Chatting With Your Home Economist

Selecting Fresh Foods Of course you want to buy the freshest foods possible. When selecting fresh produce or meat, you can see quality just by looking. But you can't open packaged foods to check for freshness before you buy them. Open dating, or freshness dating, is a system which helps to make sure you receive foods at their peak quality. It is an important shopping tool that helps you get the most value

for your food dollar. An open date is any caneldar date marked on a food package or container. You can easily read and understand an open date and use it to make informed buying decisions. The open date serves as a

general guideline for selecting foods, but handling, storage conditions, temperature and humidity also affect food quality. If products are improperly handled at any point in the food marketing system or by you at home, they will lose quality and can even spoil.

Open dating has grown over the past decade because of consumer interest and because it helps stores assure the freshness of their products. Currently, there are no federal laws requiring open dates on foods, but some states, counties and cities require various types of

dating on certain perishable products.

The manufacturer or retailer usually determines the type of open date used on a food package. There are four types of dates used. "Sell By" and "Best If Used By" are the most common.

Sell by, or pull date, represents the last day a product should be offered for sale, allowing time for home use under proper storage conditions. The label may read "July 9" or "Sell by July 9". The label may also include the year, especially If a product has a fairly long shelf life. On some products, like breads, only the day of the week -- for instance, "Monday" -- may be given.

Sell by dates are generally used on perishable products, such as meats, dairy products and baked goods. Some manufacturers also use these dates on semi-perishables, including snack foods and cereals.

Best is used by date indicates the final day after which the manufacturer or retailer determines the product is still good. The label may state, for example, "Best If Used by July 9, 1983". The label frequently includes the year, because this type of date is often used on shelf-staple items having a shelf life of more than six months. Cereals and snack items are the types of foods most commonly carrying the "Best If Used By" date. Less commonly used dates include "Pack Date" and "Expiration Date"

Pack date indicates when a product was manufactured. processed or packaged for retail sale. Perishable foods,

including fresh fruits and vegetables and fresh red meat, may carry pack dates. Even though the package may be stamped with the calendar date, the label may not indicate "Pack Date".

Expiration date signifies the last day an item should be used. For instance, the label may read "Exp. July 30, 1983". Although the expiration date is not widely used, it is found or refrigerated dough products and packaged yeasts as well as drugs.

Check the label. Look for an open date. Usually the date is easy to find, but some packages contain more written information and require a closer look.

Sorting through packages looking the freshest date on the supermarket shelf is unnecessary, because the open date allows time for use at home. Remember, the person stocking shelves keeps the dated packages in order, to make sure you receive the freshest products.

To maintain maximum freshness and quality, you must properly store and handle foods at home. Meat and poultry, for instance should be held below 35 degrees F. Also check your freezer. It should be set below 0 degrees F. for best frozen food storage. Remember, use oldest items first. Proper rotation of foods at home helps you serve the freshest foods.

Remember, reading labels and using open dating help ease your food budget and let you enjoy the freshest meals possible.

MAINTAIN QUALITY ON FARM-STORED GRAIN, FARMERS ADVISED - The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service reminds farmers to make frequent inspections of farm-stored grain and take necessary steps to keep it in good condition. Mild winter conditions in many areas caused excessive moisture, mold growth and insect activity in both farm-stored corn and sorghum.

"Maintenance of grain quality is particularly important for those farmers who will use their farm-stored grain loans to satisfy payment-in-kind obligations," said Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee.

"Any loss in the quality or quantity of farm-stored grain, whether it is in the reserve program or under regular loan, is fully the farmer's responsibility. Spot checks



If any grain deterioration is detected during the agency's spot check, the farmer is instructed to recondition the grain, rotate it with new crops or repay the loan.

Bridges emphasized that farmers need to particularly alert to storability problems when inspecting their grain, and should increase spot checks of the grain if the normal checks indicate the need. "The longer grain is in storage the more apt it is to become infested." In cases where high moisture or insect infestation exists, farmers should make certain that corrective action is taken.

The Divide Section WMA will be open to small game hunting and some upland bird hunting this fall. However, the Department of Wildlife Conservation has closed deer hunting on the area for at least three years in order to allow the deer population to increase to huntable num-

"In addition to the wildlife area, the Department was given the work facilities at Holcut, which is worth at least \$295,000," District Biologist Bobby Wilson of Smithville said.

Wilson said the facilities there include a laboratory, a maintenance shop, a main building with 2,000 square feet of living space, all protected by a cyclone fence.

In addition, the Department will receive on July 1 the facilities at Turnpike Hill in Tishomingo County which include a double-wide trailer, maintenance shop, and several storage buildings.

According to Strong, the Corps will retain title to the land, but the area and its timber resources will be managed for fish and wildlife.

July 1st Marks The Beginning of a Stricter DUI Law

The Fourth of July holiday will be different this year. On July 1st the new state law goes into effect guaranteeing stricter punishment for D.U.I offenders. Mississippi Highway Patrolmen, hoping to lower last year's Fourth of July holiday death toll, will make every effort to get intoxicated drivers off the

Col. Donald Butler, Chief of the Mississippi Highway Patrol, said the law allows the arresting officer to immediately confiscate the license of the driver arrested for DUI if chemical testing of a person's breath indicates the blood alcohol concentration was .10% or if the driver refuses to submit to a chemical breath test.

He said persons who have been convicted of DUI since July 1, 1981, will spend at least 48 hours in jail, be fined up to \$1,000 and can lose their driver license for two

First offenders will be assessed a fine of up to \$500, have their driver license suspended for one year, ordered to spend at least 10 hours in a Mississippi Alcohol Safety Education Program (MASEP) school and could be sent to jail for 24 hours.

First offenders who attend a MASEP school will have their license suspended for 90 days rather than one year. Anyone convicted of DUI

three times in five years will be sentenced to jail for 30 days to one year, fined up to \$1,000 and have their license suspended for three years.

Last year's Fourth of July observance proved to be the most deadly 1982 holiday for traffic fatalities in Mississippi. Butler said 15 people died in 11 accidents. Four of the 11 wrecks were caused by alcohol drinking vehicle operators, leaving five people

Reservoir Fluctuations Begin In TVA Mosquito **Control Operation**

TVA plans to begin weekly water-level fluctuations this month on mainstream reservoirs as part of its program to control mosquitoes in the Tennessee Valley

The fluctuations will continue through Labor Day as weather permits. The fluctuations are a major part of the TVA effort to control lakebreeding mosquitoes, including those that carry malaria and dog heartworm diseases. Other measures include selected use of insecticides and shoreline maintenance.

Joe Cooney, manager of the TVA reservoir ecology program, said lake-breeding mosquitoes have not been a major problem so far this year because of heavy rains and high streamflows during April

There have been some problems, however, with floodwater mosquitoes, most notably on Kentucky Reservoir. Floodwater mosquitoes hatch whenever low-lying areas of a reservoir are

Cooney said such lowland flooding has occurred three times this year on Kentucky Reservoir, creating favorable conditions for floodwater mosquitoes.

mosquitoes also have been a problem on some other reservoirs in the southern edge of

Cooney said major aerial and ground spraying has been carried out on Kentucky Reservoir as part of a TVA systemwide vector control program. There also has been some spraying on Pickwick. Wheeler, Hiwassee, and

Chickamauga Reservoirs. TVA has also received numerous complaints this year about ticks. "Ticks had an exceptionally good winter," Cooney said, "and they're showing up in large numbers."

TVA does a small amount of tick control work on reservoir properties, but the major battle is at Land Between The Lakes, in western Tennessee and Kentucky, where control measures and research are being carried out.

Computer Usage For Students At Northeast

Computer Usage for Students will be offered one night per week for six weeks at Northeast Junior College beginning July 11, computer literacy coordinator Opal Melvin announced.

Specifically designed for students between the ages of 12 and 18, the class is limited 25 participants. Registration fee is \$45.00 per person. All would-be participants must pre-register prior to July 5 to insure a place in the class.

The class is designed to acquaint students with microcomputers and their uses. Basic terminology and simple programming will be stressed, with a great deal of class time devoted to hands on experience situations.

During the programming sessions, emphasis will be placed on BASIC (Beginners All-Purpose Symbolic Instruction Code). This language uses English words and symbols for instructions to the computer. Basic is probably the most widely used language in the world with both mini and microcomputers.

Successful participants will be awarded credit for 18 contact hours.

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

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

To live lonely, homeless, unloved, hungry and perhaps injured or diseased is no life for any being. You wouldn't want a life like that for yourself, but yet millions of dogs and cats lead lives like that because so many pet owners have failed to spay their females or neuter their males. This results in an unbelieveable surplus of unwanted kittens and puppies.

Every hour 2,000 to 3,000 puppies and kittens are born in the United States. 17 million dogs and cats are turned into shelters and pounds each year while 13 1/2 million are destroyed at a cost of 125 million dollars to taxpayers. In our state alone, 800,000 to 1 million puppies and kittens are born each year with Tishomingo County obviously contributing to this staggering statistic.

It is time the residents of this county take it upon themselves to demand action from our local elected officials to provide a refuge for our unwanted and abandoned creatures which roam Tishomingo County. It is our duty to assume responsibility for these animals at our own shelter. Many animals receive their fair share in the pleasures of life which we claim for ourselves but the abandoned and unwanted also deserve the same even if it results temporarily at our shelter.

A few months ago, I personally met with the County Board of Supervisors and presented a structured plan for developing a shelter. I advised the members that the City of Savannah, Tenn. has had past experience in allotting money for a shelter to be allocated immediately when not previously planned for in that fiscal year. After meeting with Savannah's city manager and assistant city manager, they advised me they would be more than willing to work with our elected officials on their present budget and show them how it is possible to accomplish this.

I also made the members aware that two local veterinarians are anxiously willing to work with them, one being our own Dr. Perkins. Dr. Jackson, from Corinth, has had special training regarding making a shelter work as a financial asset rather than a deficit and he has agreed to devote time working with our elected officials on this mat-

Next, I presented copies of the Mississippi state laws pertaining to animal welfare, which gives a city or county the authority to create a shelter. I also distributed copies of the ANIMAL WELFARE ACT, which amongst other things shows those in authority the requirements and regulations to follow when building a shelter.

Lastly, I presented various samples of city and county animal ordinances used by others and which luka sorely

After speaking with Mayor Biggs and meeting with the County Board of Supervisors,

their general consensus on the issue was, "Tishomingo County does not really have an excessive surplus of animals and only a minimal animal abandonment problem, therefore, we do not need a shelter." I can certainly discredit this statement as my phone rings quite often regarding abandoned litters of pupples and kittens found at the callers doorstep or found inhumanly dumped alongside of the road or at trash dumpsters, which are really nothing more than mini-adoption centers of the county. Of course, there are probably more calls which are never made as these defenseless creatures were found too late or never found at all only to die a slow and agonizing death.

With election time approaching, I ask you to approach the candidates about the need for a shelter and ask for a definite answer to this serious and appalling need for a refuge for these defenseless creatures. Animals with no future deserve a shelter and if adoption is unsuccessful, then they also deserve a peaceful death at our temporary sanctuary.

Mr. Leon Cook, President of the County Board of Supervisors, told me I was the first one in the 13 years he has held office that had ever approached him about building a shelter. Won't you help change that by calling, writing or speaking to him and your other elected officials? The choice is yours whether we become the caretakers for our unwanted and abandoned animals or let them suffer an unmerciful

that weeds hurt yields, slow harvest and lower soybean quality. Still, weeds are the leading soybean pest in Mississippi and in Tishomingo County. The key to stopping weeds is early

Perhaps the biggest reason weeds cut yields is the late timing of postemergence herbicide applications on broadleaf weeds like cocklebur and others. It's a proven fact that you must have most weeds under control within four weeks after emergence or yields will suf-

Using research figures and an example of a 40-bushel yield potential, an infestation of five weeds per 20 foot of

row reduces yields by two bushels per acre in four weeks, 4.4 bushels after six weeks and nearly seven bushels after eight weeks. Even if the weeds were then killed at eight weeks, the yield has dropped from 40 bushels potential to only 33

These figures show why you must kill weeds early to stop yield loss. For more information on controlling weeds in crops, contact the County Extension Office.

County Agent's Notes

Buying Pesticides

Buying and selling to control materials household and crop pests is becoming more complicated as new materials are offered on the market and stricter controls are imposed by state

and federal agencies.

Safe and proper use of these pesticides is necessary if we are to maintain a plentiful food supply and continue to enjoy a high level of public health.

A person who sells pesticides is in a rather unique and vulnerable position. Whether he sells to a large grower, the backyard gardener or housewife, he must face the fact that he is putting a poison in the hands of the public. He must make sure the right material is sold to prevent a possible accident.

Good pesticide dealers understand this. They know a buyer will come again if he knows the dealer is interested in the health and welfare of the customer as well as selling the right pesticide for the job.

When you buy pesticides, consider these points:

· Large packages are usually cheaper on a per pound basis. But, left-over pesticiees may cause a storage problem. A short shelf life causes waste and increases costs.

.. Dusts are usually more expensive than wettable powders or concentrated solutions, but they are also more convenient to use.

· Aerosols are usually the most expensive form. But, the convenience may be worth the price.

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
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
