## BENCHMARK TO RECONSTRUCT

First and Second District Supervisors, Lyonel "Cotton" Wade and Gerald Parsons, have received word that Winfield Manufacturing Company will reconstruct the Benchmark factory building in Burnsville, which was destroyed by fire two months ago.

The new structure will be like the old one and should be completed during the first part of October of this year. The property is owned by the

First and Second Districts. No money will be required of the county or the First and Second Districts in the reconstruction project; it will be totally financed by Winfield Manufacturing.

At press-time, no reports on whether a garment factory will relocate in the building have been received. However, news that the structure will be rebuilt is certainly good news, and it will ease the fear

and anxiety of many county residents who have been hit hard by the economic disaster.

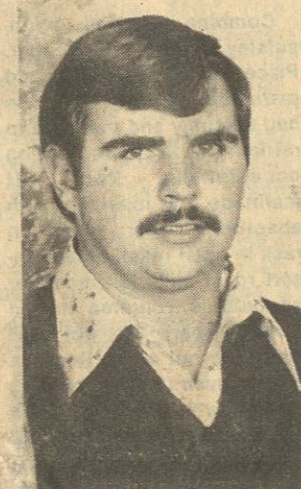
At the time of the fire, Benchmark was the county's second largest employer and Burnsville's only industry. The county unemployment rate rose from 13.9% to 16.1% after the plant burned. The impact of this figure has been widely felt.

Burnsville Mayor, A.T. Marlar, reports that many

former employees of Benchmark have lost their medical insurance causing some of their names to be added to welfare rolls for the first time. He also said that a number of workers were unable to obtain unemployment compensation because they had not been working long enough at the factory.

Commenting on the town's activity, he said, "Everything has been slow, and people are really suffering from it because of lack of income."

### One Car Crash Claims Life

An early morning car accident on Wednesday, June 15, claimed the life of Roy G. Gasaway.

According to investigating sheriff's deputy, Mike Kemp, the late model Chevrolet Impala, Gasaway was driving, left the road and plunged into an embankment and some trees at a location west of Paden on Highway 30. 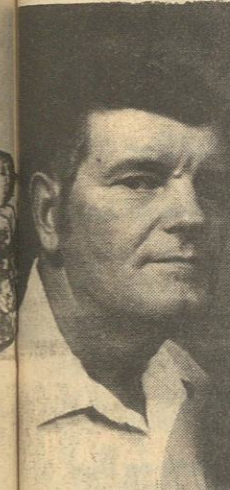

## CAR RAMS INTO BLUE BELL PLANT

The Blue Bell factory in Tishomingo was the scene of a bizarre mishap on Friday, June 10, shortly after 12:00 p.m., when a late model Ford Fiesta rammed into the wall of the building.

Seven people were reportedly taken by ambulances to the medical facility in Red Bay as a result of the accident, but all have been released.

According to police reports, Laura Conwell lost control of the vehicle after cranking it, because the gas pedal had apparently been hung in the floor with the gearshift in reverse. The automobile went between two cars in the parking lot hitting them both before slamming into the factory wall at the point where the lunchroom is located.

Three women, who had been sitting at booths in the plant lunchroom, received minor injuries. Their names are listed as Lila Parker, Dotti Laugherty, and Sue Cleveland. Ms. Conwell and four young passengers were also injured. No broken bones or lacerations have been reported. The only injuries sustained were contusions and muscle spasms.

Plant Manager, Rick

Milligan, was in the lunchroom when the midday incident took place. "It hit the wall pretty hard. It bounced off the wall and hit it again. It was fairly loud. Put down a lot of dust. I think everybody was calm considering the circumstances," he said. Milligan roughly estimates that damage to the factory building will be somewhere between four and five thousand dollars, although no official estimate has yet been received. He said that the car did not go completely through the wall.

No charges were placed in the accident.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Seasoning Hints For Low Sodium Diets

If your doctor has told you to cut down on sodium or salt, here are some seasonings that you can use as a flavorful substitute.

**GREEN BEANS:** Saute with onions; cook with clove or garlic, rosemary or curry, or use butter with a touch of honey and lemon juice. Marinate in low-sodium French dressing and serve hot or cold.

**CARROTS:** Glaze in brown

sugar, cinnamon, lemon juice and sweet butter, or add lemon juice, chopped mint and sweet butter, or braise them with an onion.

**ENGLISH PEAS:** Steam in water with an onion or curry or lemon juice; add sweet butter. They are also good with chopped mint.

**POTATOES:** Mash with dill, ground raw horseradish, parsley and sweet butter. Saute in oil with chopped green pepper and onion. For baked stuffed potatoes, remove insides and mash with chopped chives.

**SUMMER SQUASH (ZUCCHINI OR YELLOW):** Flavor

with sage, onion, curry or lemon juice. They are also good when mashed with sweet butter with a dash of nutmeg.

**TOMATOES:** Fry in thick slices, flavor with basil. Broil with curry powder, rubbed with garlic or sprinkled with chives. Broil with mushrooms, green pepper and onion.

**RICE:** To 1-1/2 cups cooked rice, add one tablespoon sweet butter, one-fifth teaspoon thyme, one-fourth teaspoon rosemary, one-fourth teaspoon parsley and a dash of paprika. For steamed or boiled rice, flavor with water in which it is cooked with curry, onion or garlic and paprika; sometimes all three. Add sweet butter, taste before serving it. Nutmeg or curry may be added, or the rice may be topped with braised mushrooms.

**BEEF:** For pot roast: brown chuck roast, add carrots, fresh tomatoes, onion, red potatoes, cloves, dash of nutmeg and caraway seed. For ground meat dishes: add sage, curry, onion, mustard powder or nutmeg; or marinate ground beef patties in low-sodium French dressing for one hour before cooking. Rub steaks with onion or garlic and dip in olive oil just before broiling.

**PORK:** Roast: Baste with apple juice every 20 minutes;

add rosemary. Homemade sausage: combine ground pork, sage, ground black pepper; a little rosemary, mustard powder and curry, let stand 12 hours.

**FISH:** Marinate in lemon juice, low-sodium French dressing, or variously flavored vinegars; or add bay leaf, lemon and pepper corn to water in which is boiled.

**FRUITS:** Add ginger to pears; almond extract or canned cherries or peaches; brown sugar to apple dishes.

**POULTRY:** Use sage and marjoram.

### Father's Day Beef Roast

3-1/2 to 4 lb. beef eye round roast

1 cup red wine  
2 tablespoons oil  
1 medium onion, chopped  
2 tsp. snipped parsley  
1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves  
Dash freshly ground black pepper

Combine wine, oil, onion,

parsley, thyme and pepper. Place roast in plastic bag; add marinade, turn to coat. Tie bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 24 hours, turning occasionally. Pour off marinade. Pat roast dry with absorbent paper; place on rack in open roasting pan. Insert roast meat thermometer so bulb is centered in the thickest part. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in a slow oven (325 degrees F.) until thermometer registers 135 degrees F. Allow 20 to 22 minutes per pound. Let roast "stand" 15 minutes. (Roasts will usually rise 5 degrees F. in temperature to reach 140 degrees F. for rare.) Carve into thick slices.

## County Agent's Notes

### Gardening

Those of you who were fortunate enough to plant early and avoid later washouts should have some garden vegetables ready for harvest. The rest of June will be a busy time for gardeners.

If you do have vegetables

ready for harvest, harvest on time for peak quality. Then prepare the same space to make room for more vegetables.

Spray or dust sweet corn silks every three or four days to control corn earworms. Sweet corn needs 17 to 21 days from first silk to maturity. Harvest is not so critical with the newer, sweet hybrids.

As soon as corn is harvested, chop the stalks and turn them under to add organic matter to the soil. Prepare the area for planting winter squash and pumpkins in early July, or cauliflower, cabbage and beans in late July and early August.

As Irish potatoes mature, the vines will begin to yellow. Don't mistake leaf diseases for maturity. Spray with a fungicide to keep the leaves healthy until they yellow with maturity.

Dig potatoes in the cool part of the day and shade them from the sun. Don't wash potatoes to be stored unless they are muddy. Let them dry in a well-ventilated, dark place for several days and then store in a cool, dark place. Don't try to keep potatoes in the ground after the vines die. They are likely to rot if not dug.

Tomatoes will continue to need care and attention, including suckering, spraying for worms and diseases, and mulching.

### Know Production Cost

Knowing your estimated costs for producing a bushel of soybeans is an important step in making soybean profits in 1983.

If you don't already have a good estimate of your production costs, you need to make those calculations. Knowing your costs is important from both management and marketing standpoints.

From a management standpoint, you need to be able to compare soybean costs and returns with similar figures on other farm enterprises. Knowing production costs also is helpful in borrowing operating capital.

From a marketing standpoint, it's hard to know whether a particular price offered for the crop is profitable unless you know your costs. To a farmer with a \$7.50 cost per bushel, a \$7 price is not too attractive. To a producer with a \$6.50 cost, the \$7 price may be acceptable.

Costs include both direct, or out-of-pocket costs, and fixed expenses such as depreciation. In selecting a yield to use on your farm, figure the average for the past five to six years as a starting point.

Knowing your production costs won't guarantee a profit, but it will put you in a position to recognize a profit if it becomes available.

## What is Morbid Obesity, And Can It Be Treated?

When is a person considered morbidly obese? Is there any effective treatment for this?

A person is morbidly obese when he is overweight either by 100 pounds or by twice his ideal body weight. (Anyone who is less than 20 percent overweight is considered cosmetically obese, not morbidly obese, and the excess weight is not usually thought to be a serious health risk unless the person is diabetic or has high blood pressure.)

However, on an annual basis, the morbidly obese person is 12 times more likely to die than a person of normal weight. Such persons may die of cardiovascular diseases - such as heart attack and stroke - and of diabetes, pulmonary problems - and even accidents, since a grossly overweight person finds it more difficult to move rapidly to avoid danger.

Morbid obesity is more common among women than men. Extremely obese people also have a greater incidence of high blood pressure, and higher levels of cholesterol in their blood. In fact, significant weight loss is frequently accompanied by a drop in blood pressure and lower cholesterol levels.

But losing large amounts of weight can be very difficult, is not impossible, for a morbidly obese person. Some people may inherit a family tendency towards being severely overweight. Often, they also suffer from a variety of social and emotional problems in addition to the physical problems that are associated with morbid obesity. They may have some overweight as children, and because the number of fat cells in our bodies are determined in childhood - overweight children may grow up having more fat cells and a greater need to eat to replenish those cells.

Obesity researchers sometimes refer to the body's "appetitestat," similar to a thermostat. This "appetitestat" in a person of normal or near normal weight is set to require enough food to keep the weight at a normal level while the "appetitestat" in a morbidly obese person may be "set" much higher. No one really understands why.

There are effective treatments for helping morbidly obese people lose weight and Are there effective treatments for helping morbidly obese people lose weight and keep it off?

Over the years, a number of unsuccessful treatments have been tried. Wiring the jaw shut so a person can't eat was one. But it proved ineffective because patients tended to regain their lost weight rapidly after the wires are

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removed.

Today, two very different treatments are being used with some success.

The first treatment puts a person on a medically-supervised protein-sparing modified fast with nutritional supplements so he can take off large amounts of weight rapidly before going onto a more normal diet. However, doctors generally agree that longterm results are poor. Behavior modification techniques are concurrently used to teach the person how to adopt necessary changes in eating and exercising. Such changes, if weight loss is to be maintained, must be lifelong.

The other treatment is one of several serious surgical procedures. One method involves using surgical staples to close off a major portion of the stomach so the person is unable to eat large amounts of food. This treatment is still experimental and is not suited to all morbidly obese persons for a variety of medical and psychological reasons. Stomach bypass is another procedure. 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### THE BREEDING CYCLE

Generally, bitches will come in season for the first time at around eight months of age. It is usually considered wiser to wait until the second season - approximately six months later before breeding her. It is also advisable to do so the first time before she is three years old.

A bitch may be bred again the following season, but this presents some risk to her health. Raising a litter of puppies is a considerable drain on the dam, and time should be allowed for her to replace calcium reserves and for the reproductive system to come back to normal. Generally speaking, skipping a season would be in your

dog's best interest.

She should also be bred only when she is in good health, free from any disease, as well as internal and external parasites. This is important for the puppies as well as for the dam. Contagious disease and some parasites can be passed on from her to her litter. Consequently, a thorough physical examination is recommended before breeding.

driver refuses to submit to a chemical breath test.

"How long the license is suspended by the Department of Public Safety depends on how many times the driver has been convicted for DUI," Butler said.

He said first offenders will have their licenses suspended for 90 days provided they attend a Mississippi Alcohol Safety Education Program school for a minimum of 10 hours.

Hardship defenses for driver license reinstatements may be made only by first offenders and only after 45 days of the 90-day suspension have elapsed.

First offenders electing not to attend a MASEP school will lose their licenses for one year. First offenders are to be fined \$200-\$500 and may be sentenced to 24 hours in jail.

"Each successive DUI offense brings stiffer fines, penalties and mandatory jail sentences," Butler said.

"For example, any driver whose second DUI offense occurs within a five-year period faces a mandatory jail sentence of 48 hours to one year, a fine up to \$1,000 and a two-year license suspension. The jail sentence may be suspended only if the offender performs at least 10 days to one year community service work."

Butler said the third time a person is convicted of DUI in a five-year period the offender will spend a minimum of 30 days or a maximum of 365 days in jail.

The three-time offender may be fined up to \$1,000 and lose his license for three years.

There is no alternative to spending time in jail for a person convicted of DUI three times in a five-year period.

Those suspected of DUI who refuse to take the breath test will have their licenses suspended for 90 days and will be fined up to \$1,000. Those with a previous DUI conviction who refuse to take a breath test, lose their license for one year.

Butler said serious financial problems can confront violators convicted of DUI after July 1.

"Working people who lose their driver licenses may be faced with employment problems especially if they do their own driving to and from work," he said.

## Math Puzzle

This coffee cake, studded with chunks of cinnamon-accented apples, spells "good eating" anytime. Delicious as a special treat for coffee breaks or snacks, it's also an appealing dessert to which those who aren't counting calories might like to add a dollop of whipped cream.

There's a mystery ingredient in this easy recipe: yogurt. You don't actually taste it, but yogurt adds moistness, tenderness, and brings out the distinctive fruit flavor of the canned apple pie filling. The apple slices start out on top of the golden batter, then sink into the cake during baking.

Blueberry, cherry, or strawberry pie filling can be substituted in this recipe.

**APPLE CINNAMON COFFEE CAKE**

- 1 package (18.5 oz.) yellow cake mix (double layer size)
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup plain yogurt
- 1 can (20 oz.) Comstock apple pie filling
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons flour

In large mixing bowl, combine cake mix, eggs and yogurt. Beat 3 minutes. Spread batter into an oiled and floured 9x13x2 inch cake pan. Arrange pie filling over batter. Combine cinnamon, sugar, and flour and sprinkle on top of cake. Bake at 350°F. for 40-45 minutes. Best served warm.

Microwave Instructions (Makes two 8" layers):

Mix batter as above. Line 8-inch microwave cake pan with a circle of paper towel. Place 1/2 of batter in prepared pan. Top with 1/2 can of pie filling and slightly less than 1/2 cinnamon mixture. Microwave at 50% power 7-8 minutes, rotate 1/2 turn at 4 minutes. Finish cooking, high power, 3-4 minutes, rotate 1/4 turn at 2 minutes. Exact times may vary with different ovens. Let stand 2 minutes before inverting onto plate. Sprinkle bottom with some of the cinnamon mixture. Repeat for second layer.

**LEMON COFFEECAKE**  
(Makes 10-inch tube cake)

- 1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup softened butter
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups liquid Carnation nonfat dry milk

Combine 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs, brown sugar, and cinnamon in small bowl. Mix together remaining 3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs, flour, soda, and salt. Cream butter, granulated sugar, and lemon rind in large mixer bowl. Add eggs; beat well. Add dry ingredients alternately with liquid nonfat milk, mixing lightly after each addition. Spread 1/3 batter in buttered 10-inch tube pan. Sprinkle 1/2 crumb mixture over batter. Repeat layers. Spread remaining batter over crumbs. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 60 to 70 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool. Drizzle Lemon Glaze over coffee cake.

**LEMON GLAZE:** Combine 1 cup powdered sugar and 4 teaspoons lemon juice. Drizzle over coffee cake.

# Health-Wise

## A Cancer Diet?

Allan R. Magie, Ph.D., M.P.H.

Yes, you read it right. Recent studies indicate that a relationship exists between what we eat and the development of cancer. Probably the most feared of modern killers, cancer yearly claims 400,000 lives in the United States. A number of factors have been known that increase one's risk of developing cancer: smoking, heredity, certain occupations like plastic manufacturing and uranium mining, and chemicals like asbestos and chlorinated organics in our water and air.

Now foods have been added to the list of risk factors. Those dietary articles specifically being singled out for concern include:

1. Alcoholic beverages--increase risk of cancer of the esophagus, colon, rectum, and liver.
2. Fats and oils--increase risk of cancers of the colon, rectum, prostate, and breast.
3. Wood-smoked and cured foods--increase risk of cancers of the esophagus and stomach.
4. Others such as moldy foods, chemically contaminated foods, foods cooked at high temperatures (e.g. broiled meat), and diets deficient in important nutrients, such as vitamin A and C.

But there's good news! Studies also demonstrate that the way people eat can also protect them from these same cancers. Although no specific food can be labeled as a cancer preventor, guidelines for lowering one's risk of developing

cancer are available. And no one can claim that any specific food mentioned here can cure



cancer. However, when the following dietary guidelines are used as part of a total healthful life-style they are associated with a much-reduced incidence

of cancer:

1. Regularly eat high-fiber foods such as whole-grain bread and cereals.
2. Eat a wide variety of vegetables and fruits (fresh, if possible) every day, especially those rich in vitamin C and A. Desirable vegetables are dark green leafy vegetables, yellow vegetables containing carotene (vitamin A), and the cabbage family--cabbage, broccoli, kale, cauliflower, and so on.
3. Eat less fat by decreasing the amount of fatty meats, spreads such as butter and mayonnaise, whole milk, and foods cooked in oil.
4. Eliminate or drastically reduce the amount of nitrite-cured and wood-smoked foods such as ham, hot dogs, bacon, sausages, fish, and so on.
5. Eliminate alcoholic beverages.

Do something good for yourself. Give it a try! It's not hard to eat more healthfully.

## Jobs

Summertime is almost here, and that means young people will soon be out looking for summer jobs. In an effort to help improve the youth employment picture by giving employers an incentive to hire young people, the Tax Equity and Fiscal Respon-

sibility Act of 1982 established a new target group in the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit (TJTC) program -- qualified summer youth employees.

This new tax credit can be a real money-saver for Mississippi employers. Through TJTC, an employer can get a tax credit of 85% on the first \$3,000 paid to an eligible summer worker. This could amount to a savings of up to \$2,550 for each eligible summer youth hired. According to O.H. Simmons, Executive Director of the Mississippi Employment Security Commission, many of the state's employers have realized a "bottom line" savings in their tax bills by using the credits available through TJTC in the past, and this new target group

promises even more savings. According to Simmons, only 1,000 young people were hired through TJTC this summer, the Mississippi businessmen who hired them could reap up to \$2,550,000 in tax credits.

Under the program, a qualified summer youth employee is someone who starts to work after April 30, 1982, works any 90-day period between May 1 and September 15, 1983, had not previously worked for the employer, and is certified by the Mississippi State Employment Service (Job Service) prior to starting work.

Employers interested in finding out more about the Targeted Jobs Tax Credit (TJTC) program should contact their local Employment Service office.

## Safety Tips For Spring Gardening

The home gardeners are at it again. Millions of American householders are back at the annual battle with crab grass and insects in the perennial effort to add a touch of natural color and beauty to the American scene.

The Mississippi State Medical Association recommends gardening as good therapy and good exercise for almost

everyone. It is ordinarily a safe and sane hobby, but gardening entails some hazards to health and safety, most of which can be avoided.

If you have done nothing more strenuous than sit by the fire most of the winter, take it easy for the first few weekends of gardening. Give your muscles a chance to regain strength gradually.

Gardening often brings cuts and scratches from twigs, thorns and sharp tools. Wash the scratch with soap and water and apply an adhesive bandage. Let it bleed a little to wash out impurities. Deeper cuts require medical attention. Be sure your tetanus boosters are up to date.

Power tools, particularly power mowers, are standard equipment for the modern home gardener. They save many an aching back, but they are sometimes dangerous. Study the instructions that come with the mower and follow the safety precautions. If in doubt, ask a mechanic about the hazards of power tools.

Insect sprays and powders, plus poisons that kill weeds, are useful adjuncts to gardening. These, also, have inherent hazards if improperly or carelessly used. Once again, read the directions, especially the warnings.

Bees, wasps and spiders are out for the spring season, too, and now and then one of them may sting you. For most of us, a sting is painful and causes temporary swelling, but it isn't serious. If you are allergic to insect stings, ask your doctor about desensitizing injections.

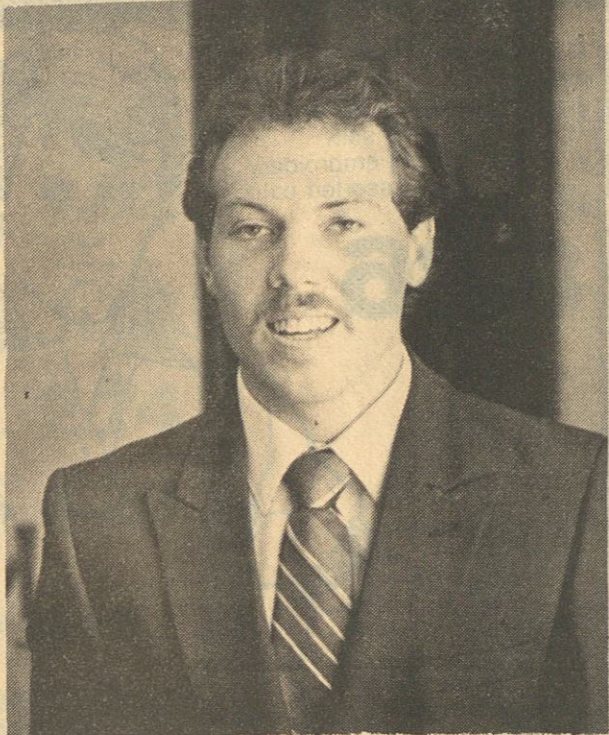

# **Father's Day** **Commentary**

The following article is the result of funding by the Mississippi Committee for the Humanities to the Mississippi Press Association. The opinions expressed are those of the author and not those of either organization.

After our afternoon naps my two brothers and I often sat with our dad at the kitchen table of the mission house in what is now Zaire.

We drank grenadine and water and listened to Dad proclaiming. Sometimes we sang at the top of our voices. Sometimes we just chattered.

As we celebrate Father's Day this Sunday, I remember many events from my childhood and my relationship to my dad.

As a professor at The University of Mississippi I have become aware of Mississippi fathers by watching their sons and daughters as they pursue college degrees.

Fathers play a major role in the formation of their children's personalities. They are disciplinarians, models of behavior, and sources of stability during crises. In some ways the quality of our society is directly related to the quality of our fathers.

During my first year at Ole Miss I asked one young man why he was in the library at 9 p.m. instead of partying at one of the local watering holes. "Oh, my daddy wouldn't like that," he said.

A co-ed responded in a similar fashion when I asked her why she had not become very angry when she learned that a fellow student had lost her class notes. "My daddy taught me better than that," she said.

Many fathers work hard at raising their children. It is their sense of responsibility despite their flaws which draws our gratitude and our affection.

My father has many shortcomings, but he is a good man who has committed himself to helping others. He and my mother took a freighter to the Belgian Congo at the very time the Nazis were invading their neighbors in Europe.

My brothers and I have talked many times about the faith and hope of a man and woman with this sense of service.

The cost to my parents was more than low salaries. The price was also the life of my third brother who died two days after birth because no oxygen tent was available in the remote area where we lived. Faulkner like, I can still hear the whine of the electric saw and see the light in the

Sitting at a typewriter in an Ole Miss classroom, I look out the window at the green light on the fresh grass and giant oaks which has surrounded generations of students and their parents. The azaleas and the dogwoods are gone. Summer is here.

Season follows season. A colleague lost his father in a car accident not too long ago. "I never realized how much we were alike," he said afterwards.

My father in Nigeria is getting the senior class ready for graduation ceremonies. I have written him.

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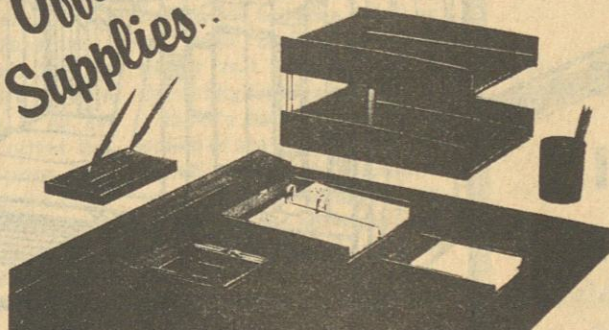
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### Curtain Call

### State Enjoyed Light Forest Fire Season

Finally, I think we can safely say that the 1982-83 season for wildfires is about over barring a prolonged drought.

I want to take this opportunity to say "thanks" to all of you readers who called in your fires (or to report other ones) during the normal fire season. Your cooperation was (and is) needed -- and you really came through.

From November through April, 67 fires burned 384 acres in our county. That compares real good to our five-year average (1978-1982) of 103 fires on 721 acres for those six months. The statewide picture was much the same -- one of the lowest years for fire occurrence on record.

Highest fire occurrence months in our State are traditionally February and March when weather conditions and forest fuels are at critical danger levels.

In February and March we have cold fronts moving in

bringing low humidity and high winds, forest vegetation is dead and dry, and winter rains have normally slackened off.

Even though we had a lot of well distributed rain, there were several days back in the winter when conditions were "right" for some bad fires. They didn't happen, because you folks were more careful than ever with your outdoor burning. I'm grateful, but our crews are even more so, since it's their lives that are most often on the line when wildfires break out and must be controlled.

Let's continue to build on this excellent 1982-83 record in our county. It's pretty

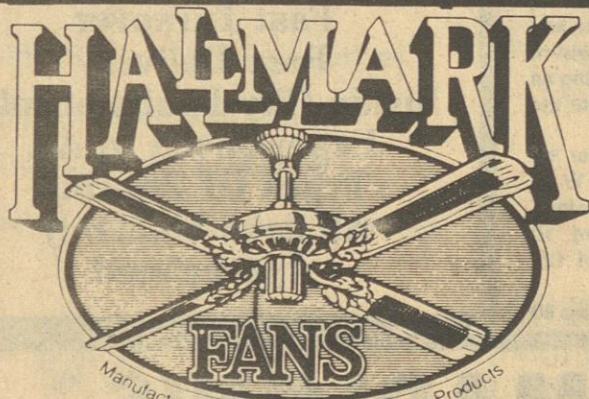

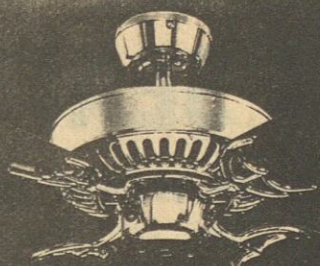

The most common surgical treatment for patients who suffer severe angina is coronary bypass surgery, in which the blood flow is rerouted around a blocked artery by way of a transplanted section of blood vessel, usually from the patient's leg or thigh.

A nonsurgical treatment called angioplasty is being used increasingly in place of the coronary bypass procedure for some angina patients.

Angioplasty opens the narrowed arteries that lead to the heart by enlarging the blood vessels with a small catheter. This catheter carries a tiny balloon at its tip. The balloon is placed in

the affected artery and then is inflated to push aside the atherosclerotic plaque that is clogging the artery. This painless procedure can be done in several hours, and the patient can return to normal activities almost immediately without discomfort and recovery necessary after a bypass operation.

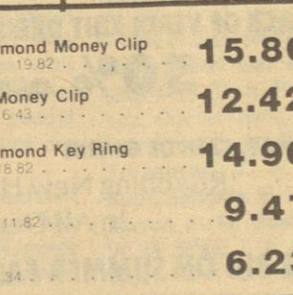
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## Their Way To Medics

Jo Booker, left, and Annette Bostick, have just completed Emergency Medical Technician, Intermediate. They finished the approximate 650 hours of training with "A" averages on levels I and II. There was approximately 200 hours of on time done in the Emergency Rooms, Cardiac Units, and Intensive Units at the larger hospitals in Alabama, and Ambulance Services and Rescue Squads in Iuka, also at Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka.

Young women have been skillfully trained for recognizing and treating emergency situations in the hospital as well as under conditions in the field. Some of the skills include: Intravenous Insertions (I.V.'s), Tracheal Intubation, Manual Resuscitation, Monitoring and recognizing dysrhythmias on the electrocardiogram (ECG), CPR, skills acquired, which were among cardiovascular resuscitation, aids to stop life threatening hemorrhaging, splinting, bandages and dressings, managing victims of spinal injuries, treatment of shock, use of precautions, M.A.S.T. (Military Anti-Shock Trousers), radio communications (voice and pen), scene control and evacuation from wrecked vehicles, including use of Hurst

Tools (Jaws of Life). Terri and Sharon are also qualified instructors of EMT I Basic Class. The girls will begin the 3rd and final level of training for paramedics in a couple of weeks at Calhoun State College in Alabama. They do agree that already being nurses is beneficial to them with the anatomy and physiology and medical terminology; however, nursing school touches only lightly with emergency situations. Terri, Iuka, and Sharon, Dennis, are presently employed at Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka.

## Matters of Health

### Treatment For Angina

WHAT IS ANGINA AND WHAT ARE THE CURRENT TREATMENTS FOR THIS CHEST PAIN?

Angina or chest pain is a frequent symptom of patients with coronary artery disease. Angina is your heart's way of telling you that it is getting too little oxygen because of blockage or narrowing of a vessel or vessels leading to it.

Unlike other types of chest pain, angina generally occurs during physical exertion or excitement, when the heart demands more oxygen than usual. It subsides when the exertion and excitement cease. Angina pain usually is not a pain but a dull discomfort, a feeling of pressure, squeezing or burning in the center of the chest behind the chestbone. Any chest pain, however, should not be self-diagnosed. It could be simple indigestion, or it could

indicate a more serious problem with your heart.

There are several kinds of treatment associated with angina or chest pain. Your doctor will suggest the proper one after a thorough examination.

Since obesity, smoking and hypertension are risk factors in developing coronary heart disease, your doctor probably will tell you to lose weight if you are obese, to stop smoking and to engage in a mild form of exercise to relieve stress and condition your cardiovascular system.

The most commonly prescribed medication for angina is nitroglycerin; it must be dissolved under the tongue and works immediately to dilate the blood vessels around the heart and allow more blood to flow to the heart. In addition, there are a variety of oral or topical forms of nitroglycerin which, while they work more slowly, give longer relief.

Another highly effective medicine for angina pain is Inderal, a drug that slows the heart beat so the heart doesn't require so much blood and oxygen.

A new group of experimental drugs, called calcium blocking agents, have been developed. Used extensively in Europe and recently approved for use in this country, these drugs have the properties similar to both nitroglycerin and Inderal but

### Energy Assistance For Elderly & Handicapped

Eligible low-income households with elderly or handicapped persons again will receive monetary assistance to help offset summer cooling costs, according to the Governor's Office of Energy Assistance (GOEA).

This summer cooling component of the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) will begin on July 1, and families certified eligible will receive one-

time payments of \$100 to \$170 which can legally be cashed only through the energy vendors declared on their applications.

Families who have received heating assistance under LIHEAP after December 1, 1982 are not eligible for summer cooling assistance.

"Funds for the cooling program will provide assistance to approximately 6,000 eligible needy families who have at least one member who is 65 or older or a member who has a physical condition aggravated by heat," said Carl B. Cooper, GOEA director. "This condition must be medically certified and documented."

All applicants must meet family income and assets tests, and the family must provide proof of income for the entire household for at least the prior month. Proof of energy responsibility also must be documented.

A single person household, for example, could have no more than \$5,850 income to qualify. A family of four could

have no more than \$11,625.

Applicants who are approved will receive checks in the names of the vendors and the applicants.

Applications for the summer cooling program will be accepted from July 1 through August 12 by local community action agencies and other community based organizations.

Approximately \$600,000 has been allocated to the summer cooling program from a total of approximately \$14.5 million provided for the year's LIHEAP activities by a federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Grant.

Last year, \$1.7 million was allocated to the summer cooling program, and 12,084 families were served. The federal government provided \$13.7 million for the entire year's LIHEAP activities.
