Zack Stewart For Hwy. Commissioner North Dist.



Zack Stewart, a candidate for Highway Commissioner of the Northern District, authorized this newspaper this week to carry his formal statement to the voters of this area. Mr. Stewart, a New Albany building contractor and former Mississippi Director of the Appalachian Regional Commission, received almost 47 percent of the vote in his race for this office four years ago.

Stewart, a 45-year-old father of four, is married to the former Betty Jo Jagers. Mrs. Stewart is managing editor of the New Albany Gazette.

In his statement to the voters Mr. Stewart said cooperation and credibility are two important assets now lacking in the Highway Department which he can add.

"We must promote an atmosphere of cooperation within the Highway Department among the people who work there and among the other Commissioners who serve," Mr. Stewart said.

"And we must improve the attitude of cooperation with the Executive and Legislative branches of the State as well as those federal officials and agencies who have association with the Highway Commission."

MASKED BANDITS STAGE ARMED ROBBERY IN IUKA

An Iuka gas station owner, open for business Sunday night, was allegedly robbed of \$438 cash while held at gun point by two male suspects who also attempted to force him into their get-away vehicle.

Both city and county law officials were summoned to the scene following the incident and search is underway for the pair. It is believed the two were traveling in an old model green Ford van bearing Alabama license tags.

John Paden, owner of the Pan-Am Amoco Service Station, located at the intersection of U.S. 72 and MS Hwy. 25 in Iuka, said he was alone in the back of his place of business around 8:15 p.m. May 8, when two men entered and motioned for him to come to the front. "One of them was tall and slim and the other was fat," he said. When asked if he could identify them, he responded, "It was dark and they had on gloves and masks."

"The slim one did all the talking," he remembered. "He told the other one to get the money out of my front right

pants pocket." Paden noted the fat bandit had a gun pointing at him (Paden), and, "He never did say anything." The attendant continued, "The slim man dragged me out to the van and while I wrestled with him, the fat one got money from the cash register."

"I jerked loose from him at the back of the van," he related, saying that he incurred a skinned knee during the scuffle preceding the departure of the thieves in the described "old model green Ford van". Paden said the pair headed east on Hwy. 72.

An estimated \$438 cash was reported taken from the 62-year old station owner; \$400 from his pocket and \$38 from the register.

A lifetime resident of Tishomingo County, Paden has been owner of the Pan-Am for 37 years, and reported Sunday's episode was his first robbery at the business.

Joint Effort To Stimulate Economic Development

Governors William Winter of Mississippi and Lamar Alexander of Tennessee will join together June 7 to help stimulate economic development and to call attention to the nearly completed Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway and the Yellow Creek Port area.

The two Governors will visit Corinth, the Yellow Creek Port and Pickwick State Park during a busy day designed to help attract new industry and new jobs for Prentiss, Tishomingo, Alcorn and Tipah counties in Mississippi and Hardin and McNairy counties in Tennessee.

John W. Fitzwater, publisher of The Daily Corinthian, chairman of the conference steering committee and the overall conference,

said regional and national media have been notified about the conference and added "it is unique to have two Governors coming together on both sides of a state boundary to promote common economic development. It is likely that it won't go unnoticed by the national TV and newspaper people."

Fitzwater said it was the hope of the steering committee that the day long conference would be a beginning for more joint efforts and cooperation between the two states and the area counties of both states. "Employment knows no political subdivision boundary, and neither does unemployment. We now have a great economic resource right here in our backyards. It can be an

economic boost for all of the counties in this geographic area. But it won't happen without push and pull from all of us. This is the beginning of that push."

The two Governors and other attendees will travel from Corinth to Yellow Creek Port in special gondola cars on the Corinth-Counce Railroad, which will enable them to view the area set aside for an industrial park at the port.

Congressmen Jamie Whitten of Mississippi and Donald Sundquist of Tennessee have also been invited to attend.

Enjoy Strawberries Now or Later

Fresh strawberries can be served now or frozen for winter enjoyment.

Fresh strawberries are an excellent source of vitamin C and are low in calories. One cup of strawberries provides almost 150 percent of the recommended daily allowance for vitamin C, and only 55 calories.

Frozen strawberries, if properly prepared, stored and thawed, will retain most of

their vitamin C.

Strawberries freeze with or without sugar or sugar syrup. However, texture, color and flavor are usually better when sugar or syrup is used.

If you want to make preserves or jam at a later date, or if you're limiting your sugar intake, freezing the berries without sugar is best.

Choose firm, ripe strawberries with a solid red color and bright green caps. If the container has red stains, the berries may be overripe or have been crushed.

To prepare the berries, wash them gently and quickly in a bowl of cold water. Lift the berries from the water, letting the sand and dirt stay in the bowl. Repeat two or three times until water is clean, then drain well. Remove caps after the berries

To freeze with sugar, add three-fourths of a cup of sugar to one quart (1-1/2 pounds) berries and mix thoroughly. Turn the berries gently with a large spoon until all are coated with sugar and juice.

Pack the berries in a moisture-vapor-proof container. Fill the containers leaving headspace at top (one-half inch for pints and one inch for quarts). Place a small piece of crumpled freezer paper or waxed paper

The process of firing and painting the pieces must be repeated several times to achieve a deep, lasting color. on top to hold the berries under the juice. Be sure the seal is airtight. Freeze as quickly as possible at 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

To freeze whole berries without sugar, pack into containers, leaving one-half inch headspace. To help preserve the bright red color, cover the strawberries with water containing one teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid for each quart of water. Seal and freeze.

Fresh Strawberry Pie

1 (9-inch) baked pastry shell
1-1/2 quarts fresh strawberries
1 cup sugar
3 tbsp. cornstarch
2 tbsp. lemon juice
1 cup whipped cream, or whipped topping, if desired

Make pastry shell; cool. Wash and cap berries. Set aside half of them (the best ones). Mash the other berries. Mix sugar and cornstarch; add to mashed berries. Cook 5 to 6 minutes or until clear and very thick. Stir in lemon juice. Cool. Select a few of remaining berries for garnish. Add the rest, whole or cut, to cooled mixture. Pour into pastry shell. Garnish with whipped cream, if used, and

whole strawberries. Yield: 1 (9-inch) pie. Note: If strawberries are tart, omit lemon juice.

Ants On The Move

The warm temperatures and high soil moisture are signs that fire ants are more active. They also will be easier to control because most of them are in the upper part of their mounds.

Few places are immune to fire ants. They invade lawns, gardens, playgrounds, school yards, cemeteries, farm crops, homes, and any other place where they can get into the soil.

Two insecticides are available that will do a good job of controlling fire ants. One is the granular bait Amdro. Amdro is about 90 percent effective and may be used only on pastures, range grass, lawns, turf, and non-agricultural lands.

Amdro is slow acting and may take up to four months to wipe out a large mound. You may need to re-treat after four months. Usually the queen and some of the worker ants are killed in two to four

weeks. To apply Amdro, distribute the recommended rate three to four feet around the base of an undisturbed mound. You can apply the material broadcast over a larger area or as a mound treatment.

The other material is diazinon. It can be used around the home and in gardens. Diazinon can be used as a surface spray, as a granular bait, or as a mound drench. Don't disturb the mounds when applying.

Drenching or wetting the mounds sometimes works better in killing adult and immature ants. Wet the mound thoroughly and repeat the application if you see ant activity one to two weeks after the treatment.

Always read the label before applying any insecticide. For more information, contact the County Extension Office.

Garden Tips

This month and June are probably the busiest times of the year for home gardeners. Activities that need attention include harvesting, planting, weeding, spraying, and watering.

Vegetables need care and attention to produce to their full potential. You don't want to neglect them and pay later with a short crop or low quality vegetables.

Don't lose leafy greens to warm weather. Harvest before they lose quality. You can

hasten maturity of onions by using a turning fork to lift the bulbs a little and break some roots. But don't bend the tops over.

As soon as corn is harvested, chop the stalks and turn them under to add organic matter to the soil. Then prepare the area for planting other crops such as winter squash, pumpkins, broccoli, cauliflower, and cabbage.

Use an organic mulch such as pine needles, compost, or old sawdust around tomatoes, eggplants, and peppers to control weeds and save soil moisture. If you used black plastic to get plants started early, cover it lightly with pine needles before the heat of summer.

Keep tomato plants tied to keep them off the ground. Sucker the plants to produce

a better fruit crop and keep in dry spells to keep the plants from drying. Keep plants sprayed to control aphids and worms.

CARING FOR YOUR PET

ON PUPPY TEETHING

Beginning at the age of about four months, puppies begin to lose their baby teeth as the adult teeth push through the gums. It is quite normal for puppies to go off their feed during this period, and even to develop mild diarrhea. Since their gums are sore, it might be advisable to switch to a softer, blandier diet than the one your puppy is having trouble with.

At the same time, most puppies like to ease their sore gums by chewing on something soft -- possibly even human flesh. As much as you may sympathize with your puppy's distress, it might be wise to discourage him from this habit before too much of your anatomy is

destroyed. Hard-rubber toys and raw-hide bones are a good substitute.

If the baby teeth have not fallen out by the time your puppy is 7 or 8 months old, you should take him to your veterinarian. If they are left in, they can impede the permanent teeth and the puppy will be left with a double row of teeth or crooked teeth. If they are not removed by a professional, there is a chance that they can break off at the roots and cause complications.
