

Unemployment Rate Decreases In State

Mississippi's unem. in April were Greene, with an percent in April, a decrease of two-tenths of a percentage point compared to March's 11.6 percent jobless rate, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director O.H. Simmons. Last year's April unemployment rate was 10.6 percent. The 11.4 percent unem-

ployment rate for the state was higher than the 10.0 percent national rate for April. figures showed MESC unemployed and 933,000 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1.052.500. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 20,344 in April.

Fifty-six of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in April. Of that number, two counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 per-

> Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers. Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to

enroll in the course. Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one of the other schools to be announced at a later date.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

Is It Better Naturally

It's estimated that consumers spent some \$3 billion on natural foods in 1982, but did they know what they were buying? Exactly what does the word "natural" mean? Take the following true-false quiz to find out what you

know about natural foods: - Natural foods are more

nutritious and better for you. than processed foods.

- The federal government sets standards that determine which foods can be sold as "natural". A food may not be labeled

"natural" if it has been processed in any way or contains any ingredients that don't occur naturally in that food. The correct response to

each question is "False".

The subject of natural foods is one that has puzzled consumers for years. Unfortunately, it's likely to continue to cause confusion and

Sick and convalescing dogs need a special bland diet to allow nature to heal the affected organs. The normal diet is usually too harsh and irritating to the stomach and intestines, and all commercial dog foods should be removed from the diet, especially horse meat. Also taboo are milk, bones, and fried foods.

The basic bland diet can be cooked cereals, baby cereals, rice. noodles, or other softened grains. You can add to this protein in the form of chicken or beef broth, or lean beef, chicken or lamb. Cooked eggs are excellent, and buttermilk is recommended because it helps the normal intestinal bacteria to return to normal.

An early definition of a "natural food" something that occurs in nature -- oranges, lettuce, fresh eggs, for instance.

Over the years, however, the definition was stretched to include this meaning, as reported in a 1974 issue of NUTRITION REVIEWS: "those foods which are in their original state or have minimal refinement and minimal processing."

For a long time, the major distinction of natural foods was that they contained only natural ingredients, nothing artificial, nothing added. The assumption was, of course, that nature couldn't be improved upon, and therefore natural meant better. Orange juice made from freshsqueezed oranges was natural, for instance, as was all-peanut peanut butter. If the manufacturer put in food colorings or preservatives or anything else artificial, they could no longer be considered natural products

As Americans became more and more health conscious, advertisers took notice. They tried to appeal to consumers' desire for fresh. wholesome foods by promoting the natural qualities of their products. Gradually, products were sold as "natural" that contained any naturally occurring or minimally processed ingredients. This was true even when the products also contained artificial ingredients. It was up to consumers to rely on their own definitions of "natural".

Is "natural" ice cream possible? It depends on your definition. Ice cream does not occur in nature; it can occur only through processing. An ice cream may contain only natural ingredients, however unrefined sugar, pure daily cream, natural fruits, etc. But an ice cream may contain emulsifiers, preservatives, food colorings, and the like, and still be advertised as natural fruit having flavorings.

Fresh Strawberry Pie

- (9-inch) baked pastry
- 1-1/2 qts. fresh strawberries
- 1 cup sugar 3 tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 tbsp. lemon juice 1 cup whipped cream, or

whipped topping, if desired

Make pastry shell; cool. Wash and cap berries. Set aside half of them (the best ones). Mash the other berries. Mix sugar and cornstarch: add to mashed berries. Cook 5 to 6 minutes or until clear and very thick. Stir in lemon juice. Cool. Select a few of remaining berries for garnish. Add the rest, whole or cut, to cooled mixture. Pour into pastry shell. Garnish with whipped cream, if used, and whole strawberries. Yield: 1 (9-inch) pie. Note: If strawberries are tart, omit lemon juice.

The farm value from dairying in Mississippi amounts to \$122 million, and the industry ranks seventh as a source of agricultural income, generating about \$366 opportunities. million of economic activity The marketing system for

Seventy firms are engaged in processing, distributing and manufacturing milk and milk products. These firms have an average monthly employment of about 2,000 and an annual payroll of almost 23 vertising associations.

Dairy marketing has become increasingly important. The marketing of milk has evolved from a simple producer-consumer relationship into a high complex system where the consumer ' may be hundreds of miles from the source of produc-

Producing and maintaining an adequate supply of milk are essential to Mississippians. Milk, often called nature's most perfect food. has long been considered a basic element in the human

Milk must be handled with the utmost care from start to finish and must meet the specifications of a host of sanitary regulations.

The number of dairy farmers and milk processing plants has declined in the past few years as alternative incentives have offered greater opportunities The composition of milk

marketed has changed, too. Early marketings consisted of large volumes of milk for manufacturing purposes. Today, 97 percent of Mississippi milk is Grade A

Much of Mississippi's milk

While some segments of the dairy industry appear to be declining, many positive signs indicate the dairy industry does, indeed, offer

milk has made tremendous advances. There are many more problems, but dairy farmers are coping with marketing decisions. Many dairy farmers have organized their own marketing and ad-

The dairy farmer must receive an adequate return on his investment. He must receive a return that will enable him to allocate his resources to milk production instead of using his resources in an alternative enter-As consumers, we spend

about 2 percent of our income on dairy products. Today, the average worker needs to work less than nine minutes to earn enough money to buy one-half gallon of milk. Ten years ago, he had to work almost 11 minutes to buy the same products. Through a coordinated and

a unified effort dairy farmers will carefully examine the feasibility of coordinating milk production with the demand requirements. In the future, it might be that dairy farmers may well shift peak production from the spring months when the demand is low to the fall months when the demand is high.

Farm milk prices must be attractive enough to permit the dairy farmer to produce milk profitably. Attractive offfarm enterprises have encouraged many dairy farmers to use their resources to produce other agricultural



ASCS **Farm News**

By: Henry L. Knox, **County Executive Director**

FARMERS PREVENTED FROM PLANTING PROGRAM CROPS DUE TO DISASTER URGED TO REQUEST PLAN-TING CREDIT — Producers of cotton, corn, grain sorghum and rice who failed to plant their normal crop acreage by the final planting date due to flood or other natural disaster, are advised to contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office promptly. According to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, the final planting date in Tishomingo County is May 20 for corn, May 25 for cotton, May 31 for rice, and July 5 for grain sorghum. He said the County ASCS Office has available a form which is used for the purpose of filing for prevented planting credit.

Bridges said requests for prevented planting credit should be filed promptly while evidence of the disaster is clearly visible. However,

any such request must be filed no later than 15 days after the final planting date for the particular crop. Bridges emphasized that producers who fail to get all or part of their acreage planted by the final planting date and fail to make a timely request for prevented planting credit may lose crop history which could effect the farm base acreage for future years.

ALTERNATIVE PRAC-TICES FOR 1983 CONSER-VATION USE ACRES - The Acreage Reduction, Paid Diversion, and Payment-In-Kind (PIK) program will probably have as much effect on farm operations in Mississippi as any program since the 1930's. Farmers should study their individual situations and decide on the best practices for use on conservation use acreage. The 1983 Farm Program

will give many farmers an opportunity to perform soil building practices. Thousands of acres in the State have been mono-cropped for years. The program helps take this land out of production and provides farmers the opportunity of preventing soil erosion, returning land to better use, improving soil fertility, and controlling pests. Farmers can also test the soil and add necessary elements such as phosphate, potash, and lime.

While many soil building practices can be performed and many options can be exercised, many factors will determine how much can be done with Conservation Use Acres (CUA) and still meet the requirements of certification. Practices for use in 1983 will vary depending, among other things, on whether the acreage is land that should be taken out of cultivation or whether the acreage is land that returns to production in

For land that should be taken out of production some alternatives are: tree planting; food plots; establishing permanent and pasture: vegetation managed according to ASCS regulations.

For land that returns to production in 1984 some alternatives are: cover crops such as summer legumes. millet and other summer grasses; wildlife practices; native vegetation managed according to program recommendations; fallow where approved (on fields with less than 3 percent slope); skip row in cotton managed according to ASCS regulations; and land forming

Before using any of these suggestions, farmers should check with the County ASCS Office to see if their selected obtain details for managing the acreage for 1983.

Hollis has been fascinated with the dulcimer for more than ten years now. He asssembles them from lifeless boards of wood, as the most masterful sculptor just barely had radio. My would chisel away at a shapeless rock. When it comes to playing the stringed instrument, he is a virtuoso. And he is also an expert on bluegrass music and passed into adulthood. heritage.

He will tell any novice of bluegrass how and why the dulcimer was born. Invented out of necessity by early settlers of the Appalachian Mountains, it was the answer to a longing for music when the grand pianos, flutes, and violins of the Old World were absent. He attributes the degree of European influence on the instrument to this fact, namely the one-line melody and drone strongs of the dulcimer which are similar to the bagpipe.

A host of songs, both gospel and bluegrass, were played on the dulcimer. According to Hollis, their topics were about "down to earth things." The musicians sang about the things they knew

> Early in life, he had an appreciative and acute ear for music, having begun to play the guitar at the age of twelve. "Back when I grew up, you didn't have television brother, Julian, and I played while we were growing up until we joined the service," he recalled of his youth.

It was not until after he had however, when Hollis was first introduced to the dulcimer. "We (he and his wife, Nevil) had been going to the Smokies for about twenty years. I got to see these somewhere around '63. I really didn't get interested in them till '73." This was the year when a friend named Archie Lee showed Hollis a family heirloom which happened to be a handcrafted dulcimer. Then the skilled carpenter fashioned one for himself using the crude, imprecise tools for general carpentry tasks.

Nevertheless, the result was most satisfactory. "I made one for myself. Somebody heard me play it and asked what I would take for it. Then I made a better

one, sold it, and began selling them all the time."

Today, the dulcimers that carry the name of Hollis Long are of the best craftsmanship and quality. Only aged wood of superior condition is used. Although sassasfras is his favorite, he works equally well with chestnut, butternut, walnut, cherry, and maple. No longer does he use the crude tools with which he created his first dulcimer. His shop is now equipped with a host of instruments including an electric saw, an electric sander, chisels, and an assorted number of antique tools. Once his hands grasp these implements, the finished product is a handcrafted dulcimer which sells for anywhere Letween \$100.00 to

Southern culture, particularly that of the Appalachian Region and the local area, plays an important role in Hollis' life. He is a member of the two culturally oriented organizations and serves as secretary for both.

Alasippi is a dulcimer association formed three years ago by individuals who either make, play, or collect dulcimers. Hollis is one of the men who helped to form the club which is composed of between forty or fifty members from the two state area.

He is also a charter member of the Bearcreek Folklore Association. In 1971, the organization began staging an annual forklore festival at Tishomingo State Park to crafts and music. This year's with the second annual Arts &



CONSIDER PERMANENT CONSERVATION PRACTICE, FARMERS ADVISED - Good conservation management of land withdrawn from production is a requirement of the 1983 farm programs. The diverted acreage must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year, said Howard Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo

"Farmers may want to consider devoting these acres to a permanent vegetative cover or conservation practice such as terraces, sod waterways, trees, filter strips and windbreaks." He said that these practices are especially effective on fragile, erosive

If a permanent cover or practice is installed and maintained, the land will be acceptable for designation as conservation use acreage in any future diversion program through 1985. The cost for installing permanent conservation practices may be shared with farmers through the Agricultural Conservation
