According to E.L. McNatt, owner of McNatt Ford Sales, Inc., located on Highway 25 South in luka, when he arrived to open for business around 6:30 a.m. Wednesday, he discovered the 1983 Crown Victoria Ford missing.

"Best thing we had on the lot," McNatt noted, describing the automobile as, "4-door, medium blue, dark blue vinyl roof, with wire wheel covers." He placed the value of the car at \$14,081.00. "The car was locked," said the car dealer, adding, "I have both sets of keys and all the paper work."

"It has been about 3 - 4 weeks since anyone has shown interest in this particular car," the owner stated. "I have been in business at this same location for almost 11 years and suffered about 14 thefts; however, this is the first in a little over a year," Mr. McNatt concluded.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Ham

Ham is a popular meat for dinner. You can choose a ham of several types -- regular smoked ham, ready-to-eat or fully cooked or canned ham. Consider your family's taste preferences, the amount of preparation the ham requires and the cost of each serving.

Country style or cured ham is a favorite. It is not cooked during processing. Before cooking, scrub with a stiff brush in hot water, soak overnight in cold water. Cover with fresh water and simmer

until tender. You may like to slice and pan fry this ham.

Ready-to-eat, or fully cooked, hams have been cooked enough to be safe for eating, but further cooking is recommended to give the ham a well-done texture and full ham flavor. Follow packer's instructions for cooking.

Boned and rolled hams are those with the bone removed which have been rolled into an oval shape and put into a casing. Some of the cook-at-home type, and most of the boned and rolled hams are fully cooked and ready to slice and serve.

Canned hams are boneless, skinless and fully cooked. These hams are good choices for quick preparation and should be refrigerated.

The prices on hams indicate several facts. For

example, the further hams are processed before being marketed, the higher the price per pound. Prices also increase as waste is reduced. If you're to get the best buy, price per pound should reflect time needed for preparation and the amount of waste.

For the best value, consider the number of servings per pound. Shank or butt end yields 2 to 2½ servings per pound; shank or butt half -- 3 servings per pound; whole, smoked -- 3 servings per pound; whole, smoked, ready-to-eat yields 3½ servings per pound; canned, boned yields 4 to 4½ servings per pound and center slices yield 4 servings per pound.

Poultry and beef also make excellent fare for dinner. So choose the meat, then vegetables to complement. Cabbage, potatoes and onions are the usual plentiful. Broccoli, asparagus, brussel sprouts and carrots add color and texture.

The time you have for preparation will determine, to some extent, the form in which you buy the vegetables. Consider cost of different forms.

### Egg Casserole

6 hard-cooked eggs, halved lengthwise  
¼ cup butter  
2 cups cooked English peas  
¾ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon pepper  
1 can mushroom soup  
1 cup cheese, grated  
¼ cup milk

Mash yolks; blend with butter, ¼ teaspoon salt and pepper. Stuff egg whites with yolk mixture and place in shallow greased casserole. Pour peas around eggs. Dilute soup with milk; add ½ teaspoon salt. Heat: add to peas. Sprinkle with cheese. Heat in 400 degree oven until cheese melts. NOTE: 2 cups of medium white sauce may be substituted for diluted

### Manage Beef For Optimum Reproduction

The economics of producing beef cattle today demand increased efficiency. With production costs soaring, producers must identify production areas where improvements can be made.

If you consider reproductive efficiency as a percentage, looking at the number of calves weaned in relation to the number of cows exposed to the bull, the reproductive efficiency in Mississippi is about 70%.

Consider these practices to increase reproductive efficiency:

Cattle Handling Facilities - Without adequate facilities, proper health and management practices are

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minor problems initially can often develop into appreciable economic losses if not treated properly.

5. Disposition -- wild cows or boss cows can disrupt working, feeding, or handling the herd. You should identify and sell them.

5. Do I help individuals evaluate their own progress?
6. Do I give personal recognition for progress, regardless of the starting point?
7. Do I recognize the accomplishments of each individual as well as the progress of the club as a group?
8. Do I make a special effort to see that each member has

9. Do I make a special effort to see that each member thoroughly understands subject matter needed to complete his project satisfactorily?

## CARING FOR YOUR PET

### CHOOSING A HEALTHY KITTEN

Kittens are made to be irresistible. You're supposed to take one look at it, pick it up and take it home with you. If you have a choice, however, you'd probably just as soon take one home that's in good health.

In looking over a litter of kittens, it's good to keep the following advice in mind. Examine the one you're interested in carefully. Check to see that the eyes are clear and free of tears or other discharge. Check the mouth to make sure the gums are free of sores. A thick glossy coat is a good sign. Also check under the delicious fur for a firm and muscular body, free of lumps and rashes. The physically healthy kitten is likewise active, bright, and responsive.

Then, once your new kitten has passed the initial inspection, it's a good idea to take him right over to your veterinarian for a more thorough examination. If there is anything wrong with your new kitten, prompt medical treatment has the best chance of working. In any event, it is good for the veterinarian to become acquainted with your "baby" and take care of routine health-care needs.

The American Legion Auxiliary remains the sponsor and shall be known as such. The civic, cultural or other group or individual is known as patron.

Today, the public is coming to recognize water pollution and to learn that sediment is a major consideration in all uses of water and is still the largest single pollutant by volume.

Around 30 percent of today's sediment is natural background from geologic erosion. About 50 percent of sediment comes from agricultural land. Another 10 percent from eroding roadsides, construction activities, surface-mined lands, and other disturbed areas. The best way of controlling pollution from these sources is management of the land. Erosion control is possible with cropping systems, tillage practices, and land treatments, such as terracing, contour farming, grassed waterways and pasture planting. Discharges of agricultural chemicals can also be reduced by reducing the amounts of these materials used and proper disposal of pesticide con-
