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

### Bobby Richardson Seeks Election For District Highway Commissioner



State Highway and Transportation officials, provides working relationships with highway professionals at the local, state and national levels, qualifies me to continue the work started during my two terms.

My record of progress in the 31 county district is outstanding as the following accomplishments show:

As of January 1, 1976, \$109 million of construction contracts were in progress. ### Unemployment Rate Decreases In State

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 11.4 percent in April, a decrease of two-tenths of a percentage point compared to March's 11.6 percent jobless rate, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's April unemployment rate was 10.6 percent.

The 11.4 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 10.0 percent national rate for April. MESC figures showed 119,500 unemployed and 933,000 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,052,500. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 20,344 in April.

Fifty-six of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in April. Of that number, two counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.

### County School Bus Driver Training

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the Tishomingo County Schools has been scheduled to begin Monday, June 6-7, 1983, at 8:00 a.m. at the Burnsville School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus drivers certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers.

Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one of the other schools to be announced at a later date.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

Issaquena, Rankin, and Oktibbeha counties had the lowest jobless rates in April. Issaquena had a rate of 3.4 percent, Rankin had a rate of 6.4 percent, and Oktibbeha had an unemployment rate of 6.8 percent.

Forty-seven counties showed a decrease in their unemployment rates from March to April, while thirty-one reported increases. The unemployment rates in four counties were unchanged.

Classes will be offered for beginners (ages 4 & 5) through junior high.



## BELMONT FIRM RECEIVES LOAN

Sun Air Products, Incorporated, of Belmont, Mississippi, announced today a relocation and expansion of its metal fabricating plant to the Belmont Industrial Park.

Sun Air President, Don Hall, said the company received partial funding through a Small Business Administration guarantee loan, and the Tennessee Valley Authority. The project

was recommended by the Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF) for funding under TVA's mitigation loan program.

"Sun Air has been one of Belmont's fastest growing industries since beginning operation in 1979," said TCDF Chairman, Jack Ramsey. "The plant has already hired two additional employees and is expected to create

another 10 new jobs within a 24 month period," he added.

The loans were used for construction of a new building and to acquire new equipment. The purchase, according to Hall, will provide Sun Air the capability to increase current production and to diversify its product line. The company currently manufactures metal seat frames, sofa frames, and seal stands for the customized van and motor home industries. Preliminary research by the Mississippi Research and Development Center has shown a favorable market

potential for several new product lines. The R & D Center also provided the company valuable assistance in the preparation of the project loan packages.

Don Hall is a native of Golden, and a graduate of the University of Alabama with a degree in industrial engineering. He worked as an industrial engineer and supervisor for Reynolds Metals Company until 1978, when he established Sun Air Products. He is married and has two children.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Is It Better Naturally

It's estimated that consumers spent some \$3 billion on natural foods in 1982, but did they know what they were buying? Exactly what does the word "natural" mean? Take the following true-false quiz to find out what you

know about natural foods:

-- Natural foods are more nutritious and better for you than processed foods.

-- The federal government sets standards that determine which foods can be sold as "natural".

A food may not be labeled "natural" if it has been processed in any way or contains any ingredients that don't occur naturally in that food.

The correct response to each question is "False".

The subject of natural foods is one that has puzzled consumers for years. Unfortunately, it's likely to continue to cause confusion and

misinterpretation in the future. The reason: There is no standard definition of the term.

An early definition of a "natural food" was something that occurs in nature -- oranges, lettuce, fresh eggs, for instance.

Over the years, however, the definition was stretched to include this meaning, as reported in a 1974 issue of NUTRITION REVIEWS: "those foods which are in their original state or have minimal refinement and minimal processing."

For a long time, the major distinction of natural foods was that they contained only natural ingredients, nothing artificial, nothing added. The assumption was, of course, that nature couldn't be improved upon, and therefore natural meant better. Orange juice made from fresh-squeezed oranges was natural, for instance, as was all-peanut peanut butter. If the manufacturer put in food colorings or preservatives or anything else artificial, they could no longer be considered natural products.

As Americans became more and more health conscious, advertisers took notice. They tried to appeal to consumers' desire for fresh, wholesome foods by promoting the natural qualities of their products. Gradually, products were sold as "natural" that contained any naturally occurring or minimally processed ingredients. This was true even when the products also contained artificial ingredients. It was up to consumers to rely on their own definitions of "natural".

Is "natural" ice cream possible? It depends on your definition. Ice cream does not occur in nature; it can occur only through processing. An ice cream may contain only natural ingredients, however -- unrefined sugar, pure dairy cream, natural fruits, etc. But an ice cream may contain emulsifiers, preservatives, food colorings, and the like, and still be advertised as having natural fruit flavorings.

### Fresh Strawberry Pie

1 (9-inch) baked pastry shell  
1-1/2 cups fresh strawberries  
1 cup sugar  
3 tbsp. cornstarch  
2 tbsp. lemon juice  
1 cup whipped cream, or whipped topping, if desired

Make pastry shell; cool. Wash and cap berries. Set aside half of them (the best ones). Mash the other berries. Mix sugar and cornstarch; add to mashed berries. Cook 5 to 6 minutes or until clear and very thick. Stir in lemon juice. Cool. Select a few of remaining berries for garnish. Add the rest, whole or cut, to cooled mixture. Pour into pastry shell. Garnish with whipped cream, if used, and whole strawberries. Yield: 1 (9-inch) pie. Note: If strawberries are tart, omit lemon juice.

### June Dairy Month

June is dairy month, a time to pay special tribute to the nation's dairy industry.

The dairy industry in Mississippi plays a major role in the development of the state's agricultural economy. One thousand dairy farmers produce 813 million pounds

of milk each year in Mississippi. This production is done with a little under 100,000 head of milk cows.

The farm value from dairying in Mississippi amounts to \$122 million, and the industry ranks seventh as a source of agricultural income, generating about \$366 million of economic activity in the state.

Seventy firms are engaged in processing, distributing and manufacturing milk and milk products. These firms have an average monthly employment of about 2,000 and an annual payroll of almost 23 million.

Dairy marketing has become increasingly important. The marketing of milk has evolved from a simple producer-consumer relationship into a high complex system where the consumer may be hundreds of miles from the source of production.

Producing and maintaining an adequate supply of milk are essential to Mississippians. Milk, often called nature's most perfect food, has long been considered a basic element in the human diet.

Milk must be handled with the utmost care from start to finish and must meet the specifications of a host of sanitary regulations.

The number of dairy farmers and milk processing plants has declined in the past few years as alternative incentives have offered greater opportunities.

The composition of milk marketed has changed, too. Early marketings consisted of large volumes of milk for manufacturing purposes. Today, 97 percent of Mississippi milk is Grade A milk.

Much of Mississippi's milk

is processed in the state, but some of the Grade A raw milk is marketed in Louisiana, Tennessee, and Alabama.

While some segments of the dairy industry appear to be declining, many positive signs indicate the dairy industry does, indeed, offer opportunities.

The marketing system for milk has made tremendous advances. There are many more problems, but dairy farmers are coping with marketing decisions. Many dairy farmers have organized their own marketing and advertising associations.

The dairy farmer must receive an adequate return on his investment. He must receive a return that will enable him to allocate his resources to milk production instead of using his resources in an alternative enterprise.

As consumers, we spend about 2 percent of our income on dairy products. Today, the average worker needs to work less than nine minutes to earn enough money to buy one-half gallon of milk. Ten years ago, he had to work almost 11 minutes to buy the same products.

Through a coordinated and a unified effort dairy farmers will carefully examine the feasibility of coordinating milk production with the demand requirements. In the future, it might be that dairy farmers may well shift peak production from the spring months when the demand is low to the fall months when the demand is high.

Farm milk prices must be attractive enough to permit the dairy farmer to produce milk profitably. Attractive off-farm enterprises have encouraged many dairy farmers to use their resources to produce other agricultural

products or perhaps even turn to employment outside the agricultural related industry.

This month -- June -- a time set aside when production is at a peak has been designated as June Dairy Month. The dairy industry does indeed play a vital role in the agricultural economy of Mississippi.

## CARING FOR YOUR PET

### DIET FOR THE CONVALESCENT DOG

If you have ever experienced double vision when you were tired or after taking medication, you can appreciate how disturbing it can be. Sudden double vision without any apparent cause is very frightening indeed. But regardless of the cause, in simple terms it indicates that the two eyes are not pointing in the same direction.

In the case of double vision due to fatigue or drugs, there is interference with the brain's ability to control and coordinate the eye muscles. Of course, this condition disappears with rest or the disuse of the medication. A more serious matter is double vision which occurs suddenly, without apparent cause, and is

present constantly. In this case, you should seek medical attention immediately. Possible causes include a small stroke, a brain tumor, or a hemorrhage. In most instances, medical treatment will gradually restore normal vision. In the meantime, special glasses can be made which eliminate this unsettling visual symptom.

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


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**E.T. In The Palm Of Her Hand**

## ASCS Farm News

FARMERS PREVENTED FROM PLANTING PROGRAM CROPS DUE TO DISASTER URGED TO REQUEST PLANTING CREDIT — Producers of cotton, corn, grain sorghum and rice who failed to plant their normal crop acreage by the final planting date due to flood or other natural disaster, are advised to contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office promptly. According to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, the final planting date in Tishomingo County is May 20 for corn, May 25 for cotton, May 31 for rice, and July 5 for grain sorghum. He said the County ASCS Office has available a form which is used for the purpose of filing for prevented planting credit. Bridges said requests for prevented planting credit should be filed promptly while evidence of the disaster is clearly visible. However,

any such request must be filed no later than 15 days after the final planting date for the particular crop. Bridges emphasized that producers who fail to get all or part of their acreage planted by the final planting date and fail to make a timely request for prevented planting credit may lose crop history which could effect the farm base acreage for future years.

ALTERNATIVE PRACTICES FOR 1983 CONSERVATION USE ACRES — The Acreage Reduction, Paid Diversion, and Payment-In-Kind (PIK) program will probably have as much effect on farm operations in Mississippi as any program since the 1930's. Farmers should study their individual situations and decide on the best practices for use on conservation use acreage.

The 1983 Farm Program will give many farmers an opportunity to perform soil building practices. Thousands of acres in the State have been mono-cropped for years. The program helps take this land out of production and provides farmers the opportunity of preventing soil erosion, returning land to better use, improving soil fertility, and controlling pests. Farmers can also test the soil and add necessary elements such as phosphate, potash, and lime.

While many soil building practices can be performed and many options can be exercised, many factors will determine how much can be done with Conservation Use Acres (CUA) and still meet the requirements of certification. Practices for use in 1983 will vary depending, among other things, on whether the acreage is land that should be taken out of cultivation or whether the acreage is land that returns to production in 1984.

For land that should be taken out of production some alternatives are: tree planting; wildlife food plots; establishing permanent pasture; and native vegetation managed according to ASCS regulations.

For land that returns to production in 1984 some alternatives are: cover crops such as summer legumes, millet and other summer grasses; wildlife practices; native vegetation managed according to program recommendations; fallow where approved (on fields with less than 3 percent slope); skip row in cotton managed according to ASCS regulations; and land forming and terracing.

Before using any of these suggestions, farmers should check with the County ASCS Office to see if their selected practices are permitted and obtain details for managing the acreage for 1983.

### Summer Youth Employment Programs

More than 9,000 economically disadvantaged

and underachieving youth are expected to participate in two Governor's Office of Job Development and Training (GOJDT) summer programs, the Summer Youth Employment Program and the Title II-B Employment and

### Training Programs for Youth.

"Having young people exposed to real life work situations will help them to be prepared for their entry into the full-time work force," said Steve Halliburton, GOJDT program operations division director. "The programs also will give them a 'taste' of a career they may want to pursue."

Approximately 8,000 will be served in 77 counties by the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) which is designed to expose young people to the "working world" with actual on-the-job experience. This eight-week program, open to 14 to 21-year-old youth, will provide participants with 32-hour per week jobs at minimum wage in libraries, county offices and other public and private non-profit enterprises.

SYEP funding is \$8,147,418.

Approximately 1,800 young people in 50 counties are expected to be served by the Title II-B Employment and Training Program for Youth which is designed to give them a sampling of various career fields.

It will include assessment, testing and counseling and occupational career and vocational exploration in fields such as auto mechanics, garment construction, food services, elementary typing, filing, mechanical drawing, welding, barbering, electronics, marketing, banking, hotel-motel, restaurant manage-

### ment and retail clerking.

Also included will be job search assistance, job holding and survival skills training, basic life skills training, remedial education for academic credit, job-seeking skills training, attainment of certificates of high school equivalency, entry employment (work) experience for the public sector and on-the-job training coupled with other services.

Open to 16 to 21-year-old youth, the program, in most cases, will cover six weeks. The youth will be given an allowance of \$2 per hour. Open to 16 to 21-year-old youth, the program, in most cases, will cover six weeks. The youth will be given an allowance of \$2 per hour.

Typically, a week will be spent in each course selected by participants.

Funding for the Title II-B program is \$1.4 million. "We realize that deciding upon a career can be a tough decision," Halliburton said. "Many young people make this decision without much understanding of the career they've selected. Frequently, they're not aware of the options."

"Through the summer youth programs," he said, "we hope we can help participants make career decisions that will be rewarding to them and allow the young people to make their best contributions to society."

"Beyond helping the young people, the summer programs can help all of Mississippi by giving our state individuals who are

ready to accept their roles in the work force with a genuine work ethic," Halliburton said. "We believe the programs can do much to help break the cycle of unemployment caused by unqualified or unwilling workers. They could help to make the difference between tax-paying workers and welfare recipients."

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**Master Craftsman At Work**  
Building a dulcimer from a slab of wood is a tedious task, which requires patience,

skill, and artistic talent. Hollis Long is a man who possesses these attributes as evidenced by the fine craftsmanship of

his finished product. The Golden resident also builds banjos and spinning wheels. His wife makes cornshuck dolls.

## Hollis Long Plays A "Sweet Song"

Hollis Long pointed to some wormholes in an ancient slab of chestnut wood while commenting on the attractive look they would give to a finished dulcimer. He knew what he was talking about. With the skilled hands of a carpenter and the discriminating taste of an artist, he makes the American originated instruments in a one-room shop located in Golden.

Hollis has been fascinated with the dulcimer for more than ten years now. He assembles them from lifeless boards of wood, as the most masterful sculptor would chisel away at a shapeless rock. When it comes to playing the stringed instrument, he is a virtuoso. And he is also an expert on bluegrass music and heritage.

He will tell any novice of bluegrass how and why the dulcimer was born. Invented out of necessity by early settlers of the Appalachian Mountains, it was the answer to a longing for music when the grand pianos, flutes, and violins of the Old World were absent. He attributes the degree of European influence on the instrument to this fact, namely the one-line melody and drone strong of the dulcimer which are similar to the bagpipe.

A host of songs, both gospel and bluegrass, were played on the dulcimer. According to Hollis, his topics were about "down to earth things." The musicians sang about the things they knew

best - the people, the rivers, and the mountains. Often the songs would have a deeply personal aspect such as a love story, a romance gone bad, or even the death of a daughter. They had names like "Wildwood Flower" and "Boilin' Cabbage Down". These compositions of Americana are preserved today because of men like Hollis Long.

Early in life, he had an appreciative and acute ear for music, having begun to play the guitar at the age of twelve. "Back when I grew up, you didn't have television - just barely had radio. My brother, Julian, and I played while we were growing up until we joined the service," he recalled of his youth.

It was not until after he had passed into adulthood, however, when Hollis was first introduced to the dulcimer. "We (he and his wife, Nevil) had been going to the Smokies for about twenty years. I got to see these somewhere around '63. I really didn't get interested in them till '73." This was the year when a friend named Archie Lee showed Hollis a family heirloom which happened to be a handcrafted dulcimer. Then the skilled carpenter fashioned one for himself using the crude, imprecise tools for general carpentry tasks.

Nevertheless, the result was most satisfactory. "I made one for myself. Somebody heard me play it and asked what I would take for it. Then I made a better

one, sold it, and began selling them all the time."

Today, the dulcimers that carry the name of Hollis Long are of the best craftsmanship and quality. Only aged wood of superior condition is used. Although sassafras is his favorite, he works equally well with chestnut, butternut, walnut, cherry, and maple. No longer does he use the crude tools with which he created his first dulcimer. His shop is now equipped with a host of instruments including an electric saw, an electric sander, chisels, and an assorted number of antique tools. Once his hands grasp these implements, the finished product is a handcrafted dulcimer which sells for anywhere between \$100.00 to \$175.00.

Southern culture, particularly that of the Appalachian Region and the local area, plays an important role in Hollis' life. He is a member of the two culturally oriented organizations and serves as secretary for both.

Alasippi is a dulcimer association formed three years ago by individuals who either make, play, or collect dulcimers. Hollis is one of the men who helped to form the club which is composed of between forty or fifty members from the two state area.

He is also a charter member of the Bearcreek Folklore Association. In 1971, the organization began staging an annual folkore festival at Tishomingo State Park to promote traditional Southern crafts and music. This year's

event has been scheduled for Saturday, June 4th.

Other festivals, such as the Brasstown Folkschool Festival in North Carolina and the Old Trace Festival held in Westwood Park near Tupelo, are on his yearly itinerary. He related a reoccurring experience at these events. "I've heard people tell me about their mothers playing to them on some kind of an instrument. They come to find out that those instruments were dulcimers."

In fact, the dulcimer was often used to lull a baby to sleep in the days of yesteryear. The word dulcimer, itself, is derived from Greek and Latin words which mean "sweet song". Hollis believes the stringed instrument is aptly named. "The dulcimer is something different. I don't know what it does. You can come home at night, play a dulcimer, and relax. There's something about them that catches ya," he said.

This very evening, he will go outside his shop where a couple of giant mulberry trees stand firmly planted in the last foothills of Appalachia. Their branches and leaves intertangle and weave to form an arched ceiling much like that of an orchestra hall. Hollis will play, and the sweet songs of his dulcimer will fade away into the approaching darkness of a Southern night.

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

## ASCS Farm News

**CONSIDER PERMANENT CONSERVATION PRACTICE, FARMERS ADVISED** — Good conservation management of land withdrawn from production is a requirement of the 1983 farm programs. The diverted acreage must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year, said Howard Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee.

"Farmers may want to consider devoting these acres to a permanent vegetative cover or conservation practice such as terraces, sod waterways, trees, filter strips and windbreaks." He said that these practices are especially effective on fragile, erosive soils.

If a permanent cover or practice is installed and maintained, the land will be acceptable for designation as conservation use acreage in any future diversion program through 1985. The cost for installing permanent conservation practices may be shared with farmers through the Agricultural Conservation Program.

Other protective covers approved for conservation use acreage include annual, biennial, or perennial

grasses, legumes, small grains, volunteer stands other than weeds, and crop residue from use of minimum till or no till practices. Upon approval, the residue or stubble from other program crops also may be used.

According to Bridges, the diverted acres can be devoted to properly designated wildlife food plots or managed habitat. Landowners creating wildlife plots can obtain technical assistance through the local Soil Conservation District or Cooperative Extension Service. Local wildlife or environmental groups may also offer assistance to interested farmers.

"We encourage farmers to consider the soil and water conservation benefits, protection of wildlife, and the long-term nutrient returns from a well-chosen cover crop, when deciding on the cover and proper control measures for their conservation use acreage," the ASCS official said.

**CORN LOANS AVAILABLE UNTIL MAY 31, BRIDGES SAYS** — Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said price support loans on 1982 corn, sorghum, cotton and soybeans will be available until May 31. Farmers who are planning to place the grain in the reserve program must do so by this deadline.

County loan rates are: Corn, \$2.74 per bushel; sorghum, \$4.31 per cwt.; cotton, 57.9 per lb.; and soybeans, \$5.08 per bushel. Each loan rate is based on a national average rate which varies from county to county to reflect prices received by farmers, production and consumption trends, and transportation costs.

According to Bridges, Tishomingo County farmers have placed 3106 bushels of 1982 grain under loan and in the reserve program. "The regular loan program provides immediate cash for farmers and allows them time to assess the market or to hold grain for feeding later," he said. Variable interest rates are charged and farmers may repay the money before the nine-month maturity date.

The reserve program offers farmers short and long term benefits to counter the price depressing effects of surplus stocks. Increased loan levels and low market prices prompted many farmers to make use of the ASCS price support loan program during 1982.

program is to provide farmers with a tool for marketing their grain. Market prices during harvest time are generally less than what they are during other times of the year, and price support loans give farmers an opportunity to take advantage of any possible increase in market prices at a later time," the ASCS official said.

To qualify for the loans, producers are required to participate in farm programs.
