically acclaimed and commercially successful, contained the top-five adult contemporary and top-40 Hot 100 hits, "It's a Crazy World." The album was a masterpiece, illuminating human nature in parables of small town life. NO PROBLEM HERE, his second album, continued to probe that theme while CUTTIN' COR-NERS, his third album (on RCA) branched into political and social satire. That album also contained "It's My Job," released as a single by Jimmy

Buffet. This, his first Geffen Records album, produced by Woodford and Ivey, marks a new plateau in Mac's growth as a person, writer, and artist. NOTHING BUT THE TRUTH, he explains, deals primarily with the art of compromise. Mac writes through what he calls a process of "excretion." "I've always been able to document things that

happen to me better through observation," he notes. "If I can draw a definite conclusion from something I tangibly, physically see happen to somebody else, then I can understand it. It's like I can unload that out of my mind. When I go back and listen to my earlier albums, each song recreates a lesson that I have learned."

Fitness For Life

Exercise: The Neglected Partner In Weight Control



Research indicates that the most effective approach to permanent weight loss is to combine diet with an exercise program. However, most people rely on modifying their food intake and exclude exercise.

Exercise is neglected because (1) we think that it stimulates the appetite and makes it more difficult to adhere to the diet; (2) we feel that exercise does not burn enough calories to make the effort worthwhile, and (3) we have become accustomed to a sedentary life style and have lost our zest for vigorous physical activity.

Today, however, at the completion point of his Geffen album, the life and responsibilities acquired since his move from Belmont to Muscle Shoals make those lessons less easy to define. "During the time I wrote

"All you can do is occasionally notice what you are trying to attain, and maybe make a couple of strokes toward it. That's where you come to understand compromise. "I'm an idealist who is probably true although the physical fitness boom that we are now experiencing is continuing to grow. Unfortunately, it has not spread to all segments of our society. Actually, we have convincing evidence which shows that moderate physical ac-

tivity lasting as long as one hour per day will not increase the appetite of people who are overweight. In fact, it has the opposite effect, acting as a mild appetite suppressant, and thereby allowing people to comply more easily with the diet.

Exercise complements the diet in other ways. An increase in physical activity burns calories so food intake does not have to be so severely restricted. A leisurely 20-minute walk will use approximately 100 calories - this is certainly not beyond the capacity of most people.

Exercise also promotes relaxation and alleviates feelings of tension and stress, which sometimes lead us to eat more than we should.

The addition of exercise as part of the weight loss program will increase the probability of successfully reaching and permanently maintaining one's desirable weight.

A number of studies have shown that overweight people eat no more than normal weight people -- they simply are less active. We have good records showing that our forefathers at the turn of this century ate more calories than we do, but they were leaner. They were physically active, mostly farmers and factory workers who had to use their muscles all day.

When buying potatoes, avoid those with a green color. This is known as "sunburn" and can be caused by too much exposure to either sun or store lights.
