UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN STATE DROPS TO 12.2

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 12.2 percent in August, a decrease of one and three-tenths of a percentage point compared to July's revised jobless rate of 13.5 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Cohen Robertson. Last year's Scott county was unchanged. August unemployment rate was 11.5 percent.

The 12.2 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 9.2 percent national rate for August MESC figures showed 128,700 unemployed and 928,500 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,057,200. The initial unemployment insurance claims

totalled 15,270 in August. Sixty-two of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in August. Of that number, four counties had unemployment rates of 20.0 percent or above.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in August were George, with an unemployment rate of 22.4 percent; Montgomery, with 21.2 percent; Jefferson, with 20.8 percent; and Jackson, with an unemployment rate of 20.0 percent.



A major factor in maintaining high quality grain is insect control. Insects cause heating in the grain, lower germination of seed, poor food value, reduced grain weight and lower grade.

To protect stored grains from insects, clean and sanitize storage bins and protect the grain with the correct insecticide treatments. Maintaining correct temperature and humidity throughout the storage period is also important.

If stored grain becomes infested with insects, fumigation will be the only way to control the pests. Stored seed also needs the

This upcoming weekend will be a big one for deer and goose hunters. On Saturday, Oct. 1 the archery season for deer begins statewide. It will continue through Nov. 18.

Archery hunters may take one antiered buck per day, but not more than five during the license year. Bowhunters

Deer taken during the archery season apply toward the overall yearly bag limit on deer.

Enforcement officials at the Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson are reminding hunters that longbows are legal during the archery season on deer. No dogs, crossbows, or sidearms allowed while hunting deer

during the archery season. Bowhunters should know if they operate a deer camp during the deer season, they must obtain a camp permit from the Department of Wildlife Conservation before beginning operation. The permit is free.

Mississippi's first goose season gets underway statewide Saturday, October 1, and continues through November 2.

Legal birds during this season include blue geese, snow geese, and whitefronted geese.

The daily bag limit will be five geese and the

possession limit is 10, including not more than two white-fronted geese daily, with four in possession.

Legal shooting hours for goose hunting are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. Since geese are migratory waterfowl, hunters must have their guns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells at any one loading.

Hunters 16 years of age and over are required to purchase a \$7.50 federal duck stamp. In addition, hunters between 16 and 65 must have a \$2 state duck stamp.

Volunteers are essential to the successful delivery of 4-H programs to youth. Last year, 619,404 4-H Volunteer leaders worked directly and indirectly with youth. 489,392 - 4-H adult leaders and 130,012 - 4-H junior and teen leaders.

4-H volunteer leaders assist youth in 4-H educational projects and activities. Many serve on local 4-H advisory committees, state or district planning groups. Many states are expanding roles of volunteer leaders to include middle management responsibilities, including recruiting and training other volunteers.

4-H volunteers are supported by the equivalent of 4,372 professional staff members and 1,225 paraprofessionals. However, all of the approximately 16,300 extension workers give some time to 4-H.

The average 4-H volunteer donates 220 hours per year in preparing for and teaching youth -- thus for each hour the salaried staff member spends in 4-H, a volunteer spends 12 hours. He or she drives 300 to 400 miles for 4-H in a personally-owned car and spends \$50 to \$60 on teaching materials. Extimated value of the total time volunteers devote to 4-H plus their out-ofpocket expenses is about \$1 billion annually.

There is also substantial involvement and assistance to 4-H programs by resource people, business, industry, agricultural and civic groups, most of which is not included in the volunteer leadership listed above.
