"As a matter of fact, if an unmodified set is connected to a party line, it may disrupt service to all of the customers on that line," Bailey said. "Because of the technical considerations, the FCC felt it was in the public's best interest for the local telephone companies to retain ownership of party line sets," Bailey concluded.

Rash of Burglaries Continue In Community

Tishomingo County authorities continue investigation into Monday and Tuesday robberies of three local residences.

The home of Jim Brewer, located on Old 25 North of Iuka, was broken into Monday afternoon, and the homes of Richard Clark, Snowdown Road, and Wayborn Bowling, Pleasant Hill Road, were burglarized Tuesday afternoon.

Sheriff Amos Bates reported the thieves gained entry into the Brewer home through a wood box located at the end of the house. One male subject has been picked up and is being held at the jail for questioning in connection with this incident. Three guns were taken.

In Tuesday's reports, a neighbor of the Clark family evidently frightened burglars away by surprising them as they were in the act of ransacking the residence. Entrance was made at the Clark home by the thieves kicking down the back door. Several items were reportedly taken from the child's room, along with a stereo system. A full report was not available at press-time.

Investigation continues by county law officials.

In the second robbery reported Tuesday afternoon, the Pleasant Hill residence was burglarized with intruders again kicking down the back door to gain entry to the dwelling. The Bowlings have reported seven guns and a chain saw taken in this happening. No leads as to the identity of the robbers were disclosed.

The home of Dr. Jerry C. Stone was reportedly fired upon in a separate Tuesday night (8:50) occurrence. No charges had been made at press-time, although two male suspects are currently being held for questioning at the county jail. No injuries were reported; however, family members were present at the time of the small caliber assault.

Iuka Water Rates To Increase

Iuka Mayor and Board of Aldermen met in a recess meeting on April 28th, at 10:00 a.m.

The order of business included the discussion of current water rates. Since the cost of energy, labor, and material has shown a significant increase over the past several years, an approximate 20% increase of present water and sewer bills was voted and passed by the town officials.

Mayor Biggs pointed out that the state average now is approximately \$7.00 per 3,000 gallons; however, Iuka customers will only be paying \$4.50 per 4,000 gallons. Customers of the city utility service will note the rate increase effective as of May 1, 1983.

County Industries Nominated For Governor's Bronze Glove Award

Two Tishomingo County industries have been nominated by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF) for the 1982 Governor's Bronze Glove Award. The prestigious award is presented each year by the Governor to one outstanding industry in each of the state five congressional districts.

Consolidated Aluminum Corporation of Iuka, and the Heil Company in Tishomingo were nominated to compete with 17 other plant nominees from the First Congressional District. The two local plants have been recognized by the TCDF for their contribution to their respective communities, the county, and the state.

Consolidated Aluminum, known locally as Conalco, has been a steady employer since locating in Iuka in 1964. The company which is headquartered in St. Louis, Missouri, laminates

aluminum foil to paper and paperboard to use for greeting card stock, home insulation, and other various products. It employs 52 people and provides an annual local payroll of just over \$1,000,000. The last layoff at the Iuka plant was almost ten years ago, and today production is running 5 and 6 days a week, around the clock.

The Heil Company in Tishomingo continues to be one of the county's premier industries providing top wages and skilled jobs for local residents. Heil currently employs 80 workers and last year provided \$1.5 million in local payroll. The Tishomingo plant is a branch operation of the parent Heil Company out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, which employs 1500 people nationwide and had sales of \$115 million last year. Products manufactured locally include hoppers, compactors, bodies, and trailers for solid waste systems. The products are sold nation-wide and to some foreign countries.

Yesterday, high school students from throughout the

county were treated to a firsthand look at the manufacturing processes at both Heil and Conalco. Tours were conducted by plant officials as part of the county's Industry Appreciation activities. The tours provided

the opportunity for many of the students who will be entering the work force, to learn more about the manufacturing jobs present in the county.

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Designing A Home Computer Center

The home computer presents a challenge to kitchen planners and interior designers much like microwave ovens did ten years ago.

Once placed on any available countertop, today microwave ovens are being located according to the anticipated use by the family and the principal user's height. Microwave oven design has changed over the

years and the home computer's placement and advancement is bound to go through a similar design process.

Today most home computer equipment is placed on a kitchen counter or desk top so everyone in the family can use it. But its appearance and requirements for its comfortable use are prompting designers to create special spaces for this new home appliance.

The designer must determine what the home computer will be used for, and by whom. Currently their main use is for financial record keeping, recipe storage, educational purposes, and video games.

Predictions for the future include expanded home services in information, shop-

ping financial transactions, travel arrangements, even employment. More people will work at home terminals without having to go to the office. Every member of the family is a potential user of home computers.

The designer must help determine a location for the home computer which will meet individual client needs. If the family doesn't play video games, the one member handles both bookkeeping and kitchen chores, an area near the kitchen may be the best location for the appliance.

If children use the unit for play or education and a family office away from the kitchen is needed, a combination desk/homework/game center in a family room may be planned.

A movable computer center may be the solution. Furniture manufacturers are designing portable tables and carts for home computers. Such a cart with its equipment could be stored where it is used most often; the kitchen planning center, the family game area, or the home office.

In determining location and space for a home computer center, the designer must consider not only what the system consists of, but also the family's potential use and needs for computer equipment and the rate of change in this innovative field.

Many families will begin with a simple game-type unit used with the family television set, and convert to a more sophisticated system as needs change. Planning space which will serve a family over times means

building in flexibility.

In designing a work station for a particular computer system, the designer must determine the surface frontage needed for the equipment and work space, consider installation requirements for comfortable use and protection of the equipment, and plan for adequate storage for tapes or disks.

The surface frontage can be determined by measuring the devices used in the system as they will be placed for use and adding a work surface on at least one side of the terminal for material being typed into the system.

Comfortable use can be assured by planning the surface for the keyboard or com-

bined keyboard and monitor

at 26 inches from the floor; locating any separate display screen near eye level; placing the screen to avoid glare and reflections from light sources such as windows and fixtures; providing good task lighting above the working surface; and planning for a comfortable, adjustable chair.

Protection of the equipment involves installing the processor away from liquids and 'extreme' heat; making sure that air inlets and outlets on the unit are not obstructed; planning for separate electrical circuit with a surge protector and better back-up to insure an uninterrupted flow of current; and avoiding an environment with static electricity to insure proper functioning.

Adequate storage for tapes and disks involves planning sufficient, handy space of a type suitable and safe for the items to be stored. Disks should be protected from dust, heat, liquids, electromagnetic interference or compression. These needs make their storage in the kitchen questionable. If a kitchen location is considered, it must be well away from any heat-producing or water-using appliances, and the room should have a good ventilation system.

Professional kitchen specialists and interior designers will need to join the growing group of computer experts to incorporate these new pieces of equipment in their designs.

County Agent's Notes

Control Garden Insects

Insects and mites can destroy or greatly reduce the yield potential of a number of our garden vegetables. These pests may damage the plants by eating the foliage, boring in stems or roots, sucking plant juices, or attacking the fruit. Control measures are often required to maintain good quality vegetables. These measures include good cultural practices and the safe and effective use of chemicals.

Control of these pests can begin by using good quality seed or healthy seedlings. The quality of the plants should be maintained throughout the growing season. To do this, you should follow a sound fertilization and living (if needed) program for your garden site. To help prevent pest build-up you should destroy crop

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residue once the harvest is completed. This is especially true at the end of the growing season, because old plants can provide food for late feeding by pests and afford good overwintering sites.

Base the use of insecticides or miticides on the presence of harmful insects or mites. Check your garden on a regular basis for these pests. When you see these pests, select and apply the proper material to the infested plants. Thorough plant coverage is necessary to achieve good control.

Follow label directions on the product you are using. Use only if crop, pest, or specific use is mentioned on the label.

Insects can be divided into two groups, chewing insects and sucking insects. These are some of the chewing insects: ants, bean leaf beetle, blister beetles, cabbage worms, Colorado potato beetle, corn earworm or tomato fruitworm, cowpea curculio, cucumber beetles, cutworms, fall armyworm, flea beetle, Mexican bean beetle, pickle and melon worms, serpentine leaf miners, squash vine borer, tomato hornworm, and vegetable weevil. Some of the sucking insects are: aphids, harlequin cabbage bug,

spider mites, squash

stink bug, and whitefly. For information on any of the above listed insects refer to Extension Information Sheet #566, which can be obtained by contacting your County Extension agent at 423-3616.

A diet of pure, lean beef lacks many of the vitamins, minerals, and carbohydrates which a

dog requires.

Still, in spite of the best intentions, there are dogs who develop finicky eaters. There is an English Sheepdog who would not eat dog food or filet mignon but only chicken. In case like that it's best gradually mix in the foods with the preferred food. In a test of will there's a good chance you'll end up the loser.
