It has been my desire and aim to carry out the duties of the office in an efficient, impartial and courteous manner, and I shall continue to do so if re-elected.

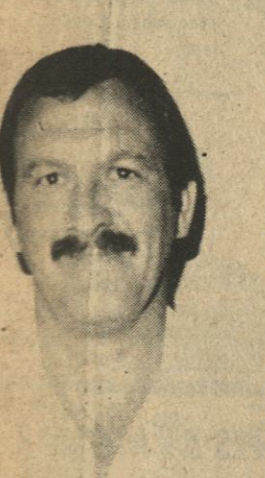
I am 49 years of age and married. Earlene and I have four children: Sharon, Glenda, Melissa and Danny. We have two grandchildren.

Jim Roberts For District Attorney



Jim Roberts, the prosecuting attorney for Pontotoc County for the past 11 and one half years, is running for District Attorney of the First Circuit Court District.

The veteran prosecuting attorney cited his record in Pontotoc County on convictions and his relationship with law enforcement and officials in kicking off his race. "It's time for a change," Roberts declared. "I'm pledging to bring an active prosecutor role to the office of District Attorney. I will put into effect an organized effort against organized crime. I'll make your district attorney's office efficient and responsive."

Mr. Roberts established his own law practice in Pontotoc following his graduation from the University of Mississippi Law School in 1971 and is the senior partner in the firm of Roberts and Tutor. He is a graduate of Millsaps College and holds a Master's Degree in Business Administration from Mississippi State University in addition to his law degree from Ole Miss. He worked his way through Millsaps, Mississippi State and Ole Miss.

Jimmy Roberts has been involved since early in his childhood and believes public service is a high calling and citizen responsibility. He was twice elected County Attorney without opposition and is the senior prosecuting attorney in the First District, including all members of the present District Attorney's staff.

He was active in student, athletic and academic functions in school, was a member of the football team at Millsaps, and was selected for many offices and honors at State and Ole Miss, including being president of the Law School Student Body and being selected to Omicron Delta Kappa, national honorary leadership society. He is a member of the Millsaps, Mississippi State and Ole Miss Alumni Associations.

In his public service experience he has prosecuted tough cases of all kinds including capital murder. He has served as Youth Court Prosecutor. He serves as attorney for many school district, public agencies and power associations, including the Regional Emergency Medical Service.

Roberts is a member of all of the York Rite Masonic

bodies in Pontotoc County, is a Shriner and a 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Mason, Corinth Consistory. He is a member of First United Methodist Church of Pontotoc where he is active in various organizations and has held several offices.

In 1971 Jim Roberts was named Outstanding Young Man of Pontotoc County. He is a former president of the Pontotoc Rotary Club, has served as chairman of the Cancer Society Campaign, the Heart Fund and currently is chairman of the Northeast Mental Health Commission.

He is active in professional bar activities on a county, district, state and national levels, including holding membership in various prosecuting attorney's groups.

Jim Roberts is 38 years old. "I have a rather old fashioned feeling about crime," he said. "I simply want to put those who commit crime behind bars."

"I intend to make the D.A.'s office one close to the people and receptive to the courts. I'll be on the job where your sheriff, police chief or any other law enforcement officer can find me if he or she needs me during an investigation. I'll surround myself with the most capable assistants possible and the best qualified investigators I can find."

"I'll be your prosecutor. I'll prepare the prosecution and you'll see me in court."

If you don't know me and I don't have the opportunity to visit with you during this campaign, I invite you to ask your hometown lawyers, your law enforcement officials or anyone from my home county, Pontotoc, about Jimmy Roberts. YOUNG IUKA MAN KILLED IN TEXAS

Iuka residents were greatly saddened this week by the tragic death of Donald (Donnie) Ray Pate, 28 year old son of Mrs. Marlene Alsop and

Vernon Pate, both of Iuka. Donnie was the victim of a brutal stabbing on Sunday, July 10, in Fort Worth, Texas. According to a family mem-

ber, the murder transpired at approximately 10:00 p.m. near the swimming pool at Pate's apartment complex. A neighbor, David P. Boyd, is reported to have attacked Pate with a kitchen knife while the victim was seated at poolside. Pate was transported via helicopter to a hospital where he was pronounced dead at 11:04 p.m. as the result of multiple stab wounds.

Donnie, a longtime resident of Tishomingo County, had been employed with a construction firm in the Fort Worth area. In years past, he attended Iuka High School where he was a member of the basketball and football squads. He was a Baptist.

The Fort Worth Homicide Department has reported to family members that Boyd will be charged with first degree murder. The suspect is currently hospitalized because of injuries sustained at the hands of Pate's friends following the stabbing.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 o'clock p.m. on Wednesday afternoon, July 13, at

the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Bobby Burress officiating. Burial followed in Rutledge Salem Cemetery.

Aside from his parents, survivors include a son, Dustin Neil Pate, age 2; and three sisters, Tressie Davis, of Belmont, Martha Lambert and Beth McNutt, both of Iuka.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Mildewed Fabrics

Mildew will grow on clothes, towels, bed linens and just about any other fabric containing a natural fiber when kept in a damp, dark, warm and poorly ventilated area. Mildew damage

can range from a musty odor and discoloration to the actual rotting of the fabric.

The best procedure for preventing mildew from forming in the first place. Clean fabric is less likely to mildew than soiled fabric. Store clothing and bed linens in a dry, clean, well ventilated place. Do not allow damp or wet clothing to sit for long periods of time. For example, remove clothing from hampers on a regular basis and remove clothing from the washing machine as soon as the last cycle ends.

If fabrics have mildewed,

personnel will provide management assistance to landowners in the areas of farmpond construction, fish stocking rates, maintaining proper pond balance, fertilization programs, and aquatic weed control. For information on fishpond management call the Soil Conservation Service in Tishomingo County.

treat them as soon as possible. Launder stained items using chlorine bleach if safe for fabric. Otherwise, soak in an oxygen bleach in hot water then launder. Items labeled "dry clean only" should be taken to a professional dry cleaner as soon as possible. Be sure to point out the mildew to the cleaner.

Some badly mildewed fabrics may be damaged beyond repair.

Home Laundering Hints

- * Close zippers, button buttons, tie strings, and snap snaps to avoid snags, tangles, and tears.
- * Always check pockets for pens, candy, and money before washing.
- * Treat spots and stains before washing because washing may set some stains permanently.
- * Avoid the "pink underwear syndrome" by sorting clothes into four piles by colors: whites, pastels, medium brights, and darks.
- * Rinse all wash loads in cold water to save energy dollars without reducing cleanliness.
- * Clean the dryer lint screen after every other load. Lint build-up increases drying time and drying cost.
- * Dry cleaned clothes immediately after washing to avoid mildew.
- * Dry full loads because small loads waste energy, but don't overload.
- * Follow directions and use

recommended amounts of laundry products for best results.

* When possible, reload the dryer while it is still warm from the previous load; this makes use of residual heat.

Lemonade Cooler

2 cups sugar
2-1/2 cups water
Juice of 6 lemons
Juice of 2 oranges
Grated rind of 1 orange
1 cup mint leaves

Cook sugar and water for 5 minutes. Add fruit juices and rind. Pour over mint leaves; cover and let stand 1 hour. Strain; cover and refrigerate. Use 1/2 cup of this syrup for each glass. Fill with crushed ice and water. Yield: 12 - 14 servings.

Help For Gardeners

The spring of 1983 was one of the worst in recent times for home gardens. Record-breaking amounts of rain and unseasonable late cold delayed planting and destroyed many gardens.

This is the year to have a big late-summer and fall garden to make up for all that didn't get planted or that was lost. Plan now for the

vegetables you want to plant. Planting dates are in the GARDEN TABLOID, available free at the Extension Office.

Vegetables you can plant in late summer include summer squash, bush snap beans, lima beans, southern peas, and cucumbers. You also can set out tomatoes, eggplant, and peppers, if plants are available.

Some vegetables normally planted in spring won't do well in late summer and fall gardens. These include sweet corn, bulb onions, watermelons, muskmelons, and peanuts. English peas are risky, but might be worth a try. Irish potatoes can be grown, but it's hard to find seed potatoes that will sprout.

If you're one of the lucky ones who has vegetables now, harvest them regularly to avoid losses. Keep spraying to control insects and diseases and keep grasses and weeds under control.

Recommendations on controlling insects and diseases and other practices are given in the GARDEN TABLOID.

Safety Depends On You

Farm safety is a big investment in time, effort, and money. A good harvest depends on your farming skills, resources, and, of course, cooperation from Mother Nature.

Whether your farm is free from costly and tragic

mishaps depends in part on how well you prepare your equipment and how safely you and your operators run that equipment. Neglect can lead to tragic consequences.

Instruct and remind operators about safe procedures. Operate and maintain equipment as directed in the instruction or operator's manual that comes with the equipment.

Many farm accidents are caused from missing shields and guards. Keep all protective shields in place and stay clear of unguarded moving parts. Shut off the power before unclogging or servicing, and wait until all moving parts have completely stopped.

Children are a leading source of farm accidents. Keep children and non-workers off the way from equipment. Don't allow children to play in or around storage bins, hay bales, silos, and other unsafe areas.

Fast VS Slow Growth Trees

Trees can generally be classified into slow growing and fast growing groups. The slower growing trees are generally longer lived, stronger and more desirable shade trees than the faster growing trees.

The slower growing trees include most of the oaks, hickories, magnolias and beeches. The faster growing group includes cottonwood, willow, sycamore, maples and pines.

A good approach to planting trees, especially on open lots, is to plant a combination of slower growing and faster growing trees. The faster trees shoot up giving quick shade. Then, as the longer lived trees reach a reasonable

size, the fast growing trees can be removed. It is a good idea to remove them one at a time over a period of five to ten years. They should be removed before they become too large and thus expensive to remove.

When planting any tree, remember to project the ultimate size of the tree. All trees generally grow faster than we realize and get larger than we expect. Leave plenty of room around houses, drives and walks and remember to look up for power lines. Don't plant trees too close together. Close growing trees adversely affect each other's form.

The average residential lot

is too small for very

trees, but try to leave 20 feet between the house and trees and 10 to 15 feet between trees and drives.

Interplanting fast and growing species approximately 15 to 20 feet apart in optimum. Then the fast growing species removed, the slower growing species will be spaced apart, 30 to 40 feet apart.

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CARING FOR YOUR PET

ON DOG BONES

Dogs and bones seem to go together, at least in the popular imagination. Comics and cartoons are always portraying dogs protecting a treasured bone, burying it, or trying to remember where they put it.

Although bones do supply a small amount of calcium and phosphorus, commercial bone meal is a better source. However, in spite of their limited nutritional value, bones are still good for dogs. They are excellent for growing puppies to distract them from destroying household effects. They also provide hours of pleasure and freedom from boredom. They exercise the gums and help keep the teeth free from tartar.

Be careful what bones

to give your dog. Bones of chicken, rabbit, fish, and the small bones of lamb, pork, or veal, should never be used. Best are large beef bones, and shank bones of lamb or pork. Also, there are some dogs that cannot digest bones in any form and vomit them or become constipated. In this case, dog biscuits are an excellent substitute.

WHAT KIND OF BIFOCALS?

Bifocals are generally the choice of people who require two separate vision corrections -- one for near and one for distance. It is the sensible alternative to carrying two pairs of glasses and changing them constantly. But even after choosing bifocals, there are additional considerations.

What degree of magnification is desirable? The power of the bifocal segment can be selected for any distance desired. Most often it is set for reading distance, but it need not be. It can be made for seeing as close as eight to ten inches for very precise work. Or it could be set for twenty to thirty inches to see the dash-

board of an auto or an airplane. But it probably cannot provide optimum focus at both distances. There are also choices as to the position and size of the bifocal segment. It is usually located in the lower third of the lens, but it doesn't have to be. It could be at the top of the lens or in the corner. It can be as small as a dime or as large as a compass most of the lens.

ASCS Farm News

FARMERS REMINDED OF CONSERVING USE REQUIREMENTS FOR PIK ACREAGES — Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, reminds farmers who are participating in the Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) and the Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Program that conserving use acreage must be protected from erosion and from spread of noxious weeds. He said that native grasses and legumes are eligible cover when adequate growth is sufficient to prevent soil erosion is obtained. However, he pointed out that it is still not too late for participants to seed these acres to summer legumes and/or grasses. The chairman also advised that it is the responsibility of individual program participants to clip this land as necessary to prevent the spread of noxious weeds. He pointed out that it is to the farmers interest to prevent weeds and undesirable growth from seeding. Control measures now will help to reduce or

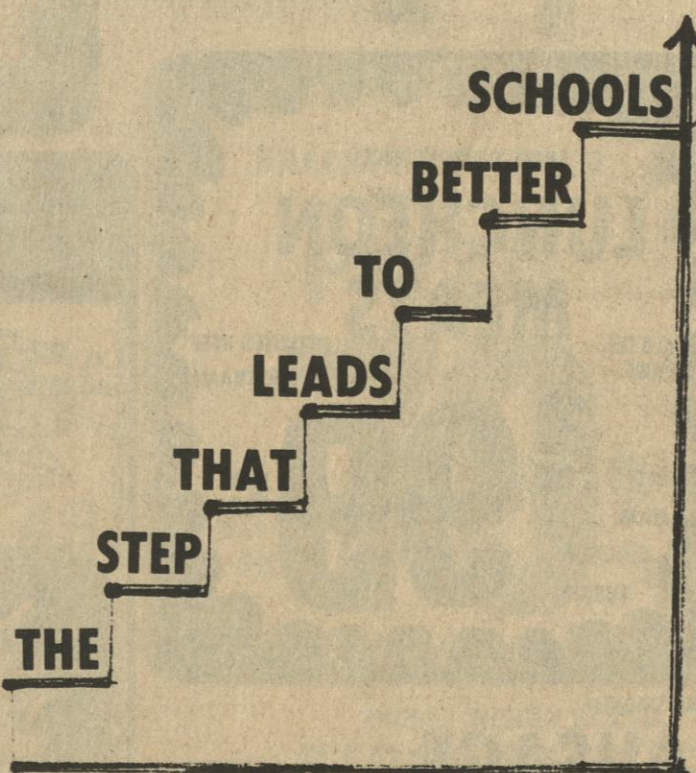

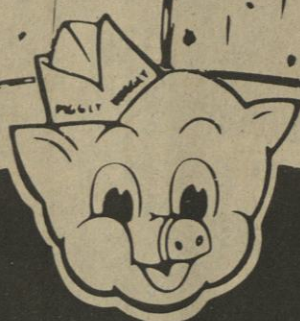

In foreign countries where sanitation is frequently lacking, *bacteria* often disable travelers with diarrhea, stomach cramps, and generalized discomfort. Bacteria such as *E. Coli*, *Salmonella*, and *Shigella* produce toxins (poisons) that, in the stomach and intestines, may produce irritation and inflammation.

Prevention of traveler's diarrhea is more effective than treatment. The drinking of water that has not been chlorinated or recently boiled should be avoided. Only those vegetables that are cooked and served hot should be eaten (avoid salads). Fresh fruit should be personally peeled or opened.

Severe diarrhea may require a physician's care and use of prescription drugs. Pharmacists in North America and in other countries can usually provide expert advice and products to relieve discomfort and sometimes shorten the disability caused by diarrhea.

Report Planting By July 15th

July 5 is the final planting date for insured GRAIN SORGHUM AND SOYBEANS in TISHOMINGO COUNTY, according to JOANN C. SHELLEY, Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acres of GRAIN SORGHUM AND SOYBEANS planted by JULY 5, insured by FCIC (or by a private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by JULY 15 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says SHELLEY.

Acreage planted after JULY 5 must also be reported on the JULY 15 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

"Farmers unable to plant prior to JULY 5 because of

excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower guarantee due to the late planting," SHELLEY explained.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.

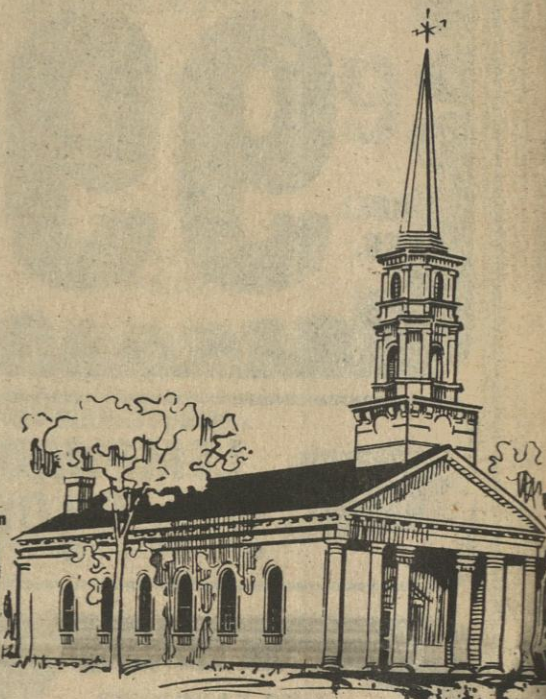

RAINBOW 4-H CLUB RESPONSIBLE FOR COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

Good things are happening in Burnsville because a group of youngsters care about their town. These youngsters are all members of the Rainbow 4-H Club, but locals refer to them simply as "The Rainbows". For like a rainbow, they bring beauty and hope to the community.

Evidence of their hard work and efforts can be seen throughout the town. In the library stands a carefully restored antique display case. The downtown district has undergone a renewal of pride and attention since the Rainbows cleaned up the area. And Burnsville now has a park for children to play in. These are only a few of the

Rainbow's accomplishments. What inspires them to do these good deeds? Perhaps it is the retired couple they look to for motivation and guidance.

H.W. and Elanor Richardson moved to Burnsville in 1977. She was a former teacher who had worked with children for thirty years. He had just retired from a rewarding career in the construction business which had taken him to the Middle East, North Africa, and South America. One year after their move to Burnsville, they began working with the 4-H organization.

Said Elanor, "I had been teaching too long. I was

missing the children while just sitting around the house. I like to see children learn and watch them develop."

H.W. made a similar comment. "It's something to do, I'm retired. We like to help the kids. Give them a chance to learn and keep them off the streets."

Soon the Richardsons had converted an apartment adjoining their home into a clubhouse for the Rainbows, and their 4-H involvement had become a full-time job. H.W. was spending a great deal of his time in his workshop instructing club members on the techniques and intricacies of woodworking. Elanor was finding herself at the

clubhouse assisting members with their individual projects or sitting in on a strategy planning meeting.

It was in one such meeting that the Rainbows decided to undertake their latest venture, the construction of a children's park. There had been a park in Burnsville back when Mrs. Montgomery was mayor. Since then, vandalism and neglect had taken their toll until nothing was left at the site.

The Rainbows took steps to build their park at this same location. Letters were written to Chevron and Reader's Digest netting \$600 in grants for the project. A theme and landscape plan were then decided upon. Afterward, a free lease on the property was acquired from Charles Rushing. With the grants, the Rainbows bought two swing sets, a barbecue grill, and timber from which five picnic tables and two benches would be built.

Once the rainbow imaged entranceway had been erected, Burnsville had herself a park. However, it is still incomplete. More playground equipment is needed including see-saws, a merry-go-round, and heavy duty swings. In other endeavors, the Rainbows have received some assistance. Second District Supervisor Gerald Parsons has furnished a metal culvert for a bridge at the entrance to the park. The City of Burnsville has promised to provide water service and garbage pick-up.

With these future projects in mind, the Rainbows are currently planning improvements for the park which has proven to be a big hit with Burnsville residents. Elanor said that she had received many telephone calls from mothers expressing their gratitude to the Rainbows. But it is the children who love the park the most.

For the project, the Rainbow Club earned the 1983 Tishomingo County 4-H Community Pride Award. This repeated their attainment of the prestigious award on the previous year when the Rainbows spurred a downtown renewal program.

Not long ago, most of Burnsville's storebuildings were empty and dilapidated. One

"We get to go places, learn a lot, and meet people." Then commenting on the club's community work, he said that they had "probably done more for Burnsville than anyone else."

Whether they have or not, one thing is certain: There's always a rainbow in Burnsville blessing the town with a special brand of beauty and hope. It's called caring.

County School Bus Driver Training

The second School Bus Driver Training School for the Tishomingo County Schools has been scheduled to begin Monday, July 18, and 19, 1983, at 8:00 a.m. at the Tishomingo High School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus drivers certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers. Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one other school which will be announced at a later date. Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

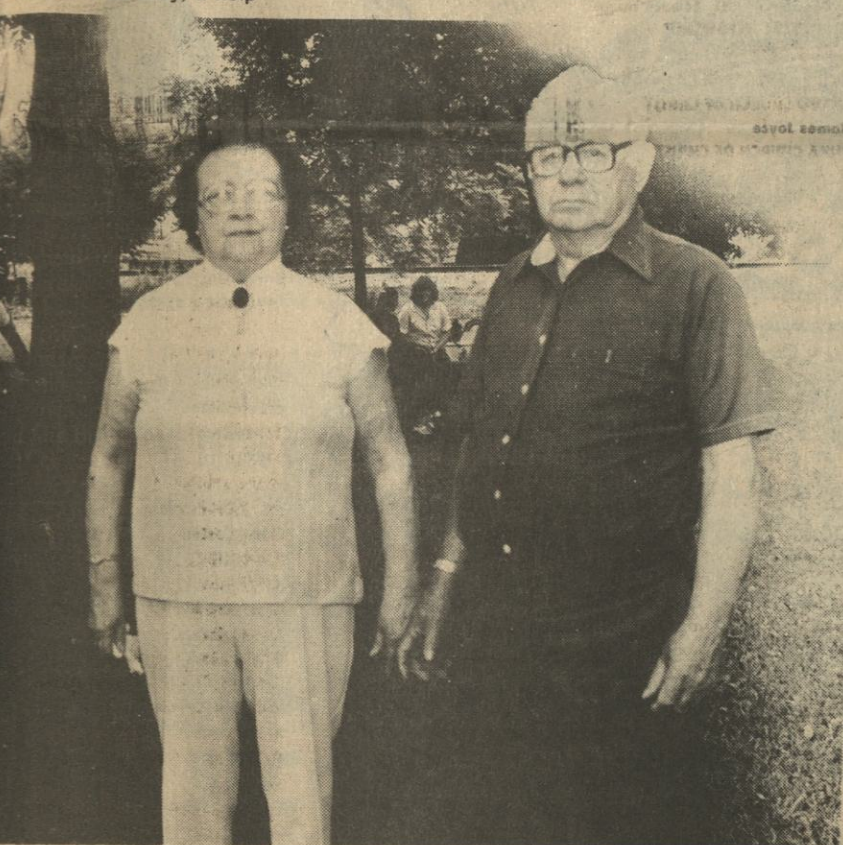

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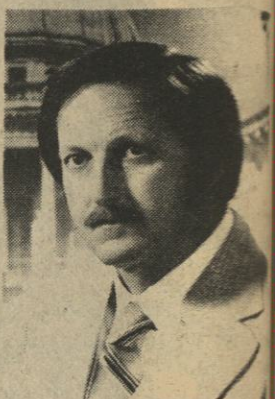

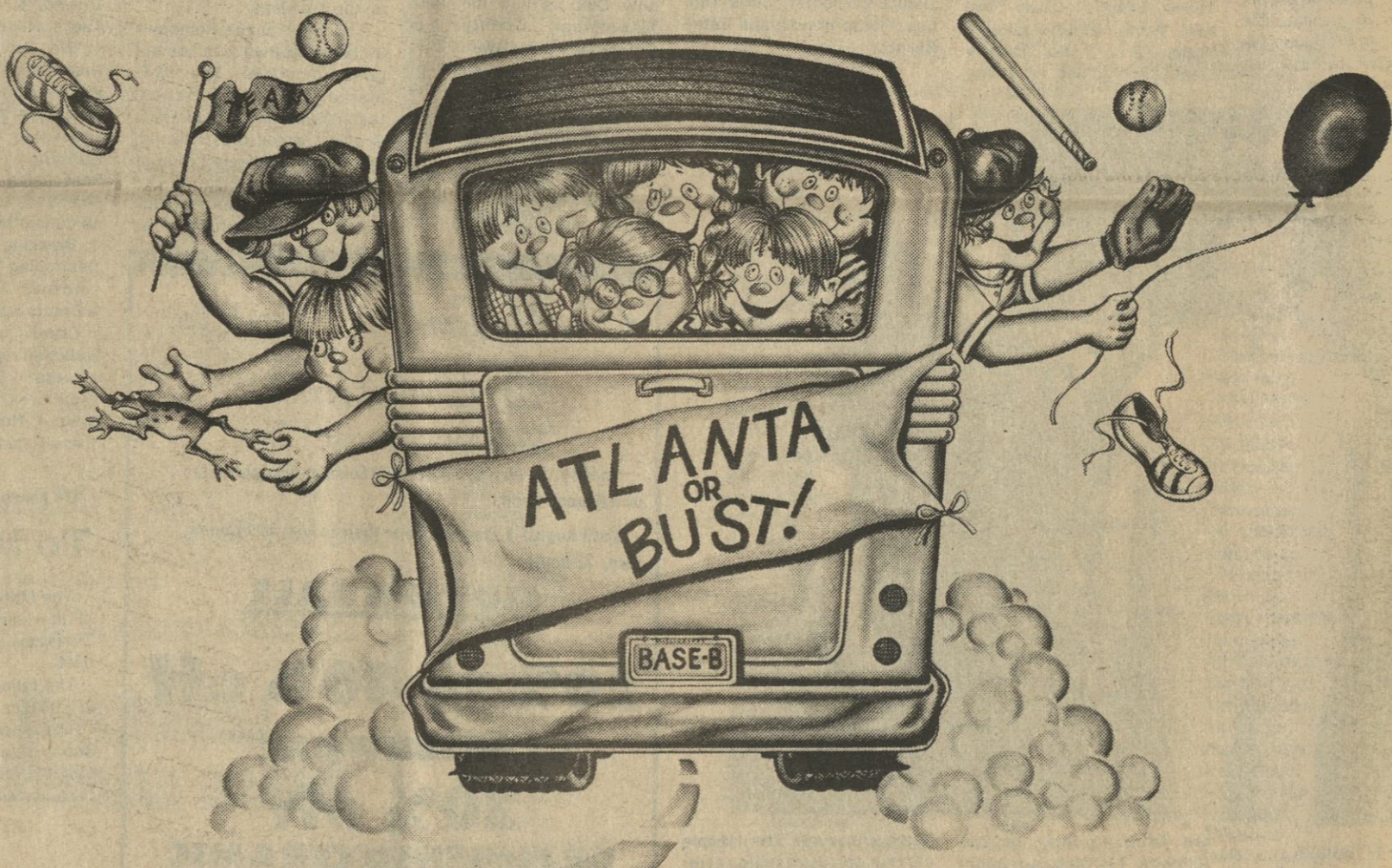

SEPPIE'S OPERATION

The following story first appeared in THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY NEWS on July 22, 1976:

Although we had started taking her to the veterinarian when Seppie was just four weeks old, we had never once left her overnight anywhere. On a few emergency trips when Art and I both had to be gone, the little dog had been left at home and someone had gone in to check on her for us.

So, when it became obvious that Seppie needed an operation to remove a tumor that was growing in one of her breasts, we just couldn't make up our minds to have it done. Years ago, you see, a veterinarian had mentioned to me that sometimes pampered pets had more trouble pulling through an operation or serious illness than unspoiled animals did - and I still had that remark in mind every time I thought of having Seppie spayed.

So, even though Seppie will

be 12 on September 15, 1976, she had not even been spayed because of my ridiculous thinking.

As the tumor got rapidly larger and as Seppie got more and more miserable every day, we knew that something should be done to relieve her suffering. Even if she died, we finally agreed, it would be better for her than for her to continue living in constant discomfort.

So, on July 1, with much anxiety, we took little Seppie out to Dr. Jim Perkins's Iuka Animal Clinic, on Hwy. 25 South, in Iuka. Located near the new courthouse, the Iuka Animal Clinic has been a real blessing for the residents of Tishomingo County and the adjoining communities. Until Dr. Perkins came to Iuka in 1971, animal owners here had to travel for many miles to the nearest veterinarians. Many a pet has died because it couldn't last long enough to reach a far-away veterinarian.

On the morning of July 1, the same day we took her to

him, Dr. Perkins operated on little Seppie. He removed the breast that had the tumor - and at the same time, he spayed her!

Today, twelve days later, Seppie is coming along fine. So, I can repeat that my being afraid to leave her away from home overnight was indeed ridiculous, foolish reasoning.

We don't believe in letting litters be born while there are so many homeless cats and dogs already on earth without homes, so we had never let Seppie have any offspring. It was not difficult for us to prevent her from having litters even though she wasn't spayed because we always had all the male dogs neutered as soon as possible after we brought one home.

So, our decision to have Seppie spayed at the age of nearly twelve had nothing to do with preventing her from having a litter. We had her spayed so that she would simply be healthier and more comfortable in her old age.

You see, in the human-being world, Seppie's age is already comparable to about a 100-year-old person! Once, dog years were figured by some experts to be seven dog years to one human year. But in recent years, the experts have come up with some new ideas on the subject and some now consider the first year of a dog's life to compare with the first 14 of a human life. The second year of a dog's life, a little less, and, then, it gets down to seven dog years to one human year, as it first started out to be (according to the information I've received from

time to time).


Well, anyway, for those who've asked me how old a cat or dog should be before its spayed - and if an old cat or dog can be spayed successfully - I can say now with personal experience that we've had animals spayed from age six months to 11 years, 7 1/2 months, Seppie's age when she was spayed.

Seppie already shows that she is much more comfortable and we know she will live much longer with the operation than she would have without it. We're hoping she'll live at least another 12 years (24 is not an impossible age, you know, for either a cat or a dog).

Little Seppie, brown and white mixed terrier, was given to us by our-then-next-door-neighbor, Kenneth Wayne Barrett, son of Mrs. Dimple Barrett, of Iuka, and the late Mr. Barrett. The little pup was given to us by Kenneth when the boy himself was about nine or ten. His gift has brought much joy into our lives.

FOOTNOTE: On March 18, 1980, little Seppie died of a heart attack. She was 15 1/2 years old. Having her spayed certainly added comfort to her life and she enjoyed the time she had left. She will always be missed.

Since Seppie's story was written, Dr. Perkins' Animal Clinic has moved to a new location on Hwy. 25 South.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

In a recent issue of THE VIDETTE I read an excellent LETTER TO THE EDITOR written by Ms. Morlock of the Corinth-Alcorn Humane Society. It concerned the plight of homeless animals in our community and the need to build an animal shelter for them. My family and I, as tax-paying citizens of this county, think a shelter would be a wonderful idea.

Politicians and hopeful office-holders take note... the building of an animal shelter would be a nice addition to your political platform. Think of the jobs it would create - first, people would have to be hired to build the shelter, then several people could be hired to maintain the shelter and attend to the care and feeding of the animals. There's also another plus - since half the people in Tishomingo County are running for public office this year, a new post would be created; that of City Dog Catcher.

Vetters of an animal shelter would probably say a shelter costs too much to build and maintain because so many people are on welfare or unemployment. At least unemployed people receive a little money to keep them from starving to death... unwanted animals don't. They face a slow, painful death by starvation or a swift, bloody death by a speeding car.

People, you can change this situation. Write or call the appropriate county officials or representatives and let them know you think an animal shelter is needed in Tishomingo County.

POINT OF LAW

Q: What liability do I assume if I "co-sign" a note for a friend or relative?

A: Frequently a lender will refuse to lend money to an individual who is considered a bad credit risk unless the individual has someone to co-sign the note promising to repay the money. If you co-sign a note for a borrower, you are basically promising the lender that you will pay back the amount borrowed if

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the borrower does not. For example, if you co-sign a note for a friend who has borrowed \$5,000 from a bank, and your friend is unable to repay the loan, you owe the bank \$5,000. The bank may legally force you to pay this amount.

Of course, as between you and your friend, your friend is primarily responsible for repaying the loan. If you should have to pay the bank, your friend is legally

obligated to repay you. However, the fact that your friend may have promised you that he would repay the bank himself does not prevent you being liable to the bank. Co-signing a note is not a mere formality; by co-signing, an individual takes on serious legal responsibilities.
