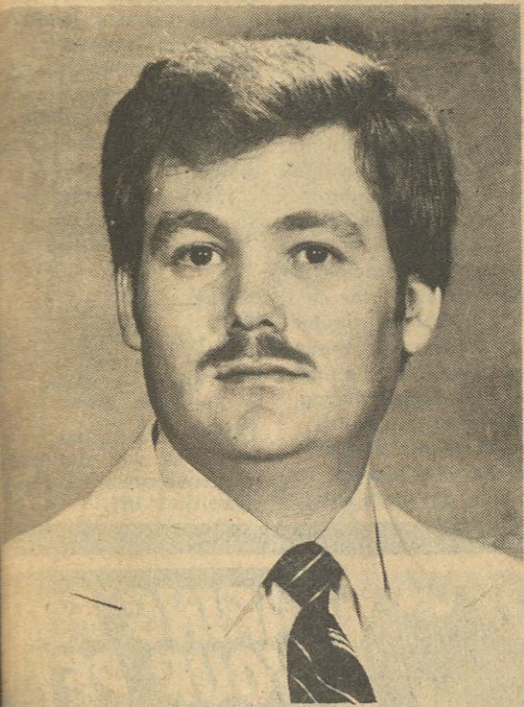

Reduction In Natural Gas Rates

Alabama - Tennessee Natural Gas Company will file with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission revisions to its existing rate schedules to reflect a reduction in natural gas rates to its customers in the Tennessee Valley. The new rates are proposed to be effective May 1, 1983, and will include a reduction in the commodity charge of 49.12 per thousand cubic feet of natural gas resulting in a commodity rate of \$3.7192 per thousand cubic feet to the G-1 customers and a rate of \$4.1312 per thousand cubic feet to the SG-1 customers. The G-1 Demand Charge remains at the present level.

The customers to benefit are Selmer and Hardin County Gas Company in Tennessee; Russellville, Tusculumbia, Sheffield, Florence, Decatur, Huntsville, Athens, Hartselle, Cherokee, Moulton, North Alabama Gas District, and Lawrence-Colbert Counties Gas District in Alabama; luka,

Tishomingo, and North Mississippi Natural Gas Corporation in Mississippi.

The proposed reduction will be subject to approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. This reduction follows a similar reduction applied for on May 4, 1983, by Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company, Alabama-Tennessee's primary supplier. The reduction is a result of an emergency gas purchase policy recently implemented by Tennessee Gas Pipeline Company with respect to the purchase of natural gas from its producers/suppliers.

As the primary supplier of natural gas to the people and industries of the Tennessee Valley, Alabama-Tennessee is pleased to make this announcement. We believe that this reduction in the price of natural gas will be extremely beneficial to the economy and will provide a stimulant to encourage industrial growth and a resulting benefit to the people in this area.

Dennis Youth's Body Recovered In Creek

The body of Ralph Jeffrey Moore, 17, of Dennis, was discovered early Monday morning following a 15-hour search by Prentiss County law officers and volunteers, in the Little Brown Creek near Marietta.

The youth, a passenger in a pick-up truck, driven by his cousin, was thrown from the vehicle, which collided with a bridge guardrail, on Siloan Road, located about 4 miles east of Marietta, around 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon. Moore's brother, Scotty, was also a passenger in the pick-up. He, along with the cousin, was taken to the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Booneville where they were treated for minor injuries.

The name of Moore's cousin was unavailable. Moore was a student at Belmont High School.

Services were conducted Tuesday, May 17, at the Old Bethel Methodist Church

with the Reverends Rodney Borders, James Smith, and Paul Stacy officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery. Deaton Funeral Home in Belmont was in charge of the arrangements.

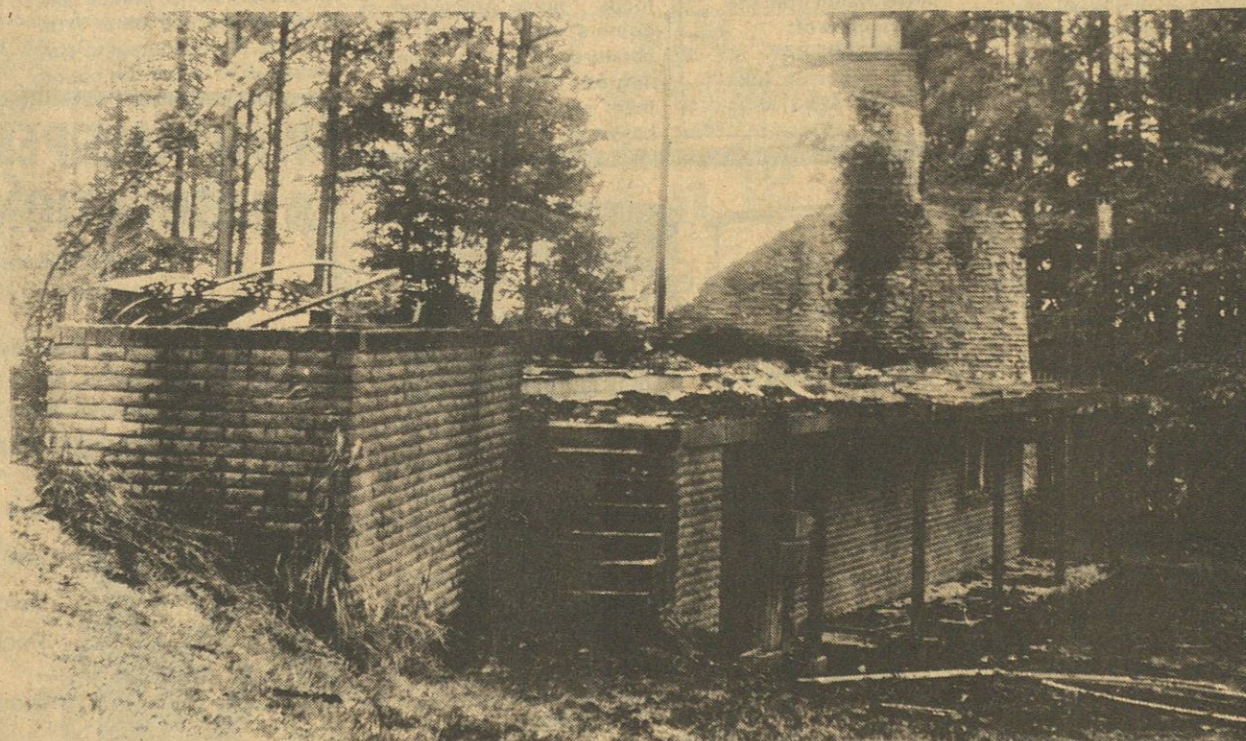

Flames Destroy Home . . . Hospitalizes Owners

Aaron and Lucy Garrett both incurred major burns in an attempt to salvage personal items from the blaze that ripped through their relatively new 3 bedroom, 2 bath home, located on Turnpike Hill Road Saturday night. The owners remain hospitalized at press-

time; he at Tishomingo County Hospital with various injuries to his face, head, feet and legs; however, Mrs. Garrett was transported to the Greenville, Miss., Burn Center suffering with burns covering 26% of her body. According to family members, the couple's two teenaged children were out

for the evening, leaving their parents alone at the time of the 8:30 - 9:30 fire, which was believed to have ignited in the attic section of the bi-level house. Danny Lynch, volunteer with the North Crossroads Fire Department, said the Second District Unit arrived on the scene approximately nine minutes

following notification of the fire. He said the Burnsville Volunteers served as back-up. The firemen were successful in their attempts to save the county school bus parked alongside privately owned vehicles in the area of the fire, but the flames were too far advanced to save the house, which was termed a "complete loss".

Corps Invites Bids on Lock Maintenance

The Nashville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers plans to issue invitations for bids for the painting of the miter gates at the Wilson and Wheeler Locks in luka.

Both projects are located on the Tennessee River. Wilson Lock is near Florence and Wheeler Lock is near Burnsville.

The work to be performed on the main lock at Wilson will be to paint the lower miter gates as well as the middle and upper gates of the auxiliary lock. The estimated cost for this work is within \$10,000 to \$500,000.

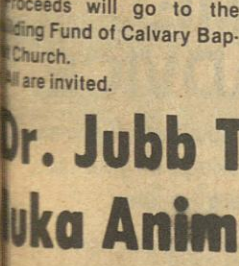

Chatting With Your Home Economist

How To Store Canned Foods

Theoretically, canned and dried foods can be safely stored indefinitely, as long as there's no problem with broken seals on canned goods or mold growth on dried foods. However, long storage will reduce the

quality and nutritive value of both canned and dried foods.

To minimize nutrient and quality loss, store containers of canned and dried foods in a clean, cool, dark, dry place. For best flavor, texture and color, try to use most canned and dried foods within a year.

The primary nutrients that are lost during long or warm storage are vitamin C and thiamin. Research has shown that losses of these vitamins in home canned foods is minimal over a year's time if food is stored at 45 to 60 degrees Fahrenheit in a dry, dark place. But, if stored at 85 degrees Fahrenheit, losses of one-third or more of vitamin C

safety recommendations that are with operation manuals and signs on equipment. Use the seat belts on ROPS equipped tractors and follow the signs on the tractor to avoid rollovers. Do not allow children on tractors or in work areas or fields.

Read pesticide labels for safety precautions. Good shop or animal handling facilities and training workers will help avoid accidents. Most accidents happen when a breakdown occurs or you get in a rush. One example is turning too fast on the turnrows. This causes tractor overturns. During these problem times, take the time to use safety. Repair, unclog, or get pulled out of a stall.

Many accidents can happen on the farm and do. To avoid these, get more safety

Safety Precautions With Insecticide

1. Keep insecticides in a safe place especially from children.
2. If you spill any of the insecticide on your body with soapy water immediately. Wash all skin after dusting or spraying.
3. Wash all food before eating.
4. Follow directions on label.
5. Wear protective clothing while applying insecticides.

CAT RESPIRATORY DISEASE

Feline respiratory disease is highly contagious to unprotected cats and should be of major concern to every cat owner. It is one of the most frequently occurring problems that can affect your cat and can result in serious illness or, in some cases, death.

Since respiratory disease can be caused by any of several organisms, symptoms may vary from mild coughing and sneezing to a sometimes fatal pneumonia. Runny eyes and nose, fever, depression, lack of appetite, and ulcers of the mouth and tongue may also be indications of a respiratory disease. If your cat shows any of these symptoms, you should consult your veterinarian immediately.

Through laboratory tests, he or she can make a positive diagnosis.

However, prevention is really the best step to take against these diseases. Vaccines are now available which can protect healthy kittens against some of the major causes of feline respiratory disease. The best age to begin vaccination is about nine weeks of age with subsequent vaccinations as necessary. An annual booster is recommended for all cats.

KEEPING UP WITH ASTIGMATISM

Astigmatism usually occurs when the shape of the front of the eye is more oval than round. Exactly why this happens is not known. Some theories say it is an inherited condition, others developmental. Still others blame such factors as poor lighting, incorrect posture or increased amounts of close work.

Astigmatism is most often corrected by prescription eyeglasses. Now, there are also contact lenses which are made specially to match the special shape of the astigmatic eye. Whichever lenses are prescribed, there is usually a period of adjustment during which objects may look distorted, slanted or out of position. After that,

vision is substantially improved.

The degree of astigmatism usually does not change rapidly, but gradual changes will generally occur. This is particularly true for school age youngsters and elderly persons. Regular optometric examinations are the best way to keep on top of things. If your astigmatism has progressed, your optometrist may change your prescription to compensate for the change.

and thiamin may be expected during a year's storage.

Although cool storage is recommended, avoid storing canned foods where they might freeze. If there is danger of freezing, insulate the jars by wrapping them with blankets, cardboard, or newspapers.

Unless the seam is damaged or the jars break, freezing won't cause canned foods to spoil, they won't have the same quality you'd expect from properly stored foods. Freezing doesn't hurt dried foods, although repeated freezing and thawing isn't recommended.

Dark storage areas are recommended because light can cause some foods to darken. If your cool storage space isn't completely dark, wrap each jar in newspaper or store the jars in the carton they came in.

A dry storage area is recommended because dampness can cause jar lids to rust and eventually break the vacuum seal, allowing spoilage. If screw bands are left on jars, or if you use one-piece lids, rust development may make it nearly impossible to remove the screw bands or lids. In the case of dried foods, dampness may cause mold growth and spoilage.

Even if your storage conditions are ideal, careful rotation of your stock is very important. Be sure to put the date on all jars, cans, and packages and use the ones with the earliest date first. It's also important to check canned and dried foods in storage periodically for any visible signs of spoilage like bulging lids, fermenting, or mold growth.

Finally, it's best not to store any canned or dried foods - home processed or commercial - where temperatures are more than 85 degrees Fahrenheit. Keep them away from hot pipes, hot-water heaters, furnaces,

or direct sunlight.

Buttermilk Baked Chicken
4 to 6 half chicken breasts, skinned
1-1/2 cups buttermilk, divided
3/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup margarine
1 (10-1/2 oz.) can cream of mushroom soup

Dip chicken into 1/2 cup buttermilk. Then roll chicken in mixture of flour, salt and pepper. Melt margarine in a 9 x 13 inch pan. Place chicken in pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 30 minutes, uncovered. Turn chicken and bake for 15 minutes more. Turn chicken again and pour mixture of one cup buttermilk and mushroom soup over chicken, baking 15 minutes more. Remove chicken to platter and garnish with parsley. Serve with pan gravy. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

ASCS Farm News

STATE ASCS DIRECTOR ENCOURAGES CONSERVATION ON PIK LAND — Participants in the Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) and the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program have an unusual opportunity to improve the land which is designated as conservation use acreage, according to T.M. Barron, State Executive Director of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) in Mississippi. He said the agreement requires that this land be protected from erosion, insects, weeds and rodents. He and other farm leaders are encouraging participants to utilize the opportunity not only to protect this conservation use acreage, but to improve it.

"Hold Our Topsoil" (referred to as "HOT"), has been adopted by Governor William Winter as the watchword for agriculture in Mississippi. He has established a steering committee to promote conservation measures with the goal of holding our topsoil. The Food and Agriculture Council of Mississippi, which is composed of the heads of USDA agencies in the State, has endorsed and is fully supportive of this effort.

ASCS Director Barron, who is also Chairman of the Food and Agriculture Council, said "Mississippi is third in the Nation in the loss of topsoil per acre. This is a loss which must be reversed if our soil in this State is to continue in productivity. Therefore, each farmer who is participating in the 1983 ARP and PIK programs is encouraged to give careful consideration to establishing conservation practices which will do the best job of protecting and improving his designated conservation use acreage." Following are some eligible covers and practices:

1. Annual, biennial, or perennial grasses and legumes. Most grasses and legumes are eligible cover whether seeded or volunteer, except soybeans. Certain sudan grass/grain sorghum hybrids are eligible. The County ASCS office should be contacted if such a hybrid is being considered. FEDERAL CROP INSURANCE — Kansas City, Missouri, April 20 - May 20 is the final planting date for insured corn in Tishomingo County. Acres of corn planted by May 20, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be

reported by June 10 to receive full crop insurance coverage.

Acreage planted after May 20 must also be reported on the June 10 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

Farmers unable to plant prior to May 20 because of excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower bushel-per-acre guarantee due to the late planting.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.

Farm Safety

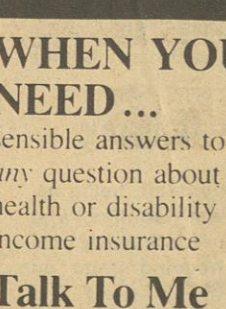
During our spring rush, farmers should be more aware of a problem that affects all farmers and workers. Fifty farmers are killed yearly in farm work accidents. Few other occupations will compare in loss of life, physical disability, medical cost, equipment damage, and other losses.

About one out of ten farms in Mississippi will have an accident. Over 4,000 accidents, costing more than four million dollars in losses, are expected this year. Tractor overturns, runovers, and roadway accidents account for most deaths. Field machinery, augers, and power take off drive equipment permanently injure hundreds each year. Accidents while repairing or adjusting machinery, working livestock, electrical shock, falls, and pesticide poisonings are other threats to the farm worker.

More than 50 instructional programs are offered at the Waco campus ranging from Automotive Mechanics to Nuclear Technology.

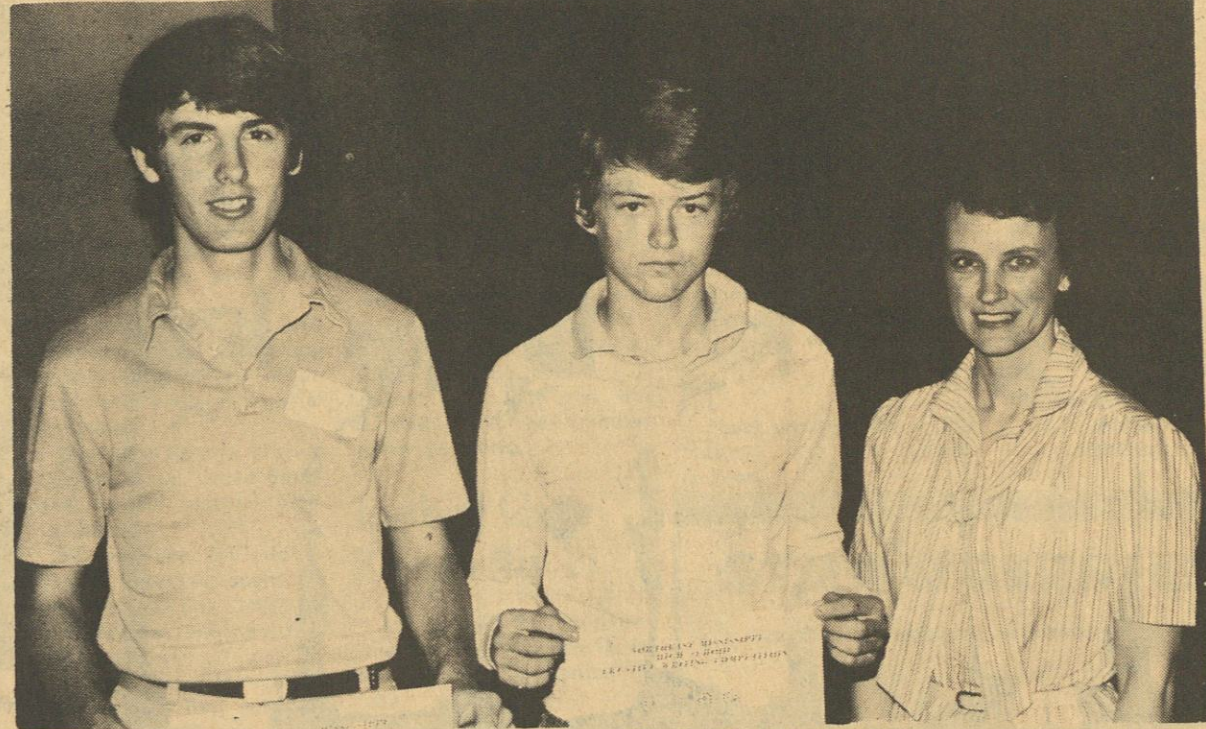

"Acres of cotton planted by May 25, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by June 10 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says Goss.

Acres planted after May 25 must also be reported on the June 10 acreage report as being planted too late for in-

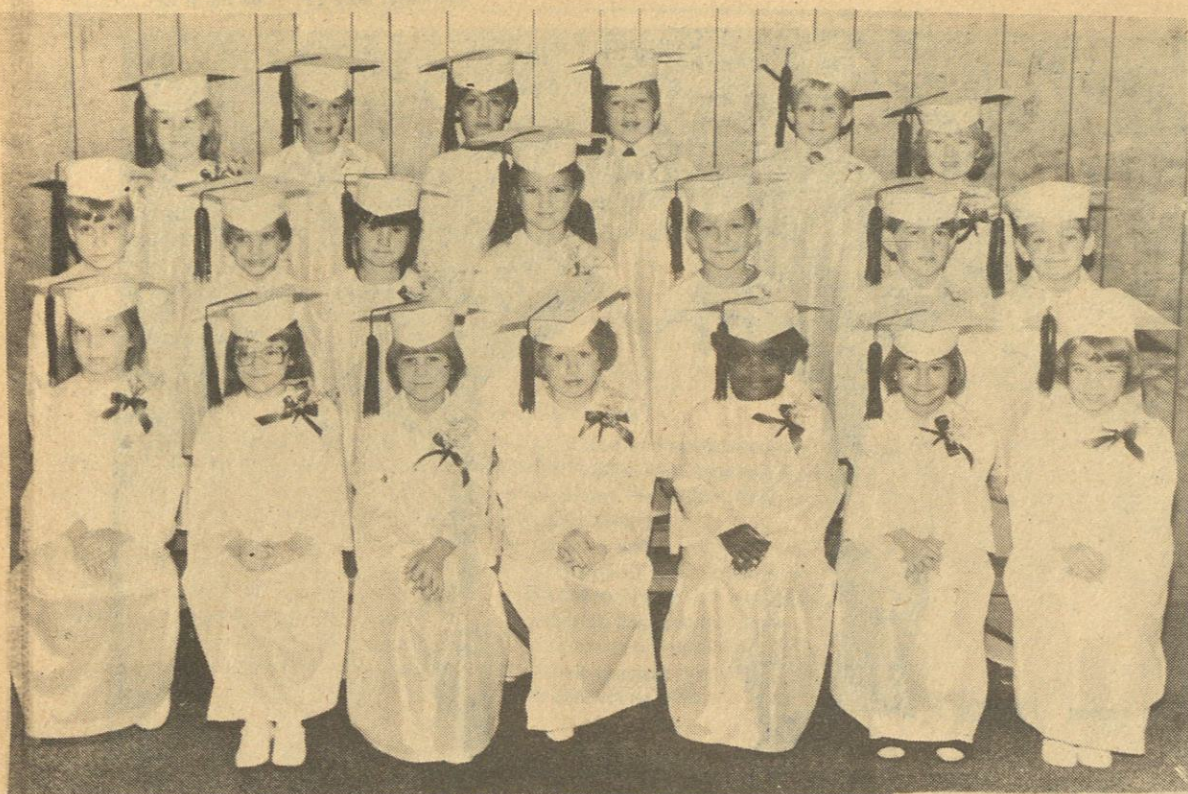

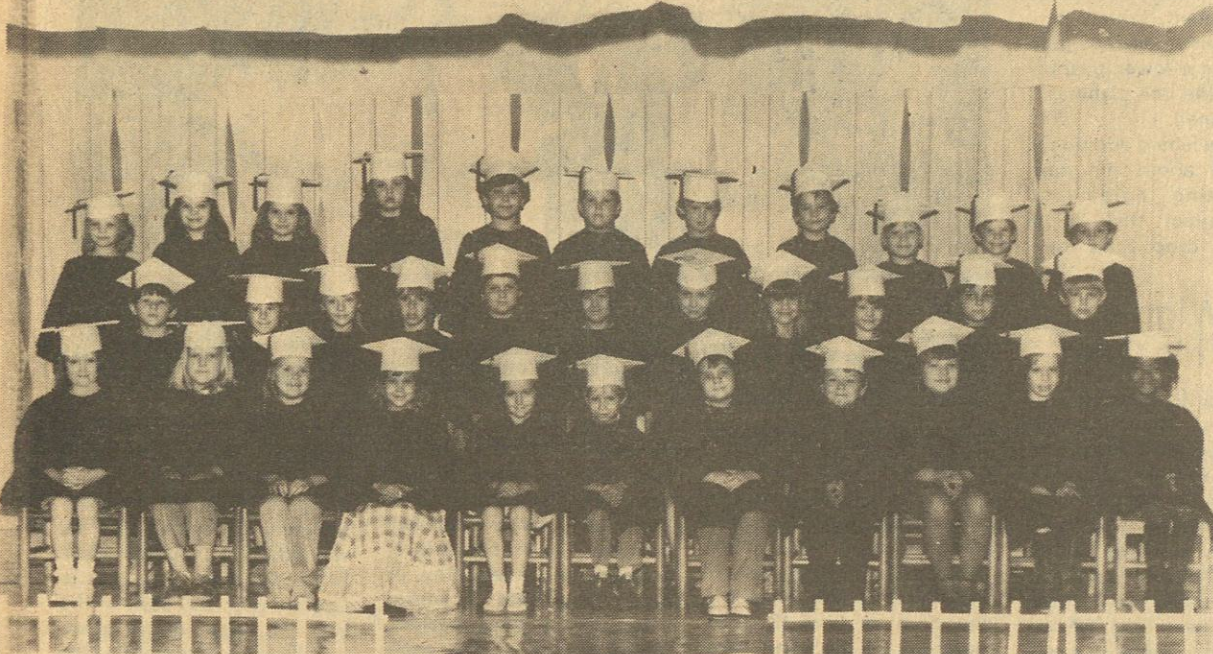

ASCS Farm News

RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF PIK ACREAGE: Participants in the Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) and the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program continue to raise

questions concerning the grazing and harvesting restrictions on conservation use acreage, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee. He said the general rule is that the land must be out of crop reduction during the year. The following specific points concerning use of this acreage are listed as a means of answering some of the questions:

1. Grazing is not permitted during the period May 1 - October 31, 1983. (This nongrazing period is considered to be the normal cropping season.)
2. Harvesting of a crop from the acreage is not permitted. (There are some exceptions as noted in 3 below.)
3. As a general rule harvesting of crops from conservation use acreage is prohibited. There are some exceptions such as:
 - a. Harvest of honey from bee colonies located on this acreage is permitted.
 - b. Harvest of fish is permitted except during May 1 - October 31, 1983.
 - c. Noncommercial recreation is permitted.
 - d. Winter vegetables could

be harvested period to February 28, 1983, with COC approval.

Bridges emphasized that the farmer is responsible for seeing that the grazing and harvesting restrictions are complied with. He went on to say that the participant must maintain the acreage in an approved conservation use to protect the land from erosion, insects, weeds and rodents. The participant is also required to clip or bushog as necessary to control weeds and bushes.

The Committee Chairman said that any participant who has a question concerning conservation use requirements or grazing and harvesting restrictions, should contact the local ASCS Office.
